Gov't offices moving to Meadowcrest

The Crystal River branch offices of the tax collector, property appraiser, clerk of circuit courts and supervisor of elections will be closed until Tuesday, Jan. 17. All the offices will be relocated from their current location on U.S. 19 in Crystal River to the West Citrus Government Center at 1540 N. Meadowcrest Blvd., Crystal River.

The last day of business at the old offices was Jan. 11.

During the transition, government services will still be available at offices in Inverness. If assistance is needed during the closure, call the Citrus County Courthouse at 352-341-6400.

Rip current warning for Gulf beaches

TALLAHASSEE — State emergency management officials said there is a high to moderate risk of rip currents along Florida Gulf coast beaches.

Beachgoers are urged to use extreme caution Thursday, especially if red flags are flying.

Deputy State Meteorologist Michelle Palmer said strong winds over the Gulf of Mexico are causing breaking waves of five to seven feet. That's causing rough conditions along the Florida Panhandle beaches. She warned of a moderate risk along the rest of the state's Gulf beaches.

A red flag means conditions in the Gulf of Mexico are considered dangerous.

Rip currents are narrow, powerful currents that run perpendicular to the beach.

CRYSTAL RIVER — Opponents of a controversial U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service proposal to quiet the buzz the around a popular recreation area in King's Bay and to introduce other rules sat for a face-to-face meeting with the other side

Wednesday.

A group that included Crystal River Mayor Jim Farley, City Manager Andy Houston, Citrus County Commissioner Joe Meek and members of a citizens group (Save Crystal River) opposed to the proposed rules headed to Jacksonville for the meeting. Attorney Clark Stillwell was also part of the group.

“They’re not going to make any commitments and I don’t expect them to, but we are hoping we made our concerns clear and that it will change some

The group’s mission was an effort to express concerns about economic impact and the possibility of policy creep in the area leading to the river, according to Houston.

minds before the final rules are released,” Houston said via telephone after the meeting.

He said their group did not get any concrete date for the release of the rules either.

The controversial proposal, which was unveiled in June, calls for, among other things, the area around Buzzard Island, the sports zone, to become a slow zone for boaters in a bid to protect the manatees from propeller injuries and

County clears debris-littered site in Crystal River

An 11-acre dump site in Crystal River was buzzing with county workers this week rather than mosquitoes.

“We started Monday — to give you an idea of the size of this,” said Larry Brock, deputy public works director. “Monday, two days, 212 tons and we are only 40 percent complete. I’ve been in this business 30 years. It’s the largest one I’ve ever encountered. It’s an area that’s knee deep across 11 acres. It’s phenomenal.”

Brock was speaking Wednesday at a meeting in Beverly Hills of the Citrus County Council (CCC), giving its members updates on the public works projects.

The Citrus County Mos-

quito Control District brought the existence of the dump site to the attention of the Citrus County Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) last month, when Joel Jacobson, director of the mosquito control district, stated in a letter that eight sentinel chickens in Crystal River tested positive for mosquito-transmitted viruses from mosquitoes hatching at a property at 1660 N. Nightshade Drive.

At a December meeting of the BOCC, Jacobson said Mosquito Control has treated the site for about a year at a cost of \$15,000 to spray it from the air. He asked the BOCC to clean up the site.

Ken Frink, director of public works, told the BOCC at the December meeting it was the worst

public dump site his department had ever come across. Frink estimated the cleanup cost at \$40,000.

On Wednesday, Frink told the *Chronicle* the cleanup was going better than anticipated.

“We didn’t find any surprises out there,” Frink said.

The final cost would come in under his December estimate, according to Frink.

Brock told CCC members on Wednesday that he would not debate about how this dump site

was allowed to exist.

“I will tell you that when it landed in public works, it was the end of October,” Brock said. “The middle of November, we had plans to clean this site.”

Work crews would work Thursday, although not on Friday, Brock said.

“Monday we should be out of there,” Brock said. “And hopefully that will help the mosquito situation.”

A CCC member asked Brock if the owner could

Candidate OK with seating plan for forum

CRYSTAL RIVER — A candidate for Citrus County Commission who threatened to boycott a political forum unless she could sit 6 feet from her opponents is promising to attend regardless of the seating arrangements.

Renee Christopher-McPheeters had told Debbie Ressler she feared for her safety sitting too closely to fellow District 1 candidates Dennis Damato and Ron Kitchen during Saturday’s forum at American Legion Post 155 in Crystal River.

Christopher-McPheeters, however, said Wednesday she will attend the forum, sponsored by the Nature Coast Republican Club and Citrus Republican Women’s Club.

“I’ll sit wherever I need to sit,” she said. “If I’m asked to sit at the table with my opponents, I’ll do it. I’m not afraid.”

Damato, the two-term incumbent, is seeking re-election. His opponents so far are

Christopher-McPheeters and Crystal River Councilman Ron Kitchen. There are no Democrats in the race; official ballot qualifying is in June.

Christopher-McPheeters exchanged a series of New Year’s Day emails with Ressler, an officer in both clubs charged with arranging participation in Saturday’s forum. Christopher-McPheeters forwarded the emails to the *Chronicle*.

At first Christopher-McPheeters wanted to make sure she’d have use of a podium and microphone. Then her requests took another turn.

“My husband insists that I must be at least 6 feet away from Dennis Damato and Ron Kitchen and not between either as he is looking out of my security...” Christopher-McPheeters wrote.

She noted that Damato

Instructor wants named cleared

INVERNESS — A Lecanto High School agriculture teacher plans to appeal a five-day suspension for inappropriate behavior in the classroom.

William “Steve” Richardson has already served his suspension. His attorney, Charles Holloman, said

Richardson wants to clear his name.

On Tuesday, about 40 parents and students attended the Citrus County School Board meeting in Richardson’s support, saying he is a great teacher and backer of Future Farmers of America.

“If not for Mr. Richardson ... I would not be up here saying to you what is truly in my heart,” Amber Maynard, vice president of the

Lecanto High FFA club. “It would be a shame if other students don’t get to have the experience I’ve learned from Mr. Richardson and the FFA class.”

And the Agricultural Alliance of Citrus County discussed his case Monday when one of Richardson’s supporters brought it to the board’s attention. The board said it would send a letter to the district vouching for Richardson’s character and emphasizing the importance of his continued work in the FFA program.

The suspension is the result of an

deaths. Officials say the slow speeds are necessary to protect manatees from fast boats. The current speed limit in the sport zone is 35 mph.

The rule changes also could affect scuba diving in Three Sisters Springs and prevent entry in smaller springs if the weather is cold enough.

Public input on the proposal ended last August, but the U.S. Wildlife Service has yet to make decision about the rules. During public input meetings, hundreds of residents turned out to either speak in support or opposition to the rules. Supporters of the rules have pointed to the need to protect the manatees from boat propellers and the safety of non-boaters in the area.

Opponents of the rules also brought up the safety issue at the meeting,

according to Chuck Underwood, spokesman for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife and based in Jacksonville.

"Human safety and that of species (manatees) is really high on our list of things we are giving consideration to," Underwood said.

He said the delegation repeated a lot of what has already been heard during the input sessions, but that his agency is paying particular attention to economic impact issues and safety.

"I think the meeting went well, but like I said, most of what was said was not new, but we are listening,"

he said.

Underwood could not give a definite date for the release of the new rules, but can only say the timeline is fluid.

"I have heard anything from the end of January to sometime in February," Underwood added.

Last summer, Underwood had hoped a decision would be forthcoming before the manatees returned en masse to their winter home in November.

When a decision comes down, it will be issued out of the Jacksonville office of U.S. Fish and Wildlife.

Underwood had said one of three things is likely to happen:

- Modify the plan, "we can take away rules, but can't make it more severe";
- withdraw the proposal entirely;
- or go ahead with the plan.

The City of Crystal River and county officials have been on record that if the agency introduces the new rules as they are, there will be a lawsuit.

But during a recent gathering about the proposal at Crystal River City Hall, attorney Stillwell warned

about how expensive a lawsuit could be and thought coming up with an alternative proposal and engaging in talks with the feds could move the

controversy to a better conclusion.

Employee arrested in couple's killing

With 8-foot stone walls and a guarded gate securing the Tampa area's most exclusive homes, the Avila neighborhood is a wealthy enclave home to famous sports figures. That's why authorities figured it was unlikely someone got in from the outside and gunned down a retired physician and his wife at their 7,000-square-foot mansion.

Hillsborough County Sheriff David Gee said Hector Rivera, 76, and his 55-year-old wife Debra knew their attacker: It was the man they employed as Debra Rivera's driver and personal assistant. Julian Ospina-Florez, 31, is charged with two counts of attempted murder and appeared in court Wednesday.

Ospina-Florez didn't speak during the brief appearance. He has denied the killings, telling deputies that an unknown man burst into the home and attacked him, tied him up and left him in a bathroom.

BOCC vows to protect water

Former County Administrator Gary Kuhl appeared before commissioners Tuesday to support a resolution to protect water resources.

Kuhl also is a past director of the Southwest Florida Water Management District.

County Administrator Brad Thorpe said the district had been going through a transformation.

"Some of it is OK, but some of it might leave us a little vulnerable to protecting our water resources," Thorpe said. "Mr. Kuhl, with his past experiences of this, realizes the importance of trying to protect our water resources. We're water-rich. Areas to the south of us are

water-poor."

Kuhl said a study he reviewed in 1978 as a young environmental engineer — The Four River Basin Study — outlined alternatives that would put well fields in Citrus and Hernando counties and as far north as the Suwannee River to get future water supplies for the Tampa Bay area.

"There are southern neighbors who look north for their possible future water supply," Kuhl said. "And remember The Villages that is just to the east of us that is going to need a greater supply as time goes on."

Kuhl said he gave credit to Nancy Argenziano, who pushed through legislation some years back for local sources first. It meant counties such as Hillsborough and Pinellas had to exhaust all of their water supply

sources before they could go to Citrus, Hernando or Pasco counties to put in a well field or seek other water supplies.

Commissioner Dennis Damato presented the resolution to support funding of Florida's water management districts established in Chapter 373 of Florida Statutes. The chapter also strongly discourages the transfer of water resources across water management district or county boundaries and establishes that water resources belong to the public and are not a commodity to be bought and sold.

The resolution also supports adequate funding for the water man-

agement districts, so they can manage and protect regional and local water sources.

It opposes the centralized command and control of regional and local water resources within the executive and legislative branches of government or by statewide board or authority. It also opposes any effort to move water from public ownership to ownership or total control by private interests.

The board voted unanimously for the resolution.

Ribbon-cutting marks Tompkins Street completion

Project done in two phases

INVERNESS — After two years and \$1.3 million, the upgrade to Tompkins Street in Inverness is completed.

City officials, residents and local business people attended the brief celebratory ribbon-cutting Wednesday.

At the previous week's city council meeting, Inverness City Manager Frank DiGiovanni said, "I don't know how Tompkins Street could have turned out any better. It's a beautiful addition to the city of Inverness and an important traffic reliever. It materialized as we had envisioned, and I think that we as a community will see only benefits coming from that road. This is an investment for the city and a wise use of local and state dollars."

Ken Koch, the city's development services director, said the reason they did the construction in two phases was because of the estimated cost. However, on Wednesday he said the first phase cost was estimated at \$1.2 million but actually cost \$800,000.

The second phase, between Cherry Avenue and Ella Avenue, cost \$500,000, for a total of \$1.3 million.

Funds for the improvements came from a CIGP (County Incentive Grant Program) grant through the Florida Department of Transportation.

"It only cost us \$650,000 through matching funds, and that money came from impact fees and not out of the general fund," Koch said.

The Tompkins Street project — tree-lined median, new pavement, theme lighting and signage — was part of the city's long-term plans to upgrade all the major arteries that lead to major roadways, such as State Road 44.

be charged for the cleanup cost. This situation was unusual, Brock explained. "Typically, when the county intervenes in these situations, there's a levy of an assessment or a lien on that property or that property owner," Brock said.

is no other mechanism to recoup or go against anybody to recoup these costs. We're going to put it back on the tax rolls. That's our idea," he said. Another CCC member asked when the dumping started and who the major contributors were. "We don't have good dates on when it started," Brock said. "It was one individual who was an older gentleman and as we understand it he would go up to some of the thrift stores and he would dumpster dive as to what he felt was something he wanted. And then he would take it back to his property. It was one individual — it wasn't a concerted effort where the neighbors were dumping on it. This person found value in just about everything. And it's out there. You name it, I can find it on that property."

At the Dec. 6 BOCC

meeting, Commissioner John "JJ" Kenney said the BOCC should have been advised sooner. "We put our citizens at risk for a whole year without any communication between Mosquito Control and the Board of County Commissioners and our staff," Kenney said. "I don't want to see this happen again. If we have another problem like that, I would expect — I would demand — that Mosquito Control contact the county immediately so that we can take the necessary remedial action to protect our citizens." Kenney visited the site on Monday to watch the progress and talk with some of the workers. Five county workers were operating heavy equipment to collect and dispose of trash. C.R. man charged with assault, accused of threatening woman

A Crystal River man arrested Sunday is being accused of slicing a woman's bicycle tire and then threatening to carve her throat, according to the Citrus County Sheriff's Office report. Clint Anthony Molen, 22, is charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, possession of a controlled substance and drug paraphernalia. According to investigators, Molen confronted the woman while she was fixing a tire on her bicycle and demanded money for pills. He reportedly told her she was not going anywhere until she produced the money and said he was going to slice her tire. Molen, then, allegedly walked into the house and came out with a steak knife and sliced one of her tires and told the woman her throat was next. Investigators confirmed

the cut on the tire and spoke to Molen, who admitted being angry at the woman and slicing her tire. Deputies reportedly also noticed track marks on Molen's hands. When quizzed about the marks, Molen alleged he uses Roxys and "shoots them up." He then took officers to a bedroom and drawer that had numerous needles, syringes, residue and a spoon. There was no bond for the assault. Other cases: Jennifer L. Swain, 40, of Inverness, was charged with domestic battery Sunday. According to the report, a man came home and found household items strewn about and when he asked Swain what was wrong, she attacked him. Swain reportedly bit the man and was said to have been drinking. No bond was allowed. James C. Kyle, 52, 2452 N. Owl Point, Crystal River, was charged with child abuse and domestic battery Sunday. A report stated an inebriated Kyle began verbally attacking a woman who eventually removed herself from the situation by retiring to the bedroom. A little while later, the woman reportedly overheard Kyle trying to talk a minor at the residence into going over to his house. The woman allegedly came out of the room and told Kyle that was not going to happen and that he should leave the residence. An altercation ensued and Kyle reportedly pushed the woman down the hallway, causing her to fall into another bedroom. No bond was set. Chronicle reporter A.B. Sidibe can be reached at 352-564-2925.

once made a sarcastic remark to a reporter about a woman who publicly questioned the taxable value of his property during a budget hearing. 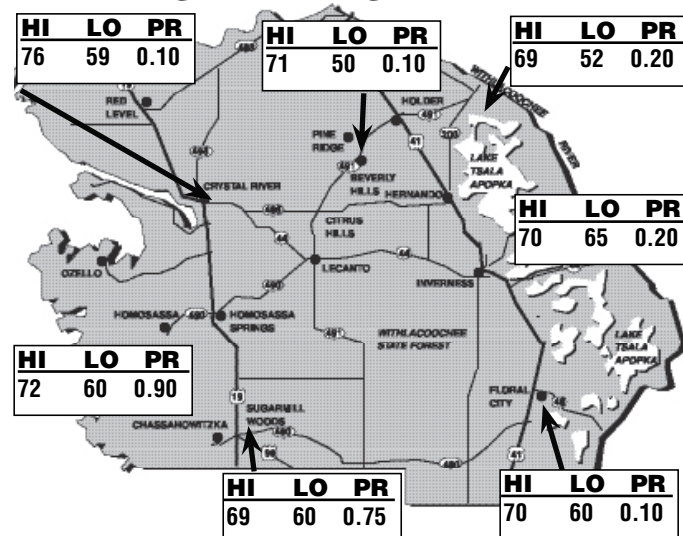

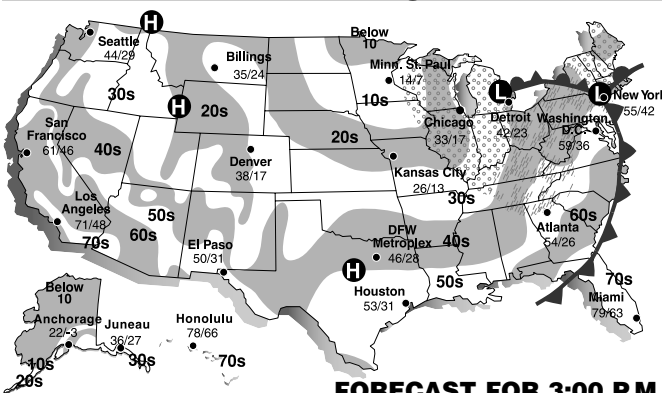

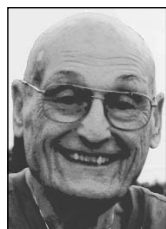

Uprooting history

Wild hogs unwelcome guests at Mississippi Civil War site

Last year's frightening flooding of the Mississippi River didn't do any direct damage to the site of one of the pivotal battles of the Civil War. It did bring in some undesirable new neighbors.

Park officials say a pack of wild hogs seeking higher ground moved in and are rooting up the landscape at Vicksburg National Military Park, an 1,800-acre park where thousands of Union and Confederate troops fought and died in 1863.

They fear the hogs could undermine some of the park's 1,370 monuments, its national cemetery and trenches and earthworks on the bluffs above the river. The hogs could also startle or injure more than 1 million annual visitors.

"It looks like the world's biggest Rototiller has gone through some areas," park superintendent Mike Madell said. "People think we plowed some of the areas they've been in."

The Mississippi River crested at a record 57.1 feet in Vicksburg on May 19, forcing many animals, including hogs, deer and alligators, into new areas.

The hogs are mostly in the northern third of the park, and the dense brush between Graveyard Road and North Union Avenue. Damage to the earth is particularly noticeable around the Indiana Regiment marker.

Madell said rangers

have removed 11 hogs since they first appeared in May 2011. He believes about another dozen are still on the loose.

"I came here two years ago and we had a small population," he said. "I'm pretty sure we got all of them, but the flood drove these in and they are finding plenty of food and good habitat, evidently."

"They could do some real damage to a very historic part of the park," Madell said.

The siege of Vicksburg ended on July 4, 1863, with Union Gen. Ulysses S. Grant's forces defeating Confederate Lt. Gen. John C. Pemberton's forces. The series of battles effectively severed the Confederacy's western states and established Union control of the Mississippi River.

Public radio, TV caught in financial bind

Public radio listeners laugh about "driveway moments" — when you've arrived at your destination but sit there with the car radio on, so engrossed in the story you're unable to tear yourself away.

There just aren't many similar stories about commercial radio. Public radio — and public TV, as well — offers the type of quality, in-depth programming unavailable elsewhere.

That focus on content is due in part to its public-private support format. At the national level, there is ongoing discussion about de-funding public broadcasting. In Florida, after more than 30 years, it's now a reality: in 2011 Gov. Rick Scott vetoed almost \$4.8 million in state funding approved by the Legislature for public radio and TV stations.

Stations' budgets have long included other funding sources, but not sufficient to make up the loss without changes to format, services or structure. They include listener/viewer memberships, corporate and foundation grants, university affiliations, and underwriting fees. "Underwriting" is similar to commercial broadcasting's advertising, but Federal Communications Commission rules prohibit mentioning prices, offering inducements to buy, issuing calls to action or making qualitative claims. Underwriting is intended to identify supporters, not specifically to promote companies, products or services.

There are several sides to this, of course. National Public Radio, for example, has been accused of bias from both liberal and conservative camps. Government funding also presents a concern for those who are suspicious that the relationship between broadcasters and the governments that help

support them is too close, too simpatico. Fair criticisms, all.

However, think about societal benefits. Studies by two national, bipartisan polling firms rank the Public Broadcasting System as America's most trusted institution.

Public radio and TV stations offer a living laboratory for university-based journalism students, as well classroom extensions for both traditional and home-based schooling and enrichment for preschoolers. Public stations feature hours of music, theater and artistic programming as well as in-depth discussions on current events and timely topics.

After last year's action, Florida public radio and TV stations evaluated offerings to see what can be dropped or modified. There have been service changes and layoffs. Certainly it's not over yet.

So where does this leave us? The state Legislature over time had been reducing funding, and it's a good idea for public broadcasting to gradually wean itself from receiving public monies while retaining its service model. But the governor's cold-turkey approach could drive some stations out of business.

We all should support public broadcasting however we can. That might mean investing in membership (just think: a mere 30 cents for every Floridian would make up the loss). It could be urging your company to become an underwriter. It could be participating in fundraiser golf tournaments or other events that some stations say they're resorting to this year. And of course, if the state Legislature again includes funding for public broadcasting, as it did last year, you can let Gov. Scott know that you support it.

investigation that occurred after a student's parents filed a complaint.

Allegations included that Richardson broke a welding mask in anger, made inappropriate comments regarding the school district to students, remarked to students that he had a weapon in the glove box of his pickup truck and asked at least one student to bring him lunch to school.

Superintendent of Schools Sandra "Sam" Himmel informed Richardson Dec. 16 of his suspension.

The suspension was the third disciplinary measure against Richardson in the last two years.

In March 2010, Lecanto High Principal Kelly Tyler issued a "letter of concern" to Richardson for, among other things, stinging two students with a cattle prod who had asked for it. Tyler's letter also lists examples of Richardson displaying anger and asking a student to pick up food for him off campus.

"I believe we all agree these behaviors are unacceptable and must not

occur again in your class," Tyler wrote.

In August 2011, Himmel suspended Richardson three days for violating district policy in the way he conducted an FFA fundraiser. According to his personnel file, Richardson deposited money from the fundraiser in an outside account.

Following the November complaint, the district interviewed the student whose parents made the complaint, plus eight students chosen at random.

Himmel's letter said the district concluded probable cause occurred in four areas:

■ Richardson was repairing a piece of farm machinery when he became angry and threw the welding mask, shattering the glass.

Richardson denied the accusation. In written comments to the allegations, he said was repairing a piece of tractor equipment with the welder and an electrode overheated. Richardson, whose right arm was amputated two years ago after an earlier accident, said he grabbed the helmet and used it to disengage the electrode and that the helmet's glass shattered on the floor.

■ Richardson made inappropriate comments to

students. According to the investigative report, some students said Richardson told them district officials thought he was a thief and that he was being watched.

Richardson denied making any of those statements.

■ Richardson told at least one student he had a handgun in his glove box. "Although you may have made the comment in a joking manner, this kind of statement should not have been made due to possible repercussions it may have caused," Himmel wrote.

Richardson said he never told students he had a handgun in his vehicle.

"I did ask a student to retrieve a camera from the glove box of my vehicle," he wrote. "I did state, 'Watch out for the bazooka.' Obviously a bazooka would not fit in the glove box with the camera."

■ He used poor judgment in having students bring him lunch to school.

Richardson said that only happened once.

Richardson's appeal will go to the school board for a final determination.

Bill would require public comment at meetings

TALLAHASSEE

Florida's citizens would get the right to be heard on public issues, not just be seen, at meetings of local government and state executive branch bodies under a bill that cleared a Senate subcommittee Wednesday.

The measure (SB 206) was filed in response to a pair of appellate court rulings that noted Florida's open government "sunshine law" requires officials to meet in public but does not give citizens a right to speak at those meetings.

The legislation filed by Sen. Joe Negron would give the public that right with certain limitations.

"We're a country founded by revolutionaries," said the Stuart Republican. "Guess what? If you're serving on a

governmental bodies set time limits on public comment. They also could limit comment to representatives of large groups or factions rather than give everyone a chance to be heard. They also would set procedures citizens must follow to give notice of their intent to speak.

Purely ministerial and quasi-judicial actions that affect an individual's rights would be exempt. So would emergency situations affecting public health, welfare or safety.

The bill was heard by the Rule's Committee's subcommittee on ethics and elections.

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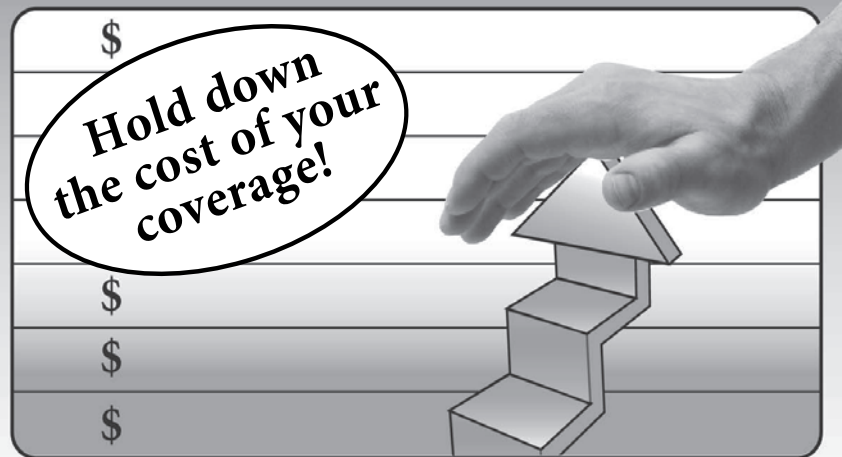

COLUMBIA, S.C.— Mitt Romney swept into South Carolina on Wednesday in pursuit of a confirming victory in the race for the Republican presidential nomination, buoyed by a second straight electoral triumph, bulging campaign coffers and warm words from the state's pre-eminent practitioner of tea party politics.

His GOP rivals showed no sign of surrender.

Four farmworkers, four children slain

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras — Officials in Honduras said men armed with AK-47 rifles and machetes killed four adults and four children in a part of the country torn by a land dispute between workers and landowners.

Police Chief Osmin Bardales said the farm workers were taken from their homes Tuesday night, hacked with machetes and shot at close range by four men in the village of Regaderos on Honduras' Atlantic coast.

Among the victims were a 1-year-old boy and three girls ages 7, 12 and 15. The other victims were two men and two women.

Bardales said the ears were severed on some of the bodies.

Regaderos is in the Aguan River valley, where farmworkers have been demanding ownership of thousands of acres of oil palm plantations that they say were illegally seized by landowners.

US denies role in scientist's death

WASHINGTON — The Obama administration denied any role in Wednesday's killing of an Iranian nuclear scientist, the latest in a series of events that have exacerbated tensions with Iran.

The assassination of Mostafa Ahmadi Roshan was the latest in a year that has already seen new U.S. economic sanctions, threats to bar American ships from the Persian Gulf, an Iranian death sentence to a jailed U.S. citizen and an escalation in Tehran's uranium enrichment program.

Iranian reports said two assailants on a motorcycle attached a magnetic bomb

to Roshan's car, killing him and his driver. Roshan was a chemistry expert and director of the Natanz uranium enrichment facility in central Iran, and the slaying suggested a widening covert effort to set back the Islamic republic's atomic program.

But U.S. officials said they had nothing to do with it.

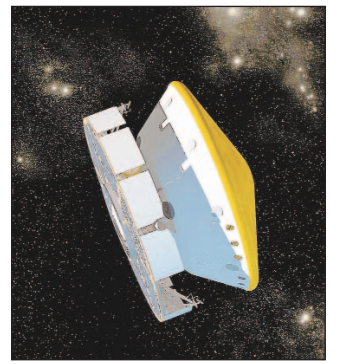
"I want to categorically deny any United States involvement in any kind of act of violence inside Iran," Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton told reporters. "We believe there has to be an understanding between Iran, its neighbors and the international community that finds a way forward for it to

Mars-bound rover aims for August landing

LOS ANGELES — A NASA spacecraft hurtling toward Mars prepared to fire its thrusters Wednesday to put itself on course for an August landing.

Engineers closely tracked the one-ton rover nicknamed Curiosity, which has been cruising along since rocketing from Earth last November.

The firing of its eight thruster engines is the most important task Curiosity will perform during its 352-million-mile flight to the red planet, but it's not unprecedented. Previous robotic explorers have had to adjust their paths several times en route to landing.

"Just because this is a well-traveled road to Mars given the number of trips we've made, I'm very careful to not let that experience cause us to be complacent," said Arthur Amador of the NASA Jet Propulsion Laboratory, which manages the \$2.5 billion mission.

At the time of the course correction, Curiosity will have racked up 80 million miles and will be traveling at 10,200 mph relative to the Earth.

The day before, the team uploaded commands calling for the spacecraft to fire its eight thrusters for nearly three hours Wednesday afternoon, redirecting it closer to its target. Though it will execute the move without human interference, engineers will be on standby in the off chance that they have to abort.

"We should be very, very close to our desired aim point at the top of the Martian atmosphere" after the maneuver, Amador said.

If Curiosity did not tweak its position, it will miss Mars altogether. Engineers did this by design to prevent the rocket's upper stage that hoisted the spacecraft from hitting the red planet. Once Curiosity separated from the upper stage and was on its way, the team has several chances to fine-tune its trajectory before touchdown.

Curiosity, whose formal name is the Mars Science Laboratory, is aiming for a 96-mile-wide crater near the Martian equator that boasts a towering mountain in the center. The six-wheel, nuclear-powered rover planned to drive to the lower flanks and examine the layered deposits to determine whether the area was once capable of supporting microbial life.

Armed with a suite of instruments including a laser to zap into bedrock and a jackhammer, Curiosity is more sophisticated than previous Mars spacecraft. Despite its capabilities, it won't be able to detect life. Instead, it will hunt for the chemical building blocks of life during its two-year mission.

Conflicts heating up

US: No assurance Pakistani military won't stage coup

WASHINGTON — Amid near-open conflict between Pakistan's civilian and military leadership, the Pentagon has neither sought nor received assurances that the Pakistani army won't stage a coup, a Pentagon spokesman said Wednesday.

"This is a matter for Pakistani of-

officials — their government leaders, military and civilian — to work out," the spokesman, Navy Capt. John Kirby, told reporters.

It also is a matter of grave concern in light of Pakistan's status as a nuclear power and the risk that its arsenal — said to be well protected now — could fall into the wrong hands in the event of civil conflict.

The Pentagon disclosed that Army Gen. Martin Dempsey, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, talked by phone on Tuesday with his Pakistani counterpart, Army Gen. Ashfaq Pervez Kayani. Dempsey's office declined to provide details of the conversation but said it was their first contact since Dec. 21.

Pakistan's internal conflict adds yet another layer of complication and peril to the U.S.-Pakistani relationship, which the Obama administration insists is still key to defeating the threat posed by al-Qaida and other terrorist groups.

Pakistan also forced the U.S. to vacate Shamsi air base in southwestern Baluchistan province. That base had been used to launch missile strikes by American drone aircraft at al-Qaida and other targets in Pakistan. After a six-week lull, a CIA drone conducted a strike against militants Tuesday.

A Pakistani official said Wednesday his government got no advance notice of the latest CIA strike.

Terminally ill woman witnesses murder-suicide

LOGAN, Ohio — A man repeatedly shot his adult son and two sisters-in-law in his living room, killing them in front of his terminally ill wife, then fatally shot himself on the front porch as family tension about the cancer-stricken woman's care apparently boiled over, authorities said.

An earlier dispute about whether the woman should have been fed tea and toast or the orange her husband

had peeled for her apparently set off the shooter Monday, 63-year-old Paul Gilkey.

The Logan man spared his wife and allowed his grown stepson to leave unharmed, Hocking County Sheriff Lanny North said Tuesday. The stepson drove away from the property, a house on a wooded hillside in rural southeastern Ohio, to seek a cellphone signal and call for help.

The sick woman, 59-year-old Darlene Gilkey, wit-

nessed the shootings from a hospital bed in her living room but wasn't injured, the sheriff said. The family friction escalated into violence in the evening when Paul Gilkey went to a bedroom, retrieved a semiautomatic handgun and began threatening relatives, North said.

Autopsies showed that Darlene Gilkey's sister Barbara Mohler, 70, of New Straitsville, was shot twice in the head at close range, and another sister, 63-year-

old Dorothy Cherry of New Plymouth, was shot in the head and chest, Hocking County Coroner Dave Cummin said. The Gilkeys' son, 38-year-old Leroy Gilkey of Columbus, was killed with three close shots to the head, Cummin said.

Sowers told an emergency dispatcher that Gilkey shot one of the women first, then turned the gun toward his own son.

Paul Gilkey later shot himself in the chest, the coroner said.

GAINESVILLE — Will Muschamp and Brent Pease first crossed paths on the recruiting trail in 2000. Muschamp was an assistant at Valdosta State in Georgia, and Pease was at Northern Arizona. They were competing to sign defensive tackle Vincent "Sweet Pea" Burns, who grew up in the shadow of Valdosta State.

Some-how, Pease persuaded Burns to leave his hometown for a school 1,700 miles away.

"Right then I knew he could recruit," Muschamp said Wednesday.

The 47-year-old Pease has been on Muschamp's radar ever since. Muschamp hired him Tuesday to replace Charlie Weis as Florida's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach, tasking him with improving the program's worst offense in the last

Pease spent the last six seasons at Boise State, five as receivers coach and the last one as offensive coordinator.

He has 11 years of play-calling experience, beginning at his alma mater, Montana (1996-98), and then Northern Arizona (1999-2000), Kentucky (2001-

02) and Baylor (2003-05).

Pease said he shares the same pro-style offensive philosophies as Muschamp.

"This was a perfect fit," Pease said in a statement. "I want to be multiple in our offensive formations and have a balanced attack with tempo. I firmly believe in being fundamentally sound and red-zone efficient. I want to develop our players in a pro-style offense that can help them at the next level."

Under Pease, the Broncos averaged 44.2 points and 481.3 yards last season and won 12 games.

Steering the course

Most offices are pretty much the same. You have a desk, chair, computer, a few plants and maybe a window, if you are lucky. Matt Steelfox, an officer with the Florida Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC), falls into the "luckier-than-most" category, to say the least.

His "office" is the woods and waterways of Citrus County.

"You can't beat this when it comes to work," said Steelfox, 25, while recently patrolling the inshore waters of Crystal River. "I couldn't do anything else after doing this."

"I spend 50 percent of the time on water patrol," he added. "I patrol all of Citrus from the Withlacoochee down to the Chassahowitzka. It's a huge area."

Steelfox is a Citrus High School graduate and has been hunting and fishing in the area since he was a young man, so the terrain he works on is his home turf. But there is always something new around every corner.

"I am always finding another canal to venture down, plus I find a lot of areas to fish when I get off work," Steelfox said with a laugh.

He has been married to his wife, Jordan, for almost a year.

The duties of an FWC officer are many. Checking boaters and fishermen for safety equipment, proper vessel registration and licenses is just one aspect of the law enforcement work that is done. They also keep an eye on commercial activities that in the waterways of the county, such as crab, grouper and snapper fishing and shrimping. There are

seven officers and a lieutenant assigned to the county.

"We have two or three guys out on any given day," said FWC Lt. John Jones. "We also have three officers from the Guardian (an off-shore patrol boat) that fill in and augment as needed. We try and be proactive when we are out there."

"Any commercial interest out here, we regulate," Steelfox said after issuing a warning to a crab boat captain because the vessel didn't have numbers visible from the air.

The numbers have to be visible on the side of the vessel and from the air. In this case, the numbers were covered by gear at the front of the vessel.

Steelfox offered a suggestion about where to post the numbers, and the crabbers agreed to resolve the issue.

"I see them out here all the time and will check them out in a couple of weeks to make sure it's taken care of," Steelfox said.

Jones said the FWC trains its officers to "walk the line" when they are on and off the job. He added that there are times when a hard stance is needed, but for the most part, officers are trained to interact with the general public in a respectful, helpful manner.

Steelfox inspected several crab traps, and one trap did not have the required number of escape rings (three.) After writing down the number on the buoy, Steelfox said he would keep an eye out for any further violations. A person with an active trap without the required equipment could face a misdemeanor charge and a \$318 fine.

Some violations, however, are sure to get a ticket, a stern warning or even a trip to jail.

Steelfox was called out to a boating tragedy in April 2010 that involved a fatality. A passenger was thrown off the front deck of a pontoon boat and killed by the boat's propeller.

"You can never be safe enough out on the water," Steelfox said. "If I spot a similar situation, with a speeding boat, they are going to get a ticket."

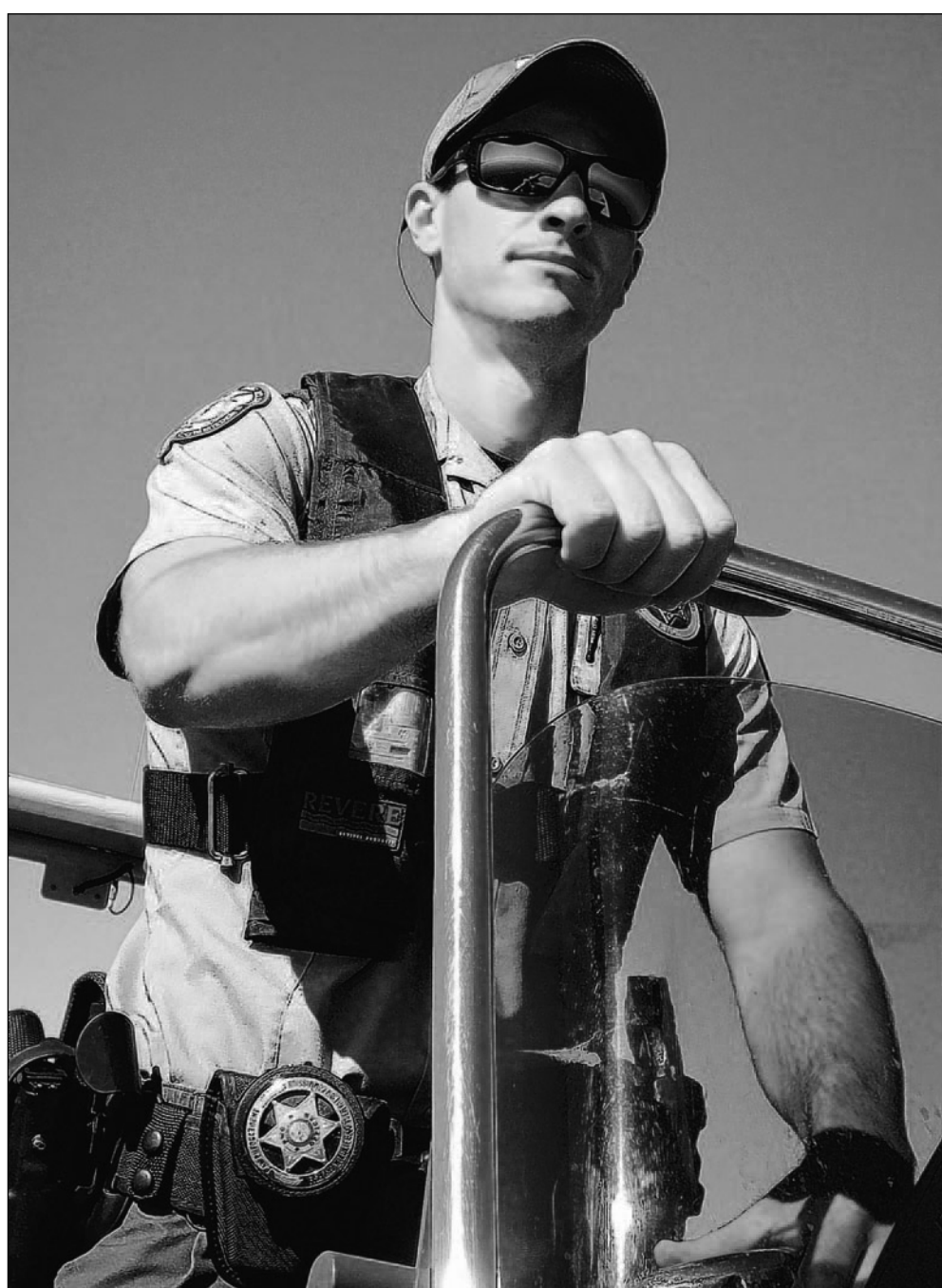
Steelfox also talked about a scalloping mishap from a few years ago that has left an indelible mark on his memory. He had spotted a scalloper who didn't have a dive flag present. The man then showed Steelfox his fins, which were chopped up by the prop of a boat that had recently passed over him.

"Who in the world would go in without a dive flag after that?" Steelfox asked.

Another major concern is keeping an eye out for impaired boaters. The FWC has been stringent in its efforts to curtail boating under the influence (BUI), and officers are trained in detection of impaired operators.

"It's tough sometimes to know that you arrested a guy for BUI and he's going to lose his job," Jones said about the deadly practice of operating a vessel while drinking. "I've had guys crying, pleading with me. I've gone home at night thinking about the guy's life. But when you add alcohol and boating, the results can be deadly. Sometimes it's easy to put the handcuffs on them. We have to protect the public and sometimes protect (operators) from themselves."

Jones and Steelfox stressed that their agency is dedicated to educating individuals about proper, prudent vessel operation and the importance of

having the required safety equipment.

"If your motor starts burning up, what are you going to do?" Steelfox asked. "Reach for the fire extinguisher. What if it is empty? You have 30 gallons

of fuel in your tank. Then you are going to jump overboard. Do you have life vests? That is why it's important to have safety equipment on board."

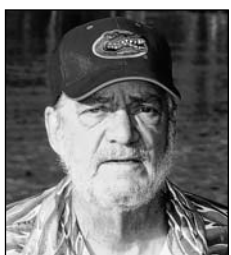

Seemed like a good idea, but ...

Last summer, I suggested anglers who make their own chum by grinding fish carcasses and byproducts add to the mix the innards left over from cleaning scallops.

For those not familiar with scallops, the only part suitable for human consumption is the adductor, the muscle that opens and closes the two halves of a bivalve's shell. Everything else is discarded, enough to fill a sizeable bucket. I felt using the glop instead of simply throwing it away made sense, and it might even make for a more effective chum.

That idea is no longer under consideration for the Brilliant Suggestion of the Century Award. Bob Webb, local angler and regular reader of *Tight Lines*, thought the idea of utilizing what's normally considered garbage was a good one, and, since he does use chum, accumulated some during the season. He took it on a recent trip to the Keys, and established a scallop glop chum line, which immediately attracted ... nothing. Zero fish. After a reasonable amount of unproductive time, he switched to commercial chum, which did bring in bait, and the party

began catching fish, so it wasn't that there weren't bait fish around; the scallop cleanings simply did not work.

Since the trip took place over the holidays, and since I only learned of the failure of my idea this week, I had hoped I could claim it as my mistake for 2012, but the Queen of the Castle vetoed that idea, saying I made the suggestion last year, and it would be counted as the mistake for 2011. I would simply, she declared, have to find something else to be wrong about this year. Rats.

I don't know why the glop didn't work, although I do have a theory, which I will not disclose until I hear from people smarter than I, to whom I have submitted the theory for their opinions. In the meantime, if you took the suggestion, I'd like to hear how it worked for you. Or didn't.

Local saltwater panfish expert Mike O'Feild and friend and fishing buddy Bobby Miller, visiting from Brandon, Miss., hit the barge canal last Monday and Tuesday, and had either two excellent days or two terrible days of fishing, depending on your perspective. Leaving the U.S. 19 ramp near the FWC

building at 0700 hours on an exceptionally low tide, they worked Marker 29, then Marker 27, then 25, finally heading to the junction of the Barge Canal and the Progress Energy canal, all of which produced poorly. By then, the tide had begun to flood, and the fish finally turned on. The bad news is the fish, mostly black sea bass, were all small; the good news is they were plentiful.

Nothing increases a youngster's interest in fishing more than catching fish, and to a kid, size doesn't matter, so if you have young anglers in your family, the Barge Canal is worth the time and effort.

With the weather warming, trout will be moving into shallow water during the heat of the day. Look for some with deeper water nearby, as they'll move into it during the night, moving to the shallows as the day wears on. MirrOlure's Lil John and D.O.A.'s Glow Jerk baits or live shrimp should work. Tight Lines to you.

The Wildcats (16-1, 2-0 Southeastern Conference) had a 23-6 closing run for their second straight 15-point league win. They didn't take a double-digit lead over the Tigers (10-6, 0-2) until Davis scored on an alley-oop pass from Lamb with 1:31 left.

Rob Chubb had 14 points and

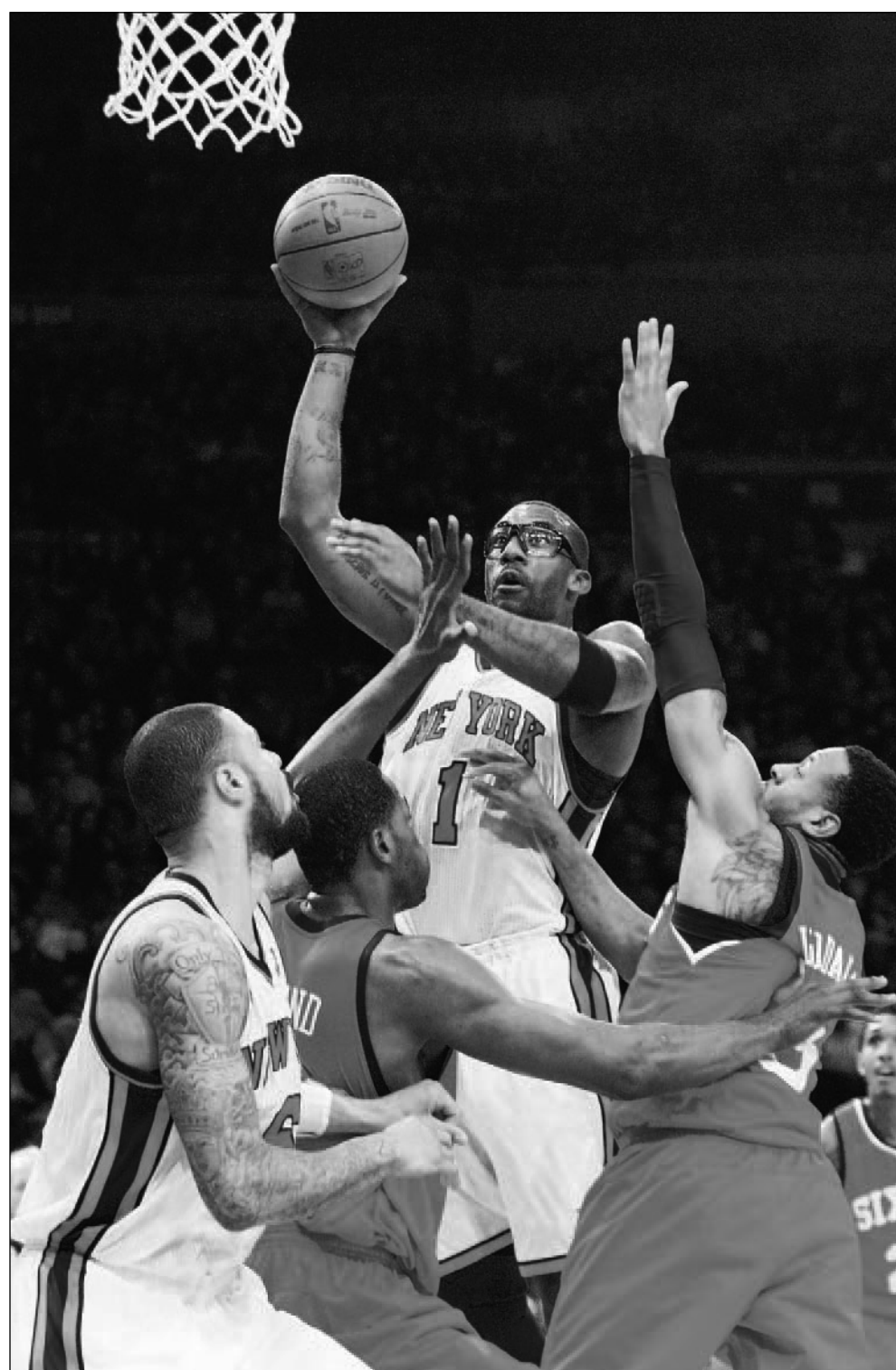
Isaiah Thomas scored 12 of his 20 points in the fourth quarter and Jimmer Fredette had 10 for the Kings.

month to take the head coaching job at Kansas.

Muschamp hired Weis in hopes of turning around the offense. Instead, the Gators averaged fewer yards and points than they did in 2010 under former coach Urban Meyer. Florida ranked 102nd in total offense last season, averaging 334 yards a game.

Pease watched the Gators

practice in Jacksonville for the Gator Bowl, and then spent last weekend in Gainesville with his wife. He apparently liked it so much he canceled an interview with national champion Alabama, which is looking for an offensive coordinator to replace new Colorado State coach Jim McElwain.

Pease begins work Friday and will spend his first month recruiting.

When spring practice opens, the Gators will rely on Pease to mentor fresh-

men Jacoby Brissett and Jeff Driskel — the quarterbacks expected to compete for the starting job this spring.

"No question, you've got two young guys who need a lot of fundamental work as they continue to progress as players," Muschamp said. "It was critical to me to bring in a guy that that's his expertise. Really good coaches coach a lot of stuff. You coach linebackers, coach secondary. You can train anybody to coach a front. Good coaches can coach a lot of different

places. He's done that. Again, it shows you his track record of relating to people and doing a great job conveying the message."

Pease most recently worked with Boise State's Kellen Moore, who became the first quarterback in the Football Bowl Subdivision to win 50 games. Pease's resume also includes record-setting receivers Tyler Shoemaker, Austin Pettis, Titus Young and Jeremy Childs.

More importantly, Pease has experience in the

Southeastern Conference.

At Kentucky, Pease helped turn the Wildcats into one of the top scoring offenses in the country. After posting a 2-9 season in Pease's first year, Kentucky finished 7-5 in 2002, which matched its best record since 1984, and ranked 23rd nationally and led the SEC in scoring offense.

Muschamp said calling plays in the SEC is different from other leagues.

"I just think there are more people to account for," he said. "I've said this be-

fore: the SEC is different because of the defensive lines in this league. ... Everybody's got good front people. Everybody's got people you've got to account for, and you've got to understand it's about mismatches.

"He's been through that. When you've got to line up against some of the defenses in this league and figure out how you're going to block those guys. You're not seeing it in one or two teams in your league. You're seeing it top to bottom, week in and week out."

"It's always challenging to go up against an offense like this because you can do so many things," Pro Bowl nose tackle Vince Wilfork said. "You can't just say, 'When they get in this formation, this is going to happen,' or 'When they do this, look out for (this).' Mularkey 'smart' choice for Jags

Jax hires just third coach in 18 seasons

JACKSONVILLE — Mike Mularkey is far from a splashy hire.

The Jacksonville Jaguars know it, and everyone around the league seems to be talking about it.

New owner Shahid Khan said he spoke with some big-name candidates, and then decided to make the "smart" choice by hiring Mularkey. The former Atlanta Falcons offensive coordinator was introduced as the franchise's fourth head coach Wednesday and did little to alter his reputation as a colorless coach.

The Jaguars didn't seem to mind.

Although there were some who thought Khan would spend big for a well-known coach, he questioned whether those guys would be successful "after the splash." He believes Mularkey will.

"When you start sobering up, how does it feel?" Khan said. "That's the key issue. After the binge, how do you feel? ... A wonderful thing about football is everybody looks great until the ball is snapped. Once the ball is snapped, results speak for themselves and we know in September how good a job he is doing preparing, strategizing, (assembling) the staff. It will all come out. By that time, the buzz, the splash, is going to be history."

Mularkey, meanwhile,

"Some guys are very good at managing the game and calling plays. I'm not one of them," Mularkey said. "Any one mistake can be the difference in the game. I don't want to be that guy that thinks he can do it all. If I can't do it, I'm not going to do it. Hopefully I'll put it in the right hands. That's what my job is, to get that guy in here, get the right guy in here to do it."

Mularkey also plans to meet with former defensive coordinator and interim head coach Mel Tucker on Thursday, and likely will offer him his old job back. Tucker interviewed for the same position in Minnesota, and will have to decide whether to swallow his pride and remain in Jacksonville.

bert also has three years remaining, making Mularkey, Smith and Gabbert kind of a package deal. If they don't succeed, Khan surely will start over.

"We've got a huge amount invested in Blaine," Khan said. "Our fate is tied to him. We can't win without him."

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Baylor's Griffin makes it official

Heisman winner going to NFL

WACO, Texas — When Robert Griffin III arrived at Baylor four years ago with new coach Art Briles, the Bears had never even had a winning season in the Big 12.

Standing in the confetti celebration last month after the Bears won their first bowl game in nearly two decades for a 10-win season, the exciting dual-threat quarterback knew in his gut it was time to move on to the next level.

Griffin made it official Wednesday, announcing he would skip his senior season to enter the NFL draft after a college career in which he set or tied 54

school records in 41 games. It was a month and a day after RG3 became the first Baylor player to win college football's highest individual honor.

"Obviously you want to leave something better than you found it," Griffin said. "I can say we've done that."

It was nearly 2 1/2 minutes after Griffin started talking during his campus news conference that he finally said he was going to the NFL. But, like he said, he has never been good at good-byes.

"It's see you later," he said.

His public announcement came right after meeting with teammates to inform them of the decision, and Griffin said he broke down in tears after telling them.

Griffin had told Briles of his decision when they spoke Tuesday, following up on a conversation from the previous day.

Ashton Kutcher wants to return to television show

PASADENA, Calif. — A clean-cut Ashton Kutcher said Wednesday he's interested in continuing with "Two and a Half Men" beyond this season — and CBS wants him, too.

Kutcher's addition to television's most popular comedy following star Charlie Sheen's implosion was a grand experiment that has worked out better than CBS or the producers could have dreamed.

The show is up 20 percent in viewers over Sheen's final season, the Nielsen ratings company said, and Kutcher has also brought in a younger crowd.

"I've had a blast," said Kutcher, who plays the heartbroken Walden Schmidt. "Since I stopped doing 'That '70s Show,' I've always wanted to go back and do television."

Kutcher appeared at a news conference without the long hair and beard he has worn this season. It was cut as part of the plot in an episode of "Two and a Half Men"

that airs Monday, he said.

Kutcher will be working on movies after filming for this season of "Two and a Half Men" concludes, but "right now I'm looking at it as a hiatus," he said.

CBS would have to strike a new deal with actors and producers to continue the show beyond this season. All parties seem interested in working it out, CBS Entertainment President Nina Tassler said.

"In spirit and intent, everybody is very motivated," she said. Series creator Chuck Lorre said he gave thought to ending the series after Sheen left last season and couldn't imagine it continuing. But CBS and his co-creator, Lee Aronson, nudged him to continue.

"Lee said, 'Why not try? If we fail, no one would be physically

harmed,'" Lorre said. "It seemed like such a heartbreaking way to end, and we didn't want it to, so we said let's keep the light on."

Writers were able to change the tone by making Kutcher's character a heartbroken man who has everything he wants except the woman he loves. Jon Cryer, who played Sheen's annoying little brother, is now Schmidt's older friend. It was all a welcome tone change, Aronson said.

"It's been a lot of fun and a challenge to create a different show with a lot of the same elements," he said. Lorre, who was the target of sharp barbs from Sheen last spring after he was fired, said he wished his former star well.

Popular café opens new west-side site in Crystal River

Plantains flambe with butter, brown sugar and a touch of rum is one of the innovative and upscale dishes you can order at Havana House Grill, newly opened east of Crystal River.

This Caribbean twist on a traditional favorite dessert represents the culinary artistry of Rosie Ruiz, who gathered a faithful following during five years at Havana House in Lecanto, now expanded to a second, more upscale version of the original.

The expansion to the site at the intersection of State Road 44 and County Road 486 dwarfs the first café in size. It's a delightful and spacious restaurant with tropical decor, seating for 140 at tables and booths and a separate attractive lounge serving wine and beer.

There are plans to offer live entertainment on weekends and limited delivery service to businesses.

Rosie and Frank Ruiz started in the restaurant business in Citrus County after many years in the food business. He previously worked for more than 20 years at a Winn-Dixie store and she was director of catering for Hilton Hotels in South Florida.

Rosie Ruiz is a first-generation Cuban-American from Miami and her husband is a native of Cuba. They also owned several eateries in South Florida before moving to the Nature Coast.

The vivacious Ruiz is a hands-on owner who said she considers the 20-plus servers and chefs part of her family. The staff includes the two Ruiz sons, Geoffrey and Franklyn. All provide friendly and helpful service for the new restaurant.

The much smaller Havana House in Lecanto will continue operating its popular buffet that draws customers from surrounding county offices, schools and residences.

"We have the same favorite dishes at our new place with emphasis on a more elaborate menu such as eggs Benedict and huevos rancheros for breakfast," she said.

Patrons will also find a larger lunch selection of choices such as authentic pressed Cuban sandwiches, \$5.59, filled with Serrano ham, Swiss cheese, mustard and pickle on Cuban bread.

The breakfast burrito rolled with a combination of crisp bacon and scrambled eggs with home fries and buttered-and-toasted Cuban bread slices is a big winner.

Most of the sandwiches are made with fresh toothsome Cuban bread: roasted pork with mojo sauce for example, \$5; Geoffrey's croquette of ham, pickle, two ham croquettes, mustard and Swiss cheese, \$6.99; Key Largo fried fish breaded with panko and fried with grilled onions and melted Cheddar-Jack cheese, \$7.29.

All sorts of wraps are available such as the Navajo wrap with grilled chicken and Guacamole, \$6.79; Cajun chicken "Born on

the Bayou," \$6.79 and the South of the Border with grilled chicken, roasted red peppers, red onion, hot peppers, Cheddar-Jack cheese, salsa and sour

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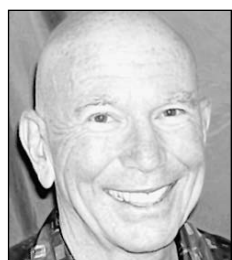

The making of good wine

What makes wine good? It's a "duh" question, right? Many gentle readers, I'm sure, will answer with the writer's own words, "Because I like it."

It's not unlike Supreme Court Justice Potter Stewart who was discussing the definition of pornography when he said, "I know it when I see it."

As you keep popping those corks or twisting

what concerns most gentle readers (think QPR), or bang for the buck. Too many factors are in the creation of great wine — not to mention so-called perfect wine — to mention here. Great grapes from vineyards where the fruit is not overcrowded (think quality over quantity) is one big plus.

The short answer to what makes great wine is they are meant to be great. No expense is spared in the cultivation or the manufacture, nor is the professionalism of the winemakers themselves. One of the keys to enjoying great wines is to go after them and work hard to find clones that taste almost as good. For me, it's been a lifetime of exploration.

So, Ron, how many perfect labels have you tasted among the many you have tried? The answer is I have been lucky enough to taste a handful. And like the judge, I know it when I see it.

Following are a few of the labels we tried over the holidays: none are perfect, but they sure score in the top 10 percent. None cost more than about \$30, with the whole average about \$15.

White wines Bev liked:
■ Hart & McGarrity chardonnay.
■ an unusual "Vedejo" grape from the Bormos winery in Rueda, Spain.

■ a delicious chardonnay from Kendall-Jackson, the Grand Reserve, with a spine of rich acidity, lastly an Albarino (full of peaches) from Spain, a Val Do Sosego.

Reds I truly enjoyed were:
■ a Beaujolais Crus, Moulin-a-Vent Domaine Dochon, so ripe and rich for a Gamay,
■ a delicious Portuguese Douro, Ventozelo QV, blew my socks off.

Two beauties for \$10 tasting like \$30:
■ a Shannon Ridge Wrangler Red blend, from Lake County, California,
■ a Minervoires from the south of France, Domaine des Murettes, Clos de l'Olivier.

- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1 cup mayonnaise

need to pay big bucks.

Take the example of a Nissan Altima (our car of choice). It runs good, gets 30 or better mpg, but it's not a

Rolls Royce or a Maybach, with thousands of hand-finished refinements. Therein lies the difference between a Parker-rated perfect and a really good drinking table wine to satisfy one's personal tastes. The price-to-quality ratio is off the capsules, you will rely more and more on your own judgment.

What if a bottle of wine is well made in every regard, but is just not your style? It may well be someone else's cup of tea, but just not to your liking. Not everyone is a fan of blue fish or mullet for example (oily), perfectly edible seafood, just not for you. And that doesn't make it bad fish.

Take the issue of temperature. White wine served too cold (ideal temperature is 40 to 50 degrees) will taste flat. The right temp will reveal bracing acidity, crispness, flavors that tweak the tongue. Red wine (ideal 50 to 60 degrees) will taste alcoholic if served too warm, that is at typical Florida room temperature. Aromas of black stone fruit and flavors of cassis and ripe cherries flood the mouth. After swallowing the taste lingers for moments.

I have written many times about scoring systems and benchmarks, so we are not going to review the technique of rating now. I will ask another question: what is a "perfect" wine?

Robert Parker, the so-called "emperor of wine," holds an event every year, where for \$2,000, participants are privy to sampling a slew of 100-rated wines, deemed perfect by Parker.

I suspect if I spent thousands of dollars traveling out west to be part of this deep pockets tradition, I may well be influenced by Parker's selections, and by all the folderol accompanying the event. Will I agree all of the red wines are perfect? And more important, will good wife Bev, who doesn't care for any red wines (except maybe the Nouveau once a year), is going to ask why we both

are going to spend all this money, when we could be lying on the beach in St. Thomas sipping frozen daiquiris.

The spare-no-expense philosophy is taken to absurd levels by folks who have the wherewithal to buy labels costing thousands of dollars in search for the perfect wine. The reality is cost rarely measures up to quality. And hundreds of supersaturated wines around on Citrus County shelves are rated as excellent by those who like cabernet sauvignon or white burgundies. So, there is no

need to pay big bucks.

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Low-carb cake?

Fast, easy angel food recipe possible

It seemed impossible. I wanted to make a zero-sugar, low-carb version of a cake that is made from almost nothing but sugar and carbs.

And it took just 20-something attempts. But after many disappointing — and some downright disgusting — versions, I finally managed to bake an amazing and sweet angel food cake that rises beautifully and has the same delicate, almost spongy texture as traditional recipes.

My motivation was simple — Mom. A longtime vegan, she has lived without her (and my) favorite cake for decades. But she recently started eating egg whites again, which put angel food back on the table. Except she isn't eating sugar and is trying to limit carbohydrates.

Angel food cake has three primary ingredients — egg whites, sugar and flour. Egg whites and sugar are whipped until they form a thick, airy batter; then flour is gently folded in. Could I make a cake with only one of the key ingredients?

From the start, structure was the challenge. Using egg whites and the natural sugar alternative known as stevia, I was able to bake up cakes with the proper taste. And they would rise beautifully in the oven. But as soon as they came out, they wilted into near puddles of cooked dough.

To get the structure I needed, I turned to two ingredients popular in gluten-free baking — guar gum and xanthan gum. Most baked goods get their lift and structure by working the gluten (a type of protein) in wheat flour

until it forms bonds that trap air. People who avoid gluten need to find a way around this, so they use other ingredients to replicate those bonds.

The cake still needed dry ingredients, and for that I turned to more egg whites. A blend of powdered egg whites and egg- or whey-based protein powder was a good start. A bit of almond flour completed the dry mix, giving the cake a bit of extra body.

This cake is easy to love because it is fast and simple to make, is delicious and is great for dieters. It makes a standard size angel food cake, but has just 160 calories, 4 grams of fat, 28 grams of protein and 8 grams of carbohydrates per quarter of the cake. That's right. Per quarter of the cake.

LOW-CARB, GLUTEN-FREE ANGEL FOOD CAKE

- 12 egg whites (about 2 cups of liquid egg whites)
- 1 teaspoon cream of tartar

- 1 teaspoon xanthan gum
- 1 teaspoon guar gum
- 1/4 teaspoon baking powder
- 8 packets stevia sweetener
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon almond extract
- 1/4 cup vanilla egg- or whey-based protein powder
- 1/4 cup almond flour
- 3 tablespoons powdered egg whites

Heat the oven to 350F. Generously coat a large fluted pan with cooking spray on the fluted center and bottom only, but not on the outer sides of the pan.

In the bowl of a stand mixer, combine the egg whites, cream of tartar, xanthan gum, guar gum, baking powder, stevia and both extracts.

Beat on low for 30 seconds, then increase mixer to high and beat until very stiff peaks form, about 4 minutes. The mixture will be airy, voluminous and quite thick.

Into a small bowl, sift together the protein powder, almond flour and powdered egg whites. Sprinkle half of the dry ingredients over the egg whites. Run the mixer at medium for 5 seconds, or just until the dry ingredients are incorporated. Sprinkle the remaining dry ingredients over the egg whites and mix again just to incorporate.

Increase mixer speed to high and run for another 5 seconds.

Use a silicone spatula to scrape the sides of the bowl and gently fold the mixture together once or twice. Transfer half of the mixture to the prepared pan, then use the spatula to smooth the top. Repeat with the remaining mixture. Firmly tap the pan on the counter to help eliminate air bubbles.

Bake for 35 minutes. Remove the pan from the oven and overturn the pan and cool upside down. When cool, to release the cake, run a paring knife along the outside of the pan.

From start to finish, it takes 50 minutes, plus cooling, and serves eight.

Winter comfort mac and cheese

This Italian macaroni and cheese is inspired by the Italian sub popular in the Northeast. The recipe uses sautéed salami, garlic peppers, sun-dried tomatoes and onion.

Make popular recipe with an Italian flavor

In this grown-up version of macaroni and cheese, we take a trip to Italy. Sort of.

Inspired by the Italian sub popular in the Northeast, we sautéed up salami, garlic peppers, sun-dried tomatoes and onion. Our cheese sauce is creamy and sharp with a mixture of fontina and picante provolone. If you can't find picante provolone, just use the sharpest provolone you can find.

And while we used orecchiette pasta, any shape will do. If you prefer your macaroni and cheese baked, spoon the finished recipe into a casserole dish and top with Parmesan cheese before placing under the broiler for a minute or two. Garlic peppers are a sort of pickled red pepper. If you can't find them, substitute roasted red peppers and add a

minced clove of garlic and a tablespoon of red wine vinegar.

ITALIAN MACARONI AND CHEESE

- 1 pound orecchiette pasta
- 5 ounces dry salami, diced (about 1 cup)
- 1/2 cup chopped oil-packed sun-dried tomatoes
- 1/2 cup garlic peppers, diced
- 1 medium yellow onion, diced
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 2 1/2 cups milk
- 1 cup shredded fontina cheese
- 1 cup shredded picante provolone cheese
- 1/2 cup shredded fresh basil

■ Salt and black pepper, to taste

Bring a large saucepan of salted water to a boil. Add the pasta and cook according to package directions. Drain and set aside.

Meanwhile, in a large saucepan over medium-high, sauté the salami until crisped and browned, about 5 minutes. Add the sun-dried tomatoes, garlic peppers and onion. Continue to cook until the onion is very tender, about 5 to 6 minutes. Add the butter and stir until melted. Add the flour and stir to coat well.

While stirring continuously, pour in the milk. Bring the mixture to a boil, continuing to stir. Cook for 5 minutes. Turn off the heat and stir in the fontina and provolone, one at a time, to ensure even melting. Stir in the basil and the cooked pasta. Season with salt and black pepper.

From start to finish, it takes 40 minutes and serves eight.

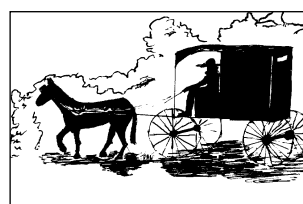

pork, slow roasted, \$10.99; ropa vieja, the famous Cuban tradition of marinated flank steak slow-roasted in a tomato-based sauce, then shredded, \$10.99; picadillo (Cuban chili), \$8.99; chicken Milanese, \$11.99; Palomilla steak in garlic and lemon with grilled onions, \$10.99; New York strip steak, and Argentinean cut skirt steak with chimichurri garlic sauce, \$12.99. And that's not all.

Seafood is part of the feast, with gulf shrimp (not imported from Southeast Asia, Ruiz emphasizes), scallops, mussels and a variation of surf-and-turf Latin combo with your choice of seafood and steaks or poultry.

Choice of sides is served with the dinners, and those sides are worth a visit to Havana House. They include plantains, boiled yucca with mojo, deviled crab (when available), rice and black beans, garlic mashed potatoes and much more.

Rosie Ruiz said she learned to cook in her preteens from her grandmother, who passed on the family recipe secrets of making sofrito, the combination of tomatoes, peppers, garlic, onion and herbs that provides the base for so many Cuban dishes, as well as a superb picadillo, similar to southwestern chili.

Her parents lived in Cuba under the rule of Batista before the revolution that brought Fidel Castro to power.

Her grandfather, El Viejito Bringuier, she said, "was called the Bob Hope of Cuba," a well-known entertainer who had his own radio show and appeared as emcee at such well-known Havana nightclubs as the Tropicana and the Shanghai.

Cuban-style chicken and yellow rice is an occasional daily special and will soon be on the regular menu, along with other specialties such as Paella, Ruiz said.

Starters include Spanish-style tapas, small bites of ceviche, gamba (shrimp with garlic) and mussels with garlic or wine sauce and conch fritters.

Prenchek, who moved from the Lecanto café to pilot the new kitchen with two other chefs, and it's obvious they are ready to please. Jessica Candaday is front-of-the-house manager.

You don't need to worry about too much spice at Havana House, since Cuban cuisine uses lots of flavorful but mild herbs and spices. You can add heat with the very tasty house salsa if desired.

There is really something for everyone at Havana House Grill, a welcome addition to the ethnic cuisine choices in Crystal River.

Here are three of Rosie Ruiz's favorite authentic Cuban dishes:

LECHON ASADO (Roasted pork)

This recipe can be split if not doing the whole suckling pig, can be halved for pork butt or shoulder. The traditional way to cook the whole suckling pig is on a large spit or in a box or ground pit. Havana House Grill rents and

sells the boxes.

Mojo marinade for pork:

- 30 cloves of garlic, crushed
- 1 1/2 cups of chopped parsley
- 3 tablespoons chopped fresh thyme or 3/4 tablespoon dried
- 2 tablespoons ground cumin
- 8 bay leaves
- 2 tablespoons salt
- 2 teaspoons of crushed black pepper
- 1 quart sour orange (or combine equal parts orange and lime juice, sour orange is preferred)
- 4 cups sliced onions
- 2 cups dry red wine
- 1/2 cup olive oil mixed with 1 tablespoon lard or butter

Have your butcher prepare the whole pig cleaning inside out or rinse pork butts and/or shoulder.

Begin by crushing the garlic and combining all marinade ingredients. Use your hands to rub the marinade all over the pork and slice holes and stuff remaining herbs and garlic under fat cap or in any and all crevices.

Let marinade for several hours, preferably overnight. If roasting on a spit or in the ground, then surely you are familiar with this type of cooking.

If roasting in a large oven, remove pork from refrigerator at least 30 minutes before roasting. Place in a 325-degree oven for several hours (4 to 6) depending on size of pork until the internal temperature reaches at least 165 degrees and skin is a beautiful dark honey-brown color. Enjoy!

CUBAN BLACK BEAN SOUP

- 2 cups dried turtle beans
- 2 green peppers, 1 whole seeded and chopped

- 6 quarts water
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 ham hocks. If vegetarian beans are preferred, omit the hocks
- 2 cups thinly sliced yellow onion
- 10 cloves of garlic, crushed
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 4 bay leaves
- 1 tablespoons salt
- 1 teaspoons fresh ground pepper
- 4 whole cachucha peppers, if available
- 1 cup white onion chopped for garnish

Rinse and pick through turtle beans and pour off all excess water. Soak beans and pepper overnight in the 6 quarts of water. Do not discard water. Make sure the water is at least 1/2 inch over beans. Add more if necessary.

Sauté all vegetables (except for cachucha peppers, add those at time of simmer) in olive oil: add sauté to beans, then add all dry seasonings and bay leaves. Bring to a boil and reduce to a simmer until beans are tender, approximately 1 1/2 hours.

Add cilantro and chopped onions as garnish and perhaps a dash of olive oil.

PLANTAINS FOSTER

- 6 tablespoons of unsalted butter

- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- Dash of orange juice
- 1/3 cup dark rum
- 4 ripe sweet plantain bananas sliced diagonally (available already cut in Latin frozen-food section of your grocers freezer.)

Cook butter and sugar in a skillet on low about four minutes until sugar caramelizes. Add orange

juice and rum to deglaze pan. Add plantains to skillet and sauté, turning once until golden brown. Serve over vanilla ice cream and top with whipped cream and cherry.

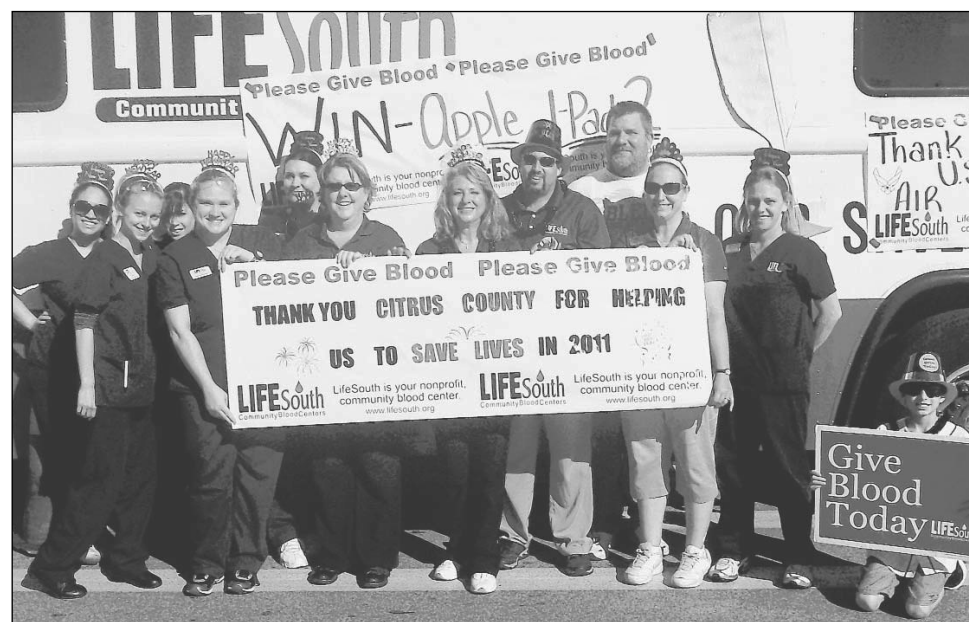

Larry Bird, former basketball superstar for the Boston Celtics, said, "While day by day the overzealous student stores up facts for future use, he who has learned to trust nature finds need for ever fewer external directions. He will discard formula after formula, until he reaches the conclusion: Let nature take its course."

That might be fine in basketball, but not in bridge. If you pull cards, letting nature take its course, you will fail in makable contracts.

What is natural for declarer? Immediately drawing trumps comes to mind. Well, is that right in this small slam? West leads the heart queen against six spades. How should South play?

After the strong two clubs and weak two diamonds, South shows his long suit. Then North's raise promises some values: a good four to seven points. South used Blackwood, then jumped to six spades when he learned an ace was missing.

If declarer draws trumps, he will lose one heart and one diamond. However, with a little luck South can arrange a heart ruff in the dummy!

He wins the first trick in the dummy (not that this is vital; it just makes communications easier) and immediately leads a diamond. Let's suppose West wins with the ace and returns a heart. Declarer wins with the king and cashes his two diamond winners, discarding the remaining hearts from the dummy. Finally, he plays the heart loser still nesting in his hand, ruffs it high, draws trumps, and claims.
