ADDRESS TO THE JANUARY EDITION,

1850.

It is now more than ten years since the New Navy List was published by the late Commander, Charles Haultain, K.H., and its success, up to the present time, has amply justified the project of that gallant and lamented officer. The publication, in its altered form, having now entered upon its fourth year, it is due to the profession amongst which its support was looked for, to add, that the success has in no degree diminished. While admitting the above fact, therefore, the Editor and Publishers deem it right to return their thanks for the patronage so freely bestowed; and to express a hope that the improvements introduced into each succeeding number will continue to earn for it the support of those to whose interests the work is so peculiarly addressed.

The grand object sought to be achieved by the New Navy List is the keeping before the world, in a condensed but intelligible shape, the more important points of service performed by each Officer, whatever may be his rank. It must be taken for granted that common routine services have fallen more or less to the lot of all; but to enter into their detail would be to defeat that part of the plan of the work which embraces condensation. It is not contemplated by the exclusion of such services to underrate them, but when it is considered that already nearly one-third of each book is occupied by notices of war or scientific performances, it will be obvious that more space could not be accorded without rendering it so bulky and expensive, as to defeat the proposed and more desirable end of extensive circulation.

It is no longer a doubtful point that the New Navy List is considered an important vehicle for the services of Officers; but although every facility and encouragement has been held out for Officers to communicate their peculiar claims upon this score, there are many who have not availed themselves of the opportunities afforded. It is therefore again suggested to those who have not taken this step, that such communications are at all times acceptable and available if sent to the Editor, or Publishers, on, or before, the 20th June, and 20th December in each year.

ADDRESS TO THE EDITION,

Published in February, 1846.

THE importance of the New Navy List and General Record of Services to all Officers of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines, has been seriously considered by the Proprietors and Editor of the present Number. In completing, at a great sacrifice of capital and labour, the extensive alterations, which will be observable at a glance, due regard has been paid to the relative services of all Officers, and the whole arrangement so changed, that its superiority in point of information will, it is hoped, render the New Navy List a book of general circulation and reference.

Nothing can be further from the wish of the Proprietors than to detract from the merits of the late gallant Compiler, Commander Haultain, whose labours and sacrifices were but ill compensated by the sale of the work; but, in admitting deficiencies, of which a remedy has been aimed at, they must be in a great measure laid to the charge of the want of business resources with which he had to contend. In this respect there will now be nothing wanting; and it is the full intention of the Proprietors to render the New Navy List in every way worthy the full confidence and patronage of the Navy and Country at large.

The changes which have at present been effected may be here alluded to. The Services of all Officers have been separated from the mass, and brought to follow the Seniority Lists of the respective ranks as closely as possible. The object of this has been to facilitate references. The Services have been thoroughly revised and reprinted in double columns, and all expletive terms of commendation or otherwise struck out. Thus an Officer will no longer have to read the services of a brother Officer recounted in a more laboured strain than his own, which intrinsically, perhaps, were of greater merit than those so described. The propriety of this will, it is hoped, meet with general concurrence, and by thus removing superfluous type, an extended record of actual service is rendered easy. In a word, it is the wish to condense as much real service as possible into a small and intelligible compass, without giving undue consequence to any.

The New Navy List will also, for the future, give by far the most complete record of the Services of that distinguished corps, the Royal Marines, in a condensed form, to be found in any publication. This new feature will, it is hoped, have the effect of making it a work essential and acceptable to all in any way connected with the

Navy.

The List of the Navy has also undergone a thorough revision. Beneath the name of each Ship on the Effective List will be found the place and date of launching, the tonnage, and name of constructor or constructors—information not to be found in a complete shape in any other publication extant. The unserviceable and harbour service Ships have been removed to a separate list.

The exclusion of the "date of passing" column, heretofore given in the Seniority Lists of Captains, Commanders, and Lieutenants, demands some explanation. The extremely partial, and occasionally

inaccurate, way in which the information was given, rendered it particularly objectionable; and the evident disinclination on the part of Officers of long standing generally to communicate the information, added to the impracticability of procuring it from an official source, decided the point of removing the column entirely. If, however, at any future period, the dates of passing can be given in every case, it will be more valuable and far less invidious than it was previously.

But the most important new feature is that of the General Alphabetical Index of all Officers in the Royal Navy and Royal Marines, which has been compiled with great labour, and upon the accuracy

of which the character of the work may be safely staked.

The Honorary Marks before the names of titled Officers will soon become familiar to the eye, and it is presumed they will be preferred to

the letters heretofore used.

The Initial Letters at present refer only to the services of Officers in Lord Howe's great battle of the 1st June, 1794; Sir John Jervis's victory off Cape St. Vincent, 14th February, 1797; Admiral Duncan's defeat of the Dutch fleet off Camperdown, 11th Oct., 1797; Nelson's achievements at the Nile, 1st Aug., 1798; at Copenhagen, 2nd April, 1801; and at Trafalgar, 21st Oct., 1805; together with the expedition to Egypt, 1801; Sir Richard Strachan's action off Ferrol, 4th Nov., 1805; and the defeat of the French squadron off St. Domingo by Admiral Sir John Duckworth, 6th February, 1806. By this selection it is not meant to cast other services into the shade, and it will be a subject for consideration what other triumphs of the British Navy shall be equally distinguished. Those selected will, without doubt, ever rank foremost in the pages of Naval History; and as the Captains who participated in all (except that of Copenhagen) were honoured with gold medals, there was good reason for commencing with those brilliant victories. The Battle off Lissa; bombardment of Algiers; destruction of the Turkish fleet at Navarin; and the overthrow of St. Jean D'Acre, were each and all alike honourable to British prowess, and will also come under consideration for distinction.

Although thus much has been done, attempts at further improvement will not be wanting, and it will afford pleasure to the Proprietors and Editor to receive corrections or available additions to the services as they are now given. In particular, those services of a scientific character are here alluded to, which Officers are requested to furnish in

order to render this peculiar province more complete.

It will, however, be obvious that the great expenses connected with the publication of a work like the New Navy List cannot be persevered in without an increase to the number of Subscribers; and those whose wish it is to maintain a work of such value to all who have claims which require to be kept before those in authority, will, it is hoped, use their best endeavours to increase the sale. They will thereby also enable the Proprietors to publish the work at the lowest price which will afford a due return for the capital embarked, and the vigilance and labour which must be incessantly employed in the collection of new materials, and the preservation of accuracy.

ist. The rank of retired Rear-Admiral to be given, by seniority, to such applicants from the 14s. 6d. half-pay list, as may be willing to accept it, with the pay of £1 5s. per day, and the corresponding pension to their widows, under the usual restrictions.

2d. An addition of 7s. 6d. per day to be given to applicants, by seniority, from the 12s. 6d. and 10s. 6d. half pay lists, being captains of not less than 20 years standing, and 55 years of age. Officers from both lists to be permitted to assume the title of Retired Rear-Admiral at the period when they would have obtained the Flag by seniority, had they remained upon the active list. Their widows to be entitled to a pension of £110 per year; and to the pension of Rear-Admiral's widow, when the rank of Retired Rear-Admiral has been attained.

3d. The vacancies upon the £1 list to be filled up, in turn of seniority, by officers now accepting the 18s. per day; but no new admissions to the £1 5s. list to be made until it is reduced below the number of 25, which it is not to exceed afterwards. The permanent retired list to be reduced to 100, by making one appointment for every two vacancies, the first 25 officers upon the list receiving £1 5s. per day, and the remaining 75 £1 per day, with

1st. The rank of retired Rear-Admiral to be the right of assuming the rank of Retired Rearven, by seniority, to such applicants from the Admiral, when entitled to it by seniority.

4th. The active list of Captains not permanently to exceed 500. A proportionate reduction to be made in the 14s. 6d. and 12s. 6d. half-pay lists; the first to consist of 70 Captains, and the latter of 100.

5th. Good service pensions to be retained by Captains, until they reach the rank of Rear-Admiral,

or Retired Rear-Admiral.

6th. The promotions from the Captains' list to the Admirals' list in future to be continuous, reserving always the undoubted right of the Crown to select officers for promotion in the higher as well as the lower ranks, whenever the public interest requires such an exercise of the prerogative.

7th. The Admirals' list not permanently to exceed 150 in number, and to be thus distributed:—

30 Admirals, or 10 of each squadron;

45 Vice-Admirals, or 15 of each squadron;

And 75 Rear-Admirals, or 25 of each squadron. 8th. This plan to come into operation on the 1st of October of the present year, and all letters relating to it to be treated as strictly confidential.



RETIRED UNDER HER MAJESTY'S ORDER IN COUNCIL, 18th May, 1846.

The List to consist of Forty Masters, at two rates of Retired Pay, to be selected from those standing highest on the list of their class who may possess the qualifications hereinafter mentioned,

and who may desire to be included in the Retirement, viz:-

FIRST CLASS. Twelve Shillings and Sixpence a day, to such Masters, not exceeding twenty in number, as shall have actually served affoat in the Navy twenty-five years as Acting Master, and Master, or shall have completed that period by service combined with that of Assistant Master Attendant, and Master Attendant, and shall be Fifty-five years of age and upwards, and shall have passed for a Line of Battle Ship.

SECOND CLASS .- Ten Shiftings and Sixpence a day to such further number of Masters as may be required to complete the Retired List to Forty, provided they shall have served in the abovementioned capacities combined, Fifteen years, and shall be Fifty-five years of age or upwards.

To qualify an Officer to receive a Lieutenant's Commission, he must have been borne on the books of, and have actually served in, one or more of Her Majesty's Ships six complete years (excepting in the case of Masters, vide page 83), two of which as Midshipman; and shall have passed such Examinations as the Admiralty may from time to time direct, after he shall have attained the full age of 19 years. He shall be required to produce, at such Examinations, proof of his age, and certificates of the above-mentioned period of service, and of the regularity of his conduct; and if any candidate shall knowingly produce false certificates, he shall thereby be rendered incapable of ever receiving any Commission in Her Majesty's Navy; and if the falsehood of such Certificates shall not be discovered until after he has obtained promotion, he shall, whenever it may be discovered, be dismissed from the Navy, whatever rank he may at the time have attained.

as Master, he must have been at Sea at least seven years, two of which in Her Majesty's Navy, in the quality of Acting Master or Second Master; or, having served seven years at Sea, shall have actually been one year or more Chief Mate, and two years Master, or two years Chief Mate, and one year Master of a Merchant Vessel. He shall produce Certificates of diligence, sobriety, and good conduct from his Captains, also from the Owners, for the time he served as Master, and from the Owners and Master for the time he served as Mate; and shall pass such Examination as the Admiralty may from time to time direct; but no Candidate shall be examined before he shall have attained the age of twenty-one years, nor after the age of forty.

Time served as Master, shall, in future, be considered as time served as Lieutenant, to qualify an Officer to receive a Commission as Commander, under Her Majesty's Regulations, Art. 2, Sec. 4, Chap. 3, in the event of any particularly

To qualify an Officer to receive a Commission distinguished conduct which in the opinion of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty it may be proper to reward by such advancement.

> Such Masters as shall not have served affoat as Masters in the Royal Navy six complete years, and are not already in the receipt of higher half pay, shall not be entitled to any increase of pay beyond Five shillings a day, except in cases where it shall appear to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that inability to serve the prescribed term of six years shall have been caused by wounds or ill health, arising from the service.

> A Master's Assistant (when such rating shall be allowed by the Admiralty) previously to receiving an appointment as such to any of Her Majesty's ships, will be required to have a thorough knowledge of Practical Observations of the Sun, Moon, and Stars, for ascertaining the Latitude; to work double Altitudes; the Longitude by Chronometer; and to keep a Ship's reckoning by the common Rules, usually denominated a day's work.

EXAMINATION OF MASTERS.

Admiralty, December 17, 1849.

having had under their consideration the present Regulations for the examination of Masters and Second Masters of Her Majesty's Fleet, as defined by Art. 21, chap. 2, page 22, and Art. 25, chap. 2, page 25, of the printed instructions, have been pleased to direct that on and after the 1st of January next, the following Regulations shall be adopted, viz.: -

All Officers passing for the rank of Second Masters (or Officers from the Merchant Service who are candidates for the rank of Master, under the Queen's Regulations, Art. 6, chap. 3, page 24), shall be examined in seamanship, either at home or abroad, by one Captain or Commander, and three Masters; and after having received a certificate of having passed such examination, they shall undergo their examination in navigation, at the Royal Naval College (instead of the Trinity House), under the same Regulations, and at the same period as Midshipmen passing for Lieutenants; but the examination for pilotage is to be conducted at the Trinity House, under the rules and regulations at present in force, but subsequent to the above-mentioned examinations. Having completed the above examinations, they will be considered eligible for the rank of Master in the Royal Navy, provided they shall have served the time required by the Queen's Regulations.

The seniority of Second Masters (or of candidates for the rank of Masters) is in future to reckon from the date of their passing in seamanship for that rank, provided they shall subsequently pass in Navigation at the Royal Naval College on the first or second examination-day following, either of which days they are at liberty to select; or, in the event of an Officer having previously passed abroad in seamanship, he is at liberty, after his arrival in Naval College. England, to select either the first or second examination-day at the Royal Naval College; or if belonging to a ship under orders to be paid off, on the

The Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty first or second examination-day after having been so paid off, when, if he shall succeed in passing, he will be allowed seniority from the date of his having passed abroad. But no Second Master (or candidate for the rank of Master) will be allowed such seniority who shall fail in passing the Royal Navy College at the first trial, or who shall not pass at the Trinity House within a month after his having passed in Navigation.

Officers appearing before the Trinity Board for the purpose of passing in pilotage, must be qualified to take charge as Pilot of any of Her Majesty's frigates for the coast and ports for which Masters have hitherto been examined; and when they shall have served three years, at least, in frigates or sloops, they may be further examined as to their qualifications to take charge of Line-of-battle ships; but in this examination it will be required that they pass for the largest description of first-rates. In the event of an Officer serving abroad as Acting Master of a Line-of-battle ship, the time so served may reckon as part of the aforesaid three years.

The class of ship of which Officers are capable of taking charge as Pilots will be stated in the certificate granted to them by the Trinity House.

All Officers desirous of being examined in pilotage at Trinity House, either for the rank of Second Master, or as to their qualifications to serve as Masters of frigates, or of Line-of-battle ships, should present themselves at the Admiralty, bringing with them a certificate of their birth, and also their original certificates for the entire period they have been employed in Her Majesty's service, or in merchant ships, in each of which certificates the word sobriety must be included. Similar certificates must be produced by Officers presenting themselves to pass in navigation at the Royal

MATES.

To qualify an Officer to become a Mate, he must have served the time and passed the Examination required to qualify him for a Lieutenantcy; but whatever rank beyond that of Midshipman he may obtain abroad, previous to passing such Examination at the Naval College as may from time to time be required, will depend for confirmation on his passing the said Examination within such period after his return

to England as shall be directed from time to time by the Admiralty.

No Mate shall be allowed Half-Pay without having been previously surveyed and reported unfit by the Director-General, or the Officers of one of the Naval Hospitals at home. The Medical Officers are therefore to report particularly in each case the probable period at which the Invalid may be again fit for employment; and at the expiration of such period the Mate is to report himself to their Lordships, in order that, if he should state himself to be still unable to serve, proper measures may be taken to ascertain his continued unfitness; after which, should he be declared fit for employment and still withhold his services, his Half-Pay is to be respited.

Mates who may apply for the retiring pension of two shillings and sixpence a day after twenty years' actual service, will not be re-admitted after having accepted such Pension. The names of all Mates who remain out of the Service for more than one year, without applying for an Appointment, will be removed from the official Register of Mates and Midshipmen, and be considered as having relinquished the Naval

Service; unless the omission proceeded from unavoidable causes.

All Midshipmen who shall have passed such Examination respecting their Qualifications for the appointment of Lieutenant as the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty may from time to time direct (if abroad, for Seamanship and Navigation, and if at home also at the Royal Naval College), shall be considered eligible to have Commissions as Mates in whatever Ship they may be serving; such Commission will be given by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, upon the recommendation of the Commanding Officer of the Ship in which the person may be serving, transmitted by the Commanderin-Chief or Senior Officer on the Station.

Commanders-in-Chief on Foreign Stations may give Acting Commissions as Mates to such Midshipmen as may pass abroad for Seamanship and Navigation, which Commissions will be confirmed from their original dates if approved by their Lordships, provided they pass their examination at the Royal Naval College in two months after their arrival in England; but no person appointed to act as Mate or as Lieutenant is to be sent home from a Foreign Station for the purpose of passing such examination.

To qualify a gentleman for an appointment as Midshipman, he must have served in Her Majesty's Navy two complete years as a Cadet, or three complete years in any other capacity; and shall pass such Examination as may from time to time be ordered by the Admiralty, and shall be full fourteen years of age. A Naval Cadet, before his admission into the Navy, shall undergo such Examination as the Admiralty

may from time to time direct.

Naval Cadets must not be under twelve years. They must be in good health, fit for Service, and able to write English from dictation, and must be acquainted with the four first Rules of Arithmetic, Reduction, and the Rule of Three.

SECOND MASTERS.

To qualify an Officer to receive a Commission as Second Master, he must have served at least six years at Sea, three of which in Her Majesty's Navy, as Midshipman or Master's Assistant; or having served six years at Sea, shall have actually been one year or more Master, or two years Chief Mate, or three years Inferior Mate of a Merchant Vessel; or shall have served in the two former capacities in a Merchant Vessel, for a period combined of eighteen months, or in the two latter, or in the three capacities, for a period combined of two years and a half. He shall produce Certificates of diligence, sobriety, and good conduct, as required in the case of Masters; and shall pass such Examination as the Admiralty may from time to time direct; but no Candidate shall be examined before he shall have attained the age of nineteen years, nor after the age of thirty-five. (See page 149.)

officer is qualified for a Frigate; the others are requested to inform the Compiler thereof on doing so.

No person shall be appointed a Chaplain in the Royal Navy who shall not have been regularly ordained Deacon and Priest of the United Church of England and Ireland, or who shall not have been graduated at the University of Oxford, Cambridge, or Trinity College, Dublin, or whose age shall exceed thirty-five years, or who shall hold any benefice with cure of souls, or who shall not produce testimonials from the Bishop of the Diocese in which he was last licensed, addressed to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, or who shall not have been examined by some competent person to be appointed for that purpose by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and be reported by him to be in every respect a fit and proper person to fill with respectability and advantage to Her Majesty's Service the situation of Chaplain.

NAVAL INSTRUCTORS.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHED BY ORDER IN COUNCIL OF THE 22nd DEC. 1836, 10th AUGUST, 1840, AND 11th MARCH, 1842.

Naval Instructors and Schoolmasters are hereafter to be designated "Naval Instructors," and Chaplains on being appointed to act as Naval Instructors are to be designated "Chaplains and Naval Instructors."-No person will be considered eligible for an appointment as Naval Instructor who is under 20 years of age or more than 35 .- Every Candidate will be required to produce a certificate of his age, and testimonials of good character; and both laymen and clergymen when appointed to act as Naval Instructors must pass an examination as to their qualifications to instruct the young Officers in the following branches:—1st. Common Arithmetic, including Vulgar and Decimal Fractions.—2nd. The first six, and the eleventh books of Euclid.—3rd. Algebra, progressing to the highest order of equations, and its application to the solution of Geometrical Problems.—4th. Plane and Spherical Trigonometry, theoretical and practical.—5th. Nautical Astronomy, particularly the principles on which the various rules for fading the latitude.—4th. Plane and Spherical Trigonometry, for finding the latitude and longitude are founded .- 6th. Mechanics .- 7th. Hydrostatics .- 8th. A competent knowledge of the Classics.

The final examination of Candidates for Naval Instructorships will comprise:—1st. The usual College passing examination in Navigation.—2nd. The application of the theory of Projectiles to Gunnery.—3rd. Observations with the Sextant, &c. The use of the Azimuth Compass and Chronometer, &c. Perfect proficiency will be expected in observing: 250 numbers will be required to pass a Candidate in the College paper, and 55 is to be the minimum number for observations.

Although the knowledge of French, as well as of other modern languages, and of the principles of drawing, is not considered as indispensable, it is very desirable that Naval Instructors should be able to give instruction in these branches of education; and preference will always be given to such as possess these

Naval Instructors will be allowed, in addition to their pay, £5 a-year to be charged on the ship's books against, and to be deducted from, the pay of every young gentleman receiving instruction.

Naval Instructors who shall retire from employment without the sanction of the Admiralty, or who shall refuse or avoid service, if found capable of serving, shall not be allowed to receive half pay; and will be removed from the list of Naval Instructors.

Chaplains acting as Naval Instructors will be allowed £5 a year to be deducted from the pay of every young gentleman instructed by them, in addition to their pay as Chaplains and to three-fourths of the amount of the Full Pay of Naval Instructors, according to the length of their service as such.

Naval Instructors are in all respects Ward Room Officers.

MEDICAL OFFICERS OF THE NAVY.

To be eligible for a Commission as Medical Inspector or Deputy Medical Inspector of Hospitals and Fleets, a Surgeon must have served four years in Her Majesty's Navy as Surgeon on board a Commissioned Ship.

To qualify an Officer to receive a Commission as Surgeon, he must have been three years employed as an Assistant Surgeon, one year of which at least, must be on board a Commissioned Ship, and the other two may be served in one of Her Majesty's Naval Hospitals; and he shall pass such Examination as the Admiralty may from time to time direct; but no Surgeon or Assistant Surgeon, who shall retire from his employment without the sanction of the Admiralty, or who shall refuse or avoid service, if found capable of serving, shall be allowed to receive half-pay; and his name in such case will be removed from the list of Officers of the Royal Navy.

An Assistant-Surgeon shall produce proof of his having served the usual and required Apprenticeship, and shall pass such Examination as the Admiralty may from time to time direct; but no Candidate shall be examined before he shall have attained the age of 20 years, nor after the age of 24.

Sir Gilbert Blane, Bart., with the concurrence of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, for the encouragement of Naval Medical Science, and excitement of an emulation that may conduce to the interests of an important branch of the public service, established a Fund in perpetuity, for the purpose of providing the means of conferring a gold medal, once in every two years, on such two Medical Officers, whether Surgeons or Assistant-Surgeons acting as Surgeons. as shall produce the most approved journals of their practice, whilst actually serving in Her Majesty's Ships.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR CADETS.

Age not less than 16, nor exceeding 21 years. Height not less than 5 feet 4 inches. Constitution approved by the Inspector-General of the Navy.

ROYAL MARINE CADETS.

1. No Candidate will be nominated a Cadet who is under 15 or above 19 years of age; and he must be prepared to pass such examination as the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty may deem fit to require.

Each Candidate will be expected to give security for the payment of such a sum to the Accountant-General of the Navy as may be fixed upon, and to bring with him, when he appears for Examination, a Certificate of good conduct from the Masters of the Schools at which he studied for the last three years, and a Certificate from the Inspector-General of Naval Hospitals and Fleets of sound bodily health, and that he does not stammer, and has no other physical defect.

2. No Cadet will receive a Commission unless he is able to go through, at least, the Examination now required, together with the short course of theoretical and practical Gunnery now established in the Excellent, with a knowledge of the Great Gun Exercise, the use of the Sextant, nor unless he had

acquired a competent knowledge of Field Fortification and Mechanical Drawing.

3. Cadets will not be permitted to remain more than two years on board the Excellent, or at the College, unless they have passed their final examination; but they will, during the second year of their Cadetship, provided they can pass the requisite examination, be eligible for such Commissions as may become vacant during that year. If appointments are made before the examination at the end of the second year, the half-yearly examination immediately previous to the occurrence of the vacancy shall be the test of ability; but in all cases the Candidate must have reached the points fixed in paragraph numbered 2, to entitle him to an appointment, and will be placed on the List of Officers according to the ability shown at such examination.

No Cadet will be allowed to proceed to the College until he has passed through the whole plan of instruction laid down for Marine Cadets in the Excellent, and he will not be received at the College

unless he produces a Certificate of good conduct from the Captain of the Excellent.

All the Examinations proposed are to be carried on by the Professor at the Royal Naval College, under the direction of the Captain of the Excellent.

4. Cadets during the first year of their appointment will not be eligible for a Commission if there

are any Cadets in their second year who can pass the requisite Examination.

5. Cadets are to be subject to Naval discipline, to receive the same pay as Mates, to mess with them,

and to be considered in all respects as Quarter Deck Petty Officers.

6. Cadets are to wear the Dress Coat of the Corps of Royal Marines, without lace, ornament, or epaulette, in lieu of which they are to wear Shoulder Straps of plain gold cord, Trousers according to

Regulations, and Dress Cap.
7. In undress they are to wear the Blue Frock Coat of the Corps, without Shoulder Straps, Grey

Cloth Trousers, or White Drill Trousers, according to Regulations.

Forage Cap with cover.

N.B. Each Cadet, on presenting himself for Examination on board H.M.S. Excellent, should be prepared with a sum not less than £40 for outfit, and £10 for mess, washing, and other expenses. (Sept. 20, 1843.)

- 4 T. A. Parke, First Lieut., serving in Triumph at Camperdown, 1797. Capt. of Artillery, serving in North America, 1813, 15, acting against the enemy in Georgia; in the operations on the Chesapeake, and at Hampton.
- J. Owen, Second Lieut., serving in Adamant at Camperdown; First Lieut., serving in the boats of Tremendous at destruction of Fr. frigate Preneuse at Port Louis, 1799; and in Belleisle in charge of the detachment, and wounded at Trafalgar. Capt. serving in Leviathan at destruction of Robuste and Luon, 1809; and commanded the Marines landed to destroy a convoy and batteries at Languelia and Alassio, and defeated, at the point of the bayonet, a battalion of Fr. troops, 1812. Major, and subsequently Lieut.-Col. commandant of the Marines co-operating with the forces of the Queen of Spain. 1836, 37. Gaz. 1799, 1805, 12.
- C. OFFICERS AUTHORISED TO WEAR FOREIGN ORDERS.

Rules relative to Foreign Orders from Foreign Sovereigns.

1st. No British Subject shall accept a Foreign Order, or wear its Insignia, without having previously obtained a Warrant under the Royal Sign Manual (directed to the Earl Marshal of England), granting them Her Majesty's permission to accept

and wear the same.

2nd. To obtain such permission, the intention of the Foreign Sovereign to decorate a British subject with the Insignia of such Order is to be notified to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, either through the Queen's Minister abroad, or through the accredited Minister of the Foreign Sovereign resident at London. And if the application be in favour of a Naval Officer, the Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs will communicate with the First Lord of the Admiralty to the same effect, previous to Her Majesty's pleasure being taken thereon.

3rd. When Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs shall have taken Her Majesty's pleasure, and obtained Her consent upon the occasion, he shall then signify the same to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, in order that the usual Warrant may be prepared for the Royal Sign Manual, and such other steps be taken as may be necessary for carrying Her Majesty's pleasure into effect accord-

ingly.

4th. When the Warrant is signed by the Queen, it shall be announced in the Gazette in the usual manner, and registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

5th. No subject of Her Majesty can be allowed to accept the Insignia of a Foreign Order from any Sovereign of a Foreign State, except they shall be so conferred in consequence of active and distinguished services before the enemy, either at sea or in the field, or unless he shall have been actually employed in the service of such Foreign Sovereign.

6th. Her Majesty's license and permission doth not authorise, and shall not be deemed or construed to authorise, the assumption of any style appellation, rank, precedence, or privilege appertaining unto a Knight Bachelor of these Realms.

7th. That if the Service for which it is proposed to confer the Order has been performed during War, the Notification required by the 2nd Regulation must be made not later than two years after the exchange of the Ratifications of a Treaty of Peace.

If the Service has been performed in time of Peace, the Notification must be made within two

years of the date of such Service.

8th. When a British Subject has received the Royal permission to accept a Foreign Order, he will at any future time be allowed to accept the Declaration of a higher Class of the same Order, to which he may have become eligible by increase of rank in the Foreign Service, or in the Service of his own country; or any other distinctive mark of honour strictly consequent upon the acceptance of the original Order, and common to every person upon whom such Order is conferred

The Queen has made known her pleasure,-

9th. That the 8th Clause of the Regulations respecting Foreign Orders shall not be taken to apply to Decorations of the Guelphic Order which were bestowed on British Subjects by her predecessors, their Majesties King George IV., and King William IV., on whose heads the Crowns of Great Britain and Hanover were united.

Decorations so bestowed cannot properly be considered as rewards granted by a Foreign Sovereign for services rendered according to the purport of the 5th Clause of the Regulations. They must be rather considered as personal favours bestowed on British Subjects by British Sovereigns, and as having no reference to services rendered to the Foreign Crown of Hanover.

NAVAL MEDALS.

Admiralty, 7th June, 1848.

The Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty having referred to a Committee of Flag Officers the consideration of the naval actions for which medals should be granted, in accordance with the spirit of the Queen's most gracious intentions, as signified in the Gazette of the 4th June, 1847; and Her Majesty having been pleased to approve of several of the suggestions submitted by the said Committee, the following notice is issued for the information and guidance of those who may have claims to this honourable distinction:—

1st. The rule, directed by Her Majesty to be observed in extending this mark of Her royal favour, is so comprehensive, as to bring within its scope all Officers, seamen, and marines (and soldiers who served as marines) who were present in any action which at the time received the special approbation of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

2nd. From the commencement of the war in 1793, it was the practice of the Board of Admiralty to notice battles of conspicuous merit by the promotion of the First Lieutenant of the ship or ships, or the promotion of the Commander, if the action was fought by a small vessel; and, conformably with this practice, it is Her Majesty's pleasure, that persons of every rank, who were present in such actions, during the wars commencing in 1793, and ending in 1815, and now living, shall receive a medal commemorative of their meritorious services; and they are required forthwith to state their claims for each action in which they may have been engaged, according to the form (A) hereunto annexed, and transmit the same to the Secretary of the Committee of Flag Officers, Admiralty, London.

3rd. Her Majesty has also been pleased to take into Her gracious consideration the many instances of gallantry displayed by Officers, seamen, and marines in boat actions during the same period, and to direct that such services, if distinguished by the promotion of the Officer conducting the enterprise, shall entitle those who were present, and now living, to a medal; provided the answers, to be given in the form (B), shall enable the Committee to ascertain that the claim is well founded. But the Officers, seamen, and marines of the ships, from which the boats were detached, are not to participate in a distinction which only properly belongs to those personally engaged.

4th. It is also ordered, that service in the frigates and smaller veasels, which were actually present in any of the great fleet actions mentioned in the Gazette of the 4th June, 1847, for which the Captains of the ships of the line received medals, shall entitle those now surviving of the crews of such vessels to a medal.

And all surviving Officers, seamen, and marines, belonging to ships actually co-operating and present during the siege and capture of Martinique in 1809, Guadaloupe in 1810, Java in 1811, St. Sebastian in 1813, for which the Army had medals, will be entitled to a similar distinction, if their return, according to form (A), shall enable the Committee to trace the presence and co-operation of the ships to which the applicants belonged.

And 5th. Her Majesty, having taken into Her most gracious consideration the circumstance that medals have been granted by Her Majesty for services rendered by the Navy, not only in the wars commencing in 1793, and ending in 1815, but also for services rendered in the late war in China, whilst the intermediate general actions, viz.:

The attack upon Algiers in 1816, The battle of Navarino in 1827, and

The operations on the coast of Syria in 1840, are unmarked by any such distinction, has been pleased to direct, that the surviving Officers, seamen, and marines, engaged in those actions, shall also receive a similar mark of their Sovereign's gracious recollection of their services, and of Her desire to record the same; and all such Officers, seamen, and marines are, therefore, hereby called upon to transmit their claims to such distinction according to the annexed form (A), and addressed to the Secretary of the Committee of Flag Officers, Admiralty, London.

CLASSES AND DENOMINATIONS OF HER MAJESTY'S SHIPS.

FIRST RATES—Comprising all ships carrying; 110 guns and upwards, or whose complements consist of 950 men or more. First rates may be subdivided into two classes—the Caledonia 120 gun class; and the Queen 110 gun class. The Caledonia, and ships of her class are armed with four 8 inch guns, and 28 9 ft. 6 in. 32-prs. on the lower deck; two 8 in. guns, and 32 9 ft. 32-prs. on the main deck. Quarter deck and forecastle: six 8 ft. 6 in. 32-prs., and 14 32-pr. carronades. The Queen mounts six 8 in. guns on the lower deck, and four on the middle deck, the remaining 50 guns on those decks being 9 ft. 6 in. 32-prs. Main deck: 30 8 ft. 32 prs. Quarter deck and forecastle: six 8 ft. 6 in., and 14 6 ft. 32-prs.

SECOND RATES-Comprising one of her Majesty's yachts, and all ships carrying under 110 guns, and not less than 80; or whose complements are under 950, and not less than 750 men. Subdivisible into four classes:-Ships of Princess Charlotte 104 gun class, carry their guns on three decks; and differ only in armament with *Caledonia* class in having four 32-prs. less on the lower, middle, main, and quarter decks; and in their being 8 ft. guns on the middle decks, and 6 ft. 6 in. guns on the main decks. The Rodney (92 gun class), is armed on the lower deck with six 8 in. guns, and 26 9 ft. 6 in. 32prs.; main deck, four 8 in. guns, and 30 9 ft. 6 in. 32-prs.; quarter deck and forecastle, 26 8 ft. 32-prs. Asia (84 gun class) is armed on the lower deck with six 8 in. guns, and 24 9 ft. 6 in. 32-prs.; main deck, two 8 in. guns, and 30 8 ft. 32-prs.; quarter deck and forecastle, six 8 ft. 32-prs., and sixteen 32pr. carronades. #### OATH OF ALLEGIANCE, &c.

By the Acts 25 Charles II., Cap. 2, and subsequent Acts, and by the 9 George IV., Cap. 17, all Officers of the Navy, on attaining the rank of Rear-Admiral, or on being promoted to a superior rank, are required to take the Oath of Allegiance, and make the Declaration therein respectively mentioned, within Six Months, either in the Court of Chancery or King's-Bench, at Westminster, or at the Quarter-Sessions of the County or Place where they shall be resident, in default of doing which their Commissions are declared void: But if the Officer should be absent from England when promoted, or if his promotion shall take place within three months before his departure, he may take the Oath, and make the Declaration, at any time within Six Calendar Months after his return.

#### COMMANDERS OF LINE OF BATTLE SHIPS.

By an Admiralty memorandum dated Dec. 13, 1847, their Lordships directed that in future, Commanders shall be eligible for the appointment of Commander of a Line of Battle Ship who have served one year in command of a Sloop, or as Lieutenant in command of a Brig, or as First Lieutenant or Gunnery Lieutenant of any Ship in Her Majesty's Service.

# ROYAL NAVAL COLLEGE.

#### SCIENTIFIC EDUCATION OF OFFICERS.

Admiralty, 20th December, 1838.

Her Majesty having been graciously pleased to sanction, by Order in Council of July 8th, 1838, the establishment of further means of scientific education for a certain number of Officers of Her Majesty's Naval Service, under such regulations as the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty may frame from time to time.

Their Lordships have directed that for this object.—Thirty additional Mates, who have passed both the

Examination in Seamanship and in Navigation, shall be borne on the books of the Excellent.

They will receive Sea pay, and be in all respects under Naval discipline; but they will receive the usual allowance instead of being victualled, and be lodged in the Royal Naval College. Any further expense will be defrayed by themselves.

They will be selected from such as have passed the Ordinary Examination on board the Excellent, and

a preference will be given to those who shall have passed the best Examination.

They will receive Instruction at the Royal Naval College for the space of one year, and then be

An Examination will take place at the end of every six months.

The Mate who passes the best Examination, provided he produces satisfactory Certificates of character and professional ability from the Captains with whom he has served, and during the period of his Instruction, will receive a Lieutenant's Commission; provided always he attains a certain fixed degree of proficiency.

A limited number (Ten) of Commissioned Officers of any rank may avail themselves of the instruction thus afforded, for the space of one year. No expense will be incurred on their account; and they will be expected to pass the ordinary examination of the Excellent before they are admitted to the instruction at the Royal Naval College. By Command of their Lordships, C. Wood.

#### EXAMINATION OF OFFICERS ON SUBJECTS CONNECTED WITH THE STEAM ENGINE.

Admiralty, 8th of December, 1849.

My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty having had under their consideration the examination required of Officers, on subjects connected with the Steam Engine, with a view to ascertain their competency to be registered as "Steam Officers," are pleased to order that no Officer shall, henceforward, be so registered, until he has passed an examination at the Royal Naval College at Portsmouth, on the subjects herein detailed; and any Officer, whether he has acquired his knowledge in one of Her Majesty's Dockyards, or at the factories of private individuals, or has studied at the Royal Naval College, or not, is at liberty to present himself for examination, on the days fixed for the purpose, on giving timely notice to the Captain Superintendent of the College of his intention so to present himself.

The Examinations are to take place once in every three months, at the time fixed for the present Quarterly Examinations; and they will be conducted by the Professor of the College, in the presence of

the Admiral Superintendent of the Dockyard and the Captain Superintendent of the College.

The subjects on which the Officers will be examined are to be, until further notice, as follows, viz. :-

1. The Elements of Geometry, Mechanics, and Dynamics.

2. Laws of Heat.

3. The application of these branches of science to the steam engine.

4. The name, and use of every part of the engines, boilers, &c.

5. Construction and principle of the engines and boilers; expansion of steam, economy of fuel, resulting from the application of the principle, and, under certain circumstances, from the employment of reduced power.

6. The nature, application, and uses of the indicator.

The Chief Engineer of the Dockyard is to furnish the Professor with questions, relating to the heads Nos. 4, 5 and 6-marked with the number which should be given for each question if answered fully and correctly; and he is to examine the written answers, and mark upon each of them the number which should, in his opinion, be given by the Professor.

The Professor is to prepare questions under the first three heads, and in like manner assign to each

question the number which should be given to it, if answered fully and correctly.

The whole of these questions are to be printed, and placed in the hands of each Officer, on the day of

An abstract is ultimately to be made by the Professor of the result of the examinations, shewing in one column the greatest number which could be gained under each head of the examination - and in another column the aggregate of the number under the separate heads awarded to each Officer; and this abstract is to be transmitted to the Secretary of the Admiralty, with a copy of the printed questions, for their Lordships' information. # RULES AND ORDERS FOR GRANTING PENSIONS TO THE WIDOWS OF COMMIS SION AND WARRANT OFFICERS OF THE ROYAL NAVY.

Art. 1 —Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy may be allowed Pension as hereinafter directed, and subject to the following Restrictions, provided they shall appear to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty to be proper and deserving objects of the Public Bounty, and not left in wealthy circumstances.

Art. 2.—The Rates of Pensions shall be as follows, viz. :—To the Widow of a

- Art. 3.—The Pensions of all Widows shall commence from the first day of the Month following that in which their Husbands died, provided application be made by the Widow within Twelve Months from the same, otherwise from the time only of such application; and all applications for Pensions must be addressed to the Secretary of the Admiralty.
- Art. 4.—The Widows of Officers (except Chaplains) who marry after the 31st of December, 1830, will only be entitled to the Pensions of their respective Classes, in the event of their Husbands having been on the List of Commission or Warrant Officers ten complete years, except the Husband be killed in action, or lose his life in the execution of the Service.
- Art. 5.—No widow shall receive a Pension as a Chaplain's Widow, unless her Husband shall have been in Priest's Orders, nor unless his name was on the List at the time of his death, nor unless she shall have been married during, or prior to, her Husband's Service in the Navy, and unless her Husband shall have served Three Years in sea-going Ships, or Four Years in Guard-Ships, subsequent to their marriage, and shall, in the whole, have served the length of time to entitle him to his half-pay.
- Art. 6.—No Widow shall be entitled to the Pension who has not been married Twelve Months to the Officer by whose right she claims the same, unless the said Officer was killed or drowned in the Ser Service; but the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty may grant the Pension in cases of Officers dying before the expiration of Twelve Months from the time of their Marriage, in such cases as they think proper.
- Art. 7.—If any Officer shall marry after the Age of Sixty Years, his Widow shall not be entitled to receive the Pension; or, if being capable of Service, he should, at his own solicitation, be excused from it, being at the time warned that his Widow would thereby forfeit the Pension.
- Art. 8.—The above Pensions shall not be received by any Widow who shall have any other Pension from the Government.
  - Art. 9.—Widows who shall re-marry after the 31st December, 1830, shall forfeit their Pensions.
- Art. 10.—The Pensions of Widows who are re-married, or may re-marry before the 31st December, 1830, shall be paid to themselves, and their Receipts shall, notwithstanding their Coverture, be deemed a sufficient discharge for the payment of their Pension.

The Widows of Boatswains, Gunners, and Carpenters, of the Royal Navy, and Warranted Masters of Naval Vessels, appointed prior to the 30th June, 1830, will, if otherwise qualified, be entitled to Pensions of £25, but no Widow of any of the above-named Warrant Officers, who shall have been Warranted after that date, shall have any claim whatever to a Pension.

RULES AND REGULATIONS RESPECTING THE APPOINTMENT, RANK, AND PAY OF ENGINEERS, UNDER HER MAJESTY'S ORDER IN COUNCIL OF THE 27th OF FEBRUARY, 1847.

Rules and Regulations as to the Appointment and Rank of Engineers.

Engineers in Her Majesty's Naval Service are to be classed in three divisions, and to be thus denominated:—

Inspectors of Machinery affoat. Chief Engineers. Assistant Engineers.

The two latter divisions are to be divided severally into three classes, namely:—

Chief Engineers of the First Class.

of the Second Class.
of the Third Class.

Assistant Engineers of the First Class.

of the Second Class.
of the Third Class.

Engineers will be considered, as at present, to belong to the civil branch of the Naval Service, and they will be appointed and rank as undermentioned:—

Inspectors of Machinery afloat will be appointed by Commission, and rank with, but after, Masters of the Fleet.

Chief Engineers will be appointed by Commission, and rank with, but after, Masters.

Assistant Engineers will be appointed by order, and rank with, but after, Second Masters.

All Engineers at present in the Service are to be continued at their present rank and denomination until they shall have been examined and found eligible for promotion into the new Establishment.

Rules and Regulations as to the Pay of Engineers.

The Pay of Engineers on the new Establishment, will be regulated under the Articles in the "Queen's Regulations" and "Admiralty Instructions," applicable to Commission Officers, except as regards the termination of their Harbour-Service Pay, and commencement of Sea Pay, which will be regulated as directed in the case of Warrant Officers, under chap. x., art. 8, page 93, of the "Queen's Regulations."

N.B. They are not to receive any additional Pay for Service within the tropics, nor any compensation in lieu of the allowance for the instruction of boys.

When Engineers borne for harbour duty may have charge of steam machinery, they are to receive Sea Pay.

When Engineers are appointed from harbourservice Pay to sea-going Ships, they will be entitled to receive three months' advance of Pay.

When Engineers are employed to execute any work, not for their own Ship, they will be allowed extra Pay (granted under the "Queen's Regulations," chap. x., sec. 4, art. 1, page 104), according to their rank.

#### QUALIFICATIONS FOR NAVAL ENGINEERS.

Inspectors of Machinery afloat.—Candidates for such appointments must be men of experience and acknowledged ability, in whose judgment, integrity, and talent, implicit reliance can be placed.

Chief Engineer – Must possess a thorough knowledge of the construction and working of marine engines and boilers in all their parts, coupled with skill and experience as a practical mechanic.

He must be se far acquainted with the elements of theoretical mechanics as to comprehend the general principles on which the machine works. He must understand how to apply the indicator, and draw the necessary conclusions from the diagrams.

He must be acquainted with the principle of expansion, and able to prove, or at least to illustrate, the advantages to be derived from the use of expansive gear.

Assistant Engineer — Must be able to keep accounts and make working sketches of engines and boilers;

and produce certificates of servitude in a factory, or other proof of his acquaintance with engine work, and of his practical abilities as a mechanic, as well as testimonials of good conduct and character.

The Second Class Assistant Engineer must have served at sea at least one year, and produce proof of his capability to work engines, &c.

The First Class Assistant Engineer must have served at sea at least two years as an Engineer, and be competent to take charge of the engines when required to do so. He must be well acquainted with the principle on which the machine works in all its parts, be able to adjust the various working parts, and set right defects which may arise in the engines and boilers.

All Engineers at present in the service are to be continued at their present rank and nomination until they shall have been examined and found eligible for promotion into the new Establishment.

# IER MAJESTY'S ORDER IN COUNCIL, DATED JULY 30, 1849, FOR THE DISTRIBUTION OF PRIZE MONEY.

(To take effect on and after January 1st, 1850.)

To flag officer or officers one sixteenth part of the hole net proceeds arising from prizes captured om the enemy, and from all other captures, seiures, &c., as aforesaid, made by any of the ships r vessels under his or their command, and of the ewards conferred for the same. When there is but ne flag officer, he shall have the entire one sixteenth; when two flag officers shall be sharing together, he chief shall have two thirds, and the other flag officer the remaining one third of the one sixteenth art; and when there shall be more than two flag officers, the chief shall receive one half of the said ne sixteenth, and the remaining half shall be equally livided among the junior flag officers. Commolores of the first class and captains of the fleet to thare as flag officers.

Provided always, That no flag officer, unless actually on board any of Our ships or vessels of war, and at the actual taking, sinking, burning, or otherwise destroying any ship or ships of war or orivateers belonging to the enemy, shall share in the distribution of any head money or bounty money granted as a reward for the taking, sinking, burning, or otherwise destroying any such ship or vessel of

he enemy.

And no flag officer, unless actually present at the capture or destruction of any pirate ship, vessel, or boat, shall be entitled to share in any distribution of the proceeds or bounty in respect of the crews of

such piratical vessels.

And no flag officer shall share in any remuneration or reward conferred or awarded to any of Our ships or vessels as salvage, unless he shall have been actually on board the ship or vessel to which the award shall be made, or have personally aided and assisted in the transaction at the time the service was rendered.

No flag officer commanding in any port in the United Kingdom shall share in the proceeds of any prizes captured from the enemy, nor in other captures, seizures, rewards, or any distributive proceeds as aforesaid, made by any ships or vessels which shall sail from or leave such port by order of the Lord High Admiral, or of Our Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral.

When ships or vessels under the command of several flag officers belonging to separate stations shall be joint captors, &c., each flag officer shall receive a proportion of the one sixteenth, according to the number of officers and men present under the command of each such flag officer; and when ships or vessels under orders from the Lord High Admiral, or from Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral, are joint captors, &c., with other ships or vessels under a flag or flags, the like regulation as to the apportionment of the flag share to the flag officer or officers is to be observed.

And with reference to these regulations it is to be noted, that a captain, commander, or other commanding officer of a ship or vessel shall be deemed

to be under the command of a flag when he shall actually have received some order from, or be acting in the execution of some order issued by a flag officer, whether he be or be not within the limits of the station of such flag officer; and in the event of his being directed to join a flag officer on any station, he shall be deemed to be under the command of such flag officer from the time when he arrives within the limits of the station, which circumstance is always to be carefully noted in the log book; and it shall be considered that he continues under the flag officer of such station until he shall have received some order directly from, or be acting in the execution of, some order issued by some other flag officer, duly authorized, or by the Lord High Admiral, or Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral.

The captain, commander, lieutenant commanding, or master commanding, or any other officer commanding any ship, sloop, or vessel of war, singly making a capture or seizure, or otherwise entitled to the distributive benefit arising from any proceeds, reward, grant, bounty, salvage, or award as aforesaid, that is to say, the officer actually in command at the time, shall have one eighth of the remainder, or if there is no flag, one eighth of the entire net proceeds; and if more than one commanding officer of the same rank of command shall be entitled to share as joint captors, &c., the one eighth shall be equally divided between them; but when captains, commanders, lieutenants commanding, and masters commanding, respectively, Our ships, sloops, and vessels of war shall share together, in whatever variety of combination, the one eighth shall be so divided into parts for a graduated apportionment as to provide for each captain receiving six parts, each commander of a sloop three parts, and each lieutenant commanding or master commanding a vessel of war two parts, which We hereby direct shall be the proportion in which they shall respectively share; commodores of the second class, and field officers of marines or of land forces serving as marines, doing duty as field officers, above the rank of major, to share as captains; and field officers of marines or of land forces serving as marines, and doing duty in the rank of major, to share as commanders of sloops.

And after provision shall thus have been made for the flag share (if any), and for the portion of the commanding officer or officers, the remainder of the net proceeds shall be distributed in ten classes, so that each officer, man, and boy composing the rest of the complements of Our ships, sloops, and vessels of war, and actually on board at the time of any such capture, seizure, &c., as aforesaid; and every person present and assisting shall receive shares, or parts of shares, according to his class, as set forth in the following scale:—

First Class—Commanders under captains in rated ships, masters of the fleet, medical inspectors, inspectors of steam machinery afloat, in or with any

ship or ships above the sixth rate, forty shares each. Second Class - First lieutenants in rated ships not bearing commanders, secretaries to admirals of the fleet or to admirals commanding in chief, deputy medical inspectors, inspectors of steam machinery afloat in or with any ship or vessel below the fifth rate, twenty-five shares each. Third Class-Sea lieutenants, masters, captains of marines, of marine artillery, or of land forces doing duty as marines. whether having higher brevet rank or not, secretaries to admirals or to commodores of the first class not commanding in chief, chief engineers of the first class, twenty shares each. Fourth Class-Lieutenants or quarter masters of marines, lieutenants of marine artillery, lieutenants, quarter masters, or ensigns of land forces doing duty as marines, secretaries to commodores of the second class, chaplains, surgeons, paymasters and pursers, naval instructors, mates, assistant surgeons, second masters, chief engineers of the second and third classes, gunners, boatswains, carpenters, assistant engineers, engineers not yet on the establishment as regulated by the Order in Council of 1847, clerks in charge, passed clerks, twelve shares each. Fifth Class-Midshipmen, master's assistants, clerks (not passed), naval cadets, clerk's assistants, seven shares each. Sixth Class-Seamen's schoolmasters, masters-atarms, chief boatswain's mates, admiral's and captain's coxswains, ship's corporals, quarter masters, gunner's, boatswain's, and carpenter's mates, captains of the forecastle, of the after-guard, of the hold, of the main top, and of the fore top, coxwains of the launch, sailmakers, ropemakers, caulkers, leading stokers, ship's cooks, blacksmiths, pilots, serjeants of marines, of marine artillery, or of land forces doing duty as marines, six shares each.

Seventh Class—Captains of the mast and mizen top, yeomen of signals, coxswains of the barge, pinnace, and cutter, second captains of the forecastle, of the main top, of the fore top, and of the after-

guard, sailmaker's and caulker's mates, paymaster's and purser's stewards, musicians, coopers, armourers, corporals of marines or of land forces doing duty as marines, bombardiers of marine artillery, head kroomen, four shares each. Eighth Class-Able seamen, carpenter's, sailmaker's, and cooper's crew, yeomen of store rooms, ordinary seamen, privates and fifers of marines, or of land forces doing duty as marines, gunners of marine artillery, painters, stokers, coal trimmers, second head kroomen, sick berth attendants, bandsmen, two shares each. Ninth Class-Cook's mates, paymaster and purser's steward's mates, paymaster and purser's steward's boys, admiral's domestics, the stewards and cooks of admirals, of captains, of the ward room, of the gun room, and of sub-officers; second class ordinary seamen, assistant stokers, barbers, tailors, landsmen, ship's boys of the first class, engineer boys, first and second class kroomen, supernumaries borne for victuals only, not specially authorized to do duty, persons borne merely as passengers, and not declining to render assistance on any occasion of capture, seizure, &c., one share and Tenth Class - Ship's one quarter of a share each. boys below the first class, three quarters of a share

Seamen gunners to share in all captures, seizures, rewards, &c., as aforesaid in the class immediately above that in which their rating is mentioned.

Supernumaries, whether officers or men, ordered to do duty on board any of Our ships or vessels by the Lord High Admiral, or by Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral, or by other proper authority (the orders of the captain or commanding officer, if no senior be present, to be deemed sufficient authority), of which due notation as to fact and authority is to be made in the muster books, shall share according to the class of their respective ranks or ratings, if not ordered to do duty in a higher capacity.

# Admiral of the Fleet.

#### Dress.

Coat. Blue cloth, double breasted, ten buttons n each row, three inches apart across the breast; white collar sloped off in front, two-inches gold lace of the Navy pattern along the top and front edges, ind one inch lace along the bottom edge, coming partly on the coat; blue cuffs, with two inch lace ound the top and down the front of cuff; white lash pointed flaps in the sleeve, with three small outtons, and one and a quarter inch lace round the dge: four rows of five eighths of an inch distinction ace round the sleeve above the cuff, at such disance from each other as place them within the ength of the slash; pointed blue flaps on the skirt, aced all round with two-inch lace, and three butous under them; a row of one and a quarter inch lace to encircle the hip buttons, and form a point above them on the seam; and bottom of lappel and front and back edges of the skirt to be laced with the same; the skirts to begin at one-fifth the circumference from the front edge, and to be lined with white kerseymere, one button at the bottom of each plait.

Buttons.—Raised, gilt, and one inch in diameter, indented with a round rim, and within, an anchor and a cable, and a crown over, between two wreaths of laurel, and small buttons to be half an inch in

iameter.

Epaulettes.—Two gold epaulettes with embroidered straps, oak leaf and acorn pattern, with pearl crescent and edging; three stars within the crescent, and one star on the strap, above it crossed batons surmounted by a crown; a double row of dead and bright loose bullions three inches and half long, and one inchand five eighths in circumference.

N.B. The devices on all Executive officers' epaulettes to be embroidered in silver according to patterns, except batons and swords, which are to be

solid.

Trowsers.—Blue cloth, with two-inch gold lace down the outside seams, to be worn over boots between the 15th Oct. and the 22nd April, and white duck over boots, between 23rd April and 14th Oct.

N.B. Commissioned officers, and Warrant officers ranking with them, shall have gold lace of the same width as that of their coats down the outside seams of their blue trowsers in dress.

Cravat or Stock .- Black silk.

Hat.—Cocked, the flaps eight and a half inches in the back, seven and a half inches in the front, five and three quarters inches at each corner, bound with gold lace two inches wide, showing one inch on each side. Black silk cockade, five inches wide, looped with six gold dead and bright bullions, three and a half eighths of an inch wide, and the two centre twisted, with a button of the same size and pattern as that of the coat; and tassels with five gold and five blue bullions each.

Sword.—The hilt solid, half basket guard, with raised bars, and crown and anchor badge, lion head back piece, white fish skin gripe, bound with three gilt wires; outside length, five inches and three quarters; inside length, four inches and a half. The blade slightly curved, thirty one inches and a quarter long, and one inch and three eighths wide at the shoulder, with a flat back, and the blade ground hollow, to within eleven inches of the end, with a double edged spear point.

Scabbard.—The top and middle lockets to be four and three inches and a half long respectively; to have loops and rings, and to be ornamented with embossed oak leaves in bas relief; the chape to be seven inches and a half long, and to have oak leaves, as above, round the upper part, and a honeysuckle

ornament at the end.

Sword Knot.—Blue and gold rope, twenty-threeinches long, with blue and gold vellum basket work head, and twelve gold bullions; a piece of the same sort of cord, fourteen inches and three quarters long, is to be fixed to the hilt, to which the knot is

Sword Belt.—Blue morocco leather, lined, full one inch and a half wide in the girdle; single, one inch wide, sword slings on carriages; the whole embroidered in gold, with oak leaves and acorns down the middle, and margined with a straight line near each edge. Gilt mountings with circular clasp in front, two inches diameter, laurel embossed edges, crown, anchor, and laurel on the centre; embossed carriage buckles, plain girdle buckles and rings, the latter one inch and three quarters diameter in the centre; and plain studs under the carriage buckles, for the more easily attaching and detaching the sword, superseding the use of swivels; a plain, strong, gilt hook attached to the ring, to suspend the sword short.

The belt to be worn over the coat.

#### Undress.

Coat.—Blue cloth, double breasted, eight buttons in each row, with stand and fall collar; pointed flaps with notched holes, and buttons under; round cuffs with three notched holes and buttons, and four rows of five eighths of an inch distinction lace round the cuffs, across the holes below the buttons.

Buttons.—Same as in dress.

Epaulettes.—Same as in dress, and also with great coats.

Waistcoats.-White cloth or kerseymere, single

breasted, with small buttons.

Trowsers.—Blue cloth, with or without gold lace on the seams. In warm climates, or on the home station in summer, Officers may wear white duck.

Cravat or Stock .- Black silk

Hat.—Same as in dress, or without lace.

Sword, Scabbard, and Sword Knot.—Same as in

Sword Belt.—Black patent leather, of the same width as in full dress, but without embroidery; the



It is of paramount importance to explain, why a steel balance-spring coated only with pure gold has great ad-

Steel, when tempered, possesses greater elasticity and tenacity than any other metal; is of easy and certain manufacture; its specific gravity is light; while its only defect is its liability to rust. Gold, on the contrary, is so soft, as to have but little elasticity, and if alloyed is liable to break in use. It is also of difficult and uncertain manufacture. Its great specific gravity when compared with steel, is a serious objection, and, when manufactured into a balance-spring, its error of rate, arising from variation of temperature, as much greater than that which takes place in steel. A proof that gold balance-springs are highly ineligible is to be deduced from the fact, that many of the old chronometers purchased by Government previously to the public trial were constructed with gold balance-springs, which were afterwards exchanged for steel ones. Besides, there is no account of a single chronometer with a gold balance-spring having been placed on the Government public trials, although hundreds of steel ones have been submitted during a space of nearly twenty years. By the patent electro-metallurgic process, the highest elastic metal receives all the protection of the durability of gold, without its surface being subjected to the slightest injury.



It is equally applicable to twenty persons as to one.

*This consists of a large oval funnel of Sheet Gutta Percha inserted in the book-board in front of the Bible, attached to this is a piece of inch-tubing, passing down on the inside of the pulpit and under the floor, like a main gas-pipe, attached to this are branches of smaller tubing, leading to any pew where a deaf person may sit; and, at the end of each is an ear-piece. You may thus supply a whole congregation, and enable all to hear without the least difficulty or effort on the part of the preacher.

### Washing Carriages, Watering Gardens, &c.

### From Mr. JAMES YOUNG, Livery Stables, Leeds.

I beg to convey to you a sense of my high approval of Gutta Percha Tubing—I have used it now for nearly two years for washing my carriages, and find it invaluable for that purpose. I have it attached to the Water Works Company's Pipe, consequently have a force of water which brings off the dirt much better than the regular process of washing with mops, &c., and has this great advantage that it does not injure the paint. I also find it extremely useful for washing out the stalls, stables, and yard.

### Extraordinary Tests of Strength.

From the WATER WORKS, Birmingham.

I have experimented upon the pieces of Gutta Percha Tubes, which Mr. Burstall forwarded to me, by placing them at the end of Service Pipes, where the constant pressure has been above 200-feet head of water, and where the ram, caused by the shutting off the flow of water suddenly, has consequently been very great. These experiments have been attended with perfect success, so far as the capability of these pipes to withstand hydraulic pressure, whether steadily or intermittently applied, is concerned. These Pipes have now been subjected to severe trials for upwards of two months, and I cannot perceive any mark of their being deteriorated. I find that the slight elasticity of these Tubes very much diminishes the action of the ram on the lead fittings to which they have been applied. J. ROFE, Engineer.

The following letter of explanation from Mr. T. BURSTALL, accompanied the above.

I enclose you Mr. Rofe's letter, and as I assisted in the above experiment, a little explanation will enable you to understand what has been done. The Tubes were \(\frac{3}{4}\)-inch bore, the material 1/8-thick; —and in addition to the trial named by Mr. Rofe, they were also tested by the Water Company's Proofing Pump, with its regular load of 250 pounds to the square inch—afterwards we added weight up to 337 pounds, and I wished to have gone to 500, but the lever of the valve would bear no more weight; we were unable to burst the pipe.

A strong man worked the pump as quick as he could, and the pulsations in the pipes were very distinct, but owing to the slight elasticity of the Gutta Percha, not the slightest permanent effect could be discovered. The joints were very simply

and easily made, and stood perfectly tight.

### Opinious of the Press.

GUTTA PERGHA TUBING.—Some very important results have just been arrived at, by a series of experiments made by the Birmingham Water Works Company, relative to the strength of Gutta Percha Tubing; with a view to its applicability for the conveyance of water. Mr. Rofe, the engineer, took a tube of three quarters of an inch diameter (the material being one-eighth thick), and having attached it to the water-main, subjected it to a pressure of two hundred-feet head of nater. It was afterwards connected with the hydraulic proofing-pump, and tested up to three hundred and thirty-seven pounds on the square inch, without bursting. The lever of the pump would bear no further pressure, but apparently, the strength of the material would have enabled it to bear five hundred pounds on the square inch. The tubing being somewhat elastic, slightly yielded to the above extraordinary pressure; but on its withdrawal, the tube returned to its original size.—Times.

If a Gutta Percha tube be carried from the deck to the mast-head of a ship, a conversation may be distinctly carried on, even during a storm between the man on the look-out and the captain. It is also useful for conversation between the helmsman and the captain whilst in the cabin.

—Journal of Commerce.

PREVENTION OF MINE ACCIDENTS.—Amongst the numerous ingenious suggestions which have been made for preventing the frequent recurrence of those fatal catastrophes by which so many hundreds of our fellow-beings are suddenly launched into eternity, Gutta Percha Tubing has been proposed, on the principle of Whishaw's Telekouphenon, or speaking telegraph. It appears to us, that this simple and economical apparatus might be the means of saving many lives, and preventing much destruction of property.—Mining Journal.

To EMIGRANTS.—Gutta Percha tubing, which being so very light, may be easily exported, will form a valuable means for supplying new settlements with water.—Standard of Freedom.

Poisoned Water.—It is not generally known to the public that the carbonic acid, or fixed air in water, decomposes lead pipes, and thereby imparts poisonous properties to the water. Within the past few months Sir Raymond Jarvis, of Ventnor, had occasion to repair the pumps which supplied his mansion, when, to his amazement, it was found that the large leaden feeding pipe was almost entirely eaten away by the water, and the interior covered with a white and poisonous crust. Sir Raymond has had the whole replaced with Gutta Percha Tubing, which, from its extraordinary alkali and acid-proof qualities, will preserve the water perfectly pure. It seems remarkable that, at the moment when our sanitary movements have commenced with so much vigour, Gutta Percha should have come to our aid, not only as a means of preserving the feet from damp and wet, but also as a medium for supplying us with the best of liquids—water, untainted by the deleterious properties which we have endured by the use of leaden pipes.—The Patent Journal.

DOMESTIC TELEGRAPH.—The extraordinary despatch of Railways and Electric Telegraphs seem to have given an impetus to the national character in economizing time in an infinite variety of ways never even dreamt of, a few years ago. A scientific member of the Society of Friends has rendered the novel material of Gutta Percha Tubing subservient to an important saving of time and footsteps in the domestic circle. In consequence of the peculiar power possessed by this Tubing for the transmission of sound, he has applied it for the conveyance of messages from the parlour to the kitchen. Even

a whisper at the parlour mouthpiece is distinctly heard when the ear is applied at the other end. Instead therefore of the servant having to answer the bell as formerly and then descend to the kitchen to bring up what is wanted, the mistress calls attention by gently blowing into the tube, which sounds a whistle in the kitchen, and then makes known her wants to the servant who is able at once to attend to them. By this means the mistress not only secures the execution of her orders in half the usual time, but the servant is saved a double journey.—Daily Nervs.

For the conveyance of sound it possesses astonishing facilities; tubes made of it conveying the slightest whisper perfectly audible from end to end—as hose for carrying water, and as a substitute for leather in pumps especially in mills and on board ships, it recommends itself-to universal adoption. It is liable to none of the accidents which attend pipes and other contrivances where fractures or the failure of sewing may take place; or if, perchance, any repair should be needed, it can be effected with the greatest ease.—Patriot.

GUTTA PERCHA TURING will be found of great advantage in ventilating the lower deck, and ship-hold; it resists the action of salt water, only becoming harder when exposed to it. A few coils of ½-inch Tubing would be serviceable where a communication was desirable with the shore, as for instance in case of shipwreck, as a conversation could by this means be carried on at very great distances, and the tubing would be found quite strong enough to convey the wretched mariner on shore.—Mercantile Journal.

This tube passes up the centre of the Monument from its base to the gallery, at which point it is upheld by a flunge, also made of Gutta Percha. It is intended for the conveyance of water, and is, we understand, highly approved by the civic authorities, being light in weight and economic in price. The above adaptation of Gutta Percha affords another striking instance of its very general applicability.—Times.

TELEKOUPHENON.—This name has been given to an ingenious application of Gutta Percha Tubing, which, it appears, is not only a valuable medium for the conveyance of water, but possesses an extraordinary power of conducting Sound. The Telekouphenon is a tube of this material which may he carried from one room or building to another, and through which a conversation may be distinctly carried on: even a whisper is heard at a considerable distance. By means of a whistle in the mouth-piece 'attention' can be called by the master in his office to the workmen, &c., in the attic, and messages given, and answers returned, as readily as though they were close to each other. The saving of time and footsteps which this speaking Telegraph will effect, both to employers and employed, must secure its extensive adoption.—Architect.


### PATENT GUTTA PERCHA TUBES.

### INSTRUCTIONS FOR MAKING JOINTS.

For Straight Tubes.—Place in boiling water the two ends which are to be joined, until they expand externally and assume a bell form. Open the tube to



its proper dimensions, if at all contracted below the bell. After all moisture is wiped off, flatten the expanded portions by gently pressing out or flattening the



the two ends. The flattened ends may be then fitted accurately, and nipped together with the thumb and finger; the flanches adhering and forming a strong and permanent union. When nearly cold, pare down the flanches with scissors to half their size if needful. If the surfaces are slightly rubbed with pure naphtha, it will ensure a firm joint.

Another Method.—Soften the two ends to be joined by means of hot water, and enlarge their calibre by an iron, or other tool, sufficiently to receive a small




piece of the same size as those to be joined. Having dried the parts which are to be united, insert a small piece of tube about the length of the diameter of those to be joined, say if half-inch tube, let the small piece be not less than half an inch long, and so on; bring the expanded ends into contact with each other, and seal them together by a warm iron, not too hot.



For the formation of an Elbow Joint.—Cut the two pieces of tube to be united, at such a slope as will form the required angle. Heat the cut edges

sufficiently to soften them, bring them accurately together with firm but gentle pressure, as it is important to avoid raising a burr in the inner side. Pinch the outer edges of the suture together, and then cool by plunging into cold water.



Wipe off all moisture, and strengthen the seam by attaching a thin slip of softened Gutta Percha round the joint.

For the attachment of a small tube to a larger one, say at a right angle with it.—Cut an opening in the side of the larger tube, the size of the tube to be inserted. From the small tube, cut off a piece one inch in length, giving one end a curved form, corresponding to the opening in the large tube; warm the edges as before directed, and apply them to the orifice of the large tube by gentle pressure, using a mandrel or other means to prevent a burr on the inner side. Take the remaining portion of tube to be joined, and having softened and expanded the end sufficiently to receive the piece previously attached, pass the enlarged mouth over the said piece, leaving a distended sticking surface twice or three times as large as the tube itself, drawing it steadily over so as to avoid a ridge or burr. Press it, whilst hot, close round the curved surface of the larger tube, which should be gently heated to receive it. Wipe down the edges with a hot iron and the junction is complete. The accompanying sketch will more fully explain the process.



Where the calibre of the tube is large, and the coat not very thin and a slight internal burr of no consequence, it is sufficient to cut the concave opening in the one pipe and the convex extremity of the other to match, so that their sectional areas shall exactly coincide and then apply them together accurately with moderate pressure, after heating as before described. The joint can be strengthened if needful by fixing a thin slip of Gutta Percha over the seam as before mentioned.

To join Gutta Percha Tubing to a Metal Pipe, &c.—Soften the end of the Gutta Percha tube in hot water—wipe off the moisture and then stretch it over the end of the metal pipe.



Keep gently and constantly pressing the Gutta Percha to the metal with the palm of the hand until it is quite cold, (which may be hastened by the pouring on of cold water), and it will form a perfect joint. No bandage or wrapping will be required, if properly done, as the Gutta Percha on cooling gradually contracts, and thus bites, or firmly grasps the metal tube.
