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Slate Oak, Nathanson for '81 closing

The amount of your social security benefit is based on your earnings under the system percentage of your pre-retirement wages.

Persons with low wages can expect social security to replace about 55% of their monthly pre-retirement wages; middle-income wage earners, 40%; high-income workers, 30% or more.

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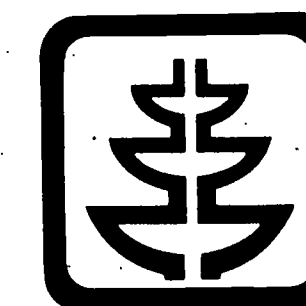

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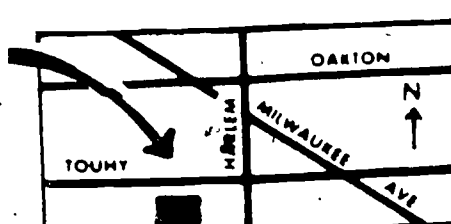

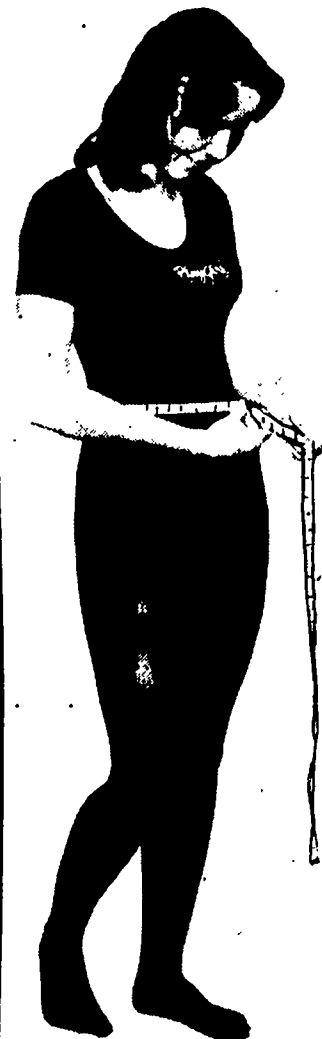

In Marriage/Family, Give Self

What does it profit a man if he gains money, prestige in his job, self-respect? The following is not uncommon in marital counseling—the husband had two predominant themes—money and self. He constantly put his wife down—she wasn't as smart, couldn't match up to his mother, never did anything right, has it so easy, and was generally beneath him. She hit back hard for her own survival after enduring it for more than 10 years by threatening divorce. At first her husband could hardly believe it—not him! Why, she couldn't do that to him. He was too great, too good, too... How could she do that to him after all he had done for her: three children, home, car, bank account (all three in his name though)? Not only was the wife suffering in this family, but so were the children. The first major breakthrough came when the father dared to take the risk of investing himself in his children. He began to find out that he had really been missing out on a good thing and he began to actually enjoy his children. He found the rewards to be great. What he thought would be a threat to his ego, his manliness, he found quite the opposite. Also, he began to enjoy his work. Though he was successful before, he was unhappy and his work was anxiety producing. He began to invest himself in his clients, let down some, not have to prove himself every time with a client and pull punches; his sales improved. Now he is enjoying his work as well as being successful. Threat to his ego like he thought? No! Instead, he found the change to be quite rewarding, not ego-deflating. Now, how about his wife? This has been the most difficult area for him to really invest himself. He says he loves his wife and wants to preserve his marriage if at all possible. He believes he is now ready to take the risk of making such an investment. But, his wife doesn't think she can or will, or even wants to try any longer. It may appear that I am singling out the men more than the women, but in my work, I have found this to be the big hang-up in men—preservation of their ego at the expense of not expressing their emotions and thereby not being as human as they might be. Unfortunately, too many couples wait until they resemble the example above before they try to do anything about it. Don't let it go as far as this, though, because then it's all uphill. If you aren't able to work it out in a few months, so your relationship is more satisfying to you both, then reach out for some professional help before it drags on for years, and/or ends in divorce. 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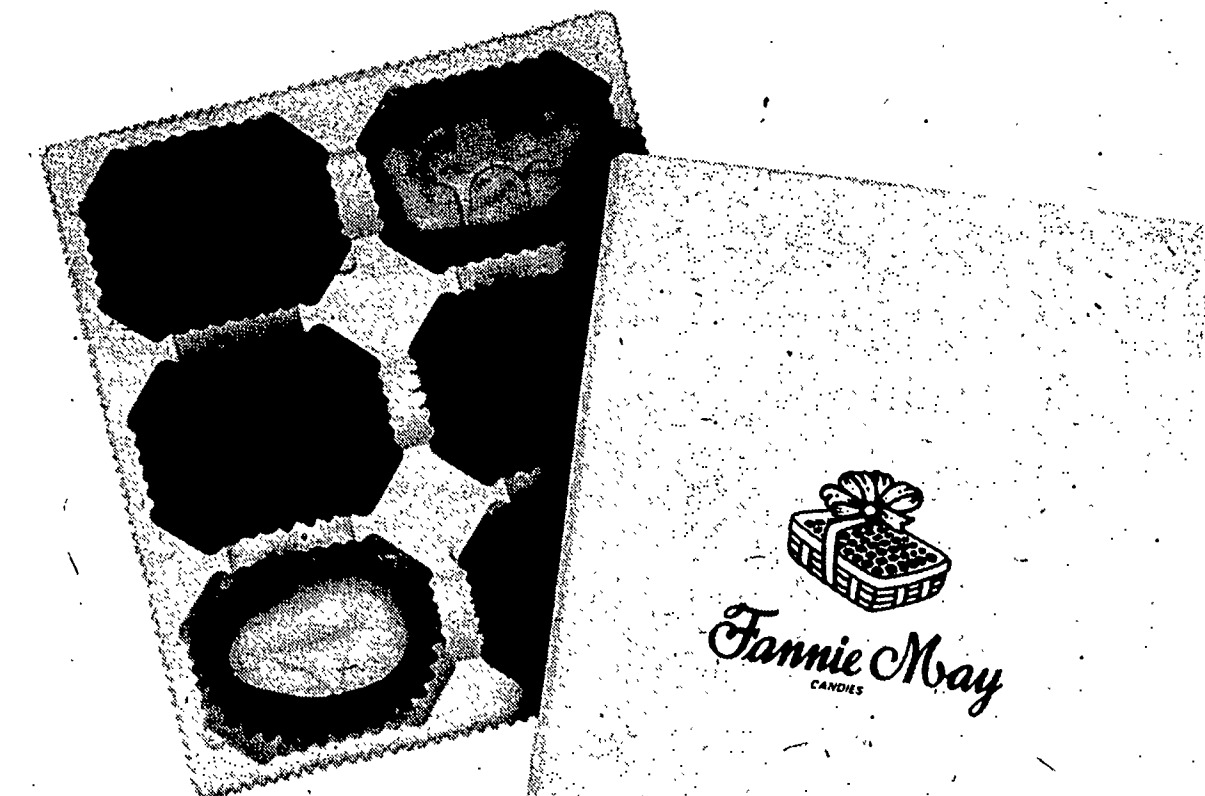

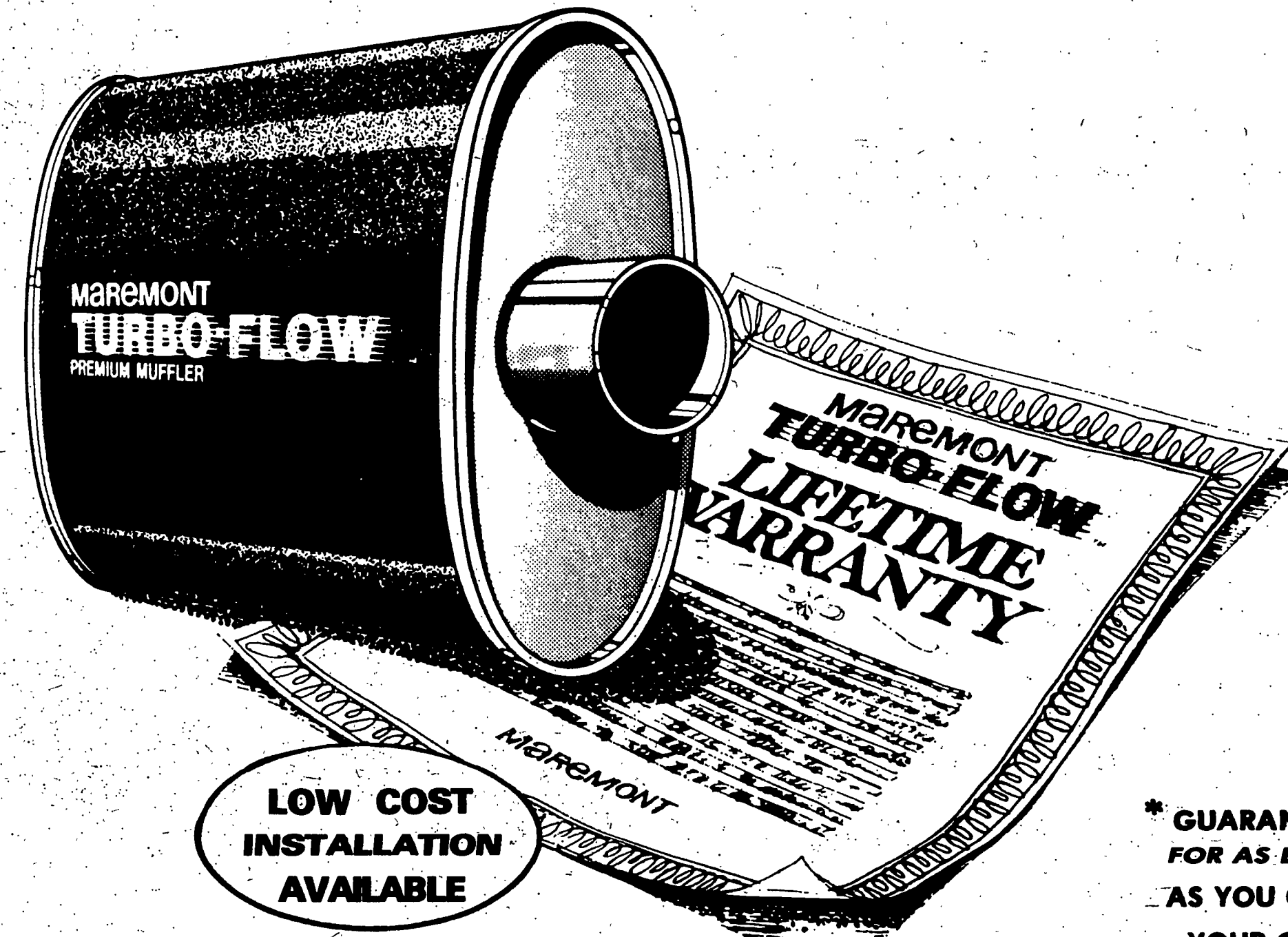

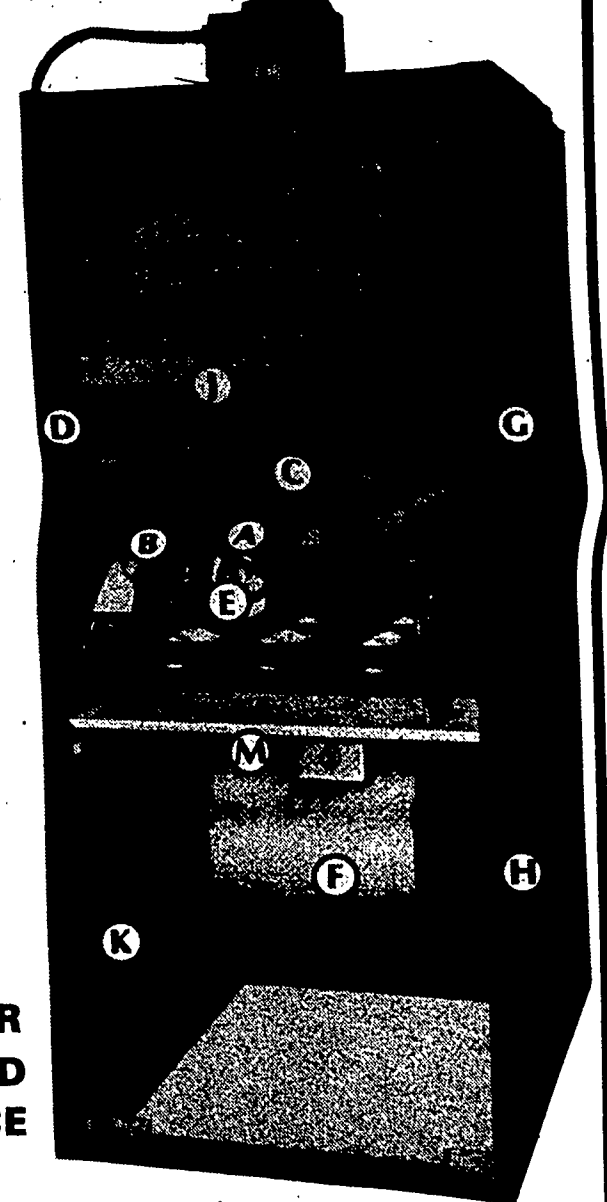
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Inga Nimrod files for OCC Board

Tax relief possible through an IRA

With the deadline for filing 1979 income tax returns quickly approaching, Citizens Bank & Trust Company, Park Ridge, reminds taxpayers that possible tax benefits are still available for qualified persons.

The federal tax law grants the privileges of deductible contributions and tax-deferred accumulation for retirement savings through an Individual Retirement Account (IRA). Employed individuals who are not covered by any other tax-qualified plan (pension, profit sharing) and are under the age of 70½ can open or add to an IRA by tax return time of this year and still claim the contribution as a tax deduction on one's 1979 income tax return. One can deposit any amount up to 15% of his earned income to a maximum of \$1,500 each year into an IRA (\$1,750 with a separate account for a non-working spouse).

Annual contributions to an IRA are tax deductible and no income tax is paid on the interest these

deposits earn until one begins receiving distributions at age 59½ or thereafter. However, there are substantial penalties for any premature withdrawals from an IRA and distributions must begin by age 70½. Also each contribution to an IRA has a 3-year time requirement for persons under age 59½ (except for deposits to 26-week money market certificates).

Accumulation of funds from deposits into an IRA can be substantial over a period of years. For example, a \$1,500 annual contribution into an IRA that pays 8% interest compounded daily will amount to nearly \$200,000 after thirty years.

Legislation enacted earlier this year now permits other deposit account options for one's retirement planning. Contributions to certificates of deposit paying a rate of interest one-half percentage point below the yield on Treasury securities maturing in 2½ years (to a maximum rate of 12%, compounded daily) are permissible. IRA funds can also be deposited into 26-week money market certificates requiring a minimum one-time deposit of \$10,000. Federal regulations prohibit the compounding of interest on this type of certificate.

Additional tax relief is available to an employee who is covered by a company retirement plan and receives a lump-sum distribution at retirement, other separation, or plan termination. The law allows the recipient of such a distribution to deposit within sixty days all or part of the lump sum into an IRA rollover plan. The account holder will pay tax as payments from the IRA are received. Tax and financial advice should be obtained before making a rollover.

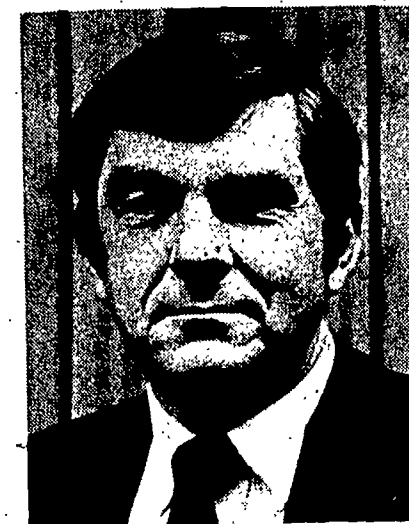

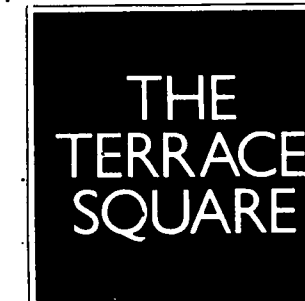

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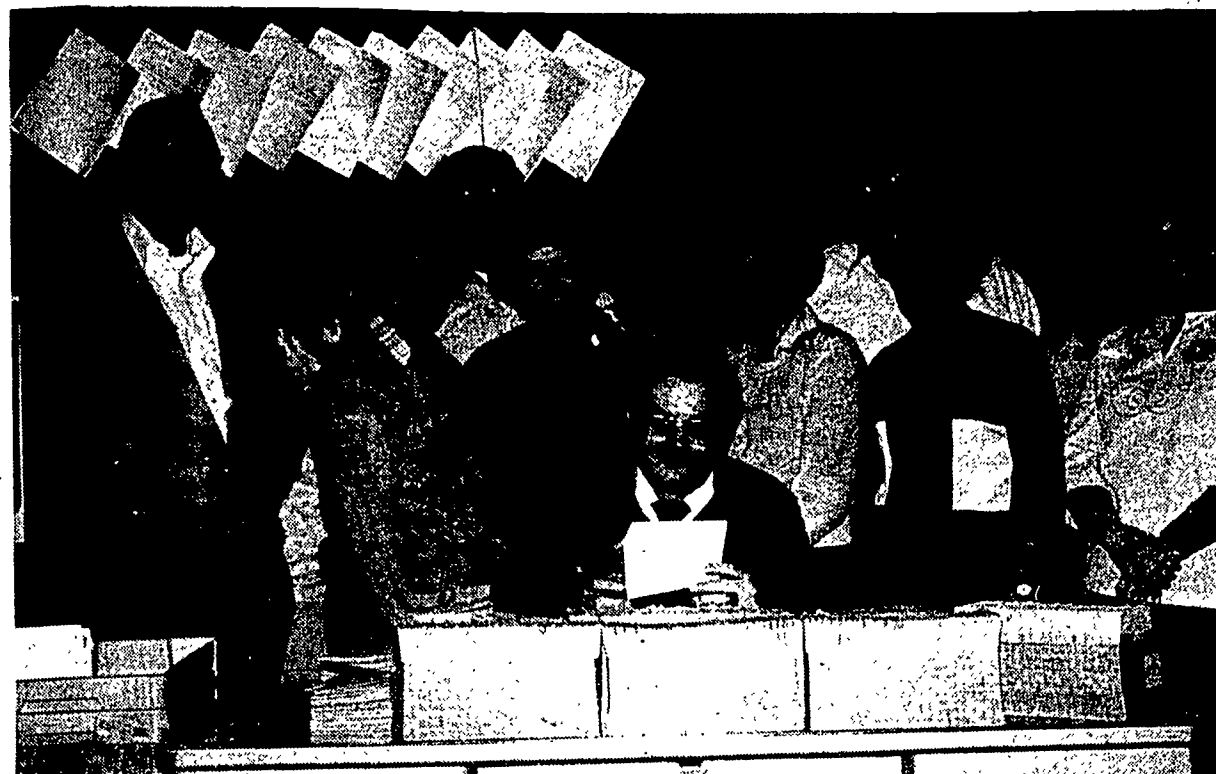

PROPOSED SETTLEMENT

This action is a claim by certain taxpayers who, on their own behalf and on behalf of all others similarly situated, have alleged that they have been improperly taxed by the North Maine Fire Protection District for the years 1971 to date by reason of the fact that the properties for which they are the taxpayers of record were disconnected from said North Maine Fire Protection District by the annexation of said properties to the Village of Niles. This Proposed Settlement, if approved by the Honorable Harold A. Siegan, Judge, Circuit Court of Cook County, will fully adjudicate all rights of said taxpayers.

Annexations

The Village of Niles, Illinois, by Ordinance Nos. 1970-11 and 1970-12 passed April 28, 1970, and by Ordinance 1970-20 passed May 26, 1970, annexed certain properties to the Village. Copies of said Ordinances are attached hereto as Exhibits A, B and C respectively. At the time of said annexations, the properties in question were within the corporate limits of the North Maine Fire Protection District.

Double Taxation

By reason of the properties being within the North Maine Fire Protection District, said properties were subject to a tax for fire protection services in an amount levied by the Corporate Authorities of the North Maine Fire-Protection District. Upon annexation to the Village of Niles, said properties were subject to a tax for all municipal services, including fire protection, in an amount levied by the corporate authorities of the Village of Niles. Thus, if the properties were to remain in both the North Maine Fire Protection District and the Village of Niles, said properties would be subject to two tax levies for fire protection services, one by the North Maine Fire Protection District and the other by the Village of Niles.

Litigation

The applicable statute pertaining to properties within a Fire Protection District that are subsequently annexed to a municipality is as follows:

"Any territory within a fire protection district that is or has been annexed to a city, village or incorporated town that provides fire protection for property within such city, village or incorporated town is, by operation of law, disconnected from the fire protection district as of the January first after such territory is annexed to the city, village or incorporated town, or in case any such territory has been so annexed prior to the effective date of this amendatory Act of 1965, as of January 1, 1966. Such disconnection by operation of law does not occur if, within 60 days after such annexation or after the effective date of this amendatory Act of 1965, whichever is later, the fire protection district files with the appropriate court a petition alleging that such disconnection will cause the territory remaining in the district to be noncontiguous or that the loss of assessed valuation by reason of such disconnection will impair the ability of the district to render fully adequate fire protection service to the territory remaining with the district. When such a petition is filed, the court shall set it for hearing, and further proceedings shall be held, as provided in Section 15 of this Act. At such hearing, the district has the burden of proving the truth of the allegations in its petition."

Illinois Revised Statutes (1969), Chapter 127-1/2, Section 38.3.

Pursuant to said statute, the North Maine Fire Protection District filed an action in the Circuit Court of Cook County, Illinois to prevent the disconnection from the North Maine Fire Protection District.

After hearing the evidence, the trial Judge dismissed the Petitions of North Maine Fire Protection District on December 9, 1970.

The North Maine Fire Protection District took an appeal from Judge Commerford's ruling. The Appellate Court of Illinois, First District, on September 14, 1971 entered its judgment affirming the ruling of Judge Commerford. The North Maine Fire Protection District filed a Petition for Leave to Appeal with the Supreme Court of Illinois asking that Court to review the Judgment of the Appellate Court. On January 26, 1978 the Supreme Court of Illinois denied the Petition for Leave to Appeal.

All avenues of appeal from Judge Commerford's Order of December 9, 1970 having failed, the Order became final.

Legal Positions of the Parties
 It is the legal position of the Plaintiffs that they should not have been obligated to pay taxes to the North Maine Fire Protection District from and after December 9, 1970.

It is the position of the North Maine Fire Protection District that it had the right under the provisions of Chapter 127-1/2, Section 37b to take an appeal from Judge Commerford's ruling, and that during the pendency of the appeal, the North Maine Fire Protection District was obliged to provide, and did, in fact, provide, fire protection services to those properties during the pendency of litigation. North Maine Fire Protection District further argues that it should be entitled to levy and retain taxes for the tax year 1978 on the ground that the Order of Judge Commerford did not become final until the Illinois Supreme Court denied the Petition for Leave to Appeal on January 26, 1978.

In informal discussions between counsel for plaintiffs and counsel for North Maine Fire Protection District before the trial Judge, the Judge has expressed grave doubts on the likelihood of the return of any tax monies already paid for a number of reasons:

- 1) The tax monies collected by North Maine Fire Protection District have already been spent;
- 2) Because the statute permitting disconnection is unclear whether the North Maine Fire Protection District had to provide service during the appeal, North Maine Fire Protection District had no alternative but to provide such services;
- 3) North Maine Fire Protection District stood ready, willing, and able to perform fire services in the areas, even though such services were duplicative of those offered by the Village of Niles; and
- 4) An order to repay the taxes would have to be paid out of future levies of taxes and any such levies would so tax the resources of North Maine Fire Protection District that it would force the District to curtail substantially its fire protection services within the area remaining in the North Maine Fire Protection District.

Settlement Proposal

1. An Order would be entered permanently restraining and enjoining North Maine Fire Protection District from asserting jurisdiction or attempting to assert jurisdiction in the areas that were annexed to the Village of Niles by Village of Niles' Ordinances 1970-11, 1970-12 and 1970-20.

2. Said Order would further enjoin and restrain the County Clerk of Cook County from extending the taxes of the North Maine Fire Protection District to those areas annexed to the Village of Niles as set forth above for the tax year 1978 and subsequent years except as provided hereafter, and except those levies applicable to the retirement of bonded indebtedness incurred prior to May 28, 1970.

3. Said Order would further provide that taxpayers of those areas annexed as set forth who paid the second installment on their 1978 real estate taxes be entitled to a refund of that portion of the real estate taxes so paid for the corporate purposes, but not for that portion paid for the purpose of retiring bonded indebtedness, of the North Maine Fire Protection District, less the pro-rata share of fees and costs to be determined by the Court, said refunds to be paid by the County Treasurer of Cook County out of a fund established by him or to be established by him from tax payments heretofore made or to be made for the benefit of the North Maine Fire Protection District.

4. Said Order would further provide that each refund shall be calculated on an individual basis by taking the total amount of 1978 taxes paid by each class member, subtracting therefrom the pro-rata share thereof allocable to the retirement of bonded indebtedness and dividing the remainder in half. The amount allocable to the bonded indebtedness and one-half of the remainder shall be paid to the North Maine Fire Protection District. The other one-half of the remainder shall be paid to the taxpayer after deducting therefrom the pro-rata share of fees and costs as determined by the Court.

5. Said Order would further provide that the County Treasurer shall issue refunds to the taxpayer of record for the year 1978 (as said party's name appears in the 1978 General Real Estate Warrant Books) or his agent upon said party's presentation of proof of payment to the Treasurer and that such proof of payment may include a receipted bill for 1978 taxes or a cancelled check marked so as to evidence payment of 1978 taxes.

6. Said Order would further provide that proof of payment of said taxes would have to be given to the County Treasurer not later than six months after the date of the Order approving the settlement.

7. Said Order would further provide that the Court shall grant reasonable attorney's fees and costs after a hearing on a Petition for Fees to be filed by the Attorneys for plaintiffs.

8. Said Order would further provide that, pursuant to the provisions of Section 38.3, Chapter 127-1/2, Illinois Revised Statutes, the area annexed to the Village of Niles, as set forth above, shall remain liable for its proportionate share of such bonded indebtedness and taxes may be levied and extended therefor until such time as sufficient funds to retire such bonds have been collected.

9. Such Order would further provide that the County Treasurer shall be deemed to have satisfied any obligation he may have under said Order upon his disbursing all monies in the fund and, in the event that any monies remain six months after said Order is entered (allowing for any claims made within said time) he shall disburse said remaining funds to the North Maine Fire Protection District.

10. Said Order would further provide that the County Treasurer shall not be compensated for his activities taken pursuant to said Order, that he is acting as a disbursement agent for the other parties to this lawsuit and, not being compensated, neither he nor the County of Cook shall be liable for any erroneous refund.

11. Said Order would further provide that, except as provided herein, the taxpayers constituting the class of plaintiffs, whether or not said taxpayers paid taxes under protest, are barred from any and all claims, actions or causes of action resulting from the payment of taxes assessed by North Maine Fire Protection District for the years 1971 through the first installment of 1978 taxes.

A hearing on the proposed settlement will be held by His Honor Judge Harold A. Siegan in Courtroom 2206, Richard J. Daley Center, Chicago, Ill., on June 5, 1980, at 11:00 A.M. at which time and place you may appear if you deem fit.

Niles studies request for annexation

At the Tuesday evening Village Board meeting, trustees were presented with a request for annexation to Niles of two lots in Ballard Acres.

The request, presented by Jerry Holmar of Eidamiller Real Estate on behalf of James Johanson, sought preliminary approval from the board to submit an annexation agreement for Lots 2 and 9 located at Lincoln and Knight avenues in the unincorporated section of Des Plaines. The two lots are located on either side of an existing home at 9347 Knight ave.

The petitioner told the board the annexation to Niles would be beneficial to the future owners of the property to get Niles police and fire protection and would make the lots more marketable.

Joe Salerno, Director of Building and Zoning for Niles told the board if this property was annexed to Niles, the street running in front of the property would also have to be annexed. It was also noted the street was in extremely poor condition.

After considerable discussion, Mayor Nicholas Blase referred the matter to the committee on Streets and Alleys and suggested board members meet to visually check out the area and bring back reports of their findings to the next board meeting on April 8.

In other actions Mayor Nicholas Blase read a resolution declaring the week of April 21 through April 27 as "Notre Dame High School Recognition Week" in Niles and congratulated Father Markos, principal and Jack Burke, business manager for the school who were present at the meeting.

While McDonald's attorney Brennan requested a continuance until the April 7 Zoning Board meeting to discuss the parking requirements with his personnel, zoning commissioners were in agreement that they had heard enough testimony on the petition to make their decision.

McDonald's petition was unanimously denied by the commissioners with each one basically stating the same reasons for denial, namely, traffic congestion, parking requirements, letters from School Districts 63 and 207 citing their objections, dissent from the homeowners and indications from the police and fire department of loss of time in answering calls. All the zoners stated the eatery was not in the best interest of the public welfare.

Zoning Board president Frick told attorney Brennan that if they wished to appeal their case to the Niles Village Board, they should call the village manager's office to procure a spot on the agenda. Brennan later told the Bugle they intended to appeal to the village board. He also thanked the zoning commissioners for their time and attention and while he was not happy with their decision, he did appreciate their indulgence.

In other actions, the board approved a zoning change from B-1 Special Use Drive In to B-1 Fully Insured.

Based on the testimony by McDonald's personnel that 38.8 per cent of their business is carry out, Niles Village attorney Richard Troy sent a letter to Zoning Board president John Frick stating that due to the nature of the restaurant's business as both a full service and carry out facility, parking requirements would have to be adjusted to allow 119 spaces for the restaurant and 38 for the retail stores, a total of 157 spaces.

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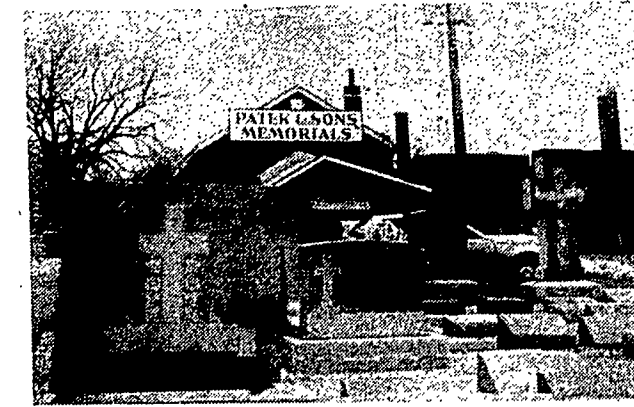
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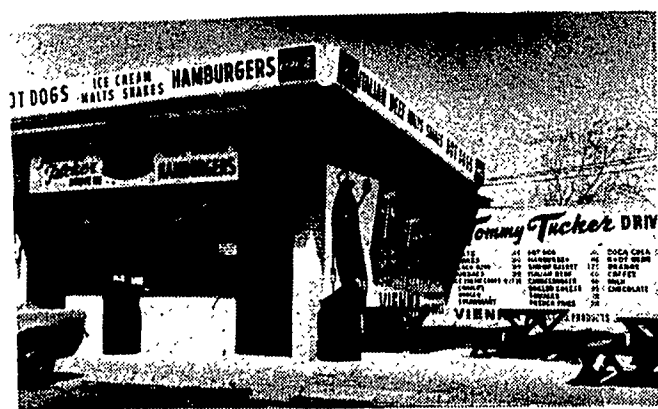
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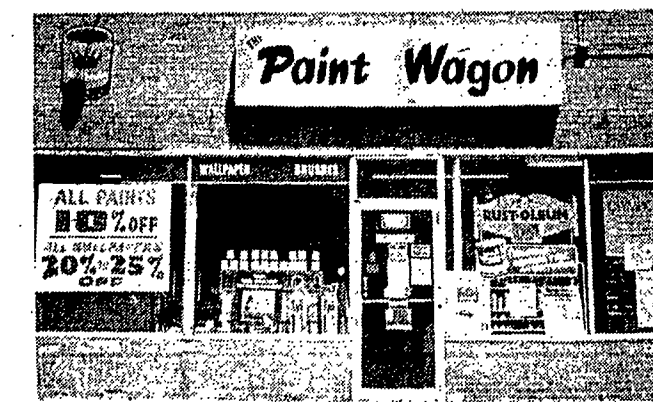

such a power failure, no emergency system to operate the electric circulating pumps for the heating system or the electric booster pumps needed to get water to the elderly residents living above the fourth floor.

After this situation was brought to our attention, several phone calls were made to the Village of Niles, Commonwealth Edison and the Director of Housing for Cook County and a story appeared in the Dec. 13 issue of the Bugle.

This past week we received the following letter from Niles Mayor Nicholas Blase:

"Dear Diane: I thought you might be interested in this since you were initially responsible for bringing this problem to our attention."

Attached to the mayor's letter was a purchase order from the Housing Authority of Cook County in the amount of \$3,200 to cover the Emergency Service Installation for elevator and heating for The Huntington, 9201 Maryland, Niles. Also attached was a letter Blase had received from Victor L. Walchirk, Executive Director of the Housing Authority of Cook County where in he acknowledged the mayor's letter of March 12 concerning the need for the emergency general system for the elevator and circulating pumps for heating system in the building.

Walchirk stated in his letter, "It is my understanding that your building department has determined that these improvements to the present system will provide a satisfactory solution to resolve these deficiencies. We can assure you of our continuing commitment to the health, safety and welfare of the elderly residents of The Huntington."

We, too, are pleased with their overdue concern for the Huntington residents and feel this emergency system will make them breathe a little easier should a problem ever arise again.

speaking on behalf of favorite programs.

Board members also increased the student-teacher ratio by one providing, in theory, 24 students to each teacher in the elementary schools and 24 students to each teacher in the junior high schools. In practice, this number does not hold true with many elementary classes now containing more than 30 children.

Board members approved a 50 per cent cut in art, vocal music and physical education for elementary schools, and voted to eliminate aides for art, vocal music, home economics and industrial education in the junior high schools.

Other cuts would include continuation of one language in junior high school, reduction of guidance staff, learning disability resource aides placed on half-time, number of speech and social workers reduced, fees instituted for music in instrumental music program and loss of one instructor and summer school in the same program, library services halved, extra-curricular activities, clubs and intramurals ended to be replaced possibly with Park District programs, secretarial and library clerk positions reduced and lunchroom supervisors decreased in junior high schools. Staff members would have to be given 90 days notice before end of semester or their contracts would be automatically renewed.

Many parents seemed to prefer the closing of a junior high school before other cuts in the program were made. Ann Sostrin, a school

board candidate, said, "The question is not whether we will close a junior high this year but can we afford not to?" Ben Cohen, a parent, said it was "extraneous" to increase the pupil-teacher ratio without closing Apollo. Barbara Huff, an Oak parent, said, "You are nickel and diming our children's programs when more money could be saved by closing a junior high school."

Board members said all children from Oak school would be bussed to Nelson school providing a child count of about 697 students there. Children now in the early childhood (special education) program at Oak would also be housed in the Nelson annex.

About 68 children from Nathanson school north of Church st. will attend Stevenson school and about 600 youngsters from Nathanson will attend Twain school. Children in cross-categorical classes will also attend Stevenson school.

Board members approved a motion for the placement of a referendum this April, transferring funds from the Site and Construction fund to paying for certain items in the Operation Building and Maintenance Fund. Indirectly, this would relieve a little pressure on the Education Fund because some items may be paid for either from the Education or O.B.M. fund.

An example would be custodians' salaries, broken glass, etc. They also approved a resolution providing for a public hearing on the tentative amended budget and appropriation ordinance for the fiscal year 1979-80 at 7:30 p.m. May 13 in Apollo school.

In two previous committee-of-the-whole meetings on March 20 and 24, board members discussed the range of proposed cuts and it became clear that board members were not willing to eliminate an entire program. School closings were also evident although no action may be taken at a committee-of-the-whole meeting.

Four schools were provided for analysis of cost savings. They were Oak, Nathanson and the two junior high schools. At the time, Richard Smith, board chairman, said these schools were listed because they have low populations. A call to the business office confirmed the statement.

However, Phillip Deckowitz, board member, had said if any schools were to be closed, he hoped all would be equally considered.

Parents of children in special education at Oak school made many statements to the board concerning "galloping" classrooms.

Dennis Bernaz, a special education parent and spokesman for the Oak Parent Teachers Assn., said the parents were assured special education classes would not be moved around again. He said, "We are not as vocal as Wilson parents or as reticent as Ballard parents but we are survivors."

Rochelle Kantrovich, a special education parent, brought up a fact on most persons' minds. "Usually around March we hear about programs or school closings — why don't we hear about it earlier?"

Stetina replied discussions were underway last Fall and we are now planning for next September. He said, "We knew there would be problems. Every dollar the board can save now will give the board and the community more options a year from now."

on the city," according to village attorney Martin Ashman. It establishes how one goes about condemning property and sets penalties. These regulations are in addition to regular building codes which have always been in effect.

Ashman lauded Daly's "concerned citizen" efforts and also explained how the retention of home rule was essential for the village to be able to pass such an ordinance. "This is an illustration of how one man can inspire and make a difference when you have control of your own local government."

Of course Mike Daly didn't stop attending meetings once he got the village to clear his neighbor's yard last fall. No, he has been a permanent fixture in the audience of village board meetings on the 2nd and 4th Mondays of each month. And last Monday, when the agenda reached the section for citizens' comments, Daly proudly took the floor to say, "Morton Grove is one of the greatest villages in the nation and we want to keep it that way."

Village Clerk Jerry Schurhke reminded other Morton Grove residents that vehicle stickers must be displayed by May 1, as there will be no extension of the deadline.

Village Administrator Fred Huber explained the Insurance Services Office will be evaluating the Morton Grove fire services classification, through a review of records and field inspections of facilities and equipment. The village currently ranks a "respectable Class 4" out of 10 classifications, according to Huber. The Insurance Office's determination of how-able Morton Grove is to combat fires affects fire insurance rates for homes and businesses.

In other business at the March 24 village board meeting: Mayor Flickinger set a meeting with condominium officers for 10 a.m. Saturday, March 29 at the Village Hall to discuss garbage collection.

There will be a call for bids for the replacement of four fire hydrants along Ferris ave.

The board voted support for NORTRAN's efforts to have RTA reduce student fares throughout the week.

Mayor Flickinger voiced the board's strong support of Project Stadium Light Brigade, to help raise some of the \$60,000 needed to purchase lights for the Niles West Stadium. The stadium would then be the night game center for Niles North as well, and would be available for community functions.

"We are behind this," said Flickinger, "when you take a vacation, you see every little town of 2000 has a lighted stadium, and here large villages like Morton Grove and Skokie do not."

Village Trustee Don Snieder called for a public meeting to review the proposed community development block grant program tonight at 7:30 in the council chambers.

The board approved the American Legion's request to operate a kiddie carnival July 3 through 5 on the Post grounds, as part of the village's Olde Fashioned 4th of July celebration.

Under advisement of corporation counsel, a new ordinance will be drawn up which would prohibit the sale of any smoking paraphernalia to those under 18 years of age.

The two offensive stars of the team are Jenny Klauke and Mary Lou O'Brien, who came from Our Lady of Perpetual Help in Glenview.

Friday, the young ladies will be in Champaign, part of the Elite Eight which will be vying for Saturday's finals. Chicago's Marshall High School and a team from East St. Louis are favored.

You'll have to pardon our Niles chauvinism but these favorites haven't come up against girls from Niles.

There's a popular book, The Right Stuff, the story of the first astronauts, which is on all the bookstands. If ever there is a local personification of the "right stuff" it's the girls from Marillac. The tiny school has only 600 students and it's competing against schools many times its enrollment.

Along the yellow brick road to Champaign, Marillac has defeated Glenbrook North, and then bumped off Deerfield with a last second basket. In the Conant sectional they defeated Prospect and Hersey before defeating Niles North in the supersectionals. This very gutsy team was down 41 to 33 at the beginning of the third quarter before they roared back and outscored Niles North 27 to 12 in the final two quarters.

When the little lady from paragraph one came home, I was about to tell her there is now one more weekend of basketball. "You wouldn't believe it but ..."

She didn't wait for me to finish. "Oh, yes, I'd believe it ... there's more basketball ahead." She's incredible! She must be clairvoyant.

The East Maine District 63 board has been holding meetings the past week exploring areas to cut-back in their fight to meet a 1.5 million dollar deficit by June of '81. They first discussed program reductions cutting back on art, music and gym activities. They next considered school closings and are likely to close 2 elementary schools before next fall. Lastly, they may increase teacher-student ratios from 23 to 24 to 1 in the lower grades.

In addition to program cuts, school cuts and teacher cuts, the 4th choice the board has is to hold a referendum to increase taxes. But because only about 10% of the residents in the area send their children to the public schools, they are not very optimistic about passing a tax increase.

It is a heart-wrenching effort to reduce the school district. Teachers and administrators have their jobs on the line. And it's a sad experience to know well-qualified people are going to lose their jobs.

Surprisingly, after all the trauma which surrounded closing schools two years ago, residents who have been thru the previous cut-backs seem to favor school closings. When the choice is narrowed to cutting programs, reducing the number of teachers or the closing of buildings, many in the audience seem to favor the closing a couple of school buildings.

At the first meeting last week, parents from Niles' Oak School came out to voice their opposition to their school's closing. And it first sounded much like the protests of two years ago. One parent said she didn't want her child eating peanut butter sandwiches for lunch. Others had equally mundane complaints. It sounded like the same old nitpicking which went on in 1978. But by Monday night when another meeting was held, the audience which was still there at midnight seemed to agree all the cuts were necessary. One former Ballard parent told me she was in the front line of opposing her school closings in '78 but now agrees the busing of her child has worked out well. She even hinted the transfer to the new school may be working out even better than when her child was at Ballard.

The entire reduction action is sad. Teachers and administrators losing their jobs is the most difficult problem to adjust to. Closing neighborhood schools seems to be the least difficult problem.

The cut-backs in programs cause anxiety. We recall how difficult it was to obtain a full-year's kindergarten in the district. We remember the battles to include a language program in the schools. And the fight to include a band program took many months by residents. All these battles by parents took weeks and months and perhaps years of endless meetings before they became a part of the curriculum.

Monday night one parent was horrified his 8th grader might not take a shower after a gym program. And when the talk of raising class size to 24 to 1 was considered difficult, we found it hard to comprehend.

One board member noted he didn't want the East Maine district to be like the Chicago school system. And while we know today's Chicago may not be the same one we knew 40 years ago, we do remember class sizes of 48 students, and gym classes without any showers, and art and music programs without special teachers. And before someone answers we should do better than those days, you shake your head, knowing the East Maine Class of '80 couldn't hold a candle to the O'Keefe class of '39. But that's the way I promised I'd never talk to my own children, telling them the old days were so much better. But listening to the cries for 24 students in a class and showers for the gym students is a bit bewildering in light of the ensuing crises. The alternate to balancing the budget could well be the closing of schools under local jurisdiction and their being taken over by the state. Local residents would lose their input into the schools and big brother would be in charge.

The decisions the district has to make are tough ones. But they have to be made. And the sooner they're made, the faster the district will get on with its primary business of teaching its children.

Lastly, another new superintendent will soon be on the scene. He shouldn't have to be burdened with these same problems which pushed one very well-qualified man out of the district. He should be free of these burdens which should have been settled long ago.
