WHY TWO PREVIOUS SITTINGS FELL THROUGH. A "HORSEY" TRANSACTION.

INTERESTING HOUSE POSSESSION CASE.

The presiding justices at above court yesterday were Messrs. P. W. Kenny, T.C. (in the chair), Luke Larkin, T.C. and Mr. Brazil, Town Clerk.

A "HORSEY" TRANSACTION. John Walsh of Kilmacthomas, sued M. Coffey, for £30 in respect of the sale of a horse on the 24th June, 1921.

Mr. P. A. Murphy, solr., appeared for plaintiff; and Mr. McDonald, solr., for defendant. The evidence of the plaintiff was that he had purchased the horse for £30.

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INTERESTING HOUSE POSSESSION CASE. Michael and Mary Walsh, Cathedral square sought possession of the premises occupied by the British and Argentine Meat Co., Ltd., at Barronstrand street.

Mr. P. O'Connor, solr., appeared for the plaintiffs; and Mr. Nimmo (representing M. J. Farrell, solr., Dublin) for the defendants. Mr. O'Connor said defendants held the premises under yearly tenancy at a rent of £46 per annum, payable quarterly.

Mr. P. O'Connor said the premises were described as No. 7 in the agreement, which was actually prepared by the defendant company. As a result of the notice to quit a considerable amount of correspondence had passed between the first of the parties and the defendant.

Mr. P. O'Connor said the defendant company had been looking for other premises, and as soon as they could find a suitable shop they would be prepared to give up possession. A number of other letters were read dealing with increasing the rent, etc.

LIVE STOCK SHIPMENTS. Live stock shipments from Waterford last week were—251 fat cattle, 1260 stores, 10 milch cows, 231 sheep, 901 lambs, 153 pigs and 1 horse.

Dungarvan Urban Council.

At the meeting of the above on Friday Mr. M. Brennan (chairman) presided. Also present: Capt. Foley, Messrs. J. F. Moore, M. Griffin.

The Town Clerk, Borough Surveyor and Harbour Master were in attendance. FINANCES. The amount expended for the week was £38 18s. 7d., of which £20 12s. 3d. was on roads, £14 18s. 4d. on water, and £3 10s. on artisans' dwellings.

Mr. Casey—I thought it would be £400. Mr. McGrath—It will be later on. The Clerk said the total amount expended up to the present in connection with the waterworks at Glendine.

THE TOWN TENANTS. A deputation from the Town Tenants' Association attended, comprising Messrs. J. M. Murphy, Thomas Power, Mary St., J. Dahill, W. Donaldson and William Power.

Mr. Murphy pointed out that on the last occasion the deputation was before the Council they urged that the Council had the power to carry out certain improvements to the sewerage systems to houses at a certain valuation. They were informed from another source that the Council had the power to do so.

THE BALLYHACK CAUSE CENTRE. The action brought by William Barron against John J. O'Neil, both of Ballyhack, Arthurstown, Co. Wexford, was in the list for hearing on Tuesday before Mr. Justice Dodd in one of the British Courts surviving in Dublin and a city special jury.

Mr. Lynch, K.C. with whom were Mr. Gibson, K.C. and Mr. J. J. Mooney (instructed by Mr. P. R. Bugey, solr.), for the defendant, said that the reason his client wanted the case transferred to the other court was that they could not get the Republican police, who made a search of plaintiffs' premises, to come and give evidence in this court.

IRISH PRODUCTS LEAGUE. A communication was received from the Irish Products League pointing out the necessity of supporting Irish Products at the present time. Whatever internal political differences divided them at present, they all desired to save the struggling industries from extinction.

ERECTING SHEDS. On the report of Mr. McGrath, the Council decided to erect two concrete sheds for the convenience of bathers during the bathing season.

THE PROVISIONAL GOVERNMENT. A communication was received from the Provisional Government with reference to the international commission that had been set up with regard to certain finances and claims from the 21st January to the 11th July, 1921, and pointing out that the Provisional Government were prepared to make preliminary arrangements for a limited number of cases where they were satisfied that such was desirable in the interests of industry and employment by way of building.

Waterford County Board of Health

MEETING AT THE TOWN HALL.

A meeting of the above was held in the City Council Chamber on Wednesday, Mr. Richard Gleeson (vice-chairman) presiding. The other members present were Messrs. Whelan, Messrs. T. C. Wm. Cullinane, P. W. Kenny, T. C. O'Meara, Messrs. Michael Flynn, secretary, and E. Haughton, storekeeper, were in attendance.

CARRICK AFFAIRS. The clerk of the Carrick (No. 1 R.D.C.) reported that the Carrick, midwife of Portlaoighis dispensary district, resigned, owing to age, in January last. Her pension had been fixed and sent to the Department for saffron, which had not yet been received. Her salary at the time of resignation was £35, with £12 10s. bonus. She was still acting, and would continue to do so until a successor had been appointed.

APPOINTMENT OF MIDWIVES. No applications were received for the vacant positions of midwives to the Bonmahon and Woodstown dispensary districts, and it was decided to re-advertise. THE HOME HELP SCHEME. A considerable portion of the day's business was the consideration of the home help scheme, and after protracted discussion the necessary arrangements were made.

DUNGARVAN COTTAGE HOSPITAL. A discussion also took place on the expenditure recommended by Dr. Boyd Barrett in connection with the above, it being eventually decided to advertise for tenders, the acceptance of which will be left in the hands of the Dungarvan Sub-committee.

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The Oireachtas

Arrangements for this season's Oireachtas are being pushed on vigorously. The work has become so heavy that the Gaelic League Standing Committee has arranged for special weekly meetings in connection therewith...

LITERARY COMPETITIONS. Though an extension of time has been given to writers till May 15th, many ad-judicators are at work on the literary work already. The results will, in accordance with past years' procedure, be announced during Oireachtas Week.

OPEN AIR COMPETITIONS. This will consist of the usual hurling match, pipers' band competitions, individual piping, dancing and brass and fife and drum band competitions. Arrangements are being made to have a promenade of massed bands on the opening day.

CHOIRS. A special endeavour is being made to attract choirs to this year's Oireachtas. Gaelic Ireland has been backward in this particular matter, and though the year's efforts may not be crowned with great success, it is hoped to attract a good number of choirs.

LANGUAGE COMPETITIONS. These competitions are numerous and varied. They embrace storytelling, dialogue, recitations, oratory, scholarships, etc. Feis committees and Coiste Comrales are busy at work and are being asked to send in their very best material in all but more especially in the language competitions.

IRELAND ABROAD. Mr. P. J. Little delivered in Dublin on Monday an interesting lecture on "Ireland and Small Nationalities in South Africa and South America." He said that his general experience had led him to believe that if peoples were left to themselves they got the best of their own government.

Mr. Little said the Irish there were about 50,000 strong. A number of them were very rich landowners. They or their ancestors went to the Argentine about 70 years ago. They spoke English amongst themselves; otherwise their language was Spanish.

AN OLD DRY DOCK. The Secretary of the Harbour Board, stated at Monday's meeting that Mr. Graves, Waterpark, informed him of the existence of a dry dock on his property and of his readiness to have it cleaned and made available for public use.

AUCTION OF GRAIN. On Wednesday Mr. Thomas Walsh sold by auction at the street of Messrs White Brothers 3,000 barrels of Indian corn. Prices varied according to condition of the grain from 17/6 to 9/3 per barrel.

137 YEARS OF AGE. A patriarch upwards of 137 years of age died on Friday at Killrossney. Within two years of his death he was able to accomplish easily the journey on foot, to and fro, between his home and Dungan-van, a distance of eight miles.

THE ORDER TO DEEPEN THE BAR. At the Harbour Board on Monday Mr. Cheney, solicitor, read the provisions of the Order for the deepening of the Bar below Duncannon. The Commissioners expressed their best thanks to the City Members, Messrs Osborne and Delahunty, for their exertions in the matter.

CUNARD STEAMER WRECKED. The Cunard steamer "Triph" was wrecked this morning at Tuskar. The "Naiaid," a fishing vessel, came into Dunmore soon after the wreck had occurred, carrying 36 of the passengers who had been on board the Cunarder. Reports say that all hands are saved.

A MALCOMSON FACTORY STRIKE. The power-loom weavers in Messrs Malcomson's factory at Millford, Belfast, are on strike. Messrs Malcomson had agreed to give increased wages but requested three days' time to fix the amount. The workers declined to accede to this request.

WATERFORD T.D. ROUSES THE DAIL. HIS PROPOSAL TO MICHAEL COLLINS. At the meeting of Dail Eireann on Wednesday the following is the gist of the incisive speech delivered by Cathol Brugha, T.D. for the Members of the Cabinet.

When Sir John was asked to attend the Lloyd George convention in 1916 Mr. Lloyd George's convention in 1916 the National Executive made one of the conditions in their reply, drawn up for the most part by President Griffith, that the Convention should consist of none but persons freely elected by adult suffrage in Ireland.

That Treaty, an act other had things in it, meant Partition. Partition according to the proponent of the Irish hierarchy, since the last, would be nothing but a "pretext" source of discord and fratricidal strife. The fact that the Irish hierarchy had changed their minds since then and advised the Irish people to accept the Treaty was unfortunate for their co-republicans in the North, but it did not mean that the circumstances or conditions would be anything different for the Partition.

I followed, and on once outside the grey walls of the prison we divided in pairs. Mary Bourke (who was doing years' hard labour and myself went together and drifted away in the kindly sun, and we could only clasp each other's hands and whisper again and yet again, "Is it true? Are we really free?"

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A LADY'S GOSSIP

**EVENING MODES.**  
Taken altogether the cost of evening gowns is considerably lower than was the case last year, and this in great measure is due to the fact that the extensive use of printed and patterned materials is lessening the demand for hand-embroidered silk. In Paris brightly dyed toulard d'ers is much employed for evening wear, trills and garnitures of artificial flowers—which match those portrayed upon the fabric—being the only ornamentation permitted. Except for very smart functions the low décolletage is not permissible. Debutantes are wearing frocks cut high both back and front, entirely without sleeves, and skirts that reach almost to the line of the ankle.

**FASHIONABLE TRIMMINGS.**  
The craze for fancy gossams and narrow ruched or pleated ribbons is very marked at the moment. These trimmings are much used upon the fronts of bodices, and the long pointed side panels that appear on many of the newest skirts. For afternoon frocks made of crepe, a hanging trail of simulated roses and dahlias is employed to trim one side of the skirt, the petals being fashioned of crepe to match. Similar blooms finish the favorite crossover bodice drapery, and form the collars of little silk cloth coats designed for wear with these particular frocks. The flower collar is particularly a great vogue, the blooms being fashioned of the same fabric as is used for lining the coat or wrap.

**OVERALLS.**  
The overall is promised a wide vogue this coming summer for country and indoor wear. It is made on plain lines, the rather plain bodice and full skirt being eased into a shapely belt. Many examples fasten down the back, and some not at all. The latter models are fashioned to cross over behind, the drape being kept in place and secured by means of sash-like ends. Printed or gardie, tussore silk, and plain linen, are the favourite fabrics for these overalls, wool embroidery and floral appliques cut from printed silks or cretonnes forming the trimming.

**TO LAUNDRY TUSSEORE SILK.**  
Tussore silk which, by the way, is never-ending wear, is quite easy to launder at home. A lather needs to be made of some good soap in warm—not hot—water, and the garment should be gently rubbed and rinsed until clean. It must then be rinsed in lukewarm water and dried as quickly as possible. The great point is never to iron tussore until it is perfectly dry, otherwise wherever dampness remains patches will appear. When washing Jap or other descriptions of white silk an excellent plan is to add a little methylated spirits to the rinsing water. This produces a gloss and prevents the iron from sticking. These silks should be only partially dried, then rolled in a dry cloth and left for an hour or two before being ironed.

Finance and Law Committee

UPKEEP OF COURTHOUSE.

REVALUATION OF CITY PREMISES.

The usual monthly meeting of the above committee was held in the Mayor's Office, Town Hall, on Tuesday evening, the 14th inst., Mr. Luke Larkin (in the chair). Ald. P. Quinlan, and Councillors Robt. Cutlar, T. O'Neill, Wm. Cullinane, J. S. O'Neill, and Thomas Dunne.

REVERSIONARY LEASES.

The application for above by Mr. McSweeney was refused on the grounds that in the committee's opinion the application was rather premature, as the present lease had about 15 years to run.

Consideration of the adjourned cases of Mrs. Mary Fitzgerald, Mr. E. W. Clamper, and Messrs. R. and T. Whittle for further similar applications were adjourned for a month, owing to the absence of Mr. H. J. Keane, solr., who has already appeared before the committee on behalf of Mrs. Fitzgerald and Mr. R. Whittle.

The Borough Surveyor submitted a report in connection with the application for a reversionary lease by Mr. John Flynn of Graecien road, and it was ordered that consideration of the matter be adjourned for a month. Mr. Flynn meanwhile to be notified to attend the next meeting of the committee.

The application for a reversionary lease by Mr. Paul Caulfield, Yellow road, was referred to the Borough Treasurer and Borough Surveyor for report.

A similar order was made on the application of Mr. Wm. Cullinane for a reversionary lease of his dwellinghouse at the Mayor's Walk.

UPKEEP OF COURTHOUSE.

It was ordered that the resolution on the books ordering the stoppage of payment of accounts in connection with the upkeep of the Courthouse, etc., be rescinded, and that the Corporation take over responsibility for these charges as from the first of the present financial year.

REVALUATION.

An important letter was submitted by the Town Clerk from the Ministry of Finance (Baltas, Rue de la Ville) re the general revaluation of the city, and it was decided that the Town Clerk and the Borough Treasurer proceed to Dublin with a view to interviewing the responsible Ministry as suggested in the communication submitted.

CHANGES IN MARKET HOUSE CHARGES.

The following changes in the local Market House charges were recommended, pursuant to a report of the Borough Treasurer:

Live Stock—Present charge, 1/- per weighing. Proposed new charge, 6d. for first two beasts and 6d. for each succeeding beast.

Potatoes—At present 6d. per sack; new charge, 3d. per sack.

Coal proposed to be changed from the present figure of 1/- per load to 6d. per load for city residents.

These changes will take effect for six months.

NO TO BE PROVIDED WITH IDENTIFICATION BADGES.

Arising out of certain costs incurred in the extinguishing of the recent fire at Thomas's Hill, the following order that the badges for identification be ordered from the State, and that the wearers of these badges be provided with identification badges.

WHY TWO PREVIOUS SITTINGS FELL THROUGH.

A "HORSEY" TRANSACTION.

INTERESTING HOUSE POSSESSION CASE.

The presiding justices at above court yesterday were Messrs. P. W. Kenny, T.C. (in the chair); Luke Larkin, T.C., and P. Brazil, Town Clerk.

Mr. Kenny, in explaining why two previous sittings of the court fell through, said that on the first occasion he was held up in Dublin on the Wednesday evening as there were no trains running to Waterford. The Mayor was also in Dublin at the time attending Parliament, and without the requisite number of Justices the court could not be held. Last Thursday the Justices attended, but the Registrar was not present, and evidently had not summoned anybody and after waiting for about half an hour the Justices had to go away again. With regard to that day's court, Mr. Kenny said that no proper notice of it had been sent to any of the Justices, and it was only by a hurried messenger that morning that he was informed that the court would be held.

A "HORSEY" TRANSACTION.

John Walsh, Kilmac Thomas, sued M. Coffey, J. Hill, for £30 in respect of the sale of a horse, on the 24th June, 1921.

Mr. P. A. Murphy, solr., appeared for plaintiff, and Mr. McDonald, solr., for defendant.

The evidence of the plaintiff was that he had purchased the horse for £30. The animal was delivered all right, but would not stay on his land, and had on four occasions travelled over 41 miles back to the defendant. The horse was, consequently no use to him. Subsequently he met defendant at Kilmac Thomas, and the latter told him that he had "stuck" him in the horse by purchasing him too cheaply. Plaintiff said that he did not want the horse at all and offered to sell him back to defendant. Defendant said he would be willing to accept the horse if plaintiff agreed to add another £5 to the purchase price of £30, which he refused, but eventually a bargain was struck at £2, and on receipt of a cheque for this amount defendant agreed to return to plaintiff his original £30. This money had not since been forthcoming.

For the defence it was stated in evidence that the £3 referred to was for the grazing of the horse when it returned to its original owner. There was also a counter-claim by defendant for the grazing of the horse since it had been returned to his land in December last.

The Justices decreed for £30 for plaintiff, together with the usual costs of court. They dismissed the counter-claim.

INTERESTING HOUSE POSSESSION CASE.

Michael and Mary Walsh, Cathedral square sought possession of the premises occupied by the British and Argentine Meat Co., Ltd., at Barronstrand street.

Mr. P. O'Connor, solr., appeared for the plaintiffs, and Mr. Nimmo (representing Mr. M. J. Farrell, solr., Dublin) for the defendants.

Mr. O'Connor said defendants held the premises under yearly tenancy at a rent of £48 per annum, payable quarterly. The tenancy to be considered by six months' notice in writing by either side. Plaintiff's title was admitted.

Mr. Nimmo said the defendants occupied No. 22, not No. 7.

Mr. O'Connor said the premises were described as No. 7 in the agreement, which was actually prepared by the defendant company. As a result of the notice to quit a considerable amount of correspondence had passed between his client and the defendants. In the first of these letters Mrs. Walsh pointed out that as she herself was under notice to quit from the executors of her landlord, and as in the opinion of her solicitor the court would give a decree in the landlord's favour, she hoped the defendants would save her the trouble and expense of legal proceedings. The company replied that they had been looking for other premises, and as soon as they could find a suitable shop they would be prepared to give up possession.

A number of other letters were read dealing with increasing the rent, etc.

Mr. Nimmo said plaintiffs offered no alternative accommodation to the defendant, and in a letter to the vacant premises of Mr. McCall on the opposite side of the street, but left the defendants to go look for these premises themselves. Defendants were entitled to some compensation for establishing a business. Plaintiffs had issued a second notice to quit in December, and as the six months would not expire until the 23rd inst., he held that the action before the court was premature inasmuch as the period had not expired.

Mr. W. Smith, local manager for defendant company, was called to give evidence.

Mrs. Walsh also gave evidence, as she had been served with notice to quit. She also wanted the premises because her husband, who was a ship's engineer, had recently had his salary considerably reduced, and she wished to open a business to supplement his income in that way.

Mr. Kenny said the court was satisfied that all the necessary proceedings had been completed, and they recognized, too, that there was a great deal of hardship on both sides, that the plaintiffs were, under the circumstances, unwillingly compelled to bring pressure to bear on the defendant, and they recognized, too, that people building up a business should not be ruthlessly displaced, but still there was nothing else left for the plaintiff to do, and she was entitled for the premises for which they gave a decree for possession.

Replying to Mr. Nimmo, who suggested there might be an appeal, the Justices expressed their willingness to state a case.

LIVE STOCK SHIPMENTS.

Live stock shipments from Waterford last week were 214 fat cattle, 1,295 stores, 10 milk cows, 23 sheep, 299 lambs, 153 pigs and 15 hogs.

For the week the farms for the period since the 1st January to May 14th, 1921, 220,000 animals are about 1,000,000 figures for the same period, but the figures are accounted for by the hold-up last year owing to the restrictions placed on cattle exportation. At the same time, it shows that, notwithstanding the prohibition of Ireland's export trade in live stock has not suffered eclipse.

Dungarvan Urban Council

At the meeting of the above on Friday

Mr. M. Brennock (chairman) presided. Also present—Capt. Foley, Messrs. J. F. O'Leary, T. M. Coffey, M. J. Casey, M. Moore, M. G. Coffey, and M. J. Casey, M.P.

The Town Clerk, Borough Surveyor and Harbour Master were in attendance.

FINANCES.  
The amount expended for the week was £38 18s. 7d., of which £20 12s. 3d. was on roads, £14 16s. 4d. on water, and £3 10s. on artisans' dwellings.

Chairman—How much of that has come out of the £400?

The Clerk said they were on the right side so far. He had received a cheque from the County Council for £366 17s. 4d. for the Urban Council's proportion of the grant.

Mr. Casey—I thought it would be £400.

Mr. McGrath—it will be later on.

The Clerk said the total amount expended up to the present in connection with this grant was £279 17s. 1d., and £203 on the waterworks at Glendine.

The Chairman said they would want to be very cautious. They expended their money on the waterworks on the assumption that they would get a loan, and so far they had not heard anything about it.

Mr. McGrath said the clerk had stated that the grant would be forthcoming.

Clerk—What do you want saying that for? I asked for permission to apply for the loan.

Mr. Casey—Would not the bank give a loan for the purpose?

Clerk—The loans have not been paid for two years.

Mr. Casey—all that money is spent.

Clerk—Yes, portion of it.

Mr. McCarthy—Whatever money has been spent on the waterworks is well spent, and was badly wanted.

Chairman—Yes, money is the whole question. We should draw the attention of the Borough Surveyor to the condition of the reservoir. He suggested that in conjunction with a competent engineer Mr. McGrath should make an inspection of the place.

Mr. McGrath said there was a lot of water going into the tank, and he could not make an inspection of it. There were nine feet of water in it at eleven o'clock that day.

Chairman—The caretaker reported there was only four feet of water in the tank.

Mr. Casey urged that the Council had the power to carry out certain improvements to the sewerage systems to houses at a certain valuation. They were informed from another source that the Council had the power. They were now commencing the summer season, and it was an awful state of affairs if such a thing would be neglected. It would be a source of danger to the public health, and they had enough of trouble without sickness. They had had several complaints with regard to leakages, damp floors, bad roofs, and they were also informed from another source that the Council had powers to compel landlords to do these repairs also. If the Council had not the power, the Town Tenants' Association would have, because they would not allow the tenants to pay any rents until the landlords carried out the repairs, and the Council were only in the beginning of the trouble.

Mr. Thomas Power submitted a report on the houses and their condition generally. There was a house in Barrack lane that the sanitary sub-officer reported on some time ago, and nothing had been done. He also complained of another house in Davis street, and the wall dividing the house and Draper's field had been knocked down. This caused the tenants much inconvenience as the sewage matter from the slaughter house came into his premises. He was informed that the Council's workmen used to clean this sewer. In Abbeyside there was a man-hole opposite Mr. Cullinan's, and the sewage from the houses on each side was running into this man-hole and getting stopped. The tenant applied to the Council for a loan of a rod to clear this hole, and he was charged one shilling, not understanding that the Council's workmen used to clear this place. As regards other houses there were many complaints of bad roofs, damp floors, and of the sanitary conditions generally. They were told that the sanitary sub-officer had power to compel the landlords to carry out repairs in these houses in a proper state of repair. He also referred to other matter and said that they had received a report from Clonmel pointing out the duties of sanitary authorities in these matters.

The Corporation of Clonmel made an order which they handed to their sanitary sub-officer, compelling the landlords to put the houses in a proper condition of repair, and if the Corporation of Clonmel had that power the Dungarvan Urban Council should have the same power. He suggested that a list of the grievances complained to the sanitary sub-officer and agreed that the necessary repairs be carried out.

REPORT ON THE ADOPTION OF THE REPORT WHICH BEARING UPON A GOOD POINT.

Mr. Casey moved the first of the resolutions, that they should be protected. The landlords were receiving rents for the houses, and it was only right that the ratepayers should be protected.

Capt. Foley seconded the proposition.

The Chairman asked what position would they be in with regard to the ratepayers if the Council brought the case into court and if they failed.

Mr. Murphy gave a guarantee that they would be beaten in the courts the Day Tenants' Association would have the power.

The Chairman said on that matter he would be glad to do all in their power to protect the ratepayers.

Mr. McCarthy said they would have to keep the rates up until the Council had sold the houses, but he as a landlord's man had sold.

The resolution was passed, and the minutes read.

THE PROVISIONAL GOVERNMENT

A communication was received from the Provisional Government with reference to the international commission that had been set up with regard to certain financial claims and the 21st January, 1921, and pointing out that the Provisional Government was prepared to make preliminary arrangements for the way of loan in anticipation of the work of a limited number of cases which they were satisfied that such was desirable in the interests of industry and employment by way of building.

Waterford County Board of Health

MEETING AT THE TOWN HALL.

A meeting of the above was held in the City Council Chamber on Wednesday, Mr. Richard Gleeson (vice-chairman) presiding. The other members present were—Mrs. Whelan, Messrs. P. Cullinan, J. Fleming, P. W. Kenny, E.C.; Wm. Cullinane, T.C., and M. O'Meara. Messrs. Michael Flynn, secretary, and E. Haughton, storekeeper, were in attendance.

CARRICK AFFAIRS.

The clerk of the Carrick No. 1 R.D.C. reported that the incumbent, midwife of Portlaw dispensary district, resigned, owing to age, in January last. Her pension had been fixed and sent to the Department for sanction, which had not yet been received. Her salary at the time of resignation was £35, with £12 10s. bonus. She was still acting, and would continue to do so until a successor had been appointed.

The same gentleman further reported that the Portlaw dispensary caretaker was living in the place, and the owner of the house, a portion of which was used as a dispensary, required the house for one of his workmen. The occupier was paid £4 as rent and £5 as caretaker, with a ton of coal per annum. Dr. Walker, M.O. of the district, was prepared to get apart two rooms in his house as a public dispensary and waiting-room at £10 a year, to include heating, caretaking and rent. The R.D.C. had the matter before them at their last meeting, and approved of same as a recommendation to the County Board of Health.

He also stated that Dr. Walker had been allowed two weeks' leave of absence as portion of his annual holiday. Dr. Stephenson to discharge his duties at £5 5s. a week. Mrs. Chanon, midwife, was also allowed two weeks' leave of absence owing to ill-health, and was being temporarily replaced by Mrs. Julia Shanahan as midwife of the Rathgorman dispensary district.

The reports were suitably acted upon by the meeting.

APPOINTMENT OF MIDWIVES.

No applications were received for the vacant positions of midwives to the Bonmahon and Woodstown dispensary districts, and it was decided to re-advertise.

THE HOME HELP SCHEME.

A considerable portion of the day's business was the consideration of the home help scheme, and after protracted discussion the necessary arrangements were made.

DUNGARVAN COTTAGE HOSPITAL.

A discussion also took place on the expenditure recommended by Dr. Boyd Barrett in connection with the above, it being eventually decided to advertise for tenders, the acceptance of which will be left in the hands of the Dungarvan Sub-committee.

The Ballyhack Cause Celebrate

The action brought by William Barron against John J. O'Neill, both of Ballyhack, Arthurstown, Co. Wexford, was in the list for hearing on Tuesday before Mr. Justice Dodd in one of the British Courts surviving in Dublin and a city special jury. The cause of action was alleged slander and trespass.

Mr. Dudley White, K.C., with whom were Mr. Swaine, K.C. and Mr. Devitt (instructed by Messrs. M. J. O'Connor and Co.) for the plaintiff, applied that the trial be adjourned to next sittings. He said that an effort had been made to prevent the proceedings being brought in that court. Injunction proceedings had been instituted against the plaintiff in what was described as the High Court of the Republic. The injunction was refused by the tribunal, which had been resorted to at the last moment by the defendant. In the interval between then and now Mr. Barron had been kidnapped and taken to Duncannon Fort by some unknown persons.

Mr. Lynch, K.C., with whom were Mr. Gibson, K.C. and Mr. J. J. Mooney (instructed by Mr. P. R. Buggy, solr., for the defendant, said that the reason his client wanted the case transferred to the other court was that they could not get the Republican police to make a search of plaintiff's premises, to come and give evidence in this court. He did not question the accuracy of Mr. White's statement. He knew nothing about it. He was willing to go on with the trial with the witnesses that he had, or to acquiesce in any order that his lordship might make.

Mr. Justice Dodd remarked that Mr. Lynch might not be so willing to go on if the plaintiff was present. He adjourned the trial to the next sitting.

He then said that he would try the writ would be to bring witnesses over from the bleak and lonely North.

IRISH PRODUCTS LEAGUE.  
A communication was received from the Irish Products League pointing out the necessity of supporting Irish products at the present time. Whatever the political difficulties may be at present, they all decided to give the League their assistance in every way possible.

The Council reported that the children of some of the tenants of the prison dwellings were doing damage to the Council's property.

ERECTING SHEDS.  
On the report of Mr. McGrath, the Council decided to erect two sheds for the use of the bathing machine.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT.  
The Chairman said he was sorry Mr. Grogan was not present, as he was a very important person in the Council. He said that he had not time to go into a full statement of the account, but he would give a general statement of the account.

We publish in another part of this issue a leading article from the New York Herald dealing with the retirement of Judge Martin Keogh from the bench. The Herald's verdict is that the Judge is of Irish birth but leaves it to us to decide.

Martin Keogh is a living example of the irreparable loss Ireland has sustained for generations by the flight from her shores of one of our greatest judges. Had he not left Ireland, his own government fifty years ago Martin Keogh would not have been compelled to seek a foreign land an outlet for his abilities. He would have found at home a field for his labours, and he would be now looked upon as a brilliant eminent not of the American bench but of the Waterford of the country which gave him birth.

Waterford may well be proud of having produced so many men and women of high distinction. We doubt if in any Society in any small town in any country there existed such a galaxy of budding talent as the Catholic Young Men's Society here could boast of half a century ago. The names of our late Thomas Sexton with Martin Keogh is the only living member of the gallant band which was dispersed in the Earlier Seventies in time of a great depression of political, social and commercial in this country. Then there was Edward Moran, brilliant lawyer and litterateur, who died a few years ago in B. K. Moran, Lenny, poet and patriot, and a host of young men who, in their own way, distinguished themselves.

Last month we published an "Fifty Years Ago" column in our issue of the proceedings which took place in the Catholic Young Men's Society in the month of April, 1922, when the members of the Society presided Martin Keogh with a testimonial accompanied by an address illuminated by Mr. Edward Barry, then a mere boy. Still, we are happy to say in the Land of the Living. We do not seem to have got back to the days of the early Seventies in the matter of intellectual pre-eminence, but perhaps it would be fairer to say that Waterford intellect runs in other channels nowadays.

Political unrest has, as it were, turned our younger men aside from the arts and sciences, from literature, poetry, painting, scientific pursuits, etc. The only one of the art in which our young people excel in these days is the art of music.

When we are settled down under our own government there is little doubt that a new generation, its thoughts and actions, diverted from the intensity of political struggle, will find its way back to the arts and sciences and war in these fields world-wide distinction. And when that day arrives, when the genius of our race—the genius which has earned honour for the name of Ireland all the world over—the genius and the fervour which in former days flashed the light of religion and civilization in the dark places—again blaze forth, it is to be hoped that Ireland will retain for her own benefit and will adequately reward and honour men of the stamp of Martin Keogh.

**Waterford Education: Down**

There may be a number of supermen in the world, but there is no one more than the Catholic Bishop of Waterford. He stands for firmness and finality. He stops the almost unbelievable atrocities against the Catholics of that part of Ireland known as "North-East Ulster." We print the following words in another part of the "Waterford News" to-day, a copy of which we have in our possession: "The burning of Desertmartin and of slaughtered Catholics founded a heap, will bring the truth home even to the most callous and the most irreligious. The 'Specials' subsidised by England, are, by the way, our fellow countrymen. The Orange men are burning Catholic villages. Desertmartin cannot stand idly by. Particular must be taken that the Orangemen must be brought to book, and the responsible Irish Government. This of course is a pipe dream."

**LOCAL AND DISTRICT GOSSIP**

**TRAMORE BATHING.**  
 Guilleme Cove is being got ready for the bathing season, which, of course, does not open officially until 1st June. It is to be hoped that this year men bathing at Newtown Cove and Pier Cove will fall in and march to Guilleme, to prevent bathing becoming the accepted thing in Tramore. Last year a good deal of latitude was allowed owing to abnormal tides and the absence of strong and bicycles, prohibited under the British Tan regime. This year all that is changed, and we expect to find (now that British restrictions are off) fewer people complaining of the length of the journey to Guilleme. That excuse won't wash!

**SHIPPING NEWS.**

 The distinguished priest, Father Ambrose Coleman, O.P. S.T.L., is making a brief sojourn in Waterford. He will preach at Mass on Sunday, and also in the evening, in St. Saviour's Church.

**FOLLOW MY LEADER.**  
 It is announced that for the year 1922 the Provisional Government has decided to follow in the footsteps of England as to imposition of Income Tax, Excise, Customs, etc.

How delightful for plundered Ireland—bled white already by England, and now to have its ichor squeezed out of its veins by its Provisional Government!

**PORT PAR.**  
 The ss. Rotterdam, with general cargo, arrived at Tramore on Sunday. Only a minor portion of the latter was, however, discharged locally, and the steamer sailed again on Monday evening for the metropolis, in which place the remainder of her cargo was to be landed.

**WATERFORD AND CARDINAL MERRY DE VAL.**  
 Yesterday took place the opening ceremony in connection with the exhibition of pictures at the Gould Gallery, Regent Street, London, in aid of the Nuns of Ypres Reparation Fund. The American, French, and Belgian Ambassadors, and a host of the city, were in attendance on Sunday days next day. In addition, the Spanish Ambassador, Don Alfonso Meriz de Val, is (says the "Independent") in correspondence to be added to the list of distinguished personalities who have promised to be present. He is brother of Cardinal Merry del Val, and the address of the latter from a branch of the Waterford family of Merry, established in Spain in the year 1660, is introduced by William of Orange after the broken Treaty of Limerick. In another part of this issue we deal with the flight abroad of her most gifted sons. There is a curious coincidence in the fact that the Waterford connection of the Merry del Val family, lapsing three centuries, was renewed some years ago by the marriage of the eldest son of Edmund Downey, Waterford, to a member of the Merry del Val family.

**A FEW CELEBRITY PRIZE WINNERS.**  
 Mr. W. F. Watt, second prize winner in the recent competition for the F.R.S. Coill, was trained by Miss E. Burleigh, L.R.A.M., from 1915 to last January, when her serious illness interrupted his lessons.

**BOXING—YOUNG JACKSON DISQUALIFIED.**  
 In the fifth round of a boxing contest at Clonmel last night Young Jackson (Waterford), who was meeting Paddy Farrell, of Clonmel, was disqualified when he had the fight well in hand. The offence was a back-handed blow. Jackson was giving away weight and height, and he states the decision was not well received.

**WALMONT SEASON OPENS BADLY.**  
 Salmon fishing on the Suir during the past month has been declared to be the worst experienced for years. It seems there is very little fish, as the dullness prevails all the way up the Nore and Barrow.

The destruction wrought by the big seal weighing 4 cwt., which was killed by Sgt.-Major Howlett, I.R.A., between Duncannon and Ballyhack, must be enormous. Seals have a predilection for salmon, and one seal is capable of ruining a whole river. Seals are extremely hard to shoot, and the bullet that laid him low had to be fired from a long range, which bestows excellent marksmanship. The first bullet found a vital spot, and as the huge form struggled in its death throes the water became charged with blood. It is suggested the Department should reward the marksman.

**WEXFORD WATERFORD.**  
 At Wexford Park on Sunday Waterford met Wexford in a friendly Association football game. During the first half Wexford, favoured by the breeze, had matters practically all their own way and kept Waterford pinned below the half-way line. Their frequent efforts to score were, however, fruitless, the Waterford goal proving too good. Nearing the end of the game Waterford, from a good clearance by their goalkeeper, worked down and secured a rather soft goal. Wexford worked rather hard in an endeavour to draw level, but the full time whistle sounded leaving them losers. Final scores were—Waterford, 1 goal; Wexford, nil. (Waterford team—J. Boyle, P. Pender, M. Leahy, W. Simpson, J. P. McGrath, W. Saunders, R. Stone, G. Marks, J. Brown, A. Hales and J. English.)

**DRAMATIC SEQUEL TO BALLYHACK LAWSUIT.**  
 There was a sequel on Sunday to the decision given in the Republican Supreme Court on Monday last in the application of John J. O'Neill, Ballyhack, for an order against Wm. Barron, shopkeeper, same place, to restrain further proceedings in the Court of Southern Ireland in an action brought by the latter to recover damages for alleged slander and trespass against the plaintiff. The application was dismissed by the Court, the President (Mr. Creed Meredith, K.C.) remarking that if the Court granted the injunction people would continually wait until the last stage to see how things would go, with the object of bringing in an application like the one before them.

Following this decision, the action by Mr. Barron would in the ordinary course come on for hearing in the Dublin High Court last Tuesday. On Monday we learned unofficially that on Sunday the plaintiff in the case was arrested by the I.R.A., and further that notices have been served on the plaintiff's witnesses ordering them not to attend the court. Mr. Barron was released on Tuesday.

**IN WATERFORD PRISON.**  
 Messrs. Robert Barron, Shebbagan, and John Whelan, Kinneigh, were arrested by the I.R.A. on Sunday evening and taken to Duncannon barracks, where they were brought before Mr. P. Kennedy on Monday. It is understood that they were charged with again giving an undertaking over the lands of Mr. Howlett, Shebbagan, after giving an undertaking over a week previous not to do so. They were remanded to Waterford prison pending the District Court, when they will be brought up.

**OTHER ARRESTS.**  
 The above is not the only arrest this week reported from Duncannon. Mr. E. Kelly, Saltmills, was also taken into custody in connection with taking possession of a field from Mr. Downes, which Mr. Kelly claims. It appears he gave himself up, and was tried with other men, and on giving an assurance that he would not put cattle into the field again for a month, pending an investigation of the claim, he was released.

Messrs. James McDonald, Carraghmore, and Laurence, Crobie, Monachee, were taken into custody on Monday by I.R.A., and brought to Duncannon barracks, in connection with a charge of interfering with Mr. Peter O'Sullivan, Bangoranga, by going to his place at 10.30 p.m., when it is alleged, threats were used over land purchased by him. They were allowed out on bail of £20 and two sureties of £10 each.

**Ordered Back**

Strike of girls and women in the Waterford boot trade terminated to-day, as a result of an Arbitration Board ordering them back.

**Cheques Ready to Go**

On the resumption of the Bottomley Trust in London to-day a Southampton investor, cross-examined by defendant, said he did not know that when the receiver took possession of the papers and funds of the club they found a large number of letters ready to go out with cheques. Witness added that Mr. Bottomley had heaps of time to send them out before they were taken over.

**Belfast L'endularism**

Belfast Fire Brigade were busy this morning in coping with seven outbreaks of fire, all believed to be due to incendiarism. The premises involved were principally stores connected with wholesale concerns. The damage is estimated at many thousands of pounds.

**The Swing of the British Pendulum**

Mr. Asquith, addressing a Liberal gathering at Blackpool to-day, said the last six months had seen an unmistakable change in the whole political scene and a marked revival of Liberalism. The country had as last become fully conscious of the futility of the Coalition Government. Viscount Gladstone said that Lord Grey would soon be back in the fighting line. He would welcome the appearance of Lord Roberts' Coat on the Liberal platform.

**Irish Peace Efforts**

NO FURTHER ADVANCE TOWARDS A SETTLEMENT.

At Deal Eireann this afternoon the Speaker took the chair at 3.30 p.m. The hopes that had been earlier raised that peace was in sight were dashed when Mr. O'Dwyer, Secretary of the Peace Committee, made the following statement: "I REGRET TO SAY THAT ALL THOUGH FURTHER CONVERSATIONS AND CONFERENCE HAVE TAKEN PLACE, THE NEGOTIATIONS ARE STILL WHERE THEY WERE, AND NO ADVANCE TOWARDS A SETTLEMENT HAS BEEN MADE POSSIBLE. As far as the house is concerned the break is still where it was."

**CATHOLIC VILLAGE BURNED IN ULSTER!**

UNSPEAKABLE CRIME AGAINST CIVILISATION.

MURDERED CATHOLICS FLUNG IN A HEAP.

The Press Association's Magherafelt correspondent telegraphs:—Half the village of Desertmartin was maliciously burned down during the night, and four Catholic young men—Henry McGeehan and James McGeehan, brothers, and John and Francis Higgins, also brothers—were taken from their beds and shot. The premises involved included a corn and flour mill and a licensed house. The bodies of the four men shot were found in a heap.

**Policeman Shot in Belfast**

Shortly after one o'clock this afternoon several men attacked Constable Heslop, Royal Irish Constabulary, on plain clothes duty, while passing along Smilkfield Square, which is within a few yards of the centre of Belfast. Shots were fired at Heslop, who fell to the ground severely wounded. His condition is reported to be critical. The attackers got clear away.

**The Faithlegg (Great Island) Estate**

DEPUTATION FROM THE TENANTS TO REPRESENT THE LATE MR. GEORGE POWER.

On Wednesday last Mr. C. G. Stapleton, 29, Molesworth St., Dublin, agent for the late Mr. H. Power, D.L., of Faithlegg, Co. Waterford, attended at Cheelpoint, Co. Waterford, for the purpose of receiving the half-year's rent due 25th March last. The estate is unpopular because of the late Mr. Power and his father, the late Mr. P. J. Power, D.L., both refused to sell. The tenants on the Great Island, Co. Waterford, portion of the property, acting on instructions from the Irish Farmers' Union, took the opportunity of presenting the agents for the purpose of offering to secure adequate abatements in the rents so as to put them on an equal footing with their purchased brethren all over the county.

The tenants were accompanied by Mr. J. S. McDonald, Chairman of the Unpurchased Tenants Committee of Co. Waterford, and Mr. M. Moran, County Secretary, L.F.O. The following tenants acted as deputation:—Messrs. J. Moran, A. Shanahan, P. O'Connor, P. Costello, James Sherlock, David Kent, P. Power, James McGrath, J. Brunack, and the local secretary of the I.F.U., Mr. N. J. Murphy.

Mr. Murphy briefly introduced the deputation. He stated the increase for the tenants coming out this year would be £20 a year. From what he had seen of the land in his walk through the island that day, he had no hesitation in saying that the rent was far too high. The Great Island land could not be laid down under permanent grass, it would be broken up after 3 or 4 years grazing. He stated that the tenants had been in working such ill-fated land coupled with the high grass lands of Tiperary or Limerick. Mr. McDonald also detailed the many efforts made by the I.F.U. to secure the completion of the land purchase.

Mr. Moran dealt with the cases of those tenants whose lands were submitted all through the past year whose tenants he said could scarcely be expected to read extracts from the proclamation lately issued by the official Labour Party which demanded compulsory tillage of 20 per cent. of all arable land with suspension of payments of all rents, purchase annuities, etc. He would not put forward any demand that day for any specific reduction till after the tenants conference in Enniscliffey on the following Monday.

Both Mr. McDonald and Mr. Moran declared that they were not believers in Bolshevism, they recognised the right of the landlord to a fair rent.

Mr. Stapleton in reply said he fully recognised the difficulties under which the tenants carried on their business. What ever the former owners had done, the present landlord, Mr. O'Sullivan, was doing and anxious to do. He was glad to say that the best relations always existed between the late Mr. Power and his tenants. He hoped that when land purchase became a reality that good landlords who gave reductions like the late Mr. Power would be treated more kindly than those who gave no reductions. He was sorry Mr. Moran did not put forward a definite claim that day, but when that was put forward he would lay all the facts before the court, Mr. Galway.

The deputation then withdrew.

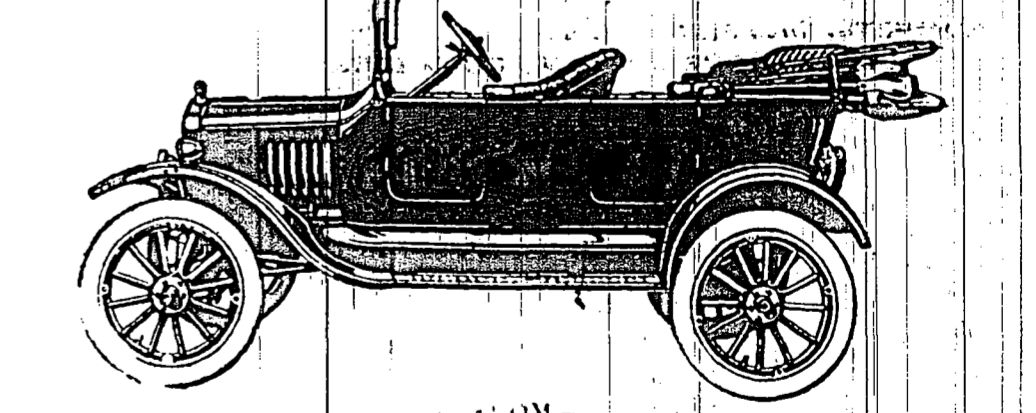
