A state regulatory agency has levied a \$5,000 fine against the George J. Goldman Memorial Home for the Aged, 6601 Touhy Ave., Niles, for a Type A violation in connection with the death of a 87-year-old resident on March 27. The State of Illinois Depart-

ment of Public Health, IDPH, also has ordered the Goldman Home to implement a plan of correctional action and has issued a conditional license to operate through December of 1988, according to Linda Haase, IDPH public information officer.

Haase said the incident occurred when a nurse's aide noticed the woman was having difficulty breathing and reported it to a nurse on duty. "The nurse said she would be there shortly. However, she went to the woman

We read in one of the metropolitan newspapers a caller phoned the 911 emergency number to report the tragedy about the two teens who died of burns after climbing an electrical pole in Niles. We were also told by Niles village manager, Jack Hodge, that Niles ambulances were on the scene in record time.

The village of Skokie uses the 911 emergency number while Niles and Morton Grove have their own seven digit emergency numbers.

We've always believed the 911 emergency number should be used throughout the country. When you're out of town it should not require you seek the emergency number before dialing for help.

In November, Nilesites will have the choice of voting for the use of the 911 emergency number. Because Niles has two telephone companies, whose franchises are within its borders, it's taken several months of work by the police and fire departments to coordinate the use of the 911 number for emergency use. Manager Hodge said state law requires the choice of the use of the number be placed

## Heinen concerned over public apathy on budget

Adoption of the combined budget and appropriation ordinance was the main order of business at Tuesday's meeting of the Niles Park District Board.

Elaine Heinen, board president, said she and board members were disappointed no one appeared at the board meetings during which the budget and appropriation items were discussed. "People apparently are not interested in how their money is spent," she said.

"If taxes are raised, we get wall-to-wall people with complaints. On the other hand, we must be doing something right."

According to Bill Hughes, park director, the board appropriated \$4,070,200, with a total budget of \$3,485,482 for the fiscal year. Cash on hand at the beginning fiscal year (May 1), \$1,255,183; anticipated revenue for the new fiscal year, \$3,230,658; estimated amount of taxes to be received,

## Police apprehend burglars of Niles eatery

Two men were charged with burglary, possession of burglary tools and possession of stolen property on July 9 in connection with the robbery of a Niles restaurant. Niles police stopped their car because it looked suspicious, according to a police official.

Lopez, Benigno, 27, of Chicago, whose bond was set at \$5,000 appeared in Niles Circuit Court July 15 on the charges, but the case was continued to July 29.

The second offender, Oamel Gonzales, 28, of Chicago, faces a July 29 court date. Bond was set at \$10,000.

According to the manager of the Old Jerusalem Restaurant, 8743 Milwaukee Ave., the facility closed about 11 p.m. "The robbery must have taken place after that. Niles police called me and I identified the stolen items found in their car," he said.

Police were on routine patrol when they noted an old red Dodge Magnum that appeared to be in a beaten condition with damage on the front quarter panel and the left turn signal hanging out. The

rear tail lights also appeared to be out.

Police followed the car, which made a left turn from Milwaukee onto Birchwood and then proceeded to make a left turn onto Nora at a slow rate of speed.

After a circuitous route on various streets, in which police lost sight of the car once, the offenders were stopped on Oakton and Octavia.

During questioning, Gonzalez, who was driving the car, could not produce a driver's license. Police then observed what ap-

Approximately 115,000 people ate a wide variety of food, drank beer, enjoyed carnival rides and listened to music ranging from rock 'n' roll to country nostalgic dance tunes at the Niles All American Festival last week.

Elaine Heinen, president of the Niles Events Committee, which sponsored the five-day event, said the Committee had predicted the record attendance exceeding last year's 100,000 attendance. "We were shooting for 125,000 but happy with the number of people that turned out for the fest. The weather may have been hot, but we only had a little rain on Saturday that cleared up later in the day," she said.

Although dollar figures have yet to be tabulated, Heinen stated the festival and the Taste of Niles were "highly successful. The Niles Events Committee worked all year on the festival which resulted in the larger attendance this year. All feedback we received has been very positive," she said. "I'm very proud of the Committee and all the volunteers who

helped make the festival a success."

According to Heinen, Saturday evening drew the largest crowd. The entertainment on the main stage featured the New Colony Six playing popular tunes.

"About 30,000 people were crowded in the First of America/Golf Mill Bank parking lot, spilling over into the beer garden and beyond. The beer garden was so crowded, we had to close the gate to prevent more people coming," she said.

She added that as a result of the hot weather on Saturday, people were lined up at the bars. "It was great to see that many people enjoying themselves. The crowds were orderly during the festival run and there were no police problems."

The attendance was about 25,000 on Sunday, the final day of the fest. Heinen said after calling various television stations, Channel 2 sent a crew early in the afternoon to televise the event. "The festival went on television at 5:30 p.m. and the people came

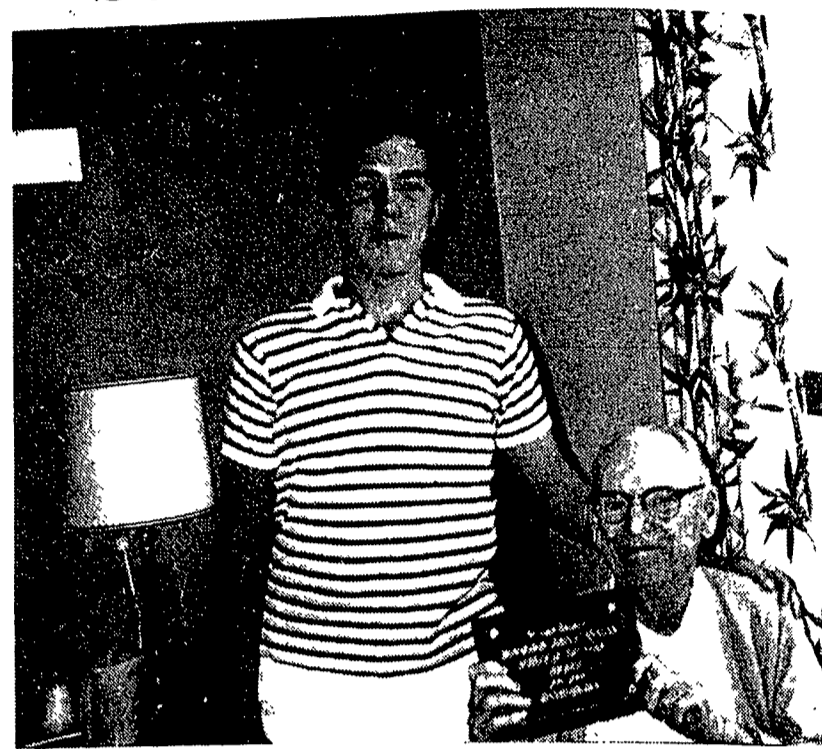

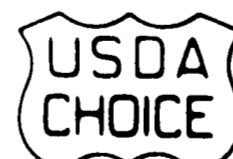

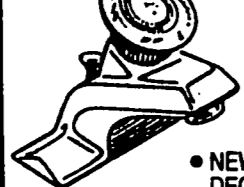

If the power steering fails, you can still steer the car. However, maneuvering the car will become difficult, and you may need a passenger's help to steer to the side of the road. Steering loss is usually the result of a broken fan belt. If this occurs, you can temporarily regain power by replacing the belt with a nylon stocking. Some cars are equipped with a back up brake system - brakes on both the front and back wheels. If one system fails, the other may still work, but you will need to exert greater force than normal on the brake pedal. If the braking system fails, pump the brakes and apply the parking brake.

## Mandatory auto insurance passed by Senate

For 17 years, Illinois legislators have been proposing bills to require motorists to have auto insurance, but Sen. Bob Kustra (R-28) is the first General Assembly member to win passage in both houses for a mandatory insurance bill.

Approved in the Senate 42-15 this week, HB 3900 requires all motorists to have at least basic liability coverage. Compliance could be checked through random verification by the Secretary of State and by police when drivers are stopped for traffic violations or involved in accidents.

Kustra explained that the measure calls for a \$500 fine and two months loss of auto registration for a first offense of driving without insurance. Repeat offenders could be fined \$1,000 and lose their vehicle registration for four months. "The idea is basic - if a motorist doesn't insure a car, the punishment is loss of the right to take that vehicle on the road," he said. Repeat offenders could be fined \$1,000 and lose their vehicle registration for four months. Reinstatement fees would be charged at the end of suspension periods.

The 9 American League starters that year who are now all in the Hall of Fame are Lou Gehrig, Charlie Gehringer, Joe Cronin, Jimmy Fox, Babe Ruth, Al Simmons, Heinie Manush, Bill Dickey and Lefty Gomez. . . 3 of the 9 National League starters in the Hall are Bill Terry, Frank Frisch, Travis Jackson, Pie Traynor, Joe Medwick, Kiki Cuyler, Gabby Hartnett and Carl Hubbell. . . 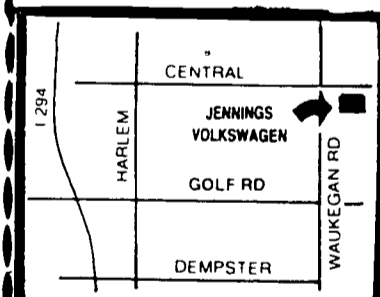

### Traffic Safety Hints

by Secretary of State Jim Edgar

Driving defensively means watching for pedestrians as well as other vehicles. In 1986, 276 pedestrians were killed and 10,267 were injured by motor vehicles in Illinois.

1. When the pedestrian is in a marked or unmarked crosswalk on your side of the road and there is no traffic control signals. Slow down and stop, if necessary, before proceeding.
2. When making a turn at any intersection, and when making a lawful turn on a red light after coming to a complete stop.
3. After coming to a complete stop at a stop sign or flashing red signal at an intersection. You also must yield to the pedestrian who enters a crosswalk before a traffic light changes.
4. When leaving or entering a street or highway from an alley, building, private road or driveway.
5. When approaching vehicles or persons working in a clearly marked highway construction or maintenance area.

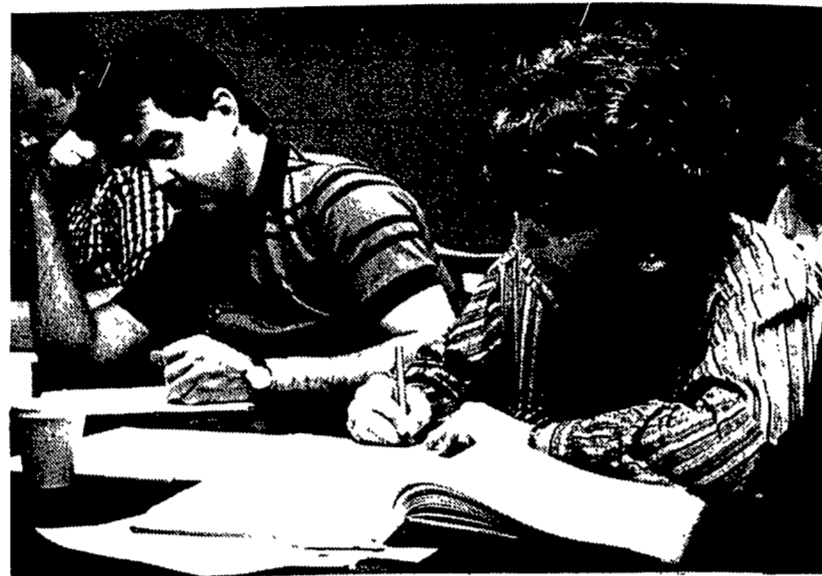

## North Central College Weekend College



When Weekend College was introduced at North Central College in west-suburban Naperville in the fall of 1981, 78 students enrolled in one or more courses. Now, almost seven years later, more than 400 students enroll in Weekend College each term, and a second center for the program has been opened in the northwestern suburbs at the Gould Conference Center in Rolling Meadows.

What is Weekend College, and why is it so successful? ## News on classroom computers

Social science teachers at Maine East learned how to bring the world to their classrooms when Kay Hicks, District Department Chairperson for Library and Technology Services, conducted a workshop on X-Change. Maine Township High School District 207 is the first area school district to take advantage of the system which is offered through Cablenet.

X-Change feeds the news of the world to personal computers via cable television lines. The news wires include Agence France Presse from France, Associated Press from the United States, Canadian Press from Canada, Central News Agency from the Republic of China, Deutsche Press-Agentur from West Germany, Kyodo from Japan, Notimex from Mexico, Opec News Agency from oil producing countries, XINHUA News Agency from the People's Republic of China, and TASS from the Soviet Union.

Using sophisticated satellite technology, X-Change collects news wire transmissions at a processing center in Denver and sends them on to local cable companies. Cablenet captures the information in a large receiving dish on earth and transmits the signal over cable television lines that go to schools and

determine which countries support or oppose American policies. According to Hicks, the system also has the capability of searching through the news for all the information on a specific topic for research projects. The system is expected to be used by students in current events, social science, and debate classes.

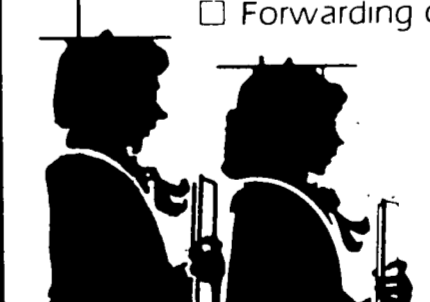

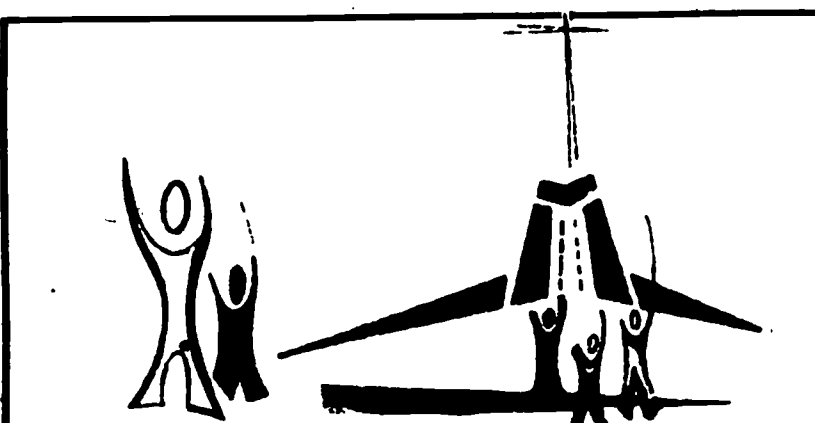

### Daley bill to protect seniors approved by general assembly

Legislation proposed by Cook County State's Attorney Richard M. Daley to increase the penalties against anyone who seriously injures a senior citizen during the commission of a crime was approved by the Illinois General Assembly Wednesday and sent to the governor for final action.

House Bill 3615, which would create a new criminal offense known as "Aggravated Battery to a Senior Citizen," was approved in the state Senate by an overwhelming margin, according to Daley, who noted that the legislation passed the Illinois House last month.

"I congratulate all of the senators and representatives who recognized the need to give greater legal protection to seniors, who are often targeted as crime victims due to their age," Daley said.

If signed into law by Gov. James R. Thompson, the statute would require a mandatory prison term for criminals who inflict serious injury or permanent disability on a victim who is age 60 or older.

Under current law, such offenders are eligible for probation. "Some criminals regard seniors as easy prey because they are less able to defend themselves," Daley explained.

"This law would send the message that attacking and seriously injuring a senior will result in mandatory prison, making these crimes less attractive to those who might be tempted to commit such an offense," he added.

The new law would also increase the maximum penalty allowed for this type of crime to seven years behind bars, instead of the current five-year maximum. Daley praised the efforts of the bill's principal sponsors—Illinois Representatives John P. Daley (Chicago), Lovana Jones (Chicago), Benjamin A. Martinez (Chicago), Calvin Sutker (Skokie), John O'Connell (Willow Springs), Kurt Granberg (Centralia), and Illinois Senators Timothy Degnan (Chicago) and Margaret Smith (Chicago)—in obtaining General Assembly approval of the measure.

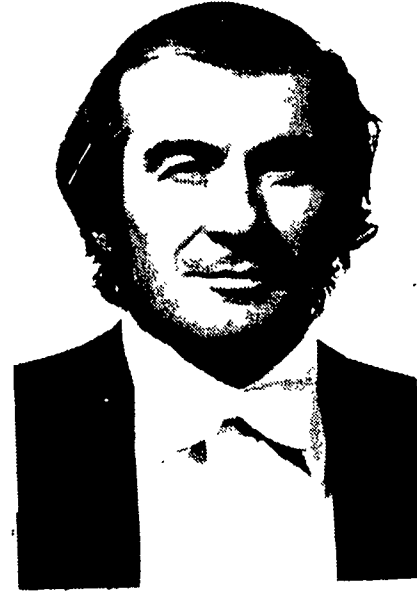
## Old Orchard Summer Concert

## Loyola's E/R notes pediatric injuries

Although people often associate an emergency room visit with serious injury and trauma, most cases treated in the emergency room fall into the category of minor injuries. And frequently, the patient is a child.

Recent statistics from the Consumer Product Safety Council show that 39.5 percent of emergency room visits involve children under the age of 14. Of that group, almost two-thirds are treated for minor injuries.

The top three injuries seen by pediatricians at Loyola University's Foster G. McGaw Hospital, Maywood, are trauma to the head, lacerations and various orthopaedic injuries, according to Dr. Simon Ros, director of pediatric emergency medicine at Foster G. McGaw Hospital.

"Trauma to the head usually happens within the household and occurs throughout the year," says Dr. Ros. "Lacerations, however, tend to be more seasonal. We see more in the summer months. And of all the orthopaedic injuries we treat, the most common is an ankle sprain."

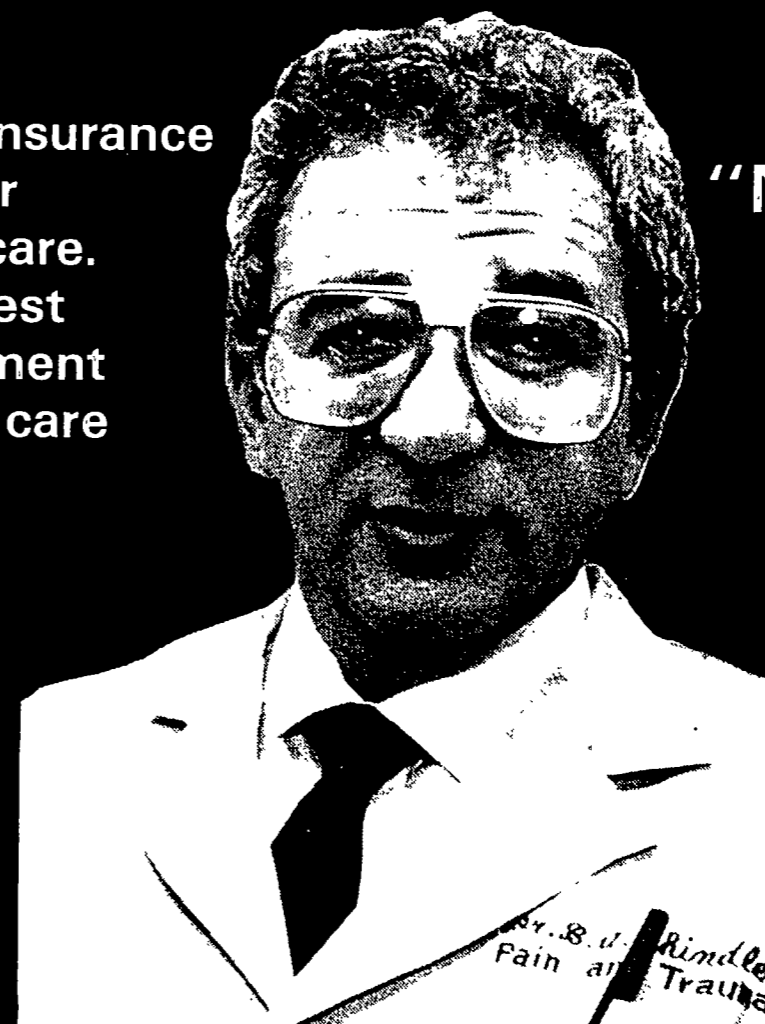

## IRS checking 1985 tax returns

Every Monday for the next few months, several thousand Chicago area taxpayers are going to open their mail boxes and find a three page letter from the Internal Revenue Service about their 1985 tax returns.

The computer generated letter, identified in the upper right hand corner as a CP-2000, is basically a request for information and may not be as ominous as it seems at first glance.

You know you have a CP-2000 if

the first page starts out with the words "Proposed Changes to Income..." The letter will explain that the IRS has received certain W-2 or 1099 Forms listing income paid to the taxpayer that was not listed or properly identified on their 1985 tax return. The letter continues by explaining that you have 30 days in which to respond. If you agree with the IRS, simply tear off the bottom of page one, sign and mail it with your check, partial payment, or request for payment arrangement. If you disagree, send a signed statement with documentation back to the service center.

It is not necessary to call the toll free number listed on the letter. The CP-2000 must be answered in writing.

The second page contains a recalculation of the 1985 return based on the questionable information. Usually, this results in a tax increase. Page three will list the specific items that the IRS is questioning.

The IRS suggests the first thing the taxpayer does upon receiving the CP-2000 is check the IRS figures against their tax return. The second action is to respond in writing. An ignored letter from the IRS does not go away!

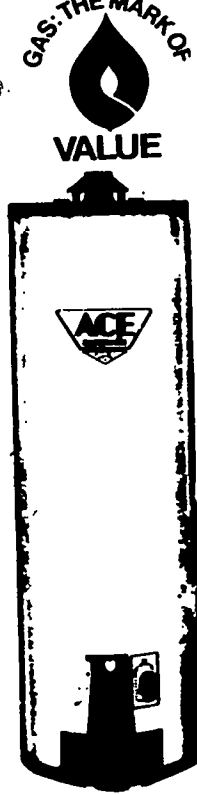

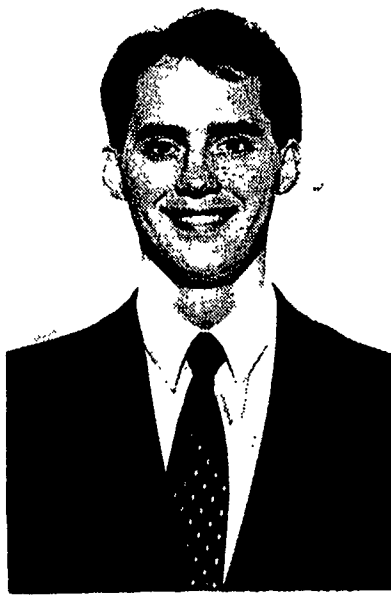

## Illinois Bell proposes lower telephone rates

Illinois Bell customers will see lower telephone bills beginning in July if the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) approves an \$85 million cut in rates proposed today by the company.

In addition, one-time customer refunds totalling about \$35 million will appear on August bills if the company's proposal is approved.

The rate reductions and refunds were proposed to reflect changes in Illinois Bell's revenues and expenses resulting in part from the lower federal tax rate and reduced depreciation expense.

The \$85 million reduction will appear on telephone bills as a credit each month, beginning in July, until the ICC acts on a plan the company will propose later this year to outline specific rate changes.

Business customers will receive a credit of \$1.78 per line per month and residential customers will receive \$1.03 per line per month.

"We agreed to an \$85 million

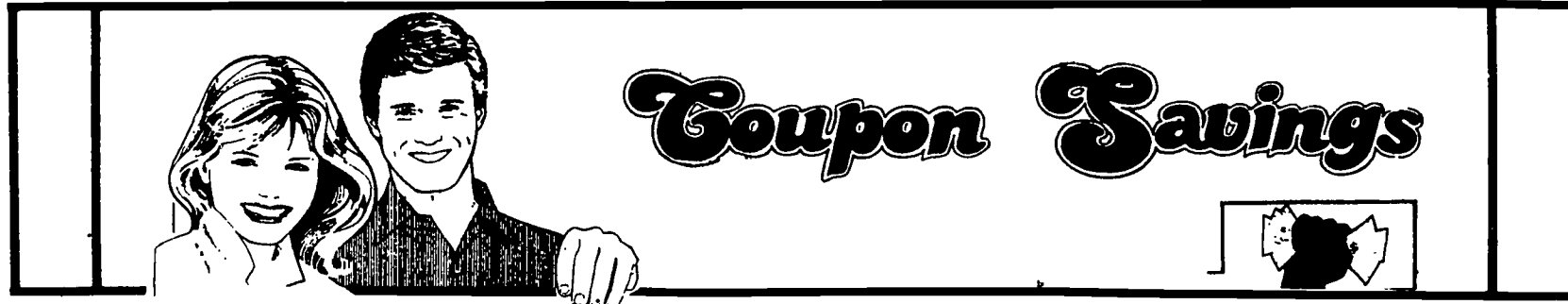
amount in discussion with the ICC staff, but we will seek to modify this later," said Fred K. Konrad, Illinois Bell assistant vice president for regulatory affairs. "We believe \$85 million is too large for a permanent rate reduction."

"In our filing later this year," Konrad said, "we will present reasons why we believe the permanent rate reduction should be modified."

The one-time refund on August bills totalling about \$35 million represents the amount the company has set aside for potential refund based on anticipated tax savings for the first half of this year.

Business customers will receive a refund of around \$8 per telephone line while residential users will be refunded around \$5 per line.

The one-time refund will come from a fund established in January by order of the ICC. That fund will be terminated once the refunds are granted.

# Evanston annexation strengthens Oakton's partnership school

The annexation of Evanston Township High School (ETHS) with Oakton Community College District may be described as a natural marriage. According to Oakton President Dr. Thomas TenHoeve, the College's partnership with Evanston started many years ago.

"In diverse ways the College has had long-standing educational and training relationships with Evanston. There are a number of joint programs already in place," said TenHoeve.

For example, Oakton has an articulation agreement with the North Suburban Educational Region for Vocational Education (NSERVE) which is comprised of five North Cook County high school districts, including Evanston which serves as the administering district.

"Oakton is a full participant in any NSERVE activity that is relevant to the College. Our faculty members along with faculty from Evanston and other NSERVE high school districts meet with employers to identify the level of preparation the students will need to be effective employees in a variety of fields. We also discuss ways in which vocational courses and curricula may be sequenced to provide a smooth transition from high school to college," said Trudy Bers, senior director of Institutional Research, Curriculum and Strategic Planning.

Also, ETHS is a participating member of the Adult Education Section of the Oakton/MONNACEP Area Planning Council which is responsible for submitting an annual adult education program plan for its area to the Illinois State Board of Education. Oakton serves as administering district of this Council.

Thanks to a cooperative agreement between Oakton and ETHS, students enrolled in the Evanston High School

Restaurant Hotel and Recreation program can attend Oakton's Hotel/Motel Management program. The agreement, which was approved two years ago, provides an opportunity for students to learn more about the program, gain college and job experience and get ahead in their academic study.

Then, there is the recent cooperative articulation agreement between Oakton and Kendall which allows Oakton's Hotel/Motel Management program students to complete their Bachelor of Arts degree in two years at The Culinary School of Kendall.

Oakton President Dr. Thomas TenHoeve also is personally involved with the Evanston community where he serves in various organizations. He is a member of the governing boards of NSERVE and of the Regional Educational Services Center. He also serves on the Mayor's Employment Training Committee.

Further proof of Evanston's strong ties with Oakton is demonstrated in the number of Evanston residents enrolled at Oakton each semester. The Spring 1988 Admissions and Enrollment Report shows that out of 2,168 out-of-district residents enrolled at Oakton, 579 were from Evanston.

According to MONNACEP Continuing Education Program Director Barbara Rizzo, 50 percent of adult education courses have students from Evanston. The winter 1988 Enrollment Report shows that out of 1,653 out-of-district residents who took MONNACEP courses, 233 were from Evanston.

Each year, a large number of students from Evanston participate in special programs like Talent Search; the High School Accounting Contest; the Test of Engineering Aptitude, Mathematics and Science (TEAMS) competition; and the Basic Nurse Assistant Training,

to mention a few.

On-site programs offered through Oakton's Institute for Business and Professional Development have brought educational training and development programs to various Evanston businesses, including Shand Morahan and Company, the Central Evanston Child Care Center, Washington National Insurance Company and the Evanston Fire Department.

Several Oakton faculty members and administrators, including Jack Thompson, dean of Social Science/Business; John Tosto, professor of Student Development; Bill Taylor, professor of Political Science; and Alan Rubin, professor of Student Development reside in Evanston and are involved in various community activities.

Faculty member Helene Block initiated the first Early Childhood Development off campus course for the Evanston child care program 10 years ago. She also was instrumental in starting inter-generational programs for Evanston Day Nursery Care and the Prime Time Adult Day Care. She presently serves as a consultant to various Evanston schools.

Oakton Board Chairman Ray Hartstein noted that at the June 28 Board meeting at which the Evanston Annexation resolution was approved, "Because Evanston was without a community college for so many years, we always tried to reach out to serve them whenever possible. Our past activities reflect our interest in Evanston's educational needs, and we look forward to expanded contact as this annexation becomes a reality."

# Tips on finding the perfect baby sitter

A thorough interview and "gut instinct" are primary factors in the selection of a quality baby sitter, according to Karen Brugler, administrative director, Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, Lutheran General Children's Medical Center, 1775 Dempster St., Park Ridge.

"Because the baby sitter often becomes an important person in the lives of family members, the selection process should be as professional and thorough as possible," Brugler says.

Brugler suggests both parents meet and talk to the person before the baby sitter is entrusted with the care of a child. The selection process should be evaluated in the interview:

-Does he or she act in a responsible manner?

-Does he or she have prior job references?

-What do you know of the potential sitter's background?

-If they are a high-school aged person, what is his or her academic history, and does he or she participate in high school activities?

-Finally, trust your instincts, if you feel uncomfortable with the person, chances are so will your child.

Brugler advocates interviewing the potential sitter alone, then bringing the child in. Watch how the prospective sitter responds to your child while you are present, and find out from your child if that behavior changes when you leave the room.

In evaluating the results of the interview, two important factors should be analyzed:

-Capacity to relate to children. Do they speak the child's

language? Do they enjoy the same things as children? Do they have the "ability to regress", to understand what a child is trying to communicate?

-Maturity. Maturity level is the most important quality in a baby sitter. Most people who apply for baby sitting/child care jobs like - and can relate to - children. But do they have the ability to act like a responsible adult when necessary?

"Each of us has a child inside of us, and that part identifies with children," Brugler says. "But, baby sitters must maintain a responsible level of judgment and safety, when needed."

Once you have chosen and begin using the sitter, talk to your kids. They will let you know if something is wrong. "Children can't always verbalize how they feel, instead they get us to feel the way they feel," says Brugler. "If while talking to your children, you begin to feel uncomfortable, then something may be wrong."

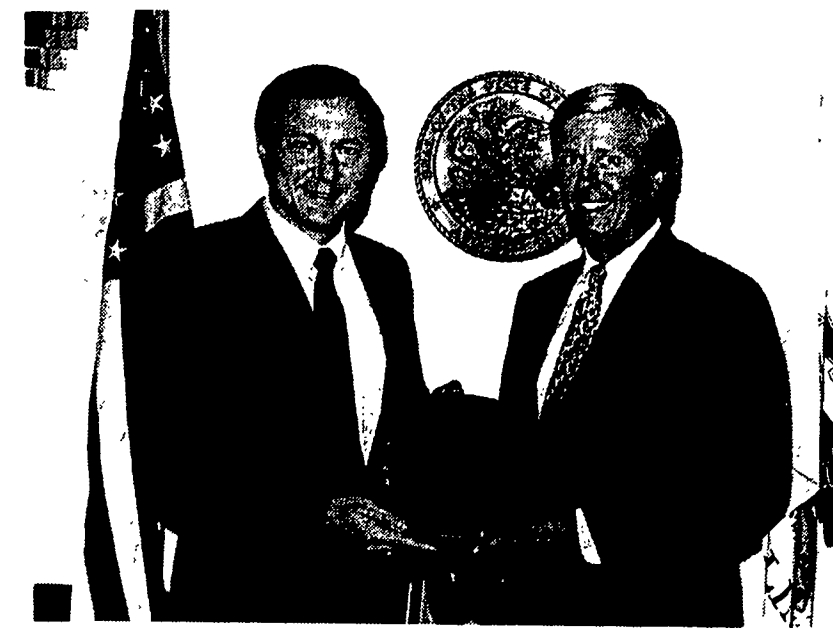

before voters. He said a surcharge of 50¢ per month would be tacked onto telephoner's bills if the referendum is okayed.

It certainly should be an issue which concerns Morton Grove residents. I wonder how many MG residents could recite their own emergency number. And equally important, how many outside residents coming into Morton Grove would have to spend time looking up MG's emergency number if an emergency occurred.

Morton Grove's manager, Larry Arft, told us the subject was studied years ago but because Morton Grove belongs to the RED program which has a joint emergency

system with surrounding villages, it created a conflict. It is necessary to have a single answering point for the village to have the 911 system and MG was not set-up for such a system. Larry said the problem is not insurmountable but felt the police department would have to execute the central answering point if the system was installed.

Niles, which has a very sophisticated communications system at its police department headquarters, also belongs to the RED system. But, after several months of study by Whitey Emrikson and Harry Kinowski, the problems concerning this central answering point were ironed out.

## Gala proceeds benefit the developmental day care

The funds from the Lutheran General Foundation's annual 1987 Gala were used to further accelerate the Developmental Day Care Program at Lutheran General Children's Medical Center, 1775 Dempster St., Park Ridge. The Developmental Day Care Program is a special project at Parkside Children's Day Care Center designed to introduce handicapped children into "normal" day care environments.

"The Developmental Day Care Program allows handicapped children the opportunity to learn that they are not completely different from other, 'normal' children in the center," says Susan Walker, director, Developmental Day Care Program, Lutheran General Children's Medical Center. "Participating in classroom as well as playground activities helps all children—handicapped and non-handicapped—to become comfortable with and to better understand each other."

According to Walker, the funds from the gala were designated for physical assets and to further train teachers through inservice

seminars, taught by hospital employees and social workers who are proficient in working with handicapped children. The seminars will help teachers better understand the special needs of handicapped children enrolled in the program. Day care workers will be taught to effectively deal with handicapped children introduced into their classroom and to correctly handle questions and reactions from children already in the class as well as inquisitive parents.

The Developmental Day Care Program was a result of numerous parent requests for programs designed to help handicapped children with their special needs.

"Interest in the Developmental Day Care Program has been tremendous! We're receiving positive feedback and support from the community, as well as professionals working with handicapped children, and Lutheran General Children's Medical Center physicians and specialists," says Walker.

Lutheran General Children's Medical Center is comprised of 172 inpatient beds and 136
