Rabbi Michael Knopf

Let me start with the pitch: Our congregation is developing an innovative new program that has the potential to transform the

fabric of our community in an exciting, positive, and tangible way, and that would put us on the cutting-edge of Jewish life locally and nationally. And I am looking for your help in making it a success.

It's called "The Havurah Project." The Havurah Project is a community engagement program centered on the Shabbat dinner table and the relational power of small groups. Anyone who has ever been to or hosted a Shabbat meal knows that the Shabbat table is a place where similar and disparate individuals can gather to form meaningful connections with each other, create a larger sense of community, and deepen their relationships with Judaism.

With that in mind, The Havurah Project will connect small groups ("Havurot") of 8-10 congregants (who have similar interests and/ or demographics) with host families (who are demographically distinct from their guests) for monthly Shabbat dinners. Over the course of a year (beginning next fall), each Havurah will attend a Shabbat meal at each host home. round-robin style.

Participants will also be encouraged to participate in activities together like invitation-only Social Action/Tikkun Olam outings and special classes. They will also join for a Shabbat retreat at the end of the year, an offsite Shabbat experience of spirituality, community, education, and fun.

Here's how you can help make The Havurah Project a success:

1.) We need a small group of folks who would like to be part of a leadership team for the Havurah Project. This team would work directly with me on planning, organization, and implementation. If you are interested in pitching in, taking a leadership role and ensuring this program's success (and, indeed, the very success of our community) please email me at rabbi.knopf@bethelrichmond. org.

2.) For the launch year, we are focused on Havurot comprised of interfaith families, young adults and college students, and families with Jews by Choice. If you fit into one of those demographics and would like to be part of the initial phase of this innovative program by being part of a Havurah, please email me at rabbi.knopf@bethelrichmond.org.

3.)We are looking for members over the age of 50 to be part of our inaugural cohort of Shabbat dinner host families. If you fit into that demographic and would like to host a small group once per month for a Shabbat dinner, please email me at rabbi.knopf@ bethelrichmond.org. We will provide hosts Shabbat dinner "bootcamp" training sessions, "Shabbat Dinner Tool Kits" (which will include materials such as scripts, blessings, continued on page 2

Notes From Hazzan Marian Turk Director of Congregational Learning & Music Singing the Seder Order

There are people who have a habit of, first thing in the morning, taking a quiet moment of meditation to set their intentions for the day. This might involve some personal affirmations and saying out loud what one's goals are for the day. Of course, Judaism asks that we pray in the morning, and there is a set liturgy for that prayer. It can also be grounding and empowering to do a little self-affirmation and goal-setting each morning. But what if we were to sing these affirmations and goals? Can you imagine your spouse, child, parent, or roommate springing forth from bed each morning singing, "I am a strong, caring person, worthy of all the love in the universe!" Or perhaps, "Today I am going to greet everyone I meet with a warm smile!" Would this burst of song disturb you? Or would it inspire you to set your own positive goals for the day?

Is it silly to suggest that we sing out our personal goals for the day each morning? That's actually what we do each year at the Passover seder. At the beginning of the ritual—way before any matzah is broken or charoset consumed we sing the order of the seder, known as Kadesh Urchatz. I'm sure you are all very familiar with this ritual, and you may even have a particular attachment to a certain tune for the seder order. But have you ever thought about why we do this?

Kadesh Urchatz, a listing of the 15 steps of the seder, is a mnemonic rhyme whose exact authorship is unknown, but has been attributed to Rashi in 11th-century France. There are many reasons to say out loud, or outline, the events of the seder to come. First and most obviously, it gives some order and organization to the evening to come. Instead of just having one long seder ritual, when we enumerate the steps of it, it allows us to order, in our minds, and anticipate what lies ahead. This out-loud enumerating of the seder steps also allows us to mentally prepare ourselves for the journey from slavery to freedom—both physically and metaphorically—that our seder represents. Saying things out loud has power and represents a commitment—when we say the order of the seder out loud, we commit to undertaking the journey our Haggadah asks us to take.

But why sing Kadesh Urchatz? Why not just say it? Well, since Kadesh Urchatz is meant as a memory device, singing is very helpful. It's often easier to remember text that is sung rather than spoken. That's why you can still remember the words to your favorite song in high school many years later. It's also why we chant the Torah and other Biblical texts, instead of just saying them. But in addition to helping remember a text, singing can help us connect emotions to that text. The text of the Haggadah has developed in many different ways in different places around the world. But no matter where in the world you are, no matter what your Jewish community's customs are, every seder includes the 15 steps out-



lined in the Kadesh Urchatz. Singing those steps out loud confirms the unity of our seder ritual, the unity of the Jewish people, and the unity of our commitment to God. Hopefully it can help us give focus and purpose to our goal for seder night—experiencing the journey from slavery to freedom, as our ancestors did. And maybe it can help us bring the joy of freedom and the understanding of what it takes to go from servitude to freedom into our daily lives, infusing each day with gratitude and strength to meet the challenges that face us.

So, perhaps you won't start bursting forth from your bed each morning joyously singing your daily affirmations. But I do hope that you will bring a focused mind and a heart full of gratitude and song to your seder table.

I wish everyone a joyful Passover, and I look forward to seeing you at school and in synagogue!



There is a beautiful custom of immersing in a mikveh (ritual bath) before Passover, whether on the first day or all three days. Jews have for millennia immersed in mikva'ot in order to stand before God in a state of spiritual purity, and for many of us, this becomes an especially meaningful act close to Passover. Additionally, the immersion is symbolic of conversion. Just as a Jew by choice immerses in a mikveh and becomes a "new person," so, too, on Passover, we seek to become "new people" by facing our fears, receiving a new identity, experiencing transformation, and living our new-found freedom.

Since our congregation is so blessed to have a beautiful Mikveh, this year we are proud to announce that ours will be open for all to use on Wednesday, April 20, Thursday, April 21, and Friday, April 22. What is hametz? Wheat, oats, rye, barley, or spelt

became hametz (fermented) if they came in contact with water for 18 minutes after harvesting. The term hametz is also applied to dishes and utensils which have been in contact with hametz foods during the year.

The Torah prohibits the ownership of hametz during Pesach. Therefore, we arrange for mekhiratz hametz, the sale of the hametz to a non-Jew. This transfer is accomplished by appointing an agent, the rabbi, to handle the sale. It is a valid and legal transfer of ownership. At the end of the holiday, the agent arranges for the reversion of the ownership of the non-allowed hametz. If the ownership of the hametz was not transferred before the holiday, the use of the hametz is prohibited after the holiday as well.


