We read in one of the metropolitan newspapers a caller phoned the 911 emergency number to report the tragedy about the two teens who died of burns after: climbing an electrical pole in Niles. We were also told by Niles village manager, Jack Hadge, that Niles ambulances were on the scene in record

The village of Skokie uses the 911 emergency number while Niles and Morton Grove have their own seven digit emergency numbers.

We've always believed the 911 emergency number should be used throughout the country. When you're out of town it should not require you seek the emergency number before dialing for help.

In November, Nilesites will have the choice of voting for the use of the 911 emergency number. Because Niles has two telephone companies, whose franchises are within its borders, it's taken several months of work by the police and fire departments to coordinate the use of the 911 number for emergency use. Although people often associate an emergency room visit with serious injury and trauma, most cases treated in the emergency room fall into the category of minor injuries. And frequently,

the patient is a child. Recent statistics from the Consumer Product Safety Council show that 39.5 percent of children under the age of 14. Of that group, almost two-thirds are treated for minor injuries.

The top three injuries seen by pediatricians at Loyola University's Foster G. McGaw Hospital Maywood, are trauma to the head, lacerations and various orthopaedic injuries, according to Dr. Simon Ros, director of pediatric emergency medicine at



"Each of us has a child inside of us, and that part identifies with children," Brugler says. "But, baby sitters must maintain a responsible level of judgment and safety, when needed."

Once you have chosen and begin using the sitter, talk to your kids. They will let you know if something is wrong. "Children can't always verbalize how they feel, instead they get us to feel the way they feel," says Brugler. "If while talking to your children, you begin to feel uncomfortable. then something may be wrong."
