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10 Local Men In CCC Posts

Year's Enrollment Was 51 With Most Completing Their Time.

Since July 1, 1939, to and including June 30, 1940, 4,907 young men of Connecticut have served in the CCC in the state, a report of the department files. These men have been paid a total of \$1,324,890 in cash or deferred payments to parents or guardians or to themselves in accrued savings.

The average enrollment for the year was 17, making the year's record 31,370 men. Thirty-nine received honorable discharges, two were honorably discharged and ten still remain in service.

The sum of \$13,770 was paid to the state during the year in the CCC in cash or deferred payments or allotments.

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Hospital Here Again Class A

Approved for 26th Consecutive Year by the National Body.

The officers of Manchester Memorial hospital were advised today that the institution has been named for the 21st consecutive year by the American College of Surgeons as a Class A approved hospital, one of 2,806 hospitals in the United States, Canada and a few foreign countries.

Manchester Memorial becomes a link again in this chain of approved institutions stretching from coast to coast.

Dr. M. C. McCann, associate director of the College of Surgeons, in making his annual report on certifications that the country's hospital defenses are much stronger than during the World War and are today to be ranked among the best in the world.

The American College of Surgeons began its hospital standardization program shortly after the war when deficiencies of many hospitals were then clearly revealed by the demands of war. The approved list of hospitals in 1918 contained the names of 30 institutions. The standards have become popular since that time until now there are 2,806 hospitals in the United States and Canada approved.

The trustees and officials of the Manchester Memorial will soon receive a certificate attesting to the 1940 approved rating.
