

Holiday fire safety tips

For a fire-safe holiday, the Office of the State Fire Marshal offers a reminder of how to save lives and property loss from fire during the gala holiday season.

State Fire Marshal Harold I. Schmelzki points out "since half of Americans are unprotected by smoke detectors in their homes, this is a good time to install one for year 'round safety. Smoke detectors, incidentally, make excellent gifts for loved ones.

"Have an escape plan and practice Edith (Exit Drills in the Home). Instruct the babysitter in fire emergency procedures," Schmelzki suggested.

A list of do's and don'ts may seem contrary to the holiday spirit, but appreciation and practice of it may save lives.

Natural Trees - Be sure the tree is fresh, not dyed green. Except for the tree having been stored in extremely cold weather, the needles should be supple and bend not snap. When bumped on the ground, only a few, old needles should fall; a rain of needles indicates a dry, hazardous tree. The cut end should be sticky from sap.

If you store the tree before decorating, keep it in a bucket of water in a cool place, away from heat and out of the wind.

Before decorating, cut one inch off the bottom of the tree to improve water absorption. Set the tree in water in a sturdy, non-tip stand. Guy wires may be used and needed for stability.

Keep the tree away from candles, TV sets, fireplaces, open flames and heat vents. Do not set it up or near an exitway.

Add water in the tree every day. Plain water is best; absorption of other preparations may clog the trunk and prevent water absorption. When the needles are dry, discard the tree.

Plastic trees - Be sure it carries the label of an approved safety-testing agency.

Metallic trees - Use only indirect spotlighting unless the tree has a built-in electrical unit with the label of an approved safety-testing agency. Do not use decorative lights on a metallic tree.

Lighting - Replace worn insulation, loose bulb sockets and broken plugs. Be sure all light-sets are testing-agency approved. Use only 15 ampere circuits.

Be sure decorative lights are not close to combustible materials. Do not use candles or open flame around or on the tree. Do not use candles in decorations or displays.

Make sure all decorative lights area are turned off before going to bed or leaving the house. Provide a switch away from the tree for controlling the lights. Do not crawl around or under the tree for any reason.

Indoor lighting sets should not be used outdoors. Be sure outdoor lighting sets, extension cords and fixtures are testing-agency approved.

Decorations - Use only flame-retardant or noncombustible materials. Do not use untreated cotton batting, flocking, tissue paper or flammable foam plastics on or around the tree. Keep gift wrapping and electric toys away from the tree.

Celebrations - Be sure to keep exits clear. Provide large ashtrays. Dispose of smoking materials in covered, metal waste containers. Don't dump matches or cigarettes and cigar butts in trash - smoldering smoking materials can cause paper to burst into flames later.

Have a safe and happy holiday.

The State Fire Marshal also suggested that local fire departments can be very helpful on all fire safety questions and problems. It pays to call them before there's a fire. From the LEFT HAND

The black lady who cleans The Bugle office has been with us for 10 years. Each weekday she goes to someone's home or office, one day in Morton Grove, the next day in Elmhurst and around the suburbs week after month after year.

Her one son went to Lane High School and struggled through the first three years. During this period his father died and his Mother was his sole support. He life was not easy. Her garage burned to the ground and she didn't have insurance to cover the fire. She had other setbacks but she struggled on. The last year of high school her son shifted gears and began doing well. He graduated and was accepted at a university downtown where he's now in his first year. Last week she told me he had taken a computer course on weekends and will now teach freshmen at the university, giving him an extra \$100 a week. She's as amazed as she is proud of her wonder-kind.

Despite her fighting to get by each week she often talks about her work in her church. This year she said they are gathering food, clothing and toys to distribute to the less fortunate in their area. She said she also works to send money to the poor in Haiti. She works hard on her weekend "days off" gathering money and supplies for the indigent in South Africa.

This lady's difficult life has not stopped her from giving to others. She exemplifies the spirit of Christmas.

During World War II we visited my Grandmother's sister who lived in London. While in her apartment one day we reached for a door which we assumed lead to another room. She said the door led to nowhere. The other side of the door was the rest of her apartment but it was halved by a German bomb during the early days of the blitz.

At nighttime she joined thousands of other Londoners who slept underground in the subways. Barracks-like beds were stacked four high in Oxford Circle and Charing Cross and other stations. The bomb-like tubes protected these people from the V-1 and V-2 bombs which were being lobbed into the center of the city from the continent.

One time during the Christmas season we stopped to visit. Her daughter told me she was running around the neighborhood trying to gather some Christmas gifts for the less fortunate. There wasn't much food available. New toys were non-existent. And Londoners hadn't seen new clothes in the store windows in years. Yet, this very nice lady, whose elderly years were being spent sleeping in subway stations, was out gathering what she could to help those who were less fortunate. She too, exemplified the spirit of giving.

In Skokie a few years ago a cousin told me the Jewish people on their street give a little extra gift to their friends and neighbors who are celebrating Christmas. Each year they donate their time during the weeks surrounding the holidays by babysitting with their neighbors' children while the adults go visiting their friends and relatives for the holidays. It is a gift of "giving themselves", a far more thoughtful gift than one they might buy in one of the local stores.

When you're in the stores this week some last-minute shopping, stop to take pause at what you see. This incredible spending binge at this time of the year proves we are living in the land of plenty. But there's another America out there. It's hungry and its life is thwarted and it faces each day without, and its inhabitants are living in the land of the limited.

If the struggling cleaning lady can give to the less fortunate and if the beleaguered London lady could stalk the war-torn streets in search of something for those who have less, then certainly we who have so much can give to those who are hurting.

Golf Maine coach complains about phys ed program

District 63 lowers tax levy by \$88,000

Following a public hearing, Board members of East Maine School District 63 approved the 1985 tax levy of \$8,337,497 at a December 17 meeting. Last year's levy was \$9,225,190.

The amount of taxes collected by the District is determined by the State multiplier and taxable property within the District. Called the tax extension, this amount will be lower than the levy. For example, \$8,680,754 or 94.1 percent of the levy was extended to the District last year.

A breakdown of amounts levied for 1985 are educational, \$6,570,541; operations, building and maintenance, \$1,361,300; transportation, \$435,616; Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund, \$285,930; tort immunity, \$50,000; special education, \$72,603 and working cash, \$181,507.

Fred LeVine, a coach at Golf-Maine Park District, told board members he was there on behalf of students who were not being taught basics in physical education at Mark Twain school. LeVine said something should be taught other than kickball and "Bombardment", a game in which youngsters throw a ball at each other.

LeVine said parents are present at the meeting "who are more irate than I am."

Also, the President of Golf-Maine Park District suggested the School District update professional material on physical education in the resource center, hold in-service training for physical education teachers and ask for annual reports on the physical education program.

Reporting on a physical education program, Donald E. Bond, superintendent, said "We can do more and will do more at Mark Twain. We have taken a look at the curriculum and will make changes."

Niles Park ok's \$750,000 general bonds

At an abbreviated meeting Tuesday night Niles Park Board approved the purchase of \$750,000 of general obligation bonds for capital improvements within the district.

The 1986-1992 bonds were sold for 6.9% to the First National Bank of Niles and will be used for start-up costs for a new maintenance garage, improvements at Jozwiak Park and for upgrading tennis courts.

Park attorney Gabe Barraffato said the local bank purchased the small amount of bonds as a favor to the park district. He said normal

According to documents produced at last month's meeting, Rajski signed a petition, letter to a Glenview newspaper and political "flyer" all urging a "no" vote on referendums for annexation to the District. The controversial referendums were unsuccessful.

In response to board charges, attorney Lawrence Weiner was scheduled to present a statement regarding Rajski's "conduct" in publicly opposing annexation to the District.

Weiner's statement may determine if Rajski committed a "misdeemeanor" or "petty offense."

Statement on world peace



Mayor Nicholas B. Blase accepted on behalf of the Village of Niles a statement on world peace presented by Mr. David Sperry, vice chairman, and Mrs. Virginia Kerr, secretary, of the Baha'i Community of Niles at the regular Board of Trustees meeting Nov. 28.

The author of the statement, which is entitled The Promise of World Peace, is the Universal House of Justice, the international governing body of the

Baha'i Faith. One of the purposes for releasing the statement at this time is to promote a meeting of the world's leaders dedicated to the search for world peace. However, the statement is addressed to the peoples of the world since a ground swell from the grassroots in favor of such a meeting may be the only means of ensuring that it will take place. 1986 is an opportune time for this meeting since it has been declared the International Year of Peace by the United Nations.

The date the statement has been presented to the Secretary General of the United Nations, President Ronald Reagan, Secretary Gorbachev of the Soviet Union and about 50 other heads of state. It is foreseen that the statement will receive a much wider distribution thru the coming year.

Cook County open Hedrick campaign

Joe Hedrick opened his campaign for Niles Township Republican Committeeman with the aid of many prominent Cook County Republicans including: Joseph Mathewson, Republican Convention endorsed candidate for President of the Cook County Board, John McNeal, 9th District Republican State Central Committeeman; and Gordon Hirsch, candidate for Commissioner of the Cook County Board.

Hedrick announced that his administration would be dedicated to rebuilding the Niles Township Regular Republican Organization (NTRRO) with a concerted effort to "attract the huge number of members who have left the organization in the last 3 1/2 years and a concentrated campaign to attract new members, especially the young and ethnics". Competition breeds success, and my goal is a strong successful Niles Township Republican Organization".

John McNeal, whose district covers much of Niles Township, and who is seeking a third term as State Central Committeeman, echoed Hedrick's theme saying "I have witnessed a rapid deterioration of the NTRRO during the administration of the present committeeman. Each year fewer and fewer people attend her meetings. Her support of Republican candidates is virtually non-existent". McNeal also noted "the decline in Republican vote totals in the township during her reign as reason enough for new leadership".

In his talk to the crowd of over 100 people, Joseph Mathewson, who is in the process of meeting as many Republicans as possible, declared, "Niles Township will be an important area if I am to be elected President of the County Board and if Republicans are to be victorious in November."

Commenting on the enthusiasm of the crowd Mathewson observed, "we need this kind of Republican dedication if we are again to be a force in Cook County politics."

Gordon Hirsch, a Niles Township resident, also stressed the need to rebuild the party saying, "we need new fresh ideas, the kind that the people here today will bring to the party, and the kind that I will bring to the Cook County Board as I did to District 219 when I was elected at age 18."

Hedrick, a long time precinct captain in the NTRRO has served the organizations as an area chairman, Morton Grove coordinator, and a member of the executive board. He proved his organizational skills and vote getting ability in 1984 as the Republican candidate for State Senator in the 1st District. NUTCRACKERS AND WALNUTS
SYMBOLS OF THE SEASON

It's no surprise that Christmas is the "season of the nutcracker"—and the walnut. This is the time of year when more nuts are cracked—at home and at California's major packing plants—than at any other.

According to the California walnut industry, 100 million pounds of walnuts are cracked—a speed of about 600 per minute—just to meet the demand for holiday baking. That's over 3 billion walnuts! But cracking walnuts wasn't always this speedy. As recently as 1939, the country's major walnut packers hand cracked nuts—at about 2 walnuts per minute, per worker. Today, the industry utilizes

two major types of mechanical crackers that can crack up to 300,000 walnuts a day—kernels intact and shells discarded. But while industrial crackers have made walnuts more convenient for holiday baking, as much as sixty percent of each year's crop is sold inshell—for at-home cracking and eating, or decorative use. As a salute to Christmas and this American holiday tradition, add a bowl of freshly-harvested inshell walnuts and a colorful nutcracker to your holiday centerpiece. To enjoy the good taste of walnuts in holiday baking, cook up a batch of these delicious Walnut Shortbread cookies.

Walnut Shortbread
1 cup butter or margarine, softened
3/4 cup sifted powdered sugar
1 1/2 teaspoons grated lemon peel
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups flour
1 cup ground walnuts
In mixer bowl cream butter and sugar. Beat in peel, vanilla and salt. Combine flour and nuts; stir in, mixing to blend thoroughly. Press dough evenly into 10 x 15-inch jelly roll pan. Bake in 325 degree oven 25 to 30 minutes just until shortbread begins to brown. Cut into 2-inch squares while warm. Remove to racks to cool completely. Store in airtight container. Makes about 3 dozen squares.



Nilehi Junior to take math test

You can only play five players on a basketball court at a time, but the return of sixth man, John Gross, sure makes Oakton Community College coach Tom Jordnt feel good.







Car seat loan program a plus for residents

by Jennifer Lewis

"It's better to be safe than sorry." It may be an old cliché but its value is taken seriously at the Morton Grove Crime Prevention Bureau where the loanable car seat safety program is getting its strongest demand during the holidays.

Morton Grove residents can come to the police station or call 966-7800 or 470-3208, to reserve a car seat free of charge, officer Deborah Borucki said, who is in charge of the Crime Prevention Bureau.

Borucki is pleased the program is getting repeat business. During the holidays the department will

loan up to half of their 20 car seats daily compared to one or two during other seasons, she said.

The program is especially helpful to grandparents or friends who may be visiting this time of year because they don't have to purchase a car seat which is mandatory for children under four in Illinois, Borucki noted.

Under the passenger protection law which was enacted on July 1, 1983, penalties include a \$25 fine which can be waived with proof of possession of a child restraint device on the first offense. A fine of \$50 is issued on the second offense.

According to Borucki, car seats aren't only safer but provide greater freedom for the parent and more comfort for the child. The parents are free to drive and the child is protected in a full seat by soft padding that cushions the head and sides. Kids can't slip out of the seat like they can in seat belts, she added.

Borucki, who speaks to groups about car safety said she explains how a 15 pound infant held by a passenger in a car driving 30 miles per hour can suddenly weigh 450 pounds during an accident.

According to a Gerber Products brochure on car safety, an infant involved in an accident can become a flying missile and be crushed by the passenger or injured by fire.

Borucki said children can identify with safety by following a routine.

Kids identify getting into the car seat, Borucki said, "They will climb right in and buckle up."

Sutker seeks second term in House

State Representative Calvin R. Sutker (D-Skokie) has announced plans to seek a second term in the Illinois House next year.

"I believe the legislative experience I have gained in Springfield and my accomplishments in office make me the most qualified person to represent the 56th District," Sutker said. "I have worked hard to serve my constituents over the last year and would enjoy the opportunity to continue doing so."

Sutker cited a number of successes during his first term in office, including passage of an Alzheimer's disease package, which he cosponsored, to enhance treatment, research and counseling of victims and their families.

Additionally, the first-term legislator cosponsored the Collective Bargaining Bill granting police and firefighters the right to enter into collective bargaining agreements for the first time.

"The measure contains a no-strike clause to protect the public, while still giving law enforcement agents and fire personnel a chance to secure better wages and working conditions," he said.

Sutker was also leading House sponsor of a new law establishing the State Solar Energy Grant Program to give assistance to people who install energy saving solar equipment in their homes.

The first-term legislator said he supported a comprehensive package of missing children bills this year aimed at preventing child abduction and abuse. One new law calls for "Attendance Hotlines" in schools to notify parents of a child's absence within two hours.

To help arrest spiralling utility rates, Sutker supported

legislation altering the way utility taxes are computed in Illinois. The new law replaces a 5 percent tax based on the consumer's total bill with a more modest tax based on energy usage.

"From now on utility taxes will stay at the same level provided the amount of energy service remains constant," he said. "In this fashion, consumers are rewarded for conserving energy."

Sutker also helped ensure passage of a number of education reform measures in the House. He supported legislation calling for greater dropout intervention; school district reorganization; programs for handicapped students; as well as teacher evaluations and pupil testing.

Election reform was also high on Sutker's legislative agenda. He was a chief sponsor of newly signed legislation to help disabled voters exercise their right to vote. "The new law eliminates the need to obtain a doctor's signature for handicapped voters who wish to vote by absentee ballot."

Sutker was also principal House sponsor of legislation which was signed into law to reform the method of electing downstate committeemen in Cook County in a manner consistent with downstate committeemen.

As current chair of the Democratic State Central Committee, Sutker has the distinction of being a top party leader, bringing to the House a special expertise in statewide political affairs. He also serves on the House Committees of Labor and Commerce; Judiciary I; and Cities and Villages.

Traffic Safety Hints

Recent blizzards in Iowa, Minnesota and Wisconsin were a stark reminder that drivers can be stranded on the highway when weather conditions deteriorate rapidly.

Advance planning for such an emergency should include assembling a winter survival kit to carry in your car on long trips. The Illinois Emergency Services and Disaster Agency recommends:

the following items.

First, fill a two- or three-pound coffee can with quick-energy and non-perishable foods, first aid supplies and other survival items. Chocolate and dried fruits are good quick-energy foods that help produce body heat. Non-perishable foods can include instant coffee or tea, dry soup and bouillon cubes.

If you are stranded for more than a few hours, you can make drinking water by melting snow in the coffee can. Hang the can from the rear-view mirror by running string or wire through

two small holes near the top of the can. Melt the snow by placing a small wide-base candle in a small pie tin on the dash. Take several books of matches and do not forget spoons and insulated cups for the soup, coffee or tea.

Bandages, aspirin and essential prescription medicines should be included with the first aid supplies. Survival items include a compass, a small flashlight with extra batteries, ski caps, and gloves or mittens. Finally, take extra blankets, flares, salt or sand, a shovel and a fire extinguisher in the car.


