FRESHMEN, FIGHTING, HOLD VARSITY TEAM

YEARLINGS SHOW BEST FORM OF SEASON

Long Runs of First String of Backs Checked—Von Lackum Again at Left Halfback

Varsity and freshmen mixed again last night in scrimmage, and the yearlings, gaining confidence, held the big team to smaller and smaller gains as the evening wore on. At first, with the full varsity line-up in action, the freshmen were unable to hold, and they were swept back for two touchdowns in short order. Then the first year men rallied, and with Murphy retiring from the varsity line-up, broke up play after play, Schulte at left tackle breaking through and downing the varsity backs repeatedly.

The work of the first team as a whole was an improvement over the early part of the week. Alexander was at end again for a few minutes, and was later replaced by Feller, who in turn gave way to Korf. Bowman had left tackle again, and this line-up looks as though it might stand the test for some few days. The line is big and powerful, and the freshmen lost oftener than they gained in their efforts to make headway against it offensively. Curry continued to make long gains, and Murphy got his usual plunges through the line, although the yearlings cut him down to shorter distances.

After the first string had gone through a half-hour's work, the second team went in, but was unable to gain against the freshmen defense and the two aggregations fought a stubborn fifteen minute battle in the middle of the field. The coaches featured the pause while the teams were changing by banishing a freshman sub who was caught smoking a cigarette on the side lines from the field for the season.

The varsity plays are not yet working as smoothly as they should, and the coaches intend to put the men through a strenuous course of signal practice and scrimmage work until they go in more acceptable style.

Hockey Will Begin

Work on the field is planned by the department of physical training for women. Classes in hockey will begin the outdoor season this Monday morning, weather permitting.

NEW PUBLICATION WORK OF PROFESSOR F. E. HORACK

Text-Book on Iowa Government Comes From Press

There has just come from the press of Charles Scribner's Sons a new text-book on "The Government of Iowa," written by Professor Frank E. Horack of the department of political science. Professor Horack is exceptionally well prepared to write a volume of this character because of his many years of experience in teaching the actual workings of American government.

The new text book of civics by Professor Horack is a distinct improvement upon anything of the kind that has hitherto been written in connection with Iowa. In the first place it is a marked departure in style and arrangement from the average civics text book, which consists largely of extracts from the constitution joined by connective phrases. Professor Horack has avoided this method and has presented the essential facts of Iowa government in an interesting and logical manner. Furthermore, his book is based upon the results of the latest and most critical researches in the field of Iowa history and politics, and it is strictly up-to-date, including the changes made by the general assembly at its last session.

Dr. Horack's volume has already been adopted for use in the civil government classes in the Iowa state teachers' college at Cedar Falls and in the state college at Ames. It is probable that it will soon be in use in many of the high schools of the state.

President Bowman Speaks

At the meeting of the Men and Religion Forward Movement, held in the Commercial club rooms yesterday it was decided to elect a committee of fifty, chosen from the religious denominations of this city, to bring about a sane impetus for religious advancement in the different cities of the country. Cedar Rapids was chosen as a common center from which auxiliary lines of operation will be instituted. Milton Remley, an Iowa alumnus, was chosen chairman and Albert Shade, also a graduate of S. U. I., was made secretary. Pres. Bowman of S. U. I., attended the Iowa City meeting today and, after luncheon, spoke briefly on the subject of organization. He expressed himself as heartily in sympathy with the movement and stated that he was pleased to note the marked advancement along religious lines at Iowa since he was a student of the university.

Rain Stops Tennis

Rain which fell most of the day yesterday stopped the all-comers' tennis tournament on the university courts, no matches being played.

As the courts dry rapidly, the tournament will be resumed today unless more rain falls. The players who were scheduled to play yesterday will meet at the same time today.

POLLS OPEN FROM TWO TILL FIVE IN L. A. HALL

Fight is Hardest in Sophomore Class —Least Strenuous in the Junior Class

The dampened condition of the weather yesterday evidently had a depressing effect on the ardor of the embryo politicians of the university. At least they were not so much in evidence as they were at the beginning of the week. As a matter of fact most of the solid work of the campaign has been done and the candidates have a pretty fair idea by this time of how their supporters are lining up.

Beginning this morning, however, the air will be filled with political talk as the candidates and their supporters renew their efforts to secure the much desired and much coveted honors. The polls will be open from 2 to 5 o'clock in the hall of liberal arts. Each class will have a separate place in which to hold their election. The exact places have not been announced for all the classes but it is certain that there will be enough of the wily ones watching the game to aid any bewildered polls seekers to the right places.

There is apparently very little change in the senior class. The fight in that class has been one of the most determined in years, with the result that there is scarcely a member of the class that is not firmly supporting one ticket or the other.

In the junior class there are now two tickets in the field but the fight is not being waged there with the vehemence of former years. The sophomores are contending bitterly for the votes that will elect the members of next year's Hawkeye board. With three tickets in the field the result is decidedly uncertain as there will undoubtedly be a great many split ballots.

Freshman office seekers are showing a disposition to follow in the footsteps of the upper classmen in some respects, but they do not put the energy into their fight that the older men are accustomed to expend in the game.

NO TESTS WILL BE HELD FOR OFFICERS' POSITIONS

Changes in New Manual Make Examinations Inadvisable

Contrary to the announcements, the examinations for commissioned and non-commissioned officers in the cadet regiment will not be held tomorrow. A copy of the new manual has been received by Commandant Mumma and the changes in it are so many and so radical that a knowledge of the old manual is of little or no value. The new manuals have not as yet been received by the book stores and consequently the candidates for appointment have had no chance to prepare for the scheduled examination.

Captain Mumma has decided to make the appointments of commissioned and non-commissioned officers from his knowledge of the past work of the candidates. Examinations, however, will be held at the end of the first semester. At that time if any man proves deficient in the required knowledge of the manual the appointment will necessarily be cancelled.

The candidates will be tried out in the capacity for which they wish a definite appointment and the men who prove themselves best fitted will receive the temporary positions. This action comes very unexpected as it was thought that the changes in the new manual would hardly necessitate so radical a revision of the old commands and drill movements.

Cross Country Prospers

Cross country running according to Coach Kellogg is coming along very nicely. Last night over twenty men were out and from the results shown Iowa will have a strong team. If practice continues in the future as it has in the past there is no doubt says Coach Kellogg, that Iowa will be well represented. A definite time will be made today so everyone who has been out or any new runners are requested to be at the armory at 4:15 and set a new time.

PHYSICS HALL TO BE FINEST IN COUNTRY

LEADS ALL OTHERS IN CONVENIENCE

No Similar Building in the World Will Equal the Iowa Structure When Completed

As stated in an interview with Prof. G. W. Stewart, the head of the physics department, who has personally inspected the physics departments in most of the large universities, the new physics hall now being erected will excel in beauty and efficiency of architecture any such building in any university in this country or the world. Without furniture or equipment, the edifice will cost \$225,000, and when finally equipped and outfitted will represent an outlay of \$300,000. Although there are a few more expensive in the United States, there are none that will equal it.

The extreme dimensions north and south are 221 feet and east and west 69 feet. It has four stories on the east, but owing to the contour of the ground, there are five stories on the west.

Starting over the site of the corner stone on the northeast corner, the names of the noted physicists of the world are engraved on the entablature, starting with archimedes, Gilbert and Galileo and proceeding in order of time to Drude, the last.

There are two entrances on the east, and on west main entrance leads to a vestibule of Kosota marble, from which stairways on the right and left curve up to the floor above. At the ends of the building are two large stairways, and connecting these and giving convenient access to all the rooms, is an eleven foot corridor on each floor.

Classic simplicity is the keynote of the structure within. The building is free from useless ornamentation, but relies on correct, clean cut proportioning of its divisions for its beauty.

The building is entirely flexible. Solid walls divide the various stories into four large divisions, two at the ends, and two at the sides along the corridor. The remaining divisions are made only by light walls which can easily be removed or changed. Thus the subdivisions may be altered at a later date to accommodate any changes that may arise in the teaching of physics in the future years, or the ideas of a future generation. In but two physics halls in the world has this modern idea been applied; one at the university of Toronto, and one now under construction at Yale.

Correction Class to Start

The correction class which has been organized to suit the needs of the girls who have been unable to meet the regular requirements of physical training examination will begin this coming week. A rigid examination of heart, lungs and skin is given. The class numbers about fifty.
