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

# From the LEFT HAND

Her one son went to Lane High School and struggled through the first three years. During this period his father died and his Mother was his sole support. He life was not easy. Her garage burned to the ground and she didn't have insurance to cover the fire. She had other setbacks but she struggled on. The last year of high school her son shifted gears and began doing well. He graduated and was accepted at a university downtown where he's now in his first year. Last week she told me he had taken a computer course on weekends and will now teach freshmen at the university, giving him an extra \$100 a week. She's as amazed as she is proud of her wunder-kind.

Despite her fighting to get by each week she often talks about her work in her church. This year she said they are gathering food, clothing and toys to distribute to the less fortunate in their area. She said she also works to send money to the poor in Haiti. She works hard on her weekend "days off" gathering money and supplies for the indigent in South Africa.

This lady's difficult life has not stopped her from giving to others. She exemplifies the spirit of Christmas.

During World War II we visited my Grandmother's sister who lived in London. While in her apartment one day we reached for a door which we assumed lead to another room. She said the door led to nowhere. The other side of the door was the rest of her apartment but it was halved by a German bomb during the early days of the

At nighttime she joined thousands of other Londoners who slept nderground in the subways, Barracks-like beds were stacked fou high in Oxford Circle and Charing Cross and other stations. The tomb-like tubes protected these people from the V-1 and V-2 bombs which were being lobbed into the center of the city from the continent.

One time during the Christmas season we stopped to visit. Her daughter told me she was running around the neighborhood trying to gather some Christmas gifts for the less fortunate. There wasn't much food available. New toys were non-existent. And Londoners hadn't seen new clothes in the store windows in years. Yet, this very nice lady, whose elderly years were being spent sleeping in subway stations, was out gathering what she could to help those who were less fortunate. She too, exemplified the spirit of giving.

In Skokie a few years ago a cousin told me the Jewish people on their street give a little extra gift to their friends and neighbors who are celebrating Christmas. Each year they donate their time during the weeks surrounding the holidays by babysitting with their neighbors' children while the adults go visiting their friends and relatives for the holidays. It is a gift of "giving themselves", a far more thoughtful gift than one they might buy in one of the local stores.

When you're in the stores this week some last-minute shopping, stop to take pause at what you see. This incredible spending binge at this time of the year proves we are living in the land of plenty. But there's another America out there. It's hungry and its life is thwarted and it faces each day without, and its inhabitants are living in the land of the limited.

If the struggling cleaning lady can give to the less fortunate and if the beleagured London lady could stalk the war-torn streets in search of something for those who have less, then certainly we who have so much can give to those who are hurting.

## Library tables **Rajski decision** Intil January

The question of whether Margaret Rajski will have to fight for retention of her position as a Niles Library trustee has been postponed from this month until January.

An Attorney for Rajski, James Provenzo, attended the Library Board Meeting.

According to documents produced at last month's neeting, Rajski signed a petition, letter to a Glenview newspaper and political "flyer" all urging a "no" vote on referendums for annexation to the District. The controversial referendums were unsuccessful.

In response to board charges, attorney Lawrence Weiner was scheduled to present a statement regarding Rajski's "conduct" in publicly opposing annexation to the District.



# **Court Bureau**

# offers speakers

Growing numbers of community, civic and religious organizations in Chicago and suburban Cook County are taking advantage of the Cook County Circuit Court's Speaker's Bureau through which judicial speakers can be obtained to address professional or local organizations beyond the confines of the courtroom.

Some five years ago Chief Circuit Judge Harry G. Comerford formalized the court's speaker's bureau as a means to broaden public knowledge of the legal process. The Speaker's Bureau provides programs by which residents of Cook County may learn more about the circuit court system and the laws which govern our society, and at the same time, personally meet the judges they have elected.

The Circuit Court of Cook County serves a population of more than five million residents in an area covering over 950 square

County judges sitting in the various divisions of the court, including law, chancery, probate, criminal, domestic relations, and those judges assigned to the five suburban districts in Skokie, Niles, Maywood, Chicago Ridge and Markham, are participating in the court's speaker's bureau program during their evening hours, week-ends and holidays.

Program chairmen representing bona fide organizations may submit a request for a judge to address one of their meetings by writing to the Speaker's Bureau, care of the Chief Judge's office, Richard J. Daley Center, Room 2600, Chicago 60602, or by calling 443-4164. Six to eight week lead time is needed to arrange a program.


## **Gottlieb enters campaign** for Congress

# Hirsch challenges commissioners




# **NORTRAN's best**
