Oma's IMPRESSIONS

In the Old Testament, Job 31:32, Job says, "but no stranger had to spend the night in the street, for my door was always open to the travelers." In times of old it was thought a dishonorable thing to turn away travelers who came your way toward the end of the day. During the settling of this country it was common courtesy to offer food and shelter to travelers, even strangers. Times have changed and few if any would invite strangers into their home to spend the night, much less give them a meal. Although I plead guilty to having done that very thing on at least two occasions, because it just seemed the right thing to do.

There is seldom a need for that sort of thing anymore with thousands and thousand of motels and hotels, but there is still a remnant of those bygone days known as the B&B's, or Bed and Breakfast. It has become a worldwide industry. Although no longer free lodging and a meal, it remains a rewarding option to motels. I bought the 1999-2000 guide to more than 2500 inspector-approved and AAA Diamond-rated lodgings in the United States and Canada. The first B&B Opa and I stayed in was a Sunday House in Fredericksburg, TX. So named because the early settlers around Fredericksburg, being from Germany and devout Lutheran or Catholic, brought their families to town on Saturday to buy supplies. Being too far to return home and come back on Sunday for church services, they built small stone houses that are still there today,

called Sunday houses. Their descendants, the industrious people they are, have made them into B&B's. Since then we have stayed in Bed & Breakfast from Lafayette, LA. to Stowe, Vermont and from Comfort, TX. to Victoria, British Columbia. We find a lot of pluses staying in B&B's, perhaps topping the list would be the interesting people we meet. We have met couples from Great Britain, the Netherlands, Australia, Holland, Ceylon, Canada, Scotland, Japan and all over the United States. Are you thinking: "I wouldn't enjoy going into some ones home and spending the night?" I can assure you there is every type of B&B you can imagine, everything from private homes and historical buildings to barns that have been converted into lodging. The breakfast may be anything from bacon and eggs to gourmet. The cost can be very modest or in the luxury class. We selected the one in Stowe, VT., since their advertisement said they had sheep. They did, twenty-five. The hostess had a spinning wheel and she knitted beautiful sweaters. She had escaped from East Germany, made her way to America where she had married and was running a B&B in Stowe, VT. She vis-

ited with us as we sat around her kitchen table. We have seen the sun rise over the Atlantic from our bedroom window in Southwest Harbor, Maine. Or hostess lived in a basement apartment, devoting the second floor to five bedrooms and private baths. The ground floor was dining and living rooms with outside deck. We have eaten fried green tomatoes and breakfast steak with all the trimmings at a B&B in Land of the Lakes, Kentucky. We discovered the pleasure of sleeping under a goose down comforter in a B&B in Jasper, Alberta, Canada and while there became acquainted with a French-Canadian, visiting two or three hours with him. Perhaps the most truly authentic B&B we keep returning to is Wintercott in Victoria, British Columbia. Peter & Diane Caleb own it, but Peter runs it. He was born in England and served as superintendent of International schools until his retirement. He and his wife had Wintercott built as a B&B, one wing for guest, separated from their private wing by a solarium, living room and dining room. Peter is the chef, serving a traditional English breakfast. A side table offers a variety of dry cereals. The main table is set with fresh fruit, homemade jams and jellies and a choice of breakfast rolls. It is best not to get too carried away, as the main course will be at least three meats with

eggs fixed more ways than I believed possible. The rooms are all beautifully appointed with private baths. All this and only for seventy American dollars. I wish I had space to tell you of some of the others; Deer Crossing, Hamilton Montana, The Cajun plantation house in Lafayette, LA., with the hipbath tub and the Brunswick, Lindsborg, KA. The Lindsborg's chef is the husband half of another husband and wife team. He made a wonderful souffle and eggs benedict. All deserve to be mentioned but space does not permit. If you have not tried B&B's, please let me encourage you to do so. They have added a dimension to our travels that would have been missed if we had only stayed in motels. They are invariable clean, safe and there is always an element of surprise in them.

APPLICATION Petersburg Co-Op Gin, P.O. Box 40, Petersburg, Texas 79250, has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) for an amendment to Air Quality Permit No. 41372 which would authorize expansion of their Cotton Gin located at the intersection of Avenue A and East 4th Street in Petersburg, Hale County, Texas. The facility will emit the following air contaminants: particulate matter, sulfur dioxide, nitrogen oxides, carbon monoxide, and unburned hydrocarbons.

This application was submitted to the TNRCC on May 4, 2000. The application is available for viewing and copying at the TNRCC central office, the TNRCC Lubbock regional office, and at the Petersburg City Office located at 1524 Main Street in Petersburg. The facility's compliance file, if any exists, is available for public review in the Lubbock regional office of the TNRCC.

The TNRCC executive director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application.

MAILING LIST You may ask to be placed on a mailing list to obtain additional information on this application by sending a request to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below.

PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING You may submit public comments or request a public meeting or a contested case hearing to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below. The TNRCC will consider all public comments in developing a final decision on the application. The deadline to submit public comments is 30 days after newspaper notice is published. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will prepare a response to all relevant and material or significant public comments.

The purpose of public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or ask questions about the application. A public meeting about the application will be held if the executive director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

If only comments are received on the application, the response to comments, along with notice of the executive director's action on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted comments or is on the mailing list for this application. If a hearing request is timely filed, the executive director will issue a preliminary decision on the application following technical review and Notice of Application and Preliminary Decision will be published and mailed to those who are on the mailing list for this application.

After the final deadline for public comments following any required Notice of Application and Preliminary Decision, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. If any comments are received, the response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will then be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or is on a mailing list for this application.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING You may request a contested case hearing. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court. Unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 30 days from this notice, the executive director may approve the application. If no hearing request is received within this 30-day period, no further opportunity for hearing will be provided. A contested case hearing will only be granted based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. A person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the facility is entitled to request a hearing. If requesting a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number, if any; (2) applicant's name and permit number; (3) the statement "[I/we] request a [contested case] hearing;" (4) a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the application and air emissions from the facility in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the facility; and (6) a description of how you use the property which may be impacted by the facility. If the request is made by a group or an association, the one or more members who have standing to request a hearing and the interests which the group or association seeks to protect must also be identified. You may also submit your proposed adjustments to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns. Requests for a contested case hearing must be submitted in writing within 30 days following this notice to the Office of the Chief Clerk, at the address below.

If a hearing request is timely filed, additional notice may be provided. Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the executive director will forward the application and any requests for contested case hearing to the TNRCC Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact relating to relevant and material air quality concerns raised during the comment period. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the Commission's jurisdiction to address in this proceeding.
