Chester O. Boots, pharmacist's mate, third class, USNR, 25, 1012 Bishop road, Grosse Pointe Park, is a member of the U.S.S. Solace, hospital ship which has just been awarded the navy unit commendation for outstanding work at Pearl Harbor. Scene of the formal presentation

of Secretary of Navy James Forrestal's commendation was a Portland, Ore., shipyard, where the vessel docked recently after completion of seven trips to Okinawa. It was her first voyage to the States since December, 1943.

The Solace, nicknamed "the workhorse of the Pacific," also participated in operations at Guam, Saipan, Tarawa, the Admiralties, Kwajalein, Eniwetok, Papei and Iwo Jima, treating some twenty-seven thousand patients.

Fifty-Eighth Bombardment Wing, Tinian. — Staff Sergt. Robert Kenworthy of Grosse Pointe Woods.

member of the famous 58th Bombardment Wing, pioneer Superfortress unit commanded by Brig. Gen. Roger M. Ramey of Denton, Tex., enroute to the United States for separation from the armed forces under the army's readjustment program.

Staff Sergeant Kenworthy served as an instrument specialist in the 4th (Kagu-Tsuchi) Bomb Group of the B-29 bombers who first took the giant bomber into combat and established one of the outstanding records of the war in operations against Japan from India, China and Tinian over the broadest territory covered by any air force unit.

The 58th Wing was stationed in the India-China theatres from the spring of 1944 until March, 1945, as the only unit of the 20th Bomber Command and then moved to Tinian to join other units of the Twentieth Air Force in the final "blitz" against the Jap mainland. The movement to the Pacific involved a non-stop flight of over 3,800 miles by more than 150 Superfortresses from India to Tinian and was carried out without the loss of a man or a plane.

The return to the United States will mark the completion of a round-the-world trip for many of the veteran members of the pioneer Superfortress unit.

Your Garden This Week

Late potatoes should be dug in late September or early October before freezing weather sets in, but to reach their full development, should not be moved until the stems

and leaves have died. They are safer in the ground than in a damp, warm storage basement — at least until hard frosts are here. If possible, dig them on a clear day when the soil is not wet. Handle them carefully to prevent bruises and cuts. Dry them off well before placing in storage.

Don't be too hasty in digging carrots, beets and other root crops, or in pulling cabbage for storage. These crops are much better off left in the garden as late as possible as long as they do not actually freeze.

A few clumps of chives, potted to grow indoors, are excellent substitutes for onions.

Pumpkins and squash should be picked before hard frosts occur. Be

sure to leave part of the stem on the fruit, and plan to store only those that have matured completely. Tomatoes should also be picked before the hard frosts. It is possible to continue to ripen them by hanging up the vines indoors, or by picking them off and spreading them out in a light room.

For garnishes during the winter, pot up two or three plants of parsley. If your parsley is growing in a garden which will not be fall plowed, it will withstand the winter if covered with straw.

Cover bean rows which are still bearing with sacking or newspapers on frosty nights, also peppers. Tomato plants may be treated likewise.

Stamp Pointers AND Pointers' Stamps

Do you keep your stamps in a cigar box where they cannot be appreciated and enjoyed? Nothing shows up a stamp collection as well as a nicely kept album.

The most widely used albums are the ones published by Scotts — Scotts' International, for the world and Scotts' National, for the United States, also Scotts' Specialty group, such as France and colonies, British Empire, etc. Spaces are provided for every stamp. They also have other albums which have places for only major varieties and for the less expensive stamps.

Some collectors prefer blank albums such as Elbe products. These, the collector rules up to suit his needs and makes notations about the stamps. Most of the prize winning collections at the different stamp exhibitions are mounted in this type of album. Some collectors, especially those starting out, use a stock book. This is an album which has eight to 10 pockets on each page into which you can slip your stamps. One style has black pages and transparent pockets which make a very attractive display.

Many use the ordinary loose leaf paper or note books purchased at the dime store. The way they are mounted and written up makes all the difference in the world between a collection and just a bunch of stamps.

Postmaster Hannegan announced that a three-cent memorial stamp will be issued in honor of Alfred E. Smith, former governor of New York on November 26th, in New York City. This announcement came as a surprise to the stamp world as it has not been customary for the post office department to issue a stamp for an individual except on an anniversary of his birth or death.

Two more countries are issuing stamps honoring President Roosevelt: They are Liberia and Nicaragua.

Stamps play a very important part in the rehabilitation of wounded soldiers. A large number of the men at Percy Jones hospital are taking an active interest in stamps and passing many hours pouring over their collections. Hil Best of 1215 Nottingham is chairman of the "Stamps for Servicemen" committee of the Michigan Stamp club and is doing a fine job of supplying them with stamps and albums. Anyone interested in contributing stamps for this recreational therapy project may send them direct to him.

Mr. Best specializes in stamps of Australia and France and has them mounted in Scott's Specialty Albums.



Fertilizer Makers Rap Government Plan
More government interference with farmers and farm community businessmen is threatened by the companion Hill-Bankhead and Flanagan bills now before congressional committees, according to an "emergency bulletin" just issued by the National Fertilizer Association, Washington, D.C.
The bills propose government construction of plants to supply fertilizer to 75 farmers in each of 29 agricultural counties, to the disadvantage of their neighbors and at the taxpayer's expense, the bulletin maintains.
It also points out that 50,000 fertilizer agents and dealers, most of whom are small businessmen, will be unable to meet this government competition with private enterprise. Moreover, the existence of 1,100 fertilizer manufacturing plants employing 20,000 people is jeopardized by these bills, the bulletin asserts.
Association spokesmen state that fertilizer production capacity always exceeded demand and that more government-built plants and their subsidized government operation would accordingly be a waste of public money. They point out that under private enterprise fertilizer is priced lower than almost any other commodity the farmer buys, according to U. S. Department of Agriculture figures.

Tunnels Aid Research
The chief tool of the scientists for aerodynamic research is the wind tunnel which measures airplane characteristics under simulated flight conditions. The three general

classes of wind tunnels are those which can test: 1. Full-sized aircraft in a moving airstream. 2. Free flying models in an inclined airstream. 3. Models under compressed air conditions (to more closely resemble actual flight performance).

The Tragic Toll of Careless Fires Is Scored by Fire Chief

A compelling reason for observance of Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 7-13, is underlined in the following statistics on the destruction and human suffering caused by fires in the United States, provided by Fire Chief Rector of Grosse Pointe Park, and based on figures recently compiled by the National Fire Protection Association:

A total of 650,000 fires last year caused approximately ten thousand deaths and destroyed property valued at \$450,000,000.

One thousand homes are attacked by fire every day, or at the rate of one every 90 seconds.

Daily, there are 1,000 home fires, 130 store fires, 100 factory fires, seven church fires, seven school fires, and three hospital fires.

A total of 200,000 forest fires each year lay waste to 30,000 acres of valuable forest land.

In the last decade, six million fires have ravaged property valued at three billion dollars.

Yet, according to the Park fire chief, 90 per cent of all fires are caused by sheer carelessness.

University of Michigan Acquires Rare Edition of Army's Initial 'Stars and Stripes'

Ann Arbor—A rare 1861 edition of the Union army newspaper, "The Stars and Stripes," believed to be the only copy in existence, has been discovered and acquired by the William L. Clements Library of American history here on the University of Michigan campus.

This great-granddaddy of the famous service newspaper was purchased from a Battle Creek manuscript dealer for less than \$25.

In the opinion of librarians here, the founders of the official AEF newspaper, "The Stars and Stripes" during World War I, which was resurrected in World War II, were completely unaware of the Civil War publication bearing the same name.

A small, four-page handset paper, it was published on Nov. 9, 1861, by members of the Illinois Volunteers in a captured printing plant at Bloomfield, Mo., after Union soldiers chased the Confederates out of town. It is labeled "Vol. 1, No. 1," but whether or not subsequent issues were published is unknown.

That the newspaper plant was taken with little formality is evident from reading the paper. "Through the distinguished kindness of our commander, Col. R. J. Oglesby," the soldiers wrote, "we are permitted to take temporary possession of the Bloomfield Herald and print a newspaper."

The G.I. sense of humor wasn't exactly lacking among Civil War soldiers. Under their "Obituary" column they printed this note:

"DIED — A Natural Death — in Bloomfield, Mo., Nov. 9, 1861, the last spark of secession. The last rights will be paid to its remains at Spring Hill today by the Illinois Volunteers, under the command of Col. R. J. Oglesby."

The advertisements made good reading, too. One Union soldier penned this offering:

"AUCTION SALE — Offering a

varied assortment of the latest styles of Southern Confederate Bonds put up in lots to suit the purchasers. For sale by Colonel Oglesby's soldiers on the premises."

The lead story in the paper wasn't concerned with atomic bombs, B-29s or pin-up girls. It soberly discussed the vast superiority of the two-horse wagon over the heavier four- and six-horse wagon "for expeditions and rapid movements."

World Adventure Series Plans Interesting Program

Natural color motion picture tours to remote parts of the world and to well-known tourist spots in America are listed in the 1945-46 program just issued by the World Adventure Series of the Detroit Institute of Arts. The series opens its fall schedule on Sunday, October 14, at 3:30 with a motion picture tour of New England presented by the noted Boston author and radio commentator, Alton Blackington.

The World Adventure Series was organized in 1944 by its present managing director, George F. Pierrot, to give financial aid to the educational work of the Detroit Institute of Arts. It has since grown into the largest lecture course of its kind in the world. The motion picture lectures are held every Sunday afternoon at 3:30 in the institute auditorium.

Anticipating increased motor travel as a result of the end of gasoline rationing, the World Adventure series has scheduled numerous motion picture tours to places easily reached by automobile from Detroit — California, Mexico, Canadian Rockies, the Rio Grande and Colorado rivers.

Explains Distribution of Community War Chest Funds

Where does the money go that people in this community give to the war chest each year?

Of the \$8,490,336 to be collected in the metropolitan area in the Oct. 31 drive this year \$3,615,944 is earmarked Detroit community fund. This 3/4 million dollars represents 42.6 per cent of the total and it will be distributed to more than 80 local private social service agencies, included among these agencies are youth organizations such as the Scouts, hospital out-patient departments, homes for children and old people, and numerous service agencies such as the Legal Aid Bureau and the Community Information Service. Everyone in the community benefits from these fund agencies. Distribution of the community

fund dollar is made by the central budget committee of the council of social agencies, which is a federation of charitable, educational, and civic agencies, public and private, organized to bring about and maintain an effective adjustment between social welfare needs and social welfare resources.

County to Maintain Eight Mile Road in G. P. Woods

The village of Grosse Pointe Woods has relinquished the maintenance of Eight Mile road (Vernier) to the Wayne county road commission.

The village will continue the job of policing.

Canned Munitions to Keep United States on Guard

"Canned" munitions is the latest idea of American industry for protection of the nation against future enemy attack.

Manufacturers are working on the idea of aluminum cans in which guns and ammunition can be stored. If the plan proves successful, the canned arms would be dispersed throughout the country for almost immediate use in case an attack should come in the next 20 to 50 years.

Receive Social Security, No Matter at What Age You Die

Here is something you want to tell your family: Under old-age and survivors insurance, survivors benefits are payable when you die—no matter at what age that happens.

That is something some workers' families still don't understand. The wife and child of a living wage earner can't get benefits until the worker is 65 or over and stops work. But they can get survivors benefits when the worker dies any time, whether it's before he is 65 or after—provided he is insured at the time of his death. There may be monthly benefits, or just a lump-sum, depending on who makes up the family. But almost always something is payable to an insured worker's family when he dies.

If the worker leaves no one immediately eligible for monthly benefits a lump-sum death benefit is payable if a claim is filed within two years. This lump-sum goes to the widow, widower, child, grandchild, or parent, in the order named. If the worker is not survived by any such relative the lump-sum may be paid to other relatives or friends in reimbursement for burial expenses. So don't delay telling your family.

Airport Plan May Provide A Billion-Dollar Market

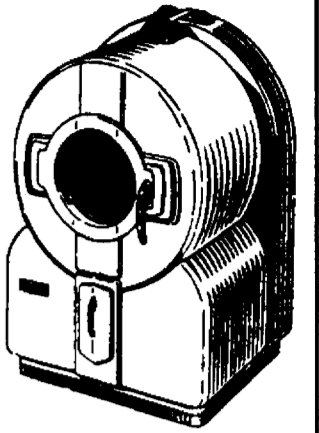

Government-aid airport development as contemplated in pending congressional bills would create a billion-dollar labor and materials market in the next decade according to the CAA.

The CAA proposes the construction of 3,000 additional airports. It estimates that it will provide \$25,300,000 worth of labor and materials for preparation of sites, \$395,300,000 worth of paving, \$55,000,000 in lighting and identification equipment, a \$10,900,000 investment in radio equipment, and related miscellaneous installations costing \$34,800,000.

Designed to be used in suits, dresses, sweaters and other wearing apparel, the new fabric resembles wool. Research was started when the company learned 100,000,000 pounds of chicken feathers and 30,000,000 pounds of turkey feathers were wasted in the United States annually.

Cargo Fleet Busy Despite V-J Day

The American Merchant Marine, which mobilized months before Pearl Harbor, will be one of the last of our war services to demobilize. V-J Day has meant no slackening of effort to the American steamship companies and seamen who operate and man our vast merchant fleet which will be required for military

and rehabilitation services for from one to two years, according to the American Merchant Marine Institute.

With six million men in the American armed services overseas, yet to be returned, the job of bringing the troops home will occupy considerable shipping for many months. The maintenance of 250,000 men in our army of occupation in Germany, in addition to the several hundred thousand which are needed in Japan, is another of our merchant fleet's major tasks.
