FINANCES NOT PRIMARY POINT, SAYS BALDERSTON, REP. OF NAT'L. S.R.C.

"The chance to go to school back east offers enviable opportunities," said Dr. Balderston of the National Student Relocation Council to eighty young people last Wednesday evening at Edex Hall.

WHAT FOODS THESE MORSELS BE!

Will you kindly write an editorial on the waste of food in the warehouse department? Quite often spoiled vegetables and fruits are being thrown away. This is our food so that we, the people in this center, should ask them to be more careful; then there is no need to run out of foods like some mess has been doing. Why should perishable food spoil in the warehouse when we need all the fresh vegetable and fruit we can get? Also by a fair distribution of all foods persons in the last mess call will not be deprived of their allowance.

(signed) bt Replying to the proposed editorial, I find that the author is not acquainted with the problem of supplying 4,100 people with perishable foods.

It is almost impossible to obtain fresh fruits and vegetables in quantities and qualities desired. Our orders are placed 12 days in advance of our needs, but we cannot often obtain some items. Consequently, we must accept perishables which are not in accordance with our specifications. Either that, or do without. For example, cantaloupes recently received were already 10% spoiled. In order to insure a constant supply of perishables we must maintain a supply above our daily needs. This, in turn, results in a certain percentage of spoilage. So, the spoilage of fruit and vegetables to which the writer refers, is an unavoidable spoilage, and not the result of carelessness or mismanagement.

As to the shortage of food at the last mess, we must depend upon the kitchen personnel to advise us when such shortages occur. We are endeavoring in every way possible to abolish any shortages. To our knowledge no shortages have been reported within the last ten days. We want everyone to have an adequate supply of food, for upon our ability to care for our evacuees, rests the record we will establish. And we wish to establish a good one.



EDITORIAL

ON EDUCATION

Education plays a dominant role in the life of every growing child. It is as valuable to their mental development as recreation is to their physical health.

Thus, some weeks ago, the Center organized an educational system whereby classes for children, high school students, and adults were started. Handicapped to some extent by the lack of supplies and facilities as well as trained teachers, the work in this department, however, has shown a marked degree of progress.

Attendance to all classes, especially the primary grades where cookie, fruit, and milk are given to the youngsters daily, has been excellent, but there is a small number of juveniles who are not enrolled.

If the parties responsible for these children would undertake to see that these youths are listed in any of the various classes, the youngsters would benefit from their efforts.

COOPERATIVES

WHAT AND WHEN



A Cooperative is a business enterprise owned and controlled by the producers or consumers, the control of which rests EQUALLY with all the members, and the gains of which are distributed directly or indirectly to its members.

In a consumers' cooperative the ownership and operation of the marketing organization are in the hards of the consumers; and in the producers' cooperative the ownership and operation of the manufacturing plants and other productive enterprises are in the hards of the workers. All cooperatives are based on the idea that the consumers or producers are to benefit by any gain from the enterprise.

Of historical importance is the achievement of the 28 weavers in Rochdale, England, who in 1844 started out with a capital of only \$140. This is the beginning of the consumers' cooperative movement. This Rochdale cooperative was successful from the very start. In ten years it had a membership of 900 and a capital of \$35,000. From this humble beginning the cooperative movement grew until we have 75,000 societies throughout the world, membership of 70,000,000 and a business of over \$16,000,000,000.

The successful cooperatives have followed the Roch-dale plan. The principles of the Rochdale plan will be discussed in the following issues.





The first step toward a democratic government in the Center was taken with the formulation of the following rules and regulations for the Center's first general election.

QUALIFICATIONS OF CANDIDATES:

1. Any voting member of the Stockton Assembly Center who has reached his twenty-fifth year is eligible to be a member of the Advisory Council or Block Representatives group.

2. Candidate shall be a resident of the unit which

he will represent.

3. Any qualified candidate shall have 15 or more signatures of qualified voters from his block. Qualified voters shall not sign more than two candidacy forms. Forms to be provided by the special election committee. FILING OF CANDIDACY:

1. Any qualified candidate shall file his intention to run with Center officials, and upon approval, names shall be posted on the bulletin board at the Informa-

tion Booth.

The deadline for filing candidacy shall be 10 p.m., Sunday, August 2, 1942. QUALIFICATIONS OF VOTERS:

1. A voter shall be any resident who is a citizen of the United States and who has reached his 21st year.

2. A voter shall be a resident of the block in which he votes. ELECTION:

1. A plurality vote shall determine the election of the two block representatives.

2. The two block representatives with highest number of votes from each block will select five from their group to serve as the advisory council.

3. The five vacancies thus created in the block representatives! group will be filled by persons receiving the third highest number of votes in the respective blocks.

4. Only one member from any block will be. allowed to serve on the advisory council.

5. There shall be one representative, from the hospital, who shall be an ex-officio member. REGISTRATION OF VOTERS:

A house-to-house registration of voters shall be conducted by the present block representatives respective blocks.



Coupled with this and the fact that voting by proxy is not tolerated, a democratic control is maintained. Each individual thinks for himself and he casts his vote according to his own thoughts. He should vote wisely because a cooperative is only as strong as its weakest links - the individual members.







Our series of articles on cooperatives were started for this reason and may aid the Center people to gain some knowledge of this plan.

PRINCIPLE #3

Money invested in a cooperative, if it received interest, shall be limited to a fixed percentage which shall not be more than the prevailing current rate.

Any business needs capital to start and those that invest in a cooperative should be rewarded, but only in the form of interest at the rate that prevails in the business world.

This principle may not apply to us in our relocation project but is an important principle for any cooperative started voluntarily.




NEW ELECTION PLANS - MORE DEMOCRATIC

After a week of anticipation the election to be held today was suddenly paigning, called off in order to conform with the new rulings issued by the Western Defense Command.

To replace the previously outlined plan, a new form of organization known as the Advisory Committee is to be chosen from an elected panel of 21 members.

Though some time will be lost in bringing about this change, the new setup will probably prove of more value to the community than the other, since all residents, Issei and Nisei alike, and over 16, will be given the right to choose panel members.

It would also be more democratic in that English-speaking Issei and Nisei will be chosen on the Committee on a proportional basis.



4TH PRINCIPLE OF COOPERATIVES DISTRIBUTION OF PROFIT

Profit shall be returned to the consumers who patronize the cooperative on the basis of the amount of purchase. Cooperatives consider profit as an overcharge that should be returned in proportion to the amount of goods purchased.

Sometimes cooperatives modify this principle and give back the net profit in the form of social services such as recreation centers, libraries, nurseries and even hospitals for the use of their members. This second method of profit return will probably be used in our relocation centers.

ELECTION PLANS APPROVED

RULES AND REGULATIONS

The following rules and regulations governing the new election setup, in compliance with the orders from the W.C.C.A. Headquarters, have been submitted by the management and present Advisory Council.

ELECTION WILL BE HELD ON AUGUST 17. DEADLINE FOR NOMINATIONS IS AUGUST 14.

1. Each barrack will select two persons, one man and one woman, to act on the block nomination committee and act as registration clerk.

2. A. A meeting will be called of the barrack nomination committee representatives in each block, at which time a temporary chairman will be elected to accept nominations for a chairman.

B. The chairman will call for advisory committee nominations and two English-speaking Issei and two English-speaking Nisei will be nominated to be voted on at the final block election.

C. The chairman will call for nomination of five persons to act as a block election committee; this committee will not include persons who have been nominated as advisory committee candidates.

3. The three condidates in each block receiving the highest number of votes will be considered elected as members of the advisory committee panel, excepting that at least one Issei or Nisei shall be in each block group.

4. The six persons who receive the least number of votes, in proportion to number of registered voters in their respective blocks, will be automatically eliminated.

This elimination will be without regard as to whether or not the person is Issei or Nisei.

WOTERS, REGISTER MON.; ELECTION

Though S.A.C. election plans were temporarily retarded, the management and the present Advisory Council are accelerating the final steps toward undertaking the new election procedure as ordered by the W.C.C.A. Headquarters in San Francisco.

The rules in regard to procedure of nominations have been submitted and have gained the approval of the San Francisco Office.

Present Block Representatives will begin the registration of voters, persons over 16 years and older, on Monday.

The meeting for nominations will be held at the mess halls next Friday at 8 p.m.

Voting by secret ballot will be held on August 17, 8 to 11 a.m., 1 to 5 p.m. and 7 to 9 p.m. at the far end of the mess hells.

70 PERCENT REGISTERED VOTERS CAST BALLOTS; BLK.I, BEST RECORD

Last Monday, 1918 votes (70 per cent of the registered voters) were cast by the residents to elect 21 members of the Advisory Committee panel.
