SCHOFIELD BARRACKS, Oahu -An early afternoon blaze at a training range here May 21 had some Marines from Heavy Helicopter Squadron 363, MCB Hawaii, working hot and heavy for more than three hours.


When the squadron received the call, five to seven acres had already burned, according to Capt. Bronchae Brown, the helicopter second pilot on the Marine helicopter.

"The federal firefighters were out there with their helicopter," said Brown. "They called us to give a hand." The squadron already had a fire buck-

et on standby due to range operations at K-Bay. The range was ready to close down, so it was no problem to provide assistance, according to Brown. However, the mission turned out to be just a bit tougher than they thought.

The fire was headed uphill. "So, we had to fly toward the mountain, then turn and fly back toward the fire," said Brown.

"Someday I will see before me a wounded Marine. I will think all kinds of things, but my training has prepared me for this moment. I really doubt I will be a hero, but to that Marine, I will be God. I will try until my life is taken to help save him."

As the Hospital Corps approaches its 100th anniversary June 17, Sailors and Marines alike will reflect on Pyle and the enlisted men and women of the past and present who dedicated their lives to saving the lives of others.

Although a bill establishing the Hospital Corps wasn't passed by Congress until 1898, the first direction to the organization of Navy medicine dates back to 1775 when Article 16 in the "Rules for

hurt men to be removed with their hammocks and bedding when the surgeon shall advise the same to be necessary. Some of the crew shall be appointed to attend and serve them and keep the place clean..."

From 1775 to 1814, the years covering America's first naval wars, few things changed in Naval medical organization and techniques. For instance, Congress approved an act March 2, 1799, which

Endangered Monk Seal visits K-Bay



An endangered Hawaiian Monk Seal was sighted on a beach near cottage 1612 May 18.

Apparently pregnant and looking for a place to give birth, the near 500-pound seal lounged for approximately half the day before disappearing back into the deep blue, according to Gordon K. Olayvar, an environmental specialist with the Environmental Department here.

"This base is perfect for her to have her pup, especially in areas around the cottages," said Olayvar. "Because of the base layout and how it operates, it's easy to find an area where she can have her pup and we can cord it off for safety."

There are only 12,000 to 15,000 Monk Seals in existence, according to Olayvar.

A Monk Seal gave birth on an MCB Hawaii beach in 1996. Environmental offi-

cials are unsure if its the same seal, but they should be able to verify her. identity once they are able to identify the bleach marks on her stomach,.

The National Marine Fishery monitored the pup until it was weaned which took approximately 54 days.

"The last time it was sighted, it was hanging out with some surfers up on the North Shore," said Olayvar. "It looked like it was headed toward Kaena Point. It was never seen again."

If the mother seal does return to give birth here, base residents need to keep a safe distance, Olayvar said.

"They will kill to protect their young," said Olayvar. "People need to maintain a distance of at least 100 feet."

Though the animals look large and don't seem to be able to cover a lot of ground quickly, Olayvar said they can travel a cou-See SEAL, A-5

ynamic duo wins

Two of MCB Hawaii's toughest crime fighters won high honors at the first DoD-wide Working Dog Competition at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas, April 24-26.

Sergeant Ruben Cadriel, a military policeman here, and his partner, a 3-year-old German Sheapard named Amber, took second place in obedience and fourth in narcodics detection in the event.

"Overall, we were one of the top five among more than 50 teams," said Cadriel. "Amber did an outstanding job and we learned a lot of different training techniques."

For the competition, dog trainers from the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Secret Service, and Germany's top dog handlers judge the dogs in skills such as narcodics and explosives detection, obedience and scouting, Cadriel said. They judged how fast the dogs work, the teamwork the dog and trainer possessed and the trainers' ability to understand the dogs' different behaviors.

This wasn't Amber's first time in the limelight. She's Hawaii's number one police dog for narcotics detection. "She knew what she was doing," Cadriel said. "The

contest is tough, and we trained real hard. Once it was gametime, Amber made it look easy."

BAC gives MWR open forum

Questions and concerns from base residents were voiced to MWR directors Tuesday at the Base Action Committee meeting in the Bachelor Officer Quarters conference room here.

Bill Lindsey, the MWR director, and various department heads, addressed concerns, including youth activities, the base pool and MCX prices and stock.

"If we aren't getting something right, talk to us," Lidsey said. "For instance, if it's the prices at the exchange you aren't

happy with, talk to our buyers and we ing in the base library." can try to get it right for you."

Morale, Welfare and Recreation currently employs 600 people. Forty-seven percent of them are base family members or off-duty Marines, Lindsey said. Last year, 92 percent of its revenues came from programs and functions. Last year was also the first time in four years MWR had increases in revenues.

"We've had a good year of facility improvement," Lindsey said. "We opened a new exchange, improved the base theater, added Firestone, opened the Mokapu Mall and installed air condition-

Lindsey also discussed the scope of programs offered by MWR and projects being coordinated presently which would further improve quality of life.

Among the new facilities planned for construction in the near future are a new Seven-day store, an improved temporary lodging facility and new gas lanes, Lindsey said.

For those who missed Tuesday's meeting, it will be televised on Channel 2 daily at 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. Next month's meeting is scheduled for June 30 at the Fairways All-Hands Club here.



CORPS BASE MARINE CAMP S.D. BUTLER, Okinawa, Japan – It all began when the country of "Pug," a small, mountainous region located in Southeast Asia, became engulfed in a civil war that threatened Americans and American interests there.

United Nations relief and charity organizations working in the area came under attack by a group calling themselves the New Peoples' Liberation Army. To curb the threat posed by the NPLA, the United States recently sent Marines into the village of "Tu Phat," the base of United Nations operations recently.

Upon locating the village, Marines were greeted by armed aggressors posted throughout the town. After reconnoitering the perimeter, a squad of Marines made its assault on positions. enemy Smoke grenades ignited, and the sound of small arms fire echoed through the village. Silhouettes

moved quickly in and out of the Marines graded the squads on buildings like apparitions in a haunted ghost town, seeking shelter in the shadows. When the smoke cleared, the positions once held by NPLA were in the hands of Marines.

This scenario was not realworld, but it served as the backdrop to one of many assaults and defenses Marines 1st Battalion, 3d Marines; 3d Battalion, 3d Marines; 2nd Battalion, 6th Marines; and 1st Battalion 7th Marines, conducted in the Military Operations in Urban Terrain facility and landing zones here. It was all part of the 1998 3d Marine Division Super Squad Competition held April 25 through May 1. The squad that won the competition was 1st Squad, 3d Platoon, from C Co., 1/3.

For six days, 13-man squads from each battalion passed through more than 70 checkpoints, conducting assaults, defenses, land navigation and first aid along the way. Evaluators and controllers from Division Schools and


their planning speed and aggressiveness.

"The purpose of the competition is to find out what Marines are lacking throughout the division and correct it at this level," said SSgt. Cecil Goodloe, a coordinator with Division Schools, 3d MarDiv. "The competition is healthy. It brings out the best in the Marines."

"We train like we fight hard," said Sgt. Michael Cannon, a squad leader from C Company, 1/3, after his squad conquered the MOUT facility. "We train for these situations all the time. Going for days with little or no sleep is nothing new to us. If you sleep in combat, you're going to get shot.

"This is what it's all about," he continued. "You get dirty. You don't eat right. You don't sleep. It's a lot of fun."

Winners from various Marine divisions will be guests of honor at the ceremonial Sunset Parade at Marine Barracks, 8th and I, in Washington D.C. in 4th August.



Anderson Hall helps Marines keep Semper Fit

The Semper Fit Program has extended into Anderson Hall, the main mess hall here, which prepared new items

to complement the program.

"We have several new items added to our menu," said mess hall manager MSgt. Cleophus Snow. "We've added a garden burger and a turkey burger that's 97 percent fat free."

"The snack line was the least healthy area in the chow hall," said MSgt. David Steward, the food service officer for Anderson Hall. "But adding the new burgers give Marines the opportunity to eat healthy when they're on the go."

The revamped menu was in the works for three

months. Major Gen. David Bice, the base's Marines in building themselves into better former commanding general, wanted the fighting machines.

Semper Fit Program to be in place in the mess hall by the time the new Semper Fit Center opened on base, said Steward.

"All this is because of MGen. Bice," Steward said. "It's MGen. Bice's guidance in Semper Fit, and creating awareness in fitness that has been our driving force.

"We've broken down our calorie cards to tell individual Marines what they're getting," Steward said. "Not every product is a healthy product," Steward admitted. That's the purpose the calorie cards serve. "You have to look at the calorie cards to see what you're getting."

The program is supported by many Marines, according to Snow.

"We get a whole lot of weightlifters in here, looking for healthy foods," Snow said.

Every mess hall has a basic menu they go by. But through MGen. Bice's efforts and the initiative of mess hall management, the Anderson Hall is well on its way to providing a better selection to aid

copied Article 16 word for word. Yet, there was still no job title or description for Navy enlisted medical personnel.

One unoffcial title, "loblolly boy," was a commonly used term for the enlisted medical personnel at the time. "Loblollies" attended to the sick and kept the medical area clean.

After increasing relevance of medical personnel brought about a new senior enlisted medical rate in 1841. The surgeon's steward was introduced, and by 1843, the Department of the Navy issued an order for stewards to be assigned to brigs and schooners.

In 1861, the war between the states brought about massive increases in personnel and changes in the way the Navy cared for its injured, including a new name for the loblolly boy. Loblollies were now nurses, and they assisted the surgeon's stewards on ships during the Civil War.

Navy medicine took another big step December 26, 1862, when the USS Red Rover was commissioned as the first vessel used soley as a hospital ship. The ship included 30 surgeons, male nurses and four nuns.

In the last two decades of the 1800's, naval medical establishments cried for reforms in the enlisted medical department. In his 1893 annual report Navy Surgeon General, J.R. Tryon, stressed the urgent need for an organized Hospital Corps.

He wasn't alone.

After the Army developed its own enlisted Hospital Corps in 1887, naval physicians pushed

for change and reform more than ever.

Thier wishes were finally granted in 1898 when, in light of the imminent danger of combat in the Spanish-American War, President William McKinley approved a bill establishing an organized Hospital Corps. From that day forth, enlisted medical personnel were known as "hospital corpsmen."


ple of feet on the ground in a matter of seconds and they're just like a torpedo in the water.

"No matter where the seal is in the water, swimmers should stay out and away," said Olayvar. "They could attack anywhere if they feel threatened."

"People have thought they were actually dead," said Lance Bookless, an environmental specialist with Environmental. "Or, they think they're dehydrated and they try to give them some water. They end up getting a face full of canines (teeth)."

If the mother does give birth on a beach here, she will remain in the area with her pup for up to 54 days, according to Olayvar.

No serious incidents were reported the last time a Monk Seal gave birth here. And, if the base community respects the seal's privacy, an addition to the Monk Seal family may come in peace once more.





Local rep confirms phone hoax

A recent hoax plagued some Oahu telephone customers, giving someone else free long distance calls.

"This scam is old," said Cpl. Daniel Quesada, a wireman with base telephone here. "It kind of spread around again."

According to an e-mail circulating through the internet, individuals identifying themselves as AT&T service technicians call random numbers and tell the answering parties they are conducting tests on their telephone lines.

In order to complete these tests, the answering party is supposed to press nine, zero, pound sign and then hang up. However, pressing this code grants billing access to whomever called that person. They can call anywhere in the world, courtesy of an unsuspecting person who answered the phone and complied with what they thought were service needs.

This may sound like a hoax, but AT&T and GTE claim it's not.

Local AT&T representative Bob Kawai, said this function is disabled. "Kaneohe Bay will not have an AT&T representative calling at any time to do these tests," stated Kawai. "If anyone is contacted for this reason, do not comply."

"There is a block on the phones now," Quesada said, "It shouldn't work even if the person presses the code."

Marines make friends on Big Island

"I think since the onset," Freeland said. "At least for the four years I've been here."



no one on this base with toenails uglier than mine.



So, while more than 50 volunteers raked in ticket after ticket, ensuring the carnival's success, there was nothing for the children to worry about but having loads of fun.


"I liked the dunk tank," said 10-year-old Mokapu student Thomas Salvetti. "And, I liked the bungee run because I got to see bungee jumping on television."
