GOVERNOR GIVES STRIKERS ANSWER

RUSSIAN SITUATION SHELVES TURKISH QUESTION

Supreme Council Discusses Problem With Rumanian Representatives Who Seek Information.

Lord Robert Cecil Declares Turks Must Leave Constantinople, Moslems Seek Delay.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—The new Junco-Slay coalition cabinet headed by M. Stoyan Protitch is expected to continue in power only until the Adriatic question has been settled, according to advisers received from Belgrade.

LONDON, Feb. 24.—The Supreme Council discarded the Turkish question temporarily today to discuss the Rumanian situation with the Rumanian representatives who are anxious to know what the powers intend doing.

The Rumanians are represented as saying that they are not without sympathy with the Bolsheviks, but they know whether they have the support of the powers and they are presently requesting a definite statement regarding the policy of the powers themselves toward Russia or their attitude toward the smaller countries who might make peace with them.

As far as is known assurances have been given that at least no definite conclusions will be reached during the morning session.

Attended Meeting Foreign Ministers of Italy and Premier Millerand of France attended today's meeting.

Premier Millerand will remain at least until Thursday and probably the entire week which will give the conference a chance to reach definite conclusions which were held up last week owing to an agreement that only Millerand could act definitely for the French.

Must Leave City Lord Robert Cecil in an article published in the Evening Standard gives the opinion that the Turks must leave Constantinople on the grounds that the maintenance of Turkish sovereignty over Constantinople must be a menace to Europe's tranquility.

What The Strikers Want

WORKING AGREEMENT OF FOURTEEN POINTS REFUSED BY GOV. HARDING

COLON, Feb. 24.—Governor Hardin made a tour of the city tonight and visited several meetings of strikers in an effort to get first hand information as to their grievances. It is his expressed hope that a settlement of the strike can be effected so that business of the port of Colon and Cristobal may not be impeded.

Inspector Lamb, accompanied by Sub-Inspector Fernandez, both mounted, made a tour of inspection of the city this evening and reported that all was serene.

COLON, Feb. 24.—The following are the fourteen points which the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and Railway Shop Laborers, have demanded from Governor Chester Harding. William Stoutie general chairman, stated today.

1. An increase of seven cents an hour, or the monthly equivalent, shall be granted employees of the Panama Canal and Panama Railroad who are members of the U. B. M. W. E. and R. S. L., effective Feb. 1, 1920.
2. An employee in the service for a period of thirty days shall be automatically raised to the rating next above, by the "Bureau of Ratings", and shall be raised in like manner after every three months' service until the maximum rating is attained.
3. When an employee is promoted to a higher grade of work, he shall receive the prescribed salary paid for such class of work; should he be acting for a fellow employee whose rate of pay is higher than his, he shall be promoted to the rating of the employee for whom he is acting. When an employee is required temporarily to perform work of a lower grade, his rating shall not be lowered.
4. Female employees shall receive the same rate of pay as male employees for the performance of a similar class of work.
5. Eight hours shall constitute a working day; and time and a half shall be allowed for all overtime.
6. All monthly employees shall be allowed one lay-over day for each Sunday or holiday they may work.
7. An employee discharged, or suspended from service pending an investigation, and found not at fault, shall be reinstated and reimbursed for all time lost.
8. When an employee is temporarily transferred from one place to another and cannot conveniently reach his home at night, he shall be furnished with board and lodging at the expense of the Panama Canal or Panama Railroad company. Where meals and lodging are not provided by the Panama Canal or Panama Railroad company, the employee shall be reimbursed for all necessary expenses incurred by him, and not later than the time he is paid for the services rendered.
9. An employee about to leave the service shall give five days' notice. Should the Panama Canal or Panama Railroad company desire to terminate the services of an employee, a like period of five days' notice shall be given him.
10. An employee shall not be "discharged on account of reduction of force," and be replaced by a new employee.
11. No employee shall be punished, or discriminated against, for being actively interested during his own time in the business affairs and operations of the U. B. M. W. E. and R. S. L.
12. An employee who considers himself unjustly treated, shall have a fair and impartial hearing before his superiors as soon as is practicable.
13. The grievances of an employee shall at all time be investigated in his presence, or in the presence of his representative, or both.
14. All members of committees seeking to adjust grievances of members of the U. B. M. W. E. and R. S. L., shall be granted leaves of absence to attend to said business.

GOVERNOR HARDING'S REPLY The chief executive of the Panama Canal replied to the union's demands as follows: "In reply to your letter of the 17th instant, I have to advise you that my attitude towards the rates of pay and conditions of employment of our silver employees remains as stated in my notice issued the 10th instant. "In accordance with the policy adopted, the cost of living and the rates of pay will be investigated in March, June, September and December, and when adjustments are found to be necessary to maintain a proper balance they will be made, effective April 1, July 1, October 1 and January 1, respectively. "Referring to the copy of the agreement enclosed in your letter, you are advised that I will not enter into an agreement, written or otherwise, with a committee of employees concerning rates of pay or conditions of employment. These matters can be fixed only by administrative order subject to change by the same authority."

DEMOCRATIC PEACE TREATY RANKS MAY BREAK

Influential Senators Move for Caucus, Revives Republican Hopes of Ratification

Leaders Concede Republican Ratification Resolution Will Command More Votes Now

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—The possibility of a substantial break in the Democratic peace treaty ranks in the Senate, inspired the influential Democratic senators, to take steps today to discuss a possible change in the party's policy and to revive the hopes of the Republicans that the treaty might be rejected with the Republican reservations attached at the last session of Congress.

Will Command More Votes The administration leaders concede that if a caucus was taken tomorrow on the Republican ratification proposal, it would command more Democratic votes than it last November.

To Work on Treaty The uninterrupted Senate consideration of the Versailles treaty until a vote is reached on the ratification issue, began Thursday under the plan announced by Republican leader Lodge this afternoon.

Securus Report Senator H. C. Stephenson, the Democratic leader, said that the Republicans claim that 22 Democrats have shown willingness to accept the Republican reservations, without change were "probably exaggerated."

Holds Up Sale The Supreme Court has formally enjoined the shipping board from selling 29 of the 30 ex-German passenger liners, recently offered for sale.

The court consented to the board's request to exclude from the injunction order the steamer Suvaco which was sold for \$2,000,000. William H. Hearst who brought the proceedings, furnished \$200,000 bond to indemnify the board against loss.

Adopts Conference Report The Senate adopted the conference report on the railroad bill embodying legislation for the reorganization of the railroads after their release from Federal control. The bill now goes to President Wilson for his signature.

Governor Harding Issues Ultimatum To Striking Silver Roll Employees

Governor Harding yesterday issued his ultimatum to the striking silver roll employees, which reads as follows: TO EMPLOYEES ON THE SILVER ROLL.

All employees who do not report for work at their regular stations at their usual time for duty Thursday, the 26th instant, will be considered as no longer employees of the Panama Canal or Panama Railroad, and will be deprived of Canal quarters after that date. Rents will be reimbursed corresponding to the unexpired portion of the month.

All employees, whether occupying Canal quarters or living in the Republic of Panama, who do not report for duty on the 26th instant, will be considered as having voluntarily quit, and if reemployed will be given a lower rate of pay as provided in existing regulations.

MUST RETURN TO WORK THURSDAY OR LOSE JOBS

Canal Authorities Believe Ultimatum Will Cause Wholesale Desertions from Strikers' Ranks

Strikers Reported to Have Decided to Stay Out Until Demands are Granted and Profit Gains

Complete returns from all the divisions and departments of the Panama Canal were not available last night but officials estimated that about ninety per cent or 14,000 of the silver employees, members of the maintenance of way union and sympathizers had answered the strike call.

Following a conference with President Letourne at the presidential residence yesterday morning a handbill was circulated advising the strikers of his warning to respect laws to maintain order and not to block highways, to hinder business and traffic in either Panama or Colon.

The ultimatum reached the hands of William Stoutie, general chairman of the maintenance of way union and at 4 o'clock the secretaries of the locals met in secret session at the union's office at Central avenue and Nineteenth street.

No details as to what transpired at the meeting could be learned save that the governor's note had been discussed and that the general consensus of opinion was that the strikers would stand firm until their fourteen points were conceded.

Various rumors of violence and bloodshed both in Panama and Colon were reported but inquiries at police headquarters failed to substantiate the reports.

In the event that the strike is not broken by the governor's ultimatum it is said that the Canal heads will fill the places of the strikers with imported labor but as yet no definite plan has been announced.

It was also reported that Governor Harding had cabled to the authorities at Washington to disregard any messages from the strikers here but this could not be substantiated officially.

In the face of the clause of the governor's ultimatum which declares that those workers who adopt the strike's cause and thus forfeit their right to quarters it is said that landlords owning houses in Calidonia, Gobernador and San Miguel have decided to rent all vacant houses and rooms solely to displaced other employees and some even intimated that no rents would be collected until after the strike was settled.

GEORGE WASHINGTON

On the occasion of his birthday of George Washington we tried to write something different about that great American and only succeeded in negatively speaking, in putting our foot in it. We are glad that our attention has been called to the fact that in writing of the human side of Washington rather than the official and historical we were liable to give a wrong impression to some of our readers. No one has greater respect than we for the first President of the United States and the man who made possible that greatest of Republics.

Besides it would have been better to have written of the Washington of Valley Forge, that sorely tried man with a pitiful army of starved, frozen lads whose faith in their leader made them stick to him through a whole winter of fatigues and suffering more terrible than common human flesh could bear.

Through it all George Washington stood firm with the courage that does not know defeat. We wondered at the courage of such men when the drive of the Germans seemed almost certain to succeed; it was the courage that Washington displayed for a full winter at Valley Forge.

Washington was not only beset by these hardships but also by political enemies who were not ashamed to play politics for the downfall of their leader. This aroused the indignation of our brave French Ally, Lafayette, who wrote to his commander-in-chief:

"I see plainly that America can defend herself in proper measures are taken; but I begin to fear that she may be lost by herself and her own sons."

This was not a very cheering message to Washington in the dead of that terrible winter. Congress had left him without a quarter master to supply the men with food, shelter or clothing. He was well aware of the intrigues against his leadership. A situation could hardly look more hopeless.

Yet with his strong heart that knew not fear or discouragement he replied:

"We must not, in so great a contest, expect nothing but sunshine. I have no doubt that everything happens for the best, that you shall triumph over our misfortunes, and in the end be happy; and then, my dear Marquis, if you will give me your company in Virginia, we will laugh at our past difficulties, and the folly of others."

"You are a prophet, due almost entirely to the courage and leadership of George Washington, the things he hoped for in a seemingly hopeless position, a hopeless time, really came to pass."

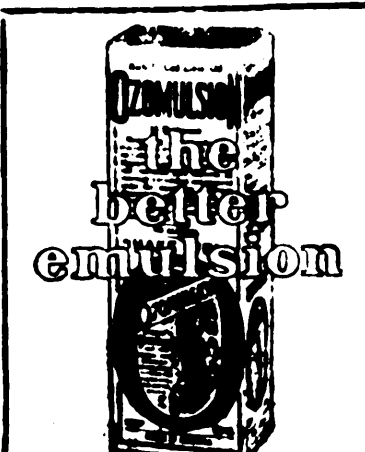

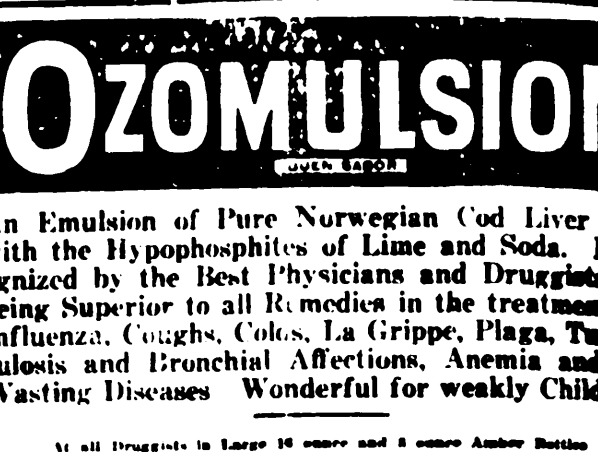

THE WORLD IN SPORT

NEW YORK, Feb. 24. While athletes in almost every form of sport will represent nearly every country on the globe during the Olympic Games at Antwerp, Belgium, this year, a recent survey of the field on sports in Spain does not give promise of an extended entering of Spanish representatives in many of the events on the varied program.

All efforts to win the Spaniard from his national pastimes of bull-fighting and pelota have met with scant favor so far. He may say that bull-fighting is conducted mainly for foreigners on Spanish soil but just the same if all the foreigners in that country were gathered together they would form only a very small proportion of the crowds which flock to Plaza de Toros in Madrid and other bull rings throughout the country on Sundays.

Golfing played in the vicinity of the British Isles by foreigners and Spaniards who have lived abroad usual interest only has been aroused in the Scotch game, however, as far as the public is concerned. Last January this diffidence was illustrated forcibly when the final match round for the King's Cup was played on the Madrid links, and a leading newspaper announced that fact the following morning but failed to mention either the name or the score of the winner.

Attempts to introduce tennis and football have not produced a national following as yet and as for boxing some of the newspapers have criticized it severely as a brutal pastime. Polo is played to some extent but this is done to the proximity of the British garrison at Gibraltar and the encouragement given it by King Alfonso and several noblemen but it is not a game for a general public.

Associated football was introduced to Spain about 20 years ago and is now popular amongst the younger generation. This invigorating pastime seems to be gaining in popularity every year and some look upon it as a possible rival of bull-fighting in the future. If Olympic games are made it will be in the form of tennis competitions.

Rowing

Philadelphia is desirous of holding the national rowing regatta next July.

A special committee has been appointed by the naval board of the Schuylkill Navy to present the matter to the national association of amateur oarsmen when that organization meets in New York in March. Philadelphia oarsmen desire the regatta in view of the favorable conditions existing locally and the excellent course available.

College Athletics

Although the meet will not be held until April 20 and May 1, eastern and western colleges are forwarding their entries in larger volume than ever before. decided by the Supreme Council in a conference to be held with financial experts. This decision reached today and is in no way connected with the earlier London decision to call a conference between the finance ministers of the European powers to discuss the financial situation of the world.

Issues Statement
The Supreme Council this afternoon issued the following official statement: "The committee which border the frontiers of Soviet Russia and whose independence of de facto autonomy they have recognized were to approach them and ask for advice as to what attitude they should take with regard to Soviet Russia, the allied governments would reply that they cannot accept the responsibility of advising them to continue a war which may be injurious to their own interests. Still less would they advise to adopt a policy of aggression towards Russia."

Will Render Support
If, however, Soviet Russia attacks their legitimate frontiers the allies will give them every possible support.

The allies cannot enter into diplomatic relations with Soviet Russia in view of their past experience and until they arrive at the conviction that the Bolsheviks have come to an end and that the government of Moscow is ready to conform its methods and diplomatic conduct to those of all the civilized governments.

Insist On Answer
BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 24. According to La Nacion's correspondent in Rome, the allies sent a new note to M. Tsumbitch, head of the Jugoslav delegation Wednesday insisting that the Belgrade government or its representative in Paris answer the allies regarding the Adriatic settlement.

The correspondent confirms his version as published by La Nacion this morning concerning the allied reply to Wilson's Adriatic note and adding that the reply drawn up by Lloyd George was dispatched after having been modified without any change in its original substance but with a softening in tone.

Decides To Treat
PARIS, Feb. 24. The foreign offices of the Parisian newspapers who are now in London report that the Supreme Council has decided to treat with the Russian Bolsheviks in a roundabout way, although perhaps the French are opposed

TUG-BOAT CREWS STRIKE HINDERS CEREAL EXPORTS

More Than 100,000 Tons Held-Up in Estimate—River Ports Paralyzed—Chauffeurs Use Violence
(By The Associated Press)

BIENOS AIRES, Feb. 24. With the movement of overseas ships in and out of Buenos Aires greatly delayed by the strike of the tug boat crews and with virtually all the river and coastwise steamers idle, dispatches from the important export port of Rosario say that to steamers, the majority of them oversea vessels, are tied up there on account of the strike of the stevedores and that more than 100,000 tons of cereals for export are held up.

Other Ports Paralyzed
Other river ports are also paralyzed by the strikes of the stevedores and the river steamship crews with the result that Argentine commerce is facing a serious situation.

The Mihanovich company which controls virtually all the river and coastwise lines, after laying up their ships yesterday and discharging the crews formally notified the government that the solution of the strike is in its hands.

Chauffeurs Use Violence
The striking chauffeurs of Buenos Aires are committing acts of violence on private automobiles owned by those who persist in driving their own cars. Nitric acid "bombs" are thrown in some machines running on the highway and knives are used on tires when the machines are left unattended. Many automobile owners are driving armed.

CONSCRIPT ARMY TO BE ABOLISHED BY MARCH 1

LONDON, Feb. 24. Introducing the army estimate in the House of Commons yesterday, Secretary of War Churchill announced that conscription would be abolished on March 31 and that within a month after that date the last conscript would be entitled to be released.

Max Raised Army
He declared that Britain had succeeded in raising and organizing an entirely new volunteer army which at the time that conscription lapsed would number about 20,000 excluding the troops serving in India.

It is intimated that immediate formal recognition of the Bolsheviks is improbable but informal relations will be opened because of the necessities of the economic situation.

WARSAW, Feb. 24. The Polish note to the allies outlining the proposed terms which Poland will submit to the Soviets is being examined by the Diet's committee on foreign affairs.

Poland's demands include Russia's renunciation of the territory west of the 1772 frontier of Poland and Russia's recognition of the Baltic States' independence. It also declares Poland's interests in Ukraine and asks guarantees against Bolshevik propaganda and demands war indemnities from the Soviets.

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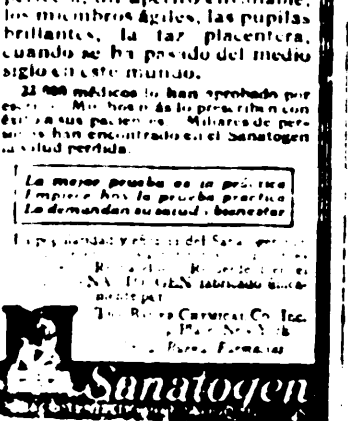


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
