## College sports good 1982 - 83 placement record, despite trends

 Staff WriterGrand Valley State Colloge students have a better chance this year of finding work after gradustion. Seatistices published in the 1982-1083 Plecerrem neporit: sthe Boord of Control show that 84 percent of Grand Valley Sure's 1982-93 groduates hove found work or are engiged in other voluntary setivities such - graduate school or military training.

The report seve that Grand

Valley State College graduates did exceptionally well, "despite the fact that 1082-1983 wes the worst yoar for employmens for college graduates."

Dean of Students Linde John. son expresed satisfection with the improved job oullock.
-I was pleseed and surprised that in this kind of economic climate that 5 percent more students were emploved." Johnson said. "It speaiks well of the increased cooperation between the faculty and the Career Planning and Counsaling ituff."

Of those undergraduate pro. grams with 10 or more gradu. ates, the groatest success in finding employment was held by graduates of the nursing and the specidel education programs. Each had a 97 parcent plesement rate. Ninoty-four percont of the computer science major found employment. witiiiam bomes College's arts and media progrom, the Kirkhof Colloge advertising and public relations program, and the criminal jus.

## Senate lambastes Affirmative Action; Seeks outside help

Two lerters addresced to State Genato Devid Molmen, 5 , and President Ronald Reagan hove already started discussion among Student Senators who passed them during a meeting last week.
The first letter, written oy Vice President Henry Hardy. asks Senator Holmes to hold public hearings on campus dur. ing March on "the poor recorn of Grand Valley State Colloge in the ares of civil righe."
"Like Voluire's description of the Holy Roman Empire, the 'Affirmative Action' program here is noither affirmative nor active, despite the suncero efforts of the A.A. officert, Autoinette Turner," the letter sald.
Is adred the dimination of "institutions on campus devoted to the promotion of civil righta" such is WSRX-FM, William lames College. and the Minority Affairs Office is "o couse for oncern."

However, Antoinette Turner.

Head of Grand Valley's Alfirme tive Action prooram. side that more research needs to the done on the issue before any obfinite charges can be made.
"I have looked at the number of students and steff iwomen and minorities). They have dropped as enrollment has dropped. More remearen needs to be done. and maybe ad dressing these issow to the appropriate bodies on compus. Turner said.

Turner adderd inst as for the lefter. the Senate ham a right so send it.
"In terms of student nighw. they (the Senota) have the right to send a letter to opubic official. Hes opinion of aftirme tive ection is ints optrion." whe suid.

Turner cired several different achiecements made by the pro gram, including minority recruir. ment. monitoring of the unem ployment process. the Paul I. Phillips Award. and more scho larship opportunites for minori.

## State college to face change of command in June of 1985

June of 1985 will mark. change in command ot the Michgan State University. Whyl Becouse university prosident Cocil Mackey announcod Ns insention to step down last woek, ofter incressing prescure from the uni. versiny's Bosrd of Trustices.

Mackoy hem served as the helm of Michigon Saste University, in Easi Lansing, since June of 1979. Ae simes. Mockey has been chariccerizeam aloof, swabborn and wetless. according to Associsted Press reports
His tenure as the state univer: sity was marked by the rewriting of the taculty grievance manual so that all comploints would be retouted direetly to his of fice.

He fought consistently with the MSU Alumnl Association, which recently declared its independence from the college odministration. Such issuer as censorship and veto power on resocwition appointios crased furore whth the prosident end the wrosintion 's board of directors.
He also proposed, though unsuccessfully, the alimination of the Schoot of Nursing and the layoff of tenured amployeres as budget entronchment meosures.

However, there were some good points to the ruling of Mackey and his administration. For instance, whille serving $\approx$

President. private contributions so the university did inernese by some 196 percent.

Mackey servgd with strained relations with several board members. although during his resignation notice, which wes made public last week, he gove no mention of his furure plans or his ressons for the move.

Mackey earns some \$102,700 for his post. according to published reports. Ther figure in. cludes some deferred salary money. His contrect allows him lo become an economics prufessor with a salary marching the average of the five highest-paid economics professors in the college, if he chooses.

According to sources. the coniract contains no ctouses for severence pay.

MSU Vice Presidens leck Breslin. 64, is often mentioned as leading candidate for the President's post. However, Breslin will mest the legal retirement age for MSU employees nexi yeer, which is 66, and will be porest so resire. sources seld. The board however, could waive the rule for him to serve es the university's highest public official. but no decision had been made as of press time if the board would do so.

Board members, at a private December meeting at which trustees Blench Martin, Bobby Crim. Matcolm Dade and Patrick

Wilson amended, vored to esk for the President's resigntion. The other members were not in vited to the affair.
The mooting was mold "\$o salk about where the university is going" stated Crim in publishod reports.

One truste. Peter Fletcher. stated that me wes "disappoin ted " with the cecret meeting.

- This only lasds 10 on under standing of the current administration and does not consribute to the harmony essentisl to the wellbeing of the universizy." He did not seate whother ho would vote to fire Mackey, if his resignation was not submitted to the board.

In his resignation scotement, Mackey said. "I made my decision without any discussion with the board and no indication from any member of the board as to anything concerning my future.

I have given the matter grest deal of shoughs and it is my conclusion that I would like to plen 10 lame..st the and of the $1984-85$ acadernic year. This will mark my end of my sixth year w president of the university and will provide a reasonable length of time for the university to establish and imple. ment the approprlate search process for a successor ."
His resignation wes unenimously sccepted by the bourd.

As for the Senate, Turner said that they should try and work "within the institution" first, adding: "I think they (the Senate) should ask more questions."
The letter passed the senate by a 170 margin

Hardy sald that the Holmes letter is intended to ask the Senator to investigate the "abys. mal state of civil rights" at Grand Valley.
"The racism here lat Grand Valleyl isn't over, it's institu. tionalized. It (racism) has so do with the way people are hired and fired, the way people are recruited. We want the state legislature to be ware that state funds have boen dil. verted from programs which had a good record in dvil righe," Herdy said.
Hardy cited the 1983 Affirmative Action report, which shows 55 of 62 professors to be white males, along with 28 of 33 people in the top five administrative levels. He added that only $5 \%$ of all men are
employed in clerical positlons while $56 \%$ of women hold them. Hardy called the latter statistic an "ourageous dif. ference."
Hardy said he also drofted the Senate's letter to President Reagan protesting the invesion of Grenada; the letter passed the Senate by a 16.2 margin.
The Grenads letter asks Res. gan to "insure the demperatic rights" of Grenadan cilizens, such as tree speech and froedom of assembly, "release the political prisoners now being held without charges by the US martial law regime," and with. draw all American troops.

- My purpose was to raise the issue with other Senators and educate them. President Reegen has shown himseif to be sensitive to public optnion. Coming from such a rightwing Republican stronghold «Ortawa Countr, I think this is posi-a tive statement we can make," Hardy said.
Student Senasor Tony Vanderwall and Senate Treasuler valerie Barron, however, voted

sogether." He added that in some newspapers, their stories will alternate berween the Serbian and Craatian languages, because both are based on differing alphabets.
"In Slovenia, there are many people who prefer to speak Izalian. There's an important sense of decentraliation. People have control over their cwn lonquage, culture and religion," Zapp sald. As a result, he added, the rivalries berween minorities are no longer a serious national problem.

Yugoalavia was occupied by the Germons during World War II until Marshall Josip Broz, known to the Western world as Tito, became the country's main leader in 194E. Since his death in Mov. 1980. Yugo.
slavia has been run on a routing systom of presidents According to Istuk, eight men representing Yugosievio's six republics and two autonomous provinces toke turns assuming the Presideney of Yugostavie on an annual besis.

Yugoslavians also have a greas interest in sport, Istuk said.
"There's skling in Slovenia; we got a chance to pre. pare for the Olymplcs. Sarajevo is the center of Yugo slavia, and all this sports terrain is built for the Olympics. All Yugosilavis took part in the Olympic games sports has been another way of bringing the nationalities together," Istuk ssid.

Istuk said that Yugostavia has tried to ensure equality between the differing languages spoken by the country's minorities.

## Iowa Caucus separates wheat from chaff <br> "For Many, Iowo Will be Bocimaing of the End"

The sbove headline from Sundey's Detrolt Free Press, suc cinily summarizes the results of the lowe Coucuses hold on Monday.

Out of the eighs men who want to be the Democrat President in 1884, Walter Mondale, former vice president under Jimmy Carter, received the mort votes ( 40 percent of the 84,000 lowe democrats who voted). The lown Caucuses held no surprises for Mondale, just e reinforcement that he is the front runner in the Democratic Party Presidential nomination

The lows Csucuses, howover, held unplessent surprises for several of the nominees. For instance, former estronsut John Glenn of Ohio, fevored second to frontrunner Walter Mondale finishod a disappoinsing fifth. His supporters were disoppointed, bui Glenn says he still plans on campaigning.

Alan Cranston, a senetor from Caiifornis, heid the number three spot at 11 p.m., sccording to Channel 13 reports, but at the end of final tally, finished fourth. Accarding to wire service stories, his funds are running low, soo low to bank on a fourth place finish.

Jesse Jackson, civil rights ectivist, finished sevensh. Chuck Skala, a local campaigner for Jackson, snid several weeks ago that Jackson would need a lot of support at the lowe ceucuses and the New Hampshire Primary to be held later this week. By the time Jackson gets $\mathbf{t o}$ the primary in Michigan on March 17, an earlier wire story prediction that he will finish second may not come true.

Former Floride Gov. Reubin Askew, finished sixth and Sen Earnes: F. Hollings of South Carolina finished last. They won it be receiving vary much attention from the madis.

Sen. Gary Mart, and George McGovern, ihird place and third place respectively, will be receiving lots of attention, though. along with Mondale.
It's sad in a way that one coucus separates the wheat from the chaff. We will listen and will read reports on Mondale, Hart and McGovern. We will also listen and will read reports on Glenn, Jackson and Cransion, bui we'll be expecting glowing reports on how they're winning votes that were first lost in lowe.

The modia makes all of this a reality. An NBC news report showed that after the first several primaries, little attention will be paid to the Democratic Party presidential nomination rece. Several editors at NBC confirmed that.

## What is the Fincoldel Ald form?

The Financlal Aid form is an applic. ation that allows students to be consider. ed for financial awards from sources like Pell Grants, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, Work Study, National Direct Student Loens, or Guaranteed

Who is elletble?
Generally any studens who hase family income under $\$ 30,000$ con qual. ify. However, Ken Friedsma, Director of Financial Aids ot Grand Valloy, enve. "I wouldn's discourage enyone above $\$ 30,000$ nor will I guarantee that anvone under $\$ 30,000$ is aligible." But applying is recommerided.

Through a grant from the Grond Rapids Founderion. Plannod Parenthood hes bown able ro employ \& full-sime educstor to deal with the Male Involvement Progrom.
Srove Croamer, full time educotor, seys thet the program consists of ihree aivisions.

To begin, the clinical apact of the program includes mon in the educational assion a women goes through on her first visit to the clinic.
