Armed Forces Seek Jewish Chaplains

NEW YORK-A nation-wide campaign to recruit additional Jewish chaplains urgently needed all branches of the armed forces was launched this week by the Division of Religious Activities of the National Jewish Welfare Board at an emergency meeting held at JWB national offices

Acting in immediate response to requests from the Army, Navy and Air Forces, the JWB Division of Religious Activities, representing the Conservative, Orthodox and Reform wings of the rabbinate, has undertaken an intensive effort to procure the additional chaplains from among the various branches of the American rabbinate.

In announcing the recruiting campaign, Dr. Solomon B. Freehof, chairman of the division, said the national rabbinical organizations, working through the Divi-sion of Religious Activities of the National Jewish Welfare Board, National Jewish Welfare Board, will go all-out to make sure that the religious needs of the Jewish personnel in the armed forces are met adequately. The American Jewish community is anxious and ready to do everything within its power to aid our government to combat and overthrow those world forces which are seeking to des-troy the democratic way of life."

The meeting of the Division of Religious Activities that launched the recruiting drive was attended by rabbis from all parts of the country representing the three major rabbinical associations— Central Conference of American Rabbis, Rabbinical Assembly of America and Rabbinical Council of America-as well as the Association of Jewish Chaplains in the Armed Forces. In World War II the Division of Religious Activities recruited 311 Jewish chaplains for the armed forces

He was a slight man, and his lead for the Miriam Hospital Association. The members will have to adjust their aims to a hospital thrice the size of the old one, and to opportunities for service never dreamed of before. They will also have to insist on getting greater responsibilities in the affairs the hospital, and be prepared to shoulder these responsibilities.

What does all this mean?

It means that more and more people will have the chance to become bigger than themselves, by extending themselves into a com munity project that will serve the sick of our own days, and of days to come.

You can be bigger than you are today, by extending your-self into the tomorrow.

Last week I sat around a conference table at the Jewish Com-munity Center on Benefit Street Half a dozen young people (I am not including myself, who repre-sented those who are over thirty-nine) were considering the blueprints for Center activities during the coming season. Granted that half of these projects will never go further than the blue-print stage, there still remains a goodly number of items that will add to the growth of many a personality, and enrich many a life culturally and socially before the season is over. This conference, and others to follow, will result in a colorful program of youth and adult activities on a community-wide basis. The program is so varied that it will appeal to as many tastes and interests as there are to be ex-pected in a community. The program, to be effective, will have to utilize the talents of a great many of us.

Here, too, you can be bigger than yourself by extending your talents and capacities in the service of the Center.

We are now on the threshold of a New Year. Rosh Hashanah was never meant to be a time for resolutions. I shall therefore refrain from urging you to make a resolution. But Rosh Hashanah is a time for meditation. So when you meditate on this first day of the new year in the Jewish calendar, turn this phrase over in your mind, and see what meaning it may have for you.

Armed Forces Seek Jewish Chaplains

NEW YORK-A nation-wide campaign to recruit additional Jewish chaplains urgently needed by all branches of the armed forces was launched this week by the Division of Religious Activities of the National Jewish Welfare Board at an emergency meeting held at JWB national offices.

Acting in immediate response to requests from the Army, Navy and Air Forces, the JWB Division of Religious Activities, representing the Conservative, Orthodox and Reform wings of the rabbinate, has undertaken an intensive effort to procure the additional chaplains from among the various branches of the American rabbi-

In announcing the recruiting campaign, Dr. Solomon B. Freehof, chairman of the division, said 'the national rabbinical organizations, working through the Divi-sion of Religious Activities of the National Jewish Welfare Board, will go all-out to make sure that the religious needs of the Jewish personnel in the armed forces are met adequately. The American Jewish community is anxious and ready to do everything within its power to aid our government to combat and overthrow those world forces which are seeking to des-troy the democratic way of life."

The meeting of the Division of Religious Activities that launched the recruiting drive was attended by rabbis from all parts of the country representing the three major rabbinical associations— Central Conference of American Rabbis, Rabbinical Assembly of America and Rabbinical Council of America—as well as the Associa-tion of Jewish Chaplains in the Armed Forces. In World War II the Division of Religious Activities recruited 311 Jewish chaplains for the armed forces.

Use of Private Cars To Be Restricted

Making of A Rabbi

By AL SEGAL

Now, how does a rabbi get that way? Here's young Mortimer Zilch, a regular boy in a world in which regular boys turn out to be crack salesmen, doctors, lawyers, or, as in the case of our well-known Mr. Hillel, president of a massive widget corporation.

Mortimer's parents are troubled as to what to make of him. His father says a bright boy like Mor-timer should be a lawyer. By personal experience of lawyers Mortimer's father thinks he knows how prosperous lawyers are: anyway, the lawyers to whom he pays fees

Mortimer's mother says No, she'd rather have him be a Doc-tor. She learned to love doctors Mortimer's mother the time she was so sick; the way they were so nice and helpful.

In his earlier life Mortimer himself said he'd like to be a ballplayer like Lou Gehrig or Christy Ma-thewson of whom he knew from the classic history of baseball.

Then, on his 18th birthday—the legal age of stepping into man-hood—Mortimer confided to his parents the career on which his mind had settled. They were all "Well, Mortimer, have you made up your mind yet?"

"Yes, but maybe you won't like it."

came into my head was when I saw our temple burn. I can remember having an uncontrollable anger and then sorrow at the condition civilization had degenerated to. The constant beatings administered by the little Nazi bullies did not help matters.

From an American boy: father has devoted his life to help others and I try to emulate him My parents exemplify all that I can possibly strive to attain."

Some answers to the question as to what was the deciding factor that finally brought an applicant to seek the rabbinate

"Shortly after graduating from high school, two of my best friends killed Their death stimulated a spiritual yearning in me. Recently I have had a tragedy in my own life. I know that only by turning to God can we obtain the strength to meet our problems."

Another answer to the same uestion: "Mr.—told me that some form of social work, which I had expressed a desire to enter, was probably what I would be the most happy in. Then the idea struck me that I would be able to combine my talents best in the rabbinical field.'

Some answers to the question as to what impacts of religion caused applicants to make up their minds toward the rabbinate:

"It was Yom Kippur and I was in the Navy and it was impossible for me to get shore leave and go to a house of prayer. I felt I just had to pray that day and so I awoke an hour before reveille and climbed to the highest gun mounting on the ship and there I took out my little prayer book and prayed. But the prayer book was not adequate: I was soon ad-lib-bing my prayers, reciting all the things I wanted the world to be when I got home . . . The signifi-cant thing about this incident was that it was not just me reciting prayers which had been written for me, but I was praying what I felt and thought . . I had moved a step closer to an intelligent religious feeling."

Another answer to the same question: "It was during my Army career that I found out that American Jewish youth is badly equipped to go out and meet the world. I attribute that to inadequate Jewish homelife, their Jewish education had been sadly neglected, their parents were just not interested in letting their children know of their heritage

And what makes a boy think he's

cut out to be a rabbi?
One answer: "I consider that my outstanding characteristics are my patience and my desire to work with people."

Another answer: "The most im-

portant thing of my experience has been the feeling of humility that comes with the realization of how little one knows

And the best of the answers to the question, why do you want to be a rabbi: "I have discovered in myself the desire to practice in myself the desire to practice social justice, to aid in the accomplishment of a Godly world. Finally I have discovered I might accomplish it only through the rabbinate."

Psychology and the Bible

I suppose that most of us would tend to characterize this age above all others as the atomic age, and yet I wonder if that is its real significance. I have a feeling that perhaps the historian looking backward may say that its most significant aspects were its innovations in psychology.

Psychology has bred a revolu-tion in our whole concept of crime and with respect to disease

The doctor tends more and more today not to ask you to stick out your tongue but instead he tells you to lie down on the couch and keep your tongue going, telling him the story of your childhood. In our jails and courthouses, psychiatrists are becoming increas-ingly more conspicuous. We tend ingly more conspicuous. We tenu to regard crime as a kind of sick-ness and sickness as being something else than sickness. Ulcers and even arthritis and what not, we are told are often psychosoma-tic. If the trend keeps up, who knows, but that we may do away with juries and judges altogether and lawyers and habeas corpuses may become as extinct as the dodo and the dinosaur. Our court-houses will become hospitals and our hospitals a kind of court-house for talks between the pa-

then and the doctor.

There have, of course, been glimpses of the same ideas in the past ages in the Takmud, Resh Lakish is quoted as saying that there is a bit of madness in every crime and one of the ancient Jew-ish sages went so far as to say the commandment. shalt not covet, was more important than the other command-ments together. This is tantamount to putting our emotional relationships above all other

things.

If we study the Bible, I think, we will find many of the stories strongly corroborating the psychiatrists' point of view. Take the theme of the rejected child, or the child discriminated against, about which the psychologists talk so much

Isn't that the point of the story of Joseph and his brethren? seph was the favored child of his father, Jacob. The Bible tells us that Jacob loved Joseph above his other children, because he was the child of his old age, he was baby; but indirectly the Bible story recounts other reasons, too. Remember, Joseph and Benjamin are both the children of Rachel, the favorite wife of Jacob.

Poor Leah. She knew she had been put over on Jacob. When she had her first son, she called him Reuben, for that means, "See son," that is to say, that the Lord hath (Continued on next Page)

Jews In The Russian Zone

In addition to the 3,000 Jews in the Russian sector of Berlin, there are a further 1,200 living in the various larger cities of the German Democratic Republic, as the newly established East German State is now called. They are dispersed in the various "Lander" or provinces, the largest number being in the Province of Sachsen, with a Jewish community of about 300 souls in Leipzig. Next in size is the community in Erfurt, 250, and the third is that in Dresden, with about 200. The smallest community is that of Chemnitz, numbering 50.

While contact with the Jews living in the Eastern sector of Berlin is free and unrestricted, those in other parts of the Republic are not very easily accessible. Only occasionally are they visited by Jews from Berlin: and whenever a Jew from Leipzig, or any other city in the East, wants to visit Berlin, he must have a special permit, and to get this he must produce a sound reason to support his application. Not infrequently, Jews from Eastern Germany are allowed to visit Berlin for a wedding ceremony or a "brit milah." Occasionally, but only occasionally, a rabbi from Berlin is granted permission to visit communities in the East. The Jewish community in Leipzig is the only one to boast a Shochet and kosher meat from Leipzig is supplied to a number of other communities, but there is no rabbi and no Jewish school, for the simple reason that there are very few youngsters willing to attend one. Most of the young people have already left, some for Israel, while others are (Continued on next Page)

studying in the Western sector of Berlin and preparing to emigrate to Israel as soon as they finish their studies. The few young Jews who still remain are members of the dominant Communist Party and exhibit all the signs of assimilation.

Religious services are held regularly on Saturdays in most of the communities. They have, however, to rely on Jews in the West for the supply of prayer books.

I was not myself able to visit the Jewish communities in the Russian Zone, beyond that of the Eastern sector of Berlin, which forms an integral part of the Jewish community of Berlin. But from talks I had with the Jews in the Eastern sector and others who have visited Eastern Germany on several occasions, some of them as late as last April, I was able to establish that on the whole the Jew is treated on an equal basis with the Germans and there is no discrimination whatever. Yet, it is this otherwise commen-dable policy of treating the Jew on the same footing as the Germans that makes his existence there precarious. The Jew is not only treated as a German, he is asked to consider himself a German. He is asked, in effect, to forego his Jewish identity and, what is no less unbearable, to forget what the Germans did to the Jews under Hitler. When a Jewish leader complained to a Russian about this policy, the reply, I was told, was that if the Russians could bring themselves to be friends with the Germans, why not the Jews?

It is evident that in an atmosphere of this kind only those sworn to follow the prescribed Moscov line can accommodate themselves. Small wonder that most of the Jews in the Eastern sector talk of emigration.

Economically, too, the Jewish position is not a very happy one. Although theoretically they are allowed to follow any trade they like, in practice this is not the case and in the prevailing circum-stances there are only a few spheres in which they can earn a living. A number own retail shops, but no Jew owns any lar-ger business enterprise; these are all in the hands of the State or of the Co-operatives. Few Jews have so far recovered their pre-war property and although when the administration was still in Soviet hands the policy was a liberal one as far as restitution went, not a single Jew has been able to recover a factory or workshop. But even if they are willing to overlook these economic difficulties, the Jews find it impossible—or at least the majority of them do-to treat the Germans as comrades. What is more, the Germans themselves, despite all the talk of brotherhood and peace, appear to be no less anti-Semitic in the Eastern part than in the Western. It is true that any manifestation of anti-Semitism is rare, the Ger-mans in the East being well aware that any display of anti-Jewish feeling would bring more immediate and more drastic action than is the case in the West. But anti-Semitism, I was told by many who have visited the Eastern Zone, is, nevertheless, ess, strong and wide-While I was in Berlin, spread. While I was in Berlin, the Jewish cemetery in the Eastern sector was desecrated by a group of young Germans. Nor was this the first desecration, Several similar incidents had taken place ear-lier, but were not reported in the ss. The authorities, un (Continued on next Page) unlike

(Continued from last Page) those in the West, took immediate and firm action to discover and arrest the perpetrators of this shameful act and they even made it possible for a representative Jew to speak to several of the arrested German youths in prison. This action contrasts favorably with the leniency shown to kin-dred criminals in the West. Nevertheless, the atmosphere in the Eastern Zone cannot be con-sidered favorable so far as Jewish national and religious aspirations and traditions are concerned.

Most of the Jews in Eastern Germany are opposed to assimilation and to them the new con-ditions in which they have to live are more of a hardship than a blessing. It is only natural, therefore, that they should pin their hopes on the possibility of emigration.

There is, however, a considerable number of Jews who have accommodated themselves, some because of their ideological convictions, others because they have no alternative. For these, life in the Eastern Zone has brought changes for the better. Some of them today occupy high positions in the Government and Administration, positions which no Jew had ever before held in Germany and which, despite all talk of democracy and equality, they cannot even today hold in Western Germany. Several Jews hold im-portant posts in the ministries of Information, Industry and Justice. The Supreme Judge in the Eastern sector of Berlin is a Jew and so are several senior judges in the provinces outside Berlin. In the press, too, as well as in the theatre, quite a considerable number of Jews have been given responsible positions, but all these are people who have accepted the Communist Party program and are willing to forego national interests for those of the Party.

Relations between the Jews in the Eastern sector of Berlin and those in the Western sector are good and cooperative, but for how long, no one can tell. If the in-ternational situation becomes worse and friction between East and West more acute, the unity existing within the Jewish community of Berlin, too, is likely to MR. and MRS. The Community-Centered Jewish Center

By HERMAN L. SAINER

In this thoughtful article, Mr. Sainer, Midwest Section field serretary of the National Jewish Welfare Board, outlines a suggested
program for cooperative working
relationships between Jewish Community Centers, Synagogues, Jewish Schools and other Jewish
community agencies...

THE EDITOR

As an instrument of communitywide service, the Jewish Community Center recognizes that its work creates opportunities for cooperation with other agencies and organizations interested in Jewish programming and progress. This necessitates clarification of function. But who is there to provide the necessary communal understanding, without doing harm to the Center's self-respect and its potential for maximum service?

Where do we find the communal power which may rightfully aspire to define proper function for institutions with similar aims, comparable elements of program, and often in seeming pursuit of the active interest of the same indi-

active interest of the same individuals and groups?

Moreover, problems sometimes
arise when planning is confused
with operation and the central
planning body tries to become an
operator of the Jewish Center or
seeks to exercise close supervision
over its affairs. Such practice generally defeats the purpose of
democratic community planning
and organization, since it delimits
autonomy, freedom of development and exercise of indigenous
leadership.

The membership character of the Center, the fact that the management derives its authority from the membership, the policy of self-support, emphasis on demo-cratic procedures in program development, are all distinctive factors in the nature of the Center that must be safeguarded against the control of a coordinating or community planning body.

Looks to Central Body

The Center looks for a community body whose experience is comprehensive and whose purposes are basically coordinative, and it finds in most communities a more or less effective federation or welfare fund or community council in whom some social planning responsibilities have already been lodged. To such a central body the Center has in fact a dual relationship. On the one hand, it turns to Federation for guidance in relating its activities to the work of other agencies in the community, and on the other for deficit financing. Since Jewish Centers are dependent on community funds for a substantial part of their operating income, their relation to the fund-distributing body is far fom tenuous.

In this context of Jewish community organization, the Center's function is one of widely accepted special competence, which may be characterized as essentially Jewish, dealing with normal people rather than with those who require special care for one sort of handicap or another, doing a job with and through other institutions, and cutting across many lines of group segmentation. It is the home and an important educational arm of the organized community.

Out of all this, certain questions emerge. Does the Federation have the right, as the social planner, to give approval to the Center as the agency most competent to do effective work in its area of func-(Continued on next Page)

tion? A dramatic illustration of this relationship is the recent al-location, by the Jewish Federation of Chicago, of funds for additional professional workers on the staff of the Jewish Community Centers to supervise leisure-time programs in several synagogue facilities, presumably on the ground that the Center was most competent to provide professional guidance for such activities in whatever suitable facilities might be avail-able. Community needs are met in this way with a minimum outlay of capital funds.

As a functional agency, the Center knows that the Federation as the central financing body, must inevitably be the central budgeting body and, logically, the central planning body. As such the Federation should have a truly democratic structure with representations. democratic structure, with repre-sentation from and the support of every responsible section of the community. It is the business of the Center, and of every agency in town, to work hard at realizing such a democratic structure in the central group, in the interest of the community at large as well as in the interest of each agency's best services to the community.

This brings us to the problem of cultivating harmonious relationgogue, Center and Jewish School, at one in the sincere conviction that cultural and educational activities constitute the vital core of any Jewish communal program and deserve the finest leadership which the community may possess. Contribution of the Center ...

It is the unique contribution of the Jewish Center, rooted in the group work process and eager to enrich human personality and group association through the use of all its resources and skills, to bring the Synagogue and School the understanding that all three seek in common to provide a warm and friendly setting for activities which are not ends in themselves but rather the means for the debut rather the means for the quevelopment of personality and close identification with the culture of the Jewish people, as well as the integration of the Jewish group integration of the Jewish group integration. to the pattern of American life.

In social, recreational, educational and cultural activities, all three institutions reach out for the interest and participation of members of the same community. Co-operation and coordination would then seem highly desirable, with the agencies concerned to be in-

volved in the planning.

Small but exciting beginnings have been made toward the living concept that each individual and group in the community is entitled to assistance from every resource in the community which can be helpful. Generally speaking, it is now recognized that each institution has special competence in certain areas—the Center in the sound application of the group work method in leisure-time activities, the Synagogue in spiritual and religious matters, and the Jewish School in formal educational activities.

To say this is not to imply that every sort of duplication of overlapping is ipso facto an evil thing, or that each institution may properly declaim its own special ver-sion of 'fifty-four forty or fight' The fact of the matter is that each has come to appreciate, in a spirit of mutual acceptance — by no means universal, but heartening in its frequency — the substance (Continued on next Page)

which the others can give to the enhancement of individual and

group living.

The times in which we live com-pel a high index of Jewish group awareness and a growing concern with Jewish education, coupled with an increased willingness to support it. Significant progress can be reported in the relation-ships between Jewish Center and Jewish educational agencies.

No doubt the Statement on

Common Objectives and Areas of Cooperation, adopted by the American Association of Jewish Center Workers and the National Council for Jewish Education, has served for the past three years to encourage local cooperative ventures.

Continuous cooperation has meant continuous exploration by a joint committee of the possibilities for reaching the objectives of Jewish education for all age groups which Center and Jewish Education have in common — through formal and informal program, home and country camping, youth and adult education, re-search, well-trained personnel.

Certainly there are many pro-blems still to be resolved. Both recognize the basic character of Jewish education for children, yet little has been done to work out reasonable and mutually satisfactory answers to questions around available time for children to participate in Center program and Hebrew School classes. Nor have the Jewish educator's reser-vations about the Jewish qualifications of Center personnel helped to make working relationships easier. After all, the focus of both "is on the Jewish child and his depersonality. Fragmentizing the services for his adjustment leads to confusion and disunity in his understandings and feelings as a Jew." A unified approach is in the best interest of all concerned.

Integrate the Programs

If the recreational character of Jewish group activities gives them a particular appeal to children, and gives rise to the fear that such appeal may detract from attendance at formal Jewish classes. then let the programs be integrated. This would make it possible for Jewish children to avail themselves of both services, and formal Jewish education could share the attractive qualities inherent in recreational activities.

What is leisure time, and what essential time, in the contemplation of the Center worker and the Jewish educator? Only by putting their heads together can the answer be found, provided that both understand that neither Jewthat ish education nor Center program is coextensive with Jewish lifeand that in the last analysis lei-sure time, too, is essential time.

Many instances of cooperation can be cited. The results have been encouraging, though the pit-falls of tradition and vested in-terest are still apparent. What seems clear is that we have reached, at least in professional circles, ed, at least in professional circles, a plane of understanding with respect to a community function. There is a strong body of opinion that Jewish education will be either communal or not at all, and that this is a crucial point in any discussion of Jewish education.

We are immersed in a cooperative process, connoting a common sincerity about the integrity of the values of Jewish education.

Perhaps together we shall be able to formulate effective plans for keeping the child within the cooperative undertaking and the educational process over a much longer span of years than is now the case. Would it be too bold to

suggest that we might often evaluate the Hebrew School curriculum and the Jewish Center program together so that the Jewish child receives maximum benefits from both, in his development as a both, in his development as (Continued on next Page)

well-rounded person.

I like the plain words of an agreement made early this year between the Jewish Community Centers and Board of Jewish Education of Chicago, with respect to nursery school operations in that city: "The Board of Jewish Education is to act as a resource agency on Jewish content for the nurseries sponsored and supervised by the Jewish Community Centers.

On the other hand, the Jewish Community Centers will act as a resource agency on group work and nursery techniques in relation to the nurseries supervised by the Board of Jewish Education." It was further agreed, to meet again in about two months to review the progress made.

view the progress made.

In the most recent public discussion on the Synagogue and the Center, during the JWB biennial conference in May 1950, expression was given by lay and professional leaders to the progress which has been made in working relationships between the two institutions in several communities. At the same time, it was recognized that hard work and abiding patience will be required for many years, before a deep sense of partnership is achieved between them in the service of the Jewish community.

in the service of the Jewish community.

While confusion and a deepseated feeling of rivalry may be found in many situations where Synagogue and Center try to expand their sometimes overlapping programs, it is also true that the list of happily developing relationships has already become impressive.

Unifying Influence

The best generalization which may be made at this time is that we tend to emphasize the unifying influence of the Jewish Center as the community resource for leisure-time activities, and the obvious division of Jewish religious affiliation among orthodox, conservative and reform congregations, against a background of insistence that religious experience through the Synagogue is at the heart of Jewish group survival.

It is of paramount importance to state that Center and Synagogue do not disagree about the fundamental character of religious values in Jewish life; the falling out comes from rabbinical insistence on the primacy of the Synagogue, as if nothing is validly Jewish which does not spring from the Synagogue or have its being in it. The fact is that the Synagogue and the rabbi are not endowed with exclusive rights and privileges pertaining to every aspect of human concern in the Jewish community.

The further fact is that there

The further fact is that there is absolutely no foundation, in theory or in practice, for rabbinical assertions, made pleasantly or in anger, that the Center dares to equate itself with the community as a whole. The Center simply regards itself as an agency of the community, engaged in the use of group work method and skills to foster informal Jewish educational activity. Could we not all hearken to the late Rabbi Liebman, who said two years ago:

"I believe that the majority of

"I believe that the majority of us must and will recognize that there are so many forms of Jewish life in the country that no return is possible to monopoly on the part of the Synagogue. Pluralism is the reality! At the same

Continued from last Page ne I believe that the functions of the Synagogue are primary for

a Jewish philosophy of life, for our Jewish morale, for Jewish survival I am also aware of the impertant and significant role that the Jewish Centers have played and will continue to play in the American Jewish scene."

A joint consultative committee the Synagogue Council and the JWB has been trying to get at difficulties on the na level as "a clearing and cooperating agency between the Synagogue and the Center." This is an im-portant first step. Especially heartening is the open recognition of obstacles to be overcome

To know each other the Syna-gogue and Center must work together on their mutual problems. strengthening each other as they inevitably must if suspicion and an exaggerated sense of competition are cast aside. Working together has meant, and must continue to mean intensification of Jewish inherest and identification for Cen-ter membership and staff, and deeper understanding of Center principles among congregational leaders and rabbis. The same holds true, of course, for boards and staff in Jewish education.

It might help to recall a resolution adopted by the Council of Young Men's Hebrew and Kindred Associations at its triennial con-vention in New York in October, 1920, 30 years ago:

10, 30 years ago: WHEREAS, It has been the policy always of the constituent urganizations of the Council to cooperate with local synagogues wherever and whenever possible; BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Managers be urged to communicate with the Central Conference of American Rabbis, the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, the United Synagague of America, the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations, such other bodies as the Board of Managers may see fit, with reference to establishing a co-operation between the constituent synagogue and rabbinic mem-berships of these organizations, to the end that the synagogue might ed for extension work of the Y.M.H.A.'s and that in turn the and the synagogues might have the advantage of using the

Y.M.H.A.'s for extension of reli-gious activity." I believe there can be no pat formula for drawing functional boundary lines between Synagogue and Center. The easing of this exing problem must be sought, as Janowsky puts it. "in functional cooperation rather than in juris-dictional accommodations." All of us cherish the sense of tradition and communal leadership of the Synagogue through the ages. Yet in working together today we owe due deference to change and to the reality of the situation, in our common concern for sound community organization.

Notable efforts have already been made to master the problems of the day to day relationships, through joint operation by Cen-ter and Synagogue of a cultural and recreational program, and by use of synagogue facilities on a rental basis under the program supervision of the Center. Where mutual understanding is achieved, joint operation rather than a landlord-tenant arrangement is preferred. In any case, fuller participation of the community has en achieved in the examination ways and means to intensify

legiance need not necessarily be given by all men to any single in-stitution in the Jewish or in the general community.

In relationships between Jewish Center and local affiliates of Jew-ish youth organizations we have hammered out a modus vivendi in those communities where agreement has been reached on the basic tenet that the Center is the focus of Jewish communal work in recreation and informal educa-tion. Local implementation has been uneven throughout the coun-try, stemming from differing degrees of recognition of central functioning of the Center and different relationships to community planning.

Arrangements have been made with AZA, for example, with res-pect to membership of their affi-liated individuals and groups in the Center and supervision of AZA leaders by Center staff, without disturbing the special aspects of the local unit's program. Genuine effort is being made nationally as well as locally to integrate na-tional youth programs of the Center

Youth councils have also helped to bring these young people and their clubs closer to the general work of the Center, but they are turning in ever increasing numbers to trained Center personnel bers to trained Center personner for assistance in program plan-ning. Last year, the JWB issued a helpful guide in this area of relationships, on the basis of con-sultations with leaders of national youth groups describing in general youth groups, describing in general terms the range of services which the Center can offer these groups as well as the avenues of the participation in community youth and young adult councils.

Unmistakable Trend

The overall trend toward cooperation is unmistakable, even if the road to complete unity still appears to be thorny. The major task in this area involves the patient application of good process in interpreting the community role of the Center to representa-tives of national organizations so that they may understand the Center's position of respect for their autonomy and its earnest wish to make available its phy-sical facilities and the skills of its staff to enhance the program of each of these organizations.

In working together toward common objectives, mutual confi-dence and respect among the agencies generally concerned with Jewish cultural activities in the community pre-suppose the avail-ability of personnel with adequate professional qualifications and Jewish orientation, and of the best kind of lay leadership in the cul-tural realm where it belongs.

Many external factors are inwhat will happen to the Jewish people in this country and else-where, some of them quite beyond its control and others of an in-ternal nature—the advance or retreat of the democratic spirit and process, the ethos in which inter-national relations are carried on, the march of economic stability or the march of economic stability or its decline, the mounting or ebb-ing of anti-semitism, our appre-ciation of the irreparable loss we suffered in the distintegration of European Jewry, the spirit-lifting story of Israel, the character of our own Jewish leadership, the adequacy of our educational pro-gress, the development of our reli-gious and cultural interests. gious and cultural interests.

If we have faith in ourselves and

in our institutions, if we plan and our work together for the attainment of happiness and security in the groups, we may venture to hope that the American Jewish com-munity will grow and prosper under the warming influence of forces which we have built for shaping Jewish life as a whole. How tragic it would be for the

On Giving Away Money

Everybody likes to give away money. Isn't it more blessed to give than to receive? Think how blessed the banks must be. Money is the root of all evil. Who steals my purse, steals trash, said Shakespeare. You can't take it with you, says Broadway. Yes, money is a foul thing. Everybody is just delighted to give it away.

Yet I see in the papers that Samuel S. Fels died in Philadelphia recently and the newspapers say that during his lifetime, Sam Fels gave away no less than forty million dollars. That's a lot of

One might expect that a man who had given so much would be well-known but the fact is the name of Samuel Fels was not much tooted during his life time. 'He who gives in secret is greater even than Moses himself," said the sages of the Talmud and apparently Samuel Fels was one of this category, for many of his gifts were made with the proviso that his name was not to be mentioned in connection with the gift.

Better known was his brother. Joseph Fels, who also gave away many millions. If Joseph Fels was better known, it was not because he craved publicity more than his brother. It was simply that in his point of view and perhaps in his personality, he was more exotically challenging. A little man, standing not more than five feet, he was very human. "I can give away one hundred thousand dollars with one hand," he once said, "and with the other squeeze a man for five cents."

Samuel Fels gave a great deal of his money for scientific research and Joseph Fels, too, didn't give exactly for what we call charity. He gave, as he liked to say, to destroy charity. He gave his money largely for furtherance of the single tax movement. He thought that once the ideas of Henry George were carried into effect, poverty and unemployment would be as outdated as smallpox and there would be no need of charity.

It seems to me there was something essentially Jewish in this concept of Joseph Fels. The Jewish word for charity is Zedakah which means something more than charity. Zedakah means righteousness. justice. It does not mean, as charity implies, the giving of favors.

The future, it seems to me, must be in this direction. To Joseph Fels, land monopoly was the great social curse, the germ that caused the black plagues of poverty and unemployment. In new countries, where land is easily available, there is no unemployment and little real poverty. Once you forced idle land into use by the single tax, he (Continued on Next Page)

Continued from Last Page) thought, every country would in this respect, be a new country. this respect, be a new country. Land would be cheap for housing, rents would be cheaper, there would be no tenant farmers, no sharecroppers, no reservoir of the unemployed beating down the wage scale of labor in general. It is interesting to note that the great Jewish economist, Frank Oppenheimer, reached virtually the same conclusions in economics as did Henry George.

If Joseph Fels thought the ba-

sis of his swollen fortune was a remedial defect in the economic system, it is interesting to note that another great Jewish multimillionaire, Julius Rosenwald, be-lieved that great fortunes were the result largely of luck. He liked to tell the story of the man who said he had won twenty-five thousand dollars in a lottery by Asked to using his brains. explain, he said, "It was like this: one night in a dream, I saw the number 9 and the next night I had a dream and I saw the number 6, so I used my brains, added the two numbers and bet on 14."

For the most part, most of the great American Jewish fortunes have gone to other than Jewish purposes. The Rosenwald for-tune went largely for the advancement of the Negro. The Gug-genheim wealth sponsors acade-

mic fellowships and art. The Jewish Croesuses seldom been favorably disposed to Zionism. Julius Rosenwald was a farm friend of Schmaryahu Levin, but the latter could never induce Rosenwald to give for Palestine, save for one or two privileged institutions, such as the Hebrew Technion. When Herzl beseeched Baron de Hirsch, When as the latter was about to launch a Jewish colonization movement to support colonization in Argen-tina, the latter remained obdurate. As Rosenwald gave millions for Russian Jewish colonization, so Baron de Hirsch gave millions for Jewish colonization in Argen-Russia and Argentina tina. seemed better bets to these multimillionaires than the rocks of Palestine.

It probably could not have been otherwise. The man of very great wealth is apt to take a too practical point of view. He is not the one to take too many chances. I think in the story of industrial development, the same story is true. It is rare that the man of enormous fortunes is a pioneer even in industry. The less wealthy must do the preliminary work. Then the DuPonts come along.

The treatment is identical with that of the armed services during the recent world fracas. This move is being made on direct orders from General Douglas Mac-Arthur.

The pulse of musical life in Europe and in Israel was explained to us this week by Jascha Heifetz and Mischa Elman. The noted violinists are back from overseas tours — Heifetz having just returned from a trip to Israel, and Elman having recently completed a three-month tour of Europe.

Heifetz found widespread interest in music in Israel. He also saw an opportunity for U. S. talent in the Holy Land, not only for the big name artists, but also for lesser talent.

Contemporary Israeli music, he said, shares "the tendency of all modern music to try not to sound too much like music. This is a characteristic of youth and of beginnings. Many composers start that way before they realize that music must have an immediate appeal."

Elman took no American modern music with him on his European trip. American composers, he said, are good arrangers and orchestrators, but they're not very imaginative or creative.

"They try to write music in the spirit of our machine age," he said. "Music is the only art that has to be untouched by the machine age we live in."

Mischa sees a definite renaissance of the romantic age in music, as in art. "The public wants beauty, not distortions and dissonances," he said.

Eddie Cantor, when he visited Israel early this summer, found that some of his old Goldwyn pictures had been revived. At an Israeli state function several days later, one of the government officials, who had just seen one of the films commiscrated:

TOP-PICKS

Ben Gurion on the "Exiles"

The recent major policy speech by Premier David Ben Gurion to the envoys of Israel on the sub-ject of the "In-Gathering of the Exiles" was almost of revolu-tionary significance, both for Is-rael and for the Jews outside it. It marked a reversal of the Israel Government not only on a political question, but on an ideological principle. The Premier told his audience of Israel envoys, gathered in Jerusalem, that the "In-Ga-thering of the Exiles" theory was "complete nonsense" and that Israel messengers abroad should cease sowing panic among Americans, British and Latin-American Jews by warnings that they are fated to undergo the same ex-perience as did the Jews of Europe under Nazism unless they settle "en-masse" in Israel. He advanced a new and ingenious division of the Jews of the Diaspora into those in "Galut" (exile) and those in "Tvutsa" (disper-sion). The "Galut" consists of the Arab and Moslem countries from Persia to North Africa where Jews have no future and have to be saved in Israel. The "Tvutsa" is composed of the United States, Britain, the Dominions and Latin-American countries where Jews enjoy freedom and equal rights and are not in exile and thus are exempted from the nationalistic commandment to settle in Israel. They should remain where they are and help Israel financially and economically to become a strong

Ben Gurion, who formerly was one of the chief exponents of the nationalistic upsurge in Israel, has completely reversed himself and has openly adopted the thesis advanced by the American Zionists at the recent Chicago convention. Thus the American Zionist opposition has won a complete victory. If, as it is assumed, Ben Gurion's speech is not but an expedient maneuver forced upon him by a critical situation, to be changed again when the danger is over, then it marks a landmark in post-war Jewish history.

"With These Hands"

Sam Levene plays the part of an idealistic cloakmaker who fought the terrible exploitation. helplessness and disease of the sweat-shops in the early part of this century in the U.S. He tells the story of his life and struggles to raise his trade from the posi-tion of semi-slavery to its present dignified and secure state. Scriptwriter Morton Wishengrad catches writer Morton Wishengrad catches the spirit of the period and the unique idealism of the early pio-neers of the Jewish labor move-ment which was not limited to economic goals only. It was this which has made the Jewish labor unions in America, and particu-larly the ILGWU unique among the American trade union move-ment and which constitutes their ment and which constitutes their special contribution to American civilization during the first half of this century.

Political Notes
The question of a successor to James G. McDonald as our ambassador to Israel is receiving much attention in Washington these days. There is a coterie in receiving the State Department that would like to see the portfolio handed to a career diplomat of pro-Arab orientation. However, informed Washington circles believe Bart-ley Crum is getting top consideration for the post. In fact it is no longer a secret he was consi-dered for the appointment soon after U. S. recognition of Israel. His friendship for Israel has been profound and consistent. Two brilliant young Jews whose names are frequently mentioned in connection with our global diplomatic efforts have been suggested for the post but official Washington con-siders it inadvisable to give the appointment to a Jew at this time

The Korean conflict has given the Arab states another card in their game against Israel and they intend using it at the September session of the U. N. Assembly. Arab League leaders now meeting in Alexandria are ostensibly discussing the Korean situation but actually they are mapping nui-sance strategy for the forthcoming Assembly meeting. Their game is to harass U. S. policy in the U. N. in the hope of being able to wring American concessions on the Jerusalem issue. They expect using the session as a spring-board for a diplomatic offensive against Israel. They will also endeavor to secure U.N. recognition of the Arab League as a Middle Eastern regional bloc . . . Current rumors that both President Weizmann and Premier Ben Gurion may come to the U.S. early this Fall are just rumors . . With Senator Lehman a certain can-With didate for reelection it does not seem likely that the Democratic Party in New York will run another Jew for high office. Party leaders however are said to favor Congressman Abraham J. Multer as running mate to their guberna-torial candidate

What few people know, or have forgotten, is that Bean is a Lithuanian-His parents came born Jew. the States during the great early 20th century wave of Jewish im-migration from Europe. They fled Russian pogroms in 1904 fled Russian pogroms in 1904 and settled in New Hampshire. Young Bean was then ten years old. Now economic advisor to the Department of Agriculture, Bean was first brought to that depart-ment by Henry Wallace when he was Secretary of Agriculture. Anti-Semitism and Art

The literary colony in Paris is eething with indignation over the ugly results of a literary contest. The French Ministry of Education, it seems offered a prize to young French dramatists. Among the contest participants was one Jean Lavagalle who authored an anti-Semitic play called "Next Year in Jerusalem." When it was dis-closed that Lavagalle's play was awarded the prize, there was an uproar in the literary and artistic circles of Paris, with debate rag-ing in press and cafes. The Ministry of Education came under heavy attack for accepting an anti-Semitic piece in the contest and for crowning Lavagalle's filthy play as a work of art.

Zionist Congress To Meet Dec. 20

JERUSALEM — The World Zionist Congress will take place December 20 in Jerusalem, Eliahu Dobkin announced this week at a press conference. He said that elections to the Congress had al-ready been held in a number of smaller countries.

Mr. Dobkin said that Zionist parties in the United States will not hold elections but will receive 120 seats as follows: General Zionists, 33; Hadassah, 33; Labor Zionists, 25; Mizrachi, 12; Hapoel Hamizrachi, 7; Hashomer Hat-zair-Mapam, 3, and Revisionists, 6.

The Jewish Agency official dis-closed that 450,000 Shekolim had already been sold in Israel, mak-ing Israel's the largest delegation to the Congress. Elections to the Congress will be held in the Jewish state at the end of October.

Capitol Spotlight

WASHINGTON Jewish congressman, Jacob Javits has been mentioned as a likely candidate for mayor of New York City. Washington circles consider it very possible that he may get the Republican - Liberal - Fusion nomination for the mayoralty made vacant by the appointment of William O'Dwyer as Ambassa dor to Mexico.

Javits' constituency, the upper West Side of Manhattan, includes Washington Heights and Columbia University. His best known constituent is Gen. Dwight Eisenhower. The area is predominantly Jewish and includes so many Ger-Jewish and includes so many Ger-man-Jewish refugees that it is sometimes called "The Fourth Reich." In 1946 Javits ousted Tammany Hall domination from his district which for years had been a Democratic stronghold. He has since compiled a record which might explain why he is being so widely discussed as a potential mayor of the world's greatest city.

His life has been a fulfillment of dreams of America which were envisioned in European ghettos. It was from such ghettos and with such dreams that his parents came to America.

Javits' father made pants on the lower East Side. His mother helped support the family by selling toys from a pushcart. Javits' introduction to politics came at an early age when his father rose from pants-maker to Tammany representative for three shabby tenement buildings. The senior Javits tended to custodial duties in the buildings as well as to the political orientation of all occu-pants over 21.

A prophetic comment on Javits' A prophetic comment on Javits' success is to be found under his picture in his high school year-book. The inscription says, "You can't tell from first appearances." His first job netted him \$75 a week as a printing ink salesman. Later, his older brother, Benjamin, turned over a bill-collecting business to him by 10.24 he become ness to him. In 1924 he became a clerk in his brother's law firm In 1927 he passed the bar and joined Benjamin in law practice in the firm of Javits & Javits. By 1940 Javits was known as a strong backer of the late Fiorello La-Guardia.

the general all the filters he could use. The grateful general made Javits a dollar-a-year man. By the time Javits was commissioned a major in the Chemical Warfare Service he was so well-known in Washington that five generals attended the induction ceremony. He rose to the grade of lieutenant colonel by the end of World War II and is at present a full colonel in the reserve.

Soon after Javits arrived in congress, old-line Republicans Congress. found that they had a heretic in their ranks. He came out in favor of O.P.A. and against the National Association of Manufacturers. When Republicans wanted to kill rent controls, Javits voted to re-tain strong controls. Administra-tion "Fair Deal" advocates have often said they could always count on him for an extra vote on any crucial issue. Javits' liberal lean-ings are such that he takes pains to list himself as a "Republican-Liberal.

By 1948 Javits' popularity was great enough for him to defeat Paul O'Dwyer, the ex-mayor's brother. O'Dwyer, with strong support, had attempted to win the twenty-first district.

Javits is known to be a fighter. When he found that German fiancees of American soldiers were getting, and abusing, pre-ferential treatment to girls from France and other countries, he decided to act

To insure an impartial arrangement, he proposed an amendment to an immigration bill. It was defeated by a vote of 100 to 1. Undaunted, Javits explained the situation to a number of Senators. He was vindicated by the Senate when a measure containing his recommendations was adopted in the final version of the bill.

Javits went to Europe in 1947

with three other Congressmen on

mission. fact-finding travels brought them to Warsaw Hoping to demonstrate American good-will they joined with peas-ants laboring to remove debris from the battered streets. Javits and his colleagues took up shovels and filled a whole truck with rubble.

Javits' mother was born in Pa-lestine—a fact which may be partly responsible for his vital interest in Zionism. Immediately after his election to Congress he went to Palestine, at his own expense, to study conditions there. He was later chosen to christen the S.S. Haifa, the first vessel to carry the fiag of the Israel-Amer-

Poland Liquidating Jewish Officials

moved from important public positions in Poland and will be replaced by Russian citizens, it is predicted in a report published here by the "Christian Science Monitor." The report says that the purge of Jewish officials is to be expected as a result of Marshal Konstantin Rokossovsky's becoming the chief of the Politburo in Poland.

Polish-born Rokossovsky ''is known for his anti-Semitic atti-tude," the paper says, adding that he also has the reputation of be-ing a "specialist in conducting purges."

The first high Jewish official to be removed was Jacob Berman who, from the very beginning of the present Polish government's existence, has been known as Mos-cow's liaison man, the Monitor reveals. Another prominent Jewish figure rumored as marked for demotion is Hilary Minc, Polish Minister of Commerce and Industry, the report says.

"The fact that Marshal Rokossovsky is known for his anti-Semitic attitude strengthens the belief that he has orders to make per sonnel changes that gradually will result in complete elimination of Jews from public affairs in Po-land," the article says.

"Marshal Rokossovsky himself is expected to take Berman's place as secretary of the Polish Communist Party. Jewish spokesmen say that dismissed Jews will go to Moscow, ostensibly for a visit as has often occurred before, but that this time they will not re-turn, and that they will not be allowed to leave the Soviet Union."

Continued from last Page of the state he has closely watched the development of diplomatic re-lations between the U.S. and Israel. He has strongly protested to Secretary of State Acheson whenever he felt Israel was get-ting devious treatment. Much of his time last winter was taken up with the Near Eastern arms race; his attempts to insure Israel a fair chance to buy arms are well-known.

A deep interest in Jewish life is indicated by his family life. He was married in 1947 to Marion Ann Borris of Detroit. They have a boy and a girl. The boy is named Joshua after the late Rabbi Joshua Loth Liebman. Javits also finds time to serve as a trustee of the Jewish Memorial Hospital and as an overseer of the Jewish Theological Seminary.

To Raise Money By Cemetery Sales

BUENOS AIRES to raise three million pesos-about \$300,000—through the sale of burial places to wealthy members of the Jewish community here was adopted by the General Assembly of the Ashkenazi Kehillah which is in sole control of Jewish community cemeteries.

One-third of the above sum will be allocated for Israel, another third will be spent on the con-struction of Jewish school buildstruction of Jewish school build-ings, while the remainder will be set aside for Jewish educational activities, including the training of Jewish youths for emigration to Israel. The General Assembly, which represents 40,000 Jewish families affiliated with the Ash-kenazi Kehillah in Buenos Aires, also decided to appoint a chief also decided to appoint a chief rabbi for the community.

Oppose Hysteria In WASHINGTON — Ambassador Fighting Subversion

NEW YORK-Officers of seven organizations, major Jewish combination with 15 other nationcombination with 15 other national organizations, this week condemned the McCarran, Mundt-Ferguson and Wood "Communist control" bills and urged House and Senate leaders to substitute legislation "in the spirit of the President's Aug. 8 message on national security."

In a statement signed by the

In a statement signed by the officers of 22 national organiza tions and issued by the National Civil Liberties Clearing House in Washington, the organizations said that the McCarran and related bills are "indiscriminately repressive measures, ostensibly written to meet the Communist threat to cur national security. but they will not do that job.
"They jeopardize the rights of

individuals and of organizations which not only are not subversive but are dedicated in principle and program to the fight against Communism.

Suggest Alternative

The organizational leaders called the internal security bills spon-sored by Senator Warren G. Magnuson and Representative Eman-uel Celler "more adequate to protect the country against security threats while maintaining con-formity to traditional American guarantees of individual freedom.

The statement signers said they are "conscious of the need for adequate internal security measures, united in- opposition to all totalitarian political movements and committed to the preservation of the democratic way of the atof the democratic way of life at home and abroad," but that they are "unalterably opposed" to sub-versive control bills which are "indiscriminately repressive."

Need Understanding
The McCarran, Mundt-Ferguson and Wood bills "represent a
hysterical approach to a serious national problem which can only be met through an understanding of the nature of the communist movement in this country and the faithful adherence to the basic principles of the Bill of Rights," the statement said, adding that "we most earnestly hope that the Congress will not endorse totalitarian methods to fight totalitarian dangers.

The N C R A C organizations which signed the statement were: American Jewish Committee, American Jewish Congress, Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith. Jewish Labor Committee, Jewish War Veterans of the U.S. A., Na-tional Community Relations Ad-visory Council, and Union of Am-erican Hebrew Congregations.

Federation Supported

Hospitals to Merge

PHILADELPHIA — The three general hospitals in the Federation of Jewish Charities—the Mount Sinai, Northern Liberties and Jewish—have agreed to merge their facilities to form the nucleus of a major medical center to be established on the Jewish Hospital grounds. Mount Sinai and Northern Liberties formally approved the plans at a board meeting while Jewish Hospital voted in favor of the idea if the other two hospitals fell in line.

The merger is the first step in the establishment of the center which basic plans call for the inclusion of four other Federation institutions—Philadelphia Psychiatric, Eagleville Sanatorium, Willow Crest for Convalescents and Community Health Center.

The center, for which an additional \$3,000,000 will be raised above the \$2,000,000 already earmarked by the Federation, would establish close liaison among all seven Federation institutions for research, medical education and the treatment of patients. None of the hospitals would be closed.



Catholics Honor Jewish Physician

Spanish Paper Says Jews Oppose Franco

NEW YORK—The allegation that opposition in the United States to the proposed American \$100,000,000 loan for Spain has been organized by U. S. Jews "to help Communism" is made in a long dispatch filed by the New York correspondent of El Diario York correspondent of El Diario Vasco, a leading newspaper in San Sebastian, the New York Times reports from Madrid.
"Statistics that naturally are not published," the dispatch said, "show that the majority of the

Communists and Communist sym-pathizers of the United States are

persons of Hebraic extraction, like the spies arrested for com-plicity with the great traitor, Dr. Fuchs, who gave to the Soviet the secrets of the atomic bomb." As an outstanding figure in opposi-tion to Spain, the dispatch cited "the Hebraic former Governor of York, Herbert Lehman.

This opposition is "captained," the article said, by "the implacable enemy of Spanish-American friendship, the New York Times." The article reported that the New York Times, in spite of this al-leged anti-Spanish stand, had published a Madrid dispatch reporting the efforts of young Spaniards to volunteer for service






