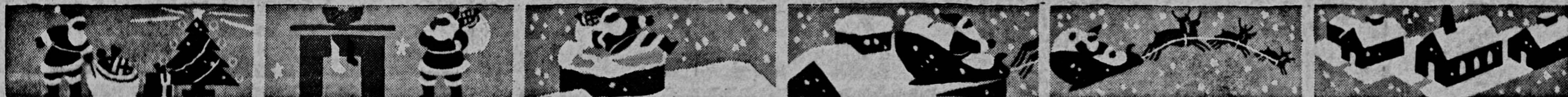

Pittsburgh Downs Trojans in 12 to 7 Fray

Randour Runs Wild in Aiding Panther Cause

U. S. C. Scores Lone Marker in Waning Minutes of Game

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 14 (AP)—Pittsburgh had Whitley Randour on its side today and his presence meant the football game won by the Panthers from the University of Southern California, 12 to 7.

The fleet back scored his first touchdown of the season after he had gained more than 750 yards this fall without crossing the goal line and this was the difference in the final accounting.

The halfback was a constant threat, for even when he did not run with the ball, the Trojans thought he might.

U.S.C. Scores Late
Southern California gave the crowd of approximately 35,000 its first chance to yell for the House of Troy when the game had less than a minute to go by completing a pass from the Pitt 39 yard line, Dave Davis to Bill Gainsford, who caught the ball on the 10 yard line and ran on to score.

The Trojans escaped a shutout in the fifty-ninth second of the eleventh hour when it seemed they never would score. The Panthers' great defensive play had stopped the Trojans a minute before when they took the ball on the one yard line, and in the second period the home guards had seen the door shut in their faces on the five yard line.

Pitt Garner First Score
Pitt, too, had its chances but could capitalize on only two. Pittsburgh scored the first touchdown of the game in the middle of the first period when Frank Souchak intercepted a pass in midfield. He found himself surrounded evenly by a mass of Trojans and tossed the ball to Paul Shaw who struggled a few more yards to Southern California's nine yard line. Three plunges left the ball only a yard from the goal and Frank Patrick plunged over on the fourth try.

The second score for the visitors came after a march of 81 yards. With two dashes of 25 yards by Randour helping their cause, the Panthers moved steadily to within seven yards of Southern California's goal. Randour then helped himself to his only touchdown of the year. Homer Beatty blocked the try for extra point.

Pitt's sensational goal line stand came just before the Trojans registered their lone marker. Beatty intercepted a pass on Pitt's 33 yard line and a pass from Glenn Thompson to Alvin Kiddler placed the ball on the 17. Pitt was penalized five yards for taking too much time out, and a pass from Thompson to Cliff Probst placed the ball on the 19 yard line.

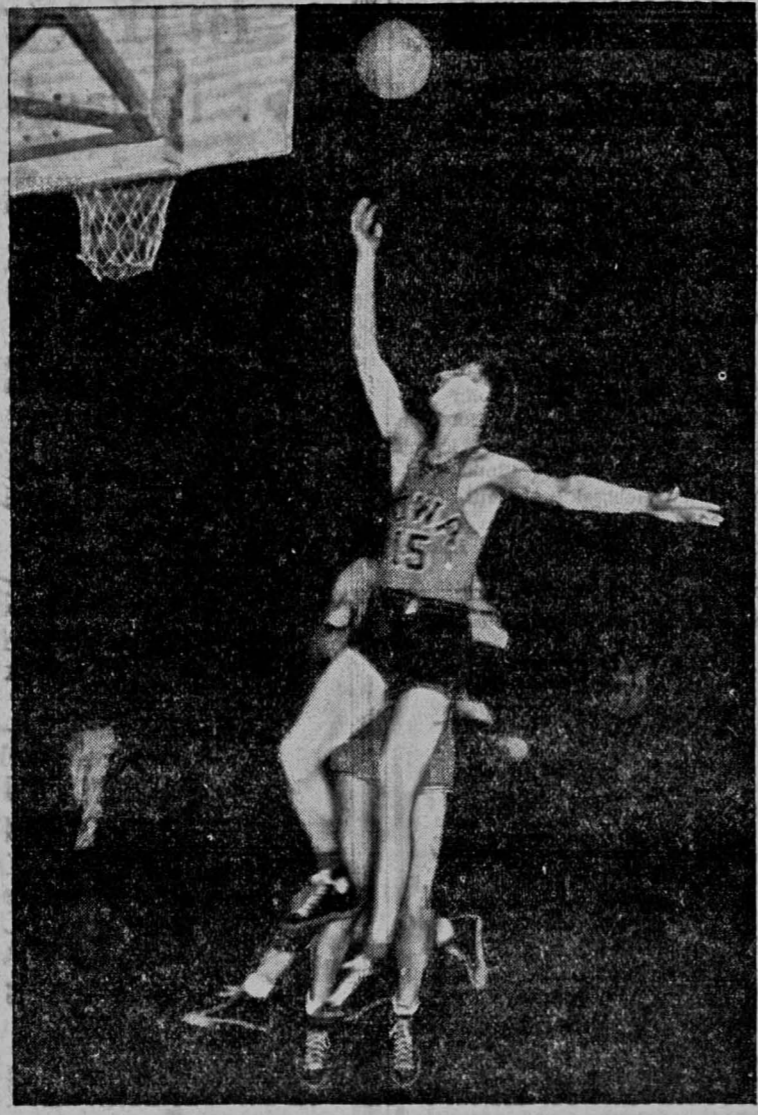

Guernsey Victor

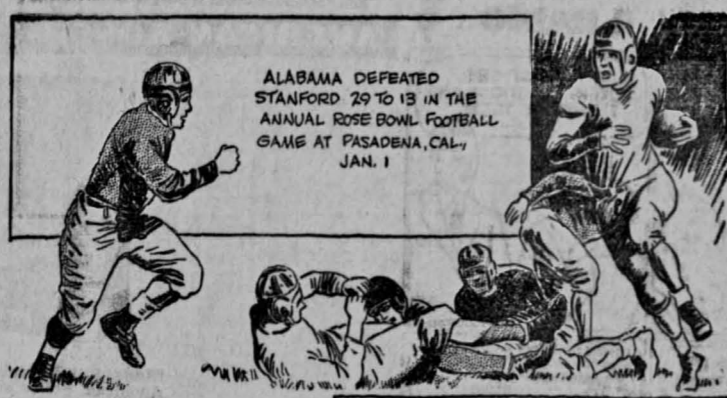

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Wisconsin Directorate Withholds Action

MADISON, Wis., Dec. 14 (AP)—Directors of the University of Wisconsin Alumni association voted today to withhold action regarding the current crossfire of charges concerning the administration of athletics at the university until responsible authorities have made a report.

The directors resolved, however, that a thorough investigation of the Wisconsin situation by university authorities is recommended and expected.

They chose Abel Berge, Chicago, as the board's secretary and amended the association's organization by creating six standing committees. Berge will replace Herman Egstadt who resigned last June.

The university board of visitors also met in annual session here today. Dr. W. W. Kelly, Green Bay, a member, said the sentiment of the board was that it is ready to investigate the Wisconsin athletic situation if necessary.

The directors' expression regarding the athletic affairs at the university was contained in the following resolution:

"Be it hereby resolved by the board of directors of the Wisconsin Alumni association:

"That we recommend and expect

on the part of those responsible for the conduct of the university an immediate and far reaching investigation of the entire athletic situation and of any other situation which may have a bearing thereon;

"Be it further resolved that until the result of the investigation by the university authorities is made public, this board defer further action; that this association then take such action as it may deem advisable."

The board supplemented its organization with the creation of an athletic committee, a membership committee, a magazine committee, a student relations and awards committee, an honorary degree committee, and a state relations committee.

The athletic committee will supervise the organization of county and city representatives for furthering university athletic interests.

Alumni will be appointed in each county and large city to contact high school athletes to persuade them to attend the university.

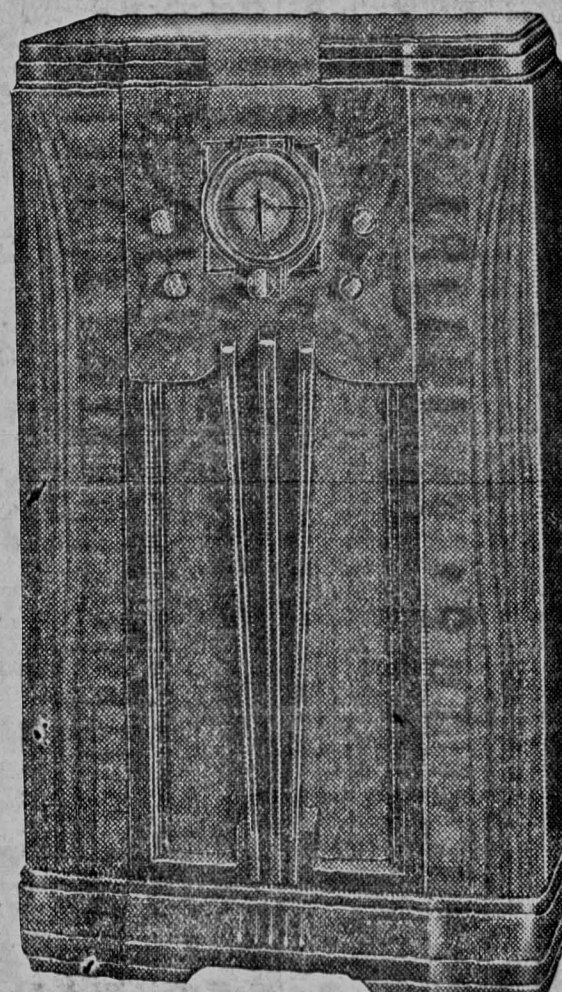

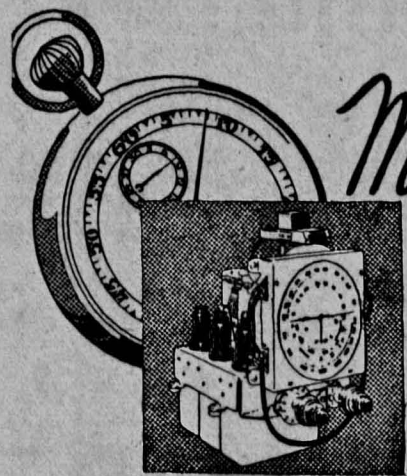

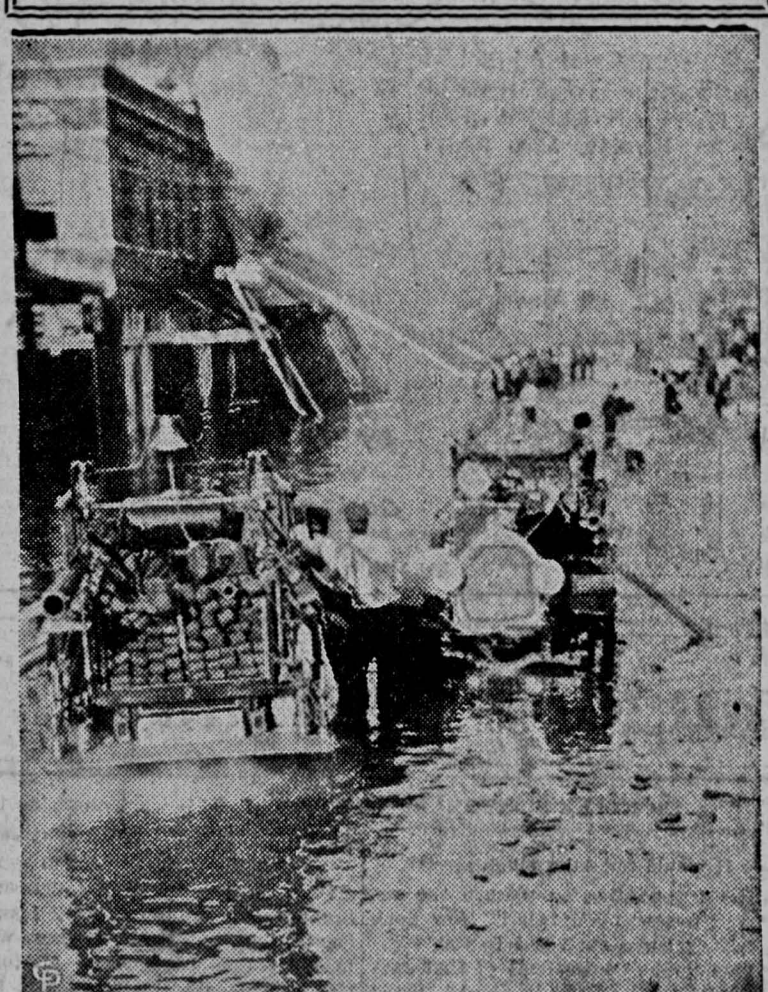

The Reserve Board and the Depression

We were interested to hear Harry Brown, acting dean of the college of commerce at the University of Missouri, insist that responsibility for both the depression in the United States and the political upsets in Great Britain should be laid to the policy of the federal reserve board during the period, 1928-30.

The mechanics of depression, he showed, are simple. Imagine people at the height of a period of prosperity waking up one morning to find that one-third of all the money in the country has disappeared.

Reminding his audience that most buying power is not real money, but credit money, Dean Brown showed how the federal reserve board decreased the amount of money in circulation. It sold bonds on the open market at attractive prices.

The banks, however, were in no position to extend credit. The withdrawal of money forced them to restrict loans. And they could not sell the securities they held to the federal reserve for more money because the board raised the discount rates.

Only a mind-reader able to guess what the board would think of next, asserted Dean Brown, could have foretold the depression. The commodity price level was not rising. The business depression in Europe had no direct bearing on the United States at the time.

The present attempts by the new deal to increase credit-money is a step in the right direction, the dean believes. The depreciation of money by boosting gold prices has done no harm and, perhaps, some good; but manipulation of gold, he feels, is chiefly valuable for keeping it from flowing either in or out of the

country to an extent dangerous to world economic balance. Dean Brown did not claim that money and bank credit changes were the sole causes of depression, but he felt that they caused the major fluctuation from "prosperity" to "depression."

The lecture was remarkable both for clarity and logical thinking. Dean Brown may be very nearly right, and we are beginning to have hope that civilization may yet learn to immunize itself against the ever recurring disease called depression.

The Rising Cost of Government

The number of persons receiving government pay checks has risen from 2,759,835 in March 1933 to the astounding figure of 9,947,956 in December, 1935, which means that almost one out of every four persons employed in this country now shares in the \$550,000,000 average monthly pay check of the treasury in Washington.

This also means that more persons receive government pay checks than are employed in trade and domestic and personal service combined, that more persons receive government pay checks than the total of those employed in manufacturing. One cannot help wondering where it will all end.

Will Roosevelt continue to increase the federal payroll if he receives another term in office? The last government loan of \$900,000,000 sent the national debt over the \$30,000,000,000 mark, which is an all-time record. Yet, because of the low interest rate, this debt is probably not as burdensome to our government as was the debt of \$25,500,000,000 at the close of the World War.

A Mid Summer Night's Dream

Now that Old Man Winter is about due to blow his wintry blasts over the United States, scientists have announced the construction of an air cooled bed. While you're thawing your toes with the hot water bottle, or using that old piece of flannel underwear to warm your loquacious appendages, reflect that next summer when the mercury hits 100 degrees you can sleep comfortably in a cool bed.

Upon observing the notice, "Dates Assigned for English Exams," a University of California student remarked, "There are hardly any functions here where a fellow can stag it any more."

The Japanese Advance

Japan's history is analogous to a modern success story. In the last 1,600 years the empire of the Rising Sun has advanced—remarkably fast. If past gains can be taken as criterion and also a forecast for the future it will not be many years before the Nippon empire becomes a leader, not only in the east, but possibly in the west hemisphere.

Not until about 400 did traders and missionaries begin filtering into the island, teaching these people who learned with lightning rapidity. During the nineteenth century Nipponese students permeated the western civilization and through precept and example fostered a civilization in Japan as advanced, and in some respects farther advanced, than that of the west.

The army has been moulded on the German army. Japanese navy men look up to the British navy as the ultra-perfect goal. Every instrument of destruction is placed at the disposal of their organs of warfare. Japan's warriors laugh at death. They laughed in the face of Russian cannons in 1904. They grinned at oblivion in the recent Manchurian fracas. It is with this utter contempt for death that the Japanese carry on their present aggressive tactics.

Dean Kay Warns S.U.I. Students Against Pre-Vacation Cutting

Students Cutting Class Before Holidays Will Lose Hour of Credit

Do not cut the last meeting of any class before Christmas holidays, Dean George F. Kay of the college of liberal arts warns.

The rule covering these absences, which subject the offending students to a possible penalty of the loss of a semester hour of credit, has been explained by Dean Kay in an effort to avoid such absences.

Faculty Rule The much misunderstood faculty rule states simply: "Each absence immediately before or immediately after a holiday or vacation (except the vacation preceding the opening of the new year) shall operate to reduce the amount of credit by one semester hour for each absence, unless such absences be excused by the committees on admission and classification."

Dean Kay explains that this rule applies to the last meeting of each class, and even though the student attends another class between his cut and the holiday period, he is still subject to the rule, and may be penalized accordingly.

Not Automatic However, the action of the rule is not automatic, Dean Kay says. Each case is carefully considered on its merits, and a penalty is assessed in accordance with the circumstances.

May Be No Penalty If the absence is excusable, no penalty is assessed. If, however, there is no adequate reason for the absence or the student has deliberately prolonged his vacation a penalty is assessed.

Sickness Acceptable Sickness of the student, or serious illness or death in his family, are usually acceptable excuses if accompanied by adequate proof, Dean Kay said.

With a 17 1/2 day holiday coming, the longest in the history of the university, it is Dean Kay's advice that students attend their classes up until noon Friday and return for their first classes on Tuesday morning, Jan. 7, 1936.

Students With B. A. Degree May Apply For Chicago Job

Any University of Iowa student possessing a B.A. degree may apply for a new type of internship just established at the orthogenic school of the University of Chicago, according to an announcement made yesterday at the Iowa Child Welfare Research station.

A young man with some training in psychology and mental hygiene is preferred, and a knowledge of sociology or recreational and occupational methods is required.

The successful applicant will have complete charge of all extra-curricular activities for a group of 10 boys, and his work will include a study of behavior problems.

Beginning Jan. 1 and continuing through June, with the possibility of renewal, the internship will provide \$50 a month room and meals and an opportunity to take a limited amount of work at the University of Chicago.

Dentists Hear Dr. Simpson

St. Louis Man Asserts Neglect of Teeth Due To Depression

"Artificial teeth may become the tombstones of the depression because people in general are neglecting to take care of their teeth," said Dr. Clarence O. Simpson of St. Louis, in an address here yesterday afternoon before 150 dentists and dental students in attendance at an annual meeting of the Iowa State Dental Society.

Dr. Simpson gave special emphasis to the utility and interpretation of dental radiographs, the science of making and interpreting X-ray pictures of teeth as preventive measures rather than as post-mortem findings.

The principal deficiency of most dentists is their inability to make radiographs which one can interpret," he said.

Statistics show that the average person at the age of 50 has artificial teeth. At the time when prosperity could be enjoyed with omnivorous abandon, the individual has to use decay teeth. This is a gastro-nomic and romantic tragedy," he said.

Economic Value Radiography is of economic value to the patient because periodic X-ray examinations save many times the cost of dental operation and replacement of teeth, he said.

Dr. George E. Morgan of Milwaukee addressed the group in the morning session on "Practical Phases of Dentistry for Children and How Predodontia May Be Made Profitable to the Dentist in General Practice."

To illustrate the lecture he used a series of slides showing the development of teeth from the time of birth, and also the treatment of bad teeth in children.

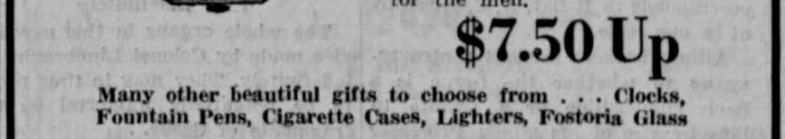

300 Musicians Will Present "Messiah" at Yuletide Vespers

Music Commemorates 250th Anniversary Of Bach, Handel

More than 300 musicians, including the university symphony orchestra, the university chorus and seven soloists under the direction of Prof. Philip G. Clapp, head of the music department, will take part in the Christmas vespers Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock in Iowa Union lounge.

This concert will be in commemoration of two great composers, Handel and Bach, on the two hundred and fiftieth anniversary of their births. Both were born in 1685.

In honor of Handel, the composer's most famous work, "The Messiah," will be presented by chorus, orchestra and soloists.

Because it is particularly appropriate to the Christmas season, the first part of the composition, dealing with the prophecies of the coming of Christ and the narrative of His birth, will be presented. The entire composition is seldom performed because of its great length.

The finest choruses and solos from the second and third parts will also be produced, including the famous "Hallelujah Chorus." At its first performance in the English court in 1742 his chorus made so great an impression that the audience, led by the king, rose and stood throughout its presentation. The custom persists to this day wherever the composition is produced.

To celebrate the Bach anniversary, the orchestra will play Professor Clapp's orchestral transcription of a Bach fugue for harpsichord. The theme of the fugue is the notes B, A, C, H of the German scale, which corresponds to B-flat, A, C, B-natural in our scale.

Although there is some controversy as to whether the fugue is a Bach composition or a tribute to him by one of his pupils Professor Clapp said recently, its appropriateness on this occasion is evident.

Soloists for "The Messiah" will be Sopranos, Florence Vanderwicken and Gertrude Krieg, both of the music department.

Probably the waste products set free by the living cells.

"Aging and death were suppressed. The colonies originating from a fragment of tissue extirpated from a chick embryo nearly 24 years ago are still alive. Not only are they alive but they grow as actively as on the first day.

Two Important Facts were brought to light by this experiment. First, removal of waste products and proper food prevent, in a colony of tissue cells, the occurrence of death. Second the cells that build up the body are capable of unlimited multiplication. They are potentially immortal.

"Still more useful information can be obtained from viscera living outside the body. An organ such as a thyroid gland, ovary, spleen, etc., is placed in an apparatus recently invented by C. A. Lindbergh, where it is completely protected from bacterial infection.

Fluid Circulates "Through its arteries a nutrient fluid is caused to pulsate and circulate, just like the blood pumped by the heart through the whole body. Under these conditions, organs taken from dead animals not only survive, but also grow, and set free active substances in the circulating fluid.

"Thus, the mechanism underlying the development, or the degeneration, of anatomical structure may be analyzed. The presence of certain chemical substances, and the lack of elimination of waste products are found to be the cause of most of the alterations of the organs."

Live Indefinitely The whole organs in this new device made by Colonel Lindbergh live indefinitely. They may in time prove to be potentially immortal as the fragments of tissue.

But human personality, Dr. Carrel pointed out, appears only when the organs are gathered together completely to form a body, and mentality is the first entity to disappear before the death of the body, and certainly long before the deaths of many of its individual parts, which survive for hours or days, according to varying environment.

Seeks Facts Ever since he began his medical work Dr. Carrel has sought for facts about the human personality that disappears so much more quickly than the death of the body it inhabits.

He has investigated the experiences of mediums in receiving messages they think come from the dead. He said the importance of the facts cannot be denied.

But in his own investigations he finds positive reason to think the messages are explained by clairvoyance or telepathy, rather than as communications from the dead. Clairvoyance and telepathy he holds as proven facts.

Old-Fashioned Tid-Bits Make Tempting Christmas Package

"Say it with cookies"—that happy greeting, "Merry Christmas." A box, jar or basket of these homemade favorites makes one of the most attractive and intimate gifts for friends or family.

Most households need a good supply of Christmas tid-bits to take care of the frequent raids on cookie jars and candy boxes during the holidays. Here are some popular recipes:

- Lebkuchen: 2 cups dark brown sugar, 4 eggs, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon cloves, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg. Beat eggs, add sugar and beat two minutes. Add rest of ingredients. Chill dough three days. Roll out thin, cut in strips one and one-half by two inches. Bake 12 minutes on greased baking sheets in moderate oven.
- Crimson Stars: 1 cup fat, 2 cups sugar, 2 eggs, 2 tablespoons cream, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 cup red sugar, 1/2 cup almonds. Cream fat and sugar. Add eggs and cream. Beat two minutes. Add extracts, flour and baking powder. Chill dough two hours or longer and then roll it out until very thin. Cut out "stars" and sprinkle with the red sugar. Bake 10 minutes on greased baking sheets.
- Maple Pralines: 1 1/2 cups sugar, 1 cup maple syrup, 1/2 cup cream, 1 cup pecans. Boil sugar, syrup, butter and cream until soft ball forms in cold water. Stir frequently while cooking. Let cool 20 minutes. Beat until creamy, add nuts and drop portions from tip of spoon onto buttered dish or waxed paper.
- Pound Cake: 1 1/2 cups butter, 2 cups sugar, 1 teaspoon almond extract, 3/4 cup pasty flour, 8 egg yolks, 8 egg whites, 1/2 cup vanilla. Cream butter and sugar. Add extracts and beaten egg yolks. Beat three minutes. Fold in rest of in-

- Popcorn Kernels: 2 quarts popped corn, 1 cup water, 1 cup nuts, 1/2 cup molasses, 1/2 cup sugar. Boil without stirring the molasses, sugar, water, vinegar and butter. When stiff ball forms in cold water, add corn and nuts. Pour into buttered pan, pressing down well. Let cool and with sharp knife cut into bars. If desired, the cooked mixture can be arranged in small piles on the pan.
- Caramel Almonds: 1 cup sugar, 4 tablespoons water, 1 cup shelled almonds. Boil slowly, sugar and water until light brown. Do not stir. Add nuts and pour at once onto waxed paper to cool. Other nuts can be used in place of almonds.

"They showed a more extensive background of information, presented a well-kept argument, and were able to re-support their main arguments with additional material after they had been attacked," he explained.

Professor Beuhler especially praised the rebuttal speech of Addison Hickman, who summed up the debate, balancing and refuting the

main arguments. The judge also remarked that the Iowa team was able to keep control of the debate during most of the session, although they had to surmount a "Rock of Gibraltar" argument in the Wisconsin plea against increased taxation, red tape and political graft.

lin said that Hitler and Sir Eric yesterday discussed at length the possibilities of limiting armaments and establishing an aviation mutual aid treaty among signatories of the Locarno treaty—Britain, France, Germany, Italy and Belgium.)

The "White Paper" (official government document) disclosed that Hoare sent the following telegram Dec. 10 to the British minister in Addis Ababa:

"You should use your utmost influence to induce the emperor to give careful and favorable consideration to these proposals and no account lightly to reject them."

At the same time, Sir Samuel gave this information to the ambassador to Rome:

"If, as they hope, the reply in principle is favorable, the French and United Kingdom governments will immediately take steps in order that the committee of five (of the league) may be called together Dec. 12.

"In that case, the meeting of the committee might modify the object of the meeting of the committee of 18 which is fixed for the same day." (This "object" was to discuss an oil embargo.)

Observers said the Anglo-French recommendations and the promise to use their influence at Geneva to obtain league approval of the peace plan appeared at variance with the attitude adopted at Geneva by Premier Laval and Anthony Eden, British minister for league affairs, two days later.

Shirley Lent, 11, of Council Bluffs, is looking forward to a bit of practice in the culinary art during 1936 and she expresses her desire for "A cooking utensil set, a little electric stove, and a play table and four chairs."

Duane Calmer, 12, of Sioux City, is rather skeptical about the existence of "this old fellow with whiskers," but he admitted he might change his mind if "I get a train, bike, skates, and a pair of house slippers."

Quite Concerned

Most of the children are quite concerned about how generous St. Nick will be in dealing with their parents. One of this group is Iris Stourovous, 9, of Waterloo, who, after presenting his demand for a picture machine and some nice hard Christmas candy, hoped that "poppa" would be given what he wanted.

Richard Wales, 6, of LeClaire, didn't hesitate for a moment to relate what he was hoping to receive, and he commenced in a dulcet voice to rattle off his lengthy list at a staccato pace. "I want a horn what toots, two drums what make a lot of noise, two play bears; some candy and nuts, a scooter, two wagons, and two playhouses."

To Have Dinner

Their well-deserved aspirations will be climaxed with a regular Christmas dinner, 100 stockings full of toys, a real Santa Claus and a large Christmas tree. At present the hospitals are being dressed with decorations pertinent to the Yuletide season.

Blonde Harriet Hansen of Cedar Falls outwished all the others. She felt rather certain that she'll spend the Yuletide season at home.

Likes Ice Skates

"I'd like Santa to bring me a pair of ice skates," she said, "so that I can go ice skating down on that pond two blocks from my home."

Crouched on his bed beside a heap of pictures haggled out of various drawings he had made, Harold Rurode glanced up from a book of Christmas stories to assert that he had written about the history of the holiday in his letter to Santa Claus. But in "P.S. I wrote I would like a bicycle for Christmas so I can ride to Sunday school and to school. I got more from it than anything else," he said.

Wanderlust

of one of the most hotly contested elections in recent years, the bill of complaint charges that only 51 per cent of the 5,736 voters balloted in favor of the institution of municipal ownership in the electric field. The company's petition points out that the affirmative vote was not "as large as a majority of the votes cast at the preceding municipal election" when 6,043 Iowa Citizens had cast ballots.

Misled Voters

The petition continues, "In the campaign preceding such election, widespread and repeated misrepresentations of material facts, calculated to mislead the voters, and which in truth and in fact did mislead the voters, were made and given general circulation in Iowa City by the proponents of municipal ownership including the defendant aldermen and executives and members of the Iowa City Municipal Ownership league."

False charge of complainant's profits and receipts, false and fraudulent charges of identification with complainant of the Chase National bank of New York and the receipt by such bank of hundreds of thousands of dollars asserted to have been taken from Iowa City consumers annually, charges that the light and power company was responsible for the closing of Iowa City banks, and the charge that company officials proposed to shut off current from consumers unless they vote against municipal ownership were the charges of misrepresentation which company attorneys set forth in their federal district court petition.

The petition also alleges that the action of the city council under the administration of former Mayor Harry D. Breene in rejecting a PWA loan and grant agreement automatically nullified the authority from the special April utility election. The former council returned the PWA papers, unsigned, Oct. 5, 1934.

The light and power company's application for a temporary restraining order is similar to one filed in the supreme court of the District of Columbia Tuesday in which PWA officials were restrained from extending further funds to the city of Iowa City for the purpose of continuing the municipal light and power plant project.

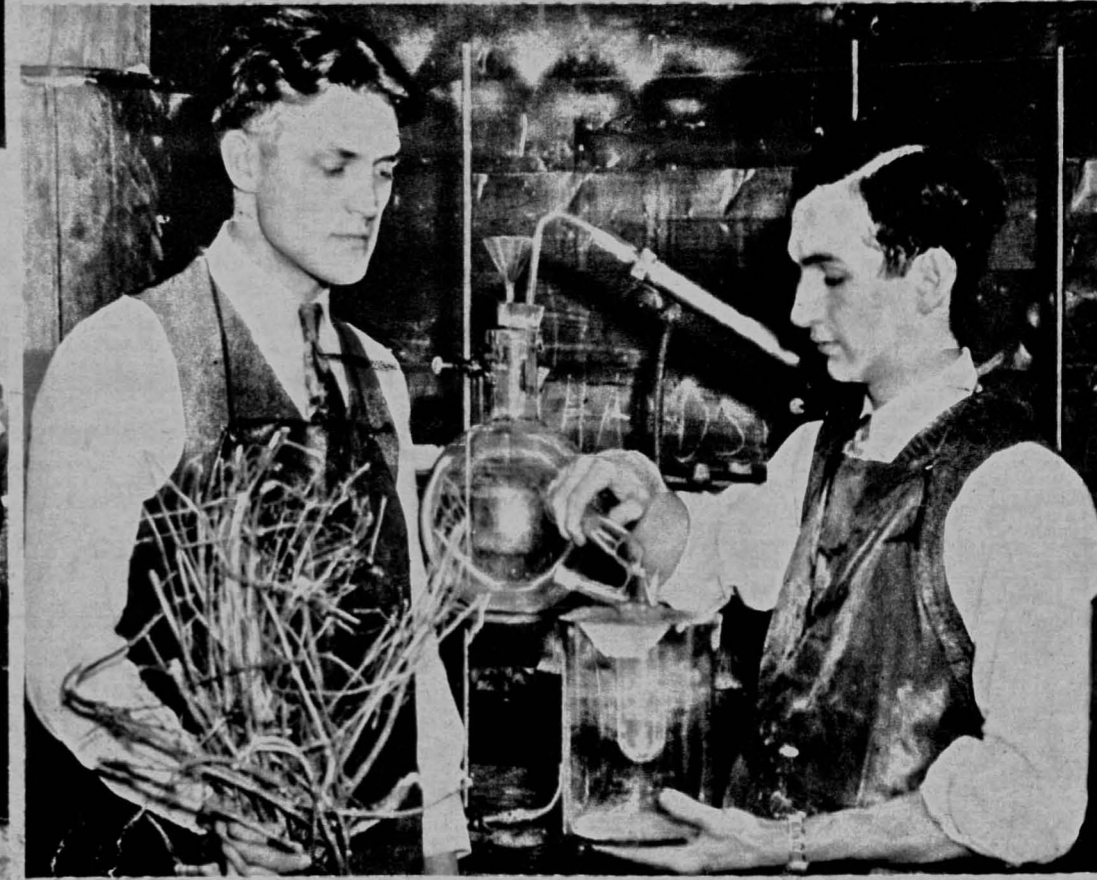

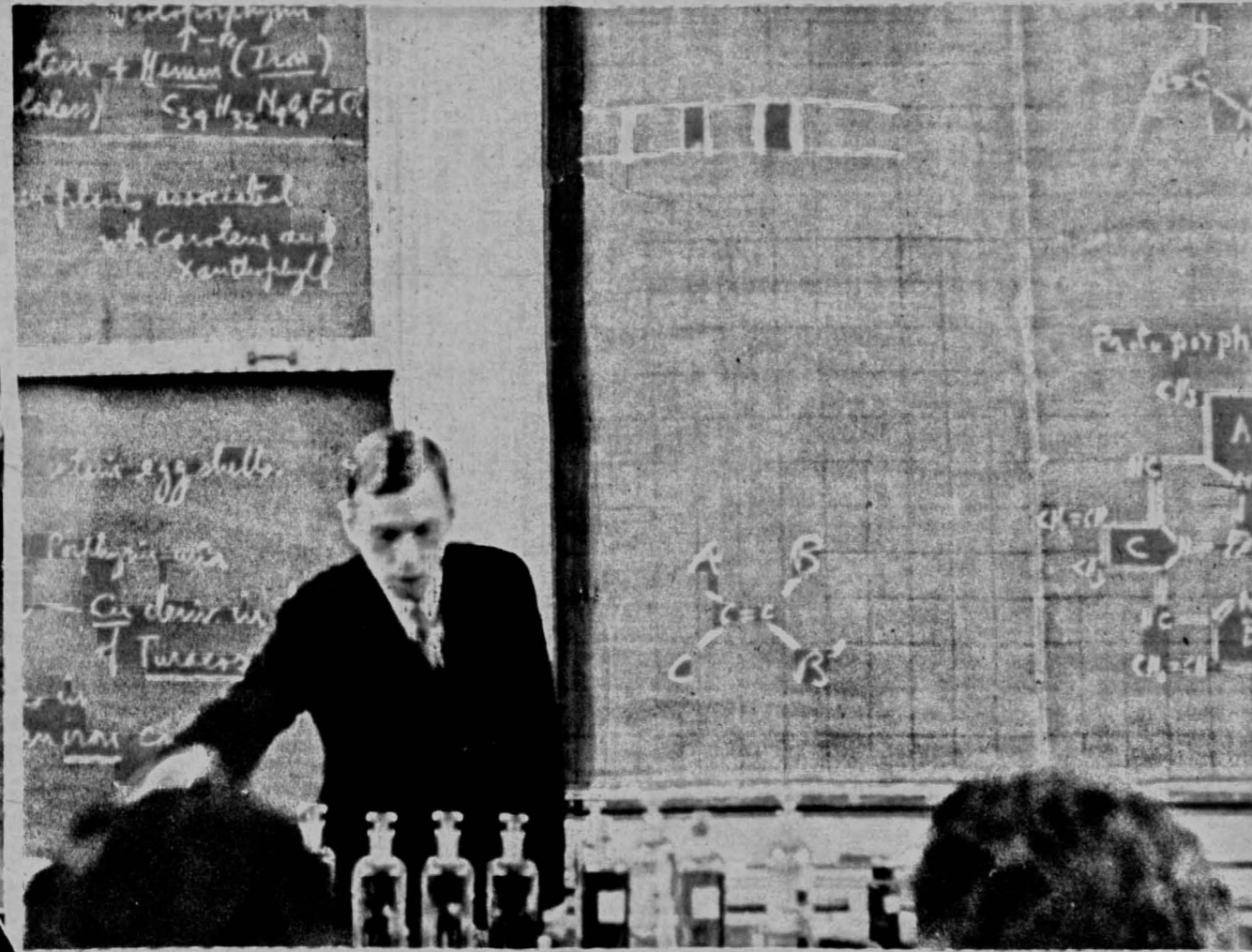

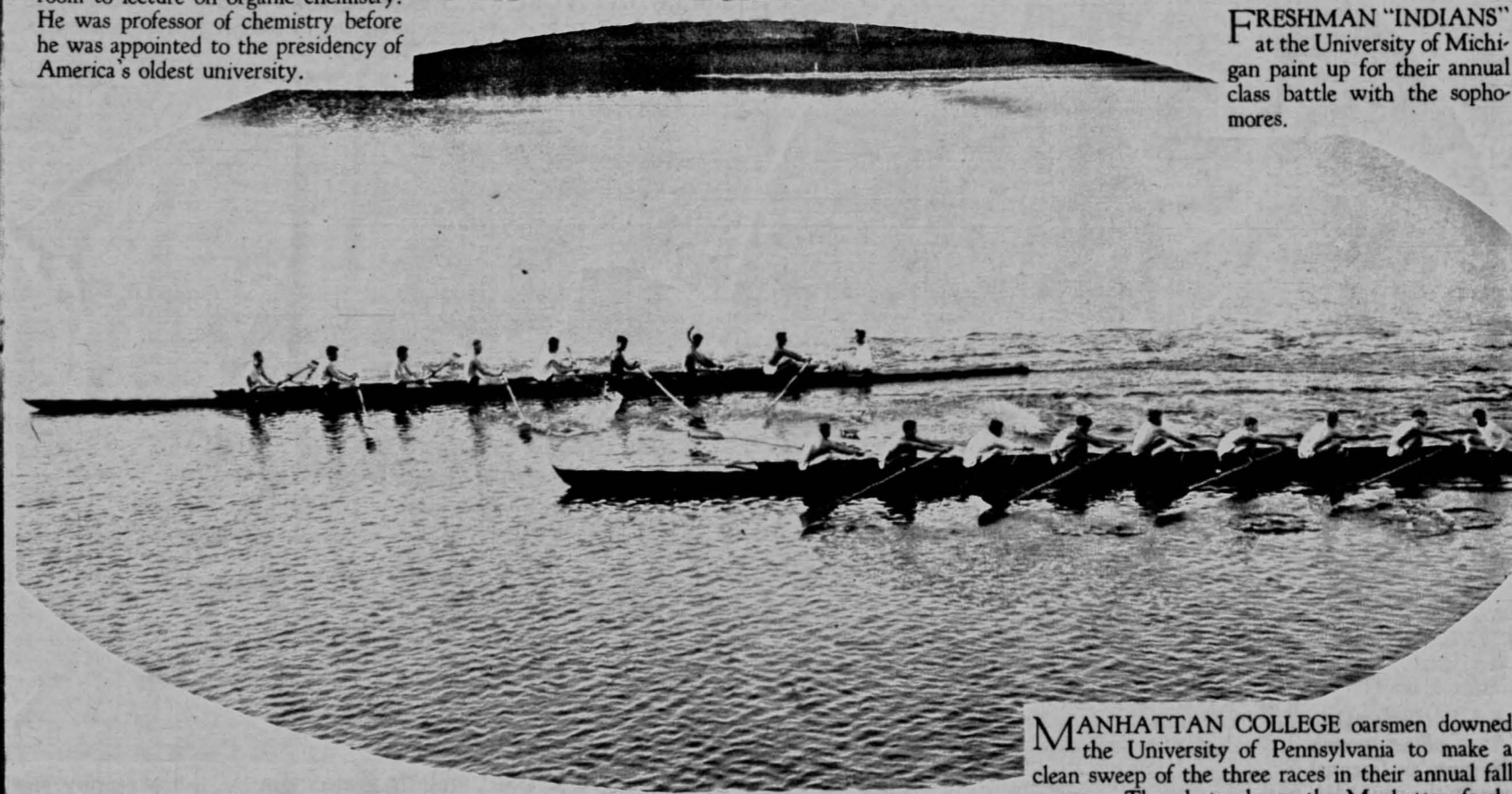

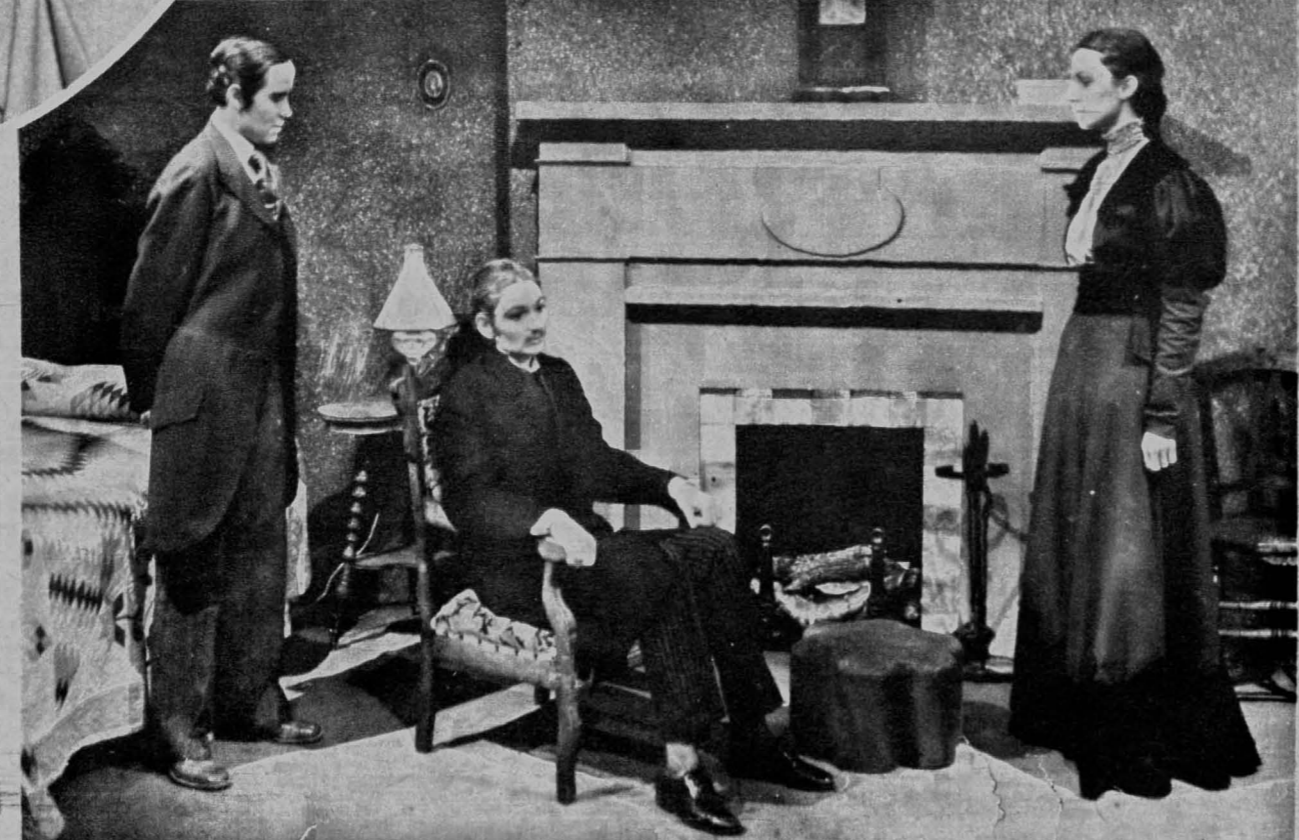

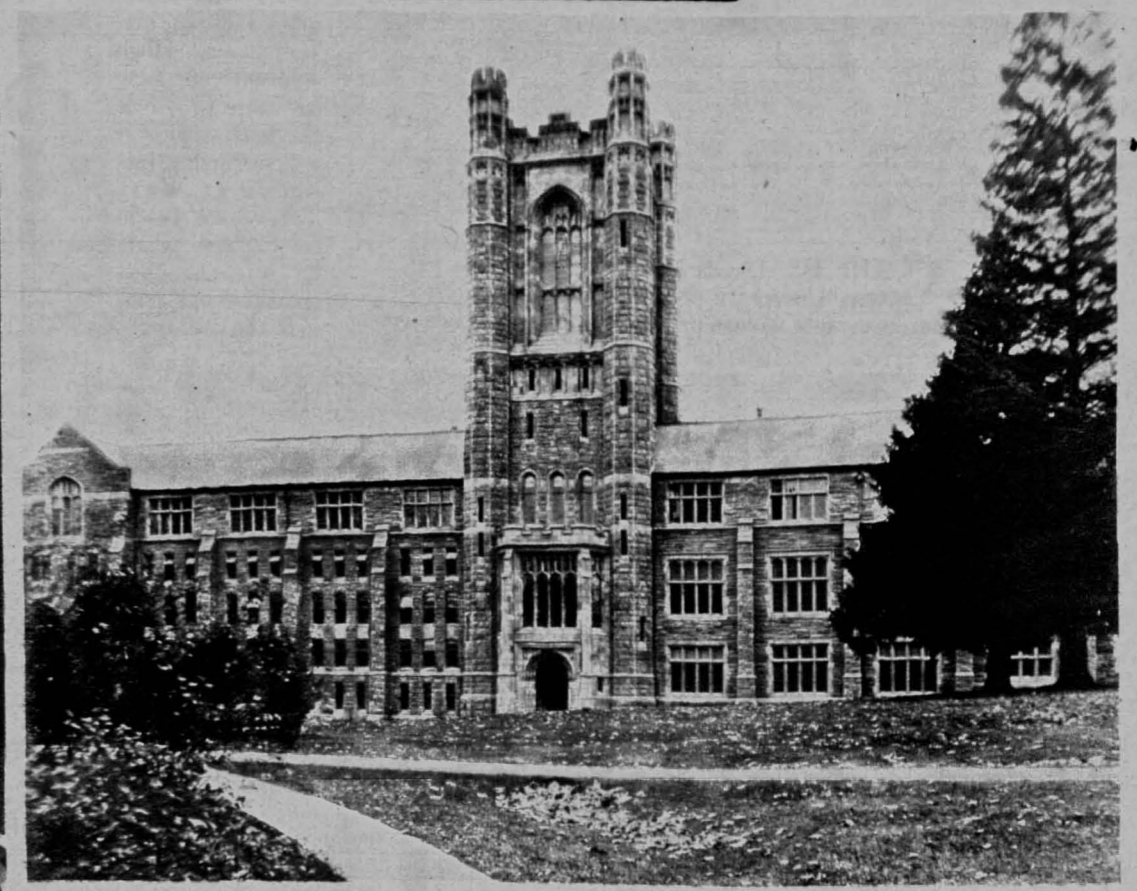

AAA Discards State's Board

Iowa Corn-Hog Group Goes Into Discard For Reorganization

AMES, Dec. 14 (AP)—In the second major personnel shakeup of the year, the AAA discarded the Iowa corn-hog committee and board review today and established a single Iowa corn-hog board.

Makes Announcement
Claude Wickard, chief of the corn-hog section of the AAA, made this announcement here late today at the close of the first of a series of state corn-hog meetings where the 1935-37 adjustment program was discussed.

Wickard, although making no definite announcement, indicated a similar policy of setting up single administrative boards will be followed in other states.

Indicate Personnel
No announcement of personnel of the new board was made, but it was indicated R. M. Evans, who this year was chairman of both the state committee and the state board of review, would be appointed chairman of the new board.

It was indicated also that J. L. Boatman, soils specialist in the Iowa extension service, Ralph Smith, present corn-hog committee secretary, and Herve Hazen, recently appointed to the committee to succeed William McArthur, would be included on the new board.

Governor Will Tell Source Of Liquor Seals

Sale of Seals Doesn't Involve Commission Says Clyde Herring

DES MOINES, Dec. 14 (AP)—Gov. Clyde L. Herring promised today to disclose the source of the Iowa liquor seals circulated among bootleggers—something a trio of investigations and two trials have failed to do.

"We have all the information we need," the governor said, adding that "this information shows members of the liquor commission were not involved in any way with the sale of seals."

To Make Report
The governor declared his report will be made within 10 days or two weeks—"just as soon as we can get our information into a connected story in affidavit form."

Lehan T. Ryan, assistant attorney general, said tonight the information "is shaping up to include several persons." He declined to name any of them.

Herring's promise to clear up the seals mystery—which he declared really hasn't been a mystery for two months—was made after conferring with Iowa liquor commissioners and Ryan. The governor earlier this week instructed Ryan to "get to the bottom" of the seals leak.

Reports Purchases
Prior to the conference Herring reported that two men came to him voluntarily yesterday and told him how they purchased seals, who they bought them from and what they did with them.

The governor said one of the men turned over 2,000 seals to him and that the other said he burned 2,300 seals he had purchased.

Herring declared that most of the information he has now was submitted to the Polk county jury several weeks ago.

Human Echo Youth R'sounds When Sounds Are Made Near His Quarters

HAWKSHEAD, Lancashire, England, Dec. 14 (AP)—The mystery of seven-year-old Frank Atkinson, who "vibrates" when he sleeps and whose body produces strange "knockings," has been solved—in principle at least.

"Human Echo"
Through some unknown physiological process, doctors said they had determined, the boy, while asleep, becomes a "human echo" and reproduces a noise created anywhere near him.

Dr. W. E. Allen said his parents, however, still cling to the belief their son is the victim of some unworldly power. They refuse to consent that the boy be placed in the care of a specialist.

Tests Do Not Vary
"I am convinced that an abnormal nervous system is responsible for the weird sounds apparently emanating from the boy's abdomen," Dr. Allen said. "Tests with the boy sleeping in a neighbor's home had no variant results."
