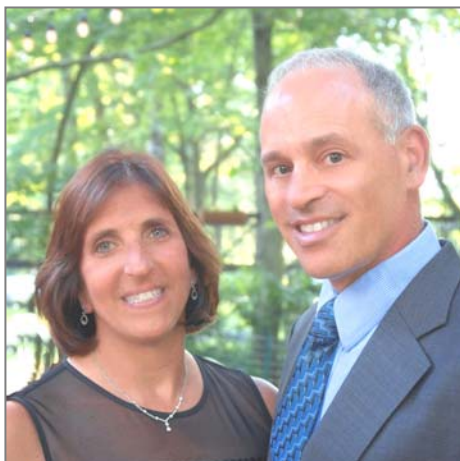

Maltzman Memorial Shabbat Dinner Honoring Robin and Howard Zwick

During their 20 years at TBH-BE, both have served in multiple leadership roles, all while raising their two boys, Adam and Zachary. Howard was Men's Club co-president and has sat on the synagogue board either as a member or officer for the past 14 years. Robin just concluded

her two-year term as Sisterhood president after serving as vice president for many years. Robin was honored to be part of the 2007 TBH-BE adult b'nai mitzvah class.

Together, they have taken on integral roles in synagogue fundraisers such as Hava Na'Grilla, Tzedakahthon, Craft and Gift show, and

OFF THE PULPIT

Why Do We Come Together? Thoughts for the High Holidays

Part of the beauty of the High Holidays is the yearly pull we feel to return to our spiritual homes—our synagogue. In fact, the celebration of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur centers around the act of coming together. Many of us are drawn to the familiar and moving liturgy of the Holidays while others are summoned by the Cantor's voice or by the messages of sermons. Above all though, I believe that the strongest pull comes from the community.

"Koolulam" is the name of a project in Israel to bring Israelis together through song. Throughout the country, notices are posted in different cities asking people to come together for an hour. Anyone can come: young or old, Jewish, Christian or Muslim, religious or secular, musically gifted or not. During that hour, they learn the words and tunes (which most already know) and harmonies of a popular song. After an hour of rehearsal, the cameras roll and the song is performed. The size of the groups ranges from a few to as many as 12,000. You can watch the video recording of some of these performances by clicking on the link on the web site (see details on

page 16). What you will hear will astound you.

If you are like me, you will be struck by several features of the performance. First, as the cameras pan the audience, one sees a variety of people representing all shapes and sizes every age, every religion and from every cultural background. Those who participate are simply those who showed up.

What also strikes me with each song performed is that all the diversity melds into a collective voice—a voice that can only be created together emerges. Within that collective voice, there is a sense of unity, a spirit of kinship and "belonging." There are no "stars" among the members of the audience, yet the sound of thousands of voices, singing as one, with joy and strength is unique, powerful and palpable.

For me, the pull of the High Holidays is similar. We are drawn together not to stand out from the rest but to stand together. We come because we want to be part of that group that lifts its voice in song together. It doesn't matter whether or not your voice is strong. Others

FROM THE ASSOCIATE RABBI

Become a Lifelong Learner

As we begin the new year on the Jewish calendar, I also look forward to my new role within the congregation. With Lisa Richman ably leading the religious school, I can now turn more of my focus to other areas, including our Adult Education program. Our tradition teaches us that "Talmud Torah k'neged kulam" – the study of Torah is equivalent in import to all of the other commandments because it leads to them all." We hope that as you begin the new year, you will consider which of these offerings interest you most and join us when you can.

We are pleased to bring back our **Adult B'nai Mitzvah class** this year. Whether you came to Judaism later in life or simply never had the opportunity to celebrate becoming a Bar/Bat Mitzvah, we are pleased to offer this popular course once again. The class will meet on Sunday mornings, beginning October 14 and culminate in a group celebration on June 1, 2019. It will have two focal points: 1) Refreshing (or learning) Hebrew skills, learning the trope system for Torah reading and reading a short passage from the Torah at the June 1 ceremony; 2) An opportunity to look at a wide range of Jewish topics and rituals

with adult eyes – going beyond the basics to understand the deeper meanings and how learning more about our tradition can impact our lives. I am the lead organizer and teacher for the class, with Rabbi Cooper and Hazzan Rosner playing integral roles in it.

In celebration of our congregation's 60th anniversary, we are excited to offer a two-part talk and tour on "**The Past Sixty Years of Jews in Philadelphia.**" Local educator (and brother of our own Melanie Wolfson) Dr. Michael Schatz will lead us on a look back, first through words and later by visiting the sites that will help us understand what the Jewish community looked like 60 years ago and how we moved from that point to where we are now. The talk will take place on Sunday, October 28, 9:30 – 11:00 AM and the tour will be on Sunday, November 11 1:00 PM – 4:30 PM.

We are blessed to have in this congregation a wealth of Jewish scholars, many of whom volunteer their time to teach us. This year, we are pleased that **Dr. Saul Wachs** will be teaching a class in October on "How the World Changed Judaism." This class will look at

FROM THE CANTOR'S STUDY

As Temple Beth Hillel-Beth El celebrates its 60th Anniversary, I decided to have a look back as well on my 29 years at this incredible synagogue! One of the more unsung activities where I am intimately involved is the regular care and preparation of our *sifrei torah*. It is a terrifically important job. As part of my first year's work, I needed to code the *sefarim* for the Universal Torah Registry, marking each torah with a unique identification pattern. This added a level of security to our *sifrei torah* that was much needed. Security aside, the scrolls must be rolled fairly regularly and occasionally there is actual repair work that must be done.

Every so often, a *sefer* is deemed *pasul* (not kosher for use), and I need to determine what needs to be repaired. I have had the great opportunity to work with and learn from two wonderful *sofrei-stam* in my years at TBH-BE. Rabbis Saul Teitelbaum and Isaac Leizerowski are two master *sofrim* and true artists with ink and quill. With them, I learned the laws of *safirut*, and in most cases, I can determine whether a word in the *torah* is "off" and what to do with it. I've also gotten quite good at sewing and patching when the *claf* (parchment) gets loose at the seams. It's always a joy to work with a *sefer torah* and there is a sense of satisfaction when a repair

goes well.

Changing the *torah* covers in advance of Rosh Hashanah is special in its own right. My wife, Amy will often help me with this task, as there are a lot of *sefarim* to take care of. This activity is one that really helps prepare us for the high holy days. This year is extra special. As part of our 60th Anniversary, we have new mantles for our *sifrei torah*. We thank those congregants for their generosity in dedicating a Torah mantle! The high-holy-day covers are inscribed with the words *avenu malkenu* while the year-round versions have the words *or chadash*. They are absolutely stunning, and it will be wonderful sharing our new covers with everyone.

Amy, Morey, and Elana join me in wishing you all a happy and healthy new year!

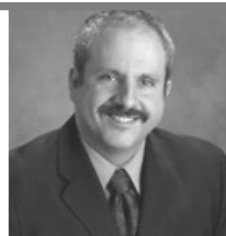

FROM THE ECC

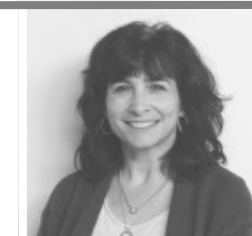

Cycles Within Our Communities

While sitting shiva for my mother (z"l), in July, I commented to someone that in a way, it is better to receive than to give. When I first said it, it took me by surprise; it sounded selfish. It was not the message we received from our parents. But as I sat shiva, I found that being on the receiving end serves as a very strong reminder of the power of community. Temple Beth Hillel Beth El is an action-oriented congregation, which functions as a warm and embracing community. During shiva, our members—some of whom I did not know—were there to help, to anticipate and satisfy all of the needs, even when I didn't know what I needed. I realized that being a part of a community means that we are all part of a turning cycle.

One day we must all receive. I know that in time, I will be able to give to others in the ways they have given to me and carry out the cyclical nature of communities. How can we transmit this powerful message of community to our children? How do we instill a sense of community and connect-

edness in our children?

Communities are not created spontaneously. To teach the message of community to our children, we will need a network of parents that, together with the Religious School staff, will instruct and model how being in a community means both giving and receiving. That cyclical and reciprocal feature of communities must be made explicit and expected in every encounter.

As I begin my new role as Director of the Religious School, I have been thinking about this theme a lot. Without giving too much away, I look to establish plans for cross-grade programming, allowing our oldest students to work with younger students in a variety of ways. They will share their abilities, interests and skills with our younger students who look to our older students as models. Special interest groups, mentoring programs and parental involvement are all part of our plan. Through it all, the curriculum will emphasize messages of community, engagement and warmth—this year and in years to come.

SEATING REMINDERS

There are no assigned seats. The ushers are available to assist you in locating seats, if needed.

TASHLICH SERVICE

During the Rosh Hashanah ceremony of *Tashlich*, families gather at a stream or body of fresh water and cast crumbs into the water, symbolically ridding themselves of their accumulated sins. In our congregation, this ceremony has become a memorable experience attended by over one hundred congregants.

Tashlich takes place on the afternoon of the first day of Rosh Hashanah, Monday, September 10.

BYOB (Bring Your Own Bread) to the reservoir, 2 blocks south of the synagogue at Remington Road Pond. Our ceremony will begin at 5:30 PM.

SECURITY

All adults and children 13 and older (members and guests) will be required to show a ticket, issued in *their* name, to the security guards and/or ushers before entering or re-entering the building.

In addition to your ticket, you may be asked to show photo I.D. All bags and strollers are subject to examination prior to entering the building.

PARKING

Due to the volume of cars, we encourage congregants to walk to holiday services, if possible, or for families to carpool. Handicapped parking spaces are available on a first come, first served basis. Please see the security staff at the front door if you require assistance to park.

HIGH HOLIDAY CHAPEL MINYAN

Chapel minyan at Temple Beth Hillel-Beth El for High Holiday morning services and Kol Nidre is a traditional and participatory minyan in the more intimate setting of the Holocaust Memorial Chapel. The services feature opportunities to participate in many aspects of the service, including:

- Congregant-led *tefillot*
- Divrein T'filah: providing explanations and historical background on selected prayers
- Supplemental readings

All TBH-BE members are welcome to attend. A TBH-BE High Holiday Ticket is required for admission. While this service will not be geared specifically for families, children are welcome to the service *when accompanied by a parent*.

Minyan planners look forward to offers for participation in various parts of the service, individually or as a family. 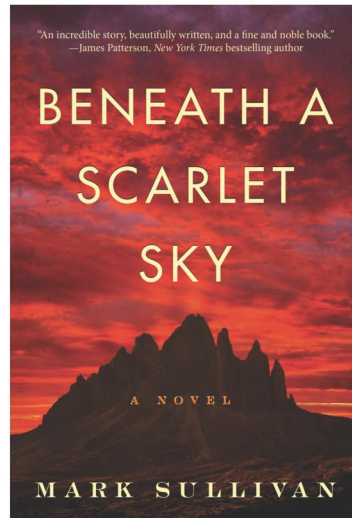

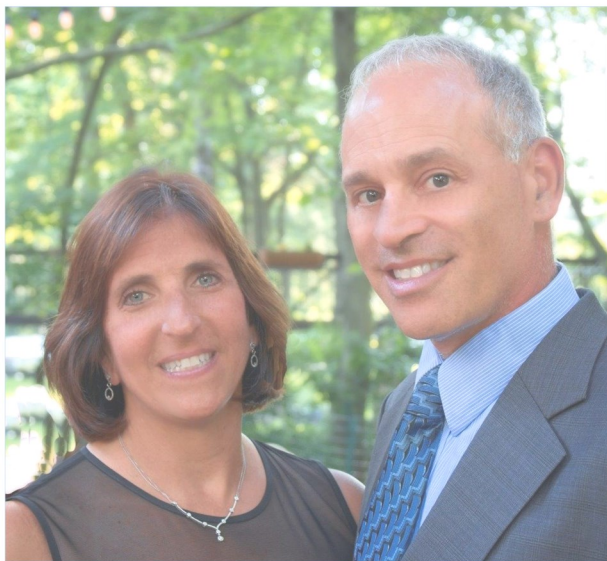
