

Remarriage after age 60 does not affect

If you are a widow or widower and remarry at age 60 or older. you can continue to receive social security benefits without any reduction in the amount of your check. Also, if your new spouse gets social sécurity benefits, you may elect to take a benefit as a dependent on your new spouse's social security record if the

The rule regarding remarriage does not apply if you are under 60 or receive benefits as a surviving divorced spouse. If you remarry, you would no longer be eligible for benefits as a widow or widower. However, if your subsequent marriage ends and you are a widow under 60 or a surviving divorced spouse, you may become entitled to benefits again. This law which is a part of the 1977 Social Security Amendments changed the rule regarding remarriage of widows and widowers age 60 or older. It was in response to the concern of older people who wanted to remarry but feared the loss of their social security benefits. If you have questions about how marriage affects social
