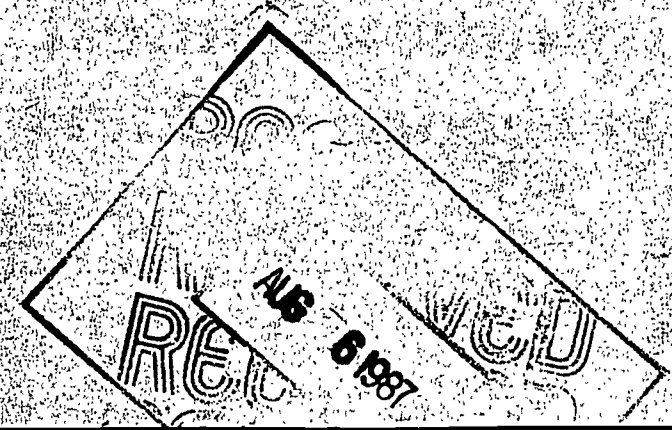


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1987 Niles Beautification Contest winners

Existing home at Dempster and Oketo would be razed for parking

Zoners ok ABT parking lot petition

A request by ABT TV and Appliances to construct a parking area on a residential lot at 8760 Oketo was approved by the Niles Zoning Board following two rounds of votes and an amended petition. Approximately 50 residents attended Monday's meeting to voice their concern that a zoning change from residential to commercial (B-1) would be an en-

croachment in their neighborhood. Others cited traffic problems and devaluation of property. The subject site, which has an existing house on it, is located at the northwest corner of Oketo and Dempster Sts. Purchase of the property is subject to zoning approval. Hearings continue on new suburban landfill site

The battle between residents and the Northwest Municipal Conference over a proposed refuse site will continue at another public hearing by the Cook County Board of Appeals at Hanover Park village hall on Aug. 12. In the third of a series of hearings, NWMC executive director Bill Grams is expected to repeat testimony on behalf of the conference's 31 member communities, including Niles, Morton Grove and Des Plaines. At previous hearings, Gram explained why the 300-acre site was selected and why the conference communities need the land fill.

The site in question is at Illinois Hwy. 25 and W. Bartlett Rd. in unincorporated Cook County. According to Grams, at least one more hearing will be held (end of

August) before the board decides to endorse giving the conference the special use permit required to own and operate the landfill. The proposed balefill (type of compacting garbage) is drawing continuous protests from residents in Bartlett, Hanover Park and South Elgin (closest to the garbage site) who say they don't want the balefill "in their backyards."

Grams, however, maintains the site is located near an industrial-agriculture area rather than a residential area. "The only residential area is a trailer park in Bartlett several miles away," he said, adding that residents from the individual towns will not be adversely affected. Continued on Page 46.

Constitution Contest draws record winners

More than 600 of the 3,000 students who participated in a special Constitution quiz correctly answered all of the questions, according to Eric U. Edstrom, chairman of the Contest Committee of the Maine Township Constitution Bicentennial Commission.

Three separate quizzes were administered to Maine Township public and private school students in elementary grades 5 and 6, junior high, and high school.

First, second and third place winners in each category have been determined by lottery. Each first place winner will be awarded a \$500 U.S. Savings Bond and second and third place winners will be awarded specially-struck Bicentennial Medals and Commemorative Plaques at the Maine Township Board meeting Tuesday, Aug. 25.

First prize winners will remain a mystery until Aug. 25, although the following students have been notified that they have been selected for the top three places in each category:

Police Chief Emrikson reflects on 30 year career

Niles Police Chief Clarence Emrikson, who announced his intention to retire next May, took time out from his duties to reflect on his 30-year career as a law enforcement officer.

During an interview by The Bugle, Emrikson said he joined the Niles Police Department in 1957 and was appointed police chief in 1961 by Mayor Nicholas Blaise. "I enjoyed being a police officer and still miss the action in solving problems on a daily basis," he said. "Administrative work is very different, in that goals are made and it takes time to get the expected results."

When Emrikson joined the department, the roster totaled 13 police officers. Today, there are 50 full-time police officers, 48 reserve officers, 16 crossing guards and 14 employees working in various departments.

As police chief in the early 1960's, Emrikson recalled it was a period of "exciting times" and many challenges. "I can sum up my years as rewarding ones because I feel a good department has been built up. It's the finest in the country today," he said.

Emrikson graduated from Lincoln School in Park Ridge and Taft High School in Chicago. He did a stint in the Marines and af-



ter leaving the service started working as a carpenter. "But I always wanted to be in police work and took an initial exam at the Niles Police Department."

He then decided to attend police recruit school in San Diego leaving his wife and children in their Niles home. He stayed only a few months because of high housing costs and returned to the village to work as a carpenter until he joined the police department in 1957.

Someone over 65, however, needs only 1,000 or 2,000 calories per day. Thus, the older persons cannot afford the "empty calories" of junk food. The diet of an older person must contain good, well-balanced nutrition in order to avoid deficiencies in vitamins, minerals, protein, and iron. 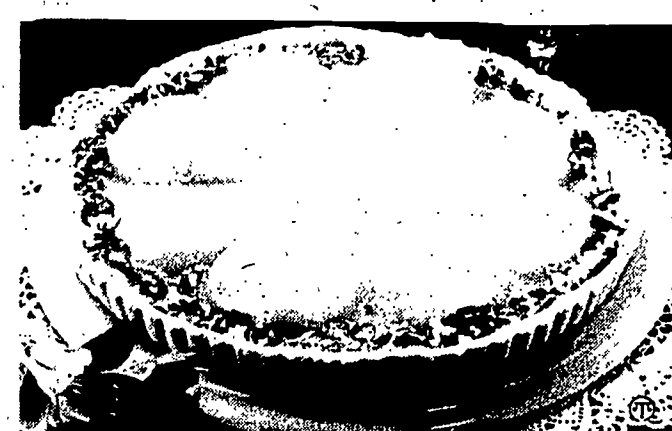

WHAT MAKES A GEM VALUABLE?

What makes a gem valuable? Gemstones are valued in part because of their beauty. The beauty of an apparently colorless diamond comes from the way it interacts with light, how it sparkles. For colored gems, beauty comes from color. Desirable color is a matter of taste. Some prefer the green of an emerald, for example, while others may prefer the green of peridot, sometimes described as lime-green. The goal for the cutter of peridot is to obtain the best color from the gem.

How durable a gem is also influences how valuable it is. Some gems need protection from blows and knocks. Peridot is such a gem, more likely to be set in a necklace or earrings, or if set in a ring, likely to be protected by metal. Just as fine silk is treated gently, so is this fine gem.

How much in demand a gem is affects its value too. Peridot, for instance, is a beautiful gem that has remained quite affordable because demand for it is not high. When people think of green gems, they think first of emeralds. Emeralds are generally much more costly than peridot.

The most important factor in determining the value of your gem is the pleasure it brings you. Try on a peridot and decide.

Daley files theft charges in furniture store closing

Two former owners of a Near North Side furniture store were charged with theft Friday after they allegedly closed their business without notice and fled with more than \$60,000 in deposits and advance payments, according to Cook County State's Attorney Richard M. Daley.

Daley filed the theft charges against Armando C. Pazmino, 47, and his wife, Loreta, 39, the former owners of C.A. Pazmino & Associates, 220 W. Kinzie St., after receiving complaints from more than 50 consumers who were allegedly cheated.

The Pazminos, who previously lived at 800 W. Rand Rd., Arlington Heights, closed the store on or about April 23 and are believed to have fled the state, Daley said.

An investigation by Daley's Consumer Fraud Unit developed evidence that the defendants took payments over the past 18 months, ranging from \$200 to more than \$6,000, from customers

ordering furniture from samples on display at the Kinzie street store.

"In some cases, the payments were not forwarded to the manufacturer," Daley said. "In others, the merchandise was not even ordered."

Arrest warrants were issued Friday afternoon for Pazmino and his wife. If convicted, they face up to a year in jail on each charge.

Daley said he would also seek refunds for anyone found by the court to have been cheated by the defendants.

Several dozen consumers gathered Friday in a courtroom at Belmont and Western avenues on Chicago's North Side to sign complaints against the Pazminos.

The Pazminos allegedly cheated more than a dozen Chicago customers, as well as residents of Lincolnwood, Arlington Heights, Elk Grove Village, Hoffman Estates, Le-

mont, Palos Heights, Palatine, Bridgeview, Burr Ridge, Glenwood, South Barrington, Schaumburg, Maywood, Wheeling, Lake Forest, Prospect Heights and Park Ridge.

Also filing complaints with Daley's office were residents of Lake Zurich, Midlothian, Algonquin, St. Charles, Naperville, Hinsdale, Glen Ellyn, Lindenhurst, and Belvidere.

Daley urged other consumers who may have been cheated by the defendants to file a complaint with his Consumer Fraud Unit at 443-4600.

Skokian sentenced for filing false returns

J. R. Starkey, District Director of the Internal Revenue Service for northern Illinois, announced that Samuel McKinley, Jr., of Skokie was sentenced today to 6 months of work release, 5 years probation during which 500 hours of community service must be performed and \$20,000 in fines for filing false and fraudulent Federal income tax returns.

McKinley is a taxicab owner and bookmaker. He pleaded guilty on May 13, 1987 to each of 2 counts of a criminal information filed May 5, 1987, which charged him with subscribing to false and fraudulent income tax returns for the years 1981 and 1982. McKinley also admitted to bribing Cook County vice policemen.

Under existing law, a person convicted of criminal tax offenses, in addition to whatever sentence is imposed, is also required to pay the tax determined to be due as well as interest and civil penalties that may be assessed.

Kustra Scholarship signed into law

Illinois college students will be able to qualify for student loans to attend out-of-state colleges, as a result of a measure proposed by Sen. Bob Kustra (R-28) and signed into law by the Governor. SB 443 permits the Illinois State Scholarship Commission to be guarantor for student loans made by out-of-state banks. "This was necessary because of Congressional action last year requiring all guarantors to allow banks in other states to participate in their loan programs," Kustra explained. At least 19 state guarantors already have this authority to operate at a national level. "This legislation opens up the loan program to many students who previously could not qualify because they chose to attend schools in other states," Kustra said. "Now they can apply for loans from banks where they are enrolled, up to the same limits that are permitted for students who borrow from in-state banks

Niles allergist calls hay fever a misnomer

Hay fever, despite its name, is not a disease found exclusively among horse lovers and farmers, claims Niles Board Certified Allergist, Dr. Angelo E. Falleroni, 9101 Greenwood.

While hay fever or allergic rhinitis plagues sufferers from mid-August for four to six weeks, mold spore sufferers continue to have symptoms until the first frost, adds Dr. Falleroni.

Sneezing, perhaps wheezing, itchy and watery eyes, scratchy throat, headache, stuffy and runny nose, feeling sluggish and tired—describe hay fever victims whose treatments have not been individualized with the proper medication or desensitization injections to make them more comfortable and improve their quality of life, according to the Board Certified Allergists of Greater Chicago.

Desensitization consists of injections of protein from the pollen grain which immunize the body, allowing active work and play outdoors during the day when sun and hot air currents take their toll.

The amount of microscopic ragweed pollen in the air on any given day depends on wind which increases the quantity and on rain which decreases it. Pollen can be airborne for hundreds of miles, says Dr. Falleroni.

Although the onset of hay fever may begin at any age, unknowingly the sufferer has endured several seasons of exposure to the pollen before the body becomes sensitized and symptoms appear annually.

Ragweed, which wreaks havoc with sensitive mucous membranes, commonly grows in dwarf and giant varieties in areas where the soil has been disturbed.

Nilesites host Pitcairn Island visitor

In mid-July, Kari Boye Young of Pitcairn Island paid a visit to the home of David and Suzanne Miller, long-time Niles residents. Kari, a Norwegian born woman but full-time resident of Pitcairn Island, was on her way back to Pitcairn from a visit to her homeland in Norway. She was able to stop in Chicago for several days and to spend a night at the Millers-in-Niles. Kari left Pitcairn last spring to visit her elderly mother and family in Norway aboard a Norwegian scientific research vessel that had been in Antarctica and had stopped at Pitcairn Island on its way back to Norway from New Zealand. The ship was heading non-stop from Pitcairn to Oslo, an extremely rare opportunity indeed, so Kari, with the urging of her husband, took the opportunity to visit her homeland and family.

Kari is the wife of Pitcairn's Magistrate, Brian Young, who traces his ancestry back to mid-shipman Edward Young of the HMS Bounty. Pitcairn was settled in 1790 by the mutineers of the Bounty and their Tahitian wives, being led to the misnamed island by Bletcher Christian and his first mate, Edward Young. The island has flourished over the last two centuries but is now troubled by too many of its young people being attracted to the "outside world" such that

there is fear that soon not enough able-bodied islanders will be left to maintain Pitcairn's lifestyles of self-sufficiency. Resurrection Hospital has embarked on a program to assist in bringing emergency medical aid to Pitcairn's population via satellite radio link. This will help ease one of the biggest anxieties of the island, i.e., what to do when emergency medical situations arise with no doctor within hundreds of open ocean miles. Kari also visited the Emergency Room at Resurrection and was able to speak with the hospital's staff who will be providing help to the Pitcairners when needed. Kari wrote a book several years ago in Norwegian called

The Last Mutineer. It was very popular in Norway and is sold out at this time. She recently finished an english translation and hopes to see it published in Britain and New Zealand in time for Pitcairn's Bicentennial in 1990. It is hoped that a U.S. publisher will also take an interest in publishing it as the first two chapters that we've seen are fascinating. Kari set sail back to Pitcairn on Sunday, July 26, on the last leg of her journey back to her adopted home and to her husband, Brian, and two children, Timothy, 8, and Anette, 5. Kari enjoyed her visit to the Niles area but commented that "it was a bit too hot at times, and not very hilly."

Social Security disability reviews

If you are 1 of the nearly 5,800 residents of the Northwest suburbs of Chicago who receive Social Security or Supplemental Security Income (SSI) disability checks, you should know that your case will be reviewed periodically. This is to make sure you continue to meet all requirements for benefits.

The timing of your review will depend on the nature and severity of your impairment, the likelihood for improvement, and other factors. A review could be scheduled as early as 6 months after your first month of eligibility if you have an injury or illness that is expected to improve. Or you may be reviewed only every 5-7 years if your impairment is considered more permanent and less likely to get better.

After you get a written notice, someone will interview you in person or by phone to explain the review process and your appeal and other rights. You will be asked how your impairment keeps you from working and about your medical treatment and any work you may have done since the latest decision.

Your case then will be reviewed by an agency in your

State that makes disability decisions on behalf of the Social Security Administration. The people there will request medical reports from sources that treated you. If additional medical evidence is needed and it is not available from your sources, you may be asked to take a special examination or test at Government expense.

You will be notified in writing when a decision has been made. Benefits generally will continue unless evidence shows that your impairment has improved and you are able to do substantial gainful work. There are some limited exceptions, but they apply in relatively few cases.

If a decision is made that you are no longer disabled, you can

appeal the decision and request continue payment. You can meet with a decisionmaker during the first appeal step (reconsideration) to explain why you feel you are still disabled. If you appeal within 10 days after receiving the notice, you can request to have benefits continue. You can do this through the second appeal step (decision by an administrative law judge); if you later lose the appeal, however, generally you must repay any benefits that were not due you.

**Fraud lawsuit filed
against solicitors of elderly**

Attorney General Neil F. Hartigan on July 27 filed a consumer fraud lawsuit against a Texas-based mass-mailing firm that solicits the elderly on behalf of insurance companies and agents who want to sell Medicare supplemental insurance policies.

Named as defendants in the suit filed today in Sangamon County are the Senior Citizens Marketing Group and its president, Allen B. Kramer. The company also operates under the names of National Senior Advisory Center and Senior Security Benefit Services. The company is located in Dallas, Texas.

According to the suit, Senior Citizens Marketing Group mass mails thousands of solicitations to the elderly in Illinois each year. The company uses names which imply that it is affiliated with independent senior citizen organizations. The mailings often appear to be official U.S. documents and even include a Washington address. Senior citizens are asked to respond to the company's mailings by returning postage-paid cards. The names are then sold to insurance agents, who take the purchased cards to the elderly person's homes to make sales presentations.

Hartigan said the solicitations mislead the elderly into thinking that by returning the card they will receive free information about recent Medicare changes and new insurance plans to address those changes. In reality, the information is hand-delivered by an insurance agent desirous of selling policies.

"Medicare was created to spare aging Americans the fear of economic ruin," Hartigan said. "It is outrageous that some individuals exploit these fears and create undue anxiety among our elderly."

The suit seeks temporary and permanent injunctions enjoining the firm from engaging in deceptive direct-mail campaigns.

The complaint also asks the court to fine the company up to \$50,000 per violation of the Illinois Consumer Fraud and Deceptive Business Practices Act, and to pay all costs for investigation and prosecution.

Tax check-offs brought donations of \$615,922

Illinois taxpayers donated \$615,922 of the state income tax refunds they were due this year to help prevent child abuse, research Alzheimer's disease, and protect non-game wildlife, according to Sen. Walter W. Dudyecz (R-7-Chicago). "Because of taxpayers' generosity through the tax form check-offs, Illinois will be able to step up its efforts in those three areas," Dudyecz said. "The fact that all three funds topped the \$100,000 they needed in donations to be listed on next year's tax forms indicates that taxpayers

consider their work very important." Dudyecz said the Alzheimer's Disease Research Fund received \$50,000 more than it did last year, a total of \$165,539 to be used for general research grants and early research grants for persons who plan careers specializing in Alzheimer's disease. "With such strong public support, Illinois could become a leader in the drive to find the cause and treatment for this debilitating ailment," he said. The Child Abuse Prevention Fund drew the most contributions through check-offs - \$257,173. "Now that we have become so aware of the prevalence of child abuse, people are eager to do what they can to protect youngsters," he said. Most of this fund goes into grants to local social agencies working to prevent abuse.

The third fund, Non-Game Wildlife, received \$171,291, which will be used for projects to protect habitats of certain birds and animals and for wildlife studies. Dudyecz reported that new funds to help pay expenses for U.S.

Olympics teams and provide more services to the blind may be added to the tax forms next year, if they are approved by the Governor. Anti-smoking bill gets exec backing

With legislation that would limit smoking in public places and offices facing the General Assembly this week, a new poll shows strong business support for a smoking crackdown.

A Crain's Chicago Business poll of 200 Chicago-area firms shows that 71% support legislation restricting smoking in public places. And 41% would favor a bill completely banning smoking.

A surprising 34% already either have restricted or banned smoking on the job, and 20% of companies with no restrictions said they plan to impose them in the future.

The Chicago Business Poll, conducted quarterly for CCB by First Colonial Bankshares Corp.,

surveyed the attitudes of 200 chief executives of small-to-mid-sized Chicago corporations.

"Our position has always been that (it) should be up to the employer to decide if there will be a smoking policy," said Don Hughes, lobbyist for the ISCC. "It is a general philosophical approach that we oppose government intrusion into the employer/employee relationship."

As lawmakers return to Springfield for the last week of action on bills in their house of origin, legislation is pending in both chambers that would set limits to smoking in public places and offices. This is the first time both House and Senate committees have sent bills to the full

membership for consideration. Lobbyists and legislators say both bills' chances are too close to call.

Nearly three-quarters of CCB poll respondents who have instituted smoking restrictions cited concerns about the links between smoking and lung cancer as a key factor in the decision. More than a third of the same firms were aware of the Surgeon General's findings.

Among Chicago firms that said they have implemented restrictions on smoking, 76% said they had made the policy effective immediately.

And only 25% of survey respondents said they would be likely to offer a stop-smoking program for their employees, should

the Illinois Department of Public Health to administer and enforce the act.

Of the 9% of companies that said they had instituted such programs, 61% said the programs were successful.
