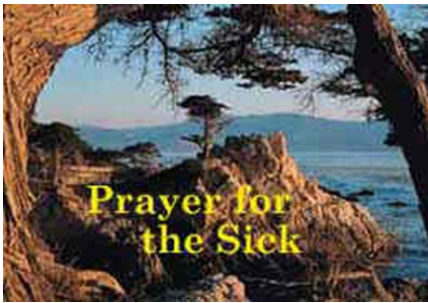

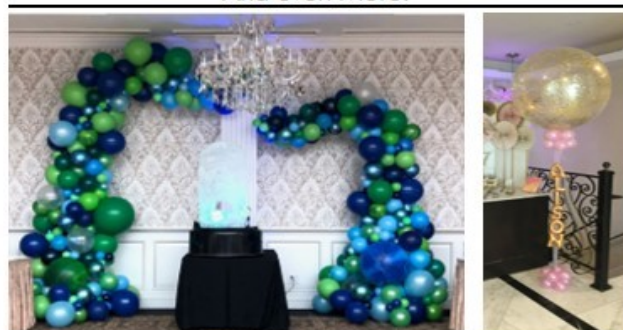

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RABBINIC REFLECTIONS



Over the past fifty years or so, Judaism and other religions have faced a difficult challenge: modern societies' evolution away from obligations. To be a good citizen, or a good Jew, traditionally meant that we each subscribed to a set of binding actions within families, communities, and in our relationship with God. Through the late part of the twentieth century and into the twenty first, we have drifted from feelings of obligation. In their place many moderns have elevated individualism, placing the self and personal liberty above other values.

For Jews, the loss of feelings of obligation feels particularly acute, as doing what is expected of us has been central to Jewish law and living, no less the sense of our Jewish selves, for thousands of years. Each winter, the minor holiday of Tu b'Shevat provides an opportunity to re-center our actions, with an eye toward our obligations to

the community and to the future. It is the holiday which marked the maturity of fruit trees in the ancient period, which would be subject to tithing. Those tithes, in turn, supported the work of the priests and the Temple in Jerusalem, making it possible for everyone in the community to take part in what we might term the religious economy. By tithing their fruit trees, Jews acknowledged their personal obligations to the continued operation of the Temple.

In rabbinic lore, a well known midrash establishes the standard of planting fruit trees even if, as in the case of the carob tree, no produce will come to fruition until many years later, perhaps not even in the lifetime of the one who plants it. Despite the possibility of not gaining any benefit personally from these trees, the sages understood that just as carob trees were in the world when we came into it, it is our responsibility to make sure they are here when others follow us.

Obligation is at the center of how Jews are to understand their place in the world. We emphasize our responsibilities to others, rather than what is due to us from them. That value is sometimes in direct conflict with modern sensibilities, but it is a crucial counterweight to a society that feels ever more centered on the individual. It is in fulfilling our obligation to others that we

live up to the standards of our sacred texts and our sages' words. Being a Jew means planting for a future that will bear more fruit than we consume.

FROM CANTOR LARRY



Following the holiday of Hanukkah, which fell early this season, I began to reflect on the secular holiday of the New Year. I began to think of what changes will be applied to the 2021 New Year. Although many of my wants and wishes have already been asked for and some put into place since the Jewish New Year back in September; nonetheless, I feel that there are many new beginnings that take place in any given year. With every beginning, we must be thankful for all that is good. We celebrate the end of reaching a goal and begin to work on the next set of priorities and adventures.

One of the important blessings that we recite when we enter a new phase is the blessing of the Sheheheyanu. Normally, this blessing is recited on seventeen occasions in the year. It is translated as: "Praised are You, God, Ruler of the Universe, Who has granted us life and sustenance and permitted us to reach this festive occasion." It is recited when tasting fruit for the first

time in the season, when putting on a new garment, when moving into a new house, when lighting the first Hanukkah candle, when the Shofar is sounded on Rosh Hashanah, the first day the Lulav and Etrog are used on Sukkot, before reading the Megillah on Purim, and it forms part of the Kiddush for festivals, except the last two nights of Pesah.

Sheheheyanu is omitted on the last two nights of Pesah, commemorating the crossing of the Red Sea, in order to stress the idea that we must not rejoice over the misfortunes that befell our foes. Similarly, only half-Hallel is recited on the last six days of Pesach, in keeping with the following tradition: When the Egyptians were drowning in the Red Sea, God restrained the angels from singing and praising, saying: "How can you sing while my creatures are drowning,, in the sea?" (Megillah 10b). It all goes back to the biblical warning which says: "Do not rejoice when your enemy falls, do not exult when he is overthrown. . ." (Proverbs 24:17-18).

The Sheheheyanu blessing is not recited at a Brit Milah (circumcision ceremony) festivity because of the "pain" involved to the child circumcised. Nor is it recited at the first counting of the Omer, which brings to mind the tragic events con-

nected with the Sefirah period between Pesah and Shavuot. Otherwise, it is used on all happy occasions.

May the occasion of the "2021" New Year be one to fulfill the blessing of the Sheheheyanu. May we all be blessed with a future that is filled with global health, happiness, and, above all, peace.

On behalf of my wife, Laura, and my children, I wish all of you a happy and joyous 2021 New Year.

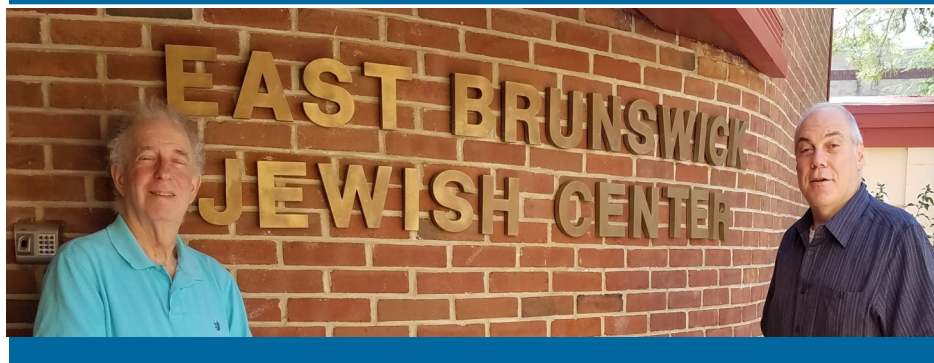

FROM OUR PRESIDENTS



As we ring in the new year of 2021, we gladly say good-bye (or some may say good riddance) to 2020, a year we will never forget. But as we reflect on the year of the Corona virus pandemic, we would like to illuminate some of the ways that we at EBJC made the year, not only bearable, but also made us proud to be part of our kahal.

As the year began, we found ourselves on firm financial footing, meeting our budget objectives through the first quarter of the year. Kudos to our financial team: treasurer, Neil Kosher, and financial secretary, Haley Migdal, for preparing the budget. And thank you to our membership for supporting EBJC with timely dues payments and contributions.

On the night of February 22nd, we held our annual Gala, honoring East Brunswick Mayor and EBJC member, Dr. Brad Cohen. The event was a rousing success; attendance was a sellout, and we raised over \$40,000 for our synagogue. Thank you to our Gala chairs, Margo and David Julis, Executive Vice-President Joannie Weinfeld, and our Gala committee for organizing and bringing to fruition such an enjoyable event.

Who would have realized then that less than three weeks after the Gala, we would be shutting down our in-person activities due to the pandemic? We are grateful that we had a committee of physicians in our community to help guide us through some of the difficult early decisions to lock down the shul. Thanks to Drs. Laura Brandspiegel, Richard Drachtman, Lou Friedman, Jules Plafker, and Phil Schiffman for their

medical advice, and to our legal counsel, David Libowsky for his legal expertise. We were among the first group of local synagogues to close our doors, but we did not close out our community. As you all know, less than 24 hours after making the decision to close, we were streaming services to our community. Our attendance at our online services has been phenomenal, and our membership has participated in these services from home. We were able to stay connected, and in some ways, this connection during a time of lockdown has strengthened our community. And even though our services were only online, we managed to celebrate several B'nai Mitzvot with guests tuning in from as far away as Argentina and Israel.

When the pandemic waned in the summer, we were able to hold in-person services on Shabbat, the High Holidays, and the Chagim, and we were even able to hold outdoor Hakafot on Simchat Torah!

The pandemic has brought out some of the best in our community. Many members have volunteered to go grocery shopping for those, who due to age or underlying medical conditions, did not feel safe to do the shopping themselves. Our Membership Committee has made and continues to make calls to our membership to check in on them and to see if there is anything that EBJC can do for them.

There have been multiple classes available online. Judah Landa has continued to teach his Science and the Bible and Talmud classes via Zoom. Both Cantor Larry and Rabbi Pivo teach regularly as well. Members of our Sisterhood have

held baking demonstrations. And our Keshet and preschool programs have operated online as well as in person.

EBJC has hosted several entertaining programs in the past few months, all of which have been streamed on Zoom. In October, Robyn Helzner gave a program on the Jews of China. November brought us an evening with Tova Feldshuh, the actress best known for portraying Golda Meir in Golda's Balcony on Broadway. And on the sixth night of Hanukkah, we had a family program featuring a comedian and a mentalist. Something for everyone.

Perhaps the best news of 2020 has been the pending sale of part of our property to Yeshiva Ateres Shlomo. When the sale closes, EBJC will retire all our debt and will have an endowment of \$1 million dollars which will secure our financial stability for the foreseeable future.

We do not want to ignore or downplay the misery of 2020 caused by COVID-19. Members of our kahal have lost loved ones to or have suffered from this horrible illness. But Judaism is essentially an optimistic religion. After Hashem completed His creation, He looked at his work and He said, "ki tov," He saw that it was good. We look back at the challenges of this past year and our community's responses to it, and we also say, ki tov.

We pray that with the arrival of vaccines and our continued vigilance with mask wearing and social distancing, we can look forward to returning to a more normal world.

In the words of Psalm 84, "... [may we all continue] to go from strength to strength".
