# SINGAPORE'S END NEAR

## U.S. Forces Sent to Dutch West Indies

### Move Made to Check Threat Of Axis Grab for Oil Wealth

#### American Soldiers Occupy Two Islands At Request of Dutch

WASHINGTON (AP) — To thwart any axis grab for the oil wealth of the Dutch West Indies, the United States announced last night that it had sent troops to the Dutch islands of Aruba and Curacao off the coast of Venezuela.

This follows up the government's action last November in sending troops to Dutch Guiana, on the north coast of South America, to guard the mines producing bauxite, from which aluminum is manufactured.

Last night's step was taken at a time when the Dutch East Indies, on the other side of the world, are newly menaced by the imminent fall of Singapore, and it was apparent that the United States and the Netherlands wanted to be in a position to repulse any synchronizing stab by Germany at Dutch resources in the Atlantic.

The size of the forces sent to Curacao and Aruba was not disclosed. A formal announcement by the state department said the move was made at the request of the Netherlands government and that the troops would be withdrawn at the end of the war.

It was understood, the statement added, "that the Venezuelan and Netherlands governments have reached an agreement whereby the former will cooperate in this defense measure in a manner similar to that agreed upon between the governments of Brazil and the Netherlands in the case of Surinam (Dutch Guiana)."

Curacao proper and Aruba, which belongs to the Curacao group of six islands, are both highly important as oil refining centers. The Royal Dutch Shell has large refineries on Curacao and the Standard Oil company of New Jersey has important facilities on Aruba. These plants refine oil from Venezuela.

The area of Curacao is 210 square miles and that of Aruba 70 square miles. Curacao Harbor has long been an important shipping center. A duty-free port, it was visited in 1939 by 7,000 ships, including cruise vessels whose passengers bought European cosmetics and other articles there.

### Soviet Army Smashes On Against Germans Toward White Russia

MOSCOW (AP) — With a battle-cry of "On into White Russia," the red army smashed doggedly on west last night, painstakingly overrunning more smoldering towns where the swastika had blown along the fortified line which the nazis tried at heavy cost to save.

White Russia, where the German army first pushed inside the old Russian boundary last summer, lies 30 miles beyond Smolensk and some 60 miles beyond the last reported Soviet forward positions in the Torpeis-Kholm sector. Its complete recapture would set the Germans back into Sovietized eastern Poland where the first blows of the German-Russian war were struck.

But reports from the front said the Germans were persisting in counter-attacks from both flanks of the long battleline in a desperate attempt to beat down the Soviet offensive.

The Russians, however, said they were engulfing battlefields where the Germans lost 1,500 men in a single day on the Leningrad front; more than 1,000 in unsuccessful attempts to stop the red army on the central front, and 850 in one endeavor to stem the red tide in the south.

### School Board Decides Against Making Any Changes in Calendar

WASHINGTON (AP) — No change will be made in the fiscal calendar of the Iowa City public schools, it was decided at a meeting of the school board last night, and spring vacation will be observed from March 28 to April 5, inclusive, as planned, with the second semester closing for the year on June 5.

As the calendar stands, seniors graduating in June will have ample time to register for the 8-week summer session at the university, starting June 8, if they wish to do so.

The board also discussed a possible increase in the salaries of school teachers and employees in view of the increased cost of living since the outbreak of war. The teacher's committee agreed to investigate the situation and bring a report before the board at its next meeting.

A motion was passed authorizing the supplies committee to purchase at once as many office supplies for next year as are available.

Attorney Arthur O. Lelf and Justice of the Peace J. M. Kadlec stated that they will not be candidates for re-election in the school board election, Mar. 9. The board moved to appoint the same election judges and clerks that served in the last board election.

Supt. Iver A. Opstad asked the board to consider expanding the athletic program for boys in senior high in preparation for future service in the draft program.

### Tanker Torpedoed Off Jersey Shore

NEW YORK (AP) — The Standard Oil tanker W.L. Steed was torpedoed to the bottom of the Atlantic in broad daylight off New Jersey Feb. 2, the navy reported yesterday with the landing of three survivors from a crew of 38.

Three lifeboats containing an undisclosed number of men still are missing.

An axis submarine hit the ship with one torpedo at 12:45 p.m. and the crew left the vessel in four lifeboats. Able-bodied Seaman Louis Hartz, 38, of Philadelphia, said.

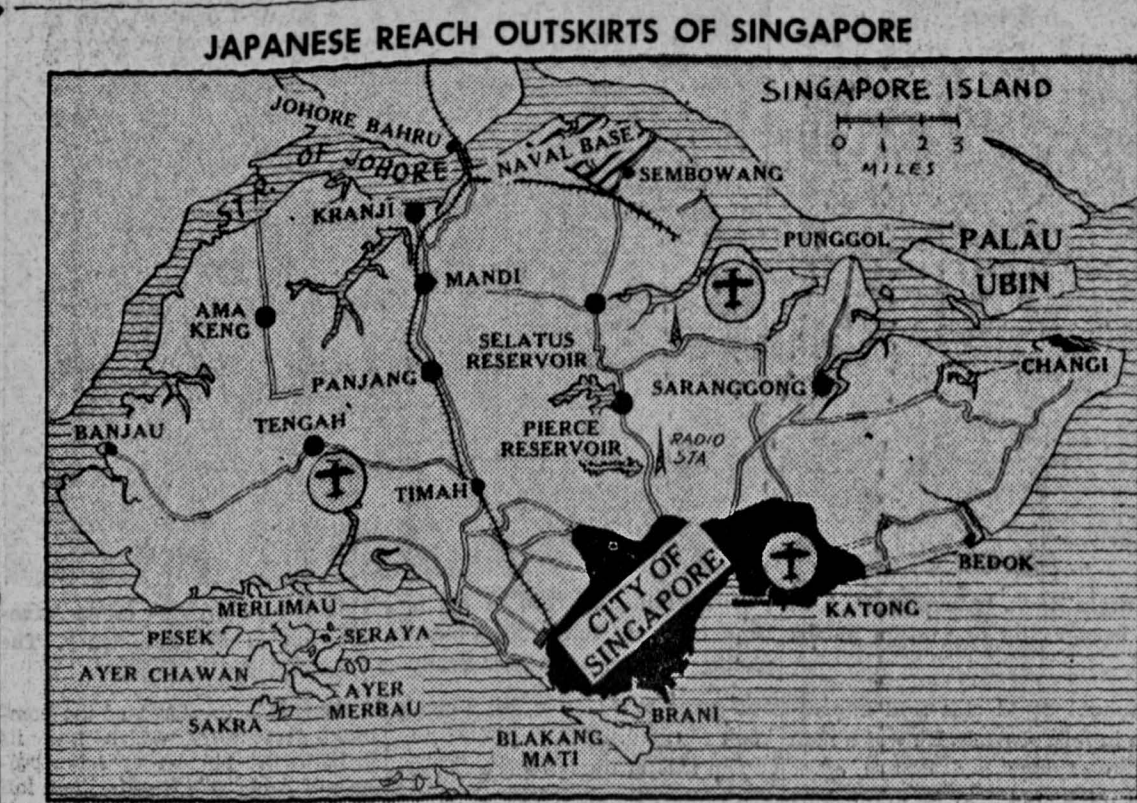
### \$300,000,000 Asked Of Congress to Ease Unemployment Problem

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress was asked yesterday to provide \$300,000,000 quickly for "cushioning the shock" of unemployment resulting from conversion of plants to wartime production and for training workers needed in defense industries.

Sidney Hillman, war production board labor director, and Paul V. McNutt, federal security director, told the house ways and means committee that time was of the essence; that the federal government must step in quickly to supplement state unemployment benefits.

### Government Rests Case Against Laura Ingalls

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government rested its case against Laura Ingalls, noted aviatrix, yesterday with testimony that she received \$300 a month from the German embassy to campaign for American neutrality, and that an embassy official even tried to get money to her after the United States entered the war.

## 2 Jap Cruisers, Destroyer, Sub Sunk off Naval Base at Amboina

### Mine Fields, Artillery Responsible for Latest Far Eastern Victory

BATAVIA (AP) — The sinking of two Japanese cruisers, one destroyer and a submarine off the Dutch naval base at Amboina island recently was announced by the naval commander here today. Altogether there were three cruisers sunk along with the other vessels in the first weeks of fighting around Amboina island, but the sinking of one of them had been announced previously.

The naval commander said his new announcement was based on these fresh reports:

On Feb. 2, the first Japanese cruiser to enter the mine field laid by the Netherlands navy at the entrance of Amboin bay, hit a mine and sank within a few minutes.

On Feb. 3, in a mine field laid before another bay of Amboina island, a terrific explosion occurred under water, and later evidence indicates that it was an enemy submarine which was attempting to enter the bay stealthily.

Nothing has been seen or heard of the Japanese undersiebat since, and its complete destruction is considered an established fact now.

### Korns to Give Speech Tonight On Cardiology

Prof. Horace M. Korns of the department of theory and practice, college of medicine, will explain problems concerning the heart and heart diseases in his Baconian lecture tonight at 7:30 in senate chamber, Old Capitol. His general subject is "Certain Aspects of Cardiology."

The history of cardiology and important discoveries related to this subject will be discussed.

"What is normal blood pressure?" is one of the questions that Professor Korns will answer tonight. He will explain abnormally low or dangerously-high blood pressure and what can be done for such conditions.

A clarification of the disease, angina pectoris, will be made. Professor Korns will also discuss heart attacks, the use of electrocardiograms in diagnosing a heart attack, chances of recovery from heart attack, rheumatic heart disease, heart murmurs and what they mean, and the diagnosis and treatment of irregularities of the heart beat.

### Dutch Admiral Made Naval Chief in East

WASHINGTON (AP) — An admiral of the royal Netherlands navy succeeded to the command of other American and other allied sea forces defending the rich East Indies yesterday as Japanese hordes battered the once-guardian fortress of Singapore.

The shakeup in command was occasioned, it was officially announced, by the heretofore unrelieved illness of Admiral Thomas C. Hart, 64-year-old American, who requested to be relieved of his weighty duties as chief of the combined naval forces in the western Pacific.

To the place he has held since January 17 the united nations leadership elevated his second-in-command, Vice Admiral C. E. L. Helfrich. This 55-year-old native of the Indies thus becomes supreme director of allied naval strategy on the eve of desperate days for the island's defenders—days which may produce the bitterest naval fighting of the war to date.

## Tragic Drama Fast Running Out On Important Allied Stronghold

### Threat Now Seen to Allied Positions in Java; Expect New All-Out Jap Offensive To Take Bataan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Air M. Landon asserted last night that the United States might well take a leaf from England's book and "change leaders, in the field or at home, whenever bungling management" of the war endangers military success.

Landon did not say whether he had any particular leader in mind, but he made plain that he considers there is "waste, inefficiency and confusion" in the government, and that new dealers have been treating the war "as just another political alphabet." He called on President Roosevelt to make an end of such practices.

The American people, he asserted in an address prepared for broadcast over the blue network at a Lincoln Day dinner here, are ready for united action, "but the sound of their leader's trumpet has been obscured."

"The babel of conflicting agencies in the nation's capital is creating confusion throughout the nation," the 1936 republican presidential nominee continued. "Because of a lack of frankness we are not sufficiently aware of what is required of us. We are not efficiently girding ourselves for battle."

Likewise, the former Kansas governor said, the president has "not made clear the staggering sacrifices ahead of us."

"We have never experienced anything like it in our history," he declared. "Resolute and courageous as the American people are, their mettle will be severely tried in the years ahead."

Landon said the American people specifically want these results: production adequate to the needs of the armed forces; certainty that defense funds are not wasted in non-defense expenditures nor misused because of incompetent management, and prevention of all war profiteering.

### Canadian Youths Riot Against Conscription For Overseas Service

MONTREAL (AP) — Bands of youths were admonished to vote "No" to conscription for overseas service and urged to start a "peace campaign" at a rally here last night and then they fanned out over the city in demonstrations that resulted in the injury of at least four policemen.

They engaged in melees with the police who tried to break up the demonstrations as the youngsters marched through the city bearing placards and shouting in French: "Down, down, down conscription."

After holding a 26-11 advantage at the intermission, the Marians went into a slump, which the Maroons were quick to take advantage of. Seemuth dropped in a goal in the first minute of the half, and St. Mary's didn't score again until the last 30 seconds of play, when Brack found an opening for a set-up.

# Iowa Swimmers, Wrestlers to Meet Minnesota Teams Here

## Gophers to Challenge Hawkeye Tankmen Tomorrow Evening

A strong University of Minnesota swimming team tomorrow evening will challenge the University of Iowa's record of not having lost a dual contest at home except to champion Michigan since 1933.

The Gophers and the Hawkeyes will open the Iowa home season, Iowa beat Chicago, 51-33, in the opener last week; while Minnesota likewise has defeated Chicago but lost to Ohio State.

Close races are in prospect in the 50- and 100-yard free style events, where Iowa's Ed Armbruster and Don Westrom will clash with Ray Hakomaki and Bob Acker.

Minnesota will center considerable power on the 220- and 440-free style races, with Arnie Eichelepp, third in the Big Ten events last year; and Acker, fourth in the conference 220, Cyle Kemnitz in Iowa's best 220 man but the Hawkeyes are not strong in the 440 event.

In the backstroke, the competition will be between Bob Becker and Ed Mahoney of Iowa, one-two in the Chicago meet; and Capt. George Brandt and Bill Ewens, Don Garniss of Minnesota and Cyril Noon of Iowa are the leaders in the breast stroke, with the race dotted about even.

Iowa will be favored in the 440-yard free style relay, with the same team which was third in the national meet and which defeated Minnesota in the final event to win last year's dual meet, 46-39. The Gophers, however, have the edge in the medley relay.

Hawkeye divers Leo Biedrzycki and Capt. Victor Vargon will be opposed to Dexter Phillips, former prep champion of Des Moines. Iowa performers are rated the favorites.

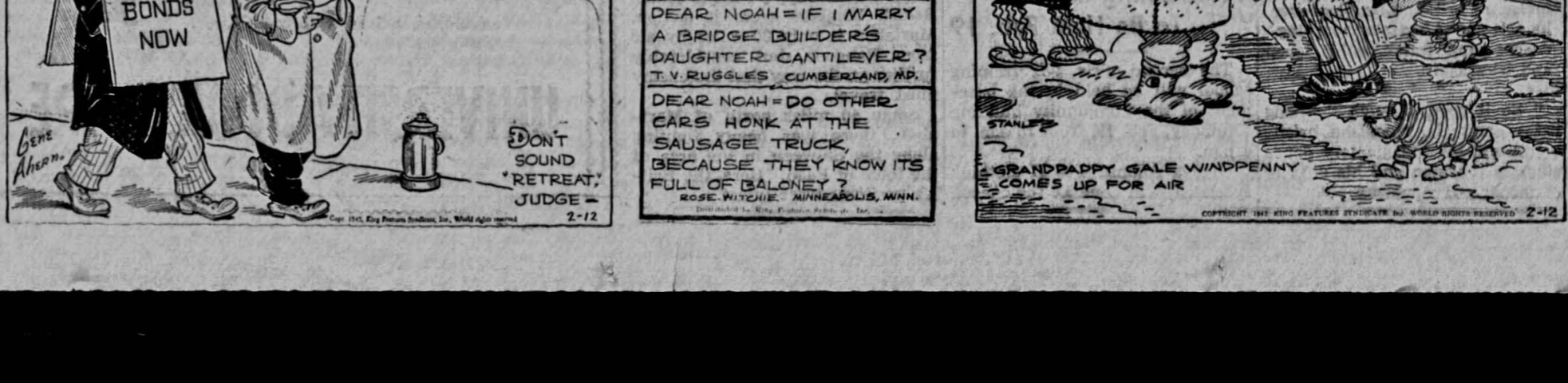
