The firm also received approval for a bowling alley to be erected on the south side of Jericho Tpke. about 422 feet east of S. Oyster Bay Rd., Syosset.

A new gas station will be built at the southeast corner of Broadway and Hazel St., Hicksville, by the Caristo Construction Corp. of 26 Court St., Brooklyn, following granting of a variance by the Board Thursday.

ISLAND TREES — The Civic Assoc. wants School District 26 to remain a common school district for the present, it was decided at a meeting held Monday night at the Five Corners Restaurant, Bethpage.

It was announced that a hearing on the fire district was held on Aug. 4 in the Queens County Supreme Court. Residents of Island Trees wish to be incorporated in the Bethpage Fire District and not in the Levittown district which is served by the Wantagh Fire District. Judge Nicholas M. Pette reserved decision.

The next meeting of the Civic Assoc. will be held on Monday, Aug. 21, at the Melody Bar in the Millshire Park Shopping Center at 8:30 P. M.

1,847 Ready to Vote Next Wednesday Night

HICKSVILLE—The Board of Education is attempting to put into action the most urgent recommendations of the Columbia Report by asking voter approval next Wednesday night, Aug. 16, on the question of buying three school sites at a cost of \$148,000, and expanding East St. grade school at a cost of \$400,000. Voting takes place at the high school on Jerusalem Ave. between 8 and 12 p. m.

There are 1,847 voters qualified to cast their ballots, including 282 more who registered last Saturday afternoon. Most of the new registrants are from the Levitt home section of the district.

The Columbia Report states, "the first step in a long-term

school building program calls for the acquisition of sites and this should be done at an early date when land is still available in adequate acreage at strategic locations. . . . It is recommended that immediate steps be taken to secure at least three associated with the Levitt development, plus a fourth site in the vicinity of Lee Ave. There is strong reason to believe that permanent elementary schools should be constructed at each of these locations within the next two years."

The sites on the ballot Aug. 16 are three plots to be bought from Levitt & Sons. All are in Hicksville in the midst of newly constructed Levitt 1950 Ranch (Continued on Page 4)

School Board Gives Facts, Figures On Cost of Three Sites, East St. Plans

HICKSVILLE—Facts about the four propositions to be voted upon next Wednesday night, Aug. 16, by qualified voters of the district were made public yesterday by the Board of Education.

A breakdown on the cost of the three sites for schools in the Levitt area of Hicksville District shows:

SOUTH HICKSVILLE SCHOOL site (prop. no. 4) consists of 9.83 acres. Land cost Levitt & Sons \$23,092.98. School district share of improvements, sidewalks, curbing, pavement of roads, water mains) is \$5,808.66, making a total of \$28,901.64. The proposal calls for a bond issue of \$30,000, the difference being "costs incidental to the purchase."

DUTCH LANE SCHOOL site (prop. no. 3) consists of 18.77 acres. Land cost Levitt \$44,120.07. district share of improvements \$9,194.21, making total \$53,314.28. Bond issue \$55,000.

OLD COUNTRY RD. SCHOOL site (prop. no. 2) consists of 18.85 acres. Land cost Levitt \$44,298.98. district share of improvements \$16,983.41, making total \$61,282.39. Bond issue \$63,000.

(Two of these sites are shown on the map on Page 15.)

"The improvement costs are computed on a rate basis determined by the Nassau County Planning Commission at the time of its approval of the Levitt subdivision," Michael Sullivan, attorney for the school district, points out.

Board Names Bean, 2 School Doctors

HICKSVILLE—Elery Bean of W. Marie St. has been appointed director of adult education for the school year 1950-51, the Board of Education announced yesterday. Bean directed the highly successful program held last fall and winter.

The Board also announced the appointment of school physicians for the year. They are Dr. Alwyn Rand and Dr. William Susmer, chosen from among the applicants for the positions.

Plans for East St.

A two-story classroom wing is proposed for each end of the present East St. Elementary School building. Prop. no. 1 calls for expenditure of \$400,000 for the job.

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JUST GOT TO WAIT:

Police Sees No Relief In RR Blockade Limit

MINEOLA—It is against the Laws of New York State to block a highway crossing with a train for more than five minutes, but that portion of the Penal Law is not expected to help relieve the blockading of Hicksville crossings by Long Island Rail Road trains.

The Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc. asked the police if some relief can be obtained from the fact that LIRR trains block Jerusalem Ave. and Broadway crossings for periods of 15 minutes or more while taking on passengers and mail. Deputy Chief Inspector Louis W. Schneider of the County Police Dept. replied to the Civics: "To my knowledge there is no enforcement of this section (of the law) as the courts have held that an engineer who obstructs a crossing in the reasonable conduct of his train is guilty of no violation of this statute. Furthermore, it might be a matter of necessity on the part of the engineer to stop where he does."

The Civics have also appealed to the Public Service Commission in an effort to have long trains stop west of the crossing to allow free movement of such life-saving vehicles as ambulances, fire trucks and physicians' autos.

County Confirms \$4 Million Gain

MINEOLA.—Official assessment figures for mid-Island school districts disclosed this week by the County Assessment Dept. confirmed the exclusive advance report published in the Herald some months ago that Hicksville's valuation would exceed \$20,000,000. Hicksville District increased from \$16,194,155 to \$20,009,450. Other increases in local districts were: Bethpage 21 from \$12,038,820 to \$12,693,210; Plainview (19) from \$2,161,165 to \$2,677,035; Jericho portion in the Town of Oyster Bay from \$13,184,155 to \$13,421,250; Jericho part in Town of North Hempstead gained from \$1,687,415 to \$1,694,140.

Houses. Two of them are marked on the map published on page 15 of this issue. The third site (South Hicksville School) is approximately midway between Newbridge Rd. and Jerusalem Ave., about a quarter-mile north of the Hicksville-Levittown boundary at Spindle Rd.

The 10-acre Lee Ave. school site purchase was approved by voters on June 21. An architect is now preparing plans for the 20-room school there.

A growing sentiment against purchase of the three Levitt properties has been detected within the district, although it is impossible to gauge such feeling accurately. Some opposed resent the fact that the land must be bought from Levitt & Sons, who have, it is charged, contributed largely to the need for more schools by erecting approximately 2,800 houses in Hicksville District.

On the other hand, many of the residents of these new Levitt houses in Hicksville have not been living here long enough to qualify as voters on the question although their children will need the facilities in question.

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COLUMBIA REPORT SUGGESTS:

Hicksville May Build Inexpensive Type School Plainview Plans

The Columbia Report contains a suggestion for the type of solution to the local school problem now contemplated by Plainview, where an inexpensive cinder block, slab base building is planned at a cost of \$190,000.

The Columbia Report was made for the Hicksville School District at a cost of \$5,000 as a "Survey of the Building Requirements" of the District. It was prepared by the Institute of Field Studies, Teachers College, Columbia University. This is the 8th installment published by the Herald, based upon the 63-page report.

Kindergarten to 3rd Grade

"Consideration may be given," the Report states, "to the suggestion that during the peak period some classroom space of a temporary nature may be constructed. A number of communities are considering the advisability of building small temporary structures, consisting of from three to six classrooms to serve as primary units caring for children in the kindergarten and grades 1 to 3.

"Such small units require no other special facilities such as a multi-purpose room, and therefore are relatively inexpensive when compared with standard permanent school buildings. An advantage of this type of structure is that it may be placed at strategic points in residential areas some distance from other established schools, within easy travel distance for the smaller primary children who attend.

"This primary school plan is not offered as a definite recommendation at this time; it is merely suggested as a possibility."

Expect 800 More Pupils

Last September (1949) the total school enrollment was 1210 with 679 in elementary school. For the start of the term next month the estimate is about 800 more pupils (total 1,979) with 1,358 in elementary school. This is expected to skyrocket, starting next term (Sept. 1951) to a total of 3,185 pupils with 2,446 in elementary school.

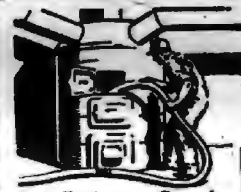
The accompanying table from the Columbia Report forecasts future enrollments.

With these figures, the Report said that "Hicksville should not attempt to overbuild school facilities to care for a peak enrollment when temporary adaptations and adjustments may suffice to bridge the worse period."

With this in mind, the Report suggests (1) increasing the size of classes from 25 to 35 pupils, doing or double sessions for a few years; (2) continue to use Nicholas St. School for a short period of years although it probably should be abandoned, and (3) erect temporary schools as

outlined at the beginning of this installment.

Regarding class sizes, the Columbia experts find "while educational authorities in general would agree that a small class size of 25 is desirable, it may be necessary in Hicksville to have classes of 35 during the peak period, except for the kindergarten, which preferably ought to be limited to 20 pupils, with 25 a maximum figure. Such a suggestion (continued on page 15)



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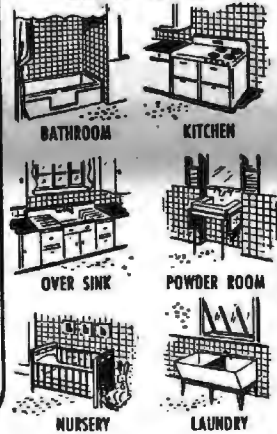

OUR OPINION:

Save Some Green Space for Future

HICKSVILLE HAS TODAY about 13,000 residents. The Columbia Report authoritatively shows that the population will reach 22,000 by 1951 and it can be expected to exceed 35,000 in the next 10 years or less.

Our population density was 1,825 persons per square mile in January of this year. We are not thickly built up as yet when we consider Floral Park has 7,700 persons per square mile. Mineola 6,800, Hempstead 5,800, Baldwin 5,180. But Columbia experts predict we will hit 5,500 persons per square mile over a period of years.

Already the school authorities are finding it difficult to locate tracts of land suitable in size for new buildings. If we continue to wait, there will be no room left for open spaces of green grass and shade trees. What we need is parks, a lot of small ones.

The suggestion has been made more than once to the Town Board that the grounds around the Hicksville Courthouse be improved as a small park. All that would be necessary is the construction of a paved walk around the edge of the grounds and placement of a few benches. The grounds belong to the people of the Township. The cost would be small.

Further, we would like to see the old jail cell in the rear of the courthouse, which has not held a prisoner for more than 10

years, converted into a public rest room. There are no such public facilities anywhere in Hicksville except those provided by auto service stations.

Why are all facilities for public recreation concentrated on the north and south shores of the Township of Oyster Bay?

We admit the existence of the fine Nassau County Park at Westbury and the LI State Park at Bethpage. But there is an urgent need for some park space right here within evening strolling distance.

Is something going to be done? We think not, because there is a complete lack of foresight and planning for more comfortable and attractive living in our community of tomorrow.

Strangely enough, Hicksville in days gone by did have many fine picnic groves. They were all privately owned, associated with hotels and saloons, and in the passage of time were made the site of stores and homes.

We have long envied Plainview for its wonderful grove of trees next to Mannetto Hills School, where many organizations are privileged to hold outings during the summer. Hicksville Republican Club members and friends will be there with a public picnic this Saturday. The Plainview Firemen will hold a corn festival (um um) there on Aug. 20.

We regret to read that even this wonderful grove may soon be gone. It is planned to cut down some of the trees to make room for the proposed temporary addition to the Plainview School.

A new resident told us this week he helped persuade his missus on settling in Hicksville because there were local parks. After they had moved in, the little woman piped up "Okay, wise guy, show me the park."

Was his face red? And won't our collective faces be redder when future generations ask, "Where are the parks?"

Okay, Blow Your Top

Training Safe Drivers

STUDENTS at Hicksville High School, commencing with the inaugural summer sessions now in progress, are getting training in automobile driving. Last week the Herald published a picture of the car made possible by McPherson Motor Sales, local Chevrolet dealer.

Recently Eugene J. Fanning, Massachusetts law enforcement officer, told a safety council convention in New York that driving courses in high schools were the best way of producing safe drivers. He added that available data indicates that motorists who took driver training courses have 40 to 50 per cent fewer accidents and traffic violations than other drivers.

Miss Mabel R. Farley, high school principal, deserves special credit for her continuous efforts to obtain the driving training program in Hicksville Schools.

A worthy contribution to safer driving on our highways has been made by all responsible for the establishment of this local program.

Shall We Incorporate?

Use of Beaches

The HERALD, in cooperation with the Information Division of the Committee for the Incorporation of Hicksville will publish this department regularly in an effort to bring its readers a full discussion of this question. The HERALD invites comments and questions on this subject in writing.—Editor.

Ques.—If Hicksville were incorporated, would local people have to pay a town tax? Would we get the use of the town beaches?

Ans.—There is no tax on local real estate for the general administration of the Town of Oyster Bay. However, if there were such a tax levied and Hicksville were incorporated, we would have to pay this tax. There is a town highway tax, but if Hicksville incorporated and local streets became village streets, we would no longer pay the town highway tax.

As for beaches, residents of incorporated villages enjoy the use of town beaches just as we do.

As a matter of fact, residents of incorporated villages vote for township officials and some are residents of incorporated areas. For example, Frank G. Scholl, the Town Tax Receiver, is a resident of Farmingdale and the former mayor of that village.

Ques.—Wouldn't the addition of local officials such as Mayor, trustees, planning board, etc., add to the cost of government?

Ans.—Such officials serve largely on a part-time basis. Floral Park pays its mayor \$1200 a year, trustees \$600 each, police justice \$1800; Farmingdale, mayor \$600, trustees \$300, police justice \$600; Westbury, mayor \$600, trustees \$300, police justice \$1200; Garden City, mayor and trustees serve without pay, police justice gets \$1 a year. Of these four villages, selected at random, volunteers serve without pay on the planning board and zoning board. Westbury pays its members of each board \$10 per meeting.

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Need for Taxi Controls

THE NEED FOR A LOCAL ordinance or law to regulate the operation of taxi service in Hicksville and vicinity is so serious that even the reputable taxi concerns are pleading for it.

Almost a year ago the Citizens' Advisory Committee on Parking, headed by Rev. Howard Rogers, recommended that controls be established to at least regulate the parking of taxicabs near the Hicksville depot. The Town Board accepted the report, but nothing has been heard since.

About four months ago the Hicksville Civic Assoc. tried, when several members complained repeatedly about the lack of regulation, the absence of established rates, etc. A letter went to the Town Board, but it failed to get action.

It is known the County Transit Commission has been studying taxi operation and may soon come up with some kind of blanket county-wide controls. However, the situation which causes the most concern is that relating to the limited cab spaces at the Hicksville RR Station. With a little serious effort it could be solved.

Meanwhile, cab operators battle for the few stands available, and the stories we hear about smashed fenders, freeze outs, air out of tires, etc., causes us to wonder . . . Does anyone in authority really care about the people in Hicksville and vicinity?

What's Your Problem?

Ques.—What is the circulation of the Herald?

Mon is made with reluctance, since it represents a backward step educationally, but at least is a sounder proposal than placing the schools on a half-day or a double-session basis if adequate building space is not available to care for the pupils in reasonable size classes. (The secondary schools may have to go on a double session for a few years, in any event). After the peak enrollment has passed, however, an attempt should be made to again instruct the pupils in the smaller class groups.

"A second suggestion that may relieve the Hicksville schools to some extent during the peak enrollment period," the Columbia Report continues, "calls for the continued use of the Nicholai school building for a short term of years. Under normal circumstances, it would be desirable to abandon that wooden structure now, but the local school plant needs will be so acute over the next decade (10 years) that it seems wiser to postpone the date for its abandonment until the school peak load has passed."

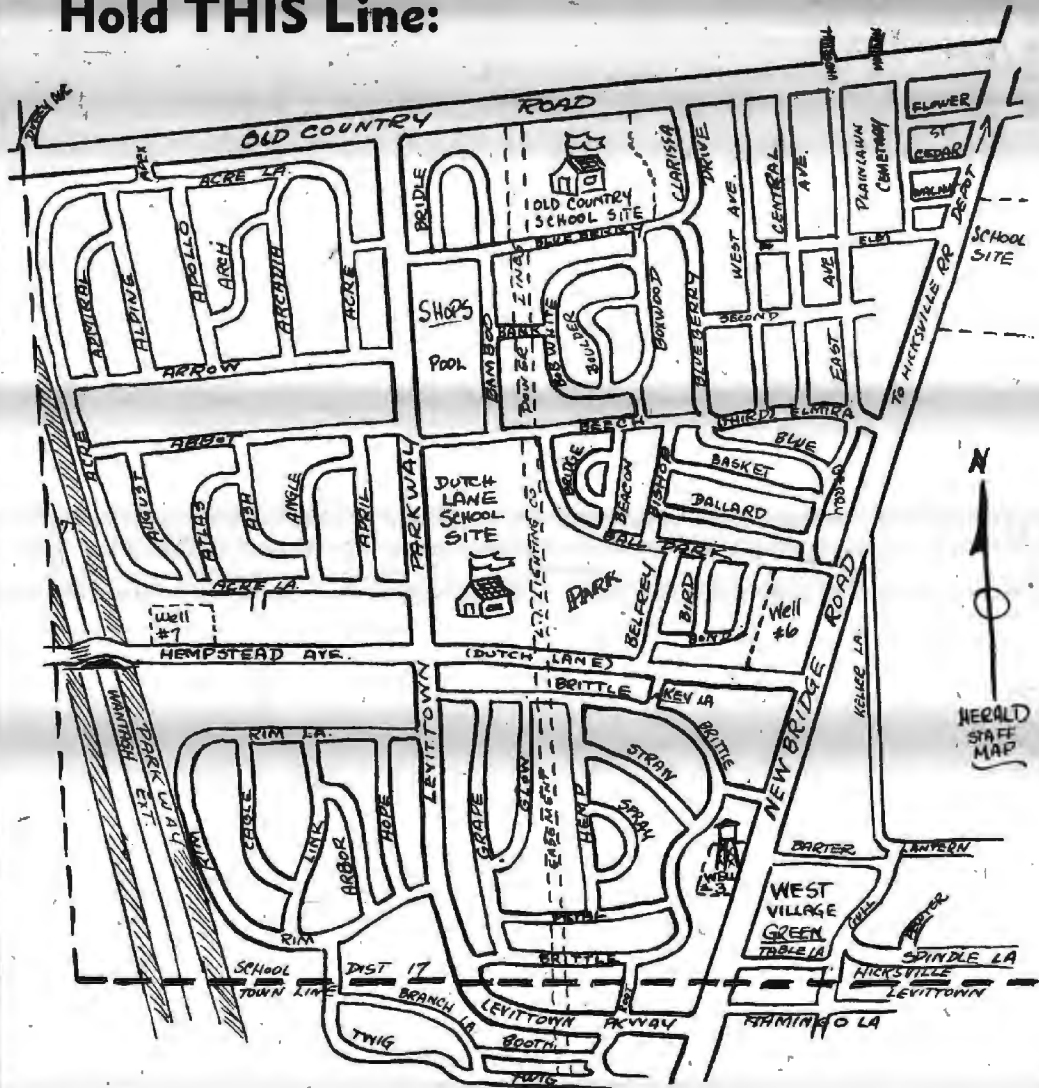

Y., duly adopted by said Board and entered in full upon its minutes on the 1st day of August, 1950, following a public hearing duly held thereon after advertisement according to law, the following Ordinance was duly enacted:

PLUMBING CODE OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY
Adopted by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, after a hearing on due notice according to law on the 18th day of April, 1950, pursuant to Subdivision 2 of Section 130, of the Town Law and posted and published as prescribed by Law.

PLUMBING CODE
TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, NASSAU COUNTY, N. Y.
Sec. 1. This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as "The Plumbing Code of the Town of Oyster Bay."

ARTICLE I
Definitions
Sec. 100. **Plumbing:** Plumbing shall be deemed to mean the profession, art or trade of, and all work done and all materials used in and for:

a. Introducing, maintaining and extending a supply of water through a pipe or pipes, or any appurtenances thereof, in a building, premises or establishment.
b. Installing, connecting or repairing any system of drainage whereby foul waste, cooling water, rain or surplus water, gas, odor, vapor or fluid is discharged or proposed to be discharged through a pipe or pipes from any building, lot, premises or establishment into any main public or private sewer, drain, pit, box, filter bed, leaching well, septic tank, or other receptacle or into any natural or artificial body of water, or water course, upon private or public property.
c. Ventilating any building sewer or fixture, or appurtenance connected therewith.
d. Connecting any building, lot, premises or establishment with any service pipe, building sewer, water pipe, main, public or private sewer, or underground structure; performing all classes of work generally done by plumbers.

Sec. 101. **Plumbing System:** The plumbing system of a building includes the hot and cold water supply, distributing pipes, hot water storage tanks and connections thereof, the fixtures and fixture traps; the soil, waste and vent pipes; the house drain and house sewer; the storm water drainage with their devices, appurtenances, and connections all within or adjacent to the building.

Sec. 102. **Private Sewer:** A private sewer means main sewers that are not constructed by and under the supervision of the Town.
Sec. 103. **House Sewer:** A house sewer means that part of the main drain or sewer extending from a point four (4) feet outside of the outer front wall of the building, vault or area to its connection with a public sewer, private sewer or cesspool and septic tanks.

b. Size. The size of the house sewer shall be not less than that of the house drain and in no case less than four (4) inches.

Sec. 104. **House Drain:** A house drain means that part of the main horizontal drain and its branches inside of the walls of a building, vault or area and extending to and connecting with the house sewer.

Sec. 105. **Soil Line:** A soil line means any vertical line of pipe having outlets above the floor of a first story for water closet connections.

Sec. 106. **Waste Line:** A waste line means any vertical line of pipe having outlets above the first floor for fixtures other than water closets.

Sec. 107. **Vent Pipe:** A vent pipe means any special pipe provided to ventilate a system of piping and to prevent trap siphonage and back pressure.

Sec. 108. **Master Plumber:** The term "Master Plumber" as used in this section means a person engaged by contract or otherwise in any other capacity than an employee to a duly licensed master plumber, in the work of installing, setting up or putting together any plumbing fixtures, pipes or appurtenances of any kind, which are connected or are to be connected with the sewerage system of a building or in the work of connecting such plumbing fixtures, pipes or appurtenances with a sewerage system.

ARTICLE II

General Provisions
Sec. 200. **Interpretation:** Except where the context clearly requires a literal interpretation of the provisions of the plumbing code, which is hereby declared to be remedial, it shall be construed liberally to secure the beneficial interests and purposes thereof to wit: public safety, health and welfare and safety to life and property.

b. The provisions of ordinances hereinbefore enacted that are in conflict with the requirements of this Plumbing Code, shall, unless otherwise specifically stated herein, be deemed to be repealed.

c. No new plumbing or drainage work, nor extension of, or alteration to existing plumbing or drainage installations shall be undertaken or performed hereafter except in conformance with the provisions of the Plumbing Code.

Sec. 201. **Enforcement:** a. It shall be the duty of the Chief Building Inspector and he is hereby given the power and authority to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.

Sec. 202. **Inspector of Plumbing:** The Inspector of Plumbing shall be appointed by the Town Board, to serve at its pleasure, and shall be an assistant to the Chief Building Inspector.

Sec. 203. **Applications and Inspections:** The Plumbing Inspector shall examine applications for permits and if same are found to comply with the provisions of the Plumbing Code, a permit for the work specified shall be issued. He shall also examine all plumbing work as the same is being installed or performed to see that it complies with the provisions of the Plumbing Code and the conditions of the permit.

Sec. 204. **Violations:** Whenever the Plumbing Inspector finds, upon examination, that a violation of a provision of the Plumbing Code or any unsafe or unhealthful condition exists, he shall endeavor to compel an immediate cessation of the condition. Failing in this, unhealthful or in violation of said code and deliver a copy of such report to the owner, agent or other person in charge of or in control of the premises and report such violation to the Chief Building Inspector who shall enforce the provisions of said code by appropriate remedies as provided by law.

Sec. 205. **Right of Entry:** In the discharge of his duties, the Plumbing Inspector shall have authority to enter any premises, building or structure.

Sec. 206. **Records:** He shall keep a record of applications filed, permits issued, certificates issued, reports, notices and orders issued.

Sec. 207. **Reports:** The Chief Building Inspector shall make a monthly report of fees collected to the Town Board.

ARTICLE III

Plumbers' Examining Board
Sec. 300. **Membership:** There shall be a board called the Plumbers' Examining Board, which shall consist of three (3) members appointed by the Town Board, who shall hold office at the pleasure of the Town Board. The members shall receive such compensation as the Town Board may fix.

Sec. 301. **Members of said board shall be master plumbers who**

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each have had not less than ten (10) years practical experience in the plumbing trade.

Sec. 302. **Meetings:** The Board shall meet at the call of the Chairman. Notice of meetings of the Board shall be given by mailing notice of the time and place of meeting, addressed to each member at his last known post-office address, at least twenty-four hours before the time of such meeting.

Sec. 303. **Regulations:** The Board shall make rules and regulations for the conduct of its business as an examining board.

ARTICLE IV

Master Plumbers
Sec. 400. **Qualifications of Plumbers:** No person shall engage in the business of plumbing within the Town of Oyster Bay until he shall obtain a license from the Examining Board of Plumbers.

Sec. 401. **Application for License:** a. Any person desiring a master plumber's license shall make application in writing to the Plumbers' Examining Board, which board shall arrange for an examination of such applicant; except where the applicant is, at the time of making the application, a duly licensed master or employing plumber in any other municipality in the State of New York, he shall submit a certified or photostatic copy of a certificate of competency or license issued by the Examining Board of Plumbers of such municipality. If he shall maintain his principal place of business in such municipality, examination will be waived, provided such municipality has signified in writing its willingness to reciprocate in like manner with the Examining Board of Plumbers of the Town of Oyster Bay. The fee, however, in such cases, shall be the same as for those requiring examination by the Examining Board of Plumbers. Such applicant shall receive a card of registration only. No certificate of competency shall be issued to any applicant unless he has been examined by the Examining Board of Plumbers of the Town of Oyster Bay.

b. A partnership or corporation may establish, engage in, or carry on the business of plumbing under a master plumber's license granted in accordance with the provisions of this section to a master plumber who is employed in such business as supervising or directing master plumber and who will be responsible for the carrying on of said business in accordance with the provisions of the laws, ordinances and regulations of the State, County and Town applicable to said business.

c. After such examination, said Board shall endorse on said application their approval or disapproval of the application, and if approved, shall grant a license to said applicant.

d. A fee of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) shall be paid at the time of making the application, the sum of Forty Dollars (\$40.00) of which fee shall be returned to the applicant if the license is not granted.

e. Every license shall expire on the 31st day of December of the year of its issuance, but may be renewed, without examination, for each succeeding year on the payment of Five Dollars (\$5.00).

Sec. 402. **Notice of Changes:** Whenever a licensed master plumber shall retire from business or remove his place of business from the place named in his application for license, the Building Department shall be notified of such retirement or removal and shall be given the address of the new place of business in case of such removal.

Sec. 403. **Revocation of License:** A license granted under the provisions of this section shall be in force until revoked by the Plumbers' Examining Board after notice to the licensee that it is proposed to revoke the license and a hearing in the matter at which the licensee shall have an opportunity to appear and be heard in relation to such revocation.

Sec. 404. **License Restricted to Individual:** No master plumber shall directly or indirectly allow his license to be used in connection with work not actually done by him or under his supervision.

Sec. 405. **Bond:** Every master plumber shall file with the Plumbers' Examining Board before beginning operations under his license, and upon each renewal of said license, a surety company bond, approved by said Board, in the penal sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) indemnifying and saving harmless the Town of Oyster Bay and/or Town Superintendent of Highways of the Town of Oyster Bay and of and from all damages or claims for damage to a public sewer, water service mains or pipes, to a highway or the surface thereof, to public or private property or to any person, arising from unlawful or negligent acts or omissions of said master plumber, his agents or employees, or any one operating under the authority of his license, in making connections with a public sewer; in opening a public sewer; or in making an opening or excavation in a public highway, public square or public park or in maintaining, guarding, refilling or working in or about such opening or excavation or in maintaining or guarding objects or materials taken from such opening or excavation or used in connection therewith.

Said bond shall remain in full force and effect until the thirty-first day of December of the year of its issuance, unless sooner cancelled by the Plumbers' Examining Board and shall be and remain security for indemnity for damages as aforesaid, during the time it is in force.

ARTICLE V

Permits

Sec. 500. **Application for Permits:** a. When required, it shall not be lawful to install any new plumbing or drainage work in a building or structure, or to extend or alter any existing plumbing or drainage work, whether such work is to be connected with the sewer or not, without first filing with the Building Department an application in writing and obtaining a permit.

b. Form. Such applications shall be made by a licensed master plumber on forms furnished by the Building Department.

c. Plans. The Building Department may require such application to be accompanied by plans, when such are necessary for an intelligent understanding of the work applied for.

d. Amendments. No changes shall be made in the specifications or plans for plumbing or drainage work after a Permit has been issued, unless an amendment showing such changes has been made to the application and has been approved by the Plumbing Inspector.

e. Repairs. Repairs to existing plumbing and drainage or the replacement of existing fixtures with others may be made without filing an application and securing a permit; but such repairs shall not be construed to include new vertical or horizontal soil, waste or vent pipes, or connecting additional fixtures to existing soil or waste pipes, or main house drains.

Sec. 501. **Action on Application:** a. Every application shall be examined as soon as practicable after filing and, if it conforms with the Plumbing Code, a permit for the work shall be issued.

b. Every such permit shall be signed by the Plumbing Inspector.

c. Fees. The fee for a permit for plumbing or drainage work shall be One Dollar (\$1.00) plus fifty cents (50) for each new vertical stack discharging into the house drain or any of its branches.

The payment of the fee herein provided shall not relieve the holder of the permit from the payment of other fees prescribed by law or ordinance.

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ARTICLE VI Certificates

Sec. 600. Final Inspection: Upon the completion of plumbing or draining work for which a permit was issued under the Plumbing Code, the Plumbing Inspector shall inspect the said work and shall issue a certificate of approval of said work, if the work has been done in accordance with the Plumbing Code and other ordinances applicable thereto.

Sec. 601. Unlawful Use of Plumbing: It shall be unlawful for an owner to use or permit the use of any plumbing or drainage until such certificate of approval has been issued by the Plumbing Inspector.

ARTICLE VII Violations

Sec. 700. Penalties: Every person who shall violate the provisions of the Plumbing Code, or regulations adopted thereunder, shall be punished by a fine of not less than Ten Dollars (\$10.00) or more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for every such offense and in addition thereto shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. The owner of a building, structure or premises, or part thereof, where anything in violation of this ordinance shall be placed or shall exist, and any architect, builder, contractor, agent, person or corporation employed in connection therewith and who may have assisted in the commission of such violation shall each be guilty of a separate offense and upon conviction thereof shall be punished as herein provided.

Sec. 701. Abatement: The imposition of the penalties herein prescribed shall not preclude the Town Attorney from instituting any appropriate action or proceeding to prevent an unlawful erection, construction, reconstruction, alteration, repair, conversion, maintenance or use, or to restrain, correct or abate a violation, or to prevent an illegal act, conduct, business or use in or about any premises.

Sec. 702. No Localization Due to Delinquency: No oversight or dereliction of duty on the part of the Chief Building Inspector shall legalize the erecting, construction, alteration, removal of use or occupancy of a building or structure that does not conform to the provisions of the Plumbing Code.

ARTICLE VIII Sewer Connections

Sec. 800. When Required: a. Every new installation of a plumbing system in a building or structure, shall, when there is an accessible public sewer in the street abutting the lot on which such building or structure is located, be connected with such sewer as provided in this section.

b. Plumbing System Connected with Public Sewer: The plumbing system of an existing building or structure located on a lot abutting on a street in which a public sewer is being placed or has been placed after such plumbing or drainage was installed shall, whenever directed by the Plumbing Inspector, be connected to such public sewer.

Sec. 801. Separate Connections: Each plumbing system of a building or structure shall be separately connected with the public sewer or with a private sewer or cesspool.

Sec. 802. Connection Permit: a. No connection shall be made to a public sewer or any sewer system except by special permit from the Plumbing Inspector and under his direction and supervision. b. No permit for a sewer connection shall be issued unless the plumbing system conforms with the Plumbing Code. This shall not be construed to apply to work performed previous to the date this code became effective.

c. No direct or indirect connection for the removal of sewage from any premises shall be made with the storm water drainage of the Town, or with a stream or water course.

d. All connections with a public sewer shall be made by a licensed master plumber.

ARTICLE IX House Sewers

Sec. 900. Materials: The house sewer shall be either extra heavy cast iron pipe, or salt glazed vitrified earthenware, sound and impervious in all parts, provided that no earthenware pipe shall be used within two and one-half feet of the street surface or the finished ground level, nor in filled ground.

Sec. 901. Workmanship: a. House sewers shall be laid solidly, on a true grade of not less than one foot in sixty feet except by written permission of the Plumbing Inspector.

b. They shall be laid as nearly as possible in a straight line, changes in direction, if necessary, being made with proper fittings and all connections made with Y branches and one-eighth and one-sixteenth bends.

Sec. 902. Joints shall be made water-tight, and precautions shall be taken to prevent caulking materials from percolating into the pipes.

Sec. 903. House Sewers shall be covered to a depth of at least two feet with well rammed fine earth free from stones and rubbish.

Sec. 904. Running Trap: a. An iron running trap shall be placed in the house drain near the front wall of the house, and on the sewer side of all connections. If placed outside the house, or below the cellar floor, it must be made accessible by a brick manhole, the walls of which shall be at least eight inches thick and provided with an iron manhole cover. When outside the house, it shall, in no case, be less than three feet six inches below the surface of the ground. Where fixtures are less than three feet above the main sewer in the street an approved back water valve shall be installed.

b. When the plumbing system of any building is altered by the addition of any new soil, waste or vent lines, to the extent of fifty percent or more and no house trap and fresh air inlet is existing on the house drain, the same shall be provided for as prescribed in this section.

c. House traps shall have two clean-outs, with brass screw cap ferrules caulked in.

Sec. 905. Inlet Pipes: A fresh air inlet pipe shall be connected to the house drain just inside of the house trap and extended to the outer air terminating with open end at least eighteen inches above the finished grade at the most available point. The fresh air inlet pipe shall be at least one-half the diameter of the house drain, but in no case shall the fresh air inlet pipe be less than four inches in diameter.

No vent caps shall be permitted and the fresh air inlet pipe shall terminate with a return bend or a fresh air plate.

Sec. 906. Curb Box: No curb box or similar device with grating placed in a sidewalk will be permitted for fresh air inlets.

Sec. 907. Inspection: Before beginning work on a house sewer, notice shall be given to the Plumbing Inspector. No work shall be covered until it has been inspected and approved by him.

Sec. 908. Street Openings: Excavations or street openings necessary for sewer connections or installing house sewers and water service pipes shall be made in accordance with the regulations of the Town Superintendent of Highways and the Ordinances applicable thereto.

ARTICLE X General Requirements

Sec. 1000. Grades of Horizontal Piping: All horizontal piping shall be run in practical alignment and at a uniform grade of not less than one-eighth of an inch per foot, and shall be supported or anchored at intervals of not more than eight feet for cast iron pipe nor more than ten feet for other pipes. All stacks shall be supported at their bases, and all pipes shall be rigidly secured.

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Sec. 1001. Change in Direction: All changes in direction shall be made by the appropriate use of 45 degree wyes, long sweep quarter bends, sixth, eighth or sixteenth bends, except that single sanitary tee-wyes may be used on vertical stacks, and short quarter bends may be used in soil and waste lines where the change in direction of flow is from the horizontal to the vertical.

Tees and crosses may be used in vent pipes.

Sec. 1002. Prohibited Fittings: No double hub, double T or double T branch shall be used on soil or waste lines. The drilling and tapping of house drains, soil, waste or vent pipes and the use of saddle hubs and bands are prohibited. Sisson fittings may be used in repair work but only by special permission of the Plumbing Inspector.

Sec. 1003. Workmanship: a. Workmanship shall be of such character as fully to secure the results sought to be obtained in the Plumbing Code.

b. All details of plumbing work not otherwise provided for in this Plumbing Code shall be of a kind and quality approved by the Plumbing Inspector.

Sec. 1004. Materials: a. Quality. All materials used in the plumbing or drainage system of a building or structure shall be free from defects and shall conform in quality and weight to the American Society of Testing Materials standards.

b. Brand Marks. Each length of a pipe, fitting, trap, fixture and device used in a plumbing drainage system shall be stamped or indelibly marked with the weight or quality thereof and the maker's mark or name.

c. Lead Pipe. The following schedule of weights and sizes of lead pipe shall be the accepted standard of this ordinance:

1 1/2 inch pipe, 3 pounds per foot.

2 inch pipe, 4 pounds per foot.

3 inch pipe, 5 pounds per foot.

4 inch pipe, 8 pounds per foot.

8 lb. lead bends shall be used in all cases.

Sec. 1005. Joints and Connections: a. Tightness. All joints and connections shall be made gas and watertight.

b. Increasers and Reducers. Where different sizes of pipes, or pipes and fittings are to be connected, proper size increasers or reducers shall be used.

c. Prohibited Joints and Connections. No fitting or connection which has an enlargement chamber or recess with a ledge, shoulder or reduction of the pipe area in the direction of the flow on the outlet or drain side of the trap shall be used.

d. Caulked Joints. Caulked joints shall be firmly packed with oakum or hemp, and shall be secured only with pure molten lead, not less than one inch deep, well caulked.

e. Lead and Iron Joints. Connections between lead and iron pipes shall be made with brass ferrules or brass screw nipples, wiped to the lead and caulked or secured into the iron pipe.

f. Manoff Fitting. Where galvanized iron waste pipe connects with cast iron waste pipe the same shall be made with an extra heavy manoff fitting or its equivalent.

Sec. 1006. Traps and Clean-Outs: a. Kind of Traps. Every trap shall be self-cleaning.

b. Traps for bathtubs, lavatories, sinks and other similar fixtures shall be of lead, brass or cast iron.

c. Prohibited Traps. No form of trap which depends for its seal upon the action of movable parts or concealed interior partitions shall be used for fixtures.

d. Where Traps Required. 1. Each fixture shall be separately trapped by a water-seal trap placed as near the fixture as possible except that a set of not more than three laundry trays may be served by a single trap at the end of the series, or a combination fixture which is cast integral may have a single two-inch trap placed under the sink provided that in each case the branches connect into the trap-seal at an angle of not more than sixty degrees to the vertical arm.

2. In no case shall the waste from a bathtub or other fixture discharge into a water-closet trap or lead bend.

3. No fixture shall be double trapped.

e. Pipe Clean-Out. 1. A clean-out easily accessible shall be provided at the foot of each vertical waste or soil stack.

2. There shall be at least two clean-outs in the house drain, one at or near the base of the stack and the other, with full size Y branch, inside the wall near the connection between the house drain and house sewer.

3. Except for the latter, clean-outs shall be of the same nominal size as the pipes up to four inches and not less than four inches for larger pipes.

4. The distance between clean-outs in horizontal soil lines shall not exceed fifty feet.

f. Manholes: All underground traps and clean-outs of a building, except where clean-outs are flush with the floor, and all exterior underground traps shall be made accessible by manholes with proper covers.

g. Basement Floor Drains: 1. Cellar or basement floor drains shall connect into a trap so constructed that it can be readily cleaned, and of a size to serve efficiently the purpose for which it is intended. The drain inlet shall be so located that it is at all times in full view.

2. When subject to back flow or back pressure, such drains shall be equipped with an adequate back-water valve.

3. Cellar floor drains shall not connect to a house drain, nor to any part of a house drainage nor to drainage sewer.

ARTICLE XI Water Supply

Sec. 1100. Fixtures: a. All plumbing fixtures shall be provided with a sufficient supply of water for flushing to keep them in a sanitary condition.

b. Every water-closet or urinal shall be flushed by means of an approved tank or flush valve of at least four gallons flushing capacity for water-closets and at least two gallons for urinals, and shall be adjusted to prevent the waste of water.

c. The flush pipe for water-closet flush tanks shall be not less than one and one-quarter inches in diameter, and the water from flush tanks shall be used for no other purpose.

d. No water-closet or urinal bowl shall be supplied directly from a water-supply system through a flush-meter or other valve unless such valve is set above the water-closet or urinal in a manner such as to prevent any possibility of polluting the water supply.

e. All domestic hot water storage tanks shall have a relief valve of standard make placed on top of tank. All automatic gas fired hot water tanks to be installed to conform with American Gas Association Standards.

f. All installation of laundry wash trays are to be supplied with water through a swing spout over the rim faucet; the use of wash tray cocks is prohibited.

g. Size of Pipes. The water service pipe from the street supply to the building shall be of lead or copper piping of not less than three-quarters of an inch in diameter.

h. Water Supply. Where water service pipe and sewer are placed in the same trench, the water service pipe shall be placed on a vertically excavated shelf one foot above on the side of sewer line, but at no time shall the water service pipe be less than four feet (4 feet) below grade.

Sec. 1101. a. No plumbing fixture or device shall be supplied directly from a water supply system through a flush or other valve unless such valve is adequately protected to prevent pollution of the

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water supply. b. No plumbing fixture or device shall be installed which will provide an inter-connection between a distribution system of water for drinking and domestic purposes and a drainage system, soil or waste pipe or make possible the backflow of sewage or waste into the water-supply system.

c. Cross connection between a public and private water supply system is prohibited unless approved by the Nassau County Department of Health.

d. Plumbing fixtures and devices for the protection of the water supply against pollution and back siphonage shall be of a type or design accepted by the National Plumbing Laboratory.

Sec. 1162. Flush-Valve Fixtures: Flush-valve controlled fixtures, with submerged inlets supplied directly from the public water supply system, (and not supplied from separate riser and tank), shall be equipped with an approved vacuum breaker in the supply line not less than 4" above the overflow level of the fixture, to prevent siphonage or backflow of contaminated water into the house water distribution piping.

Sec. 1163. Ball Cocks: One piece toilet combination where the flush tank is less than 3" above the rim of the fixture and operated by ball cocks there shall be an approved vacuum breaker located not less than one inch above the overflow outlet of the flush tank.

Sec. 1164. Submerged Inlets: Water supply inlets to fixtures shall be located at least one inch above the overflow level of the fixture, except when submerged inlets are absolutely essential for the proper functioning of a fixture, an approval vacuum breaker and check valve shall be installed.

Sec. 1165. Sterilizers: Direct water supply piping connections to sterilizers are prohibited. The waste piping for sterilizers shall not connect directly with any drainage system; such waste piping shall discharge above an open water supplied, trapped and vented fixture.

Sec. 1166. Aspirators and Water Siphons: Water supply connections to aspirators, water siphons or similar apparatus shall be equipped with an approved vacuum breaker and check valve, the check valve to be located between the fixture and vacuum breaker. The waste pipe for this type of apparatus shall not connect directly with any drainage system but shall discharge above an open water supplied, trapped and vented fixture.

Sec. 1167. Bidets and Bedpan Washers: Water supply connections to bidets, bedpan washers or similar apparatus shall be equipped with an approved vacuum breaker and check valve, the latter located between the fixture and the vacuum breaker.

Sec. 1168. Boer or Suction Tanks: Water supply inlets to roof or suction tanks shall be located at least two inches above the overflow level of the tank.

Sec. 1169. Condensers: Direct water connection to refrigeration unit for cooling purposes shall be equipped with an approved check valve to prevent possible back flow of ammonia or other refrigerant agency from defective condenser coils or jackets, except in such installations where the water supply piping is entirely outside of the piping or tank containing the refrigerant and two independent wall thicknesses of metal separate the refrigerant from the public water supply system.

Sec. 1170. Relief Valves: Refrigeration units containing more than twenty pounds of refrigerant shall be provided with an additional safeguard in the form of an approved relief valve installed at the outlet side of the check valve, such relief valve being set at five pounds above the maximum water pressure at the point of installation.

ARTICLE XIII

Fixtures

Sec. 1200. Materials: a. Water-closets shall be vitrified earthenware. Urinals and other fixtures for the disposal of human excreta shall be vitrified earthenware, hard natural stone or cast iron white enameled on the inside.

b. Water-Closet Bowls: 1. Water-closet bowls and traps shall be made in one piece and of such form as to hold sufficient quantity of water, when filled to the trap overflow, to prevent fouling of surfaces, and shall be provided with an integral flushing rim constructed so as to flush the entire interior of the bowl.

2. Every water-closet must be set on an approved floor slab of porcelain, marble or slate or on a floor of tile, cement or other material impervious to moisture.

3. Every water-closet shall have a brass floor flange soldered to the lead bend and bolted with brass bolts to the closet. All floor flanges must be set in place and inspected by the inspector of plumbing and sewers before any water-closet is set thereon.

c. Fixtures Prohibited: 1. Fixed wooden wash trays or sinks shall not be installed in any building designed or used for human habitation.

2. No new copper lined, wooden bathtubs shall be installed and an old fixture of this class taken out shall not be re-connected.

3. Fan and valve plungers, offset washers and other water-closets having invisible seals or unventilated space, or walls not thoroughly washed at each flush shall not be used.

4. Long hopper closets or similar appliances shall not hereafter be installed.

ARTICLE XIII

Water-Closets

Sec. 1200. a. Number: 1. In every existing building not already supplied and in every building hereafter erected there should be at least one water-closet connected with the sewage system.

2. In buildings occupied by one or more families or households, there shall be at least one separate water-closet for each family or household.

3. In places of assembly, accommodating fifty persons or more, there shall be one water-closet for every one hundred persons or fraction thereof but not less than three in any case.

4. In mercantile buildings there shall be at least one water-closet in each separate ownership and provided with janitor service, for every fifteen persons or fraction thereof regularly employed therein irrespective of any accommodations otherwise provided. Where a mercantile building is held in single and separate ownership with janitor service, the owner thereof may supply general water-closet accommodations.

5. In every other building there shall be at least one water-closet for every fifteen occupants.

b. Separate Toilets: In buildings or establishments where more than one water-closet is required, except for the accommodation of families, separate water-closets and toilets and toilet rooms shall be provided for the sexes.

c. Outside Water-Closets: No water-closet shall hereafter be placed outside the building it is intended to serve.

ARTICLE XIV

Soil, Waste and Vent Pipes

Sec. 1400. a. Materials: All main or branch soil, waste and vent pipes within the building shall be of extra heavy cast iron, lead, brass or copper, galvanized steel or wrought iron pipe.

b. Fixture Units: The following table based on the rate of discharge from a lavatory as the unit shall be employed to determine fixture equivalents:

Table with 2 columns: Fixture Units and Description. Includes items like One lavatory or wash basin (1), One drinking fountain (1), One kitchen sink (1 1/2), One bathtub (2), One laundry tray (3), One combination fixture (3).

HOLD THAT LINE:

Telephone Co. Doesn't Agree Upon Boundary

Table Lane is clearly shown on maps as being in the Hicksville School District, Fire District, Park and Parking District, and Water District. It is NORTH of the Hempstead-Oyster Bay Township Boundary line, but the information operator of the Telephone Co. says they have it listed as "Levitown." The HERALD had occasion, Saturday, to seek a telephone number for a Table Lane address, giving the house number, street in Hicksville. The operator corrected us on the name of the community.

We tried again Sunday, seeking a number of a Spindle Rd., Hicksville, resident likewise living north of the line. This time we were not corrected and got the number promptly. Both numbers, incidentally, are in the "Hicksville 5" exchange.

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Table listing plumbing fixtures and their costs: One urinal (3), One shower bath (3), One floor drain (3), One slop sink (4), One water-closet (6), One bathroom group consisting of one water-closet, one lavatory and one bathtub and overhead shower, or of one water-closet, one lavatory and one shower compartment, One hundred and eighty square feet of roof or drained area in horizontal projection shall count as one fixture.

c. Soil and Waste Stacks: 1. Soil and waste stacks shall extend full size and from the house drain to and at least two feet above the roof provided that the size above the roof and at least one foot below the roof shall be not less than four inches. Such stacks shall be as direct as possible and free from sharp bends and turns.

2. The sizes of soil and waste stacks shall depend on the fixture units served by them as indicated on the following table, provided that no water-closet shall discharge into a stack less than three inches.

MAXIMUM FIXTURE UNITS ON ONE STACK

Table with 4 columns: Diam., In one branch interval, On any other stack, In one branch interval, On any other stack. Lists fixture unit limits for diameters from 1 1/2 to 6 inches.

3. The term "branch interval" means the vertical length of stack, not less than eight feet, within which a branch or branches are connected.

4. The total fixture units on all branches connected to a stack within any eight feet length shall not exceed the maximum permitted by the table in one branch interval.

d. Prohibited Connection: No soil or waste vent, circuit or loop vent above the highest installed fixture on the branch or main shall thereafter be used as a soil or waste pipe.

e. Roof Extensions: 1. The roof terminal of every stack and vent, if within twelve feet of a door, window, scuttle or air shaft, shall extend at least three feet above the same.

2. No door or window of a higher neighboring building shall be located hereafter within twelve feet of an existing stack unless the owner of the higher building, at his own expense, shall carry up such stack or vent as required in this section.

f. Venting Traps: 1. Every fixture trap shall be protected against siphonage and back pressure, and air circulation assured by means of a soil or waste stack vent, a continuous waste or soil vent, or a loop or circuit vent. No crown vent shall be installed.

2. No trap shall be placed more than three feet horizontal developed length, from its vent. The vent opening from the soil or waste pipe, except for water-closets and similar fixtures, shall not be below the dip of the trap.

g. Vent and Soil or Waste Connection: 1. All main vents or vent stacks shall extend undiminished in size above the roof or shall be reconnected with the main soil or waste vent at least three feet above the highest fixture branch, but in no case shall vent or stack be less than 4" in diameter above a point one foot below the roof.

2. In buildings more than one story in height such vents shall also extend to and connect full size to the main soil or waste stack at or below the lowest fixture.

h. Size of Vents: The required size of main vents or vent stacks shall be determined from the size of the soil or waste stack vented, the total number of fixture units drained into it, and the developed length of the vent, in accordance with the following tables, interpolating when necessary between permissible length of vent given in the table.

MAXIMUM PERMISSIBLE LENGTH OF VENTS IN FEET FOR SOIL AND WASTE STACKS

War bonds in denominations of \$100, \$50 and \$25 will be awarded on the last night of the bazaar. A hand-made crocheted table cloth donated by Mrs. Louis Lutge will also be awarded. There will be various booths of games and refreshments.

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1. Branch and Individual Vents: 1. No vents shall be less than one and one-half inches in diameter.

2. For one and one-half inch wastes the vents shall be of the same diameter as the waste pipe. In no case shall a branch or main vent have a diameter less than one-half that of the soil or waste pipe served. In no case shall the length of a branch vent of given diameter exceed the maximum length permitted for the main vent serving the same size or vent stack.

3. Circuits and Loop Vents: A branch soil or waste pipe to which two and not more than eight water-closets, pedestal urinals, trap standard slop sinks or shower stalls are connected in the series may be vented by a circuit or loop vent, which shall be taken off in front of the last fixture connection. Where fixtures discharge above such branch, each branch shall be provided with a relief vent one-half the diameter of the soil or waste stack, taken off in front of the first fixture connection.

4. Vents Not Required: 1. Where bathrooms or water-closets or other fixtures are located on opposite sides of a wall or partition or directly adjacent to each other within the prescribed distance, such fixtures may have a common soil or waste pipe and common vent.

2. Branch waste pipes from the two highest water-closets on a stack need not be vented, provided the fixtures are independently connected to the soil stack, that such soil stack is not less than four inches in diameter and that the fixture traps are no more than three feet, developed length, from such soil stack.

3. Branch wastes from any one set of three fixtures in top story, other than water-closets or slop sinks, need not be vented provided the connection with the soil or waste stack is above that of the highest water-closet connected to such stack, that such soil or waste stack is not less than four inches in diameter and that the traps of such fixtures are not more than three feet, developed length, from the soil or waste stack.

ARTICLE XV
House Drain

Sec. 1500. a. Definition: The term "house drain" means the lowest horizontal piping of a building system of a building, receiving the discharge from soil waste and other drainage pipes, inside the walls of the building, extending to a point five feet outside the inner face of the foundation walls and there connecting with the house sewer.

b. Size: The sizes of the house drain and of its horizontal branches shall be determined by the total fixture units served thereby as indicated in the following table, provided that, except by special permission of the Inspector of Plumbing and Sewers, no water-closet shall discharge into a house drain or a horizontal branch of the house drain, that is less than four inches in diameter.

ARTICLE XVI
Sumps and Receiving Tanks

Sec. 1600. Sumps and Receiving Tanks: All subhouse drains shall discharge into air-tight sumps or receiving tanks so located as to receive the sewage and shall be lifted and discharged into the house sewer by pumps, ejectors or equivalent method. Such sumps shall be either automatically discharged or be of sufficient capacity to receive the sewage and wastes of the building for not less than twenty-four hours.

ARTICLE XVII
Storm Water

Sec. 1700. Storm Water: a. Separate from house drainage. Rain conductors or leaders and yard or area drains shall not be connected with a drainage system. They may connect with and discharge into a drain or sewer used for storm water only.

b. Gutters and Leaders: 1. Gutters and inside leaders shall not be less in diameter than the following:

For a roof area up to 90 sq. ft.	Gutter	Leader

For 271 to 810 sq. ft.	4 in.	2 in.

2. Outside leaders shall be one size larger than required for inside leaders.

3. If other than cylindrical leaders or semi-cylindrical gutters are used, the sectional areas for similar conditions shall be the same as those herein specified.

c. Drains: The sizes of drains for storm water shall be as indicated in the following table:

ARTICLE XVIII
Wastes

Sec. 1800. Special Wastes: a. Refrigerator Wastes. No waste pipe from a refrigerator or other receptacle in which food or food materials are stored shall be connected with a soil or waste pipe but each waste pipe shall drain into an open sink or tray, properly water-supplied, trapped and vented.

b. Dental Cuspidors: Dental cuspidors must be separately trapped by a trap of at least one and one-half inches in diameter properly vented and placed as close to the fixture as possible. The connection between trap and cuspidor may be three-fourths of an inch in diameter.

c. Drinking Fountains: 1. No plumbing fixtures, except bar sinks, soda fountains or drinking fountains, shall be installed with an indirect waste connection to the plumbing and drainage system.

2. The waste of every bar sink, soda fountain and drinking fountain must discharge over a properly water-supplied trapped and vented sink.

3. The main waste line shall be two inches in diameter, and the branches to fixtures at least one and one-half inches in diameter.

4. Drinking fountains must be trapped and the waste line extended through the roof. No vent connections need be provided.

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ARTICLE XIX
Tests

Sec. 1900. a. Water Test: 1. Before any fixtures are connected with a plumbing system and before a soil pipe is connected with the house drain or sewer, the outlet of the soil pipe and all openings into it shall be hermetically sealed and filled with water to its top.

2. Every joint shall be examined for leakage and all leaks shall be made tight.

3. No plumbing system shall be completed or soil pipe covered until such inspection has been made and all joints have been made water-tight and the work has been accepted by the Inspector of Plumbing and Sewers.

ARTICLE XX
Miscellaneous Requirements

Sec. 2000. a. Private Sewage Disposal: Private sewage disposal facilities shall be constructed and installed within the Town limits, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Nassau County Department of Health and under such conditions as may be prescribed.

b. Water-Borne Sewage Disposal: Water-borne sewage disposal facilities for dwellings shall be installed in the front yard wherever possible and for any other location, approval shall first be obtained from the Building Department of the Town of Oyster Bay.

c. Unlawful Use of Sewer: It shall be unlawful to throw or deposit, or cause to be thrown or deposited, in any fixture, vessel or receptacle connected with a public sewer, or with a plumbing system connected with a public sewer, any matter other than feces, urine, the necessary water-closet paper and liquid house slops, unless special permission is obtained for the discharge of other wastes.

d. All new buildings including stores, apartments and public buildings must have a properly vented and water supplied sink in the cellar for indirect wastes or a properly vented plugged connection for future accommodation.

Section 2001. b. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately. Dated, Oyster Bay, New York, August 1st, 1950.

Building is a three-story, fire-resistant, brick structure, located on a plot of six acres, and contains a kindergarten, 12 classrooms, combination auditorium-gymnasium, basement lunchroom, locker and shower rooms, small office and other required utility rooms. This was considered sufficient in 1927 when the school was built, but is totally inadequate for the increasing enrollment which is expected to continue until 1956 when present statistics indicate the peak will be reached.

The present building has been designed to take full advantage of the ideal orientation (east-west exposure) for the added classrooms which was also a contributing factor in the adoption of the selected scheme over the many schemes presented. Another good feature of this scheme is that the administrative offices will remain more centrally located for better supervision and control of all school activities.

The design proposed is a blend of contemporary ideas for modern daytime classroom lighting with the architecture of the

present school building. The use of structural steel framework, brick veneer with cinder block back-up exterior walls and insulated flat roof will result in an economical construction which lends itself to speedy erection. A complete survey of educational requirements by Dr. Linn, Educational Consultant of Teachers College, indicated the need for increasing the capacity of the school to twenty-four classrooms to provide facilities for an expected enrollment of from 720 to 750 pupils. The new addition, including present school facilities, will provide 22 classrooms and two kindergarten rooms, accommodating 720 pupils with various grades assigned to the classes as follows:

Kindergarten 2; First grade 3; Second grade 3; Third grade 4; Fourth grade 4; Fifth grade 4; Sixth grade 4.

On the First Floor, south end, provision has been made to accommodate all the kindergarten and first grade rooms and individual toilet rooms, coat rooms, and storage spaces. A separate kindergarten entrance has been provided and also exterior doors from each first grade classroom. Adjacent to this section, a new clinic with its dependencies will be located.

The Second Floor, south end Addition, will accommodate four new classrooms, each of which is designed in the modern manner for special-activities work areas.

The First Floor, north addition, will house the new Cafeteria. The space now occupied by the old Cafeteria will be converted into a modern kitchen and serving area with ample facilities for preparing meals and storage of food and dish-washing facilities to serve approximately 150 pupils per seating, or a total of 450 pupils, who are expected to have their meals in the Cafeteria. The present bicycle room will be used as an over-flow for the Cafeteria where cold lunches can be served. Three other modern classrooms and a remedial reading-room, about 1/2 classroom in size, (which will also be used for library purposes) will be added to the building on the second floor, new north addition.

The plans for the addition were prepared by Knappe & Johnson, school specialists whose services have been engaged by the Board of Education in conjunction with and under the supervision of Dr. Henry H. Linn of the Institute of Field Studies, Teachers College; Dr. William K. Wilson, Supervisor of Buildings and Grounds, Division of the State Department of Education, and Eric H. LeBaron, Superintendent of Schools and the Board of Education. A number of different schemes and layouts were prepared and the final scheme was selected by the Board of Education after many conferences with the architectural and educational consultants retained by them, the statement concludes.
