

Captain Double wins derby

Captain Double, a gelding who'd won only one race at the meeting - and that against maidens - decked his foes in Sunday's 14th running of the Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby.

Captain Double won with enough authority to just about cinch honors as the champion three-year-old of the meeting. With Danny Summerow at the reins,

Captain Double roared out of last place in the mile-and-sixteenth marathon and swooped by his tiring foes like a vulture answering the dinner bell. He charged across the finish with a solid 41/4 length lead. In the final steps, Captain Double had favored Copper Case wrung out to dry, while the classy invader, Free Sea, was struggling at the rear of the pack under a wearisome burden of 123 pounds.


The Derby offered a gross purse of \$24,000 and handed the winner \$14,400. Captain Double toils for Sam Stevens of Lamesa, Texas. Jimmy McClanahan is the trainer. The mutuel returns: \$10.40, \$6,80, \$4.20.

Parmer County Kid, a 14-1 outsider handled by Richard Bickel, came flying down to the wire to push Copper Case out of the runnerup slot. The difference between second and third was a length.

Parmer County Kid, the property of Charles Trimble of Bovina, Texas, raked in \$5,280 and paid \$10.60 to place, \$5 to show. Copper Case, who carries the colors of Jinx Graham of El Paso, Texas, had to be content with a third place purse of \$2,400. His mutuel backers got a \$3 show

Capi's First, a 20-1 longshot, was the first out of the gate, and the filly managed to keep her pathfinding act going through the first half of the race. As she neared the turn for home, it was obvious she was

At that point, Copper Case appeared to smell victory and shifted into high gear. The gelding barrelled ahead of his foes with a big rush on the outside. He had the

lead as he reached the straightaway. But Copper Case's glory was short lived since Captain Double was moving with even greater intensity in the middle of the track. He thundered by Copper Case with ease, and the latter, as if knowing the jig was up, quickly caved in. Copper Case sagged badly in the final half furlong, just as Captain Double was finding his sea legs.

When Parmer County Kid delivered his big closing rush, Copper Case was unable to resist.

Free Sea, a colt who'd made over \$100,000, got away as a 3-1 second favorite in his mountain debut and clearly had no taste for the derby. He was in the first flight during most of the race, then quit completely in the stretch. He ilmped in next to last.

WARRIOR'S TIME rallied from just off the pace for a 34 length win in Saturday's six furlong headliner at Ruldoso Downs. The gray gelding, owned by W. T. Stradley of Hobbs, easily held off Rebel

Sea in the six furlong allowance test. Time into the early lead, but allowed him to settle in third place as Ernest Scout, a 50-1 longshot, elected to grab the front slot during the rush down the backstretch.

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Aspencade Committee bagan making preliminary plans Thursday for that event, scheduled for the first weekend in October.

Joe Esquivel died Friday in sewer trap

Joe Esquivel, 24, Glencoe, was found dead early Friday morning in a sewer trap located near the treatment plant on the Rio Ruidoso.

He had been employed by the village sewer department the past 10 months.

He was last seen alive about 8:10 Friday morning, by another employee, when he entered the large trap to remove debris. He was found, in the trap, about 9:05. Efforts to revive him, by members of the ambulance crew and officers at the scene. were futile.

The autopsy report on the cause of death is expected to be received from Albuquerque today.

Moore explains care mill levy

Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH) administrator Ken Moore said clarification is needed regarding the proposed mill levy increase, which will be on the November ballot, to provide additional health care services to county citizens.

Moore said the increase will be raised from the current .75 mills to 2.9 mills. The .75 mills is divided equally between two sections of the county, with Carrizozo and Corona receiving half and Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Alto, Nogal, Capitan and the Hondo Valley receiving half, to provide health services.

Moore said the 2.9 mill levy would give Carrizozo and Corona one mill and the other section of the county 1.9 mills. Moore said the increase was requested to expand health care facilities in the county, by providing a physician and physician's assistant for Carrizozo's Health Clinic, and expanding services and plant at RHVH.

A Treasured Emblem Of Bonney Scotland Here Amidst the Cedar,

Pinon And Pine Here is our mountain homeland we are cheered on every hand by many of the same flowers, trees and other children of Mother Earth that were treasured by our forefathers across the sea; and of course, remain fond favorites of our kindred neighbors across the waves.

Along about now, especially after the gentle rains, our mid-summer flower friends have bloomed forth like magic smiling at us across field, meadow and hill side, dressed in their purest colors.

Among these are the English buttercup, the English primrose, the forget-me-not of Norway and all the northern countries. numberless Alpine flowers of Switzerland, the Scotch blue bell - and many others.

Scotland is known in song and story as the land of the Heather — that blooming bush of matchless beauty and fragrance that adorns vast reaches of that beloved land, a solid mass of flowery glory stretching mile on mile, awakening the grateful pride of the native folks, causing the visitor's heart to leap with delight making Scotchmen of us all.

I have looked in many places on the mountain side for traces of the Heather, and yet have not seen any. However, the traditional emblem of the

Scotch people blooms everywhere here among us.

The Hardy Thistle Staunch and Faithful Dweller In The Land

One day, back in the middle of the driest times I have ever seen here in the vale, I was strolling down toward the river across the little field near the house.

The amber-colored grass was so dry and the ground beneath so hot that your eyes hurt as you looked down, and there was a somber, uneasy feeling in your heart and a heaviness to your step.

Then, on the dry air a fragrance reached you, sending a little wave of joy throughout your soul. What was blooming so sweetly through the heat and drought? Your eye caught little clumps of light green plants with lavender blooms on the top, shaped like little king's crowns and Highland bloomed all alone across the withered field, cheering the droughty landscape shimmering in the heat waves.

Bending to smell the Jossom you had a new and pleasant experience. The thistle, for this it was, breathed forth a pure and rich perfume all its own - something between a lily and a rose. How it spread its charm all through the air - the only bloom and fragrance in a dry and burning land! Now The Thistle

Feels At Home "We are like the Thistle," say the Scotch. "The thistle loves its native land and will always be here. Nothing can drive us from our native soil."

Mother Nature has protected the thistle with thorns and deep roots, making it safe and fast in that green and flowery land of abundant rain. I never knew that this staunch little plant could also endure the heat and drought.

Today, August fourteen, after the several days of slow rain and the misty cloudy weather - you would think you were in Scotland.

The misty clouds are hovering overhead light in spots and gray in other places in the sky. The sun shines through the thin and filmy whisps of cloud and mist upon a mountain land of glowing green.

As you walk across the meadows, the turf, fragrant with the incense of rapidlygrowing grass, is springy beneath your feet, giving a lift to your step and to your spirit. And there are the thistle blooms, glowing brightly now in their silken lavender trimmed in silvery white happy along with the joyful mountain world, sending us a message, telling us what a joy it is to endure, to hope, and to keep our faith in God.

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



Dear Sally: Please write an article on the care of piggyback plants. Thank you. I enjoy your column. Ruth Wimberly PIGGYBACK PLANT [Tholmela]



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grows its leaves in an interesting fashion. The slightly hairy, downy, heart shaped leaves of bright green grow from a basal rosette. At maturity each of the leaves sends up a new plantlet at the point where it joins its own stem, hence its common name. These new plants may be cut off and rooted whenever they appear at any season of the year. Insert about 2 inches of the leaf stem into sand, with the base of the leaf resting on the sand. Report at any season, using a mixture of 1 part loam, 1 part peat moss and 1 part sharp sand; to each gallon pailful of this mixture add 1½ teaspoons of 20½ superphosphate, 1 tablespoon of ground limestone and 2 teaspoons of 5-10-5 fertilizer. Or use a packaged general purpose potting soil. packaged general purpose potting soll.

Piggyback plants do best in bright indirect or curtain-filtered sunlight in a temperature range 55° to 75°. Soil MUST be moist, do not allow the plant to become dry. It will wilt whenever it needs water and often will not recover from severe drying out. The plant must have good drainage and not allowed to stand in water and become soggy. This will cause the leaves to turn brown and drop. Because of the hairy leaves where dust can collect quickly, it is best not to spray the plant to clean. To clean the plant fill a pan or sink with barely warm water with just a tad of soap added. Turn the plant upside down and dip a few times holding the plant in place carefully. The piggyback plant is a curiosity and a fun plant for children to

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New hospital equipment upgrades service

Several pleces of new equipment installed this year at Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH) provide expanded capabilities to serve the residents of Lincoln County, according to administrator Ken Moore.

An X-ray processer costing \$13,000, installed in March, was donated by the Hospital Auxiliary. The rapid film processer can develop K-rays in 90 seconds and has a built-in developer/heater that automatically regulates the temperature of chemicals used in the processer.

Radiology supervisor Joe Najera said the machine is a time saver. "With the old method, it took at least 30 minutes to process each X-ray," The modern machinery is no more costly in terms of supplies used, Najera said. Another money saving feature is that the machine turns

used. "It produces an impressive quality of X-ray, too," Najera said.

Other new machinery received in the radiology department will be used to make X-rays, Najera siad. "The biggest plus in getting this radiology equipment is that we were able to cut radiation exposure to the patient by 30 to 50 percent," Najera said.

The radiology room was rewired to house the X-ray unit which Najera said is "very modern, tried, true and proven reliable—it has a very low incidence of breakdown. We picked it because of its record," Najera siad, "and because the machine can perform many tasks."

It is moveable across the room to handle unusual cases and is equipped with a television-like camera that replaces a mirror device formerly used to read some types of problems, Najera said.

He said a tomography unit, which is an additional diagnostic tool, will soon be added to the equipment.

cell which automatically reads the amount of radiation a patient is exposed to and automatically gives the proper exposure for each X-ray, Najera said. This X-ray equipment carries a price tag of \$130,000.

An Intensive Care Unit (ICU) was installed August first, which gives RHVH capabilities to monitor vital signs of up to eight patients. The machine also allows the staff to monitor patients while they are, for example, walking through the hospital.

Another component will soon be added to give "trending capabilities" to the


machine, Moore said. The machine could then give readouts on each patient over an eight hour period, monitoring their vital signs. "This will help determine if certain things are getting ready to happen." Moore said.

He said, for example, if a person is admitted for observation and may have had chest pains, the unit can be used to help determine possible outcomes.

Another portion of the entire ICU package is a series of tools which will be placed in the rooms at each bed in intensive care. Those tools, suction, oxygen,

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
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



Well, that depends on whether you mean percentage of games won or just sheer

with 296 games notched as victories; that's only 19 away from Amos Alonzo Stagg's all-time 314 games. (Which means we have to put up with the Bear for at least two more years. Nuts.)

Bear's been coaching for 35 years, at Maryland, Kentucky, Texas A and M and Alabama. But his percentage is .781, which is behind Penn State's Joe Paterno and Michigan's Bo Schembechler.

Paterno's been head coach for 14 years at Penn State, which is in the Nittany Valley, which is why they're called the Nittany Lions, and his record is 121-25-2, which is .817 — Schembechler is 144-36-6. or .790 percentage.

This comes from a list compiled by Elmore "Scoop" Hudgins, public relations director of the Southeastern Conference, and he figures the top 20 coaches by winning percentages.

This year (he's been figuring these lists since 1958), he ilmited the number of victories to 76, which keeps Oklahoma's Barry Switzer out of the running (he's got 73 wins, seven losses and a brace of ties.) Switzer would have a .881 with that record, making him numero uno.

Anyway, here's the rest of the list: Tony Knapp of Nevada-Las Vegas, 130-43-4, .746; Dan Devine of Notre Dame, 163-55-8, .739; Carmen Cozza of Yale (who?), 97-35-3, .730; Bobby Bowden of Florida State, 107-44-0, .709; Vince Dooley of Georgia, 118-56-6, .672; Lou Holtz of Arkansas, 76-37-4, .667; Jerry Claiborne of Maryland and Bill Yeoman of Houston tied for 10th, with 126-65-4 and 125-65-6 records.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE - Eavesdropping on conversations, it's increasingly clear that most New Mexicans don't fully understand what's going on in connection with a successor to Congressman Harold Run-

Two elements are involved.

One is the remainder of the current term the Congressman was serving, and the other is a replacement for him on the ballot in November. The second of those concerns a new term, not the present one. which will begin on January 1 of the coming year.

As to the remainder of the present term, what is to be done is very clear. The Constitution of the United States gives the instruction here. It says that when a Congressperson dies while serving, the governor of the state in question "shall issue writs of election" to choose a replacement.

It doesn't say the governor gets to do that if he or she wants to, it says "shall . . .

So the public ought to understand that, first, Governor King does not appoint somebody to fill this unexpired term; he calls an election. For that election, both Republicans and Democrats are entitled to name a candidate. But whoever gets elected will only serve till December 31, 1980, a period of about four and a half months.

Since that time is so short, some have suggested that the Governor simply declare the November election to be this special election as regards this particular

It is the second element of the suc-

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terest. That is the question of whose name will go on the ballot to replace that of the duly constituted Democratic candidate on November 4 of this year.

In this case, the law provides that such a person shall be named by the Democratic Central Committee - not the Governor. That committee is empowered to fill the vacancy, as the Republican Central Committee would be if there were a vacancy on the Republican side of the

There is no such vacancy on the Republican side because that party, by failing to run anyone in the June primary, forfeited its right to have a candidate on the ballot in November.

That's what the Attorney General's office ruled on - and if the Republicans can find a way to get around that fact, they are fine lawyers indeed.

The reason the state is pushing for compliance with the 55 mile per hour speed limit is to prevent our losing highway funds. Certain shares of our federal road dollars will be withheld unless a specified percentage of us drive at or below 55 miles per hour.

In light of that fact it is ironic that one of the state agencies with the worst record of compliance with that speed law is the Highway Department, which is funded in part by those federal dollars.

As one of those road agency vehicles passed this reporter on the road as if his little Honda were standing still, this thought flashed through his mind: "If the Highway folks can't even convince their own employees, what right do they have to cessorship which creates the deeper in- suspect the rest of us will comply?"

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





Focus on **Small Business**

by E. Maine Shafer

Dear Mr. Shafer,

"Everybody talks about the need for more innovative ideas that can become market products, that provide jobs, increase our Nation's productivity, and make new millionaires. I've got an idea. What can I do with it?"

If you pursue your idea down a road that is covered every inch of the way with obstacles - and succeed - you will become one of those rare, "unreasonable" people on whom progress depends. And you may wind up with a lot of money, power and prestige to boot.

For, as George Bernard Shaw observed. it is the unreasonable people who try to change the world around them; reasonable people adapt to it.

The Small Business Administration (SBA) recently published a new Management Aid (No. 248), "Can You Make Money with Your Idea or Invention?" that is targeted to the "unreasonable" person. The author, John Tavela, says he or she is "the kind of person your country needs to compete in world markets and maintain its standard of living" because they are "the cutting

edge of the future.' This booklet reports some statistics that may, or may not, deter idea people: between 50 and 80 percent of new products fail; of every 100 ideas submitted 85 have too many faults to bother with, and of the

produced — and only one of those will

make money. With odds like 99 to 1 against an idea being a monetary success, it shouldn't come as any surprise that your idea may be greeted with a chorus of yawns. Companies and investors are basically conservative when it comes to investing their money. Ideas are risky.

While coming up with a sure-fire idea is the biggest step, it is only the first of many before you can realize the first dollar from your invention or other innovation.

The SBA pamphlet details how, at a bare minimum, your idea will have to pass the following tests:

- Is it original or has someone else already come up with it?

 Can someone produce and distribute
 it, if it's an invention or other product. Can someone use it, if it's a marketing innovation, a new use for an existing product, or the like?

- Will it really make money - will someone buy it?

— Can you protect your idea? The publication tells where you can go for help with your idea, and gives you a guide to where you can get further in-

dition to the co-directors, two undergraduate students and one graduate student will participate in the project. The project began August 1, 1980.

Fly ash is the small particles of ash which are emitted into the atmosphere. Coal typically contains five to 20 percent mineral material that forms the ash on combustion.

"Modern air pollution control equipment can collect in excess of 99.5 percent of the ash emitted from larger plants," Dr. Clark said. "In spite of this efficiency, so much coal is burned in each plant that large amounts of ash are still emitted into the atmosphere. Furthermore, the particles that escape the pollution control equipment may be the most harmful because they are mostly in the respirable size range and do not tend to settle out of the air readily."

In order to trap these particles using existing technology, larger and more expensive anti-pollutin controls equipment will be required, with correspondingly higher operating costs. "Clearly, an alternative approach to the problem is needed," Dr. Clark said.

"Our approach is to attempt to minimize the number of small particles by changes in the combustion conditions and the use of various additives," Dr. Sveum said.

"If this approach is successful, it should be possible to design coal burning furnaces that produce less pollution than at present." Clark said.

VA lowers mobile home interest rates

The Veterans Administration (VA) has reduced the maximum allowed interest rate on mobile home loans to 14.5 percent, retroactive to July 21.

The maximum guarantee on a mobile home is \$17,500, said Ray Corkran, VA loan guaranty officer for New Mexico. At the same time, the maximum interest

rate for VA-guaranteed loans to buy mobile home lots or to buy both a mobile home and lot fell to 14 percent. The reductions ranged from 1 to 1.5

percent. Declining interest rates in the commercial market allowed the changes to be made. Corkran said.



Cutting trees had to be directly super-

vised by Blann. Trash had to be removed from the wilderness area and material suitable for firewood had to be deposited at the South Fork Campground. The drill hole had to be cased to bedrock.

A water quality monitoring program to guard against pollution was established and conducted by Forest Hydrologist John McClain. The crew struck water twice during the drilling, but in both instances, the water was cemented off.

The crew and their operation was monitored by Forest Service personnel throughout the project. Drill site engines had to have approved muffler systems, which were not as loud as an ordinary chain saw motor.

The helicopter which serviced the operation, hauling men and materials in and out of the Forest, was restricted to the safest and most direct route, to avoid unnecessary wilderness flying. During the project, every bit of trash, fuel, grease. drilling mud and drill chips were flown out of the area by the helicopter.

The drill site had to have a fire fighting tool for each person on the drilling crew, as

well as an eight pound fire extinguisher on the site at all times, All man made materials had to be removed from the site.

Dynamite blasts are nothing new for the area surrounding Grants, one of the Southwest's fastest growing mining areas.

But when a dynamite blast rips apart a transformer owned by the Continental Divide Electric Cooperative, that's different.

This week the State Crime Stoppers Commission, the Uranium Country Crime Stoppers Program and the Continental Divide and Plains Electric Corporation are offering up to \$3,000 in rewards for information leading to the solution of the bombing.

Police reports indicate the explosion occurred around 4:30 a.m., July 25. Apparently two or three sticks of dynamite were used to destroy the transformer.

Hoyce Hodges, agent in Charge of the Albuquerque office of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, told the Grants Beacon that debris from the bomb had been sent to the bureau's laboratory in Washington, D. C., for analysis.
