The first league game was played at Mountair on January 2. After a hard battle the Idaho Quintet lost by a small margin of 34-31. 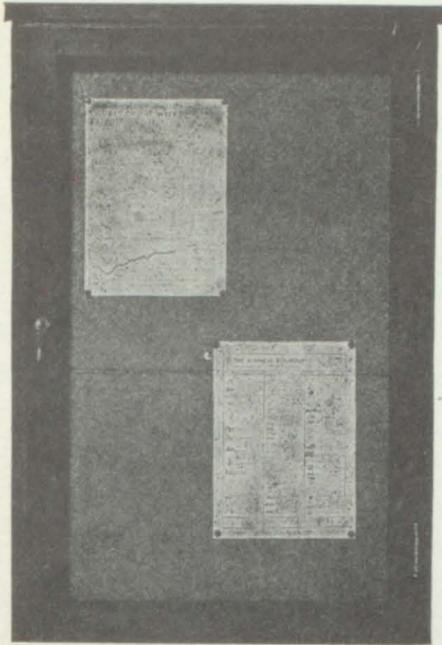
