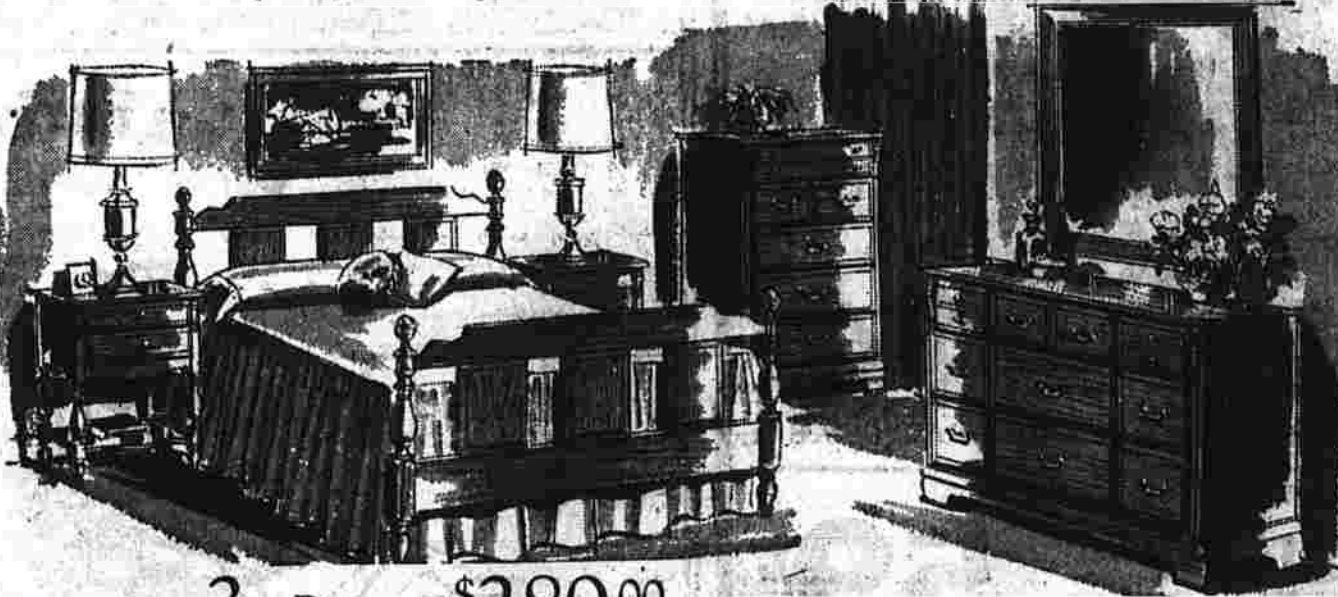

Party Maverick Sam Yorty Seeks '68 Senatorial Nod

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Sam Yorty, the prominent political figure, is making a bid for the Democratic nomination for the U.S. Senate in 1968. From California's party regulars, still huffing from last November's defeat that spells trouble.

Yorty, 57-year-old mayor of Los Angeles, has been ousting the Democratic establishment one way or another for 30 years. But state leaders concede that finding somebody to beat him for the party's senatorial nomination will not be easy.

The mayor has made two well-publicized trips to Saigon and keeps a big war map of the Vietnam hand to his desk. He implies a certain confidence with President Johnson, whose Vietnam policy he strongly supports.

He got some political mileage out of a televised row last year with Sen. Robert F. Kennedy.

And his vote-getting power in the Greater Los Angeles area, where he runs a million-dollar campaign, has been amply demonstrated.

Yorty has made no formal announcement, but says he is considering a shot at the Senate seat of Republican Thomas H. Donohue. "If the President wants me to run, I would," he says.

California's Democratic leadership believes he already is running for Donohue in the June, 1968, primary they may run. Creation of a new state controller, or Thomas Braden, former president of the State Board of Education, or Governor Edmund G. Brown, beaten by Ronald Reagan last autumn, are other possible Yorty rival but he de-

Computer File In Second Phase Mayor Lee Says

NEW HAVEN (AP) — An experimental IBM filing system designed to pool vast amounts of information for the use of the various municipal departments of the city has entered a new phase.

Mayor Richard C. Lee and IBM officials agreed Tuesday that application of the experimental stored data system is running the city will constitute the second phase.

The first part of the study was the mapping out of each city department and agency and examining how information travels between them.

New Haven was the first city chosen for joint studies of the experimental IBM filing system. It was selected for the project because of its progressive environment, said J. E. Norton, general manager of IBM's division in charge of the study.

"I would say that the City of Los Angeles right now, from your testimony, doesn't stand for a damned thing," the Connecticut senator snapped.

Kennedy accused Yorty of lacking leadership.

"I don't need a lecture from you on how to run my city," Yorty's political assets included Kennedy and Ribicoff.

Many Structures In Human Body Named For Czech

WARSAW, Poland — Johannes Purkyně (1787-1869), a Czech physician who taught physiology and pathology at the University of Breslau, made basic contributions in embryology, histology and ophthalmology. More structures of the human body are named after him than any other individual.

RHS Students Get Lesson on Closed-Circuit TV

A dramatic proof television can teach in the Vernon schools was given the other day.

The first Vernon teacher to make a show to teach his students was Allen Gates of the business education department of Rockville High School. Television was the answer to a problem.

Gates had large classes to teach, but he operated a complicated business machine, but he did not have the time to show each student in detail.

All 100 of his students could not crowd around his desk to demonstrate an automatic bookkeeping machine. "New students really see what he was doing."

Joseph Giorgio, director of audio-visual education for the town, used his TV camera and equipment to solve the problem.

He also noted that classes of 30 students each had seats before them in three separate rooms.

In the first room Gates had two TV cameras looking over his shoulder.

Gates allowed questions from the students in his room. The cameras focused on them and students talked and then back to Gates for the answer.

The whole class ran 10 minutes on TV.

From all reports of other teachers and the students, the class was a "tremendous" success, Gates said.

That was the first use of TV for Gates. He and several of his clerical graduates on TV have staged shows to demonstrate how to take job interviews.

In February 75 of his students, three classrooms, watched several classmates on TV as they made terrible first impressions on an employer, Gates. It was a "how-not-to" demonstration of job seeking.

Also, it was the first teaching use of live TV made in Vernon and shown in Vernon.

On Feb. 17 the whole operation was repeated. This time the students did everything right and got the jobs on TV before their classmates.

The advantages to the showings are immediate attention, live action. Taping repetition is unnecessary.

Gates believes his students learned much from the shows. "Other schools in the system are anxious to use TV again."

"Any means of achieving real results in the classroom is a valuable educational value," he said.

The head of personnel at the Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance Company in Hartford, Haslan Richardson, told Gates and Giorgio he saw the first TV showing Feb. 10 and was so impressed he made a special trip back to the school to see the Feb. 17 show.

Richardson does Mutual's secretary hiring.

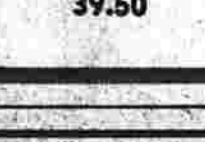

Blessed The Peacemakers?
 The difference between Secretary General Thant's latest peace plan and his previous proposition was that, in his former three points, he asked the United States to make the first specific contribution to the peace-making process, by halting the bombing of North Vietnam.

Secretary General Thant, as he emphasized yesterday, still believes that would be the best and most hopeful thing that could happen.

He has, however, obviously now concluded that no one is going to persuade the United States to make such a first step toward peace.

His new proposition, therefore, no longer asks either side to be the one to make a first contribution to the possibility of peace.

He now poses, as the first step that he hopes can be taken, a "standstill truce" in which both sides would simultaneously cease all military activity. He would, once such a "standstill truce" had been achieved, then envisage "preliminary talks" which would be aimed toward a reconvening of the 1964 Geneva Conference.

If there is any slim chance of success for the Secretary General's latest peace effort, it lies in the possibility that he may sway the parties to the war into some agreement in principle with his proposal after which he might then unveil his idea of how to get his "standstill" to come into effect.

It was such an acceptance in principle, which carefully reserved commitments on any details, which Thant has obtained from Washington. And one must judge, cynically, that even this much acceptance from Washington has been based primarily on an assumption that Hanoi is almost certain to reject the whole thing.

If the Secretary General has, in the written but so far unpublicized reply he intimates he has from Hanoi, something short of outright rejection, then conceivably he has opportunity for further maneuvering.

On the other hand, this particular peace move had already been closely by its details were revealed. Secretary General Thant has merely provided the Johnson administration with what it will interpret to be additional justification for that escalation of military pressure which Thant deprecates because he thinks it so capable of leading to wider conflict. Blessed the peacemakers? Not exactly, in our time.

Road Building To Imitate
 When we read that Soviet Russia is now being urged to stir itself and, of all things, emulate the United States in our construction of a modern highway network, we cannot, once again, the apparent inability of human being to benefit from experience, or from the mistakes of others.

The Russians apparently think that since our highways are long and straight, and cut up the landscape into minute parcels, they are good. And since we, having built ourselves what we have built ourselves, seem to have no higher objective than to build more of the same until we have whole states paved solid, we certainly cannot expect to the Russians, nor expect to be very efficient in alerting them.

What might do us both a whole deal of good, if we could bring ourselves to open our progress-fixed minds, would be some contemplation of an item which appeared in the news on the same day of the disclosure that Russia is being urged to imitate American highway builders. This second news item told of the discovery, in Eastern Egypt, of ancient Roman roads leading to the quarries where gray granite for some of the great buildings in Rome was originally quarried.

May we suggest that a system of road construction which built roads that can still be found in places some 2,000 years later might have something to suggest to us in the way of engineering and design—whose roads sometimes lasted under us half the mere proposing of them? May we note, as well, that while the Romans had the sense and the engineering to build roads in straight lines, they also had the sense and the engineering to build roads in straight lines that were efficient and comfortable at speeds which were safe and reasonable, and that when the Romans wanted to spend human lives, they did it either for harsh purposes of war or spectacle sport in their amphitheatres, but not pointlessly on their highways?

The Romans, too, knew where all roads led to, and that is something that, even with our invention of road signs, seems continually to elude us Americans.

Truth Harder To Get At
 Despite our ability to send a picture in full color instantly across oceans and continents, and to send a copy of a newspaper or magazine in a matter of hours, or obtain an untold number of facts from a computer within seconds, there is evidence that an "understanding gap" of serious dimensions exists in this country today.

In the kind of world in which we are living it is a primary mission of the communications media to bridge this "understanding gap" by speaking out the facts and arranging them in a pattern that accounts for the events and the reasons for their existence in a democratic society—the dispelling of confusion and the assembling of the facts into a free people must have in order to make the decisions that will determine their destiny.

Only when this process is successfully undertaken hour by hour, year in and year out, can the communications media fulfill one of the primary reasons for their existence in a democratic society—the dispelling of confusion and the assembling of the facts into a free people must have in order to make the decisions that will determine their destiny.

Yet, too often these days the message is not getting through. Too many Americans have too little knowledge, and even less understanding of what is going on. Far from becoming increasingly involved in the affairs of the nation through mass communications—as is generally believed—many of our people are becoming even further isolated from the march of events.

The Torrey Canyon
 The Torrey Canyon — the giant oil tanker the British Navy finally bombed out of Britain's misery — was originally built, in an American shipyard in 1959. In 1965 it went over to a Japanese shipyard, and had itself lengthened.

The Torrey Canyon flew the Liberian flag, and was owned by the Barracuda Tanker Corp. of Monrovia, Liberia. The Barracuda Tanker Corp. is a unit of Union Oil of California.

The crew of the Torrey Canyon was Italian.

The Liberian tanker built in America, hulked in Japan, and sailed by an Italian crew was chartered, Feb. 6, to British Petroleum Ltd. It was on that chartered voyage, from Kuwait, to Milford Haven, Wales, when, on March 18, negotiating a channel 12 miles wide in gale force winds, it stranded on Seven Stones Reef, on the southwest coast of England.

The detergent which was used to try and disperse the giant oil slick loosed the contents of the company's reserves; it was used in 1960 on a large scale to help clean up a coastal mess created following a tanker collision in the same region.

The final bombing of the Torrey Canyon was done by British planes. Perhaps the 1,000 ton bombs they used were originally of American manufacture.

The Torrey Canyon's hull was insured for \$18.5 million, with United States firms writing about 60 per cent of this, and London firms the balance.

The Torrey Canyon's cargo of 80,000 to 100,000 tons of crude oil was insured for between \$1,200,000 and \$1.5 million, and the vessel carried \$2.5 million.

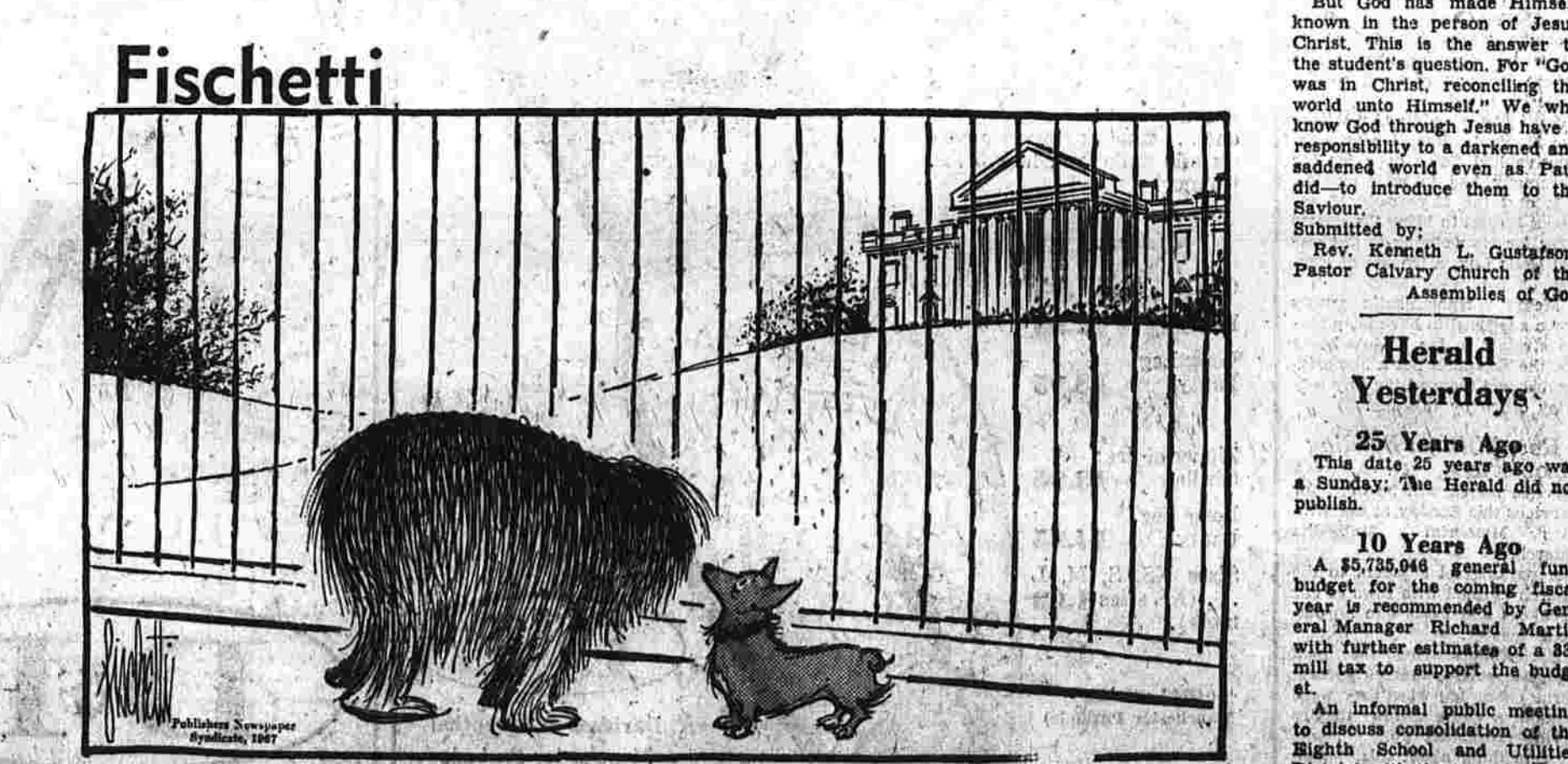

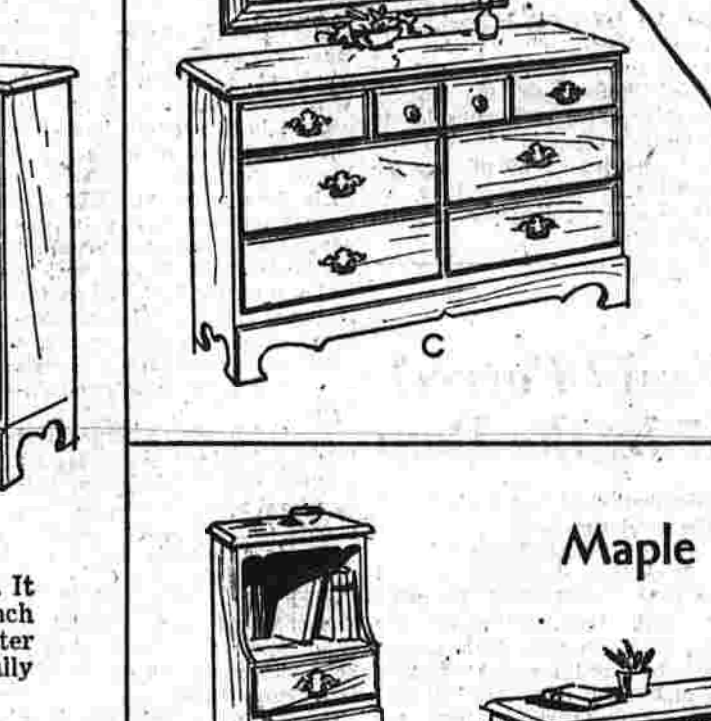

PARIS (AP) — American comic strips and their creators are going to get a red-carpet welcome to Paris...

They will be the center of an international exposition April 17-June 12, tracing the evolution of figurative drawings from carved Trojan columns to year favorite character in the funnies.

The exposition will be held in the Museum des Arts Decoratifs, near the Louvre.

The exposition will stress the American comic strip's appeal to adults, plus the fact that comics are read daily by almost a quarter of the world's population.

This exposition forms part of an 18-month campaign our society has conducted to inform the French public on the characteristics of American comic strips.

The child-oriented nature of French comics is classic and has generally not changed in 30 to 40 years.

U.S. strips are basically serious and rely largely on sociological or topical subjects. I think, however, that French thinking in comic strips is readjusting to the present.

The evolution of illustrated communication will be traced from carved Trojan columns and the tapestries of Bayeux, to the colored drawings by 12th and 13th century monks.

The first comic strip by the American Rudolf Dirks in 1897 will be shown. Dirks is now 80.

Walks Cost Would Reach \$2.1 Million

The estimated cost of constructing concrete sidewalks to meet all of Manchester's present needs, would cost the town approximately \$2.1 million, according to a report issued by Thomas C. Monahan, setting director of public works.

The Board of Directors, on March 7, had voted informal approval to a suggestion made by COP Director Harold A. Turkington, for amending the sidewalk ordinance and to provide full town payment for sidewalks. At present, benefiting property owners are required to pay 20 per cent of the cost.

Monahan lists present needs as needs on streets leading to and adjoining schools. His survey does not include other areas in possible need of sidewalks, such as Broad St. and W. Middle Tpke. in the Shopping Parkside area.

The listed costs include sidewalks and curbs.

Monahan, in a separate cost survey, estimates that the same walks and curbs, constructed of bituminous, would cost the town about half, or \$1,142,000.

Town Manager Robert Weston, in his six-year Capital Improvements Program, contained in his 1967-68 tentative budget, recommends \$181,000 for sidewalks over the six-year period—\$31,000 in 1967-68; \$20,000 in 1968-69 and in 1969-70; and then \$100,000 in 1970-71, in 1971-72 and in 1972-73.

In some cases Monahan has recommended sidewalks on both sides of a street. In others the walks are recommended for one side only.
