# NOTE

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The resolutions of the Security Council, numbered in accordance with a system adopted in 1964, are published in yearly volumes of *Resolutions and Decisions of the Security Council*. The new system, which has been applied retroactively to resolutions adopted before 1 January 1965, became fully operative on that date.

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#### INTRODUCTION

1. The present report is submitted to the General Assembly by the Security Council in accordance with Article 24, paragraph 3, and Article 15, paragraph 1, of the Charter of the United Nations. It is the forty-second annual report of the Security Council to the General Assembly. These reports are circulated as <u>Supplement No. 2</u> to the <u>Official Records</u> of each requiar session of the General Assembly.

2. As in previous years, the report is not intended as a substitute for the records of the Security Council, which constitute the only comprehensive and authoritative account of its deliberations, but as a guide to the activities of the Council during the period covered. It should be noted, in this connection, that in December 1974 the Council decided to make its report shorter and more concise, without changing its basic structure. Moreover, in 1985, the Council agreed, in keeping with the spirit of its 1974 decision, to discontinue the practice of summarizing documents addressed to the President of the Council and instead simply to indicate the subject-matter of those documents which related to the procedure of the Council. This report has been prepared in accordance with those decisions.

3. Chapters in part I are arranged in chronological order based on the first occasion on which the Security Council considered the item in a formal meeting during the period covered by the present report. Similarly, chapters in part IV are arranged in chronological order based on the date of the first communication on each item received during the same period.

4. With respect to the membership of the Security Council during the period covered, it will be recalled that the General Assembly, at the 40th plenary meeting of its forty-first session, on 16 October 1986, elected Argentina, the Federal Republic of Germany, Italy, Japan and Zambia as non-permanent members of the Council to fill the vacancies resulting from the expiration, on 31 December 1986, of the terms of office of Australia, Denmark, Madagascar, Thailand and Trinidad and Tobago.

5. The period covered in the present report is from 16 June 1986 to 15 June 1987. The Security Council held 59 meetings during that period.

6. One member of the Security Council is not in a position to agree to the Russian language version of this report for the reasons referred to in the first paragraph of chapter 23 (para. 495) of the report of the Security Council to the General Assembly covering the period from 16 June 1976 to 15 June 1977.

7. Another member reaffirmed its position in this respect as set out in chapter 23 (para. 496) of the report of the Security Council to the General Assembly covering the period from 16 June 1976 to 15 June 1977.

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#### PART I

# QUESTIONS CONSIDERED BY THE SECURITY COUNCIL UNDER ITS RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE MAINTENANCE OF INTERNATIONAL PEACE AND SECURITY

#### Chapter 1

#### COMPLAINT BY ANGOLA AGAINST SOUTH AFRICA

#### A. Consideration at the 2691st to 2693rd meetings (16-18 June 1986)

8. At its 2691st meeting, on 16 June 1986, the Council included the following item in its agenda, without objection:

"Complaint by Angola against South Africa

"Letter dated 12 June 1986 from the Permanent Representative of Angola to the United Nations addressed to the President of the Security Council (S/18148)".

9. The President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Angola, Cuba, South Africa, the Syrian Arab Republic, Zaire and Zambia, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote, in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Charter of the United Nations and rule 37 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure.

10. The Council began its consideration of the item, hearing statements by the representatives of Angola, Zaire, speaking also in his capacity as current Chairman of the Group of African States, the Syrian Arab Republic, South Africa, Cuba and the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics.

11. The representatives of the United States of America and the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics made statements in exercise of the right of reply.

12. At its 2692nd meeting, on 17 June, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

13. In addition to those previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of the German Democratic Republic, Nicaragua, the Ukrainian Soviet Socialist Republic and Viet Nam, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

14. The Council heard statements by the representatives of the Ukrainian SSR, Nicaragua, Bulgaria, Australia, Denmark, China, the German Democratic Republic, Zambia and Vist Nam.

15. At its 2693rd meeting, on 18 June, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

16. In addition to those previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Czechoslovakia, India and Mongolia, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

17. The President drew attention to a draft resolution (S/18163) submitted by the Congo, Ghana, Madagascar, Trinidad and Tobago and the United Arab Emirates, which read as follows:

"The Security Council,

"Having considered the statement of the Permanent Representative of Angola to the United Nations,

"Recalling its resolutions 387 (1976), 418 (1977), 428 (1978), 447 (1979), 454 (1979), 475 (1980), 545 (1983), 546 (1984), 567 (1985), 571 (1985), 574 (1985) and 577 (1985),

"Gravely concerned at the renewed escalation of the persistent acts of aggression committed by the racist régime of South Africa in violation of the sovereignty and territorial integrity of Angola,

"Indignant at the continued military occupation of parts of the territory of Angola by South Africa in contravention of the Charter of the United Nations and relevant Security Council resolutions,

"Bearing in mind that all Member States are obliged to refrain in their international relations from the threat or use of force against the sovereignty, territorial integrity or political independence of any State and from acting in any other manner inconsistent with the purposes and principles of the Charter of the United Nations,

"<u>Conscious</u> of the need to take effective measures to maintain international peace and security in view of South Africa's continued violation of the Charter of the United Nations,

"1. Strongly condemns the radist régime of South Africa for its recent premeditated and unprovoked attack on the port of Namibe of Angola, as well as its continuing occupation of parts of the territory of that State;

"2. <u>Strongly condemns</u> the racist régime of South Africa for its premeditated, persistent and sustained armed invasions of Angola, which constitute a flagrant violation of the sovereignty and territorial integrity of that country, as well as a serious threat to international peace and security;

"3. Further strongly condemns South Africa's utilization of the Territory of Namibia as a springboard for armed invasions and destabilization of Angola;

"4. Demands that South Africa withdraw forthwith all its military forces from the territory of Angola, cease its violations of Angola's land, sea and air space and henceforth scrupulously respect the sovereignty, territorial integrity and independence of Angola; "5. <u>Calls upon</u> all Member States to desist from any action which would undermine the sovereignty, territorial integrity and independence of Angola;

"6. <u>Calls once more upon all States to implement fully the arms embargo</u> imposed against South Africa in resolution 418 (1977) of 4 November 1977;

"7. Acting in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Charter of the United Nations:

"(a) Determines that the policies and acts of aggression of the racist régime of South Africa constitute a threat to international peace and security;

(b) Decides to impose the following selective economic and other sanctions against the South African régime as an effective means of combating the apartheid system and bringing peace and stability to southern Africa:

"(i) Suspension of all new investments in South Africa;

"(ii) Prohibition of the sale of krugerrands and all other coins minted in South Africa;

"(iii) Suspension of guaranteed export loans;

"(iv) Restrictions in the field of sports and cultural relations;

"(v) Prohibition of all new contracts in the nuclear field;

"(vi) Prohibition of all sales of computer equipment;

"8. Requests Member States urgently to extend all necessary assistance to Angola and other front-line States in order to strengthen their defence capabilities against South Africa's acts of aggression;

"9. <u>Requests</u> Member States and international organizations urgently to extend material and other forms of assist nce to Angola in order to facilitate the immediate reconstruction of its economic infrastructure;

"10. Demands that South Africa pay full and adequate compensation to Angola for the damage to life and property resulting from the acts of aggression;

"11. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to monitor the implementation of the present resolution and to report thereon by the end of August 1986;

"12. Decides to remain seized of the matter."

18. The Council heard statements by the representatives of Czechoslovakia, the Congo, Thailand, Venezuela, Ghana, India and Mungolia, and by the President, speaking in his capacity as the representative of Madagascar.

19. The Council then commenced its voting procedure on the draft resolution (S/18163).

20. The representative of France made a statement before the vote.

21. The Council proceeded to the vote on the draft resolution.

Decision: At the 2693rd meeting, on 18 June 1986, the draft resolution (5/18163) received 12 votes in favour (Australia, Bulgaria, China, Congo, Denmark, Ghana, Madagascar, Thailand, Trinidad and Tobago, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, United Arab Emirates and Venezuela) to 2 against (United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and United States of America), with 1 abstention (France), and was not adopted, owing to the negative vote of a permanent member of the Council.

22. Following the vote, statements were made by the representatives of the United Kingdom and the United States.

23. The representative of Angola made a statement.

# Chapter 2

LETTER DATED 27 JUNE 1986 FROM THE PERMANENT REPRESENTATIVE OF NICARAGUA TO THE UNITED NATIONS ADDRESSED TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE SECURITY COUNCIL AND COMMUNICATIONS CONCERNING DEVELOPMENTS IN CENTRAL AMERICA

# A. Communications received between 21 and 27 June 1986 and request for a meeting

32. Letter dated 21 June 1986 (S/18175) from the representative of Nicaragua addressed to the Secretary-General transmitting the text of a note dated 17 June from the Minister for Foreign Affairs of Nicaragua to the Ministers for Foreign Affairs of the Contadora Group and the Support Group.

33. Letter dated 27 June (S/18189) from the representative of Nicaragua addressed to the Secretary-General transmitting the text of a note dated 25 June from the Acting Minister for Foreign Affairs of Nicaragua to the Secretary of State of the United States of America.

34. Letter dated 27 June (S/18187) from the representative of Nicaragua addressed to the President of the Security Council requesting the convening of an emergency meeting of the Council.

#### B. Consideration at the 2694th to 2698th meetings (1-3 July 1986)

35. At its 2694th meeting, on 1 July, the Council included the following item in its agenda, without objection:

"Letter dated 27 June 1986 from the Permanent Representative of Nicaragua to the United Nations addressed to the President of the Security Council (S/18187)".

36. The President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of India and Nicaragua, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote, in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Charter of the United Nations and rule 37 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure.

37. The Council began its consideration of the item, hearing statements by the Minister for Foreign Affairs of Nicaragua and the representatives of the United States, Venezuela and India.

38. The Minister for Foreign Affairs of Nicaragua spoke in exercise of the right of reply.

39. At its 2695th meeting, on 2 July, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

40. In addition to those previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Afghanistan, Democratic Yemen, the German Democratic Republic, the Lao People's Democratic Republic, Spain, the Syrian

Arab Republic and Viet Nam, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

41. The Council heard statements by the representatives of the German Democratic Republic, Viet Nam, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, the Syrian Arab Republic, Bulgaria and the Lao People's Democratic Republic.

42. At its 2696th meeting, on the same date, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

43. In addition to these previously invited, the President, with the content of the Council, invited the representatives of Angola, Cuba, Czechoslovakia, El Salvador, Mongolia and the Ukrainian Soviet Socialist Republic, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

44. The Council heard statements by the representatives of Australia, Spain, China, Democratic Yemen, El Salvador, Cuba, Ghana, the Ukrainian SSR, Czechoslovakia, Mongolia, Angola and the United States.

45. The representatives of Ghana, Nicaragua and the USSR spoke in exercise of the right of reply.

46. At its 2697th meeting, on 3 July, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

47. In addition to those previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Algeria, Guyana, the Islamic Republic of Iran, the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya and Yugoslavia, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

48. The Council heard statements by the representatives of the Islamic Republic of Iran, Madagascar, Denmark, France, the Congo and the United Arab Emirates.

49. At its 2698th meeting, on 3 July, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

50. The Council heard statements by the representatives of Algera, Guyana, Yugoslavia, the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya, Trinidad and Tobago, Afghanistan and Nicaragua.

51. The representative of the United States spoke in exercise of the right of reply.

# C. <u>Communications received between 30 June and 16 July 1986</u> and report of the Secretary-General

52. Letter dated 30 June (S/12194) from the representative of the USSR addressed to the Secretary-General, transmitting the text of a statement issued on 29 June by TASS.

53. Letter dated 30 June (S/18196) from the representative of India addressed to the Secretary-General, transmitting the text of a communiqué adopted in New York on the same date by the Co-ordinating Bureau of the Movement of Non-Aligned Countries. 54. Report of the Secretary-General dated 2 July (S/18184), submitted in accordance with Security Council resolutions 530 (1983) and 562 (1985), in which he referred to developments in Central America and to his contacts with the Governments of the five Central American countries and with the Governments of the countries that compose the Contadora Group and the Support Group. He transmitted the text of a letter dated 26 June from the Ministers for Foreign Affairs of Colombia, Panama and Venezuela and the Secretary for Foreign Affairs of Mexico addressed to the Secretary-General enclosing the final version of the Contadora Act on Peace and Co-operation in Central America, and the texts of a communiqué issued at Washington, D.C. on 10 February at the conclusion of a meeting of the Ministers for Foreign Affairs of the Contadora Group and the Support Group with the Secretary of State of the United States, and of a press release issued on 24 February 1986 following a meeting of delegations of Nicaragua and Costa Rica and the Contadora Group.

55. Letter dated 3 July (S/18218) from the representative of Guatemala addressed to the Secretary-General, transmitting the text of a communication.

56. Letter dated 7 July (S/18206) from the representative of Nicaragua addressed to the Secretary-General, conveying the text of a note dated 3 July from the Minister for Foreign Affairs of Nicaragua to the Secretary of State of the United States.

57. Letter dated 9 July (S/18214) from the representative of Honduras addressed to the Secretary-General, transmitting the texts of a statement made on 4 July by the Minister for Foreigr. Affairs of Honduras, and of a statement by the Plenipotentiary representing Honduras in the negotiations of the Contadora Group.

58. Letter dated 16 July (S/18228) from the representative of Costa Rica addressed to the Secretary-General, transmitting the text of a letter dated 15 July from the Minister for Foreign Affairs of Costa Rica to the Ministers for Foreign Affairs of the Contadora Group and the Support Group.

#### Chapter 3

THE SITUATION IN THE MIDDLE EAST

## A. United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon and developments in the Israel-Lebanon sector

# 1. <u>Report of the Secretary-General and communications received</u> on 30 June and 7 July 1986

59. Report of the Secretary-General dated 17 June (S/18164), containing an account of developments relating to the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon (UNIF1L) for the period from 10 April to 17 June 1986, submitted prior to the expiration of the mandate of the Force on 19 July.

6C. Addendum dated 10 July (S/18164/Add.1 and Corr.1) to the report of the Secretary-General on UNIFIL.

61. Letter dated 30 June (S/18197) from the representative of the Netherlands addressed to the Secretary-General, transmitting the text of a Declaration adopted at The Hague on 27 June by the Foreign Ministers of the 12 States members of the European Community.

62. Letter dated 7 July (S/18202) from the representative of Lebanon addressed to the Secretary-General.

#### 2. Consideration at the 2699th meeting (18 July 1986)

63. At its 2699th meeting, on 18 July, the Council included the following item in its agenda, without objection:

"The situation in the Middle East

"Report of the Secretary-General on the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon (S/18164 and Add.l and Add.l/Corr.l)".

64. The President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Lebanon and Israel, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote, in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Charter of the United Nations and rule 37 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure.

65. The Council began its consideration of the item.

66. The President drew attention to a draft resolution (S/18226) that had been prepared in the course of the Council's consultations, which he proposed to put to the vote.

Decision: At the 2699th meeting, on 18 July 1986, the draft resolution (S/18226) was adopted unanimously as resolution 586 (1986).

67. Resolution 586 (1986) reads as follows:

"The Security Council,

"Recalling its resolutions 425 (1978), 426 (1978), 501 (1982), 508 (1982), 509 (1982) and 520 (1982), as well as all its resolutions on the situation in Lebanon,

"Having studied the report of the Secretary-General on the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon of 17 June and 10 July 1986 (S/18164 and Add.1) and taking note of the observations expressed therein,

"Taking note of the letter of the Permanent Representative of Lebanon addressed to the Secretary General of 7 July 1986 (S/18202),

"Responding to the request of the Government of Lebanon,

"1. Decides to extend the present mandate of the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon for a further interim period of six months, that is, until 19 January 1987;

"2. <u>Reiterates</u> its strong support for the territorial integrity, covereignty and independence of Lebanon within its internationally recognized boundaries;

"3. <u>Re-emphasizes</u> the terms of reference and general guidelines of the Force as stated in the report of the Secretary-General of 19 March 1978 (S/12611), approved by resolution 426 (1978), and calls upon all parties concerned to co-operate fully with the Force for the full implementation of its mandate;

"4. <u>Reiterates</u> that the Force should fully implement its mandate as defined in resolutions 425 (1978), 426 (1978) and all other relevant resolutions;

"5. Requests the Secretary-General to continue consultations with the Government of Lebanon and other parties directly concerned on the implementation of the present resolution and to report to the Security Council thereon."

68. Following the vote, statements were made by the representatives of France, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics.

69. Statements were made by the representatives of Lebanon and Israel.

70. The representative of the United States of America made a statement.

71. The representative of Lebanon made a statement in exercise of the right of reply.

## 3. Communications received on 19 August and 4 September 1986 and request for a meeting

72. Letter dated 19 August (S/18287) from the representative of the United Arab Emirates addressed to the President of the Security Council, transmitting the text of a letter dated 13 August from the representative of the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) to the President of the Council.

73. Letter dated 4 September (S/18318) from the representative of France addressed to the President of the Security Council requesting an urgent meeting of the Council.

#### 4. Consideration at the 2705th meeting (5 September 1986)

74. At its 2705th meeting, on 5 September, the Council included the following item in its agenda, without objection:

"The situation in the Middle East

"Letter dated 4 September 1986 from the Permanent Representative of France to the United Nations addressed to the President of the Security Council (S/13018)".

75. The President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representative of Lebanon, at his request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

76. The Council began its consideration of the item and heard a statement by the Secretary-General.

77. As a result of consultations held among members of the Security Council, the President made the following statement on behalf of the members of the Council (5/18320):

"The members of the Security Council express their deep sorrow at the grave and distressing attacks which killed soveral members of the Irish and French contingents of the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon. These attacks come after various serious incidents in the recent past, in particular those of 11 and 12 August, in the course of which a number of members of the Force were injured. The members of the Council express their indignation at such resort to delaberate violence, which places in jeopardy the safety of the members of the Force.

"They convey their sympathy to the afflicted families and pay tribute to the qualities of composure, courage and nelf-sacrifice manifested collectively by all the members of the Force, in service of the ideals of peace of the Organization.

"Given the worsening of the situation in the zone in which the Force operates, the members of the Council consider it essential to adopt with all urgency measures aimed at the effective reinforcement of the security of the members of the Force and request the Secretary-General to undertake all necessary steps to that effect. "The members of the Council express their appreciation to the Secretary-General for his immediate dispatch of a mission led by the Under-Secretary-General which is to carry out, in consultation with the Lebanese Government, an in-depth examination of the measures to be taken to enable the Force to carry out its mandate, as laid down in Council resolution 425 (1978), effectively in the necessary conditions of security.

"They invite the Secretary-General to submit to the Council, as soon as possible, a report which he will prepare following the mission.

"The members of the Council unanimously express their confidence in the Secretary-General and the Commander of the Force in the current difficult circumstances."

78. Statements were made by the representatives of France, Ghana and Lebanon, and by the President, speaking in his capacity as the representative of the USSR.

# 5. Communications received on 12 and 18 September 1986, report of the Secretary-General and request for a meeting

79. Letter dated 12 September (S/18338) from the representative of Iraq, in his capacity as current Chairman of the Group of Arab States, addressed to the Secretary-General, transmitting the text of a letter dated 11 September from the observer of the PLO to the Secretary-General.

80. Special report dated 18 September (S/19348) of the Secretary-General on UNIFIL.

81. Letter dated 18 September (S/18353) from the representative of France addressed to the President of the Security Council, requesting an urgent meeting of the Council.

# 6. <u>Consideration at the 2706th-2708th meetings (19, 22 and 23 September 1936)</u>

82. At its 2706th meeting, on 19 September, the Council included the following item in its agenda without objection:

"The situation in the Middle East:

- "(a) Special report of the Secretary-General on the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon (S/18348);
- "(b) Letter dated 18 September 1986 from the Permanent Representative of France to the United Nations addressed to the President of the Security Council (S/18353)".

83. The President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representative of Israel, at his request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

84. The Council began its consideration of the item and heard a statement by the Secretary-General.

85. The representative of France made a statement.

86. At its 2707th meeting, on 22 September, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

87. In addition to the representative previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Lebanon and the Syrian Arab Republic, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

88. The President drew attention to a letter dated 22 September (S/18358) from the representative of the United Arab Emirates, requesting that an invitation under rule 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure be extended to Mr. Clovis Maksoud, Permanent Observer of the League of Arab States to the United Nations. In the absence of objection, the President extended the invitation requested.

89. The Council heard statements by the representatives of Israel and Lebanon.

90. The Council also heard a statement by Mr. Maksoud, in accordance with the decision taken earlier at the meeting.

91. The representative of the United Kingdom made a statement.

92. Statements in exercise of the right of reply were made by the representatives of the Syrian Arab Republic, Israel and Lebanon.

93. At its 2708th meeting, on 23 September, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

94. The President drew attention to the text of a draft resolution (S/18356),
 which had been submitted by France.

95. Statements were made by the representatives of the United Arab Emirates and I Israel and by the President, speaking in his capacity as the representative of the USSR.

96. Mr. Maksoud, to whom the Council had extended an invitation under rule 39 of its provisional rules of procedure at the 2707th meeting, made a further statement.

97. The Council commenced its voting procedure.

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98. Statements before the vote were made by the representatives of the United Kingdom, China, Denmark, Bulgaria, Australia and Ghana.

99. The Council then proceeded to vote on the draft resolution.

Decision: At the 2708th meeting, on 23 September 1986, the draft resolution (S/18356) was adopted by 14 votes in favour (Australia, Bulgaria, China, Congo, Denmark, France, Ghana, Madagascar, Thailand, Trinidad and Tobago, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, United Arab Emirates, United Kingdom of Great Britair and Northern Ireland and Venezuela) to none against, with 1 abstention (United States of America), as resolution 587 (1986). "The Security Council,

"Recalling its resolutions 425 (1978) and 426 (1978), as well as its resolutions 511 (1982), 519 (1982) and 523 (1982) and all the resolutions religing to the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon,

"Recalling the mandate entrusted to the Force by resolution 425 (1978) and the guidelines of the Force set forth in the report of the Secretary-General dated 19 March 1978 (5/12611) and approved in resolution 426 (1978),

"Further recalling its resolutions 508 (1982), 56 (1982) and 520 (1982), as well as all its other resolutions relating to the situation in Lebanon,

"<u>Solemnly reaffirming</u> that it firmly supports the unity, territorial integrity, sovereignty and independence of Lebanon within its internationally recognized boundaries,

"Deeply grieved over the tragic loss of human life and indignant at the harassment and attacks to which the soldiers of the Force are being subjected,

"Recalling in this connection the statement made on 5 September by the President of the Council on its behalf (S/18320),

"Expressing its concern at the new obstacles to the freedom of movement of the Force and at the threats to its security,

"Noting with regret that the Force, whose mandate has been renewed for the twenty-first time, has so far been prevented from fulfilling the task entrusted to it,

"<u>Recalling</u> its resolutions 444 (1979), 450 (1979), 459 (1979), 474 (1980), 483 (1980) and 488 (1981), in which it expressed its determination, in the event of continuing obstruction of the mandate of the Force, to examine practical ways and means to secure full and unconditional implementation of resolution 425 (1978),

"Emphasizing its conviction that this deterioration of the situation constitutes a challenge to its authority and its resolutions,

"1. Condemns in the strongest terms the attacks committed against the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon;

"2. Expresses indignation at the support which such criminal actions may receive;

"3. Pays homage to the courage, spirit of discipline and composure of the soldiers of the Force;

"4. <u>Takes note</u> of the report of the Secretary-General prepared after the recent mission by his representative in the region (S/18348), particularly the

paragraphs relating to the security of the Force and the withdrawal of Israeli military forces from southern Lebanon;

"5. <u>Takes note</u> of the preliminary security measures decided on by the Secretary-General and requests him to take any further measures needed to enhance the security of the men of the Force in their peace mission;

"6. <u>Urges</u> all the parties concerned to co-operate unreservedly with the Force in the fulfilment of its mandate;

"7. Again calls for an end in southern Lebanon to any military presence which is not accepted by the Lebanese authorities;

"8. Requests the Secretary-General to make the necessary arrangements for a deployment of the Force to the southern border of Lebanon, and solemnly calls on all the parties concerned to co-operate in the achievement of that objective;

"9. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to report to it within twenty-one days on the application of this resolution."

101. Following the vote, a statement was made by the representative of the United States.

102. The representative of Lebanon made a statement.

"The members of the Security Council have noted with appreciation the report submitted by the Secretary-General (S/18396) in conformity with Security Council resolution 587 (1986), requesting him to take any further measures needed to enhance the security of the men of the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon, and to make the necessary arrangements for a deployment of the Force to the southern border of Lebanon.

"They express their gravest concern that the basic objectives of Council resolution 425 (1978) have not yet been achieved.

"The members of the Council take note of the consultations initiated by the Secretary-General with the parties concerned and others with a view to the implementation of the mandate of the Force. While they regret that the consultations aimed at implementing resolution 425 (1978) have thus far failed to yield practical results, the members of the Council request the Secretary-General actively to pursue his contacts.

"They note the new security measures decided upon since the adoption of the resolution. They request the Secretary-General to suggest any other steps he may deem necessary for increased security in connection with the movements of the Force indispensable for the fulfilment of its mandate. They approve the proposals submitted by the Secretary-General in his report and his intention to seek the approval of the General Assembly for necessary budgetary appropriation. In that connection, they call on all countries to assume their financial responsibilities towards the Force and on the Secretary-General to continue his efforts to expedite the reimbursement of the idvances of funds made by the contributing countries. "They note with interest the instructions given by the Secretary-General no the Commander of the Force to keep under continuous review all the possibilities of varying the size and deployment of contingents if that would strengthen their security without jeopardizing the effectiveness of the Force. They request the Secretary-General to study these possibilities in consultation with the contributing countries and to put appropriate measures into effect.

"In that regard, they have noted with satisfaction the intention expressed by the Lebanese authorities to deploy a regular unit of their army in the zone of the Force to work in close liaison with it in accordance with the provisions of resolution 425 (1978).

"Once again, the members of the Security Council urge all the parties concerned to give full support to the Force in the fulfilment of its mandate and also call for an end to any military presence in southern Lebanon which is not accepted by the Lebanese authorities. They call on the Secretary-General to intensify his efforts to secure the full and effective implementation of resolution 425 (1978)."

"1. Decides to extend the present mandate of the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon for a further interim period of six months and twelve days, that is, until 31 July 1987;

"2. <u>Reiterates</u> its strong support for the territorial integrity, sovereignty and independence of Lebanon within its internationally recognized boundaries;

"3. <u>Re-emphasizes</u> the terms of reference and general guidelines of the Force as stated in the report of the Secretary-General of 19 March 1978 (S/12611), approved by resolution 426 (1978), and calls upon all parties concerned to co-operate fully with the Force for the full implementation of its mandate;

"4. <u>Reiterates</u> that the Force should fully implement its mandate as defined in resolutions 425 (1978), 426 (1978) and all other relevant resolutions;

"5. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to continue consultations with the Government of Lebanon and other parties directly concerned on the implementation of the present resolution and to report to the Security Council thereon."

188. Letter dated 22 July (S/18230) from the representative of Nicaragua addressed to the President of the Security Council, requesting the convening of a meeting of the Council.

#### B. Consideration at the 2700th to 2704th meetings (29-31 July 1986)

189. At its 2700th meeting, on 29 July, the Council included the following item in its agenda, without objection:

"Letter dated 22 July 1986 from the Permanent Representative of Nicaragua to the United Nations addressed to the President of the Security Council (S/18230)".

190. The President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Cuba, Democratic Yemen, El Salvador, India, Nicaragua and the Ukrainian Soviet Socialist Republic, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote, in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Charter of the United Nations and rule 37 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure.

191. The Council began its consideration of the item, hearing statements by the President of Nicaragua and the representative of El Salvador.

192. At its 2701st meeting, on the same date, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

193. In addition to those previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Czechoslovakia, the Syrian Arab Republic and Viet Nam, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

194. The Council heard statements by the representatives of the United States, India (speaking on behalf of the Movement of Non-Aligned Countries), Democratic Yemen, Czechoslovakia and the Syrian Arab Republic. 195. The representative of Nicaragua spoke in exercise of the right of reply.

196. At its 2702nd meeting, on 30 July, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

197. In addition to those previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of the Lao People's Democratic Republic and Poland, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

198. The Council heard Statements by the representatives of Cuba, Viet Nam, Poland, the Lao People's Democratic Republic and the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics.

199. The representatives of the United States, Cuba, Nicaragua and Viet Nam spoke in exercise of the right of reply.

200. At its 2703rd meeting, on 31 July, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

201. In addition to those previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Afghanistan, Honduras, the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya, the United Republic of Tanzania and Zimbabwe, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

202. The President drew attention to a draft resolution (S/18250) submitted by the Congo, Ghana, Madagascar, Trinidad and Tobago and the United Arab Emirates, which read as follows:

"The Security Council,

"Having heard the statement of His Excellency Mr. Daniel Ortega Saavedra, President of the Republic of Nicaragua,

"Recalling resolution 530 (1983), which, inter alia, reaffirms the right of Nicaragua and of all the other countries of the area to live in peace a id security free from outside interference,

"Recalling resolution 562 (1985), which, inter alia, reaffirms the sovereignty and inalienable right of Nicaragua and other States freely to decide their own political, economic and social systems, to develop their international relations according to their people's interests free from outside interference, subversion, direct or indirect coercion or threats of any kind,

"Taking note of the Order of 10 May 1984 of the International Court of Justice (S/16564) on the Provisional Measures of Protection, its Judgment of 26 November 1984 on the jurisdiction and admissibility of the demand of 9 April 1984 presented by Nicaragua and the final Judgment of the Court on Military and Paramilitary Activities in and against Nicaragua on 27 June 1985 (S/18221),

"Aware that, according to the Charter of the United Nations, the International Court of Justice is the principal judicial organ of the United Nations and that each Member undertakes to comply with the decision of the Court in any case to which it is a party,

"Recalling all the relevant principles of the Charter of the United Nations, particularly the obligation of States to settle their disputes exclusively by peaceful means, not to resort to the threat or use of force and to respect the self-determination of peoples and the sovereign independence of all States,

"Recognizing the repeated efforts made by the Contadora Group and the Support Group to promote a political and negotiated solution to the problems in Central America,

"1. <u>Reaffirms</u> the role of the International Court of Justice as the principal judicial organ of the United Nations and a means for peaceful solution of disputes in the interest of international peace and security;

"2. <u>Makes an urgent and solemn call</u> for full compliance with the Judgment of the International Court of Justice of 27 June 1986 in the case of Military and Paramilitary Activities in and against Nicaragua (S/18221);

"3. <u>Recalls</u> the obligation of all States to seek a solution to their disputes by peaceful means in accordance with international law;

"4. <u>Calls upon</u> all States to refrain from carrying out, supporting or promoting political, economic or military actions of any kind against any State of the region that might impede the peace objectives of the Contadora Group;

"5. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to keep the Security Council informed of the implementation of the present resolution."

203. The Council heard statements by the representatives of Bulgaria, the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya, the United Republic of Tanzania, the Ukrainian SSR, Afghanistan and Zimbabwe.

204. The representatives of the United States, the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya and Zimbabwe spoke in exercise of the right of reply.

205. At its 2704th meeting, on the same date, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

206. In addition to those previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representative of the Islamic Republic of Iran, at his request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

207. The Council heard statements by the representatives of the Congo, Ghana, Honduras, the Islamic Republic of Iran, El Salvador, Madagascar, China and Venezuela.

208. The Council then commenced its voting procedure.

209. Statements before the vote were made by the representatives of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and by the President, speaking in his capacity as the representative of Thailand.

210. The Council then proceeded to the vote on the draft resolution.

Decision: At the 2704th meeting, on 31 July 1986, the draft resolution (S/18250) received 11 votes in favour (Australia, Bulgaria, China, Congo, Denmark, Ghana, Madagascar, Trimidau and Tobago, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, United Arab Emirates and Venezuela) to 1 against (United States of America), with 3 abstentions (France, Thailand and United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland), and was not adopted, owing to the negative vote of a permanent member of the Security Council.

211. Following the vote, statements were made by the representatives of France, Denmark and the United States.

212. The representative of Nicaragua made a statement.

277. The President informed the Council of a letter dated 3 October (S/18377) from the representative of Oman, in his capacity as current Chairman of the Group of Arab Stat s, requesting that an invitation be extended to Mr. Farouk Kaddoumi, Head of the Political Department of the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO), to participate in the debate on the item, in accordance with the Council's usual practice. He added that the proposal was not made pursuant to rules 37 or 39 of the provisional rules of procedure but that, if approved by the Council, the invitation would confer on the PLO the same rights of participate pursuant to rule 37.

Decision: At the 2709th meeting, on 3 October 1986, the proposal was adopted by 10 votes in favour (Bulgaria, China, Congo, Ghana, Madagascar, Thailand, Trinidad and Tobago, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, United Arab Emirates and Venezuela) to 1 against (United States of America), with 4 abstentions (Australia, Denmark, France and United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland).

279. # Decision: At the 2713th meeting, on 8 October 1986, the draft resolution (S/18383) was adopted unanimously as resolution 588 (1986).

"The Security Council,

"Having considered the question entitled 'The situation between Iran and Iraq',

"Noting that the Count has been seized with this question for over six years and that decisions have been taken thereon,

"Deeply alarmed about the prolongation and intensification of the conflict resulting in heavy losses of human lives and considerable material damage and endangering international peace and security,

"Noting the obligation of Member States to refrain in their international relations from the threat or use of force against the territorial integrity or political independence of any State, or from acting in any other manner inconsistent with the purposes of the United Nations,

"Recalling the provisions of the Charter of the United Nations and in part cular the obligation of all Member States to settle their international disputes by peaceful means in such a manner that international peace and security and justice are not endangered,

"Recalling further that under the Charter, Member States have conferred on the Security Council primary responsibility for the maintenance of international peace and security and to this end have agreed to accept the role of the Security Council in the settlement of disputes,

"<u>Commending</u> the efforts of the Secretary-General in the search for a peaceful settlement of the conflict,

"1. <u>Calls upon</u> the Islamic Republic of Iran and Iraq to implement fully and without delay resolution 582 (1986) adopted unanimously on 24 February 1986;

"2. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to intensify his efforts with the parties to give effect to the above-mentioned resolution and to report to the Council no later than 30 November 1986;

"3. <u>Decides</u> to meet again to consider the report of the Secretary-General and the conditions for the establishment of a durable peace between the two countries in conformity with the Charter of the United Nations and the principles of justice and international law."

# F. Statement by the President of the Security Council (16 January 1987)

393. The following statement was issued by the President of the Security Council after consultations of the Council held on 16 January (S/18610):

"The members of the Security Council are dismayed and profoundly concerned by the fact that, in the period which has elapsed since the statement made by the President of the Security Council on 22 December 1986, hostilities between Iran and Iraq have intensified and the risk that the armed conflict, now more than six years old, may pose a further threat to the security of the region has increased.

"The large scale military operations which have taken place since the end of last December, and which continue at this time and the parties' repeated allegations of serious and recurrent violations of the norms of international humanitarian law and other laws of armed conflict clearly indicate the considerable escalation in recent weeks of this conflict, which has taken the lives of countless persons, both combatants and civilians, and has caused grievous human suffering and heavy material losses. The members of the Security Council reiterate their serious concern over the widening of the conflict through increased attacks on purely civilian targets.

"In view of this critical situation, the members of the Security Council, recalling the statements made on behalf of the Council on 21 March and 22 December 1986, again issue an urgent appeal to the parties to comply with Security Council resolutions 582 (1986) and 588 (1986). In this context, the members of the Security Council appreciate the efforts made by the Secretary-General and urge him to persevere in those efforts.

"The Security Council, on which the Members of the United Nations have conferred primary responsibility for the maintenance of international peace and security, will remain seized of the situation and will continue to make every effort to bring about the cessation of hostilities and the resolution of the conflict by peaceful means in accordance with the Charter."

## H. Statement by the President of the Security Council (14 May 1987)

487. The following statement was issued by the President of the Security Council after consultations of the Council held on 14 May (5/18063):

"The members of the Security Council, seized with the continuing conflict between Iran and Iraq, have considered the report of the mission of specialists dispatched by the Secretary-General to investigate allegations of the use of chemical weapons in the conflict (S/18852).

"Deeply dismayed by the unanimous conclusions of the specialists that there has been repeated use of chemical weapons against Iranian forces by Iraqi forces, that civilians in Iran also have been injured by chemical weapons, and that Iraqi military personnel have sustained injuries from chemical warfare agents, the members of the Council again strongly condemn the repeated use of chemical weapons in open violation of the Geneva Protocol of 1925, in which the use of chemical weapons in war is clearly prohibited.

"Recalling the statements made by the President of the Council on 30 March 1984 (S/16454), 25 April 1985 (S/17130) and 21 March 1986 (S/17932), they again emphatically demand that the provisions of the Geneva Protocol be strictly respected and observed.

"They also condemn the prolongation of the conflict which, in addition to violations of international humanitarian law, continues to exact an appalling toll of human life, to cause heavy material damage in the two States, and to endanger peace and security in the region.

"The members of the Council express grave concern over the dangers of an extension of the conflict to other States in the region.

"They reiterate their call for respect for the territorial integrity of all States in the region.

"The members of the Council reaffirm resolution 582 (1986) and call on both parties to co-operate with the efforts of the Security Council to open the way to an early settlement of the conflict on the basis of justice and honour.

"They express support for the Secretary-General's efforts to restore peace to the peoples of Iran and Iraq and call on both States to respond positively to his efforts."

bl7. The Council heard statements by the representatives of the United States, India, Peru, Iraq, Mexico, Cuba, Yugoslavia and Argentina.

518. The Minister for Foreign Affairs of Nicaragua spoke in exercise of the right of reply.

51? At its 2717th meeting, on 27 October, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

520. In addition to those previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Algeria, Democratic Yemen, Guatemala, Honduras, Spain and the Syrian Arab Republic, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

521. The Council heard statements by the representatives of Venezuela, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, Algeria, Bulgaria and Ghana.

522. The representatives of the United States and the USSR spoke in exercise of the right of reply.

523. At its 2718th meeting, on 28 October, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

524. In addition to those previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representative of the Islamic Republic of Iran, at his request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

525. The Council heard statements by the representatives of Spain, the Congo, Honduras, Guatemala, the Syrian Arab Republic, Democratic Yemen and the Islamic Republic of Iran.

526. The President drew attention to the text of a draft resolution (S/18428) submitted by the Congo, Ghana, Madagascar, Trinidad and Tobago and the United Arab Emirates, which read as follows:

### "The Security Council,

"Having heard the statement made by the Minister for Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Nicaragua,

"Recalling its resolutions 530 (1983) and 562 (1985),

"Aware that, under the Charter of the United Nations, the International Court of Justice is the principal judicial organ of the United Nations and that each Member undertakes to comply with the decision of the Court in any case to which it is a party,

"Considering that Article 36, paragraph 6, of the Statute of the Court provides that 'In the event of a dispute as to whether the Court has jurisdiction, the matter shall be settled by the decision of the Court', "Taking note of the Judgment of the International Court of Justice of 27 June 1985 in the case of <u>Military and Paramilitary Activities in and</u> against Nicaragua,

"Having considered the events that have taken place in and against Nicaragua after the said Judgment, in particular, the continued financing by the United States of military and other activities in and against Nicaragua,

"Emphasizing the obligation of States, urler customary international law, not to intervene in the internal affairs of other States,

\*1. <u>Urgently calls</u> for full and immediate compliance with the Judgment of the International Court of Justice of 27 June 1986 in the case of <u>Military</u> <u>and Paramilitary Activities in and against Nicaragua</u> in conformity with the relevant provisions of the Charter of the United Nations;

"2. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to keep the Council informed on the implementation of this resolution."

527. The representative of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland made a procedural statement.

528. The Council commenced its voting cocedure.

529. Statements before the vote were made by the representatives of Thailand. the United States and China.

530. The Council then proceeded to the vote on the draft resolution.

Decision: At the 2718th meeting, on 28 October 1986, the draft resolution (S/13428) received 11 votes in favour (Australia, Bulgaria, China, Congo, Denmark, Ghana, Madagascar, Trinidad and Tobago, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, United Arab Emirates and Venezuela) to 1 against (United States of America), with 3 abstentions (France, Thailand and United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland), and was not adopted owing to the negative vote of a permanent member of the Security Council.

531. Following the vote, statements were made by the representatives of Denmark, the United Kingdom, France and Ghana.

532. The representative of Nicaragua made a statement.

574. The President drew attention to the recommendation in the form of a draft resolution contained in the letter dated 24 November (S/18474) from the Chairman of the Security Council Committee established by resolution 421 (1977) concerning the guestion of South Africa.

575. The Council began its consideration of the item, hearing a statement by the representative of Trinidad and Tobago, in his capacity as Chairman of the Security Council Committee established by resolution 421 (1977) concerning the question of South Africa, in the course of which he introduced the recommendation contained in document S/18474.

Decision: At the 2723rd meeting, on 28 November 1986, the recommendation contained in document S/18474 was adopted by consensus as resolution 591 (1986).

576. Resolution 591 (1986) reads as follows:

"The Security Council,

"<u>Recalling</u> its resolution 418 (1977), in which it decided upon a mandatory arms embargo against South Africa',

"<u>Recalling</u> its resolution 421 (1977), by which it entrusted a committee consisting of all the members of the Council with the task of, among other things, studying ways and means by which the mandatory arms embargo could be made more effective against South Africa and to make recommendations to the Council,

"Recalling its resolution 473 (1980) on the guestion of South Africa,

"Recalling the 1980 report of the Security Council Committee established by resolution 421 (1977) concerning the question of South Africa on ways and means of making the mandatory arms embargo against South Africa more effective (S/14179),

"<u>Recalling</u> resolution 558 (1984), in which all States were requested to refrain from importing arms, ammunition of all types and military vehicles a coduced in South Africa,

"Recalling further resolution 473 (1980), by which the Security Council requested the Security Council Committee established by resolution 421 (1977) to redouble its efforts to secure full implementation of the arms embargo against South Africa by recommending measures to close all loopholes in the arms embargo, reinforce it and make it more comprehensive,

"<u>Reaffirming</u> its recognition of the legitimacy of the struggle of the South African people for the elimination of <u>apartheid</u> and the establishment of a democratic society in accordance with their inalienable human and political rights as set forth in the Charter of the United Nations and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights,

"Strongly condemning the racist régime of South Africa for further aggravating the situation and its massive repression against all opponents of apartheid, for the killing of peaceful demonstrators and political detainees, and for its defiance of General Assembly and Security Council resolutions, in particular Security Council resolution 417 (1977),

"<u>Reaffirming</u> its resolution 418 (1977) and stressing the continuing need for strict application of all its provisions,

"<u>Mindful</u> of its responsibilities under the Charter for the main enance of international peace and security,

"1. Urges States to take steps to ensure that components of embargoed items do not reach the South African military establishment and police through third countries;

"2. <u>Calls upon</u> States to prohibit the export of spare parts for embargoed aircraft and other military equipment belonging to South Africa and any official involvement in the maint sance and service of such equipment;

"3. Urges all States to prohibit the export to South Africa of items which they have reason to believe are destined for the military and/or police

forces of South Africa, have a military capacity and are intended for military purposes, namely, aircraft, aircraft engines, aircraft parts, electronic and telecommunication equipment, computers and four-wheel drive vehicles;

"4. <u>Requests</u> of all States that henceforth the term 'arms and related <u>matéricl</u>' referred to in resolution 418 (1977) shall include, in addition to all nuclear, strategic and conventional weapons, all military, paramilitary police vehicles and equipment, as well as weapons and ammunitions, spare parts and supplies for the aforementioned and the sale or transfer thereof;

"5. <u>Requests</u> all States to implement strictly its resolution 418 (1977) and to refrain from any co-operation in the nuclear field with South Africa which will contribute to the manufacture and development by South Africa of nuclear weapons or nuclear explosive devices;

"6. <u>Renews its request</u> to all States to refrain from importing arms, ammunition of all types and military vehicles produced in South Africa;

"7. <u>Calls upon</u> all States to prohibit the import or entry of all South African armaments for display in international fairs and exhibitions under their jurisdiction;

"8. Further calls upon States which have not done so to put an end to exchanges as well as to visits and exchanges of visits by government personnel, when such visits and exchanges maintain or increase South Africa's military or police capabilities;

"9. Further calls upon all States to refrain from participating in any activities in South Africa which they have reason to believe might contribute to its military capability;

"10. <u>Requests</u> all States to ensure that their national legislation or comparable policy directives guarantee that specific provisions to implement resolution 418 (1977) include penalties to deter violations;

"11. Further requests all States to adopt measures to investigate violations, prevent future circumventions and strengthen their machinery for the implementation of resolution 418 (1977) with a view to the effective monitoring and verification of transfers of arms and other equipment in violation of the arms embargo;

"12. Further requests all States, including States non-members of the United Nations, to act in accordance with the provisions of the present resolution;

"13. <u>Further requests</u> the Security Council Committee established by resolution 421 (1977) concerning the question of South Africa, in pursuance of resolution 418 (1977), to continue its efforts to secure full implementation of the arms embargo against South Africa in order to make it more effective;

"14. Further requests the Secretary General to report to the Security Council on the progress of the implementation of the present resolution, the first report to be submitted as soon as possible but in any event no later than 30 June 1987;

#### "15. Decides to remain seized of the matter."

577. Following the vote, statements were made by the representatives of the Congo, the USSR, France and the United States of America, by the President, speaking in his capacity as the representative of the United Kingdom, and by the representative of Bulgaria.

583. The President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Angola, Egypt, Nicaragua, Pakistan, Senegal, South Africa, the Sudan and Yugoslavia, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote, in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Charter of the United Nations and rule 37 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure.

584. The President informed the Council of a letter dated 17 February from the Chairman of the Special Committee against <u>Arartheid</u>, requesting that an invitation under rule 39 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Council be extended to the Chairman of that Committee. In the absence of objection, the President extended the invitation requested.

585. The President also informed the Council of a letter dated 17 February from the Acting Chairman of the Special Committee on the Situation with regard to the

Implementation of the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples, requesting that an invitation under rule 39 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Council be extended to the Acting Chairman of that Committee. In the absence of objection, the President extended the invitation requested.

586. The Council began its consideration of the item, hearing a statement by the representative of Egypt, speaking in his capacity as current Chairman of the Group of African States.

587. The Council heard a statement by the Chairman of the Special Committee against Apartheid, in accordance with the decision taken earlier at the meeting.

588. The representatives of South Africa and Angola made statements.

589. At its 2733rd meeting, on 18 February, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

590. In addition to those previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Algeria, the German Democratic Republic, India, Kenya, Morccco, the Ukrainian Soviet Socialist Republic, the United Republic of Tanzania and Zimbabwe, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

591. The President informed the Council of a letter dated 17 February from the President of the United Nations Council for Namibia, requesting that an invitation under rule 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure be extended to the delegation of the United Nations Council for Namibia, headed by its Vice-President. In the absence of objection, the President extended the invitation requested.

592. The President drew attention to a letter dated 17 February (S/18695) from the representatives of the Congo, Ghana and Zambia, requesting that an invitation under rule 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure be extended to Mr. Mfanafuthi J. Makatini, representative of the African National Congress of Fouth Africa (ANC). In the absence of objection, the President extended the invitation requested.

593. The Council heard statements by the representatives of Yugoslavia and Nicaragua.

594. The Council heard statements by the Acting Chairman of the Spycial Committee on the Situation with regard to the Implementation of the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples, in accordance with the decision taken at the 2732nd meeting, and the Vice-President of the United Nations Council for Namibia, in accordance with the decision taken earlier at the meeting.

595. At its 2734th meeting, on the same date, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

596. In addition to those previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Guyana and Uganda, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

597. The Council heard statements by the representatives of India, Japan, Zimbabwe, the German Democratic Republic, the Sudan, Morocco and Senegal.

598. At its 2735th meeting, on 19 February, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

599. In addition to those previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Czechoslovakia, Kuwait, Sweden and Togo, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

600. The President drew attention to a letter dated 18 February (S/18700) from the representative of Yemen, in his capacity as current Chairman of the Group of Arab States, requesting that an invitation under rule 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure be extended to Mr. Clovis Maksoud, Permanent Observer of the League of Arab States to the United Nations. In the absence of objection, the President extended the invitation requested.

601. The Council heard statements by the representatives of the Ukrainian SSR, Algeria, Pakistan and the United Republic of Tanzania.

602. The Council heard a statement by Mr. Makatini, in accordance with the decision taken at the 2733rd meeting.

603. At its 2736th meeting, on the same date, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

604. In addition to those previously invited, the Fresident, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Cuba, Ethiopia, the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya and Mongolia, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

605 The President drew attention to a letter dated 19 February (S/18706) from the representatives of the Congo, Ghana and Zambia, requesting that an invitation under rule 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure be extended to Mr. Lesacana Makhanda, representative of the Pan Africanist Congress of Azania (PAC). In the absence of objection, the President extended the invitation requested.

606. The President drew attention to a letter dated 19 February (S/18707) from the representative of Kuwait, requesting that an invitation under rule 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure be extended to Mr. Ahmet Engin Ansay, Permanent Observer of the Organization of the Islamic Conference to the United Nations. In the absence of objection, the President extended the invitation requested.

607. The President drew attention to the text of a draft resolution (S/18705) submitted by Argentina, the Congo, Ghana, the United Arab Emirates and Zambia, which read as follows:

#### "The Security Council,

"Deeply concerned at the continuing deterioration of the situation in South Africa and the worsening of the human suffering that the <u>apartheid</u> system is causing in that country,

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"Outraged at the Pretoria racist régime's further intensification of its repressive rule through the imposition of a state of emergency, vesting limitless powers in its security forces, resulting in the arbitrary arrest, detention without trial and torture of over 30,000 people and the killing of over 2,500 men, women and children in the last 20 months, thus further aggravating the already gravely deteriorating situation,

"Recalling its resolutions on South Africa, in particular, resolutions 418 (1977), 558 (1984), 569 (1985) and 591 (1986),

"Considering as totally reprehensible the use by the South African régime of repressive measures, including total news blackout,

"Acl:nowledging the legitimacy of the struggle for a free, united, non-racial and democratic society in South Africa,

"Emphasizing the urgent need for the intensification of international support and assistance to the struggle of the South African people,

"Convinced that apartheid cannot be reformed and must therefore be dismantled,

"Conscious of the need to take effective steps for the prevention and removal of all threats to international peace and security posed by South Africa's racist policies and military attacks against, and destabilization of, independent States of the region, as well as the illegal occupation of Namibia,

"Noting with appreciation the voluntary measures taken by some States against South Africa,

"Bearing in mind the obligations of States under Article 25 of the Charter of the United Nations,

"<u>Convinced</u> that the Pretoria régime's intransigent refusal to co-operate with the international efforts in search of a peaceful solution to the escalating conflict in South Africa compels the international community to impose, as a first step, mandatory sanctions under Chapter VII of the Charter,

"Acting therefore under Chapter VII of the Charter in discharge of its responsibilities for the maintenance of international peace and security,

"1. <u>Strongly condemns</u> South Africa for its persistent refusal to comply with the decisions of the Security Council and the resolutions of the General Assembly on the policies and practices of <u>apartheid</u>, the decolonization of Namibia and on its acts of aggression against and destabilization of neighbouring independent States;

"2. <u>Reaffirms</u> the legitimacy of the struggle of the oppressed South African people for the elimination of <u>apartheid</u> and for the establishment of a free, united, non-racial and democratic society in their country;

"3. <u>Declares</u> that racist South Africa's intransigent refusal to comply with the relevant decisions of the Security Council and the resolutions of the General Assembly constitute a direct challenge to the authority of the United Nations and a violation of the principles of its Charter; "4. Determines:

"(a) That the policies and practices of <u>apartheid</u> pursued by the Pretoria racist régime, which are the root cause of the grave and deteriorating situation in South Africa and in southern Africa as a whole, constitute a serious threat to international peace and security:

"(b) That the continued illegal occupation of Namibia as well as the repeated armed attacks perpetrated by South Africa and the destabilization of neighbouring States, constitute grave acts of aggression and a violation of their sovereignty and territorial integrity;

"5. <u>Decides</u>, under Chapter VII of the Charter and in conformity with its responsibility for the maintenance of international peace and security, to impose the following mandatory sanctions against South Africa, in accordance with Article 41:

"(a) Prohibition on the importation of krugerrands;

"(b) Prohibition on the importation of South African military articles;

"(c) Prohibition on computer exports to South Africa;

"(d) Prohibition on the importation of products from South African parastatal organizations;

"(e) Prohibition on loans to the South African régime;

"(f) Prohibition on air transportation with South Africa;

"(g) Prohibitions on nuclear trade with South Africa;

"(h) Prohibition on the acceptance, receipt, or holding of deposit accounts from the South African régime or from any agency or entity owned or controlled by that régime;

"(i) Prohibition on importation of uranium and coal from South Africa;

"(j) Prohibition on new investment in South Africa;

"(k) Termination of tax treaties and protocols with South Africa;

"(1) Prohibition of government procurements from South Africa;

"(m) Prohibition on the promotion of tourism to South Africa;

"(n) Prohibition on government assistance to, investment in, or subsidy for trade with South Africa;

"(o) Prohibition on the importation of South African agricultural products and food,

"(p) Prohibition on the importation of South African sugar;

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"(q) Prohibition  $\epsilon$  n the importation of iron and steel from South Africa;

"(r) Prohibition on the exportation of crude oil and petroleum products to South Africa;

"(s) Prohibition on co-operation with the armed forces of South Africa,

"6. <u>Calls upon all Member States</u>, in conformity with Article 25 of the Charter, to implement the present resolution;

"7. Requests the specialized agencies to ensure the effective implementation of the present resolution;

"8. Urges States not Members of the United Nations to act in accordance with the provisions of the present resolution;

"9. <u>Decides</u> to establish, in accordance with rule 28 of the provisional rules of procedure, a Committee of the Security Council to monitor the implementation of this resolution;

"10. <u>Calls upon</u> all States to report to the Secretary-General of the United Nations on measures taken to implement the present resolution;

"11. Invites the Secretary-General co report to the Security Council on the progress of the implementation of this resolution and to submit his first report not later than 30 June 1987;

"12. Decides to remain seized of the matter."

608. The Council heard statements by the representatives of France, the United Kingdom, Kuwait, China, Cuba and Czechoslovakia.

609. The Council heard a statement by Mr. Maksoud, in accordance with the decision taken at the 2735th meeting.

610. A statement was made by the representative of Ethiopia.

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611. The Council also heard statements by Mr. Makhanda and Mr. Ansay, in accordance with the decisions taken earlier at the meeting.

612. At the 2737th meeting, on 20 February, the Council continued its consideration of the item, hearing statements by the representatives of Kenya, the Congo, the Federal Republic of Germany, Bulgaria, Argentina, the USSR and Mongolia.

613. At the 2738th meeting, on the same date, the Council continued its consideration of the item, hearing statements by the representatives of the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya, Uganda, the United Arab Emirates, Guyana, Togo, Venezuela and Ghana.

614. The Council then commenced its voting procedure.

615. Statements before the vote were made by the representatives of Italy and the United States.

616. The Council then proceeded to the vote on the draft resolution.

Decision: At the 2738th meeting, on 20 February 1987, the draft resolution received 10 votes in favour (Argentina, Bulgaria, China, Congo, Ghana, Italy, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, United Arab Emirates, Venezuela and Zambia) to 3 against (Germany, Federal Republic of, United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northarn Ireland and United States of America), with 2 abstentions (France and Japan), and was not adopted, owing to the negative vote of a permanent member of the Council.

617. Following the vote, the representatives of Japan and the Federal Republic of Germany made statements.

Note dated 9 March (S/18746) by the Secretary-General, drawing the Council's attention to General Assembly resolution 41/95 entitled "Adverse consequences for the enjoyment of human rights of political, military, economic and other forms of assistance given to the racist and colonialist régime of South Africa".

619. Letter dated 9 April (S/18790) from the representative of Nicaragua, transmitting the text of a joint communiqué issued at Maragua on 29 March by the Government of Nicaragua and the South West Africa People's Organization (SWAPO).

620. Letter dated 9 April (S/18793) from the representative of South Africa addressed to the Secretary-General, conveying the text of a message dated 8 April from the Government of South Africa to the Government of Botswana.

621. Letter dated 13 April (S/18807) from the representative of Ghana addressed to the Secretary-General, transmitting the text of a joint communiqué issued on 13 March by the Head of State and President of Zambia and the Head of State and Chairman of the Provisional National Defence Council of Ghana.

622. On 16 April, after consultations with the members of the Council, the President issued the following statement (S/18808) on behalf of the members of the Council:

"The members of the Security Council express their deep concern about the decree issued by the South African authorities on 10 April 1987, under which nearly all forms of protest against detentions without trial or support for those detained are prohibited. The members of the Council express their strong indignation at this latest measure, which is based on the June 1986 decree imposing the nation-wide state of emergency, the lifting of which was called for by the members of the Council in the statement made by the President on their behalf at the 2690th meeting of the Council, on 13 June 1986.

"The members of the Council call upon the South African authorities to revoke the decree of 10 April 1987, which is contrary to fundamental human rights as envisaged in the Charter of the United Nations and to the relevant resolutions of the Security Council and can only aggravate the situation further, lead to an escalation of acts of violence and further intensify human suffering in South Africa. "The members of the Council, recognizing that the root cause of the situation in South Africa is <u>apartheid</u>, once again strongly condemn the <u>apartheid</u> system and all the policies and practices, including this latest decree, deriving therefrom. They again call upon the Government of South Africa to end the oppression and repression of the black majority by bringing <u>apartheid</u> to an end and to seek a peaceful, just and lasting solution in accordance with the principles of the Charter and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. They also call upon the Government of South Africa to set free immediately and unconditionally all political prisoners and detainees, in order to avoid further aggravating the situation.

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"They urge the Government of South Africa to enter into negotiations with the genuine representatives of the South African people with a view to the establishment in South Africa of a free, united and democratic society on the basis of universal suffrage."

623. Letter dated 17 April (S/18814) from the representative of South Africa addressed to the Secretary-General, transmitting the text of a letter of the name date from the Minister of Foreign Affairs of South Africa to the Secretary-General.

624. Letter dated 30 April (S/18839) from the representative of Zambia addressed to the Secretary-General, transmitting the text of a communiqué issued on the same date at the end of the Summit of Heads of State on the rehabilitation of the Benguela Railway, held at Lusaka.

625. Letter dated 28 May (S/18883) from the representative of Belgium, on behalf of the 12 States members of the European Community, addressed to the Secretary-General, transmitting the text of a statement on South Africa made at Brussels on 25 May by the Ministers for Foreign Affairs of the 12 States members of the European Community.

626. Note verbale dated 9 June (S/18917) from the representative of the USSR addressed to the Secretary-General.

627. Letter dated 15 June (S/18927) from the representative of Argentina addressed to the Secretary-General, conveying the text of a communiqué issued on the same date by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Worship of Argentina.

637. Letter dated 4 December (S/18501) from the representative of Zimbabwe addressed to the President of the Security Council, requesting an immediate meeting of the Council.

638. Letter dated 5 December (S/18502) from the representative of the United Arab Emirates addressed to the President of the Security Council, transmitting the text of a letter dated 4 December from the representative of the PLO to the President of the Security Council.

# B. <u>Consideration at the 2724th to 2727th meetings</u> (5 and 8 December 1986)

639. At its 2724th meeting, on 5 December, the Council included the following item in its agenda, without objection:

"The situation in the occupied Arab territories

"Letter dated 4 December 1986 from the Permanent Representative of Zimbabwe to the United Nations addressed to the President of the Security Council (S/18501)".

640. The President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Egypt, Israel, Jordan, Kuwait, Morocco and Zimbabwe, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right co vote, in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Charter of the United Nations and rule 37 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure.

641. The President informed the Council of a letter dated 5 December (S/18504) from the representative of the United Arab Emirates, requesting that an invitation be extended to the representative of the PLO to participate in the debate on the item, in accordance with the Council's usual practice. He added that the proposal was not made pursuant to rule 37 or 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure but that, if approved by the Council, the invitation would confer on the PLO the same rights of participation as those conferred on a Member State when it was invited to participate pursuant to rule 37.

642. The President, speaking in his capacity as the representative of the United States of America, made a statement concerning the proposal.

Decision: At the 2724th meeting, on 5 December 1986, the proposal was adopted by 10 votes in favour (Bulgaria, China, Congo, Ghana, Madagascar, Thailand, Trinidad and Tobago, Union of Sovie: Socialist Republics, United Arab Emirates and Venezuela) to 1 against (United States of America), with 4 abstentions (Australia, Denmark, France and United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland).

643. The President drew attention to another letter dated 5 December from the Chairman of the Committee on the Exercise of the Inalienable Rights of the Palestinian People, requesting that an invitation under rule 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure be extended to the Chairman of that Committee. In the absence of objection, the inesident extended the invitation requested.

644. The President also drew attention to a letter of the same date (S/18505) from the representative of the United Arab Emirates, requesting that an invitation under rule 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure be extended to Mr. Clovis Maksoud, Permanent Observer of the League of Arab States to the United Nations. In the absence of objection, the Council extended the invitation requested.

645. The Council then began its consideration of the item by hearing a statement by the representative of Zimbabwe.

646. The representative of the PLO made a statement.

647. Statements were also made by the representative of Kuwait, speaking in his capacity as current Chairman of the Group of Arab States, and by the representatives of Egypt, Mcrocco and Israel.

648. The representative of the PLO spoke in exercise of the right of reply.

649. At its 2725th meeting, on 8 December, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

650. In addition to those previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representative of the Syrian Arab Republic, at his request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

651. The Council heard a statement by the Chairman of the Committee on the Exercise of the Inalignable Rights of the Palestinian People, in accordance with the decision taken at the 2724th meeting.

652. Statements were made by the representatives of Jordan and the Syrian Arab Republic.

653. The Council heard a statement by Mr. Maksoud, in accordance with the decision taken at the 2724th meeting.

654. Statements were also made by the representatives of the USSK and China.

655. The representative of Israel made a statement in exercise of the right of reply.

656. The Council heard a further statement by Mr. Maksoud, in accordance with the decision taken at the 2724th meeting.

657. At its 2726th meeting, 8 December, the Council continued its consideration. of the item by hearing statements by the representatives of Ghana, France, Bulgaria, the United Kingdom and Israel.

658. A statement was made by the representative of the PLO.

659. The representative of the Congo spoke on a point of procedure.

660. At its 2727th meeting, on the same date, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

661. The President drew attention to a draft resolution (S/18506) submitted by the Congo, Ghana, Madagascar, Trinidad and Tobago and the United Arab Emirates, which read as follows:

#### "The Security Council,

"<u>Having considered</u> the letter dated 4 December 1986 from the Permanent Representative of Zimbabwe to the United Nations, in his capacity as the Chairman of the Co-ordinating Bureau of the Movement of Non Aligned Countries, contained in document S/18501, "Recalling the Geneva Convention relative to the Protection of Civilian Persons in Time of War, of 12 August 1949,

"Seriously concerned about the situation in the Palestinian and other Arab territories occupied by Israel since 1967, including Jerusalem,

"Bearing in mind the specific status of Jerusalem,

"1. <u>Reaffirms</u> that the Geneva Convention relative to the Protection of Civilian Persons in Time of War is applicable to the Palestinian and other Arab territories occupied by Israel since 1967, including Jerusalem;

"2. <u>Condemns</u> the opening of fire by the Israeli army on defenceless students resulting in the death and the wounding of a number of students;

"3. <u>Calls upon</u> Israel to abide scrupulously by the Geneva Convention relative to the Protection of civilian Persons in Time of War and to put an immediate end to any violations;

"4. Further calls upon Israel to release all persons whom it has detained as a result of the recent events at Bir Zeit University;

"5. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to report to the Council on the implementation of the present resolution as soon as possible."

662. The representative of the Congo, on behalf of the sponsors, orally revised operative paragraphs 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 of draft resolution S/13506, which was subsequently issued as S/18506/Rev.1.

663. The Council then proceeded to the vote on the draft resolution, as orally revised (S/18506/Rev.1).

Decision: At the 2727th meeting, on 8 December, the draft resolution, as orally revised (S/18506/Rev.1), was adopted by 14 votes in favour (Australia, Bulgaria, China, Congo, Denmark, France, Ghana, Madagascar, Thailand, Trinidad and Tobago, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, United Arab Emirates, United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and Venezuela), to none against, with 1 abstention (United States of America), as resolution 592 (1986).

664. Resolution 592 (1986) reads as follows:

"The Security Council,

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"<u>Having considered</u> the letter dated 4 December 1986 from the Permanent Representative of Zimbabwe to the United Nations, in his capacity as the Chairman of the Co-ordinating Bureau of the Movement of Non-Aligned Countries, contained in document S/18501,

"Recalling the Geneva Convention relative to the Protection of Civilian Persons in Time of War, of 12 August 1949, 1/

"Seriously concerned about the situation in the Palestinian and other Arab territories occupied by Israel since 1967, including Jerusalem, "Bearing in mind the specific status of Jerusalem,

"1. <u>Reaffirms</u> that the Geneva Convention relative to the Protection of Civilian Persons in Time of War is applicable to the Palestinian and other Arab territories occupied by Israel since 1967, including Jerusalem;

"2. <u>Strongly deplores</u> the opening of fire by the Israeli army resulting in the death and the wounding of defenceless students;

"3. <u>Calls upon</u> Israel to abide immediately and scrupulously by the Geneva Convention relative to the Protection of Civilian Persons in Time of War;

"4. Further calls upon Israel to release any person or persons detained as a result of the recent events at Bir Zeit University in violation of the above-mentioned Geneva Convention;

"5. <u>Also calls on all concerned parties to crecise maximum restraint</u>, to avoid violent acts and to contribute towards the establishment of peace;

"6. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to report to the Council on the implementation of the present resolution not later than 20 December 1986.

"1. <u>Extends once more</u> the stationing in Cyprus of the United Nations Peace-keeping Force established under resolution 186 (1964) for a further period ending on 15 June 1987;

"2. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to continue his mission of good offices, to keep the Security Council informed of the progress made and to submit a report on the implementation of the present resolution by 31 May 1987;

"3. <u>Calls upon</u> all the parties concerned to continue to co-operate with the Force on the basis of the present mandate."

736. Following the adoption of the resolution, statements were made by the representatives of Cyprus and Greece.

"1. Extends once more the stationing in Cyprus of the United Nations Peace-keeping Force established under resolution 186 (1964) for a further period ending on 15 December 1987;

"2. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to continue his mission of good offices, to keep the Security Council informed of the progress made and to

submit a report on the implementation of the present resolution by 30 November 1987;

"3. <u>Calls upon all the parties concerned to continue to co-operate with</u> the Force on the basis of the present mandate."

760. Following the adoption of the resolution, statements were made by the representatives of Cyprus and Greece.

761. The Council heald a statement by Mr. Koray, in accordance with the decision taken earlier at the meeting.

795. The Council heard statements by the representatives of Zimbabwe, speaking in his capacity as Chairman of the Co-ordinating Bureau of the Movement of Non-Aligned Countries, Japan, Venezuela, Peru, Egypt, Barbados and Qatar.

796. In accordance with the decision taken at its 2740th meeting, the Council heard a statement by Mr. Ansay.

797. The representative of Angola made a statement.

798. At its 2742nd meeting, on 7 April, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

799. In addition to those previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Bangladesh, Gabon, Nigeria, Sri Lanka, the Sudan, Tunisia and Viet Nam, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

800. The President drew attention to a letter dated 6 April from the Chairman of the Special Committee against <u>Apartheid</u>, requesting that an invitation under rule 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure be extended to the Chairman of that Committee. In the absence of objection, the President extended the invitation requested.

801. The Council heard a statement by the representative of Nicaragua.

802. The Council also heard a statement by the Chairman of the Special Committee on the Situation with regard to the Implementation of the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples, in accordance with the decision taken at the 2740th meeting.

803. Statements were made by the representatives of Zambia, Togo, Tunisia, Mozambique and the German Democratic Republic.

804. At its 2743rd meeting, on the same date, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

805. In addition to those previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representative of Guyana, at his request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

806. The President drew attention to the text of a draft resolution (S/18785) submitted by Argentina, the Congo, Ghana, the United Arab Emirates and Zambia, which read as follows:

#### "The Security Council,

"Having considered the reports of the Secretary-General of 6 September 1985 (S/17442) and 31 March 1987 (S/18767) and the letter dated 12 June 1986 from the Secretary-General addressed to the Minister of Foreign Affairs of South Africa (S/18150),

"Having heard the statement by the President of the United Nations Council for Namibia,

"Having considered the statement ! Mr. Theo-Ben Gurirab, Secretary of Foreign Affairs of the South West Africa People's Organization,

"<u>Commending</u> the South West Africa People's Organization for its full co-operation with the Secretary-General of the United Nations and his special representative, including its expressed readiness to sign and observe a cease-fire agreement with South Africa, in the implementation of the United Nations plan for the independence of Namibia as embodied in Security Council resolution 435 (1978),

"<u>Recalling</u> General Assembly resolutions 1514 (XV) of 14 December 1960 and 2145 (XXI) of 27 October 1966, as well as the advisory opinion of the International Court of Justice of 21 June 1971 on Namibia,

"<u>Reaffirming</u> the inalienable rights of the people of Namibia to self-determination, freedom and national independence in a united Namibia in accordance with the Charter of the United Nations and General Assembly resolution 1514 (XV) of 14 December 1960,

"<u>Reaffirming</u> the legitimacy of the struggle of the oppressed people of Namibia,

"<u>Recalling and reaffirming</u> its resolutions 269 (1969), 276 (1970), 301 (1971), 385 (1976), 431 (1978), 432 (1978), 435 (1978), 439 (1978), 532 (1983), 539 (1983) and 566 (1985),

"<u>Reaffirming</u> the legal and direct responsibility of the United Nations over Namibia and the primary responsibility of the Security Council for ensuring the immediate and unconditional implementation of its resolutions. in particular resolutions 385 (1976), 435 (1978) and 439 (1978),

"Taking into consideration the final documents of the International Conference for the Immediate Independence of Namibia, held at Vienna from 7 to 11 July 1986, the twenty-second ordinary session of the Assembly of Heads of State and Government of the Organization of African Unity, held at Addis Ababa from 28 to 30 July 1986, the Eighth Conference of Heads of State or Government of Non-Aligned Countries, held at Harare from 1 to 7 September 1986, including the special appeal on the question of Namibia, and of the meeting of the Foreign Ministers of the Front-line States and those of the States members of the European Community on the political situation in southern Africa, held at Lusaka on 3 and 4 February 1986, "Taking into account General Assembly resolution S-14, adopted at its fourteenth special mession from 17 to 20 September 1986 and General Assembly resolution 41/39 (A-E) of 20 November 1986,

"Gravely concerned at the Pretoria régime's continued illega' occupation of the Territory and increased repression of the people of Namibia,

"Deeply concerned at the persistant refusal of the Pretoria régime to co-operate in the implementation or resolutions and decisions of the Security Council and the General Assembly on the question of Namibia.

"Deploring the intransigent sttitude of <u>apartheid</u> South Africa, which undermines the United Nations authority in implementing its resolutions and decisions on Namibia, in particular Security Council regolution 435 (1978),

"Further concerned at Pretoria's militarization and use of Namibia as a springboard for acts of aggression and destabilization of independent and sovereign States of the region, in pursuance of its policy of regional hegemony, which constitutes a serious threat to international peace and security,

"Convinced of the urgent need to take effective measures for the prevention of all threats to international peace and security posed by racist South Africa's aggressive policies and actions in southern Africa,

"<u>Conscious</u> of the obligation of Member States under Article 25 of the Charter,

"Conscious also of its responsibility under Article 41 of the Charter,

"1. <u>Strongly condemns</u> racist South Africa for its continued illegal occupation of Namibia and its persistent refusal to comply with resolutions and decisions of the Security Council, in particular resolutions 385 (1976) and 435 (1978);

"2. <u>Reaffirms</u> the legal and direct responsibility of the United Nations over Namibia and the legitimacy of the struggle of the Namibian people against the illegal occupation by the Pretoria régime and calls upon all States to increase their political, material and moral support to them;

"3. <u>Reiterates</u> that, in accordance with its resolutions 539 (1983, and 566 (1985), the independence of Namibia cannot be mode conditional upon issues totally alien to Security Council resolution 435 (1978) and calls upon those countries insisting on extraneous and irrelevant issues to desist from doing so;

"4. <u>Reiterates</u> that Security Council resolution 435 (1978), embodying the United Nations plan for the independence of Namibia, is the only internationally accepted basis for a peaceful settlement of the g estion of Namibia; "5. Once again condemns the Pretoria régime for its installation of a so-called interim government in Namibia in flagrant violation of United Nations resolutions and decisions, particularly Security Council resolution 435 (1978), and reiterates, in accordance with resolution 566 (1985), its declaration of such action as illegal, null and void;

"6. <u>Calls upon</u> all States once more not to accord recognition to this or any other entity imposed on the Namibian people by the Pretoria régime in violation of the United Nations resolutions and decisions on Namibia, and reiterates its demand that the racist régime of South Africa rescind this and similar illegal and unilateral actions;

"7. Determines that:

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"(a) South Africa's continued illegal occupation of Namibia constitutes a breach of international peace and security in violation of the Charter of the United Nations;

"(b) The persistent refusal by racist South Africa to comply with Security Council and General Assembly resolutions and decisions on Namibia and its violation thereof constitutes a serious threa: to international peace and security;

"(c) The militarization of Namibia and the repeated armed attacks perpetrated from Namibia by South Africa against independent and sovereign States in southern Africa constitute grave acts of aggression;

"8. <u>Ducides</u>, under Chapter VII of the Charter and in conformity with its primary responsibility for the maintenance of international peace and security, to impose comprehensive mandatory sanctions against South Africa;

"9. <u>Calls upon</u> all States, in conformity with Article 25 of the Charter, to implement the present resolution and all the other relevant Security Council resolutions relating to Namibia;

"10. Further calls upon the specialized agencies to ensure the effective implementation of the present resolution and all the other relevant Security Council resolutions on Namibia;

"11. Urges States not Members of the United Nations to act in accordance with the provisions of the present resolution, as well as the principles stated in Article 2 of the Charter;

"12. <u>Decides</u> to establish, in accordance with rule 28 of the Council's provisional rules of proce are, a Committee of the Security Council to monitor the implementation of the present resolution;

"13. <u>Calls upon</u> States Members of the United Nations to report to the Secretary-General of the United Nations on measures taken to implement the present resolution;

"14. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council on the progress in the implementation of the present resolution and to submit his report not later than 31 August 1987." 807. Statements were made by the epresentatives of Canada, France, Argentina, the Federal Republic of Cermany, China, Yugoslavia, Senegal and Mexico.

808. The Chairman of the Special Committee against <u>Apartheid</u> made a statement, in accordance with the decision taken at the 2742nd meeting of the Council.

809. Statements were made by the representatives of the Sudan, Pakistan and India.

810. At its 2744th meeting, on 8 April, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

811. In addition to those previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of the Byelorussian Soviet Socialist Republic, Ethiopia, the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya, Mongolia and the Syrian Arab Republic, a their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

812. Statements were made by the representatives of Algeria, Turkey, the Ukrainian SSR, Nigeria, Cuba, Kuwait, Bangladesh and Jamaica.

813. At its 2745th meeting, on the same date, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

814. The President drew attention to a letter dated 8 April (S/18787) from the representatives of the Congo, Ghana and Zambia requesting that an invitation under rule 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure be extended to Mr. Francis Meli. In the absence of objection, the President extended the invitation requested.

815. Statements were made by the representatives of Viet Nam, Afghanistan, Sri Lanka, Morocco, the United Arab Emirates, Burkina Faso, Ghana, Gabon, Ethiopia, The Syrian Arab Republic and Mongolia.

816. At its 2746th meeting, on 9 April, the Council continued its consideration of the item.

817. In addition to those previously invited, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Czechoslovakia and Uganda, at the request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

818. The Council heard statements by the representatives of Guyana and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland.

819. Mr. Meli made a statement in accordance with the decision taken at the 2745th meeting of the Council.

820. Statements were made by the representatives of the United States of America, the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya, the USSR, Czechoslovakia, the Byelorussian SSR, Uganda and the Congo.

821. At its 2747th meeting, on the same date, the Council continued its consideration of the item by hearing a statement by the President, speaking in his capacity as the representative of Bulgaria.

822. The representative of Cuba made a statement in exercise of the right of reply.

823. The Council then commenced its voting procedure.

824. Statements before the vote were made by the representatives of Italy, France and the Federal Republic of Germany.

825. The Council then proceeded to the vote on the draft resolution.

Decision: At the 2747th meeting, on 9 April 1987, the draft resolution (S/18785) received 9 votes in favour (Argentina, Bulgaria, China, Congo, Ghana, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, United Arab Emirates, Venezuela and Zambia) to 3 against (Germany, Federal Republic of, United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, United States of America) with 3 abstentions (France, Italy and Japan), and was not adopted, owing to the negative vote of a permanent member of the Council.

826. Following the vote, a statement was made by the representative of Ghana, speaking in his capacity as current Chairman of the Group of African States.

827. Further statements were made by the representatives of the United States and the United Kingdom.

128. In accordance with the decision taken at the 2740th meeting, the Council heard a further statement by Mr. Gurirab.

#### RECOMMENDATION REGARDING THE APPOINTMENT OF THE SECRETARY-GENERAL OF THE UNITED NATIONS

834. At its 2714th meeting, held in private on 10 October 1986, the Security Council considered the question of its recommendation regarding the appointment of the Secretary-General of the United Nations.

835. As a result of the voting by secret ballot, the Security Council unanimously adopted resolution 589 (1986), recommending to the General Assembly that Mr. Javier Pérez de Cuéllar be appointed Secretary-General of the United Nations for a second term of office.

836. Resolution 589 (1986) reads as follows:

"The Security Council,

"Having considered the question of the recommendation for the appointment of the Secretary-General of the United Nations,

"<u>Recommends</u> to the General Assembly that Mr. Javier Pérez de Cuéllar be appointed Secretary-General of the United Nations for a second term of office from 1 January 1987 to 31 December 1991."

# Chapter 14

INTERNATIONAL COURT OF JUSTICE

## Date of the election to fill a vacancy in the International Court of Justice

837. In a note dated 23 March 1987 (S/18760), the Secretary-General drew the attention of the Council to the fact that a vacancy had occurred in the International Court of Justice which would have to be filled in accordance with Article 14 of the Statute of the Court.

Decision: At the 2739th meeting, on 27 March 1987, draft resolution S/18761 was adopted unanimously as resolution 595 (1987).

838. Resolution 595 (1987) reads as follows:

"The Security Council,

"Noting with regret e death of Judge Guy Ladreit de Lacharrière on 10 March 1987,

"Noting further that a vacancy in the International Court of Justice for the remainder of the term of office of the deceased judge has thus occurred and must be filled in accordance with the terms of the Statute of the Court,

"Noting that, in accordance with Article 14 of the Statute, the date of the election to fill this vacancy shall be fixed by the Security Council,

"Decides that the election to fill the vacancy shall take place on 14 September 1987 at a meeting of the Security Council and at a meeting of the General Assembly at its forty-first session."

# Chapter 15

# CONSIDERATION OF THE REPORT OF THE SECRETARY-GENERAL ON THE WORK OF THE ORGANIZATION

839. At the 2749th meeting, on 12 June 1987, before adjourning the meeting,\* the President of the Security Council stated that as the Council approached the end of the period covered in the present report of the Security Council submitted to the General Assembly in accordance with Article 24, paragraph 3, of the Charter of the United Nations, namely, from 16 June 1986 to 15 June 1987, it had been agreed that he should place on record that, since 16 June 1986, the members of the Council had been engaged in consultations of the whole in connection with the issues raised in the annual reports of the Secretary-General on the work of the Organization presented to the General Assembly at its thirty-seventh, thirty-eighth, thirty-ninth, fortieth and forty-first sessions, during which members had explored possible ways and means of enhancing the effectiveness of the Council in accordance with the powers entrusted to it under the Charter. Those consultations were being pursued incormally.

The agenda for the meeting was: The situation in Cyprus.
