

## COMPUTING COMMENTS

At your suggestion, and as we promised in the last issue, each issue henceforth will contain a page with comments about computing.

The single most important suggestion I can give to anyone considering genealogy with computers is one I have made to many of you personally. The suggestion is very important to those who have not purchased their hardware and software system. It is probably equally important to those who have made their purchase. The suggestion is that you subscribe immediately to *GENEALOGICAL COMPUTING*. That is a publication that is likely to save you much more than you will ever pay for the subscription. Buy and study the back issues as their content is important and as pertinent today as when the various issues were published. Their subscription price was \$14 a year for six issues, but it went up effective July 1 1983 to \$20. I recently sent in a two-year renewal. *GENEALOGICAL COMPUTING* is published by Data Transfer Associates, Ind., 5102 Pomeroy Dr., Fairfax, VA 22032. I have no personal interest or involvement with this publication or their editors and have never been in contact with them except to subscribe and to renew.

In the last issue of the publication they had their 1983 Reader Survey Report. Most of the remainder of this page comes from that report. The editors make an important point on the front page. When you are considering buying a computer system, don't run out and buy the one that is currently the most popular one in use. Although it is not *obsolete* there is a later model available. The two most popular computers in use in genealogy (by GC's readers) is the Apple II followed by the TRS-80 Model I (followed closely by Model III). The state of the art computers to buy from these two families today would be the Apple IIe or the TRS-80 Model 4. Now lets go ahead and look at what the readers have.

The Apple II is the most popular with 138 readers reporting having one. There are 10 Apple IIe's and 7 Apple III's. A recent home computer comparison in *INFOWORLD* showed the basic price of the Apple IIe to be \$1395 with 64K RAM. Basic prices normally do not include the cost of many items of peripheral equipment which will be required to make a complete system. In GC's reader survey the average Apple IIe system in use cost the user \$2933, with the high being \$5000 and the low \$2000. By comparison, the Apple II, the most popular system, had an average user cost of \$3542 with a high of \$7000 and a low of \$700 (he must have made some kind of deal). Some of the costs of the necessary accessories are: floppy disk drive, \$395; 12-inch green monitor (TV Screen), \$249; Dot-matrix printer (that is what I use for the newsletter), \$695; Letter-quality printer, \$2195. There is probably more software available for the Apple than for any other system. Each issue of GC contains a table of genealogical programs available by computer system. There are six for the Apple II. There are no systems with more than six. In the readers survey we are asked to indicate our experience level as genealogists and computerists by Novice, Experienced or Professional. In the largest groups reporting, ninety-two or 59% of the Apple users said they were experienced genealogists and 74 or 47% said they were novice computerists.

Lets take a comparable look at the TRS 80 computers. If you are not just a little bit computer smart, then you may not know that this is the computer made and distributed by the Radio Shack stores. There are currently five 80 models in use: I, II, III, 16 and the color computer. The numbers reported by GC readers are 71, 29, 69, 7 and 16 respectively. *INFOWORLD* also gave basic prices for two of these. The Model III is \$999 with 16K of RAM expandable to 48K for \$299 per 16K. The color computer is \$399.95 with expansion similar as the Model III. If you don't know about the K's of RAM, get smart because it may turn out to be your single most significant constraint. It is mine. The model III has a built in monitor. The color computer depends on your color TV as a monitor. Although disk drives are "built-in", they are priced separately, \$849 for the Model III. According to the GC's reader survey the average system cost for the Model III was \$3355 with a high of \$6500 and low of \$1000. For the color computer the average was \$1262 with a high of \$2000 and low of \$300. GC's table of genealogical programs available show six for the model III and two for the color computer. The largest group reporting on their genealogical experience were those who considered themselves to be experienced and there were 123 or 64% of those reporting. As computerists, the largest group were the novice with 73 or 38% of those reporting.

## ALABAMA MARRIAGES

Several months ago we bought the following marriage information from HUNTING FOR BEARS, INC. P O Box 278 Hammond, LA 70404; phone (504) 345-5603. They have collected marriage information from various sources in most of the southeastern states and have loaded it into a computerized data bank. If you need marriage information on one of your lines from the southeast, you might consider them as a source. They advertise in *THE GENEALOGICAL HELPER*. You can contact them direct, or if you desire we can give you more information on their program. They do not claim to have all, or even most of the marriages, but they have provided needed information for us on several occasions. The following was their complete Alabama Alford list at the time we bought it. We have arranged it in two sequences for your convenience.

## JOHN ALFORD

1. John Alford of Fredrick County, Virginia (thought to be from Maryland) married Mary Dawson 1717 in Dorchester, Maryland. Mary was the daughter of Anne Dawson. His will, dated November 13 1748 was probated January 4 1748 in Frederick Co. VA. Book I Page 231 & 232. Mary was living in Frederick County, Virginia April 6 1758. Along with the inventory of his estate he lists the following children (not necessarily in correct order):
  - 2 i. Thomas Alford, born 1725 Frederick County, Virginia, died 1806 Wythe County, Virginia, married Elizabeth \_\_\_\_;
  - ii. William Alford, born about 1734 Frederick County, Virginia, married Letiticia \_\_\_\_ about 1758;
  - iii. Mary Alford;
  - iv. Priscilla Alford;
  - v. Aquilla Alford.
  - vi. John Alford, minor at time of fathers death, inherits Negro Caesar at age 19;

## THOMAS ALFORD

2. Thomas, son of John and Mary (Dawson) Alford, was born about 1725 Frederick County, Virginia, and is said to be of English descent. Thomas died about November 1806 in Wythe County, Virginia. He married Elizabeth \_\_\_\_ who was born 1738 and died in Wythe County after 1806.

Montgomery land survey shows that Thomas and Elizabeth Alford owned 225 acres on west side of New River in 1783.

Deed book 4 of Wythe Co (page 388) shows that in November 1805 Thomas and Elizabeth sold to Joseph Russell and John Feely --- 225 acres by survey on New River, corner to Andrew Crockett.

Thomas Alford is listed in the Virginia Magazine and Biography, Vol 47 Page 32 as one of the men in Capt. Edwards Company between ages 16-56 on March 24 1781. He resided in Goochland County, Virginia in 1757.

The will of Thomas Alford as listed in Will Book 1-338 says: I am sick. Written Nov 14 1806. Probated Dec 1806. Mentions Moses to maintain his mother, Elizabeth; and to pay the brothers and sisters or their representatives of those who may be deceased \$1 each. Makes void all other wills. Wife Elizabeth and Moses to be executors.

Children of Thomas and Elizabeth were: (exact number and order not known)

- 3 i. Moses Alford, born about 1761E, died about 1822, married August 6 1821 Polly Lavender;
- 4 ii. John Alford, born about 1763 Montgomery County, Virginia, married (1) Miss Hayes about 1788 (2) Eleanor Hoge October 22 1789 Montgomery County, Virginia and (3) Miss Smith after 1814;
- 5 iii. James Alford, born about 1766;
- iv. Mary Alford, born about 1768, died about 1840-50 in Missouri, married Charles Baker February 10 1786 Montgomery County, Virginia;
- v. Thomas Alford, Jr, married Phebe Cummings October 13 1793 Botetourt County, Virginia. Phebe was the daughter of Robert Cummings;
- vi. Elizabeth Alford, born about 1775, married Joseph Joel Baker February 28 1793 in Montgomery County Virginia, Joseph was the son of Joseph and Rachel (Nannie) (Smith) Baker;
- vii. Jane Alford, may have been a child (or grandchild) of this family, married Jeremiah Hewitt about 1804 Wythe County, Virginia.

## MOSES ALFORD

3. Moses Alford, son of Thomas and Elizabeth Alford, was born 1761E, probably in Virginia. (Birth estimate of 1761 is predicated on his being named executor of his fathers will, suggesting he was the eldest son. Other sources had already established 1763 as the date of birth of his brother John.) He married Polly Lavender, daughter of Hugh Lavender, August 6 1821 and they lived in Wythe County, Virginia.

According to Book 10-659-1822, John Craig of Washington County, Virginia sold to Moses Alford of Wythe County 250 acres on New River.

Will Book 3-41-Sept. 6. 1822 - Moses Alford deceased estate recorded January 13, 1824/Appraisal September 6, 1822, a sale September 7, 1822. Administrators: Polly Alford and James Stephens. Other Alfords mentioned at the sale were Charles, William, John SR. and Bakers--Issac and especially Joseph.

Moses and Polly Lavender Alford had a daughter:

- i. Margaret (Polly) Alford, born 1822 married James Carnahan February 8, 1837. Marriage was by George Painter of the Presbyterian Church.
- ii. Thomas Alford may have been a son in this family.

## JOHN ALFORD

4. John Alford, son of Thomas and Elizabeth Alford, was born 1763 in Virginia. The date and place of his death are not known, but some think he died in Kentucky, others say Missouri.

He first married a Miss Hayes who died in late 1788 or early 1789. His second marriage was to Eleanor Hoge (Elinor Hogg/Hogue) on October 26 1789 (Date of Bond was October 22) in Montgomery County, Virginia. Eleanor, the daughter of James and Elizabeth (Howe) Hoge, was born April 5 1769 and died in December 1814.

He entered land in Montgomery County, Virginia in 1794. They lived in Montgomery, Wythe, Giles, Monroe and Barbour Counties in Virginia. He married the third time to a Miss Smith. It is thought he left Virginia for Kentucky, and may have moved onto Missouri. Names and number of children by the third marriage are not known. Below listed children may not be complete.

Children by John and \_\_\_\_ Hayes Alford are:

- i. Fielding Alford, born 1786;
  - ii. Elizabeth Alford, born 1788;
- Children of John and Eleanor Hoge Alford are:
- iii. James Alford, born December 21 1791 in Giles County, Virginia, died in 1861 in Daviess County, Indiana, married Hannah Baker in 1813, fourteen children, of which four died as infants;
  - iv. William Alford, born 1793 in Giles County, Virginia, married Peggy Eager in December 1823, at least one child;
  - v. John Alford Jr., born November 1798 in Virginia, died 1874 in Virginia, married Elizabeth Baker 1819, nine children;
  - vi. Lavina Alford born about 1800, married John Wesley Eager, several children;
  - vii. Charles Alford, born about 1801 in Virginia, married (1) Elizabeth Hoge 1820 in Virginia, (2) Sarah Ann Billy in Indiana, (3) Susan \_\_\_ in Kentucky, thirteen children

5. James Alford, son of Thomas and Elizabeth Alford, was born 1766, probably in Virginia.

It is not known who he married but he had at least two children as follows: (not necessarily in order)

- i. John Alford, born 1782;
- ii. Robert Alford.

## ALFORD INVENTORY, 1850

One of our most useful tools is the federal census. These billions and billions of records are at their best in fragments. Usually we work with a state index for a given year, but it never gives all the information we need. The information on the various family members must come from the detailed schedules prepared by county and by state. Rarely do you find a source that has all of these available at the same place and at the same time.

The purpose of our 1850 inventory of Alford's, is to bring all of this data together into one record. Although much of the work is going to be done by us, we need your help. We will need copies or extracts from census data you have available in your personal files, and in some cases, may need some of you to do research in sources near you since we do not have the resources locally in the St. Louis area.

The beginning of our project is the national summary by state showing the number of Alford families in each state in 1850, as it is reflected in the many indexes available. The first version of that list is on the facing page. The various columns are probably self explanatory. Where the "NO!'s" are shown in the next to last column we need your help with a copy of the Alford portion from an index of that state. We need all the information shown in the index such as name, county, township, and census page number. This will be the first part completed and should show us how many Alford families were in the United States, according to the census, in 1850. It will show the number by state and as a national total.

The next part of the project will show, by state, how many Alford families were in each county, and it will keep an account of how many of them on which we have the detailed family data. The first version, showing the data from the states on which we have an index is on pages 16 and 17. As we obtain new information on each state we will include it in *ABOUT ALFORDS*, but we will not repeat a state for the purpose of keeping up with our detailed data.

When all the state indexes are in the record we will prepare a national index listing every Alford family (head of family) in the 1850 census showing his state and township and the page of the census on which his detail may be found.

Our inventory will eventually contain the family breakout of every family tabulated in the aforementioned products. We will not publish all of this in *ABOUT ALFORDS*. Much of it has already been printed in the various issues of the *ALFORD FAMILY BULLETIN*. We will print some that were not previously published in the next issue of *ABOUT ALFORDS*. This record will show, by family, each member with their age, year of birth (ca), sex and place of birth and county of census. For the head of the family it will show profession and property information.

Finally we will prepare a master list of every Alford contained in the 1850 census. It will be alphabetical irrespective of family state etc, but will show name, age, year of birth (ca), sex, place of birth and county and state of census.

We will publish portions of this in *ABOUT ALFORDS*, but space will not permit us to publish the entire product in one or even several issues. Those who have made a significant contribution of data to our collection effort (about 5% of the input or more) will receive a complimentary copy of the complete booklet. Other subscribers will be able to purchase a copy for cost. Anyone else may have a copy for the price which will be determined at the completion of the project.

Let us know if you want to actively participate in the collection of data, and give us a general idea as to the resources available to you. If this seems confusing bear with us and help us and you will understand is as the project develops.
