He 'Pickets' For Yes Vote

A new kind of "picket" made his appearance on election day in front of the Newport Beach City Hall.

Rhea Martin of 106 35th St., Newport, tacked one of those "Vote Yes" postcards on his back and marched back and forth along the sidewalk in front of City Hall, giving a little bit of "yes" sales talk to citizens as they came to vote.

Mr. Martin, former councilman and school board member in Sacramento, Kentucky, has been a Newport resident for 18 years. He was a special police officer under Chief R. R. Hodgkinson, guarding the Corona del Mar water reservoir during World War II, when there were fears of poisoning or destruction of the reservoir.

(The vote at the City Hall polling place, by the way, was 124 yes to 16 no.)

High School Will Sell Site Adjoining Campus

The Newport Harbor High School trustees decided at their Monday meeting to sell the 31.6-acre school site on 16th St., adjacent to the present campus.

They called for bids for 1 p.m. Thursday, June 25, and set a minimum valuation of \$13,000 an acre, a total of \$410,800.

Supt. Max Russell reported that the Irvine Co. had expressed no interest in considering this property in a trade involving the acquisition of land for a new campus.

Supt. Russell stated that the money from the sale would be used to purchase a 40-acre site from the Irvine Co., but neither he, nor any of the other board members cared to speculate on what price the Irvine Co. would set on the site.

The trustees established a 90-day escrow period, rather than the 30 days originally specified, in order to allow the buyer time to have the land zoned before termination of the deal.

Discussion over the possibility of undesirable development of the land after the sale caused the meeting to last until 7 p.m. The trustees wrestled with the problem of whether to put any restrictions on the use of the property.

President Hadd Ring said he felt that only a commercial retail use would be undesirable, but the rest of the board felt that "commercial retail" was not adequately defined anywhere.

Dr. Ed Milum and Mrs. Ronald Barlow, trustees, said they did not feel that commercial development would necessarily be undesirable.

Trustee Roy McCordle pointed out that by trying to determine what restrictions should be put on the use of the property, the board was attempting to do what was in reality the City Planning Commission's job.

The rest of the board agreed with Mr. McCordle. They decided to call bids with no restrictions, since they could not decide on an adequate means of restricting the use of the land prior to the bidding without discouraging prospective buyers, or even come to a definite agreement on what would be undesirable development of the land.

On this basis, the board has the right to refuse any bid, and the bidder has the right to stipulate in his bid that the final closing of the deal is contingent on his obtaining the zoning he desires within the 90-day escrow period.

The trustees, at the special meeting called for June 25, will accept both sealed bids and verbal bids, with the restriction that the verbal bids must be 5 per cent higher than any sealed bid.

More Teaching Time is Urged

In a session that lasted for 4 hours, 28 minutes, Tuesday evening, the board of trustees of the Newport Beach Elementary School District adopted a preliminary budget of \$1,518,724 for the next school year.

The board also: Received a report from the curriculum committee that recommended the lengthening of instructional time by shortening the noon hour to 45 minutes, the hiring of teachers for summer curriculum work, the addition of foreign languages to the elementary program and the re-evaluation of the present grading system used by the district.

Decided to enter into an agreement with the Orange County superintendent of schools for the employment of a coordinator of special education of the physically handicapped.

Employed 5 new teachers for next school year. They are Mrs. Betty Morgan, Dwane Myer, William Rabb, William Lynd and Marcheta Davenport.

C. of C. Hires Finch as Dollar a Year Man

Braden Finch, immediate past president of the Corona del Mar Chamber of Commerce, was appointed Tuesday to the newly created "dollar a year" job of executive secretary.

The appointment was made at a meeting of the directors at the home of second vice-president Frank Jordan.

JUNIOR TOURNAMENT SET

The Balboa Angling Club will launch its eighth annual Junior Fisherman's Tournament Monday. There are 2 divisions, 5 to 10 years of age and 11 to 15. The tournament will run to Aug. 21.

Trash Collection Charge Killed 4-1

Rise in Tax Is Expected

The Newport Beach Taxpayers Committee won a landslide victory in Tuesday's special election, piling up almost a 4 to 1 margin in favor of the ordinance to put the refuse collection cost back on the tax bill.

The vote was 3,548 "yes" to 987 "no," thereby scrapping the trash and garbage collection charge that had been levied by the Council as of last Nov. 15.

City Clerk Margery Schrouder reported that 40 absentee ballots were issued. The vote will be canvassed at 9 a.m. Tuesday, and the special initiative ordinance will become effective June 19.

Immediate effect of the vote will be a revision of the proposed budget for 1959-60. Since the collection cost will have to be paid from the general tax fund, there is bound to be an upward revision in the estimated tax rate from the tentative total of \$1.10.

Mayor James Stoddard remarked yesterday that the tax rate will definitely go up, at least the amount taken off (14 cents) by the collection charge.

The Taxpayers Committee were victorious in all but 2 of the 26 consolidated precincts. The "no" vote had a narrow margin of 104 to 93 in Precinct No. 25, which includes Shore Cliffs and a portion of Corona del Mar proper, and a 101 to 94 lead in Precinct No. 26, also in Corona del Mar.

Corona del Mar as a whole (including Irvine Terrace, Corona Highlands and Shore Cliffs) voted 837 to 460 in favor of putting the cost back on the tax bill. That is a margin of almost 2 to 1.

Newport voted "yes" by a margin of almost 11 to 1; Balboa better than 8 to 1; Newport Heights better than 6 to 1. In consolidated Precinct No. 1, in West Newport, the margin was a fantastic 16 to 1, with a vote of 170 to 11.

A total of 4,535 voters went to the polls—39.4 per cent of the 11,515 registered voters.

The last billing for refuse collection included the charges up to May 15, for half of the billing list, who will receive a bill next month for the balance. The other half will receive statements this month for charges up to June 15. It will be a Council decision whether the billing will also include the period from June 15 to 19.

50 yards out from the shore line at 12th St. in Balboa after being caught in a rip tide. One of his companions, James Barker of Orange, attempted to aid him, but was forced to kick free when the victim caught him in a strangle hold.

Mr. Hofmaister drowned in an attempt to aid Karen Rappley, 21, a WAF at March Air Force Base, who was carried out to sea by rip tide. He became exhausted about 150 yards from the shore, and was unconscious when finally dragged onto the beach. Resuscitation attempts proved unsuccessful.

Miss Rappley was able to reach shore safely, but the body of Mr. Bednarz is still missing.

LOOKS LIKE WE LOST

The outcome of Tuesday's special election was certainly decisive. We who lost can't even say, "Wait till the absentee ballots are in." The trash and garbage collection charge is out, and the tax billing method is back in.

Can't say I'm happy about it either, because I'm not. Nor am I convinced, and I do have the consolation of knowing that even a landslide decision does not automatically determine what is right. The matter of principle still remains: namely, that it is right and proper for each to pay according to his use, not according to his means.

The victory for the Taxpayers Committee gives proof once more of the political value of hard and steady work, knocking on a lot of doors, and repeating a simple but effective argument — in this case the argument against hidden taxes. Misleading, but packing a wallop.

The committee backing the collection charge worked only briefly and did practically no personal calling. On top of those handicaps, the committee received a body blow from the city itself — the preliminary report on the coming budget, WITHOUT the promised additional reduction in the tax rate. The suggested rate of \$1.10 merely holds the line, retaining the 14-cent reduction of the year just ending. That was not in keeping with the City Council's pledge to the taxpayers.

Even so, I predict there will come a time when the taxpayers and voters of Newport Beach will come around to the just and proper method of paying for refuse collection — and give approval to a collection charge.

It's high time you are reminded that, for the fourth year, the Schenley Sportsmen's Club summer awards program is under way. We're late reminding you, for it began its 22-week run on May 11.

Please note this statement: "Any angler fishing out of participating Southern California landings and launching ramps is eligible."

There was a time when you had to be fishing aboard a registered day, charter, party, rental or U-drive boat. No more. You can compete, fully and legally, aboard your own private dinghy, yacht or catamaran if you register, by written application, with the SSC. In Southern California, just call or drop a note to Capt. Cy Tucker, P.O. Box 515, Newport Beach. If you launch your outboard at a launching ramp or station, you can do the necessary signing on the spot.

Private boats already registered and displaying the official SCC plaque for 1956, 1957 or 1958 are considered registered for 1959.

SPECIES
The quarry which may win you a rod or reel, any week, are albacore or tuna, barracuda, white sea bass and yellowtail. Then, if your fish is tops at the end of the program, you're in line for a fine sweepstakes trophy—and so is your skipper, deckhand and weighmaster — only they get a big stack of those shiny round things that go into the slots in Las Vegas.

Here are the weights of the biggest fish, to date, in the 4-year-old derby: yellowtail, 61 pounds; tuna, 50 pounds, 14 ounces; white sea bass, 72 pounds; barracuda, 17 pounds, 6 ounces.

Them, folks, were all real lunkers. Believe it or not, all except the tuna were new records in 1958!

REGISTER IT
Don't be bashful about weighing in your best fish of any trip. Take the sad case of old pal and former writer of "Fish Tales," J. Wayne (Pappy) Harrison of Santa Ana. Pappy was up to the Horseshoe several weeks ago and boated a 12½-pound bary. So what did he do? He took it home and ate it. To quote — the winning barracuda the

first week of the contest weighed 11 pounds, 8 ounces. The second week winner was even smaller, —10 pounds, 4 ounces. And last week only one white sea bass was entered. (There are 3 awards each week, you know, for each species.) Better memory next time, Pappy!

Here are other top fish, the first 2 weeks, in the usual order: yellowtail, 32-2 and 26-5; white sea bass, 45-3 and 30-8. No tuna or (snicker!) albacore hit the scales these first weeks — but better days may be coming.

Or so we may hope. If you want the view as seen through my personal crystal ball, re the long-fins this year, well — the only thing that I see is the blue, far-away horizon. That means, like last year, that albacore can be had—if you go far enough. How far is anybody's guess. Last year it was real good up Santa Barbara and Morro Bay way—or deep in the heart of Mexico.

Yellowtail, barracuda and bonita fishig is real hot. The water's real warm. If my memory is any good at all, these signs say—to me, anyhow—that it will be a poor long-fin season. Sure hope I'm all wet, but I'll betcha there won't be an Inter-Club Albacore Tournament in 1959. Darn shame, too. Of all the games I ever played, that one, to me, was the most fun!

SECTION 3: The Street Superintendent of the City of Newport Beach shall cause to be conspicuously posted along the lines of the portions of said street proposed to be vacated not more than 300 feet apart, but not less than three in all, notices of the vacation of said portions of said street. Said notices shall state the passage of this Resolution of Intention and the time and place of the hearing of all persons interested in or objecting to the proposed vacation of said portions of said street. Said notices shall be so posted at least ten days before the date of said hearing, all as required by law.

SECTION 4: There is hereby reserved and excepted from the vacation of said portions of said street a permanent easement and right at any time, or from time

to time, to construct, maintain, operate, replace, remove, renew and enlarge poles, cross arms, cables, wires and other equipment and fixtures for the operation of telegraphic and telephone lines, and for the transportation or distribution of electric energy and incidental purposes, including access and the right to keep said poles, cross arms, cables and wires free from inflammable materials, and wood growth, and otherwise protect the same from all hazards upon and over the portions of said street proposed to be vacated.

These vacation proceedings are taken subject to the reservations and exceptions herein contained. **SECTION 5:** Notice is hereby given that the City Council of the City of Newport Beach does hereby fix Monday, the 22nd day of June, 1959, at the hour of 7:30 o'clock P.M. of said day, in the Council Chambers of the City of Newport Beach, located in the City Hall of the City of Newport Beach, as the time and place for hearing all persons interested in or objecting to the proposed vacation of said portions of said street, and the City Council at said time and place will hear the evidence offered by any person interested in the vacation of said portions of said street hereinbefore described.

SECTION 6: Resolution No. 4980 is hereby rescinded.

SECTION 7: This Resolution of Intention shall be published at least once in the Newport Harbor Ensign, a newspaper of general circulation, printed, published and circulated in the City of Newport Beach, and said publication shall be made before the date set for the hearing of all persons interested in or objecting to the proposed vacation.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF NEWPORT BEACH AMENDING SECTION 10126 OF THE NEWPORT BEACH MUNICIPAL CODE RELATING TO MOORING FEES.

The City Council of the City of Newport Beach does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1: Section 10126 of the Newport Beach Municipal Code is amended to read: "SECTION 10126. Same. Fees. The owner of every vessel in Newport Harbor having a mooring shall pay to the City or, while the administration of moorings is under the Orange County Harbor Department, shall pay to the Orange County Harbor Department the following fees:

For offshore moorings: An initial permit fee of \$1.20 per lineal foot of over-all length of the vessel moored thereon, payable upon the issuance of the permit. A yearly inspection fee of \$1.20 per lineal foot of over-all length of the vessel, payable December 1 of each year thereafter.

For shore moorings: An initial permit fee of \$60 per lineal foot of over-all length of the vessel moored thereon, payable upon the issuance of the permit. A yearly inspection fee of \$60 per lineal foot of the over-all length of the vessel, payable December 1 of each year thereafter."

SECTION 2: Mooring fees paid in advance as of March 10, 1959, shall not be subject to the increase provided herein. Payments made after March 10, 1959, for any period of time after said date shall be at the increased rate.

SECTION 3: This ordinance shall be published once in the Newport Harbor Ensign, a newspaper of general circulation, printed and published in the City of Newport Beach, and the same shall be effective 30 days after the date of its adoption.

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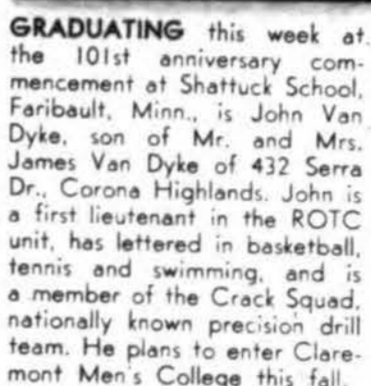
