

Dr. Frederick B. Harris, Class of 1909, and Dr. Edward G. Latch, Class of 1921, are Chaplains of the United States Senate and the United States House of Representatives respectively.

Dr. Harris has been serving the Senate since 1944. Dr. Latch, who is also a member of the College's Board of Trustees, has been serving the House since 1965.

Of the role of the Chaplain, the President of the United States has said, "Where tradition is highly respected and plays a significant role in legislative deliberations and in shaping policy, one of the most important traditions is the daily prayer which opens the sessions.

"This moment of quiet contemplation is an important event in the lives of legislators who have so little time to devote to calm reflection. It is a pause in the day's occupation from which men who have heavy responsibilities draw strength and fortitude for the tense hours that lie ahead."

A Chaplain fulfills a role that is unique in our national life. He is the spiritual guide of many men representing the great faiths of the Western World who find that through him they share a common bond. It is a sustaining thought to realize that the daily prayer is as much a part of the legislative process as is the drafting of bills and the votes that are taken on them. A Chaplain enriches the lives of all who have listened to him. He is a constant reminder of solemn obligations and of the importance of what the Congress seeks to do.

Everett M. Dirksen, Minority Leader of the Senate, adds, "It was written centuries ago that the fervent prayers of a righteous man availeth much. What a timely answer that one sentence is to the frustrations which arise each day.

"That legislators should launch into high controversy almost every day immediately after the Chaplain's prayer is of no special significance. That is but a part of our political pattern.

"The prayer with which the day opens is so important because it lingers. Sometimes a single word out of the prayer tumbles about in the soul and energizes hope and faith. Sometimes a single phrase besieges the spirit during the day and brings comfort. One word can be truly nuclear in its effect. One phrase can dissipate concern and doubt."

The heavily freighted phrase, "This Nation Under God" becomes flesh in the communion of kindred hearts and in the witness to their faith of these praying servants of the Republic.

For nearly two centuries, Dickinson has remained committed to excellence in liberal education and eminence as a liberal arts college of national stature. Its basic purpose has been to graduate students capable of becoming responsible leaders in the church, in education, business, government and the professions. Through a continually revitalized program, a climate of open and critical inquiry, talented teachers and able students, Dickinson will continue its traditional role, consonant with the changing society.

Bologna Revisited

(Ed. Note.) Medical Economics magazine refers to Dickinson College's Center for International Studies in Bologna, Italy, as a leading junior year abroad program.

In a recent issue, the magazine described in some detail six foreign study programs, including Dickinson's, and stated that the

six are "rated outstanding by authorities in the field."

The article, titled "Give Your Child a Chance to Study Abroad?", holds that a term at a foreign university can be a rewarding experience for any student under the right program and instructs parents on how to choose a program wisely.

In addition to Dickinson's, the article lists programs operated by the University of Kansas, Syracuse University, Vanderbilt

University, Sweet Briar College, and Drew University.

The Dickinson center began its fourth year September 2 with a record enrollment and an expanded curriculum.

INTRODUCTION

The turbulence in Poland and Czechoslovakia in recent months has a special significance for nine students who attended Dickinson's Center for International Studies in Bologna, Italy in the 1967–68 academic year. During the Christmas holidays these students visited Prague, Warsaw, Moscow, and other cities in East Europe and Russia. What they saw and heard is in part recorded in the accompanying articles, which are best described in the words of one of the students, Beverly Rich:

"Our tour of Russia and Eastern Europe was a highly personal experience. Each of us began the trip with preconceived ideas of what these countries and their people are like. We noticed and remembered different things as we went sightseeing and we spoke with different people in these countries. Consequently, we each returned with our personal impressions of the countries and the people. The remarks that follow are simply that-each Dickinson student's thoughts and impressions arose from meetings and conversations with Russians, Poles, Czechs, and Hungarians."

GENERAL DESCRIPTIVE

Future Christmas vacations will always evoke memories of experiences behind the Iron Curtain for nine students who were at the Dickinson Center for International Studies in Bologna, Italy during the 1967–68 academic year. These students spent their holidays on a 19-day tour of Russia and Eastern Europe. Although the weather was usually far below zero and the accommo-

dations would not have qualified for a Michelin rating, the tour was both enlightening and interesting.

Forty American college students studying in Europe participated in this program which was arranged by an Italian student travel association. The itinerary included Prague, Warsaw, Moscow, Leningrad, Kiev, and Budapest. At each border, a new national guide met the group and accompanied it until the next border. These guides were exceptionally competent, spoke English fluently and since most were also students, shared many common interests with the members of the American group.

In all of the cities there were the usual tours of museums and monuments. A few of these sights were rather obscure but most were world famous. Among the more memorable visits were those to the Kremlin, Lenin's Tomb, and the Hermitage.

In addition to the ordinary type of sightseeing, the stops in the various cities furnished other experiences of a less predictable nature. After several days in historic Prague, Warsaw was a startling contrast. The city resembles a frontier town. Since 85% of the town was rebuilt after World War II, the buildings are new—and identical.


Several days behind the Iron Curtain were sufficient to reveal the heterogeneity of the Soviet bloc. This was never clearer than in Warsaw where criticisms of the U.S.S.R. were frequent and forceful. The mutual feelings between the Polish and Russian nations are very similar to those reciprocal attitudes currently held between the French and the Americans.

The five days in Moscow included Christmas Day and absolutely none of the Christmas spirit. Nonetheless, the stay was filled with activities which more than compensated for the untraditional holiday. There were many sightseeing tours, trips through the Metro, a Christmas Eve party at the American Embassy (not part of the Soviet-planned activity schedule), and an unforgettable opening night concert of the National Winter Arts Festival which was held in the new Palace of Congresses building inside the Kremlin.

Although it was extremely cold and there were only a few hours of dismal daylight each day, Leningrad had an undeniable charm and dignity. The

The architecture is distinctive and colorful in this former Russian capital. In addition to the tours of the art and historical museums, there was a hastily arranged visit to a Russian wedding palace—a recent Soviet innovation which attempts to add meaning and prestige to the civil marital ceremony. The "palace" was simply an ordinary building in a residential district. However, the interior had been efficiently divided into waiting rooms, a wedding chamber, and a reception room. The wedding rites were literally performed with production line practices. While one couple was inside the nuptial chamber, another awaited its turn outside. Our visit included the opportunity to witness one of the fiveminute ceremonies in which a female civil official read the marital oaths to a young couple in the presence of their immediate families. During the thirtyto-forty minute span in which we were at the palace, more than ten weddings were in progress—and this was at 5:00 P.M. on a Friday afternoon!

THE Ukranian city of Kiev resembled the other Russian cities in its impersonal architecture. However, its climate was much more temperate than that of Moscow or Leningrad and the city is

surrounded by collective farms. The most interesting experience in Kiev was a New Year's Eve party-Ukranian style and with several hundred Ukranians also celebrating. Although the party officially started at 11:00 P.M., it did not reach its peak until four hours later. Midnight was calm by American standards with a broadcast by radio from Red Square and a round of toasts. For the remainder of the party, the Ukranians became more energetic as the Americans grew more exhausted. At 3:00 A.M., after 4 hours of various smorgasbord delicacies, a full-course dinner appeared followed by gigantic dishes of homemade ice cream. By 4:30 the Ukranians were still dancing wildly and downing straight vodka as the last Americans made their exit.

A VISIT TO LENIN'S TOMB

Lenin's Tomb in Red Square is a rather attractive building. From the outside it looks like five or six slabs of red stone piled haphazardly in a pyramid. Perhaps one hundred feet long on a side, the top Russian dignitaries review troops from it on festive occasions. It does not really fit Red Square with the thick walls of the Kremlin jammed behind it, a large department store across from it, and Byzantine St. Basil's Cathedral diagonal to it. Nevertheless, it is unquestionably the heart of Russia.

The sky was overcast and threatened snow the morning I saw the Tomb. As foreign guests, we forty American students were permitted to step in front of the line waiting to enter. Our Russian guides collected all cameras and pocket-books before we could proceed inside; they said there had been a bomb some months before. Two by two we descended a flight of steps into the tomb. Russian honor guards saw that we all removed our hats, walked briskly, and kept our arms at our sides.

Some Western correspondents report having seen Russians cross themselves in Lenin's presence. That I cannot verify, but I do know no talking was permitted.

Lenin is preserved in a large glass coffin. His skin was the first thing I noticed. It seemed yellow and slightly cracked. He wore a suit with a blanket up to his chest. His eyes were closed, yet I felt he was only sleeping, that he

could still awaken from his forty year rest. We circled the corpse and filed out. The bus was waiting so we boarded immediately. Yet I looked back once more.

About three thousand Russians waited patiently to complete their pilgrimage. They waited silently in line. It was ten below zero Fahrenheit that morning.

STUDENT PROTEST IN RUSSIA

Because we are members of the generation that is most active in various protest movements in our own country, one of the first questions we asked the University of Moscow students was if they engaged in any similar types of protests directed either against the University or their government. Their answer was an unequivocal "No"—they did not protest because there was nothing with which they were dissatisfied. This response startled me. Surely, I thought, there are always things that need changing and might therefore merit a protest.

An American who views and classifies the world in black and white terms might naturally interpret these student responses as evidence of their regimented life and fear of disagreeing with the government. Perhaps there is some truth to this, but one thing we Americans should realize is that most Russians are sincerely convinced of the virtue of socialism. They are convinced that their government is peaceloving and that Communism is the best system for them—after all, one cannot deny that their lives have improved a great deal over the last fifty years.

ASKED the students if they were satisfied with the recent trials of the writers Sinyavski and Daniel. I was sure that similar trials in the U.S. would have prompted a wave of protest across our country, claiming that such trials were uncalled for and demanding that the crimes of the writers be clearly defined. Granted, there was some protest in Russia against the trials, but it was minimal. The students did not offer their opinions about the trials but instead answered by asserting that in

the U.S. as well as in Russia, government censorship exists. I asked them if they had ever heard of *MacBird*. No, they hadn't. That ended that discussion.

Many Soviet students were of the opinion that the various civil rights and Vietnam protests, the hippy movement, etc., in America were obvious indications of the complete failure of the American system. Whereas I have always thought of most protests as constructive measures within the American system that hopefully help us to make the best decisions and choices, these students saw them as revolts against the American system.

I have found several possible interpretations as to why Soviet students have such a conception of the nature and purpose of American protest movements. First of all, following the Marxist-Leninist tradition, these students (and probably most Russians), take a class-conscious view of history. I was stunned by the warmth and friendliness of the Russians I met on the street and in subways toward me and toward the American people in general. I knew that such a spirit of friendliness did not have much of a counterpart among American people in their attitudes toward Russians. I realized how such a spirit could exist among the Soviet people when our discussions hit upon the subject of foreign affairs. In their view: "the aggressive enemy that has encircled the USSR with air and missile bases, that has attacked the innocent people of North Vietnam, that has formed an alliance with the dangerous and revenge-seeking nation of West Germany, is not the American people, but the ruling class of America, those people in Wall Street and the Pentagon who profit from the arms race." In the light of class struggle, the protests in America are seen as protests of the people against the ruling elite who represent the government. They are thus protests of the masses against the entire American system.

In this dimension in which any protest is seen as a protest against the entire system, it would be difficult for the Soviet students to empathize with my understanding of the significance of protest. That is, I see protest as a method of emphasizing a specific concern within the system that ought to be changed in order to improve the system as a whole. Furthermore, if the Soviets see protest as revolt against the entire system, then their abstention from pro-

test could be justified as a desire not to overthrow their entire system.

On the other hand, I could refute this whole argument by claiming that perhaps the Soviet students really do protest in certain ways and yet did not want to admit that they do so to us Americans. I could say that the students said that they were satisfied and had no need to protest because of their understanding of American conceptions of Soviet citizens. That is, perhaps these students thought that most Americans view the Soviet people as poor, in rags, and ready to rebel and overthrow their oppressive system. Believing this, the students might have wanted to emphasize to us that this is not the case, that their lives are good, and that they appreciate their communist system—thus the students were motivated to claim that there is nothing with which they are dissatisfied.

These diverse interpretations illustrate, and are themselves consequences of, the basic problem: Soviets and Americans have different perceptions of each other and different conceptions of how the other perceives himself. When Soviets and Americans get together hardly a statement is made which is not influenced by these perceptions and conceptions. How do we communicate?

ATTITUDES IN POLAND AND RUSSIA

Among the nations of eastern Europe, Poland has one of the longer records of relative independence from the Russian party line. Yet other than the comparatively small and abortive uprising in '53 it has not openly rebelled against Soviet rule as did Hungary in '56. Possibly because of this fact the Poles were more openly critical of Russia, and to some extent Communism itself, than any other country we visited.

Generally the Polish system was accepted as a sound one, especially among the youth. The Russians, however, didn't fare so well, and here it was youth that lead the attack. Shortly after we left there was a students' demonstration against a ban of a film depicting a Polish uprising against Czarist Russia. Polish feeling was also illustrated by anecdotes such as the following: In the middle of Warsaw, surrounded by spacious grounds, is the only skyscraper in the city. A gift of

Stalin, it is built in the heavy Socialist Realist architecture characteristic of many buildings in Moscow. The skyscraper is recommended by the Poles as the place from which to see Warsaw, because then one is not burdened with looking at the building itself. The joke springs more from the bitterness about Russia's role in the post-war period than from the ugliness of the building.

At the end of World War II when the Nazis retreated, Hitler ordered Warsaw leveled to the ground. His generals carried out his orders well enough to leave it 85% destroyed, with the older center of town over 90% leveled. The Poles set about after the war to rebuild, at first just aiming at providing housing and other necessary facilities to keep the city functioning. Later, however, they turned remarkably successfully to rebuilding the center of town as it had been in 1939. The Poles impress visitors with the fact that they did all this themselves, and they are rather bitter at the way the Russians brushed off the project. The USSR did indeed aid Poland, but mainly in the field of heavy industry, which many Poles feel was more for Russia's good than Poland's. The only other thing the Russians donated was Stalin's building which, including the required amount of surrounding space, covered an area where 30,000 people had formerly lived.

Such manifestations of substantial Polish resentment toward the USSR prompted this question as I left Warsaw for Moscow: "What is the Russian reaction?" To a great extent the reaction was simple bewilderment. A large percentage of Russian youth hasn't travelled outside the Soviet Union and hears only about their trusting neighbors the Poles. To these people the idea that the Polish youth resent Russia just doesn't ring true.

Even our Russian guide, a student who has travelled extensively including time in Poland, was bewildered. She had seen and acknowledged the resentment but couldn't imagine what the reason for it was: after all the USSR had done for the Poles—liberating them from Nazi oppression, building up their industry, and protecting them from revanchist German militarism (there is still much genuine fear of a resurgent Germany in Eastern Europe, especially in Russia itself)—how could the Poles turn so ungratefully on the Russians? In Poland we had heard complaints

from students who had to take Russian as a second language. Our guide couldn't imagine why they didn't jump at the opportunity to learn a foreign language as she had been delighted to learn English. She seemed unconcerned that the main complaint of the Polish students was that they had to learn Russian rather than, say, French or English.

HERE was a general flavor to the situation I had observed-Polish resentment and Russian bewildermentthat to some small extent gave me the feeling I had heard it all before. An American goes to West Europe expecting to be treated as a friend of long standing, if not greeted with gratefully open arms. After all, his country not only liberated West Europe in World War II, but also has been its protector against Soviet aggression since then. What he finds is resentment, caused to a great extent by that protective role, which is looked upon by many Europeans as more dominance than protection. Moreover, there is a resentment at being "Americanized" by all the American traits, habits, and products that have followed the soldiers to Europe. Thus there appears in some respect to be a "mirror image" set up between the two halves of Europe and their respective superpower allies.

While the Western attitude to Russia is one of only mild curiosity, the American visitor to Poland is virtually attacked with a battery of questions about the U.S. To a great degree this desire for knowledge of America arises from the great number of Polish immigrants in America. Everybody one talks to seems to have a cousin or aunt someplace in Pennsylvania or Wisconsin. But there also seems to be a separate sense of envy, a feeling that no matter what the newspaper says about this faraway country, to be so rich it must have done something right for its people. Thus the Poles have been to some extent communized, but not Russianized or even made good pan-Slavs. The very intensity of their own nationalism causes them to look outside the Communist bloc with envy because most of them are realistic enough to know that the amount of freedom they can hope for is only a matter of degree.

COMMENCEMENT 1968

THE College's graduating class went out into the world with the assurance by the commencement speaker that the world was not so very bad despite the war in Vietnam, racial troubles and the plight of the poor.

In fact, said James Reston, the political analyst, this year's crop of college graduates "are a comparatively

lucky lot."

The noted New York Times columnist and executive editor told Dickinson's largest class that their parents got out of college "(if in fact they had the chance to go to college) in the middle of the most savage war in the history of the human race."

The grandfathers and grandmothers of today's graduates were confronted with the First World War. Also, in those days, Mr. Reston added, "college presidents punished students, instead of the other way around."

Compared to the two world wars, the Vietnam war "is a walk in the sun," he told the class of 363 men and women.

"So misery is a comparative thing," he said. "We have problems today, God knows, but if we look at them in historic terms, they are not all that bad."

The ills of the world today, said the writer, must be laid to the new scientific revolution and the population explosion rather than to the shortcomings of world leaders.

"The politicians are not creating the economic, political and social revolutions of our time. These revolutions are being created by the fertility of the human mind and the human body.

"Wherever you look today you find the leading political figures of the world rushing around madly trying to deal with the consequences of the new scientific revolution and the fantastic growth of the human family."

He cited the efforts of the key leaders of the U.S., England, France, Russia and other nations to find solutions in this or that economic system or scheme.

"We have tried to deal with all this with a kind of modified Capitalism, but while we have learned to create wealth we still haven't learned how to distribute it fairly," said Mr. Reston.

He was heard by what college officials said was the largest commencement audience in Dickinson annals. In the face of treat of rain, the exercises were held outdoors in front of West College. Over 2000 seats were filled and many scores stood. There was a patch or two of blue overhead as the colorful academic procession came up the main walk of the campus, but rumbles of thunder punctuated Mr. Reston's talk and dark clouds gathered. The threat passed as the seniors in long lines marched to the roster for their diplomas and the sun shone as Chaplain Paul Kaylor pronounced the benediction.

Dr. Howard L. Rubendall, president of the college, presided over his seventh

Dickinson commencement. He and Dean Samuel H. Magill personally handed diplomas to the seniors.

Esther I. Friedman, Glen Burnie, Md. and Stephen Marini, Springfield, Pa., graduated at the head of the class and William F. Maletz, Allentown, Pa., and Karen E. Smith, Kutztown, received the Hufstader Prizes as the senior man and woman who made the greatest contribution to the college over the four years.

Graduating summa cum laude with Miss Friedman and Marini were Brian A. Bouch, Ventnor, N. J.; Marcia L. Ettinger, Wheaton, Md.; Janet L. Proctor, Bethlehem; Nancy E. Snell, Coraopolis; Linda J. Spielman, Huntington Valley, and Philip Sze, Washington, D. C.

The summa cum laude and magna cum laude graduates were presented with the membership key of Phi Beta Kappa by Prof. William H. Wishmeyer, president of the Dickinson chapter of the scholarship society.

Milton E. McDonnell graduated cum laude and with honors in physics. In all 34 graduates earned departmental honors, a record number reflecting the new emphasis on independent study and honors programs at the College.

The presence of General of the Army Harold K. Johnson and members of his staff and a concert by the First Army Band gave commencement a military flavor.

Gen. Johnson, chief of staff of the U.S. Army, gave the address at the ROTC commissioning exercises, then pinned the bars of a lieutenant on his son, Robert, who received a regular army commission. Gen. Johnson remained for the graduating exercises that followed.

These ROTC seniors were recognized as Distinguished Military Graduates: Johnson, Thomas Bowen, Bernard D. French, Henry Kenderdine, William Lloyd, Thomas McCormick, Douglas McGaw, Joyce Padgett, Thomas H. Reese, Stephen D. Reynolds, Floyd Smith, Ronald Vican and John Wright.

In all 29 members of the class received commissions.

ALUMNI DAY, with Old Grads, led by the many classes holding formal reunions on the weekend, held the spotlight.

They heard of the election of a new trustee, John S. Snyder, Scarsdale, N. Y., Class of 1933, and hailed the announcement that Samuel J. McCartney, West Orange, N. J., Class of 1941, led the mail balloting for alumni trustee for a 4-year term. He succeeded Winfield C. Cook, '32, who had completed his second consecutive 4-year term, the maximum time permitted to serve under the Alumni Association's constitution.

Snyder, a New York City book publisher, was chairman of the successful Annual Giving campaigns the past three years. McCartney is a past president of the Dickinson Alumni Association. He has also been Annual Giving chairman.

Election of seven persons to the Alumni Council was announced. They are Walter E. Beach, '56, Washington, D. C.; Mary K. Breene, '40, Oil City; Guy F. Goodfellow, '50, Chestertown, Md.; John D. Hopper, '48, Camp Hill; G. Harold Keatley, '27, Washington, D. C.; Arthur R. Mangan, '37, Camp Hill; Thomas V. Zug, '33, Haverford.

THE board of trustees at their commencement meeting reelected all board officers. They are Samuel W. Witwer, Chicago, president; Carl C. Chambers, Philadelphia, vice president; Rev. Dr. F. LaMont Henninger, Harrisburg, secretary, and George Shuman, Jr., treasurer.

Dr. Myron F. Wicke, Nashville, Tenn., a leading Methodist educational authority, was the baccalaureate preacher.

Dickinson conferred five honorary

degrees at the graduation exercises. Reston, the speaker, and John Hope Franklin, Chicago, eminent Negro historian, received the Doctor of Laws degree. John Lear, science editor of the Saturday Review, was made an honorary Doctor of Science. The Doctor of

Literature degree was conferred on Germaine Bree, literary critic and scholar, and the Doctor of Sacred Theology honorary on Dr. Wicke of Nashville, Tennessee, a leading Methodist Educational Authority, the baccalaureate speaker.

ALUMNI COUNCIL MINUTES

President Howard L. Rubendall and Samuel W. Witwer, president of the Board of Trustees, were introduced and brought official greetings to the Council.

Chairman Harry E. Hinebauch reported one new alumni club formed at Syracuse, N. Y.

ALUMNI TRUSTEE

Roy Kuebler delivered his "Critique" of the meeting of the Board of Trustees. Included were reports concerning the renovations of East College and Bosler Hall, as well as the planned construction of an additional dormitory and an auditorium-fine arts center. He identified the two major problems facing a liberal arts college today as (1) financial survival and (2) student unrest. Present college endowment and current operating budget were discussed relative to problem number one. Relative to problem number two, it was reported that an Ad Hoc Committee had been appointed by the President of the Board of Trustees to study ways to improve

communication among students, faculty, and administration.

ALUMNI PUBLICATIONS

Chairman William Harland suggested that consideration be given to increasing the number of issues of the *Dickinson Alumnus* and to enlarging its content. Discussion of costs involved followed. The matter was referred to the Alumni Secretary for further study.



India Institute Inter-Cultural Study

On August I Dickinson's first venture in non-Western academic field study, the 1968 India Institute, became airborne for three weeks of intensive cultural and iconographic analysis in central and southern India. The itinerary included trips to India's most significant religious and artistic monuments in Delhi, Banaras, Calcutta, Bhubaneswar, Konarak, Puri, Madras, Mahabalipuram, and Bombay.

The Institute was designed to: 1) study India's religious traditions-especially Hinduism, Jainism, and Buddhism; 2) make a detailed analysis of the ways in which these traditions have been expressed in India's art; 3) study selected art works, monuments, temples, etc. with particular attention to iconographic and stylistic development; 4) demonstrate how art and religion can be viewed as a single coherent phenomenon in India. Since 1964 Dickinson has required its graduates to take at least one course in non-Western studies. Hence, the Institute can be viewed as a logical extension of South Asian studies into a primary research area.

The Institute was molded around an advanced course in the history of religions and independent studies in fine arts. During the first half of the summer the participants read an extensive

bibliography in preparation for their orientation program at Dickinson beginning July 21. During the orientation period three seminars were held daily in which each of the areas visited were studied in detail. Books were left behind in Carlisle for the field trip and the entire time in India was spent directly experiencing her past and present. Each student took a comprehensive examination, prior to departure, on the bibliography and orientation material. During and following the field trip the students worked on a carefully defined Independent Study project.

The staff was composed of Professor Hilbert Sabin of the Fine Arts department and Professor Ralph Slotten, who is a specialist in the history and phenomenology of religion; Mrs. Sabin, who has done graduate work in Indian culture and spent considerable time in India completed the trio. Professor Sabin's background includes a special Ford Foundation grant for the study of Hindu architecture and sculpture. Both Professors Sabin and Slotten are part of a growing number of Dickinson's faculty who feel that direct experience with other cultures is essential for a liberal education in the twentieth

According to Professor Merle Alls-

house, Associate Dean of the College, who conceived of the India Institute program, "this was really a pilot project and barely a beginning for Dickinson's potential in inter-cultural study." When the program was on the drawing board other institutions-Bucknell, Franklin & Marshall, Gettysburg, and Wilson-were eager to co-sponsor the project with at least moral and recruitment support for the first year. These four institutions, with Dickinson, represent a new consortium of Pennsylvania colleges which has begun to talk about various forms of cooperative programming. The India Institute was the first concrete program to emerge. Dean Allshouse anticipates that with the initiative provided by Dickinson this year the India Institute has a good chance of becoming a permanent part of the five-College Consortium program. Additional support for the program can be anticipated from the University of Pennsylvania in view of her eagerness to cooperate with these five colleges through her South Asian and Oriental Studies programs. A student who became interested in Asian studies as a result of the Institute could complete his senior year in Penn's South Asian or Oriental Studies program, receive a Dickinson degree, and already be one





Fund Keeps In Step; Malcolm Fellows, Rush Associates, and John Dickinson Society Gain Members

Generally increased gifts and unprecedented participation enabled the 1968 Dickinson Fund to meet a goal that earlier in the decade would have seemed impossible. The Fund total of \$266,653, represented a substantial gain over the previous high. Alumni annual giving increased 20 per cent and gifts to the Parents Fund reflected a 34 per cent increase.

year into his graduate work. Future Institutes, spawned from these schools, could range from a study of contemporary Indian economics to archeological digs at Mohenjo-daro. There is potential within the combined consortium faculties for similar institute programs in East Asia, Japan, and Latin America.

The India Institute members represented the full spectrum of Dickinson—three carefully selected entering freshmen, eight upperclassmen, three faculty wives, and the staff. Students were se-

lected on the basis of past travel experience, maturity, and academic performance. The cost of the entire program including course tuition, room and board at Dickinson, and the field trip was \$1445. Three participants received substantial NDEA loan or aid grants. Dean Allshouse noted that all such special programs should be funded in such a way that they are open to all qualified applicants regardless of financial need, but we need more public recognition of the importance of such

travel-study programs before that is possible. He said, "It is especially significant that Dickinson has had the courage to enter a program such as this in a day when, ironically, federal and private support for international education is on the wane, but our own national integrity depends more than ever on a thorough grasp of other cultures." (ED. NOTE—A final report on the Institute, authored by Dean Allshouse, will follow in the next issue of the Dickinson Alumnus.)

The death of Eva Cass Jahn, '07, marked the end of an era in California in which she was known as "Mrs. Republican."

Mrs. Jahn's interest in politics began in the 30's and included county committeeships, State Central Committeeships, public relations assignments and organization responsibilities. She considered working in politics an act of patriotism and always encouraged young men and women to take an active part in political business.

A member of Pi Beta Phi sorority and numerous boards of directors, she held as her most endearing memory of her years in politics a state dinner in her honor at which Former Governor Goodwin J. Knight officiated. The state legislature presented her with a commendation and awarded her the affectionate title of "Mrs. Republican."

1921 Mrs. Fleurette deBerri Walker, wife of PAUL WALKER, editor of the *Harrisburg Home Star*, died on July 21 at the Polyclinic Hospital, Harrisburg, after a brief illness. A native of Paris, France, Mrs. Walker wrote a column in the weekly paper.

1904 GEORGE E. MARK, SR., of Media, died on March 15 at the age of 93 years. His career took him from Sewickley, as supervising principal, to Lansdowne Public Schools in the same capacity. He was a professor of English at Shippensburg State College until 1942, after which time he taught at Dickinson College for a few years, and then

went to the faculty of Pennsylvania Military College, where he taught until he reached the age of 75 years. He received master's degrees from the University of Pittsburgh and the University of Pennsylvania in the fields of English, education and psychology. Mr. Mark was a frequent contributor to many educational publications. In addition to his wife, he is survived by two sons: Dr. GEORGE E. MARK, JR., '32, and WIL-LIAM R. MARK, Esq., '34; a daughter, a granddaughter, JANE E. JACKSON, '64, and a grandson, GEORGE E. MARK, III, '65.

1907 The Honorable ROBERT F. RICH, retired industrialist who served as a Republican congressman during the Democratic New Deal, died on April 28 at the Jersey Shore Hospital after an extended illness at the age of 84 years. He joined the family business, Woolrich Woolen Mills, in 1907, serving as president from 1930 to 1960. He was a delegate to the Republican National Convention in 1924 and served as a member of the United States Congress from 1930 to 1950, representing the 17th Pennsylvania District. Mr. Rich was elected a Trustee of Dickinson and was a Life Member of the Board at the time of his death. He was also a Life Member of the General Alumni Association. He was a member and president of the Board of Trustees of Lycoming College and of its predecessor institution, Dickinson Seminary and Junior College. An active Methodist lavman, Mr. Rich served regularly as lay delegate to the Central Pennsylvania Conference. In addition to his widow, he is survived by four daughters and three step-children.

1912 WILLIAM S. BLACK, retired educator, died at his home in St. Petersburg, Florida, on April 12 at the age of 78 years. He began his career as a teacher and assistant principal at Rockaway High School, then spent five years at Newton High

School, where he became acting principal. After three years at Asbury Park High School, he was named principal of Dover High School in 1921. While he lived in Dover, Delaware, Mr. Black was a charter member of the Kiwanis Club, a member of the Memorial Presbyterian Church, of which he was a trustee, the New Jersey Educational Association and the advisory committee of the New Jersey Athletic Commission. He is survived by two sons, six grandsons and a great-granddaughter.

1914 RUSSELL C. GROSS, of East Orange, New Jersey, died in Orange Memorial Hospital on June 6 at the age of 75 years. Mr. Gross was self-employed as a pneumatic engineer. He worked as a consultant for ten years for a number of large companies before his retirement in 1958. He was director of the Compressed Air Institute. He was editor and chief contributor to the book, Chambersburg: Its Records and Its Prospects, which was published by the Chamber of Commerce, and was a contributor of other published articles. He was honored by the Medical Society of Franklin County, Wilson College and the Exchange Club. In addition to his widow, he is survived by a son, RICHARD M. NICKLAS, '44, and a grandson.

1921 FRANK GEES BLACK. a member of the faculty at the University of Oregon for more than 30 years, died in the Sacred Heart General Hospital, Eugene, Oregon, after a lengthy illness at the age of 70 years. Although he retired in March, he continued as a professor of English on a part-time basis at the University. Prior to joining Oregon's faculty in 1936, he had taught at the State University of Iowa, Beloit College and Harvard University. He had earned a master's and a doctorate from Harvard and had taken graduate work at Yale. A past president of the Philological Association of the Pacific Coast and of the Oregon Chapter of the AAUP, his chief research interests were the 17th century and the novel as a literary form. At the time of his death, a book on which he had worked for 19 years, The Papers of George Julian Harney, was being printed at a London press. He was the author of The Epistolary Novel of the 18th Century, and a number of articles for literary and educational journals. He was a member of Phi Kappa Sigma Fraternity. In addition to his widow, he is survived by two daughters.

1923 Dr. STANFORD W. MULHOLLAND, who had been making his home in the Virgin Islands since entering semiretirement in 1964, died at the home of his daughter in Kingsport, Tennessee, on June 27 at the age of 66. Dr. Mulholland had been scheduled to undergo open heart surgery in Mayo Clinic during the fall. He was a former professor of urology at Woman's Medical College and also served on the staff of the Veterans Administration Hospital in Philadelphia and was chief of neurology at St. Luke's Childrens Medical Center. He was stationed at Charles Harwood Memorial Hospital, Christiansted, St. Croix, Virgin Islands. He graduated from the University of Pennsylvania Medical College, the University of Michigan and earned a master of science degree at Mavo Foundation Clinic. A life member of the General Alumni Association, he was a member of Theta Chi Fraternity. In addition to his widow, he is survived by two daughters, and a son, Dr. S. GRANT MULHOLLAND, '58, and five grandchildren.

1925 EDWIN W. TOMP-KINS, SR., long active in local and state affairs, died on April 12 at Andrew Kaul Memorial Hospital in St. Marys, where he had been a patient for two weeks, at the age of 67. Mr. Tompkins was three-time Republican whip of the State House of Representatives. He served in the House from 1947 through 1962, during which time he was a member of the Rules Committee, the Pardon Board Investigating Committee, Republican Policy

Committee, "Watch Dog" Committee, Budget and Finance Committee and the Constitutional Revision Committee. In 1963 he was elected by the General Assembly as director of the Legislative Reference Bureau. A practicing attorney for 40 years, Mr. Tompkins served as Cameron County District Attorney from 1930 until his election to the House in 1947. 1930 DR. PAUL E. SMITH died at his home on March 15 at the age of 59. He was an executive officer with the National Education Association's committee on international relations. American University awarded him his Masters degree in 1937 and Catholic University awarded him the Doctor of Philosophy in 1942. From 1943 to 1952 Dr. Smith served with the Office of Education as assistant director and then director of the Division of International Education. GER, of Glenolden, died at his home on July 13 at the age of 52 years. He was a driver education instructor at Chester High School where he served for 22 years. He formerly taught history at Glen-Nor High School. He was a member of the Pennsylvania State Education Association and the National Education Association. Mr. Grainger was a former president of the Pennsylvania Association for Safety Education; Delaware County Presidents Board, Department of Classroom Teachers of Southeastern Pennsylvania; the Delaware County Safety Council and President of the Chester Education Association. He contributed to several books on driver education and had served as president of the Interboro Chapter of the American Field Service Program. A member of Beta Theta Pi Fraternity, he was also a member and deacon of the Glenolden Congregational Church and a teacher of the Men's Bible Class. He is survived by his widow; a daughter, Mrs. LINDA GRAINGER TREV-LYN, '63, and his mother.

1960 JOHN S. GORDON died at his home near Clemson, South Carolina. Mr. Gordon was an assistant professor of political science at Clemson, where he began teaching in 1963. He had done graduate study at Bologna University in Italy and at Duke University where he was a doctoral candidate. He was a member of the American Political Science Association, American Academy of Political and Social Science, the American Society of International Law and Pi Sigma Alpha and Pi Gamma Mu, national honorary fraternities. He is survived by his father, a brother and a sister.

Bishop Newell Snow Booth of the Harrisburg Area United Methodist Church, a member of the College's Board of Trustees, died recently following a period of hospitalization.

He was appointed episcopal administrator of the Methodist Harrisburg Area in 1964, after 34 years of service in Africa.

Bishop Booth went to the Belgian Congo as a missionary in 1930. In 1944, he was elected bishop with authority in Mozambique, South Africa, Angola, Southern Rhodesia and the Belgian Congo.

As Bishop of Harrisburg, he had spiri-

tual and administrative leadership of the Central Pennsylvania Annual Conference, which includes 627 Midstate churches with 132,714 full members and 31,935 preparatory members.

Besides his membership in the Methodist Council of Bishops, the Northeastern Jurisdiction College of Bishops, Bishop Booth held membership on three boards and commissions at the national level of the Methodist Church—before it merged with EUB.

His son-in-law, Professor Frederick P. Ferré, chairs the Department of Philosophy at the College.




