## **European Documentation Centre/Depository Library at the University of Pittsburgh**

In 2007 the Delegation of the European Commission to the U.S.A., Washington, D.C. donated its library collection to the University Library System at the University of Pittsburgh. The gift is a virtually complete collection of official European Community documents published since the early 1950s containing materials that are not available through Europa initiated in the 1990s. A detailed description of the collection now housed in Pittsburgh can be seen in *EU Related Archival and Library Collections*:

The highlight in the collection is the *research files* which are about 650 linear shelf feet of folders of documents arranged by subject. From the 1950s, Delegation librarians compiled these files, which contain duplicate copies of documents in the main collection. As noted recently by one scholar after spending one day in the *research files*:

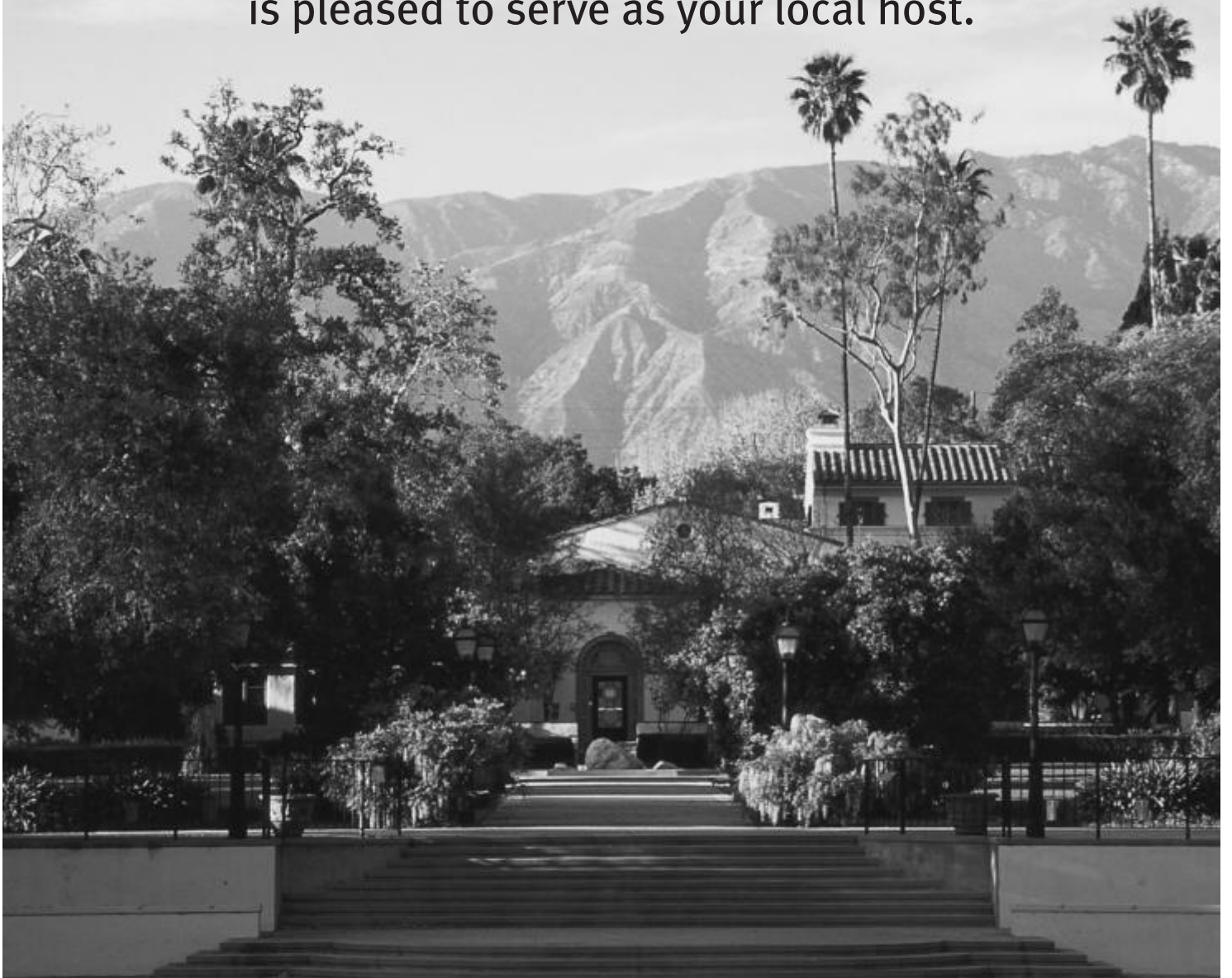
