With the installation of trucks in place of teams during 1922 it was meany as three times a day. This installation also effected a saving of nearly \$60,000 over the use of teams, according to Otto S. Hess, county road engineer.

These trucks are equipped with spring scrapers which will scrape from eight to ten miles an hour and in a day will do the work of six teams. In 1921 it was necessary to hire teams at the rate of \$6 a day and in addition there had to be furnished a scraper. One truck and driver costs a maximum of \$20 a day, o only one scraper is needed with a truck, while six are needed for the teams. Other saving such as quick hauling of gravel brought the 1922 saving to the \$60,000 mark.

The average cost of maintenance per vehicle per mile of road in 1922 in Kent county was .435 cents. This includes \$15,000 for chloride dust ayer. If this dust layer is not in-cluded the cost per vehicle mile was 033 cents. In 1921 the cost was 5

The Kent system has attracted much attention throughout the state and many road commissioners have been studying methods used here. At present under Mr. Hess is a county supervisor of roads, John Paas, for 10 years in county road work, and four district supervisors: Lewis Brown of Plainfield for the northeast district, A. H. Barrett of Sparta for the northwest district, Alvin Wills of Grand Rapids for the south-

west district and John Collins of Lowell for the southeast. These five men, with Mr. Hess, are on the road continuously directing workers in maintenance work. It is said a washout or any other danger to road users is discovered either by the supervisors or their men the same day it occurs. This danger is eliminated immediately or if that is not possible red lanterns and flags are posted.
