The event is the brainchild of 1969 South High School graduate Brian Bahr, who became a quadriplegic after an accident in 1976. The extravaganza will feature 10 jazz and rock and roll groups, (including an appearance by Bess Bonnier), celebrities Sonny Eliot, Ray Lane, Byron and JoJo "Shutty" MacGregor, Jim Brandstatter, Robbie Timmons, Doug Podell, Bob Allison, Charlie Manos, Bob Talbert and a host of others.

To this add: beauty queens, Free Press Marathon winner Kris Lenzo, the Bob Smith Sneefler Puppets, magicians and comedians, a remote control toy display, computers, ventriloquist and can-can girls.

Hold on, we're not done yet! There'll be a display of wheelchair wizardry by the famous Westland Sparks Basketball Team, an auto show, with a special display by Gresham Driving Aids, Handicapped Driving Aids of Michigan and Fargo Customs. Oh yes, they'll also be food and belly dancers.

Mack: Two years in the fight against blight

Mack Avenue has been called a success in the battle against blight. From Alter Road to the north Woods city limits, the five-and-a-half mile commercial strip has undergone a facelift in recent years.

But it is a commercial strip that still faces problems other than the bad economic times. Inadequate parking, traffic jams, and the slow drying-up of federal money make "fighting the good fight" more difficult for the five cities involved — the Park, City, Farms, Woods and Detroit.

THE FOUNDATION for much of the facade, street, median and sidewalk improvements made in the last two years comes from a recommendation made in a 1980 blight study by Gerald Luedtke, who recently spoke to the Mack Avenue Business and Professional Association.

"If you look up and down Mack, you find at least one business in each block being put in, remodeled or improved," Luedtke said. "There has been substantial reinvestment in Mack Avenue." He pointed to the new Automobile Club of America building, new banks, redesigned store fronts and general renovation that he said was "evenly distributed along Mack."

But, at the same time, Luedtke pointed to problems. While business has picked up, so have traffic volumes and congestion and that could mean less business in the future.

"All the cities have a stake in Mack," Luedtke said. "At the time we did the study, there wasn't much going on along Mack and we were afraid the business

strip would decline or become blighted."

THE BASIC premise of the Luedtke study is preventative medicine. Once blight takes hold in the area, Luedtke said, no amount of money can stop it. To keep blight from moving, cities must make an effort to keep up a program of continuous renovation, making the area look alive.

For their part, each city has begun or plans continued improvements along the strip. The Park, according to City Manager John Crawford, has a master plan, being discussed tonight, Nov. 4, that contains provisions for the boulevarding of Mack at the city limits and the removal of some buildings from Wayburn to Maryland.

The city is working on facade improvements in the area by sharing the costs with business, Crawford said. The city pays architectural fees through Schervish, Vogel, Merz, and Cardoza, an architectural firm, which draws facade plans for a business.

The benefit is two-fold, Crawford said. The city encourages facade improvements, and because of the plan's provisions, all renovated store fronts comply with the city's ordinances.

Streetscape plans have been drawn which will add lighting, benches and sidewalk improvements to the area, architect David Schervish said. Other recommendations in the master plan by Vilican-Leman & Associates include possible cul-de-sacs to decrease traffic flow on Mack.

The city is also seeking to acquire property for off-street parking in the area, Crawford said.

Although the Park has other business districts, Crawford said Mack has the greatest volume. Areas such as Kercheval may be first to receive money, he said, but only because they run through the city. Blight along Kercheval affects a greater area, Crawford said.

Fighting blight takes money, however, and funds for facade improvements, from HUD's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, are slowly running out.

BLIGHT ON Mack begins in the Park, and that's where money

should be spent to halt it, Crawford said. "I think we have to drive down Mack and see where the blight begins and start from there," he added.

City and Farms officials have also taken the Luedtke study to heart, officials said. The City, using CDBG funds, general fund money and special tax assessments on businesses has completed an alley paving program. The Farms has added sidewalk improvements to the Mack-Moross area and plans a joint project with the Woods and Detroit to continue the project to the other three corners.

Off-street parking needs have to be analyzed on a block-by-block basis, City Manager Thomas Kressbach said. Different businesses generate different parking needs, and the city will have to look at the zoning, business use and parking for the area, he said.

THE VILLAGE had a parking problem in the 1950's, but through planned development, the city was able to add to the parking with both a municipal lot and parking structure, Kressbach said. New businesses that have gone up along Mack have provided their own off-street parking, he pointed out.

Bryant wins seventh term

Pointers voted in the minority on all the major offices decided in the Nov. 2 state election with one exception — State Rep. William Bryant, Jr., House minority leader, won his seventh trip to Lansing with a solid victory over his Democratic rival.

But for Wayne County commissioner and executive, state senator, attorney general, governor and U.S. senate, Pointers supported Republican candidates who were trounced in the Democratic sweep of the state.

State Sen. John Hertel beat his Grosse Pointe Republican rival Barbara Gattorn for a seat on the new county commission by a substantial vote. Mrs. Gattorn, of the Shores, captured 65 percent of the Grosse Pointe ballots, but it was not enough to balance the heavily Democratic Detroit and Harper Woods precincts.

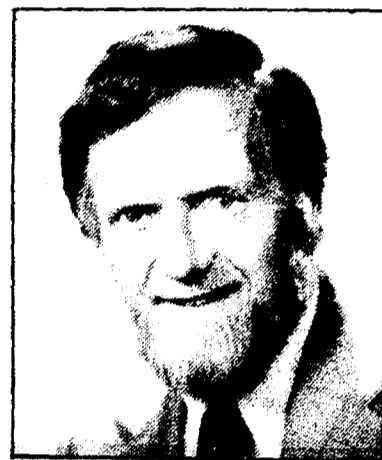
"Grosse Pointe has gone much more Democratic than I would

have thought," Mrs. Gattorn said. "The district still could be won by a Republican — but not with a Hertel running."

Hertel is a former county commissioner who gave up his senate seat after nine years in office to return to the recently reorganized county board.

Another Democrat, State Sen. John Kelly, won his second term in Lansing, lost Grosse Pointe to Republican John Lauve by a 3-2 margin. Kelly, interviewed at his victory party at the Park's Windmill Pointe boathouse, said he was pleased that he had improved his standing in the Pointes during his freshman term. Four years ago, he lost here by a 3-1 margin to the Republican candidate.

The Pointes also supported Republican losers Richard Headlee for governor, L. Brooks Patterson for attorney general, Philip Ruppe for U.S. Senate and Robert FitzPatrick for county executive.

Among Democrats, the highest vote getters here were County Executive William Lucas, followed closely by Sen. Kelly, Attorney General Frank Kelley and Hertel.

None of the election results were official when the News went to press, but broadcast projections indicated Democrats were sweeping most major state offices.

The following unofficial results include all Grosse Pointe voting precincts except absentee votes in Grosse Pointe Farms, which were still not available at midnight Tuesday when the News went to press.

Voter turnout was about 67 percent in the five cities, on par with the 1978 state election and below the average 75 percent in the 1980 presidential contest.

Officials in at least one community, Grosse Pointe City, noted a marked decline in absentee votes on Tuesday — reversing a trend that has grown steadily during recent elections. City Manager Thomas Kressbach said the number of absent voters was less than half the number in 1978 and 1980 elections. He was at a loss to explain why.

There were only a few empty seats when the lights dimmed and a booming voice broke the hushed silence:

"I didn't know if I was going to make it here today. Thank God, I did. We saved so many kids' lives today, you couldn't count 'em."

David Toma rolled up his shirt sleeves and for the next two and a half hours he told it straight to some 2,000 parents at South High School last week.

"The situation here is no different than any other school that I've been to. My friends, it's not an epidemic here, it's a pandemic! It's sick! It's sick!"

"They're doing coke, heroin, amphetamines, barbiturates and pills. They're doing it all!"

A reception with school superintendent Dr. Kenneth Brummel has been scheduled for Monday, Nov. 8, at 4 p.m., at Brownell Middle School, 260 Chalfonte Avenue.

THAT MORNING the ex-New Jersey cop stood before 3,000 students at North High School preaching about alcohol and drug abuse. They rewarded him with a five-minute standing ovation.

Back in South's gymnasium, you could hear a pin drop.

"Do you know what your kids told me today?" They said, 'I've been smoking pot since I was 5 years old.' Yeah! Right in this town! Another said he started when he was 6 years old.

"My friends, it's sad. You know what else your kids told me? 'My

father and mother are so dumb they don't even know that I'm getting high right at the kitchen table. They don't even know the difference."

Toma was invited by Grosse Pointe's Substance Abuse Commission.

Symphony opens 30th season

The London Times hailed him as "a pianist of imagination and style." The Buenos Aires Herald, in 1980, called him "a true artist in constant development." The New York Times commented on his "sensitivity and imagination."

Pianist Ralph Votapek, recipient of these warmly favorable comments from the press, will perform as guest soloist at the first concert of Grosse Pointe Symphony's 30th season. The concert will take place Sunday, Nov. 7, at 3:30 p.m. in the Parcels School Auditorium. Felix Resnick, who has conducted the orchestra for 23 years, will once again be on the podium.

"We wanted a top quality artist to open our 30th season and we found that person in Ralph Votapek," said soloist chairman Mrs. Sterling Sanford. "He not only has an international reputation but, fortunately for us, lives within driving distance of Detroit."

Votapek captured the attention of the music world in 1962 when he was grand prize winner of the first Van Cliburn Piano Competition, which brought him \$10,000, a Carnegie Hall recital and contract with impresario S. Hurok. Before that, he won the prestigious Naumberg Award and played New York's Town Hall.

Since then he has performed

throughout the U.S. with orchestras in New York, Chicago, San Francisco, Pittsburgh, Detroit, Houston and the Boston Pops and National Symphony. He toured Central and South America for the 10th time this year and also has performed in the Soviet Union.

Votapek is a native of Milwaukee, Wis., and is a Northwestern University graduate. He received his Master's degree from Manhattan School of Music and studied for two years with Rosina Lhevinne at Juilliard, where he met his wife Albertine, also a student.

Two years fighting blight

out. Facade improvements are something both the Farms and City are looking at, but both add the plans are in limbo until money can be found to fund them.

The Farms, beside sidewalk improvements, has worked in different ways to get off-street parking through purchase agreements, possible curb-cutouts and encouraging private lots.

"Where there are possibilities, the council has tried to follow them." City Clerk Richard Solak said, calling parking an "overall concern" for the area. The city has scrutinized new businesses entering the city to make sure zoning requirements for off-street parking are met while making purchase agreements with some residents so the city will be allowed to bid first on property should it become vacant.

Both the Farms and City officials said they try to look at their cities as a whole when spending grant money. Both have other commercial areas.

FOR THE WOODS however, Mack is the only business strip. Projects the Woods has completed or planned include entrance signs at the north and south city limits, resident opinion surveys about the business district, median and facade improvements, zoning regulations to control signage and business usage, and sidewalk improvements in the Seven-Mack and North Mack areas.

In addition, Schervish, Vogel, Merz and Cardoza have prepared a north-end facade plan for the city, Administrative Aide Gerard McNamara said.

The improvements won't help if the economic base leaves the community, McNamara said. Among the things the north end needs is sufficient off-street parking, an opinion echoed by Mack Avenue Business and Professional Association president Al Adams and an area architect.

"Cosmetics don't really improve businesses," the architect said. "There is a deeper problem that has to be addressed." Parking, traffic flow, pedestrian and auto circulation, zoning and business uses have to be changed before the facade improvements have the desired effect, Adams said.

"You can't move the furniture into the house until you've built the foundation," he added.

Businesses in the area need parking, Adams said, adding the cost of buying property and putting in lots was out of reach for many businesses in the area. Rents have increased in the area, he added, making the need for parking even greater.

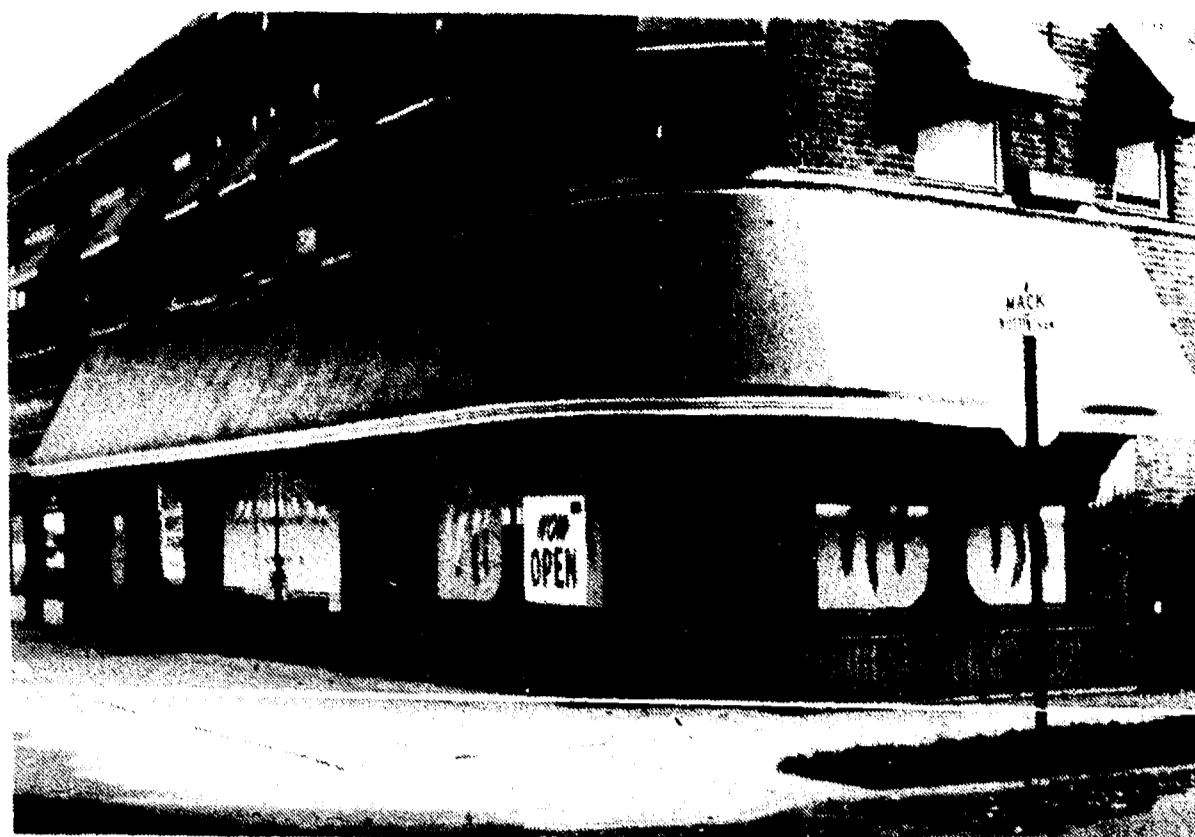

As rents increase, businesses find they can't draw the needed customers to keep from going under, he said. There has to be available parking on both sides of the street for easy access to stores.

THE NORTH END differs from other shopping areas, McNamara said, because it is not a one-stop shopping area, like the Hill or Village. Shoppers will make one stop, get back in their cars and drive to the next store, he noted, adding that without available parking, shoppers may not make the second stop.

The Mack Avenue parking problem is deep-rooted, McNamara said. A 1957 study of commercial land use recommended no new commercial development of storefronts along Mack in certain areas of the city later developed. The vacant lots could then be used for off-street parking.

That study wasn't heeded and the Luedtke study has formed the basis for Community Development Block Grant committee recommendations to the city, McNamara said.

There are three ways a city can

obtain property for off-street parking. The city can buy lots and develop the parking, as the Woods has done. Cities can rezone to allow for transitional parking districts as the Woods tried to do last month. The third alternative is condemnation, as St. Clair Shores has done.

After St. Clair Shores widened its stretch of Mack to five lanes, the city was forced to remove pull-out parking from the front of stores, city officials said. To make up the loss, the city condemned homes abutting alleys for the development of parking.

As the city clears the lots, the property costs will be assessed back to the businesses over 10 years, city officials said. The city considered the method successful enough to use along Harper, where 18 homes have been condemned, officials said.

IMPLICIT in the argument for more parking is money. The more viable the business area, the more tax revenue can be collected as the property is sold at higher values. Business taxes take some of the burden off residential bills.

Luedtke, Vilcan-Leman and

other planners and architects have ideas for increased parking and decreased traffic volume, but each has good and bad points.

Luedtke considered, then discarded, the idea of median parking, according to the study. It would detract from the esthetics of an area, Luedtke said, and would also create a dangerous traffic situation when cars tried backing out into traffic.

Cul-de-sacs at the end of the local streets where they intersect Mack have been considered, according to master plans and studies. Traffic off side streets would be limited while parking could be added along the street mouths.

Parking lots behind stores, properly landscaped, offer protection to residential areas while businesses are able to expand.

"Businesses have to have an incentive to improve, such as increased parking for increased sales, to justify the cost," McNamara said. "Wherever you find parking, you find successful, viable businesses. Blight is a moving thing, swallowing areas and the battle against blight is on-going."

The Motor City Theater Organ Society, a nonprofit corporation, is a group of more than 400 area residents who work to preserve and restore the theater pipe organ in

its original setting and to foster interest in its music.

The Society purchased The Redford Theater in order to preserve the Barton three-manual, 10 rank theater pipe organ permanently in its original setting and to provide a home for the society. All work at the theater is performed by volunteers from the membership who also maintain organs at the Royal Oak Theater, where the organ is owned by MCTOS, the Punch and Judy, and the Michigan Theater in Ann Arbor. Membership in the society is open to all interested individuals.

Shelden subdivision planned

The wrecking ball is poised above yet another Lakeshore Road mansion. The Shelden Estate, cleaned-out during an auction in September, will be demolished to make way for a 24-home subdivision if developers win city approval next week.

Representatives of Edward J. Russell, Inc., and Roger G. Knopf, associates in the venture, are scheduled to appear before the Farms council at its Monday, Nov. 8, meeting. They'll present plans for developing the Shelden Estate plus adjacent property on Newberry Place which was purchased to provide privacy for the late Elizabeth Buhl Warren Shelden.

IN SEPTEMBER, thousands of people carried more than 300 pounds of antique silver, porcelains, crystal and fine furniture out of the home during the auction of the year run by Stalker and Boos. The estate, at 131 Lakeshore Road, is the second grand home in the Farms to be scheduled for demolition this year. The city council gave Henry Ford II the green light to raze his 78-room Lakeshore home to make way for a cluster housing development in August.

Unlike Ford, who sought zoning variances from the city for his development, Russell and company plan to develop the Shelden estate in line with cur-

rent city ordinances. Next Monday they will present site plans for city review.

The land will be developed as a public subdivision around a cul-de-sac running off Grosse Pointe Boulevard. Edward J. Russell, III, said the firm decided not to take the new road through the lot to Lakeshore to preserve the effect of sweeping lawns along Grosse Pointe's most scenic route.

Plans call for homes between 2,800 and 3,400 square feet on lots minimum of 11,000 square feet, Russell said. Prices will start at about \$260,000.

If the site plans meet council approval next week, Russell said the home will be demolished in January or February. He would not say how much developers paid for the property, but estimated total development costs — including purchase of the property, demolition and construction of streets and sewers — will be over 1.3 million.

Russell said he is the third generation of his family involved in home building in the Pointes. "My grandfather, Russell, Sr., started putting houses up here 60 years ago." The firm has built homes in the Woods and Shores on Stillmeadow, Harbor Hill and in Rose Terrace. The latter was the site of Anna Thomson Dodge's 75-room Louis XV chateau, Rose Terrace, which was leveled in 1976 despite efforts by several residents to save it.

Shores switches to civilians

Grosse Pointe Shores village trustees last month considered restructuring of its Public Safety Department to open two clerk positions to relieve the police officers from clerical and administrative duties.

The department is currently employing two full time officers to do clerical and dispatch duties. The plan according to Chief Joseph Vitale, "will make the operation more cost efficient."

"At the present time we have 19 sworn officers and one court clerk," said Vitale. "In the plan we will move to 17 sworn officers, two administrative clerks and one court clerk. The difference in salary pay will save the city \$65,000."

Vitale said the clerks will be stationed with their assigned platoons and rotate with the shift as scheduled.

Vitale said that there will be no lay-offs in the police force because the plan includes retirements and transfers within the department.

"The organizational plan is conducive for the department at this time," said Vitale. "It's a growing trend throughout the country. It's an efficiency move."

Vitale said the restructuring plan of officers and clerks will begin before the first of the year.

Martin named Park Lieutenant

Park Police Chief Henry O. Coonce this week announced the promotion of Sgt. Thomas F. Martin to lieutenant, effective Nov. 1. In his new position, Martin will be in charge of the uniform division of the 32-man department.

Martin, 54, joined the department in 1949 and has received several department citations for his work, Coonce said. He is a DeLaSalle High School graduate who attended University of Detroit and received a Bachelor's degree in political science from Detroit Institute of Technology.

Martin said in a telephone interview that he intends to continue working on alternating shifts to maintain contact with other officers and situations. The police officer, who's lived in the Park since 1931, also maintains a 20-acre farm south of Yale, Mich.

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
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David Toma speaks to thousands in schools

munity Council to speak to some 5,000 students from local public, parochial and private schools about alcohol and drug abuse. After two sessions with the thousands of students, he counseled hundreds privately.

Last week's meeting with parents revealed what is going on in the drug world of Grosse Pointe teens.

"Your kids said their teachers are so dumb they don't even know the stuff is being passed around in the classroom. The school is the perfect meeting place to get high," Toma said.

The drug preacher drew a hearty applause from parents when he hit on the subject of Friday night keg parties.

"If you let your kids have keg parties, you should be indicted. You're telling your kids it's okay to drink? Something's wrong, somewhere. My friends, I got sick today. Your kids are slaves to alcohol and drugs."

Toma bluntly told parents that at least 95 percent of them couldn't hold an intelligent con-

versation with their son or daughter about drugs.

"Do you know what marijuana is? It's the most unpredictable drug around today. As soon as you light up a joint, there are at least 420 chemicals entering your body. You're sitting here and you don't even know what's going on. Many of the students I spoke to today say they are smoking pot every day."

The 50-year-old Toma is a former boxing champ, professional baseball player and marine drill instructor. With more than 7,000 arrests under his belt, he carried a 98 percent conviction record as a New Jersey cop.

A master of disguises, Toma was shot and injured at least 30 times during his police career, but never fired his gun once. His life was model for the television series "Baretta."

"I paid one hell of a price to get here tonight," Toma said. "It was worth it."

Toma told parents about his decision to lecture to kids after he saw so many of them constantly in and out of jail.

"I DECIDED to get in the gutter with the kids. I spent three years there and I became a part of them. And you know what? When you're in the gutter looking up, most people don't give a damn."

His determination to sway kids away from drugs and alcohol grew stronger when he saved a 3-year-old boy from choking on a piece of charcoal. After he arrived home and told his family of his heroic act, Toma's own son began choking on some food. Toma panicked. He couldn't help his son yet only hours before he saved the life of the 3-year-old boy from the very same thing.

After his son died, Toma says he contemplated suicide, was hit with a nervous breakdown and was swallowing up to 100 tranquilizers a day. Realizing the effects of the drugs on himself and his family, he wasn't going to let it happen to other kids.

After his appearance in Grosse Pointe last week, it's evident his dedication paid off. Said substance abuse council member Chris Dodds: "It has been absolutely fantastic. The kids are still talking about him. I've heard of kids turning over their marijuana and drug paraphernalia to Toma

and promising not to do drugs again. It's more than we imagined."

Mrs. Dodds said she received one call from a crying parent who thanked her for bringing Toma to Grosse Pointe.

At North High School Principal G. Bruce Feighner said students are still very enthusiastic about Toma's visit. "I saw kids who were very moved by him. I've received so many phone calls of congratulations from parents, thanking us for bringing Toma to

their kids. It's been very positive."

Head of University Liggett's Upper School, Stephen Clem, said Toma's deep feelings for others left its mark on students there.

"All of the kids uniformly had a positive response to his presentation, to him as a person and to his message. They seemed, in some ways, shocked, and in some ways, almost felt repulsion at the things he talked about. But they also saw how he cares and feels about people."

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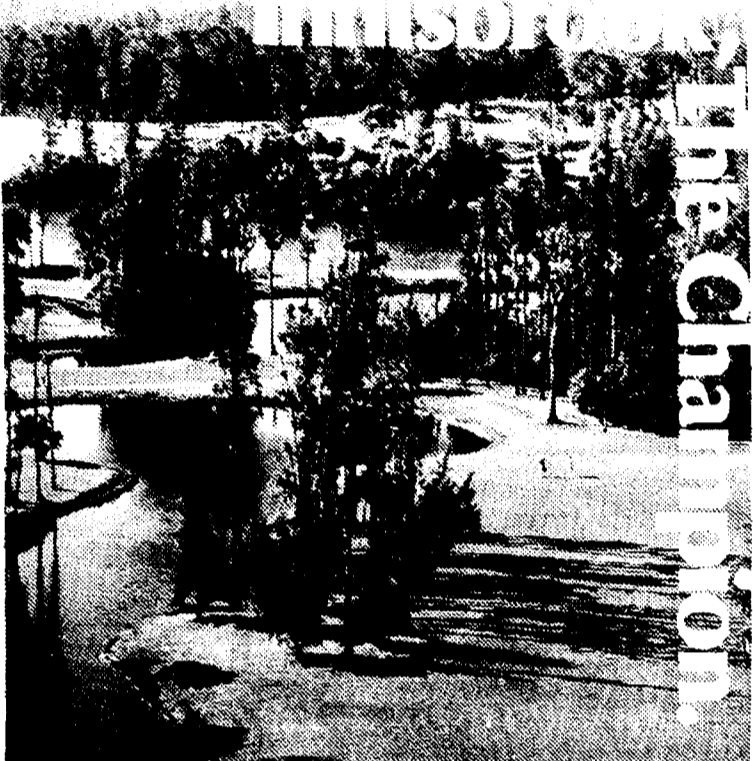
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

Taken from the attic were two heirloom quilts which the owner valued at \$800, police said.

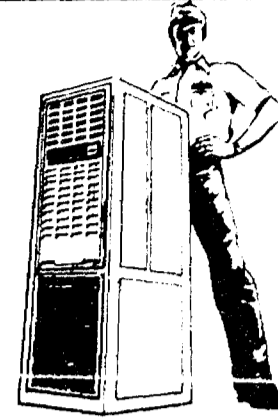

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Prime Time

For Senior Citizens

At a time when a large proportion of Americans are growing old but feeling young, they are beginning to think more about how to get the most out of their added years. They are no longer willing to accept the premise that they are old just because the world tells them so. Inside they know they are still capable of enjoying all that life has to offer.

A recent magazine article confirms this premise, quoting Dr. James E. Deaton, executive director of the Andrus Gerontology Center at the University of Southern California.

"Although most Americans think of life after 65 as 'dying a little bit every day,'" Dr. Nerren says, "there is actually little change in health. After that it is a matter of luck and lifestyle. It is not all a downhill toboggan."

With this in mind, if you are enjoying good health and have the means, it is up to you to put some life into your later years whether it be traveling, volunteer work, hobbies, a second career or just enjoying your hard-earned leisure and social pursuits.

When it comes to social activities, it is regrettable that many widows and widowers feel that there is no place for them in the social world unless they have a partner. Like those who entered the ark, they feel they must come two-by-two. So they remain behind to drown in a flood of self-pity.

MANY REFUSE to attend social functions unless they have a partner of the opposite sex. This is particularly true to women who are so obsessed with the idea of finding a male partner they overlook the benefits, the comfort, support and fun derived from friendship with women. It is not unusual to hear of women who refuse to go out with a group of female friends who go together to the theater, movies and other events because they don't want to be identified with a bunch of unmarried women. Think of all the fun these women are missing — the companionship, the excitement of getting dressed up to go out, of having dinner at a new restaurant, new topics of conversations, in short, keeping up with the world.

If male companionship is the goal, it is not going to be found within the four walls of home. It may be that within the group of women, there may be eligible brothers, business associates or

someone who can never be more than a friend to one of them.

For those intrepid, young-at-heart widows who do cherish the past and love they have known, but decide that they would like to find, not a replacement but someone to share their later years, there are some guidelines.

TO BEGIN with, don't be in a hurry. Some people, men as well as women, are in love with love. In their desire for love they fail to find out how compatible they are with the person they are dating. Don't be too anxious for a commitment and don't expect that whatever is wrong in life can be made right by another person.

A mistake that is often made is assuming that a relationship is permanent. That is not necessarily so. If this is not faced up to, the decision of one or the other to get out of it can be devastating to the person who thought that this twosome was forever. Such a traumatic experience can be avoided if attention is paid to such clues as "I don't want to get involved," "I'm not good enough," etc.

Which brings us to the time-honored assumption that men have it better than women when it comes to living alone.

For many older women, being a wife and mother was their whole life. Careers were for single women. Thus losing a husband is really losing an identity.

On the other hand, the man who has lost a wife still has his job. He has an identity and a purpose.

While women, if they choose, can find comfort and outlets with women friends, men have it easier when it comes to the dating game. For one thing, women past 50 far outnumber men. There are five widows for every widower. As a result men can and do go out more than women and they remarry more often.

In a social setting, in general, the single man finds himself an asset, the single woman soon discovers she is a liability. Friends will invite an extra man but not often will they extend an invitation to a single woman. Widows (and this goes for divorced women also) often find themselves dropped by married friends.

If this sounds depressing to single women, take heart. There is a way of getting around these barriers according to Tracy Elliott Hyde, author of "The Single Grandmother" (Nelson Hall).

With common sense and humor she offers some excellent advice to single older women who refuse to be intimidated by the cliché "it's a man's world."

One of the most pertinent chapters for women who are seeking male companionship is titled "The Woods Are Full."

She insists that single men are lonelier than single women. The obvious question is why aren't they doing the hunting and where are they?

They are everywhere, contends the author. The most obvious hunting grounds are in job situations, particularly those places of employment where men far outnumber women.

If a full-time job is too much of a commitment to make in the pursuit of this project, part-time work could be the answer. The idea is that the woman who has something besides herself to be interested in becomes more interesting herself. Therefore it need not even be a paying job. There are innumerable volunteer opportunities, many of them in places where men as well as women give of their time and talents.

CHURCH is always cited as a place to meet eligible men, but the author has a little different angle on this possibility. She suggests that you offer your services as clerical secretary to the finance and building committee which is likely to be made up of male members.

Great books, study clubs, language circles, investment clubs Mensa (if your IQ is over 148),

political organizations, adult-oriented programs in foreign language, money, business, which attract professional and business people, as well as lectures, symposia and institutes are all mentioned as avenues to new acquaintances.

If some of these possibilities have been tried and found wanting, the author has this to say: "Maybe you are not really looking. Truthfully now, haven't there been at least a few occasions when you would have encouraged conversations, and didn't?"

While she does encourage subtle aggressiveness, the author also warns against being too eager, or too demanding.

If you are shy, she suggests "you share that with almost all men and some women. Smile and speak confidently, even if you are quaking inside."

There is one other consideration. Maybe you are just too busy for an affair. Are you prepared to let other things go by the board in order to maintain this new friendship?

Remember once you have met him, you must spend quite a lot of time with him not to mention such items as sessions with the hairdresser, shopping for pretty clothes, dressing carefully for him and cooking special dinners.

As the author says "You pay your nickel and you take your choice on that one."

Once the author has thoroughly coached you on the various methods of meeting an interesting gentleman, she doesn't abandon you.

She continues with strategies of

keeping him interested which might include showing interest in him, not being too aloof but not being too forward either, arranging unexpected meetings, asking for advice and avoiding topics of stress such as politics, religion and social problems. On the positive side, flattery is a biggie. It works every time.

There is helpful advice on keeping up appearances such as attention to diet ("grandmothers should not look like walking Crisco cans"), exercise, attractive but appropriate clothes. In case there are some questions about what constitutes the complete beauty ritual for getting ready for a heavy date, there is a detailed account of how to make the most of your assets.

Other areas of exploration include a rundown of the rogues' gallery of males highlighting the martiners, the nonmarriers, the

Don Juans, the hearthwarmers, the fortune hunters and others.

The possibilities of travel for meeting people is enlarged upon and includes such items as the best type of tour and what to take along.

THERE IS even a postscript for grandfathers reminding them that women do look upon them as lords of creation which behooves them to act accordingly. There are some excellent suggestions as to how this image is maintained. Grandfathers are also reminded that the single grandmother works hard at looking good. She is a work of art. The less obvious the efforts, the more "naturally pretty" she looks, the more hours and dollars she has probably invested. Appreciate it!

All of this good advice is delivered in good humor and makes for entertaining reading even if none of it applies to your particular situation.

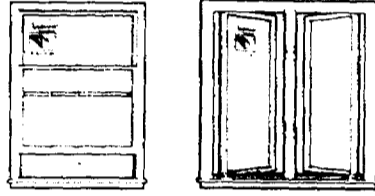

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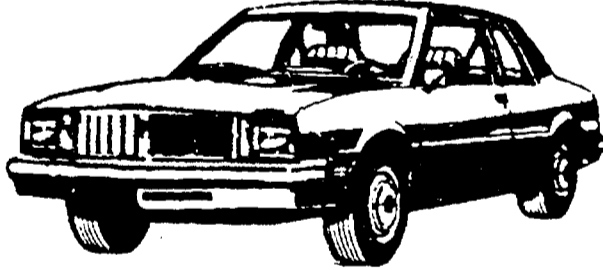

"Dart-outs" can kill your kids

"Dart-outs," were the major factor in more than half of all school-related traffic deaths in 1981, and preventing them is the aim of this year's "Schools Open Drive Carefully" campaign, according to Jack Piana, the Automobile Club of Michigan's Grosse Pointe manager.

Fifteen students, ages 5 through 17, died in accidents before or after school last year in Michigan. The Auto Club's studies show that eight of the victims were "dart-outs" who crossed the street from between parked cars or at mid-block.

"With Grosse Pointe schools open, this is the time to begin reminding parents and motorists of their shared responsibility for children's safety," said Piana. "Children must be reminded to cross at intersections while motorists must be prepared to stop for forgetful youngsters who cross at unexpected places."

Some 862,500 Michigan youngsters will cross streets or wait for buses as they attend elementary school this year. More than 116,000 will be going to school for the first time.

The Auto Club's study of the 1981 school-related accidents show 60 percent of the victims were aged 9 through 13 and nine of the fatal accidents occurred before school began.

Throughout the school year, the Auto Club will remind parents, teachers and children of traffic safety rules through the "School's Open" and safety patrol programs. The Auto Club is distributing 10,200 ponchos, 6,000 badges

and 11,000 belts for patrollers and 65,000 training booklets and other traffic safety supplies to 4200 Michigan schools.

"School's Open Drive Carefully" bumper stickers and placemats are available free to the public at the Auto Club's 56 offices statewide.

The Auto Club recommends these pedestrian safety habits for children:

- Look in all directions before walking across intersections and watch for turning cars even on a green light.

- Obey safety patrollers and crossing guards.

- Always use the sidewalk. If there isn't one, walk facing traffic.

- Dress in light-colored clothing for maximum visibility.

- Follow the safest route to school, which should be planned on streets with low traffic volume and controlled intersections.

Motorists also are reminded that state law requires them to stop at least 10 feet behind a bus when it is loading or unloading and stay stopped until the red lights stop flashing.

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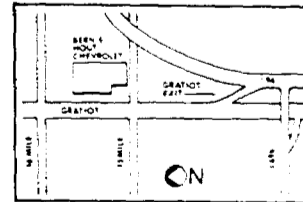
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Take a bite out of crime

For the most part, you would be safe from the danger of assaults if you never leave your home. Stay home and don't let anyone who seems the least bit suspicious in, and the odds against assault are in your favor.

While that would be the safe life, it is far from typical for an active person who must go out to get to work, the market and places of entertainment.

The unfortunate thing about assault is that you cannot be certain in advance just where and how it is going to happen. If you could be certain, you could prepare for danger with a high degree of effectiveness.

However widespread the danger of assault may be, common sense is your best guide in avoiding areas where you know danger is highest. So, if you must move about to get through life's business, and you must occasionally be in a risk situation, there are certain precautions you can take.

In general, the psychology of the criminals can work in your favor. Their makeup is basically cowardly. The street assailant is out to get something with the least amount of effort or fuss. Therefore, aside from an appearance of mean strength and power, your defense must at least be based upon appearing less vulnerable.

Every woman lives with fear of physical assault, and is no match physically for an aggressive attack by a male. Crimes against women are not selective regarding age or economic or social status. The only criterion is that the victim is female.

Consequently, all women must constantly be on guard against such attacks for they can happen at anytime or place. This is not to say women must live in an atmosphere of fear, but every woman should live in a state of constant awareness of the dangers around her and take the precautions to prevent herself from becoming the victim of some mindless criminal act.

There are certain measures women can take to sharply decrease their chances of being attacked and greatly enhance their own peace of mind. These are generally simple steps, but have proved to be highly effective in preventing violent crimes against women.

From the time children can listen, as a pedestrian they are admonished not to accept rides with strangers. This same advice applies to women. It may take you longer to walk to your destination, but it takes a lot longer to heal the physical and emotional scars of an attack on your person. If someone attempts to force you into a vehicle, SCREAM AND SCREAM LOUDLY and make every effort to break away from your assailant and run.

Walking alone may pose some danger, especially in certain high crime areas. Generally, if you must go into such a neighborhood it is best to take a taxi or have a friend drive you. In the long run, the extra effort or expense may

prove worth it. Also, when walking at night, carry a flashlight; keep away from unlighted areas; skirt sections of the sidewalk where bushes grow nearby; and above all avoid short cuts through parks, vacant lots and other deserted spots.

If you happen to be riding a bus and notice someone watching you with unusual interest, mention it to the bus driver and request to be let off at a special place. If you are followed off the bus by a strange man, take a good lead of him and don't slow down. Once it becomes apparent that he is following you, don't go to your own residence; instead stop at a place where cars and lights are visible even if the people inside are strangers.

In the event that it becomes necessary for you to run, don't run wearing high heels. Take them off and hold them in your hands; you may have to use them as weapons later should he catch up with you.

When driving always lock your car doors, even in the daytime, whether you are in or out of the vehicle. That way, no one can jump in when you come to a stop, or surprise you by lying in wait in the back seat while you return from a shopping trip. Also, if possible when driving, keep the windows rolled up to prevent anyone reaching into your car and unlocking a door when you roll to a stop.

What do you do if you are a victim of an attack, in spite of all the precautions you have taken? Unfortunately, there is no pat answer: it all depends on the circumstances. One thing is certain however, KEEP YOUR HEAD ABOUT YOU AND USE IT. You may have the alternatives of fight or flight, and if it is at all possible, make every effort to escape your attacker and avoid a physical confrontation. If not, fight and fight hard with anything available to use in self-defense.

Nail files, scissors, heavy purses, aerosol hairspray, etc.; all can be turned into effective weapons. And when striking at your assailant, hit hard in sensitive areas. The most vulnerable areas are the eyes, nose, neck, Adam's apple, solar plexus and the groin.

Budgeting for foreign travel

Whenever you plan for a vacation, there are a number of factors to consider: transportation, accommodations, meals, entertainment, even souvenir buying. However, foreign vacations might hold some additional costs. There are the initial expenses of passports and visas plus medical care, like vaccinations, that may be required before you leave, according to the Michigan Association of CPAs.

Slashed airfares, plus a strong American dollar can make a foreign vacation affordable. Before you jump at what seem to be bargain prices, calculate exactly how much more you're spending — and what you may be saving, the CPAs advise.

In nine out of 10 popular tourist countries, the U.S. dollar has gained value compared to local currency in the past year. Bookings to Europe at some travel agencies have doubled this year, while some trips to Mexico are 30 percent cheaper because of the devaluation of the peso. How much you spend — or save — depends on how, when and where you travel.

Once you decide on a destination, investigate alternatives for travel. While commercial airfares are gener-

ally lower than last year, a charter flight or package tour may fit your travel needs and budget better. That would depend upon the flexibility of your schedule, your primary destination, other sites you want to see, and whether there is a gateway city providing inexpensive access to a nearby region.

After you've chosen your transportation destination, you'll have to figure how to make those local short hops. Here it's essential to investigate well in advance because some arrangements must be made before you leave the United States, the CPAs say. In certain cases, you'll have to apply for a foreign driver's permit. While you could buy train tickets for individual trips, it might be more economical to buy a rail pass. The Eurailpass is perhaps the most widely known European travel pass. It entitles you to travel within 16 countries at prices varying with the term of the pass, however, it is not sold in Europe or North Africa.

Other countries offer local passes that might suffice. Plan your itinerary and then inquire about these regional passes. A Eurailpass for 15 days costs

\$250. But if you confine your travel to Scandinavia, a regional pass is available for \$151 for 21 days. Inquire about special rates for youths or senior citizens. Information is available through the European Travel Commission.

Understanding the local currency and being adept at computing the exchange rate on small items is essential. Know how much local currency the dollar buys. If you buy foreign traveler's checks in the United States, you will pay the current retail rate of exchange. The CPAs say if you wait and change your money abroad, then your dollar could command a different rate — it could be more or less.

Take, for example, the purchase of traveler's checks in French francs. If the exchange rate before you leave is 6.25 francs to dollars and you buy \$200 worth of traveler's checks, you'll get 1,250 francs. However, if you buy the francs over there, at an exchange rate of 6.1 francs, you'll only purchase 1,220 francs.

Also look at the difference between buying a train ticket in the United States and in the local currency. If the price is \$300 American dollars here, that is what you'll pay. However, if the French price is 1,500 francs, you'll pay only \$240 if you buy in France.

Another note on currency exchanges is that credit purchases on a major credit card may save you money as long as you don't pay interest on the transaction. Because the interbank exchange rate is lower than the retail exchange rate, you may pay less for a charged item than one you buy with cash, say the CPAs.

The school board must approve gifts to the schools and library if they are more than \$500.

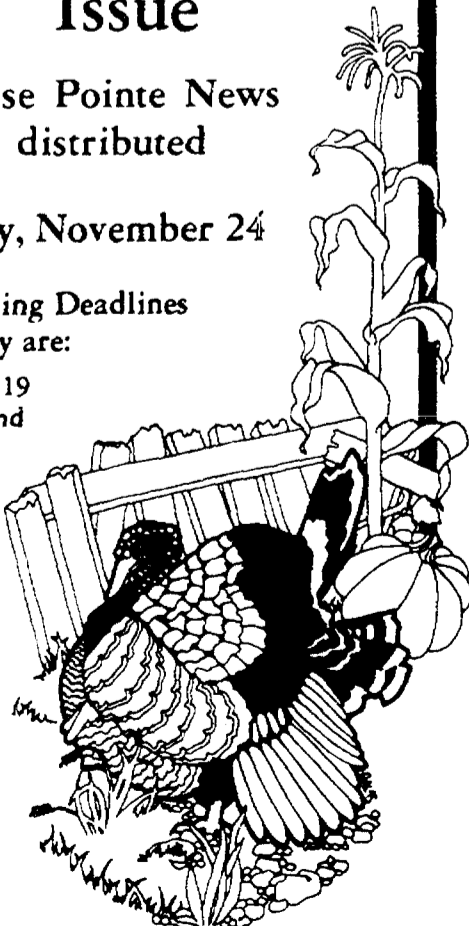

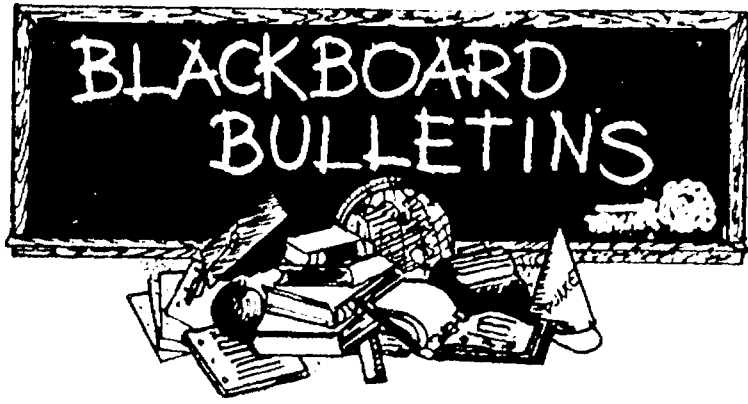

CITY OF Grosse Pointe Park MICHIGAN ORDINANCE NO. 96

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE PARK, CHAPTER 22, EATING AND DRINKING ESTABLISHMENTS, TITLE VI, BY AMENDING SECTIONS 6.1 AND 6.4 AND ADDING SECTION 6.14.

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE PARK ORDAINS:

Section 1

Sections 6.1 and 6.4 of Chapter 22, Title VI of the Code of the City of Grosse Pointe Park are amended to read as follows:

Section 6.1 Definitions. As used in this Chapter:

- The term "restaurant" shall mean restaurant, coffee shop, cafeteria, short order cafe, luncheonette, tavern, sandwich stand, soda fountain, and all other eating or drinking establishments, as well as kitchens or other places in which food or drink is prepared for sale on the premises or elsewhere.
- The term "itinerant restaurant" shall mean any restaurant operating for a temporary period in connection with a fair, carnival, circus, public exhibition, or other similar gathering.
- The term "employee" shall mean any person who handles food or drink during preparation or serving, or who comes in contact with any eating or cooking utensils, or who is employed in a room in which food or drink is prepared or served.
- "Utensils" shall include any kitchenware, tableware, glassware, cutlery, containers, or other equipment with which food or drink comes in contact during storage, preparation, or serving.
- The term "Health Officer" shall mean the person designated to act as City Health Officer pursuant to Title I of this Code.
- The term "Health Department" shall mean the Wayne County Health Department.
- The term "Director" shall mean the City Director of Public Service.
- The term "capacity" shall mean the maximum number of seating facilities for patrons.

6.4 Licenses. No person shall operate a restaurant in the City who does not possess an unrevoked license of current issue granted in accordance with Title VII of this Code. Such license shall be posted in a conspicuous place in the restaurant. Only persons who comply with the requirements of this Chapter shall be entitled to receive and retain such a license. A person conducting an itinerant restaurant shall also be required to secure a license.

Section 2

Section 6.14 is added to Chapter 22, Title VI of the Code of the City of Grosse Pointe Park as follows:

Section 6.14 Restriction on Hours of Operation. No restaurant in the City shall remain open for business or serve food or drink to the public at any time between the hours of 2:00 A.M. and 5:00 A.M.

Section 3

This ordinance shall be effective December 1, 1982.

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Know Your Schools

Parcels meeting is important

Most people aren't fond of attending meetings and, if given a choice, probably wouldn't attend a particular meeting unless very interested in the purpose of the meeting.

A meeting that has a purpose that should be of interest to everyone in this community has been scheduled for tonight. That meeting is the Community Input Session scheduled by the citizens' committee studying the future organization of The Grosse Pointe Public School System.

This meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. in the auditorium of Parcels Middle School, 20600 Mack Avenue (at Vernier).

The format for the meeting will consist of a brief overview of the committee's work since the middle of last school year, a summary of what the committee has found in its study of the present situation of the public schools and its proposals for the future which will be submitted to the Board of Education, and an opportunity for those in attendance to state opinions and ask questions.

In preparation for the community session, the citizens' committee has distributed a fact sheet

about its work, drawing attention to relevant facts about the future public education in the Grosse Pointes and Harper Woods. The fact sheets have been sent home with elementary school students, attached to parent newsletters, mailed to several individuals and groups in the community, and placed in the central library and two branch libraries for residents to obtain.

Key educational concerns listed on the fact sheet are:

- Enrollment decline is significant, continuing, and inevitably is having great impact upon The Grosse Pointe Public School System.

- Certain elective courses essential to a comprehensive program of studies are imperiled either because of low enrollment with accompanying high costs or because of insufficient enrollment.

- Declining enrollment allows for less flexibility in grouping patterns (fewer sections per grade or classes per subject, variability in class size, increased possibility for split grades).

- As low seniority staff layoffs occur there is an increasing need for retraining staff members who

are reassigned to new grade levels or different subject areas.

- Reduced opportunities exist for a broad program of student activities (athletics, intramurals and clubs).

- Increased fragmentary and part-time teaching assignments result in loss of program continuity, lost teaching time and a reduction of scheduling flexibility.

Also on the fact sheet are two financial facts: 1) The cost of per pupil education increases with diminishing enrollment, and 2) If an elementary school were to be closed, it would mean a savings in the school system's operating budget of about \$150,000. This would translate into a potential savings of about \$1.35 each \$10,000 in State Equalized Value (SEV) to each taxpaying household in the Grosse Pointes, provided there is a corresponding reduction in the millage rate.

The citizens' committee also has listed some alternatives for school organization that will be explained at the community session.

I urge residents to obtain fact sheets if they haven't already, and be in attendance at this important meeting.

Wall Street depression

When national publications take a quick look at the Grosse Pointes, they usually start by drawing the usual stereotype of a wealthy community with maids, butlers, yachts, charity balls and the other accouterments of conspicuous consumption. As those who live in the Pointes know, however, this picture is no longer accurate, if it ever was completely true.

THE WALL STREET Journal, usually respected for its economic reporting, recently fell into the same trap that has ensnared other national publications. In a story that tried to make odious comparisons between the East Side of Detroit and the Pointes, the Journal told us that local people call Alter Road the "Berlin Wall," or "the barrier" or the "Mason-Dixon line." Perhaps some people do use those descriptions but we confess we've never heard any of them applied to Alter Road.

Nor, as a matter of fact, have we heard the East Side referred to as "West Beirut" and the Pointes as "Disneyland," terms that were attributed by the Wall Street Journal to Sen. John Kelly, who represents voters on both sides of Alter. If indeed Kelly used those descriptions, he is more insensitive to Detroit and Pointe people than we thought he was, even though, of course, he did support the Democratic plan that split the Pointes into two congressional districts earlier this year.

Eventually, the Journal got around to telling us that both sides of Alter Road now are feeling

the effects of an uncertain economy. The story cites an example from each side that proves the conclusion. We agree with that opinion but we do wish the supporting evidence about the rise in crime as well as the increase in the welfare load that were blamed on unemployment had not been buried deep in the story on the inside of the paper. For these statistics showed that the recession — it's a depression in metropolitan Detroit — has had wide impact in Grosse Pointe as well as on the East Side.

If anything, the people on the East Side have more reason to complain about the Journal story than do those in Grosse Pointe. The Journal does give the Jefferson-Chalmers Citizens District Council credit for serving as a stout defense against crime and blight in that area, but still describes the area in terms that are unflattering for the East Side.

THE TROUBLE with such reporting is that it accentuates the stereotypes on both sides of Alter Road. On the one side, it finds wealth, privilege and the minor cutbacks forced on Pointe residents by the recession while on the other side it finds poverty, nonworking winos chipping in to buy a single bottle and an underemployed transvestite prostitute raising his rates. In other words, the story accentuates the difference between the two areas and ignores the substantial people on both sides of Alter who are trying their best to cope with the depression.

'Brain drain' hurts Michigan

Everyone knows that the depression in Michigan is costing the state dearly in many respects. But one loss that is not always apparent except to the families involved is the "brain drain" that occurs when unemployed workers leave the state in search of jobs elsewhere.

NOW THERE are figures that show that Michigan's population loss from April 1, 1980, to July 1, 1981, was the highest of any state in the union. The Population Reference Bureau, in a United States Population Data Sheet, said that five states lost population in that period but that Michigan's loss was larger than that of Indiana, Ohio, Iowa and South Dakota.

Those figures mean that Michigan is losing an important segment of that talented work force that has made this state one of the industrial giants of the nation. It also means, more specifically, that the state will have difficulty in achieving its goal of becoming a "high tech" state unless it soon can turn its economic situation around and halt the further exodus of the trained workers it needs to achieve this goal.

Civil service a facade

In its early days, civil service was often described as a merit system. And so it was, and is, in some jurisdictions. An honestly conceived and administered civil service system indeed is the antithesis of the spoils system for the appointment and administration of public employees.

In Wayne County's government, however, the civil service system has been a facade behind which the customary political wheeling and dealing as well as nepotism and favoritism have been not only continued but enhanced. County commissioners and other elected officials often vote to create new, well-paid administrative positions — and then take on the jobs themselves or pick political cronies or relatives to fill them. Now the civil service system itself has taken a new step to assure perpetuation of the spoils system.

A RULE CHANGE quietly adopted by the county Civil Service Commission in August

It is significant that the states which lost population in the 15-month period covered by the Population Reference Bureau report are all in the Middle West. Three of them — Michigan, Ohio and Indiana — are industrial states with strong agricultural elements as well. Iowa and South Dakota are predominantly farm states which also have many industrial plants. Both manufacturing and farming have been hurt as the area that once was known as the "arsenal of democracy" and the "nation's breadbasket" suffers severe economic reverses.

THE PROBLEM is serious not only because the "brain drain" cannot be reversed overnight but because Michigan is losing both jobs and people that it will need when the economic picture finally improves here. That is unlikely to happen until the entire national economy gets back on its feet, a fact that points to the economic obstacle facing the new governor and the new Legislature that will take office Jan. 1, 1983.

provides that managerial employees who are not covered by a collective bargaining agreement would be allowed to bump into similar jobs in different departments. That rule change will make it almost impossible for the newly elected county executive to remove present county department heads.

That is the purpose of the rule, of course. It is to protect supervisors from job loss when the new county executive puts his required reorganization into effect. The rule has the same aim as the formation of the Wayne County Road Commission union made up of supervisory employees who fear the possible loss of their jobs when the reorganization takes effect.

Under the present system in Wayne County, civil service has been turned on its head. It protects employees but not the public. It tends to support the spoils system, not the merit system. In fact, it is not civil and it does little to improve the service provided by county employees.

Mrs. McLean served as the dean of the college for four years before being elected its president in 1975 — largely as a result of student acclaim, according to a Memorial Church spokesman.

During the years Mrs. McLean served as dean, Grosse Pointes Mrs. Ray Kiely and Mrs. Fred Adams served on the Board of Trustees. They have maintained their involvement with the college and the Reverend and Mrs. Kiely will host Mrs. McLean in their home.

Mrs. Kiely is most enthusiastic about Mrs. McLean's speaking ability and the message she brings with her.

Barber-Scotia College was founded by Presbyterian missionaries for the purpose of educating freed slaves. It is one of the first of such colleges to have been founded after the Civil War for this purpose.

Among its graduates is Thelma Adair who recently served as moderator of the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church, the highest post in the Presbyterian Church.

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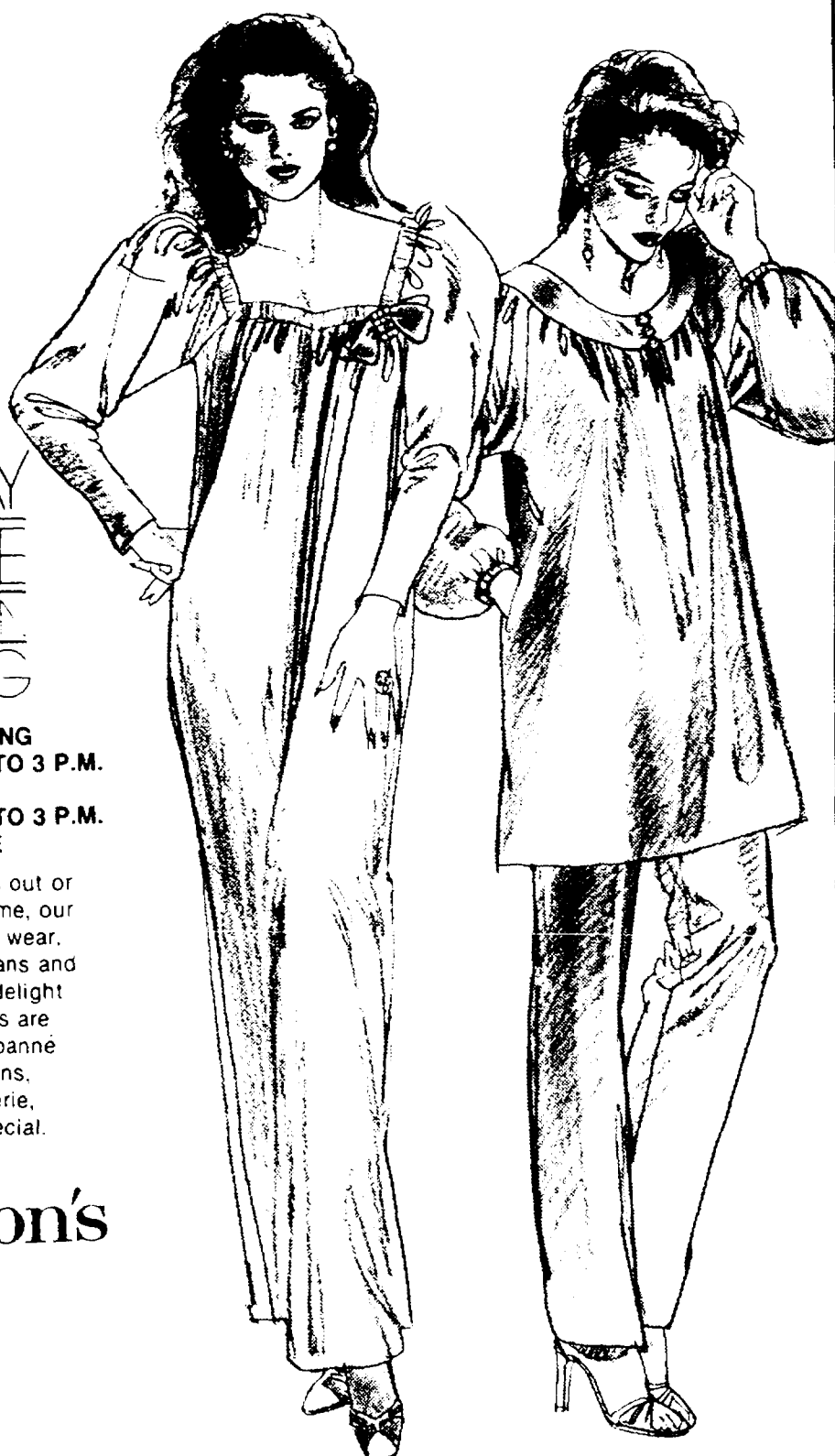

Know Your Schools

Parcels meeting is important

Most people aren't fond of attending meetings and, if given a choice, probably wouldn't attend a particular meeting unless very interested in the purpose of the meeting.

A meeting that has a purpose that should be of interest to everyone in this community has been scheduled for tonight. That meeting is the Community Input Session scheduled by the citizens' committee studying the future organization of The Grosse Pointe Public School System.

This meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. in the auditorium of Parcels Middle School, 20600 Mack Avenue (at Vernier).

The format for the meeting will consist of a brief overview of the committee's work since the middle of last school year, a summary of what the committee has found in its study of the present situation of the public schools and its proposals for the future which will be submitted to the Board of Education, and an opportunity for those in attendance to state opinions and ask questions.

In preparation for the community session, the citizens' committee has distributed a fact sheet

about its work, drawing attention to relevant facts about the future public education in the Grosse Pointes and Harper Woods. The fact sheets have been sent home with elementary school students, attached to parent newsletters, mailed to several individuals and groups in the community, and placed in the central library and two branch libraries for residents to obtain.

Key educational concerns listed on the fact sheet are:

• Enrollment decline is significant, continuing, and inevitably is having great impact upon The Grosse Pointe Public School System.

• Certain elective courses essential to a comprehensive program of studies are imperiled either because of low enrollment with accompanying high costs or because of insufficient enrollment.

• Declining enrollment allows for less flexibility in grouping patterns (fewer sections per grade or classes per subject, variability in class size, increased possibility for split grades).

• As low seniority staff lay-offs occur there is an increasing need for retraining staff members who

are reassigned to new grade levels or different subject areas.

• Reduced opportunities exist for a broad program of student activities (athletics, intramurals and clubs).

• Increased fragmentary and/or part-time teaching assignments result in loss of program continuity, lost teaching time and a reduction of scheduling flexibility.

Also on the fact sheet are two financial facts: 1) The cost of per pupil education increases with diminishing enrollment, and 2) If an elementary school were to be closed, it would mean a savings in the school system's operating budget of about \$150,000. This would translate into a potential savings of about \$1.35 each \$10,000 in State Equalized Value (SEV) to each taxpaying household in the Grosse Pointes, provided there is a corresponding reduction in the millage rate.

The citizens' committee also has listed some alternatives for school organization that will be explained at the community session.

I urge residents to obtain fact sheets if they haven't already, and be in attendance at this important meeting.

Wall Street depression

When national publications take a quick look at the Grosse Pointes, they usually start by drawing the usual stereotype of a wealthy community with maids, butlers, yachts, charity balls and the other accouterments of conspicuous consumption. As those who live in the Pointes know, however, this picture is no longer accurate, if it ever was completely true.

THE WALL STREET Journal, usually respected for its economic reporting, recently fell into the same trap that has ensnared other national publications. In a story that tried to make odious comparisons between the East Side of Detroit and the Pointes, the Journal told us that local people call Alter Road the "Berlin Wall," or "the barrier" or the "Mason-Dixon line." Perhaps some people do use those descriptions but we confess we've never heard any of them applied to Alter Road.

Nor, as a matter of fact, have we heard the East Side referred to as "West Beirut" and the Pointes as "Disneyland," terms that were attributed by the Wall Street Journal to Sen. John Kelly, who represents voters on both sides of Alter. If indeed Kelly used those descriptions, he is more insensitive to Detroit and Pointe people than we thought he was, even though, of course, he did support the Democratic plan that split the Pointes into two congressional districts earlier this year.

Eventually, the Journal got around to telling us that both sides of Alter Road now are feeling

the effects of an uncertain economy. The story cites an example from each side that proves the conclusion. We agree with that opinion but we do wish the supporting evidence about the rise in crime as well as the increase in the welfare load that were blamed on unemployment had not been buried deep in the story on the inside of the paper. For these statistics showed that the recession — it's a depression in metropolitan Detroit — has had wide impact in Grosse Pointe as well as on the East Side.

If anything, the people on the East Side have more reason to complain about the Journal story than do those in Grosse Pointe. The Journal does give the Jefferson-Chalmers Citizens District Council credit for serving as a stout defense against crime and blight in that area, but still describes the area in terms that are unflattering for the East Side.

THE TROUBLE with such reporting is that it accentuates the stereotypes on both sides of Alter Road. On the one side, it finds wealth, privilege and the minor cutbacks forced on Pointe residents by the recession while on the other side it finds poverty, nonworking winos chipping in to buy a single bottle and an underemployed transvestite prostitute raising his rates. In other words, the story accentuates the difference between the two areas and ignores the substantial people on both sides of Alter who are trying their best to cope with the depression.

To the Editor:

For the past five months, the residents of Sunningdale Drive between Fairway and Sunningdale Park have had to put up with an incredible amount of disruption due to the laying of new water and sewer lines and the repaving of the roadway.

The trouble began with the cutting down of several large maple

trees and continued with the excavating and pouring of new sidewalks, driveways and streets. Also, there was an unbelievable amount of dust, dirt, ruined lawns, torn-up driveways, broken sprinkler heads and cracked walls caused by the breaking up of the old roadbed.

After all this inconvenience, one wonders if the end result is worth

all the trouble of the process. I would like to congratulate the residents for their patience and perseverance through it all.

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'Brain drain' hurts Michigan

Everyone knows that the depression in Michigan is costing the state dearly in many respects. But one loss that is not always apparent except to the families involved is the "brain drain" that occurs when unemployed workers leave the state in search of jobs elsewhere.

NOW THERE are figures that show that Michigan's population loss from April 1, 1980, to July 1, 1981, was the highest of any state in the union. The Population Reference Bureau, in a United States Population Data Sheet, said that five states lost population in that period but that Michigan's loss was larger than that of Indiana, Ohio, Iowa and South Dakota.

Those figures mean that Michigan is losing an important segment of that talented work force that has made this state one of the industrial giants of the nation. It also means, more specifically, that the state will have difficulty in achieving its goal of becoming a "high tech" state unless it soon can turn its economic situation around and halt the further exodus of the trained workers it needs to achieve this goal.

It is significant that the states which lost population in the 15-month period covered by the Population Reference Bureau report are all in the Middle West. Three of them — Michigan, Ohio and Indiana — are industrial states with strong agricultural elements as well. Iowa and South Dakota are predominantly farm states which also have many industrial plants. Both manufacturing and farming have been hurt as the area that once was known as the "arsenal of democracy" and the "nation's breadbasket" suffers severe economic reverses.

THE PROBLEM is serious not only because the "brain drain" cannot be reversed overnight but because Michigan is losing both jobs and people that it will need when the economic picture finally improves here. That is unlikely to happen until the entire national economy gets back on its feet, a fact that points to the economic obstacle facing the new governor and the new Legislature that will take office Jan. 1, 1983.

Civil service a facade

In its early days, civil service was often described as a merit system. And so it was, and is, in some jurisdictions. An honestly conceived and administered civil service system indeed is the antithesis of the spoils system for the appointment and administration of public employees.

In Wayne County's government, however, the civil service system has been a facade behind which the customary political wheeling and dealing as well as nepotism and favoritism have been not only continued but enhanced. County commissioners and other elected officials often vote to create new, well-paid administrative positions — and then take on the jobs themselves or pick political cronies or relatives to fill them. Now the civil service system itself has taken a new step to assure perpetuation of the spoils system.

A RULE CHANGE quietly adopted by the county Civil Service Commission in August

provides that managerial employees who are not covered by a collective bargaining agreement would be allowed to bump into similar jobs in different departments. That rule change will make it almost impossible for the newly elected county executive to remove present county department heads.

That is the purpose of the rule, of course. It is to protect supervisors from job loss when the new county executive puts his required reorganization into effect. The rule has the same aim as the formation of the Wayne County Road Commission union made up of supervisory employees who fear the possible loss of their jobs when the reorganization takes effect.

Under the present system in Wayne County, civil service has been turned on its head. It protects employees but not the public. It tends to support the spoils system, not the merit system. In fact, it is not civil and it does little to improve the service provided by county employees.

Mrs. McLean served as the dean of the college for four years before being elected its president in 1975 — largely as a result of student acclaim, according to a Memorial Church spokesman.

During the years Mrs. McLean served as dean, Grosse Pointes Mrs. Ray Kiely and Mrs. Fred Adams served on the Board of Trustees. They have maintained their involvement with the college and the Reverend and Mrs. Kiely will host Mrs. McLean in their home.

Mrs. Kiely is most enthusiastic about Mrs. McLean's speaking ability and the message she brings with her.

Barber-Scotia College was founded by Presbyterian missionaries for the purpose of educating freed slaves. It is one of the first of such colleges to have been founded after the Civil War for this purpose.

Among its graduates is Thelma Adair who recently served as moderator of the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church, the highest post in the Presbyterian Church.

Mrs. McLean is a member and an Elder of John Hall United Presbyterian Church in Concord, N.C., where she resides with her husband, Earl.

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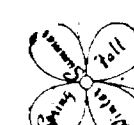

Dreams sometimes do come true. In witness we present Alice Pomian Gardner who, like so many librarians, dreamed of someday having a directorship, of the opportunity to put into practice ideas developed through 30-plus years of working with books and giving service to patrons and their interests.

Who officially retires from the Parcels Middle School Library tomorrow, takes off for a new life in Sun City, Ariz., on Sunday and starts work as director of the Sun City Library and Branch as of Dec. 1.

The library, built in 1978, now contains 50,000 volumes. The branch has 23,000 volumes. Last year's circulation was in excess of 160,000. Alice, who has been a school librarian since 1951 (Detroit Public Schools, 1951-69; Grosse Pointe Board of Education, Parcels School, 1969-tomorrow; before that, she was with the Detroit Public Library Catalog Department for five years, 1945-50), is looking forward to working with a more mature age group.

Will she miss the children? "No. At this stage of my life, I want something different." Will she miss Grosse Pointe? "I know I will miss browsing through the gorgeous shops on Mack and Kercheval Avenues, lunching at the Golden Lion and Anton's, driving down beautiful Lakeshore . . ."

But: "Sun City looks like Grosse Pointe!" When the George H. Gardner spent their first summer in Sun City a few years ago, they felt immediately at home. In 1980 they built their first home there; last fall they decided to build their second, on a golf course in Sun City West, and that's where they'll be at home from now on.

Living history in The Pointe

The Grosse Pointe Historical Society is planning a gala evening starting at 8 p.m. Monday, Nov. 8, at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial. A Docent conducted tour of the building and informative talks on the history of Alger House and its furnishings will be featured.

Refreshments will be served. The program is open to any interested members of the community as well as Historical Society members and their guests.

Mrs. Jon Gandelot will explain how one goes about having a building declared an Historic Site. Mrs. Bruce Bockstanz will discuss Alger Family history and the War Memorial Center from the viewpoint of its restoration and preservation.

Dr. Mark Weber, the War Memorial's director, will speak on the present and the future of the center, and its many works of art, as a continuing core for the cultural life of The Pointe.

The Grosse Pointe Historical Society welcomes new members of all ages; the only requirement for membership is an interest in local history and a desire to preserve the landmarks and notable relics of the past.

The society is headquartered on Cook Road, in Monteith School, and is open on Wednesdays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

MATTHEW VILLAIRE, son of MR. and MRS. MARVIN VILLAIRE, of Hampton Road, was graduated June 20 from the University of California at Los Angeles with a Bachelor of Science in Psychology degree. The 1975 graduate of Grosse Pointe North High School is currently enrolled in the School of Dentistry at Case Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio.

"BEFORE THIS appointment (as library director), we had planned to spend winters in Arizona, spring in our condo in Gatlinburg, Tenn., in the heart of the Smoky Mountains, and we had hoped to develop our working farm in Hudson, Mich., and use it as a summer residence." Those peripatetic possibilities are no more.

"I certainly can't start vacationing until at least a year from now," Alice says. But it's worth it, because Alice is retiring TO something, and all her friends and colleagues, knowing Alice, have the same reaction: "It's wonderful!"

She's a native daughter, born in Harper Hospital. She married George H. Gardner in Nov., 1943; he retired in 1981 after 30 years in electrical and electronic work. Hunting is his avocation. He's been a member of Lost Lake Woods for about 25 years, has hunted in the Yukon and plans to go up to Colorado to bring back meat for the Sun City West kitchen.

Hunting led directly to his second avocation. "He started to cook when he started to hunt," Alice says. Game dishes are his specialty, and he's been known to keep the eight burners in the Gardner's Anita Avenue home bubbling. Eight burners? "And two stoves," says Alice. As the Perle Mesta of Parcels, she's had a reputation to uphold.

She's loved upholding it. "We do a lot of entertaining. We enjoy it." They also enjoy gardening (Alice is into herbs) and reading (you could have bet on that one!) and traveling.

They went to Europe for the first time in the early '60s. "We decided we'd better travel while our legs could still take the castles and the cathedrals." On this trip, Alice fell in love with Lalique crystal. Her lovely Lalique collection is going with her to Arizona.

SO ARE HER collections of pewter and rare volumes of architecture and interior design; in all, Mr. Gardner has packed about 50 boxes of goodies he and Alice have collected on their many trips to Europe and the Far East. They've visited Australia and New Zealand, too. They're designing their Sun City West garden to resemble the gardens they admired in Tokyo and Kyoto, Japan. "A plan like this lends itself to desert landscaping," Alice says.

She's always wanted to be a librarian. "I was on the student library staff in junior high. One of the people I admired most was the librarian." She went on to get degrees in Liberal Arts, Education and (a whole year's extra work) Library Science.

Then she went to work, and she loved her work. But all things come to an end. Alice was looking forward to retirement, certainly not dreading it, when the Gardner's were invited out to dinner in Sun City by some friends who used to live in Dearborn. In the course of the evening a question came up: "Now that Alice — who is definitely NO sit-by-the-fire — has everything squared away with the new house, now that the rugs

are laid, the wallpapering's done, what is she going to do with herself?"

"What everybody else does, I suppose," said Alice, who never found filling time difficult. But when, the next day, a call came through — "Mrs. Gardner? We're looking for a library director here in Sun City, and we understand you're very qualified . . . Would you be interested in interviewing?" — she didn't have to think twice before she said, "Yes!"

And did she do her homework? Even though she didn't think she had a chance. "The ad ran just once in The Library Journal, and 73 people, from almost every state in the union, applied. I hadn't even noticed the ad."

WORD-OF-MOUTH recommended, she was one of 12 applicants selected for an interview. Dreams do indeed come true: she got the job.

She'll be in charge of a staff of three librarians and eight clerks. Most of her patrons will be young adults and children; grandparents like to be visited.

That suits Alice just fine. She's quite ready to give up working primarily with children, but give up children? — Never! "We're a small family. My husband and I have no children. He's an only child. I only had one sister." But the Gardner's have always been the sort of people who attract people; they've had many good friends, and many of those friends have had children, and it's hard to imagine a more perfect set of godparents than the Gardner's. They have many godchildren.

Alice has written a children's story, using the Paul Bunyan legends as background material. "I marry Paul off to a girl named Bertha." She's sent it to a couple of publishers. They've expressed interest, "if we could find the right illustrator."

Well . . . there's a lot of talent, professional and amateur, in Sun City, and a lot of it is going to pass through the doors of Alice's library. Who knows? Who ever really does know? A year ago, Alice Gardner had no idea she'd be gearing up for a new, dream job.

Though she frankly couldn't imagine her life without a library. She recalls one of her Parcels students, a girl, asking, "Mrs. Gardner, what are you going to do when you go to that Big Library in the Sky?"

"Probably catalog and process," said Alice. And she smiled.

ELEGANT EATING

CABBAGE RICE SOUP
2 Tbsp. unsalted margarine
1 lb. shredded cabbage rinsed
1 cup peeled onion, thinly sliced
4 cans beef broth
1 soup can water
1 can (16 oz.) stewed tomatoes
1 1/8 tsp. freshly ground pepper
1/8 tsp. nutmeg
1/2 cup brown rice
Finely minced parsley, garnish

Melt margarine in a four-quart kettle. Add rinsed cabbage to kettle along with the onions. Cook over medium heat for about 10 minutes. Add broth, water, stewed tomatoes, pepper and nutmeg and simmer, covered, for 10 minutes. Add rice and slowly cook for about 50 minutes or until rice is soft and tender. Makes 8 servings.

VERMONT CORN CHOWDER
4 medium potatoes
4 medium onions, thinly sliced
4 Tbsp. unsalted margarine
4 cups skim milk
1/2 cup evaporated skim milk
2 cans (16 oz.) cream style corn
1/2 tsp. salt
1 1/8 tsp. freshly ground pepper
1 tsp. finely chopped parsley
1/8 tsp. thyme
1/8 tsp. marjoram
Dash of snipped chives or paprika

Peel and cube potatoes. Cook in water to cover for 15 minutes or until very tender. Meanwhile, saute onions in 2 tablespoons margarine. Warm the skim milk and the evaporated milk in a large soup kettle. Add the potatoes (drain and reserve 1/2 cup of the liquid to rinse out the corn cans) Add the sauteed onions, corn, remaining 2 tablespoons of margarine, salt, pepper, parsley, thyme and marjoram. Heat mixture to piping hot, but don't boil. Remove from heat and, for better blending of flavors, set aside to cool and reheat. Makes 8 servings. Garnish with chives or paprika.

1/8 tsp. freshly ground pepper
1 Tbsp. lemon juice
2 tsp. cornstarch

Add 1 tablespoon unsalted margarine and cook over hot water until very hot and slightly thickened; serve at once. Makes 4 servings.
