Happenings of the World Tensely Told

Warner E. Farmer, twenty-three, was hurried to death at Chattanooga, Tenn., when a building containing a ton of dynamite exploded in the automobile.

Nearly 40,000 immigrants have entered the United States since July 1, the majority coming from Italy, Russia, the United Kingdom, Germany, Greece and Czechoslovakia, Washington reports.

Washington

By a vote of 80 to 20 the senate in Washington refused to limit to ten percent any volume of the duty on tobacco, cigars, cigars, tobacco and similar wares.

A bill introduced in the senate concerning the tax and interest commission to fix and regulate the rate of interest on loans made by the federal reserve bank, officials at Washington said.

Declaring the federal coal distribution committee cannot assume the coal price, the senate in Washington refused to pass a bill authorizing the distribution of coal to the states.

Representative Charles E. Rindley of Akron, O., announced at Washington, he would resign from congress because of the administration's policy to strip ship subsidies and tariff legislation.

Establishment of a special railroad court of six members to regulate the federal reserve bank, officials at Washington said.

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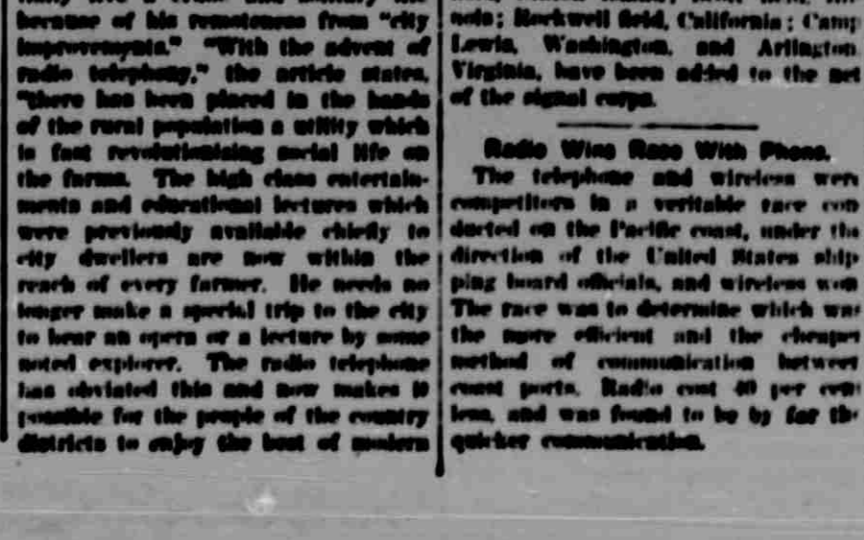
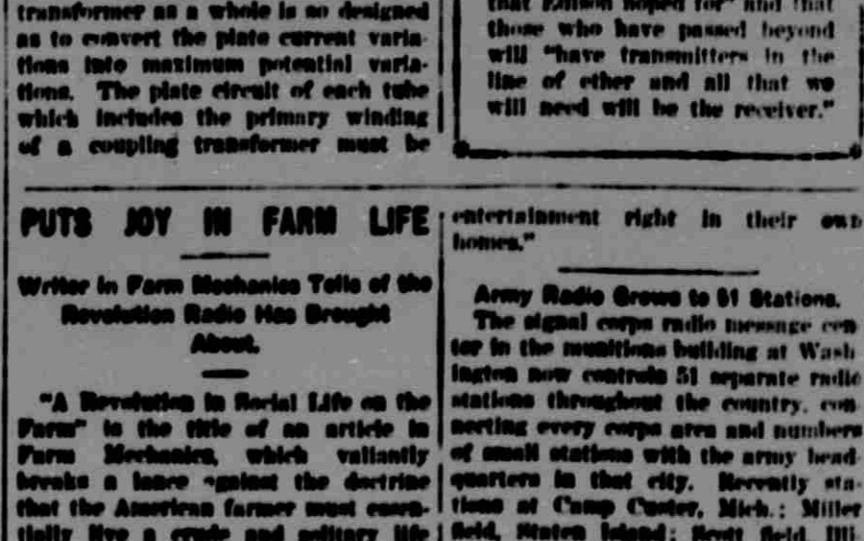
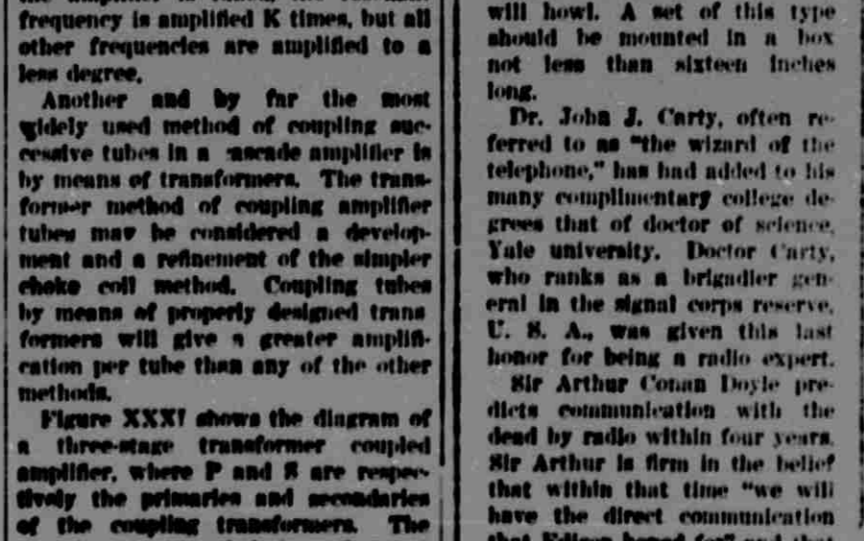
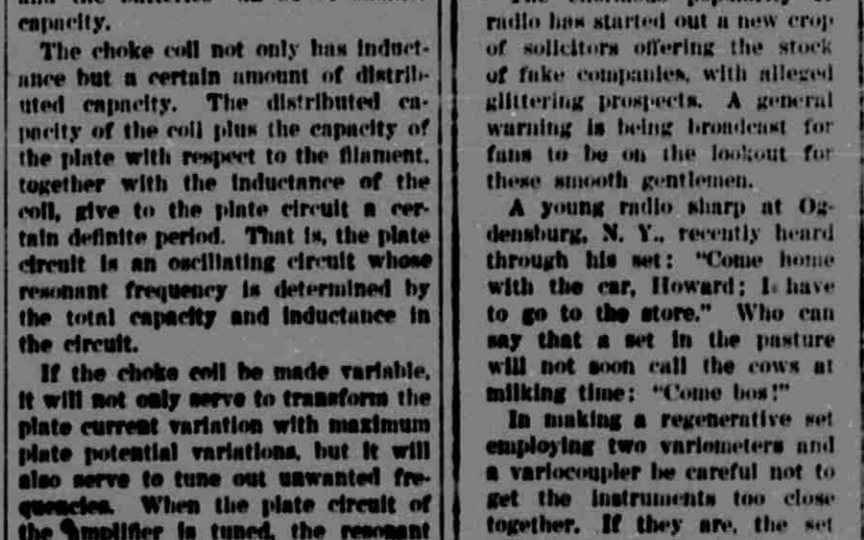
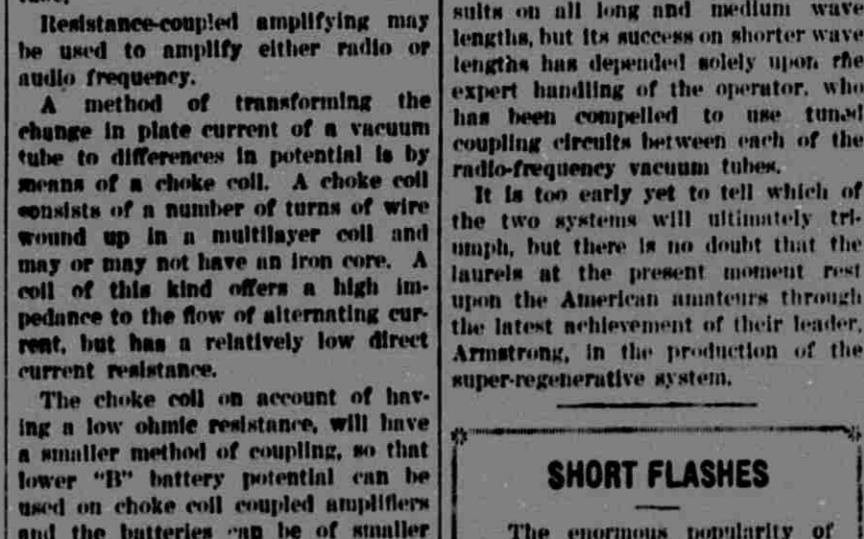
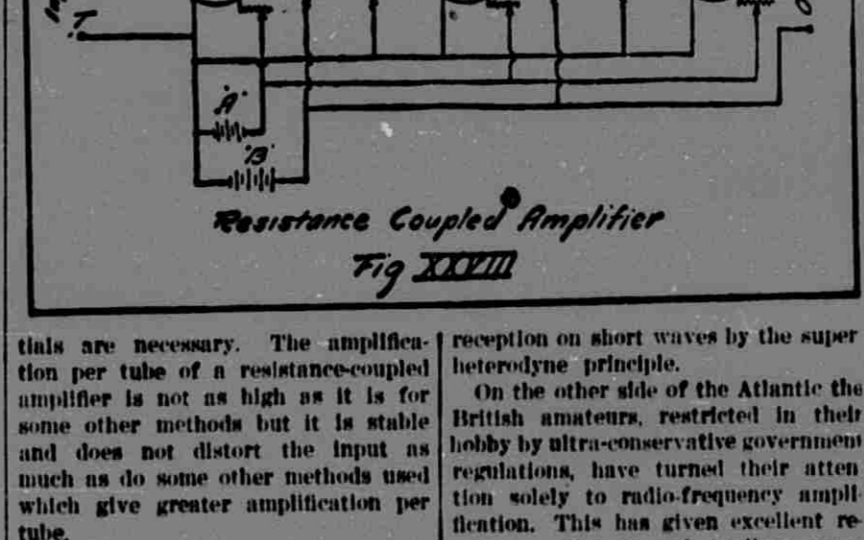
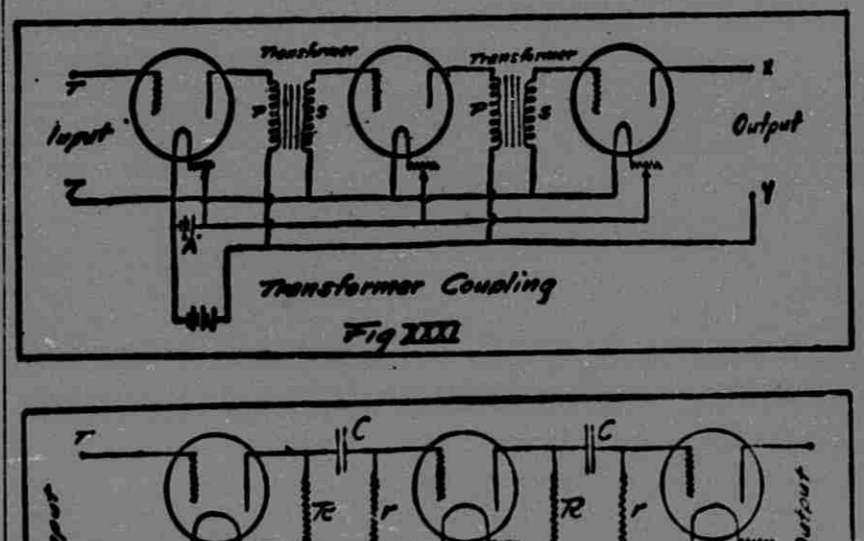
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USE OF CHOKE COIL AND TRANSFORMERS

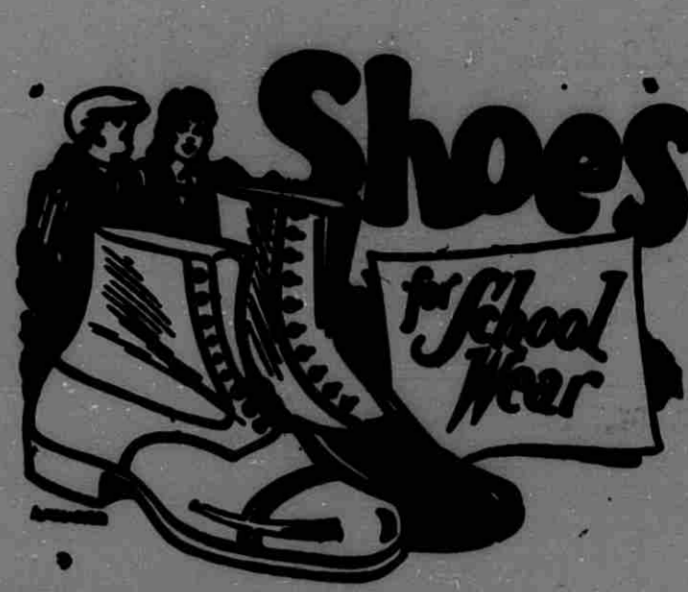

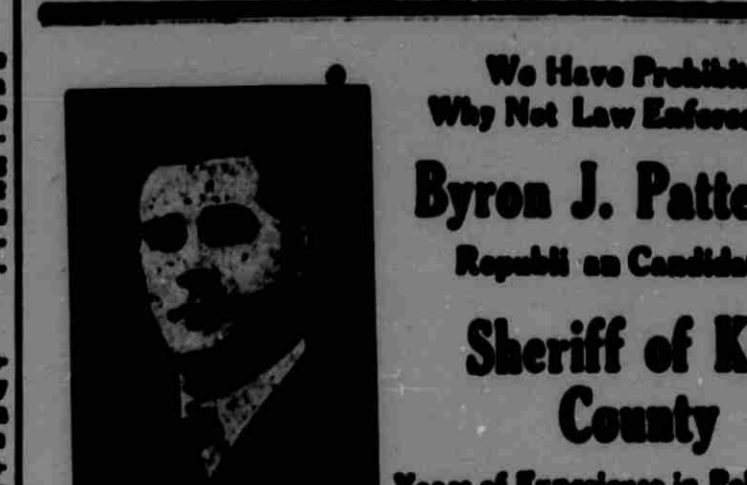
