LIVING COST'S RISE CAUSES URUGUAY TO STOP WHEAT EXPORTS

(By The Associated Press) MONTEVIDEO, March 27.—The rise in the cost of living in Uruguay is a basis for the proposed government decree forbidding the exportation of wheat.

The minister of finance has announced that the decree will be issued unless Congress enacts a measure providing for the free importation of wheat which is opposed by the agriculturalists.

In the meantime the bakers have declared a strike for the betterment of working conditions.

STEAMER GIVES OUT "S-O-S" FOR HELP

Ortega, Bound for Valparaiso from Liverpool, Radios of Distress. Forward Hold is Full of Water.

Heavy Seas Coming from Leeward Assail Crippled Ship. Captain Report: He will Try to Make Port.

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, March 27.—The steamer Ortega bound from Liverpool to Valparaiso last night sent out a wireless message giving its position as 52 degrees north latitude and longitude 5 degrees west and that it was in distress with heavy seas coming from leeward.

The Ortega asked for assistance in the form of tugs to tow her back to port.

Reported to Lloyd's. The captain of the disabled ship has reported to Lloyd's saying that he would try to make Fishguard unaided and that hold number one was full of water.

The Ortega carries one hundred and twenty first class, one hundred second class, and one hundred and forty third class passengers.

The steamer Paraguaya reports that it answered the calls of the Ortega and is now standing by ready to render any assistance necessary.

BLAMES RADICALS FOR RECENT STRIKE

Brazilian Government Say Confidencemen General Walk-Off Orders by Labor Federation Is Result of Foreign Propaganda

(By The Associated Press) RIO DE JANEIRO, March 27.—The government issued a statement tonight declaring that the general strike recently called by the Federation of Labor is the result of the propaganda carried out by foreign radicals and is in no way connected with the Leopoldina railway strike.

The statement adds that the government is well prepared to deal with the situation.

Troops have been placed at strategic points of the city but no serious disorders are reported.

Last night the police surrounded the hall in which the striking waiters were holding their meeting and arrested 200.

LEAGUE DEFECT WAS RESULT OF "CONSPIRACY"

Senator John Sharp Williams Says He Would Rather be Dog and Bay at Moon Than Be Senator Any Longer

(By The Associated Press) JACKSON, March 28.—Addressing a joint session of the Missouri legislature, Senator John Sharp Williams declared that it was the deliberate purpose of those who fought the ratification of the Peace Treaty to prevent the peace and bring about the death of President Woodrow Wilson.

Great Conspiracy. Senator Williams declared that historians would brand the present time as the period of the great conspiracy by which the League of Nations was defeated in the United States Senate.

"Do you blame me for saying that I would rather be a dog and bay at the moon than spend one minute in the Senate after the expiration of my term of office?" he asked.

ANTI-RED ARMY MOVES TO SOUTH

British and French Officers Confer With General Committee Directing So-Called Government

(By The Associated Press) CONSTANTINOPLE, March 27.—The anti-Bolshevik army operating in the vicinity of Novorossiisk and moving southward toward Batum, has established its capital at Sochi on the Black Sea coast where the general committee is directing the so-called government.

British General Keith who recently visited Sochi discussed the situation with Filippov, the chairman of the committee, for the liberation of the Black Sea province.

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LID GOES BACK ON IF FLU APPEARS

Schools, Theatres, Churches Circus and Clubhouses May Now Resume Regular Programs.

Within Certain Limits, Public Is Free Once Again to Assemble. No Easter Vacation for Zone Schools.

Restrictions which have been enforced by the health department, Panama Canal, as a precaution against the spread of influenza are now ended.

At the instance of Col. H. C. Fisher, chief health officer, the removal of restrictions became effective this morning.

Colon Compliments Public. Colonel Fisher yesterday explained, however, that if the influenza situation became worse, or if the public failed to observe further precautions outlined by the health department, the restrictions would again be imposed for an indefinite time and rigorously enforced. The Colonel complimented and thanked the public for the good spirit with which the restrictions were observed.

Schools Open To-Morrow

A. R. Lang, superintendent of canal zone schools, announced yesterday that all schools would open tomorrow morning.

Public Free to Assemble

Theatres may now open, the ship and circus circuses may give performances, canal zone club houses may resume their regular programs, and within certain limits the public is free to assemble for business, recreational, religious or social functions.

No Easter Vacation

Mr. Lang explained that in view of the quarantine period, there would be no Easter vacation for the zone schools, but that Good Friday would be a holiday.

In announcing the removal of influenza restrictions, Col. Fisher authorized the following statement:

Col. Fisher Issues Statement

The restriction prohibiting assemblies of people to prevent the spread of influenza is modified practically withdrawn as an official requirement to take effect Sunday morning, March 29. In the cities of Panama and Colon assemblies must be held only with the approval of the local health officer, and under such sanitary restrictions as he imposes. In general, he will take all possible precautions to prevent overcrowding and to insure the proper cleansing of drinking cups and eating utensils.

Small Audiences Required

Places of amusement that are liable to overcrowding will be required to obtain specific authority before opening and to satisfy the health officer that they will rigorously observe the same.

Overland Flu, Some Dead

There were two more deaths at Colon yesterday, both at Colon hospital, and one of these involved a person who previously denied having influenza and who strenuously refused to have been hospitalized against his will. Within twenty-four hours after admission to the hospital this person was dead.

Maintain Due Care

He added that the murdered man was riding from his residence in Monetown to Dublin castle when the street car was held up at Hall's Bridge and boarded by four masked men who took the unfortunate man outside on the road where they shot him dead.

The passengers on the car, among whom was the murderer, were taken to the health officer and with horror at the suddenness of a call to the hospital. Within twenty-four hours after admission to the hospital this person was dead.

Official Have Ample Authority

The sanitary rules and regulations for the cities of Panama and Colon, that have been promulgated by the President of the Republic, give the health officers of those two cities ample authority to deal with conditions dangerous to human life or health, and there are similar laws and executive orders.

ATLANTIC SIDE NOW FREE FROM FLU QUARANTINE

Along The Waterfront

Captain J. L. Byrd issued Or-
der at Noon Yesterday Re-
Opening Theatres, Churches
and Assembly Places

COLON, March 27.—At noon to-
day Captain J. L. Byrd, health offi-
cer for Colon and Cristobal, is-
sued an order stating that theatres,
churches, cabarets, and assembly
rooms could now re-open.

Captain Byrd said that there was
no little danger of the flu spread-
ing. They had recorded in all 381
cases and five deaths on this side,
but the number of cases during the
past few days had been so low that
Colon Fisher, the chief health of-

icer, had decided to lift the ban
and this Sunday the theatres and
churches would be opened again.

Theatres Open To-night

The America and Strand theatres
will re-open this Sunday evening.
Inquiries made this afternoon
found that the Cinema Pan-American
had arranged a banner pro-
gram, including the famous pic-
ture La Apache, featuring Doris
Dutton and the Paramount comedy
"The Voice of Gladness."

At the Cecilia theatre, the largest
and most ventilated amusement
palace in Central America, Dorothy
Dutton is the feature number, this
charming actress appearing in "Turn-
ing the Tables." The program includes Paramount
marionette and Pathé news pictures.

Churches Re-Open

At the city churches Sunday, spe-
cial Palm Sunday services, will be
held, and lodges and societies have
arranged meetings arranged for next
week will hold them.

The order issued by Dr. Byrd
has to be signed by each theatre
owner, minister or proprietor of a
chapel and is as follows:

Official Instructions

Permit is hereby given to
party or parties named below to
open their place or places of as-
sembly, provided the following
rules are complied with:

"Only one-half of seating space
capacity shall be occupied at
any one time."

"Smoking, spitting, coughing and
sneezing are prohibited in any
place or assembly. The offenders
shall be expelled immediately and
may be subject to a fine of \$5 gold
for each and every offense. Fine
to be imposed by the health
officer."

"All available windows, doors,
ventilators and other openings shall
be open at all times in order to in-
sure adequate and thorough ven-
tilation."

"The floor, walls and furniture
of the place shall be kept absolute-

HELD INSPECTS RAILWAY STABLES

New Block of Concrete Build-
ing Near Abattoir Will Be
Opened April 1. Total Cost
Was \$150,000

COLON, March 27.—The fine new
Panama railroad stables are near-
ing completion and will be opened
for service on April 1.

This fine block of concrete build-
ings is situated near the abattoir
on Saville street and Broad
Ave. and its cost \$150,000. It is
considered the finest set of build-
ings of its kind in Central America
and when completed will have ac-
commodations for 400 horses.

The old stables on Ninth street
will be closed down April 1 by de-
cree of the Health Department
and the stable and wagon
owners will have to use the new
stables on Broadway.

Modern Accommodation

The abattoir is at the top of 400 steps in Con-
stantine Hill, and each repre-
sentative will have accommo-
dations for his horse and carriage, a
locke, electric light and run-
ning water. Shower baths and
toilets have been built and the
stable which includes keeping the
stable clean at all times.

May Enter All Buildings

The health officer or his rep-
resentative may enter upon or with-
in any premises at any time for the
purpose of inspecting same.

"The use of the common drink-
ing cup or glass is prohibited. San-
itary paper cups must be provided
instead."

"The responsible party or parties
accepting this permit shall take the
necessary measures to enforce the
above rules and shall be held re-
sponsible for any violation of same."

"This permit shall be revoked and
assembly closed, on failure to comply with the work which the building
division had done."

Harry Adams In Charge

Harry Adams will be super-
intendent. He has had charge of
the stable for many years and will
be assisted by a foreman and seven stable hands.

There is a large wagon shed to
take charge of carriages.

The order issued to-day by the
health officer closing down all
other stables is as follows:

Byrd Closes Old Stables

On April 1, 1930, the private sta-
bles located on Ninth street, Col-
on will be closed and all occupants are
requested to vacate said stables on
the above date.

"The owners of these stables are
hereby given until April 10th, 1930
to demolish and remove their sta-
bles. If the stables are not de-
molished on or before the 10th of
April, 1930, the Health Depart-
ment will demolish same at the expense of the demolition to the



It was immediately preceded by the four sons and other members of his family and followed by students, monks and Taoists.

American Navy To Equal England's In Fighting Power by 1924, Butler Of Navy Committee Tells House

BOQUETE NEWS COL. FISHER LIFTS

NO SIGN OF LET-UP IN SHIP-BUILDING INDUSTRY YET

World's Merchant Tonnage Will Not be Normal Before Eighteen Months or Two Years, Declares Expert

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 28.—There has been no sign of a let-up in the American shipbuilding industry since the government lifted its forbidding shipbuilding from private concerns, says E. H. Bug, naval engineer of the giant of the New York shipbuilding corporation.

Vessels aggregating 125,000 tons have been ordered since the government ban was lifted, said Mr. Bug in an address, the other day, to the members of the Engineers' Club. "But," he added, "it will be 18 months or two years before the world's merchant tonnage will be normal."

Advantages which American merchant marine enjoys over the British, Mr. Bug pointed out, are 80 per cent of the American ships are oil burners, while only 10 per cent of the British ships can use oil for fuel. This, he said, gives the American mariner an advantage in the cost of crews, due to the elimination of many stokers.

URGES ARGENTINIAN WOMEN TO CAST OFF LETHARGY

BUENOS AIRES, March 28.—Dr. Alicia Moreau, a social worker widely known in South America, who has recently returned from Washington, has been telling the Argentine women that the women of the United States enjoy more liberty than those of any other country and urging them to awake from their lethargy and take lessons from their sisters in North America.

She declared in an address the other day that women of the United States brought about prohibition, that they revolutionized their nation through work and propaganda and are now in such a strong position that they intend to attain even greater rights of independence."

MONDO, March 28.—The governing body of the International Labor office has decided that the next international labor conference will be held in Geneva early next year to consider what steps are to be taken in the various countries to make effective the decisions of the Geneva and Washington conferences.

Public Is Thanked

Disease Not Yet Gone

"Influenza has not by any means yet disappeared. There is still very great need to be careful, and to keep out of crowds, as has been so often enjoined. Coughing and sneezing spread the disease. If we are careless influenza may still become a dangerous epidemic disease, making it necessary that added restrictions be imposed."

Mr. Morrell Co-operates

Colonel Fisher further said that in the enforcement of the necessary restrictions against overrunning theatres he had the hearty support of George Morrell of Colon, under whose direction several Isthmian theatres are operated.
