Rail Aides to File Passenger Report

NEW YORK (AP) — Officials of the New York Central, Pennsylvania and New Haven Railroads are scheduled to file a report in three weeks on the long-distance passenger service of the bankrupt New Haven. The report, to be compiled by top operating executives, will include figures on the costs of essential facilities. The report was agreed upon Thursday at a meeting of officials of the three railroads with representatives of the states served by the New Haven—New York, Connecticut, Rhode Island and Massachusetts. Conant Feels Small School Not Efficient

BOSTON (AP) — Dr. James B. Conant believes thousands of the nation's small high schools should be eliminated by consolidation, and he proposes this method: "Increase the number of players on the basketball team to 20." Conant, president emeritus of Harvard and a national authority on public education, was speaking only half in jest when he made this suggestion Thursday night. He quipped that you might lump four small high schools into one, and that consolidating their five-member basketball teams might be a significant place to start to gain public support. In a serious vein, he told the delegate assembly of the National School Boards Association he believes the 15 to 20 largest local school districts in the nation should be divided into smaller, more manageable units. He acknowledged that he did not know how this could be done, and said he had no hope that it would be done in the near future. Conant has long campaigned for the consolidation of high schools with a graduating class of less than 100. Such schools, he told a news conference, are too small to hire the teachers and offer the courses that today's young people need. Local pride in high school athletics, he said, is the biggest stumbling block to consolidation in many areas. Conant said boards of education in the nation's largest cities are trying to accomplish an impossible task in administering schools with hundreds of thousands of pupils. "A dozen or so boards have

Fighting in Viet Nam Casualties Inflicted In Several Actions

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Four U.S. Army men were killed and six others wounded in an assault on a Viet Cong stronghold 20 miles west of Saigon, U.S. military spokesmen reported today. Heavy casualties, both government and Communist, were reported in other actions in South Viet Nam. Two of the American dead and some of the wounded were helicopter crewmen. Two U.S. Army helicopters were shot down during the fighting. Reports of the fighting, in Hau Nghia Province, were fragmentary. Early reports said five South Vietnamese soldiers were killed and 20 wounded during the first phase Thursday. The American dead brought

the U.S. toll in Vietnamese combat since December 1961 to 320. Thirty-three U.S. jet fighters and bombers blasted suspected Viet Cong concentrations at various sites inside South Viet Nam today. The biggest raid was by 17 F100 Super Sabre Jets in Quang Tri Province, not far from the North Vietnamese border. Authorities reported that both government forces and the Viet Cong suffered heavy casualties in a major battle Wednesday in Quang Tin Province, 350 miles north of Saigon. U.S. Air Force F100s from nearby Da Nang airbase swooped in and apparently saved fleeing Vietnamese marines from possible annihilation, at the same time inflicting a heavy toll on the pursuing Viet Cong. Official accounts said the government forces suffered 82 killed, 104 wounded and 20 missing during the fighting near Viet

An strategic redoubt controlling the approaches to Tam Ky, capital of the province. An airborne battalion and two marine battalions were involved in the battle. One of the marine units was fleeing at a dead run while the Viet Cong chased them through a sugar cane field. The F100s shrieked in at tree-top height and blasted the pursuing Viet Cong with rockets and cannon. Vietnamese sources claimed 300 Viet Cong were killed, 200 in the aerial attacks. A U.S. military spokesman said American sources on the scene believed the figures might have some substance. However, it is a common practice of the government to inflate enemy casualties vastly in the fact of a major reverse as the operation in Quang Tin apparently was. The fighting there was reported to have broken off Thursday. Government troops in Long An Province, south of Saigon, killed 26 Viet Cong and captured 46 suspects in an operation that cost six government dead and 13 wounded. The fighting in Hau Nghia Province raged so fiercely that helicopter medical evacuation flights were suspended until landing areas could be made more secure. A large portion of the helicopters in the Saigon area were on standby, ready to fly more troops into the area. The fighting was on the western side of the Vao Oriental River, in Viet Cong country. Lt. Gen. J. L. Throckmorton, deputy U.S. commander in Viet Nam, flew to the 20th Division headquarters at Duc Hoa, 15 miles northeast of the battle zone, in an attempt to get information. Fighting broke out Thursday when helicopters coming down with the first load of rangers were fired on by mortars and automatic weapons. A U.S. Army helicopter door gunner was killed and four other Americans were wounded. One helicopter was knocked down and apparently destroyed. The mortar fire lifted as the helicopter phase of the assault was completed, but heavy

Prospect for Peace

Red China Barrier, USSR Seems Eager

By WILLIAM L. RYAN AP Special Correspondent Something new—perhaps dramatic—may be in store for the Viet Nam crisis. Nonaligned nations are taking an initiative to seek peace negotiations "without strings." Moscow seems anxious to snuff out the smoldering fuse in Southeast Asia. North Viet Nam hints vaguely it might listen. The big stumbling block appears to be Red China. Talks may be possible, but they could require something like diplomatic isolation of Red China. Southeast Asia's future may lie with the answer to questions like these: How much control has Red China over the North Vietnamese regime in Hanoi? Why did the Soviet Communist party virtually humiliate itself in adopting the soft answer to Peking's harsh attacks in the world Communist dispute? What was the meaning of official hints from Washington that the United Nations might have a role in easing the Viet Nam peril? From time to time there have

Nixon, Barry Argue Over Law on Vote

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two top Republicans—Barry Goldwater and Richard M. Nixon—stood on opposite sides today in the debate over legislation to guarantee Negro voting rights. Goldwater said there are enough voting rights laws on the books already—and added the legislation President Johnson now seeks "does nothing less than change our Constitution." "If we are to do this," the party's 1964 presidential nominee told more than 2,000 Republican women Thursday, "we should be approaching the current legislation as an amendment to the Constitution." But Nixon, the nominee in 1960, said action is needed now, to cope with a situation he termed volatile. He said a constitutional amendment would take too long. "I think the Congress should act, but I think it should act ju-

diculously," the former vice president told a news conference. The 13th annual Republican Women's Conference hears today from Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen, who played a major role in drafting the Johnson bill. The party's top policymakers already are on record as advocates of federal action to guarantee all Americans their right to vote before the 1968 congressional elections. The Republican Coordinating Committee took that stand March 10. Goldwater is a member, but he was not on hand then, Nixon was. Nixon said a constitutional amendment on voting rights could not be effective in time for the 1966 balloting. He said that kind of delay would lead to

However, he says he is withholding judgment until Dr. Martin Luther King drafts final boycott proposals. This was the home front highlight of a surprise news conference late Thursday at which the President also said: —The President stands by his invitation to Soviet leaders to visit the United States "and I would be happy to welcome them." —Johnson is taking a second look at plans to close some Veterans Administration hospitals and concede complaints from affected members of Congress "raise doubts in my mind whether we were 100 per cent right." However, he says his advisers still "feel they were justified in that decision." —A reorganization of agencies that regulates banks may well be proposed by Congress and the administration in the wake of current Senate hearings which, he said,

BRIDGE PLAYER'S LUCK TAKES VARIOUS SHAPES

National Men's Team Champion
It's sometimes hard to know whether a bridge player is lucky or unlucky. South was lucky to get most of the high cards, lucky that cards were well placed for him, and lucky to bid a slam that he could make. South's only bad luck was the identity of the East player.
Opening lead - King of diamonds.
West opened the king of diamonds and continued with the ace, forcing South to ruff. Declarer cashed the top clubs and ruffed a club in dummy.
Now the alarm was a cinch. South could get to his hand with the king of trumps, ruff another club in dummy, draw trumps, and try the heart finesse. No body could over-ruff the club, and the queen of hearts was well placed. What could be sweeter?
East could have been sweeter. East was Terence Reese, one of the best players in the world. South then ruffed the third round of clubs to dummy. Reese dropped the queen of clubs.
South changed his plan of play. He drew two rounds of trumps with the queen and king and left the last trump out. Since West "obviously" had the last club as well as the last trump, West would cash the ten of clubs to discard a heart from dummy. Then he could cash the top hearts and ruff a heart in dummy without relying on the heart finesse.
When South led the ten of clubs, however, West ruffed with the jack of spades, defeating the slam contract. Wasn't that unlucky?
"Poof, you object. 'South should not believe that queen of clubs. He could see Terence Reese in it either cut the moose entirely or limit my movement to a picture a year.'
Not at all. The hand was played some thirty years ago when Reese was still a college student. Nobody knew then that Reese was destined to become a world-famous bridge expert.

Building Permits High for Month

The dollar value of taxable construction for which permits were issued in Manchester last month surpassed that for the corresponding period last year by 816 per cent, according to a report released today by Building Inspector Thomas Monahan.
Permits were issued for an estimated value of \$1,000,000 during March 1965, compared to \$120,000 during March 1964. The rise was attributed in great part to a \$500,000 apartment building at Occitt and N. Adams St.
The original permit, issued in 1964, was for \$250,000, and the additional value of \$1,000,000 was added to the cost for that construction to \$750,000.
The income from building permits issued last month was 196 per cent higher than during the corresponding period last year, with \$2,085 in fees collected during March 1965, compared to \$369 collected during March 1964.

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Hebron Constables Will Patrol On Weekend

The constables being called through radio control from the town office building which has been manned by Civil Defense auxiliary police and communications personnel working with the constables.

It has been determined that the continuation of this service to the residents and constables has been announced that persons who need police services after 8 p.m. on Friday and Saturday, and after 2 p.m. on Sunday may obtain the service by calling the town office building.

Communications are maintained from the town office building with constables, town police departments and state police.

The patrols are conducted in constable-owned vehicles, equipped with radios that each constable has purchased at his own expense with this on-the-job training for the Civil Defense auxiliary police and communications personnel. Chief Deputy Raymond J. Burt stresses that the continued training program will enable the auxiliary police to accompany constables on routine patrols to become familiar with all areas of the town and the highway network.

Both the auxiliary police and the communications people will become familiar with the operation of the police headquarters control center and its communications network.

Volunteers are needed for all areas of the Civil Defense program.

Residents who are over 21 may apply for CD auxiliary police work, and both men and women as radio operators. Application should be made to Chief Deputy Raymond J. Burt, or auxiliary police coordinator Adolph F. Simons or

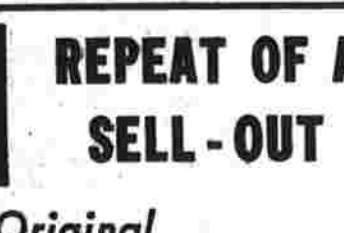

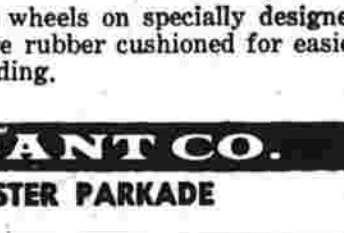

New York and Springfield, Mass. It also operates 220 local and 400 long-haul passenger trains. The New Haven estimates that all these trains are operated at an annual deficit of \$12 million.

The AFL-CIO Transport Workers Union, which represents 18,000 nonoperating employees of the Pennsylvania and New York Central Railroads, urged Thursday that the Interstate Commerce Commission reject the proposal to merge the two railroads. Two examiners of the commission recommended the merger last Monday.

The union said in a statement that the proposed merger would bring about a monopoly such as that of the "robber barons" of the early railroad days and would "create an army of miter bitblitters left stranded by the bankrupt New Haven."

Talks Slated
HARTFORD (AP)—Gov. John M. Dempsey said today that he planned to confer with state officials about the possibility of hiring a top expert in railroad transportation matters to represent Connecticut interests in hearings before the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Dempsey said he would first confer with Atty. Gen. Harold M. Malvey, Frank M. Rindholm, chairman of the Connecticut Transportation Authority, and Samuel Kanell, assistant attorney general who has specialized on railroad matters.

The governor said that the state should do anything it could do to "strengthen our case" and he added that the time to do it was now.

Dempsey disclosed his plans when asked to comment on a statement made Thursday by Republican legislative leaders. The Republicans called for a top flight team of experts to help the state save commuter and passenger service on the New Haven Railroad.

They said the state should hire the best legal talent available to represent it at hearings before the ICC.

Dempsey said he particularly wanted to confer about the matter with Kanell, who he said is an expert on railroad matters. He said Kanell has "done an outstanding job" in representing the state.

The governor said he saw no objection to hiring outside help if there was a need for special talent in the field of transportation and ICC procedures.

"I think our thoughts are along the same lines," he said in referring to the GOP statement. "I don't think we have any argument on this."

The governor said he hoped the state served by the New Haven can work together for agreement upon plan rather than be "against something."

Dempsey did not say where the state might look for a top legal expert of the kind desired, but there were indications that the most likely place would be Washington.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks at noon was up 3 1/2 at 83.1 with industrials up 3 1/2, utilities up 4 and averages up 3 1/2. The Dow Jones industrial average at noon was up 3 7/8 at 864.12.

It was the best showing the Dow industrials had made in a week but, as those things go, it was moderate.

Investment buying of some blue chips accounted for what stretched the industrial average displayed. Gains of a point or so by DuPont, Chrysler and Union Carbide were heavily influential.

Prices were higher in moderate trading on the American Stock Exchange. Helena Rubins stock rose 4 to 42 on a delayed opening block of 4,700 shares. The stock rose 4 1/4 Thursday following news that the founder, Helena Rubinstein, had died. One theory for the rise was that the company may now be more receptive to acquisition by another concern.

Corporate bonds were mixed. U.S. government bonds declined.

Law Allowing Sterilization Under Attack

Health now says it also favors repeal of the law. The law permits Connecticut to sterilize inmates of mental institutions, training centers for the mentally retarded, and the state prison.

How often the law has been used is not known but six mental patients have been sterilized in the last 10 years, four of them with the consent of the patient or her family.

Some operations also have been performed at the Mansfield and Southbury training schools for the health department. It is not known if the operation has ever been performed at the state prison.

Mrs. Evans said she will submit a repeal bill to the health department amendment which would have permitted "total surgery" on a female patient instead of removal of the uterus and oophorectomy, as the law specified.

When the bill was passed, Assembly records show that one proponent said that the number of mentally defective patients was appalling. He argued that these persons should not be allowed to produce children for whom the state must care.

Another supporter maintained that sterilized persons were more docile and better for society. The House passed the bill by a vote of 130-28. The vote in the Senate was unanimous.
