



Sparkling stickwork and fluctuating fortunes—a pattern based on the spine-tingling events of September 6th—combined to leave the huge attendance oblivious to the bitterly winter-like conditions under which the battle was waged.

The ending was blood curling as Waterford struck back in the face of seemingly impossible odds to pull the game around, a result that earned a vital point and maintained our long unbeaten run in the field of competitive hurling.
