You take the shoe box marked "Taxes-1994" and begin to sort out the papers. After an hour or two, you're relieved that your notes indicate that you need only two more items and you will be able to complete your 1994 tax forms. As you return the box to the

### ComEd sponsors TV show

ComEd is responding to the number one concern of customers: Reduce the cost of energy bills.

Beginning April 8, ComEd began bringing customers the television show "Our House," a program filled with energy-efficiency suggestions that help customers lower their energy bills while preserving the environment.

Co-hosted by Tom Tynan, a hands-on home improvement expert, and his associate Paula Engel, and his associate Paula Engel, the show airs in the Chicago area 5 p.m. Saturdays on WBBM TV Channel 2. The program's format isn't to lead viewers through time-consuming construction projects, but rather it features easy to follow, step-by-step instructions on energy-saving improvements that take less than a day, or even just a few minutes. In addition to home improvement, the show has an environmental segment on topics like electric lawn mowers, clothes processors and solar pathway lights.

The "Our House" series has been seen in 15 other television markets and been popular with other utilities including Houston Lighting and Power. Tynan has a degree in Architecture from the University of Miami and studied energy at the Florida Solar Energy Center in Cape Canaveral. He owns his own construction company, has published two home improvement books and hosts a popular home improvement show in Houston.

Joining ComEd as co-sponsors are Builders Square and Carrier heating and air conditioning. Media sponsors including the Chicago Tribune, US99 Radio and WBBM TV Channel 2 are also helping promote the show. Working with these outlets gives ComEd additional platforms to reach customers with information on energy efficiency. Copies of the series are being sent to more than 400 libraries. Customers will also receive coupons for energy-efficient equipment in the monthly ComEd customer newsletter, The Source. shelf, you can't help but notice similar boxes for "1993," "1992," back to "1990." Is there enough room in the basement? There the boxes go back to the 1980s. Or was it the 70s? You don't want to think about it.

You probably shouldn't. And you shouldn't worry about it either. This might well be the advice Maurice Nagle may offer you.

Although soft-spoken, Nagle is direct and comfortably reassuring. He says, "We have to empathize with them and understand that first year is hard."

Without hesitation, Nagle comments on the people he has assisted, "They are all very conscientious about paying taxes." He really believes that we wouldn't have a deficit if everyone was as conscientious in paying taxes.

Frequently, explains Nagle, "it is a widow" who has had a difficult time in determining "what she should keep and what she should throw out." Her husband passed away and he "usually took care of the taxes," says Nagle. Women in this position, says Nagle, often "don't know what to do with the papers they come in with."

"We shouldn't add to the tax burden," says Nagle "of these people in these income brackets who find it difficult to pay taxes." The tax preparation assistance available at the center only to seniors has proven to be an increasingly popular service according to Nagle.

Yet, as Nagle makes this statement, he points out, "Tax laws are not always fair to the elderly." He also mentions that "inflation takes its toll" and "with the decline in interest rates, a lot of people suffered, especially those who relied on interest income for survival."

"We shouldn't add to the tax burden," says Nagle "of these people in these income brackets who find it difficult to pay taxes." The tax preparation assistance available at the center only to seniors has proven to be an increasingly popular service according to Nagle.

**Make an effort to know what you have**

In order to avoid possible future stressful situations with tax

preparation, Nagle would advise all couples to "make an effort to know what you have." Too often one or the other spouse, "does not understand investment," says Nagle when decisions about selling must be made. "We're not financial counselors," says Nagle. "Sometimes an attorney would be helpful."

The tax preparation service does not offer financial or legal advice. However, tax preparers have taken a two-week course given by the IRS and AARP. Each senior is scheduled for an hour and a half session on Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday between 9 a.m. and noon or 1 and 4 p.m. If you have not yet filed your 1994 tax returns, do not put off calling, (708) 967-6100 for an appointment.

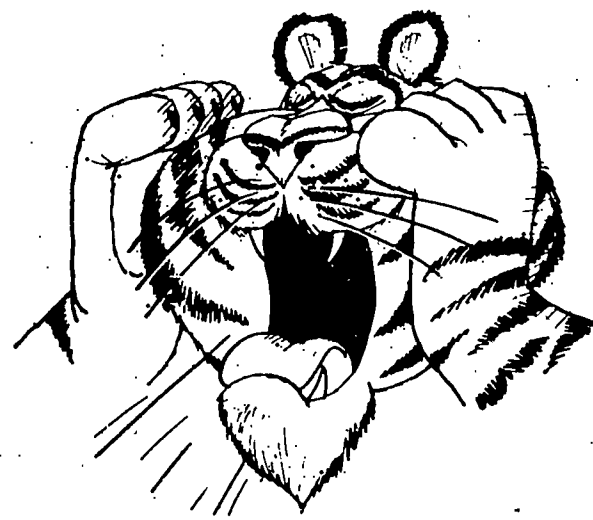

## School News

### Conservation Department distributes education packets

An education packet produced by the National Wildlife Federation is being distributed to educators and youth group leaders by the Department of Conservation, according to Director Brent Manning.

"The packet's curriculum guide focuses on habitat and offers activities that can be used during April, which Gov. Edgar has proclaimed as Natural Resources Stewardship Month," Manning said. "The activities will help students understand the connection between species and their habitat, and also their own role in the environment as one of Earth's native species."

Cheryl K. Riley, vice president of educational outreach for the National Wildlife Federation,

said the packets, titled "Home Is Where the Habitat Is," will be in educators' hands for National Wildlife Week, April 16-22.

Conservation Education chief Tom Clay said 23,500 packets, containing the curriculum guide and an accompanying full-color poster, have been sent to each K-8 public and private school registered with the Illinois State Board of Education and to youth groups by request.

One activity has students write a "classified ad" for mammal homes and habitats. Another lets them play a board game in which newly hatched sea turtles attempt to get to the sea. A third activity asks students to design a creature that is adapted to living on one of the planets.

Additional copies of the guide and poster are available at Department of Conservation offices in Springfield and Chicago, and through volunteer safety education specialists and state park interpreters. Copies also are available, through pick up only, at the Chicago Academy of Sciences.

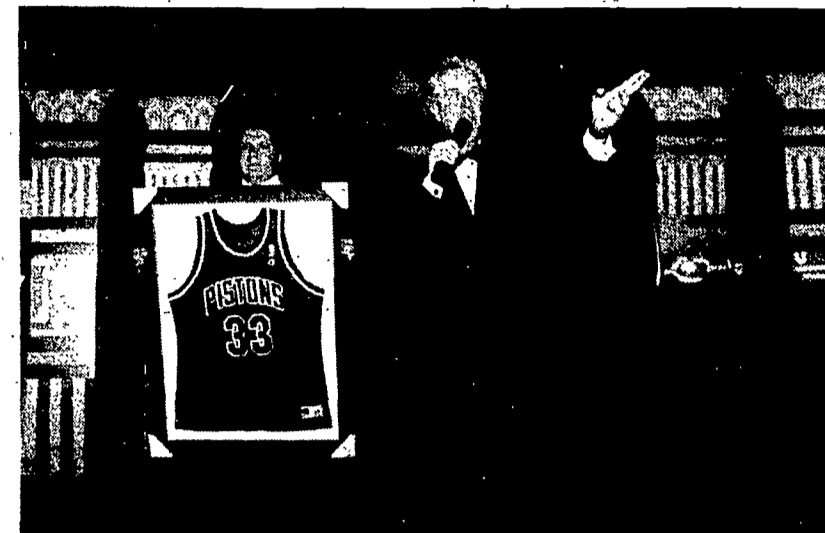

"Preparing for the Drug (Free) Years" teaches parents to identify the risk factors associated with teenage drug abuse and to practice skills which will promote family bonding and reduce those risks. The risk factors addressed in the program are positive parental attitudes toward drug use, family management problems, low degree of social bonding, friends who use drugs and early first use of drugs.

Workshop activities are based on the Social Development Model, a theory of human behavior that identifies the factors which promote social bonding and positive behavior. Research has shown that children who are bonded to their parents, school, non-drug-using peers and the community are less likely to be

come involved in negative behavior such as drug use that may threaten those bonds.

Parents will learn to increase their children's opportunities for involvement in the family, to teach key skills needed in adolescence and to provide rewards for positive behavior as well as appropriate consequences for undesired behavior.

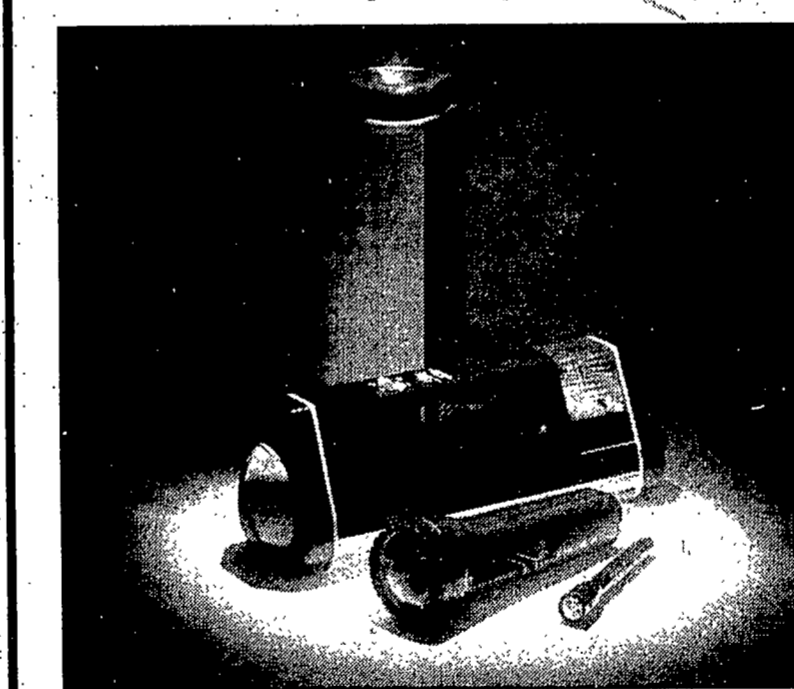

## Very popular kitchen upgrades costing homeowners \$5,000 to \$50,000

Spring is here, and along with the sprouting of this year's flowers will be the sprouting up of all those repair and remodeling vans in the driveways of homes throughout the city and suburbs.

So what are all those spring and summertime workmen up to? George Sifnotis and Tim Noetzel of the Cabinet Connection, 8321 W. Golf Rd. in the Four Flags Shopping Center, said that many people are updating their kitchens. Kitchens are the most heavily used rooms, and according to Sifnotis, the kitchen will often make or break the sale of a home.

"A nice kitchen will make up for a lot of other home deficiencies," he said, and he gave an example of a Glenview homeowner who had a real problem selling his home recently, even though he lowered the price several times. After putting \$8,000 into a new kitchen, he got the original asking price with no difficulty.

three ovens -- a microwave, an oven below a cooktop, and another oven placed elsewhere in the kitchen. Many homeowners are choosing gas cooktops above electric ovens, "for the best of both worlds," Noetzel noted. The space-saver microwave, built in over the range with its own light and vent, is another popular choice.

The environmentally correct kitchen will now have a trash compactor, an appliance that is becoming increasingly important as local governments are talking about imposing a surcharge for more than one can of garbage. "A compactor will put two cans in one," Sifnotis said.

The really hot environmental addition to the kitchen is the recycling center, a cabinet that houses two pull-out waste bins, the front one for regular garbage, the rear bin for recyclables.

Lighting in the kitchen is very important. "People want a lot of light," Sifnotis said. Many remodelers are using recessed canister lights, but track lighting is still popular. The trend is away from energy consuming halogen lighting and back to energy-conserving fluorescent lighting. Under-cabinet lights that concentrate more light on work surfaces are a must in the modern kitchen.

Indirect lighting is also being used to illuminate the tops of cabinets, where soffits used to be. Soffits, the walled in areas between cabinet tops and ceilings, are disappearing in remodeled cabinets. Cabinet hardware can really dress up the look of a kitchen. Solid brass knobs and pulls are most popular now. The Southwest style model features silver-plated cabinet accessories. Noetzel said that many decorative moldings and trims can be added to cabinets and to fill in spaces between cabinets that add lots of nice touches very inexpensively.

Appliances tend to be white or black. Black is in especially for dishwashers, stoves and cooktops. Sifnotis and Noetzel both say they're not seeing as much demand this year. Stainless steel is increasing in popularity, however.

Convection cooking, which circulates air in both microwave and traditional ovens is the new trend. Most new kitchens have

on his own house and said, "There's got to be a better way."

"We give better service, better planning and better information to the customer. So many customers don't realize the planning involved even with a bathroom," Sifnotis said. They "walk through" the planning stage with the customer and try to keep problems and questions after-the-fact to a minimum.

Cabinet Connection, 966-4611, is open seven days a week, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday until 9 p.m. No appointment is necessary.

Wood floors are very hot right now. Oaks and maples can be

sealed with oil-based sealers that produce a dance hall shine along with commercial grade durability, Sifnotis said. Young families are choosing plank or tongue-and-groove wooden floors because they are easier to clean up. Ceramic tile, usually 12" x 12", is still very popular.

So what is more important in kitchen remodeling, function or fashion? Noetzel said that most people are more interested in the look of their new kitchen, "but basic functionality is still there." A lot depends upon the space available. Smaller kitchens call for more functional designing, he said.

Size also plays a big role in the cost of kitchen remodeling. Cabinet Connections, in business for four years, has remodeled kitchens for as little as \$5,000 or as much as \$50,000. Sifnotis and Noetzel say they remodel about 35 kitchens a year, mostly in Glenview, Northbrook, Deerfield and Wilmette. Business is good and growing, they said, and they are getting many jobs through referrals.

"We offer all the products that high-end kitchen shops do at lower prices," said Noetzel. For the do-it-yourself remodeler, they offer individual products. "It isn't required that we do the installation," Sifnotis added.

But when they do the entire job, the two 30-something men with marketing and planning backgrounds emphasize service and planning. Noetzel said he went into the business because he had some remodeling work done

Instead, decorative rails or trims are placed at cabinet tops and figurines or other decorative displays are placed above cabinets and illuminated to create a very open and elegant effect.

For counter tops, most remodelers are still choosing laminates, such as the Formica brand. However, granite and other solid surfaces are growing in popularity. Corian, made by DuPont, is best for durability, said Noetzel, but it is pricier than other counter top material.

Wood floors are very hot right now. Oaks and maples can be

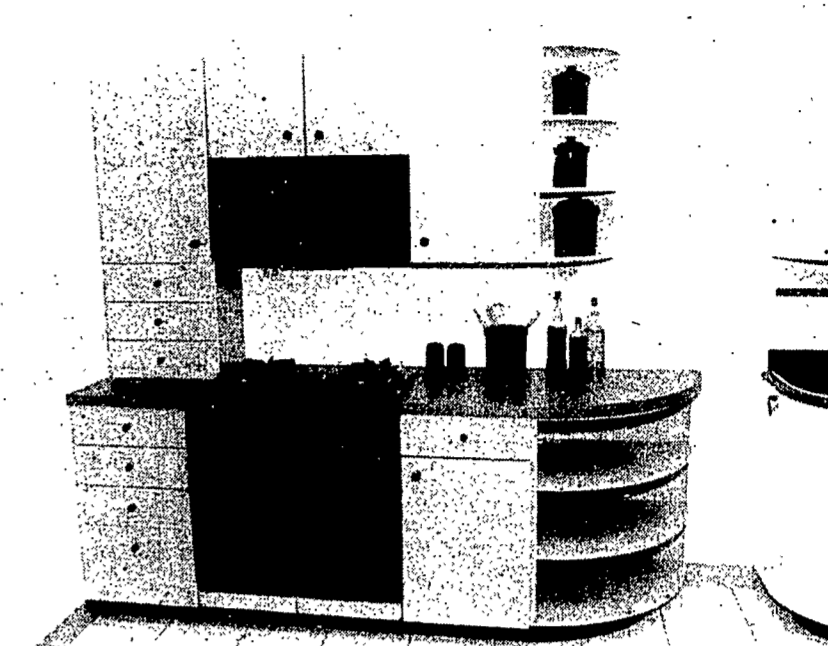

Black was used as an accent color in this kitchen, which features the space saving microwave-over-cooktop-over-oven arrangement.

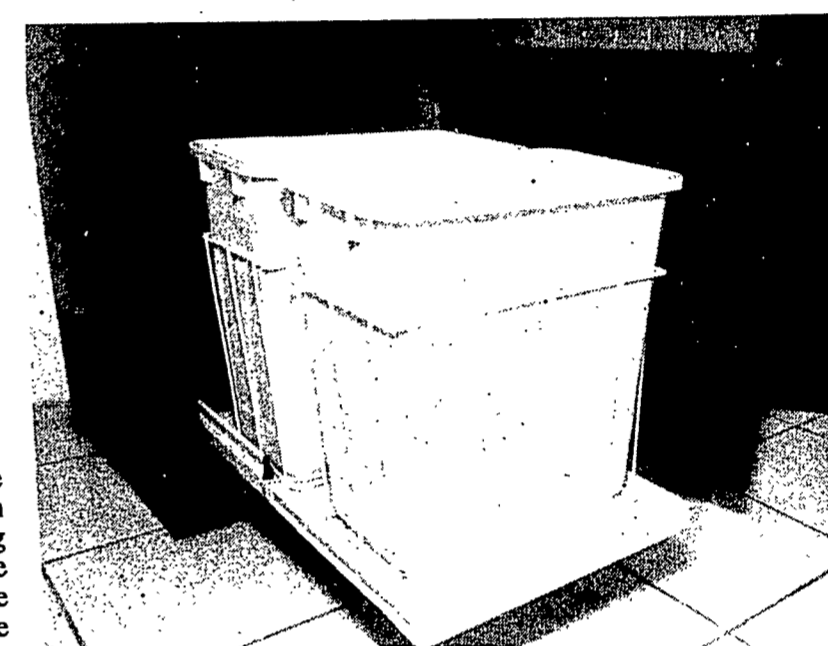

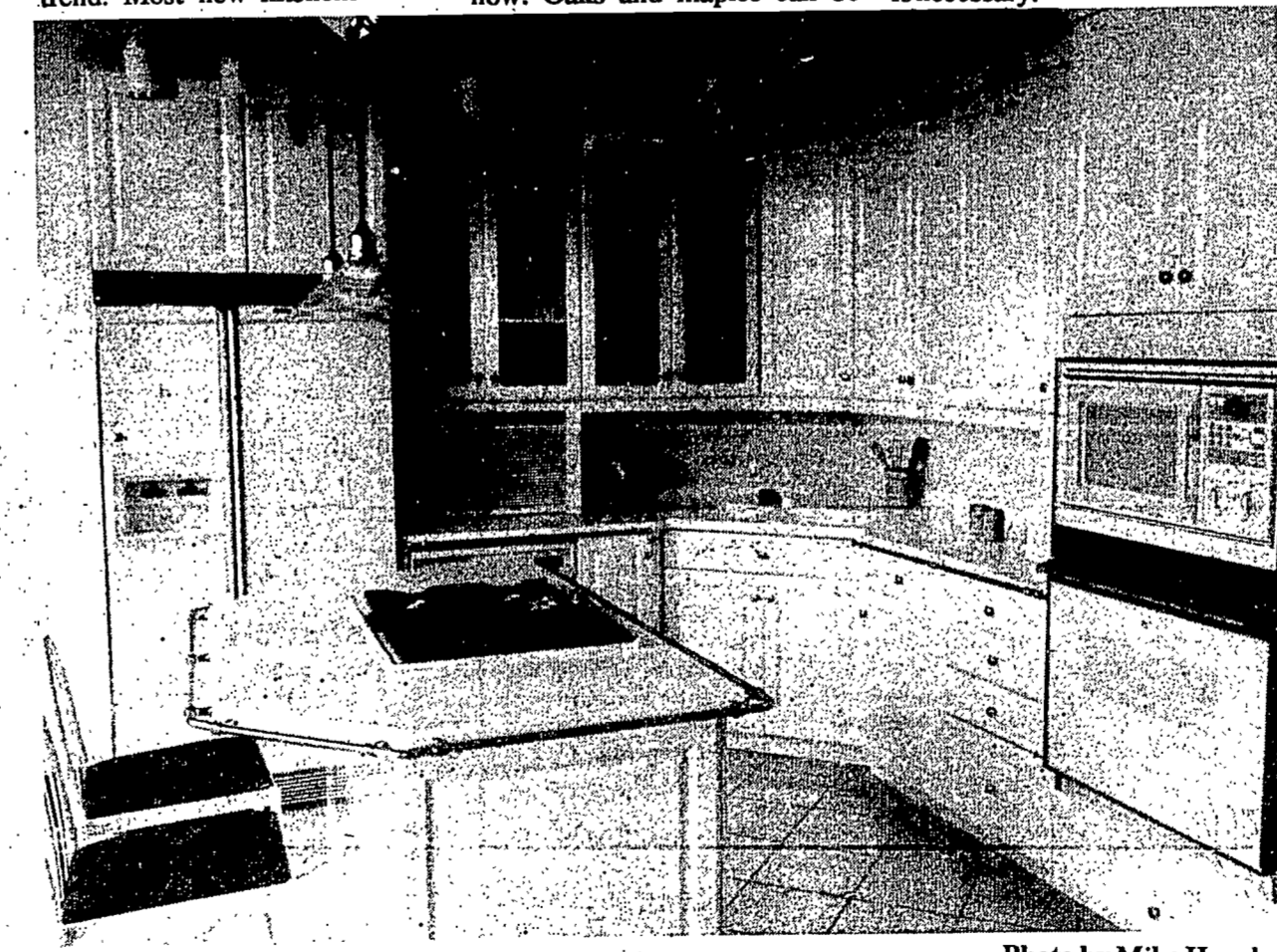

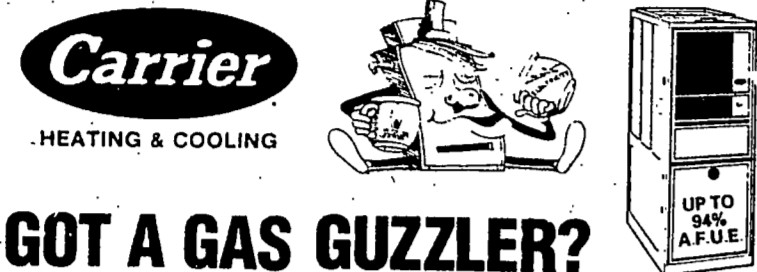

### Families play important role in children's surgery

Although they may not know it, parents and families of children undergoing anesthesia for surgery play an integral role in helping to make the anesthesia experience a positive one. Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists (CRNAs), who provide more than half of the anesthetics delivered to patients in the United States each year, recommend parents and families become more familiar with the anesthesia process for the emotional and physical benefit of their child.

CRNAs can be found in every setting in which anesthesia is delivered: traditional hospital surgical suites and obstetrical delivery rooms; the offices of dentists, podiatrists, ophthalmologists and plastic surgeons; ambulatory surgical centers; health maintenance organizations (HMOs); preferred provider organizations (PPOs); U.S. Military and Public Health Services and Veterans Administration medical facilities.

"From the pre-operative interview to the post-anesthesia care involved, families should be familiar with some very important anesthesia facts," said Mary V. DePaolis-Lutzo, CRNA, PhD, AANA president-elect. "Just as nurse anesthetists prepare to administer a child an anesthetic, so must a parent be well informed and familiar with the process."

According to Dr. Lutzo, the following are some of the important questions parents should ask the anesthesia provider before their child undergoes anesthesia for surgery:

- What type of anesthesia will be used? How will it be administered and monitored?
- What do you need to know concerning my child's medical history, such as previous surgeries, allergies, medication, etc.?
- Is it possible for me to remain in the operating room until he/she falls asleep?
- Is there anything I need to know to care for my child when he/she awakes after anesthesia?
- How will any painful side effects be managed?

"There have also been new technological advancements in the operating room making the surgical experience for children even less traumatic," said Christine S. Zambricki, CRNA, MS, AANA vice president.

The following are some of the advancements in the operating room geared toward children:

- "Band-aid" pulse oximeters which actually look like an adhesive bandage.
- Fruit-flavored and chocolate-flavored anesthesia masks.
- Cherry-flavored pre-medications.

Ms. Zambricki recommends the following suggestions for meeting the emotional needs of a child undergoing anesthesia:

- Visit the hospital beforehand and meet and talk with your child's anesthesia provider before the surgery, if possible. Even talking on the phone can allay fears.
- Bring a child's favorite toy or blanket to the hospital. Avoid toys with sharp edges or corners and those with small parts. Pacifiers for infants can be helpful.
- Tell your child the truth. "When you wake up your throat will be sore, but we will be able to give you one of your favorite cherry popicles."
- Don't tell the child more than he or she needs to know. Keep explanations simple and repeat them as needed. "The anesthetist will give you some medicine to take a nap. You will not feel any pain because of the medicine. After the doctor has fixed your... you will wake up and I will be waiting for you."

### Microwave Safety Tips from ComEd

More than any other kitchen appliance, the microwave has revolutionized the world of cooking. In a fraction of the time required of a conventional oven, a creative chef can produce terrific meals. Microwaves are not only easy, but very energy efficient, too. But, microwave ovens can be home safety hazards if basic guidelines for their operation are not followed.

A common myth suggests that radiation leakage from microwaves poses the greatest danger. If the door hinges and seal on your microwave are tight, leakage should not be a problem. In fact, the American Council on Science and Health says that electrical shock is the most frequent danger. To prevent this kind of accident from occurring, check the oven's electrical cord and plug regularly for any signs of wear or damage. The microwave should be properly installed and plugged into an outlet that is polarized and grounded. Also, check to make sure the circuit is rated for at least 15 amperes of current.

Burns resulting from cooking in a microwave oven can take you by surprise because a microwave oven heats the food without heating the dish. Before removing a dish from the microwave, open the door and allow the dish to stand for a minute or two. Always use hot pads to remove a dish from the microwave. Many recipes require the use of plastic wrap to cover the food.

Serious vapor burns can result from the hot moisture retained in the dish. Before removing a completed dish from the oven, use a lengthy kitchen utensil, such as a skewer, to puncture the covering. This will allow the steam to escape before you actually handle the dish. Some microwaves do not heat food evenly, creating the danger of "hot spots" which can burn you when you eat. Before eating be sure to stir and mix the food thoroughly.

A microwave oven can make your life much easier by reducing the time spent in the kitchen. And your family can enjoy delicious, economical meals with little or no effort.

## DOJ recommends Ameritech entry into long-distance

The U. S. Justice Department (DOJ) has recommended a plan for Ameritech's entry into long distance, paving the way to competitive prices, higher quality and more choices for customers. The DOJ proposed a trial that would be open to more than 4 million homes and businesses in and around Chicago and Grand Rapids, Michigan. Ameritech is the first of the regional Bell companies to get a green light from the DOJ on long-distance, which was forbidden by a 1982 consent decree.

Recognizing progress in opening local telephone service to competition in Illinois and Michigan, the DOJ recommended a plan for Ameritech's trial entry into long distance to U.S. District Court Judge Harold Greene. Further approvals from the Court, DOJ, FCC, and States of Illinois and Michigan are required to make the plan a reality. The plan ensures active competition in local and long-distance services and equal treatment of all competitors.

"This action puts customers in the driver's seat by dismantling a major roadblock to competition," said Richard C. Notebaert, Ameritech chairman and chief executive officer. "Long-distance prices have been rising for the past three years because there's not enough competition. The best deal for customers is more competition, and this plan will deliver."

"We're optimistic that we will receive approval of our plan and be able to offer customers a new and better choice early in 1996," Notebaert added. "Ameritech looks forward to competing with

other companies to offer customers the best value in full-service communications. We're confident that we will compete successfully and capitalize on this new opportunity to speed our growth."

Ameritech would be authorized to offer all types of long-distance services to consumers and business in a DOJ-monitored trial. The company said it would initiate long distance service, starting in the Chicago area and Grand Rapids, soon after receiving all government approvals. The initial trial area includes the Chicago area codes of 312 and 708, part of 815, the future 630 area code, and the Grand Rapids area code, 616. Customers in Illinois and Michigan currently spend about \$5-6 billion a year on long-distance services.

9, according to Sprint/Centel public relations administrator Claude Cliborne. "It's a gradual process," he said. "Some customers had their service restored as early as the wee hours of Friday morning," he added.

To repair the cable, crews first had to excavate an area large enough to work in, Cliborne explained. On one side of the severed cable were the lines from the central office. In order to identify which lines went to which customers, crews had to go to the actual premises and, using special equipment, send out a tone on the customer's line so that it could be identified. (Premises in this case could mean the telephone pole; repairpersons did not have to enter each home, Cliborne said.)

The lines had to be identified, spliced and then tested again, Cliborne said. "It's a labor-intensive process, and we were working around the clock to get customers back in service as quickly as possible," he said. "At any given time, there were a dozen people in the trenches, splicing and going to the premises," he said. "It's unfortunate. It shouldn't happen, but it does." Cliborne said of the incidence of cable cutting: "Anyone planning to do any kind of excavation should first contact JULIE, the Joint Utilities Locating Information for Excavators service at (800)892-0123.

JULIE is a state agency in existence for the sole purpose of locating underground cables of the gas, phone and power companies for customers planning to excavate on their property, Cliborne said.
