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## SUMMARY OF MONTHLY OPERATIONS

The mission of land-based aircraft of the First Marine Aircraft Wing in Korea during the month of June was to maintain air superiority, to furnish close air support for ground units, to provide escort, to conduct day and night tactical armed reconnaissance, to conduct visual and photo reconnaissance, to provide air defense patrols, to provide air rescue operations, to effect the complete interdiction of North Korean supply centers and transportation facilities, and to destroy North Korean and Chinese Communist forces and other military targets which have an immediate effect on the current tactical situation. The First Marine Aircraft Wing performed the missions as directed by operations orders issued by the 5th U. S. Air Force.

During the month of June the First Marine Aircraft Wing dispatched a total of 3673 sorties for a total of 7250.5 combat hours, exclusive of sorties flown by HMR-161 and VMO-6. Of this total VMA-312, aboard the USS BATAAN, flew 542 sorties for a total of 1155.0 hours. The following is a breakdown of the land-based sorties flown: 801 day close air support, 14 day armed reconnaissance, 113 night armed reconnaissance, 66 day air defense, 49 night air defense, 177 photo reconnaissance, 2198 interdiction, 28 MPQ, and 207 miscellaneous. Carrier-based sorties were flown as follows: 175 combat air patrol, 186 target combat air patrol, 158 reconnaissance, 5 prebriefed strikes, 14 air spots, and 4 close air support.

The 801 close air support missions were flown in support of the following United Nations units: 1st Marine Division, 283; 1st Commonwealth Division, 23; 7th U. S. Infantry Division, 7; 25th U. S. Infantry Division, 25; 40th U. S. Infantry Division, 8; 45th U. S. Infantry Division, 122; Capital ROK Division, 25; 1st ROK Division, 52; 3rd ROK Division, 8; 5th ROK Division, 46; 6th ROK Division, 72; 7th ROK Division, 29; 8th ROK Division, 28; 9th ROK Division, 61; 11th ROK Division, 12.

The weather was less favorable for flying than during the month of May, with 12 days when flying was restricted. The highest temperature recorded was 96°F and the lowest 52°F, with the mean 72°F. The maximum wind velocity was 24 knots and the total precipitation was .46 inches.

The following is a report of cargo and passengers carried by aircraft under operational control of the First Marine Aircraft Wing during the month: total aircraft loaded at air freight, 1,215; total passengers loaded, 17,490; cargo loaded for the First Marine Division, 707,663 pounds; cargo loaded for the First Marine Aircraft Wing, 2,185,554 pounds; total cargo and passenger weight, 6,995,304 pounds.

The average number of operating aircraft during the month was 173 combat types and 57 non-combat types, and the average availability was 72%, with VMO-6 being high with an average of 88%. There were 12 aircraft strikes and a total of 12 "Y" transfers to FASCOM-11. A total of 30 replacement aircraft were received.

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The following ordnance was expended this month: 2,000 lb. G.P. bombs, 410; 1,000 lb. G.P. bombs, 1913; 500 lb. G.P. bombs, 1311; 250 lb. G.P. bombs, 5899; 100 lb. G.P. bombs, 5289; 260 lb. G.P. bombs, 442; 5.0" HVAR, 1371; 6.25" ATAP, 1253; 11.75" Rockets, 11; 20MM HEI, 189,624; 20MM INC, 189,625; 20MM APT, 170,137; Napalm thickener, 33,365 lbs.; GAL Tanks (JAP), 251; Flares, MK5, 785; and Flares, MK6, 3694.

The long awaited Cadre of 12 F3D aircraft arrived at VMF(N)-513. They are not operational as of 30 June as gun barrel extensions have not yet arrived. With these aircraft and the trained personnel accompanying them, the Marine will have night interceptors to range to the Yalu River. All Weather Fighter Squadron 513 is to have their F4U-5N's replaced by F7F-3N's and will operate both night fighter-bombers and night interceptors. These changes should greatly increase their operational capabilities.

1stLt. J. W. ANDRE of VMF(N)-513 became the first Marine pilot to shoot down 5 enemy planes in night combat. Lt. ANDRE had four planes to his credit in World War II and became a night fighter "Ace" on 7 June when he shot down a YAK type fighter over North Korea.

The morale of the personnel of the Wing is very high. This is partially due to the excellent food prepared and served and the large variety of recreation activities available.

The following distinguished personages visited the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing during June: Major General J. T. SELDEN, USMC, Commanding General, First Marine Division; Vice-Admiral R. P. BRISCOE, USN, Commander, Naval Forces, Far East; Rear Admiral F. X. MC INERNEY, USN, Commander, Amphibious Forces, Far East; Commander J. LYNN, USN, Naval Attache for Korea.

The Casualty Report for the month of June was four (4) officers killed in action, two (2) officers missing in action, two (2) enlisted men (Radar Operators) missing in action and four (4) officers wounded in action. The Consolidated Casualty Report as of 30 June is as follows:

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CHRONOLOGICAL NARRATIVE

For The Period

1 to 30 June 1952

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CHRONOLOGICAL NARRATIVE

1 June 1952:

VMA-312, aboard the USS BATAAN, received a congratulatory message from Rear Admiral John GIFFRICE, CTE 95, for their outstanding performance under difficult conditions during the last operating period (CTE 95, conf disp O10735Z, Appendix VI).

The maximum available jet aircraft and 16 AD/F4U's for interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for night sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOC day readiness alerts at K-3 and K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One hundred-four (104) sorties were dispatched with 103 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 2 were air defense, 7 were armed reconnaissance, 28 were interdiction, 59 were CAS, 3 were photo reconnaissance, and 4 were miscellaneous. The weather ranged from operational to non-operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 153-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew 551 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 103 of those including 42% of the CAS sorties and 26% of the interdiction missions (Daily Operational Summary No. 153-52, Appendix III).

Friendly damages resulting from enemy anti-aircraft fire were as follows: one (1) F9F from VME-115 on an interdiction mission, sustained minor damage; two (2) AD-2's from VMA-121, on CAS sorties, received minor damages; and one (1) F4U from VME-212, on a CAS mission, suffered minor damage (1st MAW Daily Intelligence Summary No. 154, Appendix I).

2 June 1952:

Air Base Order No. 8, "Beach Regulations, establishment of," was published this date (Appendix VII).

One hundred forty-eight (148) interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for night sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOC day readiness alert at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One hundred ninety-four (194) sorties were dispatched with 190 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 4 were air defense, 152 were interdiction, 25 were CAS, 7 were photo reconnaissance, and 2 were miscellaneous. The weather ranged from marginal to operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 154-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units mounted 791 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 190 of those including 49% of the CAS and interdiction sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 154-52, Appendix III).

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Friendly damages resulting from enemy anti-aircraft fire were as follows: three (3) F9F's from VMT-115, on interdiction missions, received minor damages; three F4U's from VME-323, on CAS sorties, sustained minor damages; and one (1) F4U from VMT-212, on an interdiction mission, suffered minor damage (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 155, Appendix I).

An interesting report on "Possible Rockets," may be found in the 1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 155 (Appendix I).

3 June 1952:

Eighty-five (85) enemy vehicles were sighted by pilots from the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing who destroyed 2 of those (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 156, Appendix I).

Ninety-six (96) interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for armed reconnaissance sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOC day readiness alert at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. Fifty-two (52) sorties were dispatched with 49 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 6 were armed reconnaissance, 37 were interdiction, 4 were CAS, and 2 were miscellaneous. The weather was operational at night and marginal to non-operational during the day (Daily Operational Summary No. 155-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew only 195 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 49 of those including 33% of the CAS sorties and 85% of the interdiction sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 155-52, Appendix III).

There were only 4 encounters with flak and no damages were suffered. (Daily Intelligence Summary No. 156, Appendix I).

4 June 1952:

The Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing informed COMNAVSTA that the Wing could make 3 F2H-2P's and 6 pilots available for the special operation Formosa Straits (CG 1st MAF sec disp 040752Z, Appendix V).

Fifty-two (52) interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for night sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOC day readiness alerts at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. Ninety (90) sorties were dispatched with 86 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 47 were interdiction, 28 were CAS, 3 were photo reconnaissance, and 8 were miscellaneous. The weather ranged from marginal to operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 156-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew 634 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing flying 86 of those including 100% of the CAS sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 156-52, Appendix III).

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Friendly damages resulting from enemy anti-aircraft fire were as follows: one (1) AD from VMA-121, on a CAS sortie, sustained major damage; three (3) AD's from VMA-121, on CAS sorties, received minor damages; one (1) F4U from VME-212, on a CAS sortie, received minor damage; and two (2) F4U's from VME-212, on CAS sorties, sustained minor damages (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 157, Appendix I).

5 June 1952:

The Commanding Officer of Marine Aircraft Group 12 informed the Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing of the breakdown of part of the Y-6 parking area and taxiway that has just been sealed (CO MAG-12 conf disp 051330Z, Appendix V).

1st MAF Technical Bulletin No. 4-52, "Survival Radio Equipment," was published this date (Appendix VII).

Eighty-one (81) enemy vehicles were sighted with 5 being destroyed (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 158, Appendix I).

One hundred-four (104) interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for night sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOC day readiness alert at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One Hundred forty-eight (148) sorties were dispatched with 138 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 4 were air defense, 8 were armed reconnaissance, 85 were interdiction, 22 were CAS, 6 were photo reconnaissance, and 13 were miscellaneous. The weather was operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 157-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew 745 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing mounting 138 of those including 40% of the interdiction sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 157-52, Appendix III).

One (1) F4U from VME-212 and one (1) AD from VMA-121, on CAS sorties, sustained minor damages when they were hit by enemy anti-aircraft fire (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 158, Appendix I).

6 June 1952:

Captain Clyde R. JAFFRETT, 027449, USMC, pilot from VMA-121, was forced to bail out of his aircraft because of an engine failure. He was picked up uninjured by helicopter in friendly territory. The AD was a strike (CO MAG-12 sec disp 060115Z, Appendix V and G-3 Staff Journal of 6 June 1952, Appendix IV).

ComFAirJapan informed ComNavFE of the proposal to bring the Marine attack and jet squadrons in Korea up to their complement (ComFAirJapan sec disp 060228Z, Appendix V).

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Sixteen (16) enemy vehicles were sighted by pilots from the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing with 4 being destroyed (1st MAW Daily Intelligence Summary No. 159, Appendix I).

One hundred (100) interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for night sorties; 20 CAS sorties; the JOC day readiness alerts at K-6; and the readiness alert at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One hundred eighty-eight (188) sorties were dispatched with 187 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 5 were air defense, 7 were armed reconnaissance, 102 were interdiction, 48 were CAS, 8 were photo reconnaissance, and 17 were miscellaneous. The weather was operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 158-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew 930 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 187 of those. Included in the Wing's total were 67% of the CAS sorties and 33% of the interdiction sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 158-52, Appendix III).

7 June 1952:

The Commanding General of the 5th Air Force informed the Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing of the plans to airlift troops from Japan to K-1 in the event of further deterioration of the political situation in South Korea (CG 5th AF sec disp 070310Z, Appendix V).

The Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing notified the Commanding Officers of Marine Aircraft Groups 12 and 33 of the possibility of guerilla activity and in view of this possibility, base defense plans should be kept current (CG 1st MAW sec disp 070522Z, Appendix V).

The Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing commended the VMR-152 detachment at Itami on the completion of the baggage movement for the 1st Marine Division (CG 1st MAW disp 070752Z, Appendix V).

VMA-312, aboard the USS BATAAN, flew a total of 39 sorties (CDE 95.11 conf disp 071005Z, Appendix VI).

1st Marine Aircraft Wing pilots sighted 23 enemy vehicles and destroyed 17 of those (1st MAW Daily Intelligence Summary No. 160, Appendix I).



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One hundred (100) interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for night sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOC day readiness alerts at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One hundred eighty-seven (187) sorties were dispatched with 181 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 4 were air defense, 8 were armed reconnaissance, 87 were interdiction, 65 were CAS, 12 were photo reconnaissance, and 5 were miscellaneous. The weather was operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 159-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew 967 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 181 of those including 93% of the CAS sorties, and 30% of the interdiction sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 159-52, Appendix III).

Friendly losses and damages resulting from enemy anti-aircraft fire were as follows: one (1) F4U from VMF-323, on a CAS sortie, was lost; two (2) F4U's from VMF-323, on a CAS sortie sustained minor damage; and one (1) F4U from VMF-212, on a CAS sortie sustained minor damage (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 160, Appendix I).

1st Lieutenant John ANDRE, pilot from VMF(N)-513, was credited with shooting down an enemy night fighter and was congratulated by the Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing (VMF(N)-513 sec disp 060452Z, CTF 91 disp 081318Z, CG, 1stMAW disp 090547Z, Appendix V).

8 June 1952:

VMA-312, aboard the USS BATAAN, flew a total of 41 sorties (CTE 95.11 conf disp 081044Z, Appendix VI).

1st MAF General Order No. 96, "Awards and Decorations," was published this date (Appendix VII).

Thirty (30) enemy vehicles were sighted with 11 being destroyed (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 161, Appendix I).

The maximum F9F and 12 F4U/AD interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for night sorties; 12 CAS sorties, the JOC day readiness alerts at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One hundred thirty-nine (139) sorties were dispatched with 132 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 4 were air defense, 7 were armed reconnaissance, 82 were interdiction, 22 were CAS, 2 were photo reconnaissance, and 15 were miscellaneous. The weather was operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 160-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew 703 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 132 of those including 48% of the interdiction sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 160-52, Appendix III).

One (1) AD-2, from VMA-121, on a CAS sortie, sustained major damage, and two AD-2's from VMA-121, on CAS sorties, suffered minor damages when they were hit by enemy anti-aircraft fire (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 161, Appendix I).

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The Commanding Officer of Marine Aircraft Group 12 informed the Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing of the acute water shortage at K-6 and requested that water tanks be released as soon as possible (CO MAG-12 rest disp 090030Z, Appendix V).

ComFAirJapan informed the Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing that on the departure of the USS VALLEY FORGE from the operational area, 14 F9F's, 3 AD-2's, and 2 AD-3's would be available for fly off to Hedron, 1st Marine Aircraft Wing. The Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing notified ComFAirJapan that the Wing would provide an airlift for the return of 19 pilots to the Naval Air Station at Atsugi (ComFAirJapan conf disp 090248Z, 1st MAW conf disp 091324Z, Appendix V).

1st Lieutenant John J. MC BRIDE, III, 036712, pilot from VMF-323, was listed as killed in action when he apparently lost control of his F4U-4B during an attack at YD5817 (CO MAG-12 disp 091040Z, sec disp 091110Z, Appendix V).

VMA-312, aboard the USS BATAAN, flew 44 sorties this date (OTW 95.11 conf disp 091054Z, Appendix VI).

One hundred twenty (120) interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for night sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOC day readiness alert at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. Two hundred-six (206) sorties were dispatched with 205 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 6 were air defense, 7 were armed reconnaissance, 103 were interdiction, 68 were CAS, 7 were photo recon, and 9 were miscellaneous. The weather was operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 161-52, Appendix III).

Thirteen (13) enemy vehicles were sighted with 4 being destroyed (1st MAW Daily Intelligence Summary No. 162, Appendix I).

Friendly damages resulting from enemy anti-aircraft fire were as follows: One (1) F4U from VMF-323, on an interdiction sortie, was lost; 2 F7F's from VMF(N)-513, on night armed recon sorties, sustained minor damages; 1 F9F from VMF-311, on an interdiction sortie, received minor damage; 1 F4U from VMF-323, on a CAS sortie, suffered minor damage; 2 F4U's from VMF-312, 1 on an interdiction sortie and 1 on a CAS sortie, sustained minor damage; and 1 F4U from VMF-323, on an interdiction sortie, received major damage (1st MAW Daily Intelligence Summary No. 162, Appendix I).

10 June 1953:

Marine Fighter Squadron 212 was redesignated Marine Attack Squadron 212 (CO MAG-12 conf disp 090910Z, Appendix V).

The Commanding General of the Eight Army informed all units in Korea that aircraft flying during the hours of darkness north of east west running through Seoul and not cleared through JOC will be attacked by night fighters without warning (CG EUSAK Main sec disp 100615Z, Appendix V).

The Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing informed the 6405 Air Support Wing of the critical shortage of 500 lb. GP bombs, fins and tail fuse M101A2 and requested that a shipment of 300 each to MAG-33 at K-3 be expedited (CG 1st MAW conf disp 100757Z, Appendix V).

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VMA-313, aboard the USS BATAAN, flew a total of 35 sorties (OTE 95.11 conf disp 101031Z, Appendix VI).

Twenty-four (24) enemy vehicles were sighted with 2 being destroyed (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 163, Appendix I).

Ninety-six (96) sorties; the maximum available aircraft for night sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOG day readiness alert at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. Sixty-one (61) sorties were dispatched with 60 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 4 were air defense, 7 were armed reconnaissance, 39 were interdiction, 4 were CAS, and 6 were miscellaneous. The weather was operational during the night and marginal to non-operational during the day (Daily Operational Summary No. 162-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew 319 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 60 of those including 100% of the CAS sorties and 31% of the interdiction sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 162-52, Appendix III).

One (1) F9F-2 from VMA-311, on an interdiction sorties, sustained minor damage when it was hit by enemy automatic weapons fire (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 163, Appendix I).

11 June 1952:

The Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing informed all Group Commanders that all units who participate in rescue CAPS over native-type fishing boats will be briefed very emphatically that the most stringent security pertains with respect to these operations. The purpose of this is that every effort be made to prevent a compromise to the enemy of possible future operations (CG 1st MAF sec disp 110618Z, Appendix V).

VMA-312, aboard the USS BATAAN, flew a total of 46 sorties (OTE 95.11 conf disp 111050Z, Appendix VI).

Pilots from the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing sighted 37 enemy vehicles and destroyed 10 of those (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 164, Appendix I).

One hundred-four (104) interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for night sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOG day readiness alert at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One hundred seventy (170) sorties were dispatched with 161 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 2 were air defense, 17 were armed reconnaissance, 110 were interdiction, 11 were CAS, 3 were photo reconnaissance, and 18 were miscellaneous. The weather was operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 163-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew 770 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 161 of those including 43% of the interdiction sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 163-52, Appendix III).

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One (1) AD-2 from VMA-121, on a CAS sortie, sustained minor damage when it was hit by enemy anti-aircraft fire (1st MAW Daily Intelligence Summary No. 164, Appendix I).

12 June 1952:

The Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing expressed his appreciation to the Commander of Task Force 77 for the efficient delivery, the excellent condition of aircraft and the completeness of log book records of the aircraft that was transferred to the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing from CTF 77 (CG 1st MAW disp 12000Z, Appendix V).

Captain Morris L. POTTER, 027470Z, pilot, and MSgt William R. GOODALL, III, 314210, radar operator, from VMF(N)-513, were reported as missing in action (CO VMF(N)-513 sec disp 130123Z, disp 130616Z, Appendix V).

The Commanding Officer of Marine Aircraft Group 12 listed the following pilots as wounded in action: Captain Keith W. FOUNTAIN, 030019, USMCR, from VMF-323; Captain Clyde F. JARRETT, 027449, USMC, from VMA-121; and Captain Richard N. SCHADE, 039762, USMCR, from VMA-121 (CO, MAG-12 disps 120401Z, 120402Z, and 120403Z, Appendix V).

VMA-312, aboard the USS BATAAN, flew a total of 44 sorties (CTE 95.11 acnf disp 121027Z, Appendix VI).

Twenty-four (24) enemy vehicles were sighted with 7 being destroyed (1st MAW Daily Intelligence Summary No. 165, Appendix I).

One hundred-twelve (112) interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for armed reconnaissance sorties; 40 CAS sorties; the JOC day readiness alert at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One hundred seventy-one (171) sorties were dispatched with 170 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 5 were air defense, 7 were armed reconnaissance, 101 were interdiction, 34 were CAS, 5 were photo reconnaissance, and 16 were miscellaneous. The weather was operational throughout the period in all target areas (Daily Operational Summary No. 164-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew 724 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 170 of those including 31% of the CAS sorties and 38% of the interdiction sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 164-52, Appendix III).

One (1) F9 F-2 from VMF-115, on an interdiction mission, sustained minor damage when it was hit by enemy anti-aircraft fire (1st MAW Daily Intelligence Summary No. 165, Appendix I).

One (1) F4U from VMF-323 crashed while on the base leg of its landing pattern. One (1) F7F from VMF(N)-513, sustained minor damage while flying through debris from an exploding truck (Daily Operational Summary No. 164-52, Appendix III).

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13 June 1952:

The Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing informed ComNavFE that the Commanding General of the 5th Air Force has agreed to the shore basing at K-6 of VMA-312 while the carrier is being utilized by helicopters (CITE 91 sec disp 131155Z, Appendix V).

VMA-312 aboard the USS BATAAN, flew a total of 45 sorties (CITE 95.11 conf disp 131029Z, Appendix VI).

Ninety-eight (98) interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for night sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOC day readiness alerts at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One hundred fifty-four (154) sorties were dispatched with 151 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 7 were air defense, 7 were armed reconnaissance, 91 were interdiction, 26 were CAS, 5 were photo reconnaissance, and 15 were miscellaneous. The weather throughout the period was operational (Daily Operational Summary No. 165-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew 795 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 151 of those including 25% of the CAS sorties and 32% of the interdiction sorties ((Daily Operational Summary No. 165-52, Appendix III).

Friendly losses and damages resulting from enemy anti-aircraft fire were as follows: one (1) F7F from VME(N)-513, on an armed reconnaissance mission was lost; two (2) F4U's from VME-323, on a CAS mission, sustained minor damage; one (1) F4U-4B from VME-323, on an interdiction mission, suffered major damage; and one (1) AD-2 from VMA-121, on a CAS mission, sustained minor damages (1st MAW Daily Intelligence Summary No. 166, Appendix I).

14 June 1952:

Captain Howard D. CAMPBELL, Jr., 025615, USMC, pilot from VME-115 was listed as killed in action when a VT fuse fragmentation bomb exploded enroute to the target. 1st Lieutenant Lee C. PULSIPHER, 051522, USMCR, pilot from VME-115, flying wingman on the aircraft that exploded in midair bailed out of his aircraft and was picked up by a native fishing boat (CO MAG-12 sec disps 141022Z, 141023Z, CO VME-115 disp 151202Z, Appendix V).

VMA-312, aboard the USS BATAAN, flew a total of 43 sorties (CITE 95.11 conf disp 141059Z, Appendix VI).

Seven (7) enemy vehicles were sighted with 3 being destroyed (1st MAW Daily Intelligence Summary No. 167, Appendix I).

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Thirty-six (36) interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for night sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOC day readiness alert at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One hundred sixty-one (161) sorties were dispatched with 140 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 4 were air defense, 7 were armed reconnaissance, 99 were interdiction, 16 were CAS, 9 were photo reconnaissance, and 5 were miscellaneous. The weather was operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 166-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units mounted 702 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing flying 140 of those including 39% of the interdiction sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 166-52, Appendix III).

Friendly damages resulting from enemy anti-aircraft fire were as follows: two (2) F9F-2's from VMA-115 were lost; one (1) F9F-2 from VMA-115, on an interdiction mission sustained minor damage; one (1) F9F-2 from VMA-311, on an interdiction mission, sustained minor damage; one (1) F7F-3N from VMF(N)-513, on a night armed reconnaissance mission, sustained minor damage; and one (1) AD-2 from VMA-121, on an interdiction mission, received minor damage (1st MAW Daily Intelligence Summary No. 167, Appendix I).

An interesting outline of recent enemy activity may be found in the 1st MAW Daily Intelligence Summary No. 167, Appendix I.

15 June 1952:

The Commanding General of the 5th Air Force requested that the Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing hold a practice ground alert prior to 18 June and forward a brief report to 5th Air Force Headquarters (5th Air Force sec disp 150558Z, Appendix V).

VMA-312, aboard the USS BATAAN, flew a total of 40 sorties (OTE 95.11 conf disp 151045, Appendix VI).

1st Marine Aircraft Wing pilots sighted 6 enemy vehicles and destroyed 5 of those (1st MAW Daily Intelligence Summary No. 168, Appendix I).

One hundred-eight (108) interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for armed reconnaissance sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOC day readiness alerts at K-6; and the readiness alert at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One hundred forty-nine (149) sorties were dispatched with 144 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 5 were air defense, 6 were armed reconnaissance, 99 were interdiction, 23 were CAS, 3 were photo reconnaissance, and 8 were miscellaneous. The weather was operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 167-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew a total of 723 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 144 of those including 25% of the CAS sorties and 40% of the interdiction sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 167-52, Appendix III).

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Friendly damages resulting from enemy anti-aircraft fire were as follows: one (1) F9F from VMF-115, on an interdiction mission, sustained minor damage; one (1) AD-2 from VMA-121, on a CAS mission, received minor damage; and one (1) F4U from VMA-212, on a CAS mission sustained minor damage (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 168, Appendix I).

16 June 1952:

Captain Robert R. SCOTT, 024655, USMC, pilot, and TSgt Richard E. MULLETT, 550847, USMC, radar operator, from VMF(N)-513, were listed as missing in action when their F7F was lost due to a mechanical failure on 15 June (CO VMF(N)-513 disp 160218Z, Appendix V and Daily Operational Summary No. 168-52, Appendix III).

The Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing requested that ComFAirJapan supply MAG-12 and MAG-33 with a sufficient number of MK55 model 1 bomb racks in place of the model O racks. The high malfunction rate of the model O racks indicate that they should be replaced immediately (CG 1st MAF conf disp 160150Z, Appendix V).

Sixty (60) interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for armed reconnaissance sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOC day readiness alert at V-6; and the readiness alerts at V-3, V-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One hundred seventy-seven (177) sorties were dispatched and all were effective. Of those flights flown, 3 were air defense, 7 were armed reconnaissance, 84 were interdiction, 36 were CAS, 14 were photo reconnaissance, and 33 were miscellaneous. The weather ranged from marginal to operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 168-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew 679 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 177 of those including 36% of the CAS sorties and 39% of the interdiction sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 168-52, Appendix III).

Friendly damages resulting from enemy anti-aircraft fire were as follows: two (2) F4U's from VMF-323, on a rescue mission, received minor damage; one (1) F7F from VMF(N)-513, on an armed reconnaissance mission, sustained minor damage; one (1) F4U from VMA-212, on a CAS mission, sustained minor damage; one (1) AD-2, from VMA-121, on a CAS mission, suffered minor damage, and one (1) F4U from VMF(N)-513, on a rescue mission, received minor damage (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 169, Appendix I).

17 June 1952:

The Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing informed the Commandant of the Marine Corps that in order to comply with 5th Air Force directives in relation to battle damage to aircraft and to evaluate results of combat strikes it is essential that Marine Aircraft Group 12 have photographic facilities (CG 1st MAF disp 170655Z, Appendix V).

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The Commanding Officer of Marine Aircraft Group 33 informed the Commanding General of the 5th Air Force that a practice ground alert was held on 16 June 1952 at K-3. The situation progressed with a minimum of confusion and field problems were conducted with satisfactory results (CO MAG-33 sec disp 171331Z, Appendix V).

Twenty-six (26) enemy vehicles were sighted and 8 of those were destroyed (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 170, Appendix I).

One hundred eighty-eight (188) interdiction sorties, the maximum available aircraft for armed reconnaissance sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOC day readiness alert at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. Eighty-two (82) sorties were dispatched with 81 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 6 were armed reconnaissance, 58 were interdiction, 8 were CAS, 2 were photo reconnaissance, and 7 were miscellaneous. The weather during the night ranged from marginal to non-operational and during the day the weather restricted operations (Daily Operational Summary No. 169-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew 436 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 81 of those including 47% of the interdiction missions (Daily Operational Summary No. 169-52, Appendix III).

Friendly losses and damages resulting from enemy anti-aircraft fire were as follows: one (1) F7F from VMF(N)-513, on a night armed reconnaissance mission, sustained minor damage; one (1) F4U from VMF(N)-513, on a night armed reconnaissance mission, received minor damage; one (1) F4U from VMF-212, on a CAS sortie, suffered minor damage; and one (1) F4U from VMF-323, on an interdiction mission, was lost (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 170, Appendix I).

18 June 1952:

The Commanding Officer of MAG-33 advised CINCPACFLT that the probable cause of the VT fused bomb detonation of 14 June was that the MK-2 arming wire plate type loop pulled from the solenoid and the resulting whipping of the wire pulled it from the fuse and armed the bomb (CO MAG-33 conf disp 181355Z, Appendix V).

The Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing notified ComAirFac that flare requirements for target sorties are 50 to 70 flares per hour (CG 1st MAF Conf disp 180541Z, Appendix V).

Air Base Order Number 14 pertaining to the establishment of internal security guard was published this date. This is to improve the security of K-3 Air Base in accordance with present policies (Air Base Order Number 14, Appendix VII).



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One hundred (100) interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for night sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOC readiness alert at K-6; the readiness alert at K-3, K-6, and K-8; and 4 RESCAP sorties were scheduled. Eight (8) sorties were dispatched with 6 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 2 were air defense, 1 was night armed reconnaissance, 1 was photo reconnaissance and 2 were miscellaneous. The weather ranged from marginal to non-operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 170-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew a total of 105 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 6 of those including 100% of the Air Defense sorties and 57% of the RESCAP missions (Daily Operational Summary No. 170-52, Appendix III).

Friendly damages resulting from enemy anti-aircraft fire were as follows: two (2) F7F's and one (1) F4U-5N from VMF(N)-513, sustained minor damage (1st MAW Daily Intelligence Summary No. 171, Appendix I).

19 June 1952:

BUAER recommended to the Commanding Officer, Marine Aircraft Group 12 that tests be made to determine operating characteristics of the AU-1 aircraft at various gross weights and altitudes (BUAER disp 192125Z, Appendix V).

One hundred (100) interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for night armed reconnaissance sorties; 4 day armed reconnaissance sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOC alert at K-6; 8 MPQ sorties; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One hundred twenty-nine (129) sorties were dispatched with 127 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 110 were interdiction, 10 were CAS, 4 were photo recon and 3 were miscellaneous. The weather ranged from non-operational during the night to operational during the day (Daily Operational Summary No. 171-52, Appendix III).

Friendly damages resulting from enemy anti-aircraft fire were as follows: one (1) F9F from VMF-115, received minor damage; three (3) AD-2's from VMA-121, received minor damage; two (2) F4U's from VMF-323, received minor damage; and one (1) F4U from VMA-212, received major damage. All aircraft damaged were on interdiction missions and were hit by automatic weapons fire (Daily Intelligence Summary No. 172, Appendix I).

20 June 1952:

CNO advised that the number of EO5's for VMO-6 will be increased to a total of 12 aircraft (CNO conf disp 202151Z, Appendix V).

1st Marine Aircraft Wing pilots sighted one (1) enemy vehicle and destroyed it (1st MAW Daily Intelligence Summary No. 173, Appendix I).

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One hundred (100) interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for night sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOC day readiness alert at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One hundred forty-eight (148) sorties were dispatched with 146 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 4 were air defense, 4 were day armed reconnaissance, 7 were night armed reconnaissance, 95 were interdiction, 16 were CAS, 12 were photo reconnaissance, and 8 were miscellaneous. The weather throughout the period was operational (Daily Operational Summary No. 172-52, Appendix III).

One (1) F9F-2 from VMF-115 was lost when the pilot was forced to ditch due to a flame out (CO MAG-33 sec disp 200722Z, Appendix V).

The following are the friendly losses resulting from enemy small arms and automatic weapons fire: One (1) F9F-2 from VMF-115 on an interdiction mission, received major damage; two (2) F4U's from VMA-212, on a CAS mission, received major damage (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 173, Appendix I).

21 June 1952:

Vice Admiral R. P. EPISCOPE, USN, ComNavFE and Major General J. T. SELDEN, USMC, Commanding General, 1st Marine Division visited K-3 this date.

Captain A. J. GILLIS, 029411, USMC was nominated for 90 days PAD with the 4th Fighter Wing vice Captain S. G. WARREN (CG 1st MAF disp 210900Z, Appendix V).

Captain Bobbie FOSTER, 024474, USMCR, from VMA-212, was listed as killed in action when his F4U crashed at XC7822 (CO MAG-12 disp 211158Z, Appendix V).

Captain John W. MULDOON, Jr., 020987, USMC, from VMA-121, made a wheels down landing on Cho-Do Island when his AD-2 caught fire. He was uninjured and the aircraft suffered minor damage (CO MAG-12 disp 210624Z, Appendix V).

Captain Frank L. EDDENS, 016709, USMC, of VMA-212, ditched his F4U-4B five miles south of Cho-Do Island when the aircraft was hit by enemy small arms fire and lost all oil pressure. Captain EDDENS was picked up uninjured by a British ship (CO MAG-12 disp 210354Z, Appendix V).

Ninety-six (96) interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for night sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOC alert at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. Two hundred-fourteen (214) sorties were dispatched with 213 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 4 were air defense, 7 were night armed reconnaissance, 118 were interdiction, 58 were CAS sorties, 18 were photo reconnaissance, and 9 were miscellaneous. The weather was operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 173-52, Appendix III).

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Friendly losses and damages resulting from enemy anti-aircraft fire was as follows: two (2) F4U's from VMA-212, were lost; two (2) F9F's from VMF-115, on interdiction sorties, sustained minor damage; two (2) F4U's from VMF-323, on a CAS mission, sustained minor damage; one (1) F7F from VMF(N)-513, on a night armed reconnaissance mission, sustained minor damage; one (1) AD-2 from VMA-121, on a MPQ mission, sustained minor damage; and two (2) AD-2's, from VMA-121, on CAS missions sustained minor damage (1st MAM Daily Intelligence Summary No. 174, Appendix I).

22 June 1952:

Major General J. T. SELDEN, USMC, Commanding General, 1st Marine Division departed K-3 today for K-16 (CG 1st MAM rest disp 220010Z, Appendix V).

Four enemy vehicles were sighted and of this number, none were destroyed (Daily Intelligence Summary No. 175, Appendix I).

Sixteen (16) F9F's, 12 F4U/AD's, and 4 F4U aircraft for interdiction sorties; the maximum available aircraft for night sorties; 28 CAS sorties; the JOC alert at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One hundred-twenty (120) sorties were dispatched and all were effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 68 were CAS, 32 were interdiction, 2 were air defense, 8 were night armed reconnaissance, 6 were reconnaissance, and 4 were miscellaneous. The weather during the period was operational in all target areas (Daily Operational Summary No. 174-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew 453 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing pilots accounting for 120 of those including 75% of the CAS sorties, and 44% of the interdiction sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 174-52, Appendix III).

23 June 1952:

The Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing requested from the Commanding General of the 1st Marine Division, one (1) helicopter to transport a Medical Team from K-18 to the island of Ullung-do. A typhus epidemic, involving some persons already dead, is reported sweeping the island (CG 1st MAM rest disp 230827Z, Appendix V).

The Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing requested that the Commanding General of the 5th Air Force provide a crash boat for K-6 airfield since no helicopter or other sea crash rescue facilities are available (CG 1st MAM rest disp 230412Z, Appendix V).

Eighty-eight (88) F4U/AD/F9F aircraft were scheduled to attack hydro-electric plants north of Hamhung at CV 5843 and CV 6533. Four (4) F4U/AD sorties; 12 F4U/AD sorties; the JOC alert at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One hundred twenty-eight (128) sorties were dispatched and 126 were effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 100 were interdiction, 7 were CAS, 8 were night armed reconnaissance sorties, 8 were reconnaissance, and 3 were miscellaneous. The weather was operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 175-52, Appendix III).

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Forty-five (45) F4U/AD sorties attacked hydro-electric at CV6543 claiming 20 hits on the plant, 1 surge tank destroyed, and 15 Killed in Action. Thirty-eight (38) F9F sorties attacked a similiar hydro-electric plant at CV6533 claiming destruction of the plant and scoring 1 rail cut. The operation was in accordance with instructions contained in "Plan 63-52", (Daily Operational Summary No. 175-52, Appendix III).

Air Base Order Number 16, "Post Exchanges, establishment of," was published this date (Appendix VII).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew 834 sorties with pilots of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 128 of the total, including 30% of the interdiction sorties and 27% of the CAS sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 175-52, Appendix III).

24 June 1952:

The Commanding General of the 1st Marine Division informed the Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing that all available helicopter were committed and that the earliest available ETA at K-8 was 260800L. The helicopter was to be used in connection with the proposed mercy-mission to Ullung-do Island where a typhus epidemic had killed several persons (CG 1st MarDiv disp 240030Z, Appendix V).

The Commanding General of the 5th Air Force warned all 5th AF units to be especially alert in the event of sudden enemy action, violence, and sabotage (CG 5th AF sec disp 241210Z, Appendix V).

1st MAF Memorandum Number 80-52, "Far East Command Recreation Funds, information concerning," was published this date (Appendix VII).

1st MAF Memorandum Number 93-52, "Monthly Automotive and Allied Equipment Report," was published this date (Appendix VII).

1st MAF Memorandum Number 92-52, "Legal Information," was published this date (Appendix VII).

Four (4) enemy vehicles were sighted with all being destroyed (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 177, Appendix I).

Forty (40) F9F and 4 F4U/AD aircraft for interdiction sorties, the maximum available aircraft for night sorties; 12 F4U/AD CAS sorties; the JCC alert at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One hundred fifty-six (156) sorties were dispatched and 154 were effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 6 were armed reconnaissance, 84 were interdiction, 35 were CAS, 14 were reconnaissance, and 15 were miscellaneous. The weather was operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 176-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew a total of 1039 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 154 of those including 40% of the CAS sorties and 16% of the interdiction sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 176-52, Appendix III).

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Friendly damages resulting from enemy anti-aircraft fire were as follows: two (2) F4U's, from VMF-323, and one (1) F4U from VMA-212, on CAS missions, received minor damage; one (1) F9F from MAG-33, on an interdiction mission, sustained minor damage; and one (1) F9F from VMF-115, suffered minor damage while on an interdiction sortie (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 177, Appendix I).

25 June 1952:

The Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing notified the Commanding General of EUSAK that arrangements were completed for sub-branch of EUSAK Branch Exchange at Pusan for units based at K-3; and sub-branch of EUSAK Branch Exchange at Inchon for units based at K-6. These sub-branches were opened this date (CG, 1st MAF disp 080606Z, Appendix V).

Eighty-eight (88) interdiction sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JCC day readiness alert at K-3 and K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One hundred-eight (108) sorties were dispatched with 103 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 9 were air defense, 76 were interdiction, 12 were CAS, 3 were armed reconnaissance, and 3 were miscellaneous. The weather was operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 177-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew a total of 674 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 103 of those including 44% of the night air defense and 33% of the air defense (Daily Operational Summary No. 177-52, Appendix III).

Friendly damages resulting from enemy anti-aircraft fire were as follows: two (2) AD-2's, from VMA-121, on an interdiction mission, sustained minor damage; and one (1) AD-2 on a CAS mission suffered minor damage (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 178, Appendix I).

26 June 1952:

The Commanding General of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing informed the Commanding Officer of the Third Bomber Wing of his desire to move VP 871 Detachment from K-14 airfield to K-8 airfield (CG 1st MAF conf disp 260005Z, Appendix V).

All Navy and Marine participants in Power Complex Strikes upon North Korean Hydro-electric systems received congratulations for the excellent performance of duty and high combat effectiveness demonstrated (CNO disp 251940Z, ComNavEE disp 250203Z, Com, 7th Flt disps 260222Z, 260504Z, 260506Z, 260508Z, and CG 5th AF disp 240637Z, Appendix V).

1st MAF Memorandum Number 94-52, "Meritorious Rest and Recreation Privileges," was published this date (Appendix VII).

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## SECURITY INFORMATION

Seventy-two (72) interdiction sorties; 12 CAS sorties; the JOC day readiness alert at K-3 and K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, K-8, and K-14 were scheduled. One hundred-fifty (150) sorties were dispatched with all being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 7 were air defense, 107 were interdiction, 19 were CAS, 7 were armed reconnaissance, and 10 were miscellaneous. The weather was operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 172-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew a total of 746 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing flying 150 of those including 35% of the night air defense and 31% of the interdiction sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 178-52, Appendix III).

Fifty (50) enemy vehicles were sighted with none being destroyed (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 179, Appendix I).

27 June 1952:

VMA-312, aboard the USS BATAAN, flew a total of 46 sorties. Results of the days strikes were outstanding; including 105 buildings destroyed, 300 enemy troops KIA or WIA and a munitions factory destroyed (CFE 95.11 conf disp 271242Z, Appendix VI).

Twenty (20) enemy vehicles were sighted by 1st Marine Aircraft Wing pilots but none were attacked (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 180, Appendix I).

Thirty-two (32) interdiction sorties; 12 CAS sorties; one (1) intercept sortie over Cho-do Island; the JOC alert at K-3 and K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. One hundred twenty-one (121) sorties were dispatched with 120 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 2 were day air defense, 6 were night air defense, 30 were interdiction, 53 were CAS, 10 were photo reconnaissance, 12 were MPQ, and 7 were miscellaneous. The weather was operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 179-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew a total of 644 effective sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 130 of them. Included in the Wing's total were 44% of the CAS sorties and 25% of the interdiction sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 179-52, Appendix III).

Friendly damages resulting from anti-aircraft fire were as follows: one (1) F9F from VMA-311, on a CAS mission, sustained minor damage, and one (1) AD from VMA-121, on a CAS mission sustained minor damage (1st MAF Daily Intelligence Summary No. 180, Appendix I).

28 June 1952:

The Commanding General, 1st Marine Aircraft Wing, recommended to Chief of Naval Operations that the two (2) F4U-5P's in VMJ-1 be replaced with F2H-2P's to simplify maintenance and increase operational capabilities. This would increase the aircraft allowance of VMJ-1 to 12 F2H-2P aircraft (CG 1st MAF conf disp 280117Z, Appendix V).

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The Commanding Officer, Marine Aircraft Group 33, advised the Commanding General, 1st Marine Aircraft Wing, that the F4D aircraft are combat ready in all respects except for the overdue gun barrel extensions (CO MAG-33 conf disp 280936Z, Appendix V).

VMA-312, aboard the USS BATAAN, flew a total of 20 sorties (OTE 95.11 conf disp 280945Z, Appendix VI).

Only one (1) vehicle was sighted by 1st Marine Aircraft Wing pilots and it was not attacked (1st MAW Daily Intelligence Summary No. 181, Appendix I).

Forty-eight (48) interdiction sorties; 12 CAS sorties, 1 night CAP intercept around Cho-do Island, the JOG alert at K-6; and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8 were scheduled. Eighty-one (81) sorties were dispatched with 79 being effective. Of the effective sorties flown, 2 were day air defense, 4 were night air defense, 42 were interdiction, 20 were CAS, 7 were photo reconnaissance, 2 were ECM, and 2 were miscellaneous. The weather was operational throughout the period (Daily Operational Summary No. 180-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew a total of 545 effective sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 797 of those. Included in the Wing's total were 31% of the CAS sorties, and 27% of the interdiction sorties (Daily Operational Summary No. 180-52, Appendix III).

Friendly damages resulting from enemy anti-aircraft fire were as follows: one (1) F4U from VME-323, sustained minor damage; and one (1) AD, from VMA-121, sustained minor damage (1st MAW Daily Intelligence Summary No. 181, Appendix I).

29 June 1952:

The Commanding General, 1st Marine Aircraft Wing requested that VP 871 detachment be moved from K-14 to K-8. The Commanding Officer, 3rd Bomber Wing advised that operating and billeting facilities are available at K-8 (CG 1st MAW conf disp 260005Z, and CO 3rd Bomber Wing conf disp 290733Z, Appendix V).

Captain Francis B. KELLY, 016477, USMC, pilot from VMF(N)-513 was killed in action when his F4U-3N, crashed at K-14 during an attempted landing (CO VMF(N)-513 sec disp 291500Z, Appendix V).

The Commanding General, 5th Air Force, requested that the move of the AN/MPS-4 radar and ground IFF equipment from Tsushima Island to Cho-do Island be made at the earliest possible date. This equipment will be operated by 2 Marine officers and 18 enlisted men (CG 5th AF sec disp 290814Z, Appendix V).

Adm. AirFMFPac requested that the F7F-3N allowance for VMF(N)-513 be increased from 12 to 18 aircraft for at least 90 days and as long thereafter as the aircraft program permits (Adm AirFMFPac conf disp 272225Z, Appendix V).

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## SECURITY INFORMATION

VMA-312, aboard the USS BATAAN, was unable to fly because of non-operational weather (CTF 91 sec disp 291148Z, Appendix VI).

Eighty (80) interdiction sorties, 12 CAS sorties, 8 MPQ-2 sorties, 4 RESCAP sorties, 1 night CAP over Cho-do Island, the JOC alerts at K-3 and K-6, and the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, K-8, and K-14 were scheduled. No sorties were dispatched because of non-operational weather throughout the period (1st MAF Daily Operational Summary No. 181-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew a total of 89 effective sorties (1st MAF Daily Operational Summary No. 181-52, Appendix III).

30 June 1952:

Effective this date VMF-323 was redesignated VMA-323 (CO MAG-12 rest disp 300710Z, Appendix V).

ComFAirJapan proposed that VMF(N)-513 turn in the F4U-5N's for F7F-3N's. The total number of F7F-3N's allowed will be 18 aircraft (ComFAirJapan conf disp 300614Z, Appendix V).

The 1st Marine Aircraft Wing is to furnish 2 F2H-2P aircraft and pilots for the Formosa Sweep (ComNavFE sec disp 300736Z, Appendix V).

VMA-312, aboard the USS BATAAN, flew a total of 12 sorties (CTF 95.11 conf disp 301126Z, Appendix VI).

Ninety-six (96) interdiction sorties, 12 CAS sorties, 4 RESCAP sorties, 8 MPQ sorties, 1 night CAP intercept, the JOC alerts at K-3 and K-6, the readiness alerts at K-3, K-6, and K-8, and 2 miscellaneous sorties were scheduled. Eight (8) sorties were dispatched with all being effective. Of these sorties flown, 6 were night air defense, and 2 were miscellaneous. The weather was non-operational throughout the period. (Daily Operational Summary No. 182-52, Appendix III).

The 5th Air Force and attached units flew a total of 190 sorties with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing accounting for 8 of those (1st MAF Daily Operational Summary No. 182-52, Appendix III).

There were no flak encounters but one (1) F4U-5N was lost in an operational accident (1st MAF Daily Operational Summary No. 182-52, Appendix III).

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## SUMMARY OF MONTHLY OPERATIONS

The mission of Headquarters Squadron One during the month of June was to furnish logistic and administrative support to the First Marine Aircraft Wing Headquarters. Headquarters Squadron One was also responsible for the security, construction, and maintenance of the Headquarters Area.

Departments or sections under the administrative control of Headquarters Squadron One are as follows: (1) Administrative Section, (2) Base Development, (3) Camp Maintenance, (4) Motor Transport Section, (5) Supply Section, (6) Security Section, (7) Band Section, (8) Flight Section, (9) Disbursing Section, (10) Mess Section and (11) Marine Exchange Section. The Flight Section, Disbursing Section, and Mess Section are submitting separate type "B" Historical Reports.

During the month of June 1952, Headquarters Squadron One, First Marine Aircraft Wing joined a total of thirty six (36) officers, and a total of sixty two (62) enlisted personnel. Twenty nine (29) officers, and eighty eight (88) enlisted personnel were transferred. One hundred and ten (110) enlisted personnel were promoted to various ranks during the month. Three (3) enlisted personnel departed on emergency leave.

The Base Development Section is responsible for the cleanliness and upkeep of the Headquarters Area. It performs liaison between the Camp Maintenance Section, and Camp Commander. It supervises the preserving of cores, improvement and maintenance of roads, paths, heads, urinals, etc. It is responsible for the collection of trash and garbage from mess halls and designated areas; supervision of enlisted personnel assigned extra police duty; and the issuing of mess equipment, cots, pads, and linen to transient personnel.

The Camp Maintenance Section is responsible for various types of construction, repairs, and maintenance throughout the Headquarters area. During the month of June 1952, this section completed the installation of the primary voltage line to Marine Aircraft Group Thirty Three; installed electric fans in offices; installed a new generator; started and completed an underground (tunnel) Command Post which involved cleaning and draining, wiring, and sand-bagging entrances; screened all heads around sides and bottoms, and built double doors; built a shed to house the pump at the Marine Aircraft Group Thirty Three water-point; built a lectern and pulpit for the chapel; combined all drainage from the officers head and showers, coffee mess and infirmary; completed wash rack for jeeps; completed construction of exchange building; constructed typewriter tables, chairs, filing cabinets and screen doors; constructed and installed new First Marine Aircraft Wing signs; constructed new entrance in rear of laundry building; constructed additional windows in administration building; and painting of all buildings is still continuing. The Camp Maintenance Section is on twenty-four (24) hour watch, primarily in the event of emergencies caused by high winds, storms, etc. The Camp Maintenance Section operates the Korean Labor Office and has control over the indigenous labor within the Headquarters area. Two hundred and forty-five (245) Koreans were employed during June 1952.

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The Motor Transport Section makes vehicle transportation available to the various departments within the Headquarters and maintains a sufficient automotive pool service to utilize a maximum co-ordination of all vehicles within the pool. In addition to preventive maintenance checks the section is responsible for making repairs on the vehicles. During the month of June 1952, vehicles were driven a total of 43,516 miles. A total of 10,750 gallons of 86 octane gasoline was expended (laundry and other sections use this gasoline). A total of 25,350 gallons of diesel oil was distributed. A total 200 gallons of oil (SAE 30) was used in this section. An average of four (4) flat tires occurred daily and an average of four (4) vehicles needed towing service weekly.

The Supply Section is responsible for supplying all equipment and material required to keep the Headquarters, First Marine Aircraft Wing in proper operating order. It requisitions supplies from the U. S. Army, U. S. Navy, and the U. S. Marine Corps. All camp and sanitation items are received from the U. S. Army. Aeronautical spare parts for aircraft are procured from the U. S. Navy.

The Security Section is responsible for the security of the Headquarters area. Three (3) gates are guarded by sentries for twenty four (24) hours. Between 2000 and 0800, four (4) roving patrols are on guard within the area. The Security Section is also responsible for the investigation of any disturbances within the area. One (1) officer and forty one (41) men are assigned to this section.

The activities of the First Marine Aircraft Wing Band during the month of June 1952, have been typical of the duties of the band since arrival in Korea in October 1951. In addition to the normal routine, the majority of the activities of the band have been performed by the dance band aggregation which has played on several occasions prior to showing the movies and in the clubs. The concert band, composed of all members of the band has played weekly concerts in the enlisted mess hall. The band plays for colors and for honors of visiting officials.

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CHRONOLOGICAL NARRATIVE

For the Period

1 to 30 June 1952

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CHRONOLOGICAL NARRATIVE

Normal routine for the sections under the administrative control of Headquarters Squadron One are as follows:

(1) Administrative Section: Office hours are from 0800 to 1200 and from 1300 to 1630. The Unit Diary and Ration Statement are completed as soon as possible each morning. At 0900, 1400 and 1600 message center mail is obtained from the Wing Message Center and routed through the Chief Clerk to the Sergeant Major. All correspondence that requires further endorsement or entry in records is forwarded to designated clerks. The Commanding Officers Office Hours are normally held at 0900. At 0930 and 1330 the mail clerk delivers outgoing mail to the Wing Post Office. Incoming mail is obtained at various times during the day.

(2) Base Development Section: At 1300 and 1600 five (5) enlisted heads, one (1) officers head, and one (1) Korean head are washed and swept. Every morning and afternoon one (1) Korean boy sweeps the squadron office. Every day all urinals are cleaned and powder put in and around the urinal tubes. The trash truck crew gathers garbage at all mess halls once each morning and gathers all trash from designated trash barrels in the area. Every other day the area around fire barrels and guard huts are policed. Liaison is performed with the Camp Maintenance Section and Camp Commander to insure that cleanliness, maintenance and improvements are constantly keeping the Headquarters area in the best possible condition.

(3) Camp Maintenance: Labor crews are brought to work. Personnel muster at 0745, and work commences at 0750. Due to the variations in types of construction, repairs and maintenance of the camp this section does not follow a normal work routine.

(4) Motor Transport Section: At 0715 all vehicles are given a service check for flat tires, broken springs, water, oil, etc. At 0750 one or two trucks (2 ~~2~~ 6x6) are dispatched to the Utilities Section for use in construction. At 0830 one truck (6x6) is dispatched to the Wing Mess Hall for use in making the necessary deliveries from ration breakdown. At 1300 drivers tests are administered to all personnel who have a written request from a department officer. At 1430 a weapons carrier is dispatched to the Headquarters Water Point for the purpose of obtaining ice for the clubs. Between 1630 and 0600 two (2) drivers are on watch for possible emergencies. Each vehicle is given a preventive maintenance check every two (2) weeks or every 1000 miles which ever occurs first.

(5) Supply Section: At 0745 and 1500 one man goes to the Air Freight Terminal to obtain all supplies arriving on the first aircraft from Japan. At 0900 and 1500 all mail is delivered to the Wing Message Center. During non-working hours one man stands a telephone watch.

(6) Security Section: 0700 - Corporals of guard change. 0630 - Raise Commanding Generals flag. 0745 - post first relief. 0800 - post second relief. 1300 - guard musters. 1545 - post third relief. Sunset - colors lowered by Corporal of the Guard, followed by the lowering of the Commanding General's flag. 1900 - Corporals of guard change. 2000 - post fourth relief. 2400 - post fifth relief. 0100 - Officer of the Day meets the courier aircraft. 0400 - post sixth relief. 0600 - sentry on post five (5) makes all early calls and at 0630 he holds reveille in the enlisted area.

(7) Band Section: 0800 - morning flag raising ceremonies. 0900 - full concert band rehearsal for concerts each Wednesday evening. Evening colors are played by the field music.

(8) Exchange Section: Total merchandise is valued at \$8,439.31. Daily sales average \$361.37. Exchange opens at 1100 and secures at 1700 daily and on the 5th and 20th of each month from 1100 to 2100. The books of the Exchange are checked daily and a petty cash sum of \$60.00 is issued to the store clerk. Prior to opening time each morning the shelves are heavily stocked and a check made by the warehouseman. After closing time the money received is turned over to the officer in charge and a nightly inventory of merchandise is conducted.

Two (2) enlisted men transferred and one (1) joined. Two (2) cargo trucks dispatched to Pusan to transport beer to the Headquarters Enlisted Club. Dance Band Combo played at the Marine Aircraft Group Thirty Three Enlisted Club.

8 June 1952:

One (1) officer transferred. One (1) enlisted man joined.

9 June 1952:

One (1) enlisted man transferred. One (1) cargo truck dispatched to Pusan to transport beer to Headquarters Enlisted Club. The Navy Chevrolet sedan, assigned to General JEROME was driven to Pusan for a detailed inspection. Dance Band Combo played at the Marine Air Control Group Two's Staff NCO Club.

10 June 1952:

One (1) Officer transferred to the United States. Construction started on lectern and pulpit for the chapel. Band participated in the dedication of the new Orphans Church in Pohong Dong. Dance band played at the Headquarters Staff NCO Club.

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11 June 1952:

One (1) officer transferred to the United States. One (1) officer transferred. Joined (1) enlisted man. Vehicle was dispatched to Taegu to procure spare automotive parts, one cargo truck was dispatched to Pusan to transport beer to the Headquarters Enlisted Club.

One (1) officer transferred to the United States. Joined two (2) officers. Construction completed on wash rack for jeeps at the Marine Aircraft Group Thirty Three Water-point.

13 June 1952:

29 June 1952:

One (1) officer transferred to the United States. One (1) enlisted man transferred. One (1) enlisted man departed for the United States on emergency leave. Dance Band Combo played at the Headquarters Staff NCO Club.

30 June 1952:

Normal working routine.

## SUMMARY

During the month one (1) TBM was transferred from Hedron to FasRon-11. Two (2) F7F's were joined to Hedron, and placed in Baker Status, Pool. The R5D is utilized by VMF-152. The R4D's are utilized in transporting troops and essential items, while the SNB's and TBM's are used for administrative, utility, and flight proficiency hops. The F7F's are utilized as combat escort and flight proficiency hops. The activities of the R5D, one (1) SNB, assigned to MWSS-1, Itami, Japan, and one (1) TBM assigned to MGCIS-1 at K-8 are not reflected in this report.

All maintenance is conducted at K-3 by Hedron personnel with the exception of occasional checks being performed at Itami, Japan by Hedron-1 personnel.



2. During the month of June a total of 4,998 messages were handled, of which 3810 were INCOMING and 1,188 were OUTGOING. 41% of all INCOMING traffic and 48% of all OUTGOING traffic was classified and required cryptography.

Operations

1. The Navy Marine radio teletype administration circuit Tokyo, 1stMAW was placed in operation for handling traffic on 10 June 1952. A total of 762 messages were handled over this circuit during the twenty day period. This circuit has reduced the transmission time for messages requiring refile at Radio Tokyo by approximately three hours. The previous difficulty of obtaining general messages have been eliminated. The circuit is operated on a shared basis, the 1stMarDiv being assigned even hour schedule and the 1stMAW odd hour schedule for transmission. Radio Tokyo transmits simultaneously to both Marine stations.

2. The project for placing the spiral-four cable, from K-3 to the relay site, on poles has been completed. By getting this cable on poles, maintenance will be reduced. There had been numerous cuts made in the cable by natives and occasional fires that damaged the cable.

3. The installation of two (2) spiral-four cables, on poles, from K-3 to Doodlebug (MGCIS-3) was completed on 30 June 1952. This work was accomplished by personnel from the 440th Signal Battalion. The following circuits are routed over this cable:

One (1) AG/CI circuit Coffeemill TADC (k-8) to Doodlebug

SUMMARY

A Dental Conference was held at Headquarters Squadron on 2 June 1952. Dental Officers representing the following Dental Departments were present:

- Headquarters Squadron
- Marine Air Group-12
- Marine Air Group-33
- Marine Air Control Group-2
- Marine Wing Service Squadron-1

The Dental reports for May were reviewed by the Wing Dental Officer. Following the review, the number of patients awaiting prosthetic treatment in the Groups and Squadrons was computed and plans were formulated to reduce this number as soon as practicable. In order to insure that the urgent cases receive treatment first, the Dental Officers were requested to screen the patients and submit their recommendations to the Wing Dental Officer.

The Prosthetic Activity of Headquarters Squadron was established in March 1952. The operation of the activity has been handicapped by the lack of trained Prosthetic Technicians. In order to operate, it was necessary to train a Dentalman and a Korean laborer in the essential laboratory procedures. This training was conducted by the two Dental Officers of Headquarters Squadron. The trainees developed rapidly and were soon able to fabricate prosthetic replacements. During the month of June, 25 patients received prosthetic treatment. At the present time there are 63 patients awaiting treatment. This number will be reduced in July as the Force Dental Officer, AIRFMFPAC has indicated that a trained Prosthetic Dental Technician will arrive in early July to augment the present staff.

During the period of this report, the Dental Departments of the Wing treated 873 patients. The below table shows the number of personnel from each service receiving treatment.





(f) It is estimated that the Bank of Korea Won currency was sold to 840 military personnel totaling 46,620,000 Won, equivalent to \$7,770.00 and averaging about \$9.25 U. S. Currency (MPC) per individual.

(g) Payment of Korean Labor rolls were discontinued by this office on 31 May 1952.

(h) A total of \$426,510.00 was paid on military rolls to officers and enlisted personnel. A total of \$4,219.99 was paid on public vouchers and a total of \$301,065.35 checks in exchange for cash were issued.

1. The following is forwarded for your information:

- (a) See BuPers letter No. 31-52 NBD, dated 29 Feb. 1952 for information concerning your ID Card. According to 1949 Geneva Conventions your ID Card should be stamped across the back with a Red Cross.
- (b) The Chaplains' Division should have a complete set of your recent orders with all endorsements. It is requested that each Chaplain send a set of his orders direct to the Chaplains' Division in an envelope marked PERSONAL.
- (c) It is the responsibility of the Senior Chaplain at each activity to keep an up to date inventory of all property.
- (d) The Qualification Jackets of all Chaplains are kept in the Wing Medical Officer's Office. Be sure to check there when arriving or leaving the 1st MAW.
- (e) Chaplains La Duca and Conn did not forward a copy of their Monthly Report to the Wing Chaplain in time for Wing Historical Monthly Report as requested in Wing Chaplains Memo Number 1-52. This copy of your Monthly Report need not be endorsed by your Commanding Officer so you should put it in the mail on the 1st of each month. Note the proper heading for your Monthly Report:

Ref: (a) 1STMAW MEMORANDUM NO. 7-52  
(b) Section 4800 Chaplains Manual

1. Reference (a) is hereby cancelled and superseded by this memorandum.
2. In activities of the First Marine Air Wing which have Chaplains' Funds the senior Protestant Chaplain attached to said activity will be custodian of the Protestant Fund. The senior Catholic Chaplain attached to the activity will be custodian of the Catholic Fund.
3. All First Marine Aircraft Wing Protestant and Catholic Chapel Funds shall be administered as follows:
  - a. Funds voluntarily offered by individuals and civilian activities for the use of the chaplains in matters pertaining to religion and morale shall be placed in the appropriate chapel fund.
  - b. The funds may be expended by the custodian of the fund without advance authority on projects of a religious nature within activities of this command which are routine and which are easily recognizable as coming within the desire of the donors, such as religious equipment, aids to worship, and supplies for choir and chapel, etc. The funds shall be used only for the work of the faith represented by that fund.
  - c. All off-Base donations to religious civilian agencies, morale expenditures, or expenditures of chapel funds for other than routine religious expenditures for activities of this command, as provided for in (a) and (b) above, shall be approved in advance by the Commanding Officer. The policy of the Commanding Officer in this respect will be in conformity with the principles set forth in paragraphs 4802 (c) and (d) of reference (b), which paragraphs are quoted herewith:

"(c) In the event that it is desirable to expend the surplus of any chapel fund, such expenditure may be made to a religious civilian agency which assists the religious work of Naval personnel, as may be recommended by the Commanding Officer, provided such expenditure is to all intents and purposes, plainly consonant with the general faith and practice of the contributors; i.e., if desired, the surplus of a Protestant chapel fund might be used for alms or donated to the American Bible Society, the Gideons, the Serviceman's Christian League, the General Commission on Army and Navy chaplains, etc. The surplus from a Catholic chapel fund may be used for alms or donated to the Chaplains Aid Society, the Catholic Military Ordinariate, the National Catholic Welfare Conference, etc. The surplus of a Jewish chapel fund might be donated to some phase of the Jewish religious work. The wishes of worshippers where at all ascertainable, should in each instance bear more weight than the personal preference of the Chaplain or Commanding Officer.

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(d) Any surplus in a chapel fund which the chaplain and the Commanding Officer concerned may not wish to expend in the manner outlined, as well as any surplus which may remain unexpended in the event of decommissioning, may be forwarded to the C of C, Bureau of Naval Personnel where it will be kept in Catholic, Protestant and Jewish segregated Funds, accounted for and used in accordance with the spirit of this directive."

d. Custodians will keep an exact record of all receipts and disbursements, together with an explanation or invoice for same.

e. The accounting period of the chapel funds shall be monthly. At the end of each accounting period, upon relief of the custodian of the fund, or at any other time considered necessary, the chapel funds shall be audited by the Area auditor, First Marine Aircraft Wing.

f. When custodians are relieved of duty or are absent for a period in excess of ten days, chapel funds shall be turned over to the next senior chaplain of the same faith. If no chaplain of the same faith is available, the chapel fund shall be turned over to a Field Officer of the same faith designated by the custodian of the fund. Transfer will be accomplished by the use of an Invoice and Receipt. A temporary custodian may accept receipts of the fund but shall make disbursements only in special circumstances and with the prior approval of the Commanding Officer in each instance.

COURTS-MARTIAL:

Two general courts-martial, fourteen special courts-martial, and twenty-seven summary courts-martial were completed, i.e., reviewed and forwarded to the Judge Advocate General of the Navy, during the month of June 1952.

GENERAL COURTS-MARTIAL:

(a) One accused was found guilty of murder, violation of lawful orders and unauthorized absence. The record was reviewed by a law specialist in the office of the Judge Advocate General, and on his recommendation the sentence was disapproved and the charges were dismissed.

(b) The other general court-martial involved an officer and resulted in conviction of conduct prejudicial to good order and discipline in that he wrongfully offered to sell whiskey to enlisted men at an exorbitant price. He was sentenced to be reprimanded, to lose 500 numbers, and to pay a fine to the United States.

SPECIAL COURTS-MARTIAL:

(a) All special courts-martial resulted in convictions. However, in two cases involving the sale of military property of the United States, the convening authority, by supplementary action, disapproved the findings and dismissed the charges:

2. On 14 June a letter was submitted to the Commandant of the Marine Corps to raise the fixed credit of Unit-2 to \$5,000.00. This request was made necessary by the large volume of daily stamp sales due to a steadily-increasing parcel post business.

1. During the month of June, the Public Information Section broke all previous records for production, putting out a total of 1680 releases. This total does not include daily telephone reports from K-5, K-6, and K-8 to 5th Air Force Combat News Center.

2. When broken down, a total of 65 news stories and photos which were thought to have wire service potential were released through PI facilities to COMNAVFE as well as 19 daily summary releases.

Three motion picture shooting scripts were written for the Navy Combat Camera Group. These scripts dealt with the Marines Memorial Orphanage, Air Freight's "Korean Airline" and an Air Strike.

Four motion picture projects were completed by the photographic team. They included two air strikes, one helicopter rescue and an helicopter evacuation.

3. In the radio section 40 Hometown Interviews were made during the month. Production in this field was curtailed due to a shortage of recording tape.

4. The remaining 1519 releases were composed of Hometown and featured personality stories, including individual stories on every enlisted man in Helron 1, MA-6 and MA6-12.

A six months forecast (by months) of anticipated engineer construction maintenance and repair items is now required by 5th Air Force for planning purposes. This report will be submitted monthly by the Air Base commanders of K-3 and K-6.
- e. On 23 June requisitions for the 26th resupply for all units of this command were compiled and forwarded to Commanding Officer, 1st Combat Service Group. A requisition was submitted on 24 June to 1st Combat Service Group for resupply of winter uniform clothing for all wing units.
- f. A conference of Supply Officers of units of 1st Marine Aircraft Wing was held by the Wing supply Officer on 28 June to determine the personnel needs of each subordinate supply section and to assign replacement supply personnel arriving on the 22nd replacement draft. A representative of the Wing Supply Office left for Itami, Japan on 30 June for the purpose of interviewing these personnel and effecting final assignment.

## 7. The following is the Wing Ordnance report for the month of June:

- a. On 1 June Master Sergeant J. PAWLOSKI returned to Itami after a conference with Major BLEY regarding Ordnance facilities at Marine Wing Service Squadron 1.
- b. Colonel CLARK, Major BLEY, Major FOSTER, USAF, and Lieutenant NESMITH attended a conference aboard the USS Hector at Pusan on 1 June. Admiral BIGGS, Comander FREDRICKS of COMSERVRON-3 and Lieutenant Commander CALOMARIS discussed the Ammunition supply set-up in Korea with the possibility of re-establishing ammunition storage and delivery. At the conference it was decided to investigate the present system and take the matter up again at a later date.

c. One hundred fifty-three (153) MK 55 Mod 1 bomb racks were received. This completed the request for six hundred (600) modified racks and on the basis of improved performance of the modified racks an additional five hundred (500) were requested to complete the replacement of all un-modified racks now in service in the Wing.

d. On 2 June Major BLEY inspected Marine Aircraft Group-33 Ordnance Material Shop and the squadron ordnance facilities at Marine Fighter Squadron-115 and 311. The bomb dump and squadron ordnance facilities at K-6 were inspected by Major BLEY on 3 June.

e. Lieutenant Commander WILSON, Lieutenant CROUCH, and Chief HALLOWAY from Commander, Fleet Air Japan arrived at K-3 for a conference with Major BLEY concerning ordnance material supply. They visited Marine All Weather Fighter Squadron-513 at K-8 and Marine Aircraft Group-12 at K-6 and held conferences with the ordnance officers at these fields. They returned to K-3 on 9 June and left for Japan on 10 June.

f. On 7 June Major BLEY went to K-2 for conference on ammunition supply with Colonel PERKINS and Captain BROCKETT of the USAF.

g. On 12 June Major BLEY went to Ulsan to arrange for backloading of salvageable ammunition crates and components, satisfactory arrangements were completed and all salvageable items will be returned to Ulsan for transportation to Sasebo.

h. On 13 June Major BLEY went to K-6 for discussion of ATAR evaluation program. He visited the operating squadrons and inspected ordnance shops.

i. Commander FREDRICKS arrived aboard K-3 for conference with Major BLEY on ammunition supply and backloading of salvageable ordnance items.

j. On 18 June Major BLEY went to Itami to inspect the facilities and ordnance supply. He held a conference with the ordnance and transportation officers and made arrangements to take care of excess Mobile Ordnance Equipment. He then proceeded to Yokosuka to make arrangements for rehabilitation of Mobile Ordnance Equipment in Korea.

k. During June, ten (10) new bomb trucks were received from the states. The Mobile Ordnance situation is now in good shape with sufficient equipment on hand to meet operating needs and the rehabilitation situation is set up to handle all necessary equipment with a reserve pool of ready equipment to meet demands for the Wing.

l. On 29 June the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing lost approximately one thousand (1,000) tons of aviation ammunition (consigned to Marine Aircraft Group-12) due to explosions that occurred while off-loading an ammunition ship at Ulsan. Most of the lost items were replaced from the Marine Aircraft Group-33 dump and from the U. S. Air Force 6405th Air Support Wing. This command requested that the next scheduled aviation ammunition shipment from Commander, Service Squadron Three be expedited in order to supply Marine Aircraft Group-12 with items that could not be replaced.

m. The bomb dump level at K-3 has been reduced, revetments have been completed for most of the ammunition, and all scrap and salvageable material has been returned.

1. References (a) and (b) outline general information and instructions for the return of fired brass, ammunition containers and packing materials to Continental United States. Instructions contained in this Technical Bulletin shall be used as a guide by units of this command for disposition of the subject materials.
2. Every effort will be made to salvage all empty brass and all serviceable shipping containers and packing materials.
3. The Group Bomb Dump Officers will assemble and store all serviceable components in the inert storage areas of the bomb dumps until transported to shipping points. Marine Aircraft Groups will transport this material by carload lots to Ulsan where it will be backloaded aboard ammunition ships.
4. The following serviceable items are to be salvaged:
  - (a) Empty brass (regardless of condition)
  - (b) 20MM ammunition containers
  - (c) Bomb crates
  - (d) Bomb fin crates
  - (e) Bomb shipping bands
  - (f) Bomb fuze cavity plugs
  - (g) Rocket motor shipping plugs and caps
  - (h) Rocket head shipping caps
  - (i) ATAR head containers
5. It is directed that Commanding Officers ensure close supervision and inspection of transfers of empty brass, packing materials and ammunition containers, specifically observing the following:

- (a) Empty brass to be packed in 20MM ammunition containers whenever possible, with an alert watch being maintained for unfired rounds. If box type containers are used for shipment of empty brass, the lids are to be secured firmly in place with wire or nails.
- (b) Lids for bomb crates and bomb fin crates are to be firmly secured.
- (c) Shipping caps and plugs are to be shipped in wooden boxes with lids firmly secured.
- (d) Any materials other than brass so damaged as to be considered fit only for scrap should be segregated and handled as such.

6. Instructions contained in sections 13A12 and 13A13 or the Bureau of Ordnance Manual will be strictly adhered to by all units.

1. Reference (a) is hereby revoked.

2. The purpose of this Technical Bulletin is to disseminate information and instructions on allowances, maintenance, rehabilitation and the use of Mobile Ordnance Equipment to units of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing.

3. The allowance of Mobile Ordnance Equipment, established by reference (b), provides supporting equipment for land based Marine Aircraft Groups and independent squadrons in forward areas, based on twenty-four (24) airplanes per VMF-VMA squadron and twelve (12) airplanes per VMF(N) squadron, plus an allowance for the supporting Service Squadron. Squadrons with complements of airplanes other than the above are allowed equipment in proportion to the number of planes in its assigned complement using the appropriate allowance as a basis.

4. The total Marine Aircraft Group allowance is now considered to be the former Servron's allowance (now MABS-MAIS) plus the allowance of each attached squadron. These quantities are tabulated in enclosure (1).

5. In the interest of flexibility, it is believed desirable, but not mandatory, for Group Bomb Dump Officers to have centralized control of all Mobile Ordnance Equipment within the Group, with each squadron drawing its equipment from the pool, the quantity to be based upon requirements of the individual ordnance sections. It is felt that the quantity of items allowed each Marine Aircraft Group and independent squadron is adequate provided all items are used in the type work they were designed for, and provided further that the pool system is employed.

6. Reference (a) listed the quantity of Mobile Ordnance Equipment to be held by the Commanding Officer of Marine Wing Service Squadron One on a semi-permanent basis. 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8. Rehabilitation of all unserviceable Mobile Ordnance Equipment is accomplished by Fleet Activities, Yokosuka. Unserviceable items are to be shown in the Monthly Automotive and Allied Equipment Report (reference (d)), submitted by Marine Aircraft Groups and Marine Wing Service Squadron One. This headquarters will coordinate shipments of unserviceable items to and from the rehabilitation center.
9. It is recognized that the configuration of certain items of Mobile Ordnance Equipment is unsatisfactory for advanced base operations. However, except in case of emergency, permanent alterations of ordnance items will not be permitted without obtaining prior approval from the Bureau of Ordnance. Temporary modifications to the subject vehicles may be authorized by Commanding Officers in order to gain the most useful capabilities for the work load performed by ordnance crews.
10. Items of Mobile Ordnance Equipment that have been previously altered permanently will be reported as unserviceable and made available for shipment to the rehabilitation center.

Unserviceable items are to be shown in the Monthly Automotive and Allied Equipment Report (reference (d)), submitted by Marine Aircraft Groups and Marine Wing Service Squadron One. This headquarters will coordinate shipments of unserviceable items to and from the rehabilitation center.
9. It is recognized that the configuration of certain items of Mobile Ordnance Equipment is unsatisfactory for advanced base operations. However, except in case of emergency, permanent alterations of ordnance items will not be permitted without obtaining prior approval from the Bureau of Ordnance. Temporary modifications to the subject vehicles may be authorized by Commanding Officers in order to gain the most useful capabilities for the work load performed by ordnance crews.
10. Items of Mobile Ordnance Equipment that have been previously altered permanently will be reported as unserviceable and made available for shipment to the rehabilitation center.

1. Reference (a) is hereby revoked.

2. The purpose of this Technical Bulletin is to disseminate information and instructions on allowances, maintenance, rehabilitation and the use of Mobile Ordnance Equipment to units of the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing.

3. The allowance of Mobile Ordnance Equipment, established by reference (b), provides supporting equipment for land based Marine Aircraft Groups and independent squadrons in forward areas, based on twenty-four (24) airplanes per VMF-VMA squadron and twelve (12) airplanes per VIF(N) squadron, plus an allowance for the supporting Service Squadron. Squadrons with complements of airplanes other than the above are allowed equipment in proportion to the number of planes in its assigned complement using the appropriate allowance as a basis.

4. The total Marine Aircraft Group allowance is now considered to be the former Servron's allowance (now MABS-MAIS) plus the allowance of each attached squadron. These quantities are tabulated in enclosure (1).

5. In the interest of flexibility, it is believed desirable, but not mandatory, for Group Bomb Dump Officers to have centralized control of all Mobile Ordnance Equipment within the Group, with each squadron drawing its equipment from the pool, the quantity to be based upon requirements of the individual ordnance sections. It is felt that the quantity of items allowed each Marine Aircraft Group and independent squadron is adequate provided all items are used in the type work they were designed for, and provided further that the pool system is employed.

6. Reference (a) listed the quantity of Mobile Ordnance Equipment to be held by the Commanding Officer of Marine Wing Service Squadron One on a semi-permanent basis. In that the ordnance functions of MWSS-1 are relatively small, it is considered that some of the items were in excess of requirements. By copy of this Technical Bulletin the following allowance of the subject equipment for MWSS-1 is established:

- (1) Two (2) Bomb Service Trucks
- (2) Three (3) MK 3 Bomb Trailers
- (3) Six (6) MK 2 Bomb Trailers

7. By reference (c) Motor Transport Officers are charged with the responsibility for maintenance of all automotive equipment within their commands. Organizational and field maintenance will ordinarily be performed at Group levels and will include inspection, servicing, adjustment and replacement of minor and major parts and assemblies.
