FROM THE "DAILY EXPRESS" SPECIAL COMMISSIONERS. The impression of a stranger on his first arrival in Waterford will hardly be favourable should his journey have been made by rail, as he must have been confronted by an antiquated timber bridge, probably the Waterford and Limerick Turnpike.
