## Order of the Mound

THE Order of the Mound was established in 1917 by the faculty of Southwestern with its basis on the idea that scholastic achievement should receive some recognition. Each year, at the end of the first semester, the faculty elects to membership in the Order those seniors who have maintained an average grade of "B" in seventy-five hours of residence work.

When the society was first established the members were given permission to purchase the key of the Order. This practice was soon discontinued, and the only insignia of honor given the scholars was a purple and white ribbon. The Student Council of 1927-28 moved the presentation of a more permanent memento of achievement, and selected as a suitable award a key similar to the original Order of the Mound key. This practice was continued in 1928-29.

This year fourteen women and two men were elected to membership in the Order.

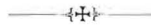

A NOTEWORTHY group of actors and actresses is the Campus Players organization. The successful dramatic productions of the players and that professional atmosphere which surrounds their activities makes Campus Players membership a supreme goal of achievement in the ambitions of many students.

Under the direction of Professor Helen Graham two plays are produced every year, one in the fall and one after May-day exercises. From the time of organization, 1919 until the present, a wide variety of play types have been produced, ranging from Shakespeare's "Macbeth" to Barrie's "Admirable Crichton". Among the most successful of recent plays are "A Bill of Divorcement", "The Rivals", and Lula Vollmer's "Sun-up". The play chosen for this May-day was Stephen Phillip's "Paola and Francesca".

Activities of the players are not limited to rehearsals and mere learning of lines. In addition, stage managing, property managing, advertising, and customing must be attended to. Besides the directing and coaching work, not a small part of Professor Graham's times is spent on making scenes styled to fit the atmosphere of each play. At all times emphasis is placed upon an impressionistic rather than a realistic effect.

To be eligible for Campus Players a student must have taken a major role in a society play or a minor role in a Campus Players production. If his petition is unanimously accepted by the active members, he is placed on probation, during which time various staff duties must be performed by the applicant. A spring banquet is annually given for the newly elected members.

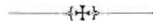

The choir represents every class in college; every society, every department major and wide variety of interests find representation here. As a medium of advertising Southwestern College in the field, the A Cappella Choir has an attractive force among prospective students, which is being recognized by faculty and students alike. THE Violin Choir, under the direction of Dean Hugh Altvater, this year completes its eighth concert season. The organization was founded as an ensemble class of violins, and after several years of experimentation, Dean Altvater finally perfected it into its present form. The choir consists of four divisions of violins, two violas and two violincellos.

The music consists of specially adapted pieces from orchestra, violin and piano music arranged in the manuscript by Dean Altvater, with the assistance of several of his advanced pupils. The choir is the only ensemble of its kind that does extensive concert work.

Included in the repertoire are movements from Mozart's Fortieth, Beethoven's Second, and Tschaikowski's Fifth Symphonies. Miss Grace Compton plays the solo "E. Major Concerto" with this group, and Miss Lucille Lorton plays the "Romance of Weniowski" with the choir accompaniment. Miss Ruth Snyder is contralto soloist, singing the "Ballet and Aria", from "Sampson and Delilale" and "Nur Wer Die Sehusucht Kennt" by Tschaikowski.

This year's tour included two weeks with concerts in Lyons, Dodge City, Kiowa, Pueblo, Colorado Springs and seven other cities in Kansas and Colorado.

(Second place in Missouri Valley Contest)*

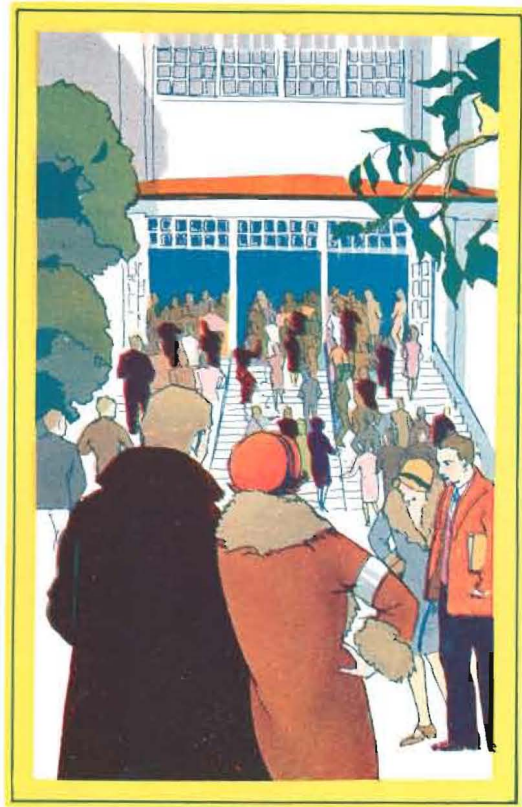

BIRDS EYE VIEW OF HOMECOMING GAME, SOUTHWESTERN VS. EMPORIA TEACHERS





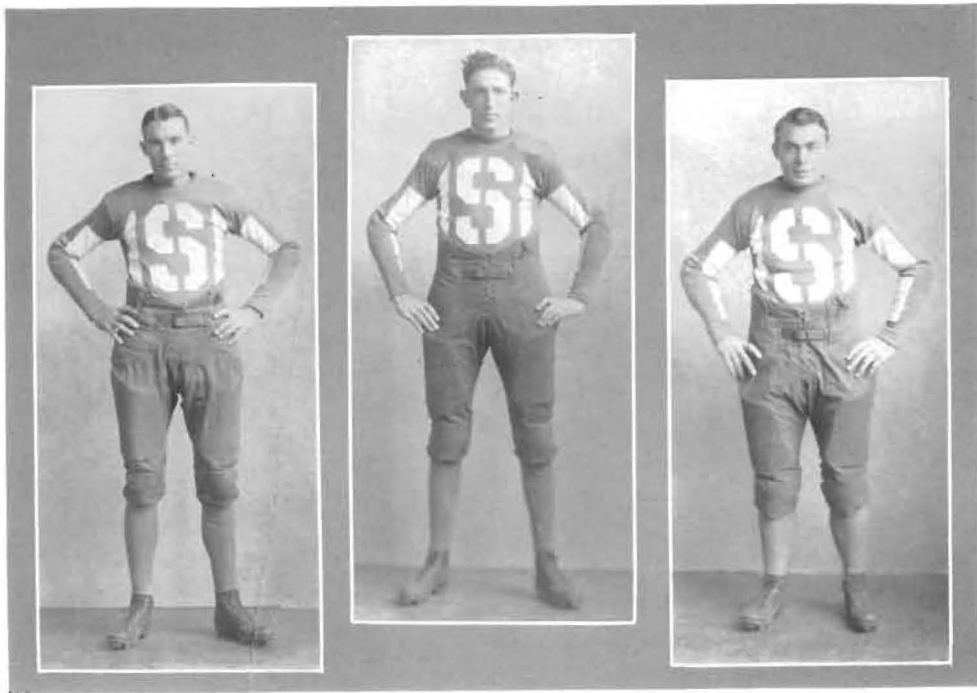

## Football History



THE Moundbuilders had one of the most successful seasons in years, losing only one conference tilt, and that to the champions, College of Emporia. The Emporia Teachers finished in second place by virtue of the fact that only one tie game was chalked up against them.

Southwestern opened the season and dedicated the new Alumni Field on September 28 against Central Teachers from Edmond, Oklahoma. The game was rather slow and the Moundbuilders showed early season form. Central emerged victorious 7 to 0, but the Builder prospects looked good.

The following week the Builders played their first conference game at Emporia with the College of Emporia. The Emporians were victors, 19 to 0, but the game was much harder fought than the score would indicate. After a 13 point scoring spree by Emporia in the first five minutes of play, the Builders battled them on even terms. Three times they carried the ball within the Emporia 10 yard line, but lacked the punch to score. This was the only time that the College of Emporia goal line was threatened all season.

On Saturday, October 20, a fighting purple team outfought and outplayed the strong Emporia Teachers before a large home-coming crowd, but the Builder eleven lacked the punch to score and the final count was 0 to 0. However, the game was in effect a victory for Southwestern. The Hornets, undefeated and doped to win by a wide margin, met a stone-wall defense and a driving offense on the part of the Builders. Only once in the fourth quarter did the Normals threaten to score when, after blocking a Builder punt, they carried the ball to the 15 yard line, where they tried a place kick. Twice the Builders threatened, once carrying the ball to the 10 yard line, and a second time to the 6 yard line. Southwestern College gained a total of 290 yards, while the Normals were credited with only 135 yards, but the scoring punch was not strong enough.

The jinx that kept the Builders scoreless was again much in evidence when they fought another scoreless tie with the Hays Teachers on October 26. The Builders outgained their opponents, but lacked the punch on the goal line. Hays was outplayed in practically all departments of the game, but the brilliant playing displayed by the Purple the week before against the Yellowjackets was missing. Late in the game the Moundbuilders lugged the ball to the Hays 11 yard line, only to lose it on downs.

Outplaying their ancient rivals from the opening whistle to the final gun, Coach Monypeny's Moundbuilders defeated the University of Wichita at Wichita, November 10, 7 to 0.

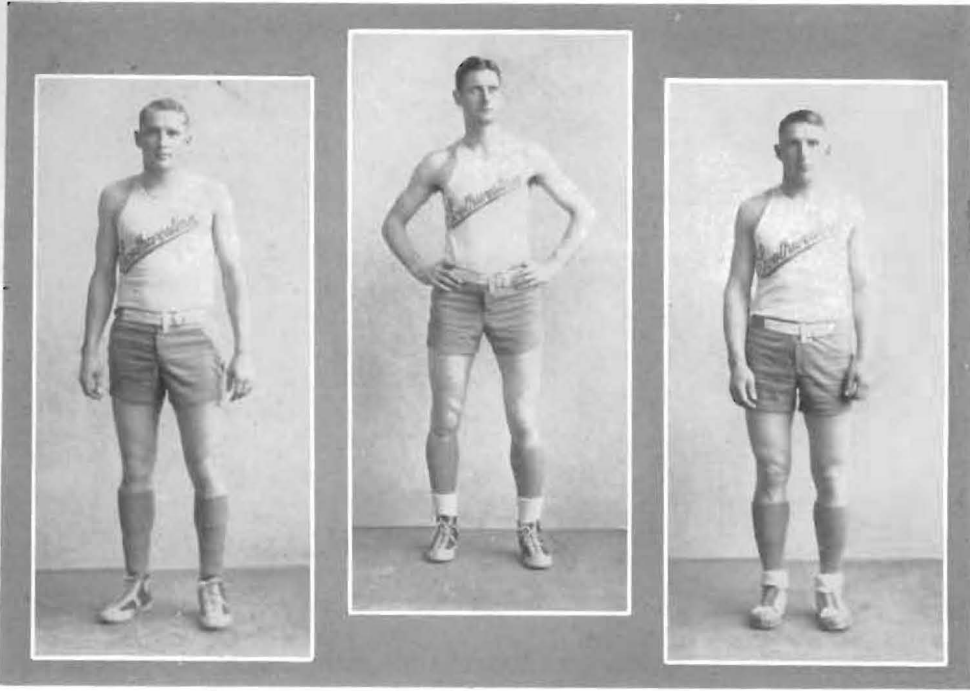

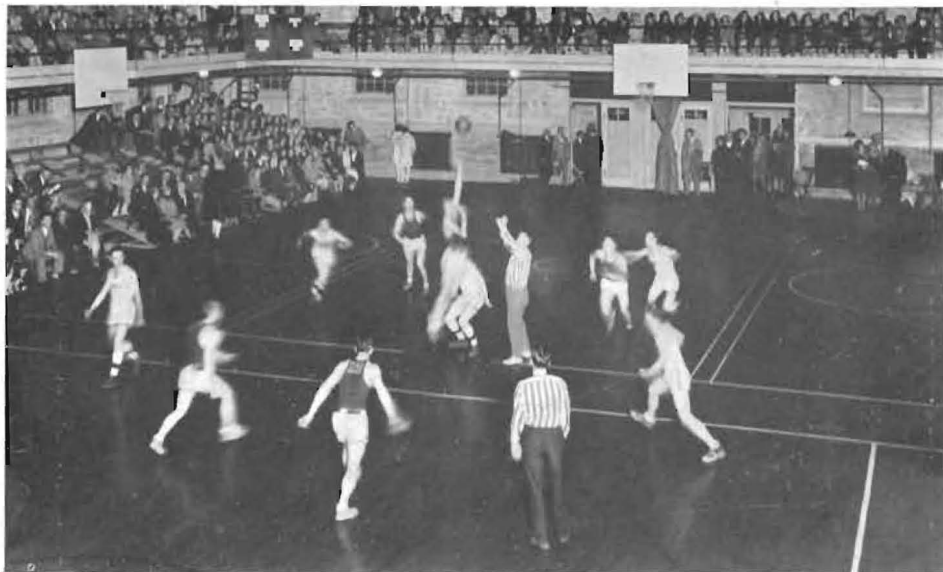

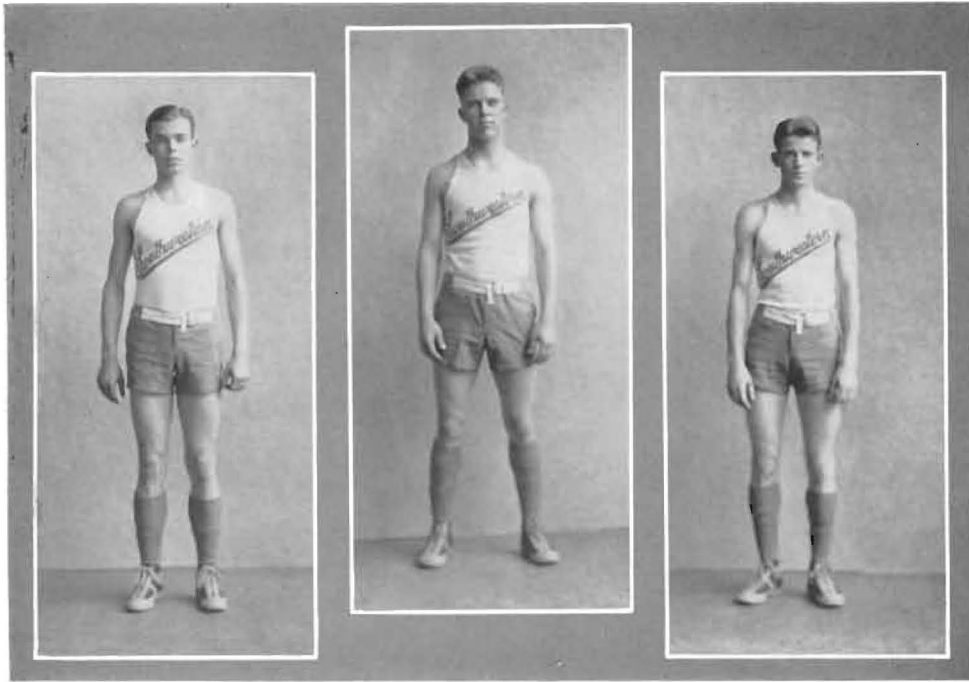

# Annual Intercollegiate Basket Ball Tourney

THE First Annual Intercollegiate Basketball Tournament was held at Stewart Gymnasium March 6-7-8-9, 1929. Despite the attraction of big city life and athletic club luxury offered by the National Tournament at Kansas City, the Collegiate Tourney was a huge success. Sixteen teams entered, including leading teams from three states. The Moundbuilders of Southwestern, after an erratic season in the Central Conference, came through in great style, emerging victorious with an impressive record. The Builders averaged 40.4 points per game to their opponent's 23.4 points—an average of a 17 point margin for every game played. As a climax to the four days of fine basketball exhibited, the Builders met and decisively defeated their ancient rivals, Wichita University, in the finals, 29 to 33. Fossey, Builder forward and high scorer of the tournament, played the greatest basketball of his career, and was an unanimous choice for the First All-Tournament Team. Okerberg, Builder guard who has not failed to win the tip over every opponent this season, was honored with a position on the Second All-Tournament Team and named captain. Gibbons, high scorer in the Central Conference the past season, won a forward position on the Second All-Tournament Team.

## Track

ALTHOUGH the 1928 track team was not heavily endowed with stars the Moundbuilders made a creditable showing. The Builders entered their first competition of the season in the Oklahoma Relays at Norman on April 14. Although none of the teams placed in the relay events, they gathered seven and one-half points in the regular track meet, which was won by Pittsburg Teachers. Okerberg placed second in the high hurdles, while Zile and Moore tied for first place with two other entries in the high jump.

On April 23 the Builders journeyed to Chilocco for a dual meet with the Indians. The track and field was heavy from recent rains so that good marks were impossible. Southwestern emerged victorious by a score of  $85\frac{3}{4}$  points to  $36\frac{1}{4}$  points.

The following week the Builders engaged in a dual meet with the College of Emporia at Emporia. Southwestern was again victorious, this time 74 to 51. Okerberg was high point man with 23 points. Zile and Dunn tied with Edwards of the college in the high jump at a height of 6 feet.

The first big meet of the season was held at Wichita the following week with Wichita University, Emporia Teachers, College of Emporia, and Southwestern present. The Builders finished in third place with  $32\frac{1}{2}$  points.

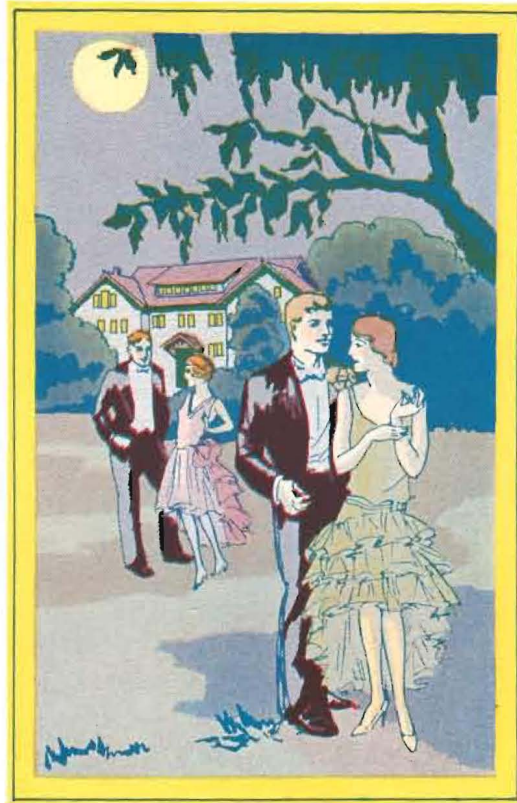

The first Annual Central Conference Track and Field Meet was held at Wichita on May 18, 1928. The Pittsburg Teachers, although pushed by Wichita University, were victors by a safe margin. The Emporia Teachers barely nosed the Builders out of third place by a fraction of a point.

The Central Conference Meet at Wichita concluded the track activities for the season. With the mainstay of the 1928 team back in school this year the Moundbuilders should give a better account of themselves in the 1929 season.

The spirit of cooperation that has been ever present between Belles Lettres and Athens has made this year a year that will be outstanding in the history of both societies.

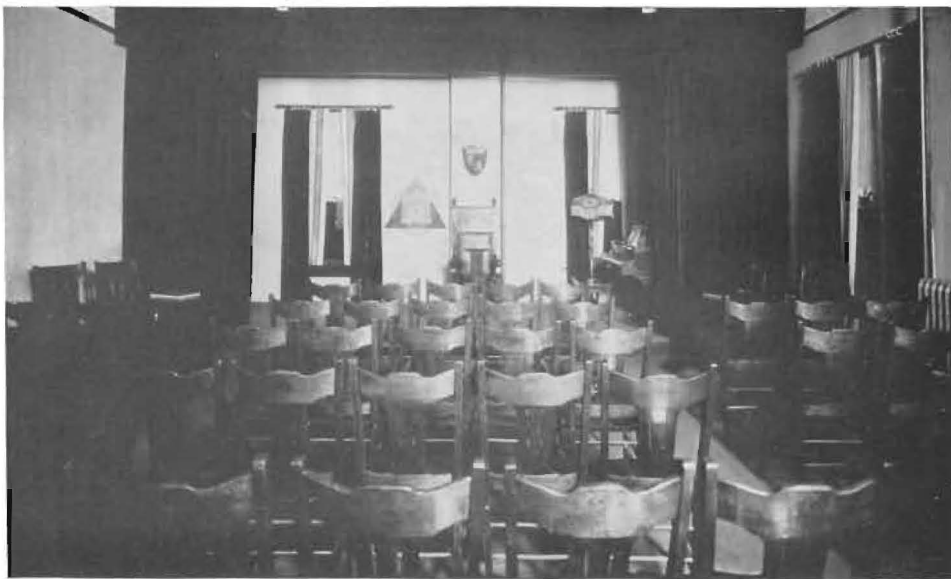


## Delphi History
