

Divvy Men, Greek 'Raiders' Take' Crete For King Paul

WITH THE U. S. SIXTH FLEET, WITH THE U. S. STATH FILENT (by mail)—As King Paul and high ranking NATO officials looked on, United States Marines and Greek Raiders recently combined to wrest the sun-scorched rock of Crete from a mythical enemy.

Expressing his delight with the whole operation, the Greek monarch said, "I am amazed at the elocklike precision used by the Marines in landing on the beach."

A platoon of Marines made a midnight rubber boat landing on a tiny offshore island to protect the flanks of the combined landing force that stormed Akrotire penin-sula shortly after dawn.

The first of several operations planned by the NATO command, the Crete landing was simplified by use of trained interpreters on both sides.

Air cover was provided by planes from the Sixth Fleet earriers and naval gunfire on the beach was simulated by Royal Hellenic Navy and Sixth Fleet warships.







Registration for the camp kind-ergarten will be held Monday and Tuesday from 9 to 11 a.m. and from 2 to 4 p.m. at the Camp School. School. Opens Sept 8 Kindergarten will re-open Sep-tember 8 with enrollment limited to 180. Children enrolled after the initial 180 will be placed on a waiting list for placement as va-

All children, who are depend-ents of military personnel at-tached to Camp Lejeune resid-ing on or off the reservation and who will be five years old by January 1, 1953, are eligible to attend the PTA-sponsored kind-ergarten. Prior to enrollment, a physical examination will be required and prescribed inoculations will be necessary, states camp memoran-dum 440-52. **Tuition**

necessary, states camp methodal-dum 440-52. To help meet the expenses of the kindergarten a \$7 monthly tui-tion per child will be charged pri-vates through staff sergeants. \$8 for technical sergeants through first lieutenants, and \$9 for captain and above. Milk will be provided to students for six cents a carton or 30 cents a week paid to the class teacher at the beginning of each week.
