RABBI'S MESSAGE



I cannot believe it! The High Holy Days are upon us. The month of Elul is almost over. Erev Rosh Hashanah is coming this Sunday, October 2nd. The first of Tishrei, and Rosh Hashanah, are Monday. Our offices will be closed, and our hearts will be opened.

As the *Chagim*, the Festivals, are approaching, my mindset seems to shift. I am torn with excitement, as the preparations take hold. I am torn with anxiety: “will I get it all in?” My dilemma is two-fold. On one hand, I love the High Holy Days; the holidays and rituals, the festivities and food. I love that our congregation comes together—it really is the only time all year that we get to see one another. Who has had *simchas* and blessings in their lives; who may be struggling and in need of our support? We get to see how much our kids have grown; we get to reflect on how our community has changed. Who is going off to college, and who is starting preschool? Who has retired, and who has begun a new job? Who has had a baby and who has passed away? We get to play catch-up in the whirlwind which we call life.



I love the High Holy Days; the preparation of sermons, the liturgy, and the organizing of programs and people; the work which goes into the *Chagim*. But that is just the practical in the life of a rabbi and congregation.

On the other hand, each one of us has our own personal work to endeavor. I ask myself, “will I get it all in?” We are human, we are fallible, and we are allowed to make mistakes. God and our liturgy give us an out for these errs. By design, we are supposed to ask for forgiveness, learn from our errors, and grow from our mistakes. We have an opportunity to make our amends, and right our wrongs. Again, I ask, “will I get it all in?”

The High Holy Days are about doing the work of *Tshuvah*, true repentance; one of the major themes of the *Yamim Noraim*, the Days of Awe. What few Liberal Jews realize, is that the work of asking forgiveness is a daily function in our lives. We are to constantly be assessing who we are as a person, working to make those amends; our weekday *Amidah* provides us with the following prayer:

Forgive us for we have sinned,
pardon us, for we have transgressed,
for you pardon and forgive.
Blessed are you, Adonai, abounding in forgiveness.

סְלַח לָנוּ, כִּי חָטָאנוּ,
מְחַל לָנוּ, כִּי פָשְׁעָנוּ,
כִּי מַחֵל וְסוֹלֵחַ אַתָּה.
בְּרוּךְ אַתָּה יי, הַמְרַבֵּה לְסִלְחָם.

Apples and honey, we will eat;
A “Sweet New Year”, we shall greet.
At the Head of the Year, new beginnings celebrated;
Our successes and failures of the year deliberated.

Are you ready for the year to start anew?
Have you made it all right, those things between you
And the other, the Thou
The person and the how?

May you be written,
May you be sealed.
Through our prayers and our caring,
Our community may be healed.

L'shanah tovah u'metukah. May it be a happy and sweet New Year. I look forward to connecting with you and yours over the High Holy Days. As Yom Kippur approaches, may you have an easy fast, and may we all come together to rejoice in this season of the year as we decorate the sukkah and dance with the Torah. I am positive we can “get it all in,” and it is going to great!

Beth Sholom Temple High Holy Days Admission Policy

All are welcome to attend our services. There is no fee to attend services nor are tickets issued. It is requested that the following be adhered to:

Members (those who have returned their yearly membership form), when you enter the synagogue for the High Holy Days services, you will find a table directly in front of you with a list of members. **For security reasons** you will be asked to check off your name, even if you have been a long time and well recognized Temple member.

Non-members, we request that you fill out a Non-member High Holy Days form which can be obtained from our office. This form asks for contact and other information and provides information for making a donation. **This will also help with security.** As with members, you will be asked to check off your name at the entrance table if you had submitted the form, or to fill out and leave the form at the entrance table. There will be a donation box available where you can drop off your donation.

Military personnel and area college students just need to show their IDs.

Members from out of town Jewish synagogues are welcomed with a Reciprocity letter from their present synagogue.

Note: Beth Sholom Temple members who will be attending an out-of-town synagogue for the Holy Days may obtain a letter of Reciprocity from the office. You must request this letter at least two weeks prior to the Holy Days.

GIFT CARDS



Ladies and Gentlemen,

I want to remind you of two fabulous ways to make donations to Beth Sholom Temple with no out of pocket expense.

- 1) the gift card (shopwithscrip.com) program.
- 2) AmazonSmile

The first one has been around for years but very few of us are using it. You can buy several types of gift cards from Ellen Grady at Sunday bagel bar. Better yet, do it online and choose from over 700 stores, big box stores, restaurant chains and online retailers. Just about anywhere you go in Central Park or South Point or Aquia for food, clothes, electronics, gas, movies, book stores, sporting goods, home & garden--everything! Go to www.shopwithscrip.com/shop to browse them.

The donation rate ranges widely:



- ◆ 2.5% from Walmart
- ◆ 4% at Giant
- ◆ 6% at Walgreens and CVS
- ◆ 10% at Macy's
- ◆ 10% at Chipotle and other restaurants
- ◆ 13% at LL Bean, J. Crew and Lands End

You can get physical cards or electronic coupons to use from your phone, tablet or PC.

Think about how much you spend on these items. \$500 per month? \$1000 per month? Multiply by a conservative 5% and then by 100 families. \$30,000 to 60,000 to the temple annually. Even if we each just did a fraction of our spending this way the benefit is great.

Amazon Smile

You can support Beth Sholom Temple financially by shopping on Amazon.com If you use Smile.Amazon.com and select BST as your charity of choice, 0.5% of your purchases will be donated to BST.

If you use Amazon, how much do you spend annually? Don't keep track? Here's a hint. The average is \$1500. Guess when most of that is spent? Between now and January. So I urge you to make the small extra effort to go to Amazon Smile and select BST as your charity of choice. The key is to go to the Smile page first before you shop. You can still use Prime.

So let's do some simple math: \$1500 per year X 0.5% X 100 families is \$7500 per year to Beth Sholom Temple. That's in addition to the gift card purchases above. And if you buy Amazon gift cards on ShopWithScrip before you shop on Smile, you increase that to 4.5%!

This time of year is when a ton of disposable income gets spent. With a little effort we can start raising much needed funds for our congregation. Even if you use Amazon Smile to donate to a different charitable organization, you are doing a great thing. I'll call that a win for BST.

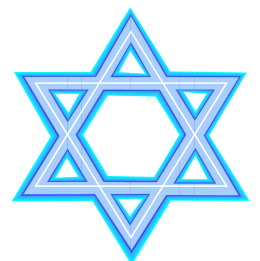

ONEG SHABBAT GUIDELINES

Here at Beth Sholom, members are given the mitzvah and privilege of hosting the Oneg Shabbat. The Oneg provides us with the opportunity to delight in Shabbat, together in community. The Oneg is also our first impression for guests to Beth Sholom Temple. It is our honor to make it a warm and welcoming event in our congregational home. You are encouraged to take ownership of this honor. Some things you can do to make Oneg more fun and inviting are: incorporate a theme - is there a holiday coming up? Or you might consider referencing the Torah portion for the week through a creative use of food, or even using your team's Oneg to thank a committee, or just celebrate the Temple family in a special way! Please use the guidelines below when considering your upcoming Oneg.

1. The list of Oneg Family assignments is available on the website, and here, in the Kol Yonah.
2. If you are NOT able to participate in your assigned Oneg, please notify the lead family of your group so appropriate arrangements may be made (lead family, please ask your fellow team members about taking over if you need to switch). It is your responsibility to switch with another family, and to inform the office of this change.
3. Prior to the Oneg, contact all team members to discuss who will bring the necessary items and other refreshments. **Necessary Items:** Challah, Kosher Red Wine, Kosher Grape Juice; **Refreshment Suggestions:** Fruit & Veggie Tray, Dips & Cheeses, Cookies & Cakes, Beverages
4. Try to arrive 30 minutes prior to service to set up; see the website at <http://www.bstva.org/onegs.html> for full instructions on set-up.
5. Clean up by taking dirty linens home for washing and either take food home or store appropriate left-overs in the refrigerator and freezer for refreshments after Saturday morning service. A cleaning team will come in on Friday evenings after Oneg to take care of washing dishes, vacuuming, and taking out the garbage.
