NOTICE OF ENTRY OF ORDER (I) APPROVING DISCLOSURE STATEMENT; (II) APPROVING SOLICITATION AND NOTICE MATERIALS; (III) APPROVING FORM OF BALLOTS; (IV) ESTABLISHING SOLICITATION AND VOTING PROCEDURES; (V) ESTABLISHING PROCEDURES FOR ALLOWING AND ESTIMATING CERTAIN CLAIMS FOR VOTING PURPOSES; (VI) SCHEDULING A CONFIRMATION HEARING AND (VII) ESTABLISHING NOTICE AND OBJECTION PROCEDURES. By order entered on November 7, 2013 (the "Approval Order"), the United States Bankruptcy Court for the Eastern District of Missouri (the "Court") approved the Disclosure Statement filed by Patriot Coal Corporation and its subsidiaries that are debtors and Debtors in Possession (collectively the "Debtors") and directed the Debtors to solicit votes to accept or reject the Debtors' Joint Plan of Reorganization Under Chapter 11 of the Bankruptcy Code (as the same may be updated, supplemented, amended and/or otherwise modified from time to time, the "Plan"),¹ annexed as Exhibit A thereto.

2. The Approval Order establishes October 30, 2013 at 5:00 p.m. (pre-ailing Central Time) as the Voting Record Date for determining the holder of pre-Chapter 11 claims entitled to vote on the Plan and establishes 4:00 p.m. (pre-ailing Central Time) on December 20, 2013 as the Voting Dead Line for the submission of ballots to accept or reject the Plan (the "Ballot").

3. Holders of claims entitled to vote on the Plan will receive electronic copies on CD-ROM of (i) the Approval Order, the Disclosure Statement, the Plan and certain exhibits thereto, (ii) this notice, (iii) a letter from the statutory committee of unsecured creditors (the "Creditors' Committee") regarding acceptance of the Plan and (iv) a Ballot or Beneficial Ballot, as appropriate, together with a pre-addressed postage pre-paid envelope to be used by you in voting to accept or to reject the Plan. Failure to follow the instructions set forth on the Ballot or Beneficial Ballot, as applicable, may disqualify that Ballot or Beneficial Ballot and the vote represented thereby.

4. If you received electronic copies of the Disclosure Statement and the Plan and would like to receive paper copies, please visit the Debtors' case information website (located at www.patriotcase11rfo.com), or contact the Debtors' Solicitation Agent, GCG, Inc., at (877) 600-6531 or, for international callers, (336) 542-5677.

5. Holders of (i) unimpaired claims and (ii) claims or interests that will receive no distribution under the Plan and are not entitled to vote on the Plan and, therefore, will receive a notice of non-voting status rather than a Ballot. If you have not received a Ballot (or you have received a Ballot in an amount you believe to be incorrect) but believe that you should be entitled to vote on the Plan (or vote in an amount different than the amount issued on your Ballot), then you must serve on the Debtors and the Creditors' Committee and file with the Bankruptcy Court a motion for an order pursuant to Bankruptcy Rule 3018(a) ("Rule 3018(a) Motion") temporarily allowing such claim in a different amount for purposes of voting to accept or reject the Plan on or before the later of (i) November 27, 2013 and (ii) the fourteenth (14th) day after the date of service of an objection, if any, to such claim. 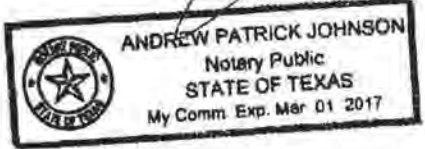

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

Filipinos crowd ill-equipped clinic

Typhoon-stricken city in Philippines braces for growing medical problems.

TACLOBAN, PHILIPPINES • A run-down, single-story building with filthy floors at Tacloban's ruined airport has become the area's main medical center for victims of last week's powerful typhoon. It has little medicine, virtually no facilities and very few doctors.

What it is not short of are patients. Hundreds of injured people, pregnant women, children and the elderly have poured into the squat, white building behind the control tower since Typhoon Haiyan ravaged the eastern Philippines on Friday, killing thousands. Doctors who have been dealing with cuts, fractures and pregnancy complications said Wednesday that they soon expect to be treating more serious problems such as pneumonia, dehydration, diarrhea and infections.

The medical woes add to the daunting tasks for authorities, including dealing with looters and clearing the bottlenecks holding up thousands of tons of aid material from coming in. "The priority has got to be, let's get the food in, let's get the water in. We got a lot more come in today. But even that won't be enough. We really need to scale up operation in an ongoing basis," U.N. humanitarian chief Valerie Amos told reporters af-

ter touring Tacloban, the capital of Leyte province. Her office has released \$25 million in emergency relief fund, accounting for a chunk of the millions of dollars pledged by countries around the world.

The World Food Program distributed rice and other items to nearly 50,000 people in the Tacloban area Wednesday, U.N. spokesman Martin Nesirky said. While the cogs of what promises to be a massive international aid effort are beginning to turn, they are not quick enough for the 600,000 people displaced, many of them homeless, hungry and thirsty.

The death toll rose to 2,344, according to a national tally kept by the disaster agency. That figure is expected to rise, perhaps significantly, when accurate information is collected from the whole disaster zone, which spreads over a wide swath of the eastern and central Philippines but appears to be concentrated on two main islands — Leyte and Samar.

With the Tacloban airport battered and roads made impassable by debris, very little aid has arrived in the city. Most of it is stuck in Manila and the nearby airport of Cebu, a 45-minute flight away.

Many among the desperate residents have resorted to raiding for food. Mobs overran a rice warehouse on Leyte, collapsing a wall that killed eight people.

Thousands of sacks of the grain were carted off. Also Wednesday, security forces exchanged gunfire with an armed gang.

Tacloban Mayor Alfred Romualdez urged residents to flee the city because local authorities were having trouble providing food and water and maintaining order, The New York Times reported. He said the city desperately needed trucks to distribute relief shipments accumulating at the airport as well as equipment to pull decaying corpses from the rubble.

Despite those incidents, police said the situation was improving. "We have restored order," said Carmelo Espina Valmorita, director of the Philippine National Police special action force. "There has been looting for the last three days, but the situation has stabilized."

With the local police force unable to operate — most were victims — the government rushed thousands of soldiers and 600 police officers from other parts of the country. The security forces, including army engineers, are helping clear roads and remove the dead, many of them on road-sides. A 6 p.m. to 6 a.m. curfew was in place.

"There's a lot of dead bodies outside. There's no water, no food," said Dr. Victoriano Sambale, one of the dozen medical staff tending to thousands of people at the airport clinic. Until

Wednesday, there was no anesthetic, so open wounds had to be stitched without it.

"Patients had to endure the pain," Sambale said. Suddenly his was summoned — another pregnant woman had shown up.

Clutching her swollen belly, Reve Rose, 26, was writing in pain while rolling on her side on a wooden bench as her nervous husband looked on. Her first child was not due until about Christmas, but she feared she was in labor already. Sambale felt her belly and tried to calm her down, certain it was just a panic attack.

"I am nervous, sad," she said. "The house is lost. Everything is gone."

The air inside the clinic was fetid. Babies screamed and despondent elderly patients sat in chairs, eating dry crackers. One woman nursed her newborn, singing a lullaby. Intravenous drip bags hung from nails driven into the walls and doorjamb.

Thelma Superable, 74, vomited and needed emergency dialysis. She, her son, Danny Superable, 51, and his young son have made their way to the clinic from their home, 20 miles away, by walking and hitching rides. By the time they reached the clinic, they were down to one bottle with an inch of water left in it. "I am trembling because I am hungry," Danny Superable said. "It's survival of the fittest."

Lutherans here send Kirkwood man to help

He will assess, give aid locals request.

KIRKWOOD • There is a routine to natural disasters. The immediate destruction is often followed by a wave of volunteers, aid groups, search dogs and "disaster cowboys" who can create more problems than they solve.

"They are going to drive you crazy sometimes, but that is your vocation," the Rev. Matthew Harrison said Wednesday during a ceremony. "The Lord has put you there."

Harrison, president of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, was speaking to his new director of disaster relief services, the Rev. Ross Johnson.

Johnson, 37, a former Army chaplain who served in Afghanistan, recently moved to Kirkwood from Alabama to take up the post. He leaves Friday for the Philippines with a small team to assess the damage there from the recent typhoon.

Harrison formerly had the same job before going on to lead the LCMS, which has 6,200 congregations in the U.S. and Canada and missionaries around the globe.

The Synod said it had committed about \$150,000 to relief of this typhoon. The pending trip also will be a training run for Johnson, who is taking over from the Rev. Glenn Merritt, 66.

Merritt said he had been to 240 disasters since Hurricane Katrina hit in 2005 — from Japan to Chile to Asia. "Meaning well is not the most important," Merritt, of Arlington, Texas, said about parachuting into disaster zones.

Rather than rushing in with a grand plan, Merritt, who used to work in law enforcement, said he asked local groups what they were doing and what they thought they should do. Then he tries to help facilitate meaningful relief with LCMS resources.

Steve Schave, of Fenton, is also going on the trip to provide assistance to Lutheran churches. He said there would be long-term needs, and he hopes the immediate interest in the damage won't wane.

"We don't want this to fade," he said.

Immigration bill is dead for this year, Boehner says

WASHINGTON • Speaker John Boehner said Wednesday that he would not hold formal compromise talks on the Senate-passed comprehensive immigration bill, a fresh signal from the House Republican leadership that the issue is dead for the year.

The slow, relatively quiet death came more than four months after the Senate, on a bipartisan vote, passed a far-reaching bill that would provide a path to citizenship for the 11 million immigrants living in the country illegally and tighten border security.

That fanfare for that bill was quashed by strong opposition among House Republicans, who reject a comprehensive approach and question offering citizenship to people who broke U.S. immigration laws to be in this country. House incumbents also are weary of primary challenges from the right.

One of the clearest signs that any action was unlikely was word that Sen. Marco Rubio, R-Fla., who had worked for months on the Senate bill, had abandoned the comprehensive approach. Rubio had taken political heat from conservatives after Senate passage of the immigration bill.

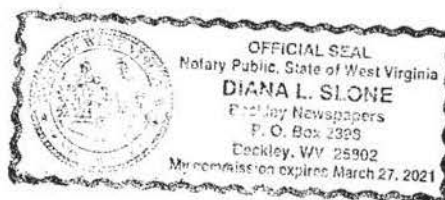

"Maybe the reason you're here today is the board did choose not to neglect Stratton this time," Snuffer responded. "We can't correct the sins of the past board, but what we can do is go from this day forward," said Snuffer. "That's what we want to do."

Snuffer described himself as an "old country boy from Trap Hill" whose old high school was replaced by Liberty and is currently in shambles.

He said he understands the viewpoint of the speakers and supports their efforts to keep their community alive.

The BOE will be spending between \$9 million and \$13 million in the Stratton school district if the bond passed, he said. "When is the last time somebody told you in East Beckley, we're going to spend \$9, \$10, \$13 million in East Beckley?"

"We're (the BOE) not going to take it away from you, we're going to give you stuff," he said. "This board wants to invest in that community and make sure you have as good a school as Marsh Fork, Fairdale, as good a school as any in the state of West Virginia."

Those from the Stratton Elementary School district who spoke let board members know about their concerns on the new Comprehensive Facilities Plan, a 10-year document that deals with renovations and repair costs of bringing the county's schools up to code.

BOE members had formed subcommittees in September to advise members on how any bond monies could be most efficiently spent. One suggestion mentioned was that Stratton Elementary students be bused to an expanded Beckley Elementary School facility — a plan that was opposed vehemently by many in the Stratton district.

Some of the previous incidents causing the district include that several sports trophies at the old Stratton High School "disappeared," and a picture of the late Stratton Principal Malvin Ross was taken from the school (now Stratton Elementary) when Ross died in 2004.

School personnel later replaced the picture, Bishop Bob Tunstalle of Temple of Deliverance told board members Tuesday.

"It's imperative that we keep the school," Tunstalle added. "If we need to do something inside, then let's do it."

"The money's going to be spent either way, but if we can preserve the heritage, the legacy's been in place since the 1920s."

"If you can do it for Park (Junior High School), you can do it for Stratton," he said. "If we can do it for other schools, we can certainly do it for Stratton."

Professional architect and contracting firms hired by the BOE to give a report on the facilities in the county reported that it would cost \$129 million to bring every school up to code.

It would cost around \$9.7 million to make all needed renovations to the Stratton facility, including the revamping of electrical systems, HVAC, the roof, the floors and other issues.

Snuffer said money could be spent on bringing the current facility up to code or a new facility could be built on the property, allowing the current building to be used for a community center.

Either way, he said, he could practically "guarantee" that Stratton would

not be closed in any case. Tunstalle said he would support a plan to renovate the current facility.

"If you can put air conditioning in these other schools that are certainly older, you can put air conditioning at Stratton," he said. "I want to support that bond ... and I believe I will be able to because I believe the board is going to make the right decision and a responsible one."

July Patterson, a Stratton mother and grandmothers, said she and others in East Beckley are offended by language in the BOE plan and on the BOE website, and by other planning committees in the city of Beckley, that targeted the neighborhood as a "high crime area."

"Go and find out about Stratton," Patterson said. "I like where I live. I don't live in a high crime area."

"We are working people," she said. "We don't rob, we don't steal, we don't mug."

"I'm insulted each time East Beckley is ... dubbed a high crime area," she reiterated. "We are human beings."

"We invest in our community, and we invest in our children."

Raleigh County NAACP President Rev.

James Cox also took offense at the language. Cox, a Vietnam veteran, said he'd fought for his country, paid his taxes and supported the school board.

He's disappointed in the current political divisions in Washington and feels local leaders are also showing disrespect to African-American residents in some instances, he reported.

"When you look at me and don't see my dollars and don't see my votes, I'm very disappointed in the USA, very disappointed in Beckley," he said, obvious hurt in his voice.

Former Beckley councilwoman Madrieth Chambers and current Common Councilwoman Ann Worley both opposed any plan to close Stratton — a plan Snuffer promised does not exist.

Another hearing on the bond issue will be held Nov. 19.

Board members urged voters to support the continuation of an excess levy that will not raise taxes and will pay for textbooks, athletics, technology and other educational necessities in the county.





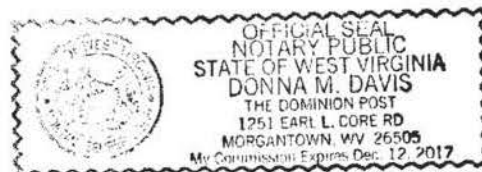

Aid trickling to hard-hit areas in Philippines

TACLOBAN, Philippines — Desperately needed food, water and medical aid are only trickling into this city that took the worst blow from Typhoon Haiyan, while thousands of victims jammed the damaged airport Tuesday, seeking to be evacuated.

"We need help. Nothing is happening. We haven't eaten since yesterday afternoon," pleaded a weeping Aristote Balota, an 81-year-old woman who failed to get a flight out of Tacloban for Manila, the capital. Her clothes were soaked from a pouring rain and tears streamed down her face.

Five days after what could be the Philippines' deadliest disaster, aid is coming — pallets of supplies and teams of doctors are waiting to get into Tacloban — but the challenges of delivering the assistance means few in the stricken city have received help.

"There is a huge amount that we need to do. We have not been able to get into the remote communities," UN humanitarian chief Valerie Amos said in Manila, launching an appeal for \$60 million to help the more than 11 million people estimated to be affected by the storm.

"Even in Tacloban, because of the debris and the difficulties with logistics and so on, we have not been able to get in the level of supply that we would want to. We are going to do as much as we can to bring in more," she said.

Israel halting plans for new settlements

JERUSALEM — Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu on Tuesday backed off controversial plans for potential construction of thousands of new homes on the West Bank, including development of a contentious area outside of Jerusalem.

The plan announced by Israel's Housing Ministry earlier in the day prompted a Palestinian threat to walk out of Mideast peace talks. U.S. officials said they were blindsided by the Israeli announcement and demanded an explanation.

In a statement issued late Tuesday, Netanyahu said the plan would make "no contribution" to settlements and would only hurt the cause.

Ban Ki-moon plans visit to Auschwitz

UNITED NATIONS — A spokesman said Ban Ki-moon plans to make the first-ever visit by a United Nations secretary-general to the infamous Auschwitz death camp in Poland. The camp remains the most vivid symbol of the cruelty of Nazi Germany's genocide of World War II. U.N. spokesman Martin Nesirky announced Tuesday that Ban will visit the camp "to pay tribute to the victims of the Holocaust and to

stress the importance of the U.N.'s work for genocide prevention, tolerance and peace."

Toronto's mayor vows fight to stay

TORONTO — Embattled Mayor Rob Ford said Tuesday he will fight any attempt to have him take a leave of absence in the wake of a crack smoking scandal.

A motion before the Toronto City Council today asks the province of Ontario to pass legislation to remove the mayor if he doesn't voluntarily take a leave of absence.

Ford, who acknowledged this past week that he smoked crack, said the council meeting will be a "rumble in the jungle."

Ford made the remark as he signed a bobble headed "Robbie Bobbie" dolls for \$20 each, inside City Hall on Tuesday.

Egypt holds off on ending curfew

CAIRO — A court declared that Egypt's 3-month-old state of emergency expired Tuesday, two days earlier than expected, but the military and security officials held off implementing the ruling and lifting a nighttime curfew, amid worries that the measures' end will fuel protests by supporters of ousted President Mohammed Morsi. Morsi, meanwhile, held his first extensive meeting with lawyers in prison.

Wider use of cholesterol drugs urged

The nation's first new guidelines in a decade for preventing heart attacks and strokes call for twice as many Americans — one-third of all adults — to consider taking cholesterol-lowering statin drugs.

The guidelines, issued Tuesday by the American Heart Association and American College of Cardiology, are a big change. They use a new formula for estimating someone's risk that includes many factors besides cholesterol, the main focus now. They take aim at strokes, not just heart attacks. And they set a lower threshold for using medicines to reduce risk.

The definition of high cholesterol isn't changing, but the treatment goal is. Instead of aiming for a specific number, using whatever drugs get a patient there, the advice stresses statins such as Lipitor and Zocor, and identifies groups of people they help the most.

"The emphasis is to try to treat more appropriately," said Dr. Neil Stone, the Northwestern University doctor who headed the cholesterol guideline panel. "We're going to give statins to those who are the most likely to benefit."

Doctors said the new approach will limit how many people with low heart risks are put on statins simply because of a cholesterol number. Yet under the new advice, 33 million Americans — 44 percent of men and 22 percent of women — would meet the threshold to consider taking a statin. Under the current guidelines, statins are recommended for only about 15 percent of adults.

Slain L.A. TSA officer's life is celebrated

LOS ANGELES — At a memorial service filled with tears, prayers and songs, the Transportation Security Administration Tuesday remembered Tuesday as a devoted public servant who greeted every traveler with a grin and never passed up an opportunity to talk about his children.

Gerardo Hernandez became the first TSA officer killed in the line of duty Nov. 1. A man authorities said held a grudge against his agency pulled a rifle from a bag and opened fire at the airport's Terminal 3. The man methodically targeted TSA agents, wounding two others and also a school teacher before airport police shot and captured him.

About 500 people turned out to honor Hernandez at the Los Angeles Memorial Sports Arena, including the two agents who were wounded.

Clinton to Obama: Honor your pledge

WASHINGTON — Former President Bill Clinton said President Barack Obama should find a way to let people keep their health coverage, even if it means changing the new insurance law.

Obama has come under pressure in recent weeks as millions of Americans started receiving insurance cancellation letters. The president had repeatedly said people would not be forced to change their insurance under the new law.

Thomas Kirsch argued prosecutors failed to prove their case, noting they called just two witnesses. Trudeau could face years in prison.

Defense rests in \$100M fraud trial

CLEVELAND — The mysterious defendant charged in a \$100 million, cross-country veterans charity fraud wanted to tell jurors his side of the story at his trial, but he skipped testifying Tuesday as his defense rested without calling witnesses.

His attorney said the defendant, who identifies himself as Bobby Thompson, 67, changed his mind about testifying, worried about his mental state if he faced an aggressive cross-examination.

The defendant, identified by authorities as Harvard-trained lawyer John Donald Cody, bled while pounding his head against the wall in a holding cell, defense attorney Joseph Patrice said during a break in the trial. The judge said the defendant was checked by the jail medical staff.

TV diet pitchman guilty of contempt

CHICAGO — Jurors deliberated for less than an hour Tuesday before finding TV pitchman Kevin Trudeau guilty of criminal contempt involving inaccurate claims about his best-selling diet book.

Trudeau, 50, was accused of violating a judge's 2004 order barring him from making false claims about his best-selling book, "The Weight Loss Cure They Don't Want You to Know About."

Suspect admits to mailing heroin

A Michigan man who admitted he mailed more than \$38,000 worth of heroin to drug dealers in Huntington faces up to 40 years in federal prison.

Zachery Jose Merritt, 30, of Detroit, pleaded guilty to conspiracy to distribute heroin Tuesday before Chief U.S. District Judge Robert Chambers, according to a statement from U.S. Attorney Booth Goodwin.

Merritt, also known as "Zane," mailed heroin to associates in Huntington from September 2012 to June 2013. The drugs were later sold in and around the area for \$125 a gram, according to court records. He is responsible for the trafficking of 638 grams of heroin, documents show.

Authorities said drug proceeds totaling \$38,250 were deposited into Merritt's bank account in Huntington and that Merritt accessed the funds in Detroit.

He provided drugs to a co-conspirator and Huntington resident identified as Lindsey Alyx Thacker, 29. Thacker, also known as "Lindsey Webb," made seven trips to Detroit between the summer of 2012 and June 2013 to pick up heroin and crack cocaine from Merritt.

Thacker and her associate, Keith Eric Wood, 28, opened their Huntington home to store and sell heroin. A check on the home on June 20 turned up 3 grams of heroin and more than \$1,000 cash.

Thacker and Wood pleaded guilty Nov. 5 to maintaining a home to sell heroin and each face up to 20 years in federal prison. Sentencing for all three is scheduled for Feb. 18.

Police say syringes found in baby's crib

When authorities went to a Clendenin woman's home to investigate the death of her boyfriend, they allegedly found syringes in her infant's crib.

rested Friday at her home and charged with child neglect or abuse causing the risk of injury.

Clendenin police went to the Maywood Avenue home Friday to investigate after town firefighters responded to a death in the home.

They found Chad Elmore, Puffilion's boyfriend and the father of her child, lying dead in a back bedroom with several syringes and needles near his body, according to a complaint filed in Kanawha Magistrate Court.

Officers also found syringes and needles on and under a mattress in a baby's crib in the room.

Puffilion told police she injected heroin earlier in the day and then took two Roxy-codone pills and smoked marijuana that evening, the complaint said. She said she and Elmore bought heroin twice a week from a woman in Pinch.

Child Protective Services workers removed the child, investigators said.

Puffilion is free on \$1,000 cash bond. A preliminary hearing will be held Nov. 19 in Kanawha Magistrate Court.

Car strikes woman checking on dog

A woman is hospitalized in stable condition after being struck by a car while kneeling in a road to check on her dog that had previously been hit by a vehicle, said Sheriff Steve Dewese of the Putnam County Sheriff's Office.

The woman was kneeling in the southbound lane of W.Va. 62 in Black Betsy about 6 p.m. Monday when she was hit, Dewese said. She was taken to Charleston Area Medical Center's General Division, he said.

He said she lived nearby and walked to the area to check on her dog. He did not know if the dog survived.

The incident remains under investigation. No charges had been filed on Tuesday morning.

Woman injured in Elkins fire dies

Jennifer Chamberlain died in Pa. burn center; fire also claimed her husband, four children

The mother of the four young children killed in a devastating fire in Elkins died of her injuries at a Pennsylvania burn center, state officials said.

Jennifer Chamberlain, 34, died early Tuesday at the West Penn Burn Center in Pittsburgh from injuries sustained in the Oct. 28 house fire that claimed the life of her husband and four children, according to an investigator at the State Fire Marshal's Office.

She and her brother, Jeff Hyde, were the last of the family at the hospital after the fire. Hyde, who had been sleeping in the basement at the time of the fire, was released from the burn center on Monday, investigators said.

Fire broke out in the Elkins home about 4 a.m. Oct. 28, trapping the family of six and Chamberlain's brother, Hyde,

inside. Isabella Chamberlain, 4, was pronounced dead at the scene. Alanna Chamberlain, 2, died at a local hospital hours later.

Alan Chamberlain, 29, Brianna Chamberlain, 2, and Catherine Bolgar, 11, all died at West Penn Oct. 29. Brianna was Alanna's twin and Catherine was Jennifer's daughter from a previous relationship.

The fire was believed to have started in a couch on a side porch where family members would smoke. Larry Messina, communications director for the Department of Military Affairs and Public Safety, said on behalf of the State Fire Marshal's Office. He said extensive damage to the home made it difficult to pinpoint the cause.

The fire blocked all of the exits. The house had a smoke detector, but it did not have any battery backup systems.

Fire Chief Tom Meader told the Associated Press. "In the wake of that fire and other fatal fires we've endured recently, we've really tried to step up our public education efforts," Messina said. "One piece of advice is when you turn back your clock for Day-

light Saving Time you replace the batteries in your smoke and CO (carbon monoxide) detectors."

He said there have been 55 civilian fire deaths in the state since Jan. 1. It's a figure he said was not necessarily high for the state, but was still "regrettable." He said West Virginia's fire death rate per capita is higher than every state in the nation, surpassed only by Washington, D.C.

A 2010 study by the U.S. Fire Administration showed West Virginia's fire death rate was 37.2 per million residents.

"A West Virginian is 3.3 times more likely to die in a fire than a member of the general population," Messina said. "That's a terrible statistic."

He said a variety of factors could be the cause, including careless smoking, improperly used unsafe space heaters, or faulty heating systems.

He recommended having home heating systems inspected, making sure space heaters meet the latest standards, and using safe space heaters, or faulty heating systems.

should be at least one on each floor of a home, he said.

Those who cannot afford a smoke detector should check with their local fire department to see if low-cost or free smoke detectors are available, he said.

Families should also plan and practice escape plans for emergencies, he said.

"Having smoke detectors and home escape plans make a difference," Messina said.

He said some media outlets had obtained the 911 recordings from the fatal Elkins fire and that a woman in the house was describing to dispatchers that she was trapped. He called it "just heart wrenching."

"Sadly, I would say the circumstances of the fire speak for themselves," Messina said. "That bad loss of life is difficult to bear. We just hope the more we do to get the message out to the public, the less frequently, or the greater chance we have to save a family the next time."

Grant improves Internet access in city

Thanks to state funds, wireless connection will be available on West Side

Free public Wi-Fi will soon be available on parts of Charleston's West Side.

West Side Main Street has received a \$5,000 Governor's Community Participation Grant to help pay for the project, the organization's board learned at its monthly meeting Tuesday.

The target area for the wireless Internet access will stretch along Washington Street West from Pennsylvania Avenue to Iowa Street, but the scope of the project will be determined by how much the grant amount will cover.

West Side Main Street Executive Director Stephanie Johnson told the board she would contact various telecommunication companies in the next few weeks to get cost estimates. From there, the board can refine exactly how it wants to prioritize the grant money.

In addition, West Side Main Street will need to determine how to fund the Internet service once the infrastructure is in place, whether it be a grant or a line item in the organization's budget, Johnson said.

Currently, a similar system is in place on the East End, centering on the intersection of Washington Street East and Elizabeth Street. Johnson said she would talk to East End Main Street officials to see what has worked — and what hasn't — in that neighborhood.

The Wi-Fi project should be completed by December 2014.

Board members also approved 2014 work plans for the organization's design, economic restructuring, promotions and organization committees.

The work plans provide outlines for various tasks the committees — and the board — want to accomplish in the next year.

For example, the design committee will continue to oversee ongoing projects like the facade and sign grant programs and the streetscape project on Washington Street. The committee also plans to look into expanding window art, similar to what was recently installed in the former Staats Hospital building.

"We would really like to continue in one way or another the Staats window concept," board member Pauline Lester said.

The economic restructuring committee will continue an ongoing effort to create an inventory of buildings in West Side Main Street's urban renewal areas, host another West Side Business Expo and develop other economic development ideas and promotions.

The committee also wants to look into creating "block captain" positions, which would give each board member a block or section of the neighborhood to serve as the go-to person for businesses in that block and to contact and interview those business owners.

The data from those interviews would then be presented to the West Side Main Street board to see what issues are common among businesses in the area.

"I think it would be such a relief off everybody's shoulder," said Claire Barth, who is on the

economic restructuring committee. "It would be beneficial for everything we do."

The promotion committee plans to expand and continue various West Side events and take on new projects, including developing a West Side newsletter and creating a promotional video using funds already budgeted for that purpose.

Finally, the organization committee will continue to examine fundraising, policy development, volunteer recruitment and other aspects of the West Side Main Street organization. It will also continue to oversee the organization's website.

Johnson updated board members on the West Side Community Garden and West Side

Farmer's Market.

She said West Side Main Street is working to increase participation and products for each of those organizations. She also said she is looking into the possibility of applying to receive an AmeriCorps VISTA volunteer to oversee some aspects of the programs.

"We have this really great local food economy going on, on the West Side, but nobody is really administering it all," she said.

Also, the 2013 annual meeting will be 5 to 7 p.m. Dec. 12. The organization's annual report will be presented at that meeting.
