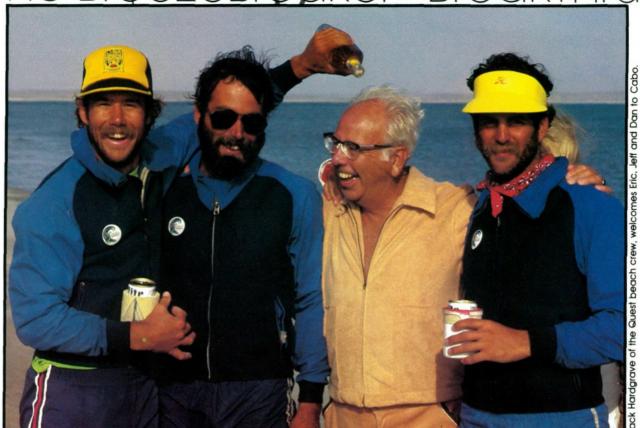

CANADIAN NATIONALS

I am writing in reference to an article on the 1980 Canadian Hobie Cat Championships, which appeared in the November/December 1980 issue of the HOT LINE, pg. 23.

The article starts with: "The First Annual Canadian National Championships ". In response to were a great success. that, I would like to tell the readers about the history of the Canadian Nationals.

The FIRST Canadian Nationals were held in 1975 at Sherkston Beach with two U.S. sailors claiming the top honours. In 1976 and 1977 the Nationals were held in Orillia. The 1978 Nationals were in Cobourg and the 1979 Nationals moved back to Orillia.

All of the above events were sanctioned by the Hobie Cat Association and organized by the Ontario Hobie Cat Association (O.H.C.A.). Until 1979, the O.H.C.A. was the only organized body above a fleet level in Canada. Then by the initiative of the sailors in the O.H.C.A. steps were taken to form a Canadian Association (C.H.C.A.). This organization was formed and had its First Annual/Inaugural meeting during the 1979 Canadian Nationals. Doug Campbell, President of Hobie Cat, was present at the inauguration, along with the Executive Director of H.C.A., Mr. Sandy Banks. They were very helpful and supportive in the early stages of forming the C.H.C.A. and they continue to work with the C.H.C.A. to date.

The 1980 Canadian Nationals held in Vancouver were, therefore, the 6th Nationals and not the 1st as reported in the article.

It takes a great deal of effort and time to organize any regatta and the people who worked on the five Nationals prior to 1980 deserve the credit for their work done for Hobie Cat sailors in Canada. The least we can do is to acknowledge it by respecting the Annual events as they occur.

The 1981 Canadian Nationals will be the 7th Annual . . . and will again be organized by the O.H.C.A. and with such guests as D. Campbell and S. Banks, we hope to make it a great event for everybody attending. The date? August 27-30, 1981 LAGOON CITY - Ontario.

I would like to comment on a paragraph that appeared in Miller and Berman's Multi Hull Racing: The Hobie Cats, (1976 edition); last paragraph on page 66 and first paragraph on page 67 where it states, "Boats with experienced male crews working the mainsheet on every puff always do better in gusty going than boats with female crews or unusually weak male ones." On page 67 it states. "Letting the mainsheet off as the puff hits, then pulling it right back in as the gust passes takes no talent, just strength. . . girls just can't do it. Miller and Berman also said they feel girls as crews are good only for two things - complaining and pulling the tail of the mainsheet back in when it falls overboard."



I disagree completely with them, I've been sailing for two years already first on a Hobie 14' and now on a Hobie 16' as a skipper with a male crew. I am 17 years-old and weigh 130 pounds and am both a good skipper and crew on a Hobie 16'. I am a good challenge towards my fellow male skippers on 16s. I recently came in second place, only three points behind our division champion. I am the only female skipper in the area, I have racked up 10 trophies, mostly in points regattas, which plainly shows you that this female is capable of something other than complaining and picking up the tail end of the mainsheet! 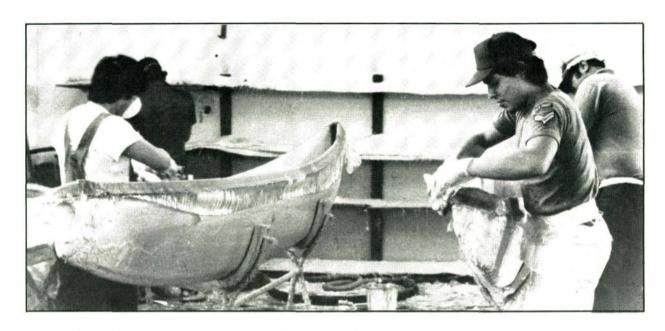

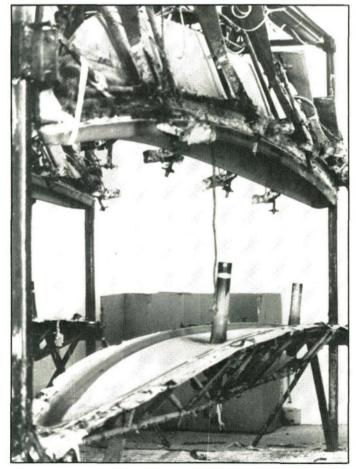

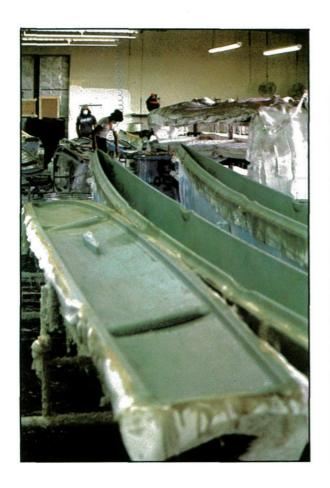


An Inside Look at the Manufacturing Process

nly a handful of curious Hobie enthusiasts have had the opportunity to visit the actual heart of the Hobie operation. The birthplace of one of the hottest sailing boats to date is divided between two facilities in Southern California.

Founder, Hobie Alter, along with Phil Edwards, co-designer of the Hobie 18, use the San Juan Capistrano plant as home base. This is where the research and design begins. Production of the hulls, decks, and daggerboards takes place across the street from research and design. A small Quonset hut once housed what now takes place in 5 mold shops; each one many times larger than the original location. Mind and hand transform gelcoat, fiberglass, and foam into low drag hulls in this part of the factory.

Production starts with the gelcoat finish sprayed into the hull mold, followed by layers of resin saturated fiberglass (top). After the resin cures, the finished hull is mated with the deck on the glue jig (left).







Hobie 18 hulls and deck await side-by-side to be trimmed and taken to the glue jig (above left). After the hulls are completed (above right) at the San Juan Capistrano plant, they are trucked 30 miles south to the Oceanside facility. On arrival the hulls go to the patch department (left) for inspection and completion of miscellaneous details.



Each boat is completely assembled at the plant. Cross-bars are drilled to fit, and the hardware is mounted.



Hundreds of yards of colorful cloth pass through the sail loft at Hobie Cat each day. Cutters, hemmers, and seamers transform cloth into shapely sails.

The actual process of laying-up a hull begins in a mold, where pre-cut foam blanks are layered with fiberglass cloth and resin. A vacuum bag is placed around the entire mold, making a uniform bond of fiberglass and foam. Edges are rounded and the excess trimmed. A second lay-up of fiberglass and resin is added. Quality control then checks for any problems. Next the deck and hull are glued together on giant glue jigs. At this point the hull is removed from the mold. Finished edges are cleaned, finalizing the hull procedures.

The completed hulls and daggerboards are trucked 30 miles south to the main facility in Oceanside. Here the boats are assembled. The hulls are first taken to the patch department, where blemishes on the hull's surface are removed. After quality control approves the hulls again, they are moved into the assembly area to meet their counterparts. The fit department mounts

the hardware and checks for faults in the vacuuming process.

Before the hardware reaches the assembly stage it is worked on in the metal shop. 80% of the metal hardware is fabricated at Hobie Cat. The metal

shop performs important functions such as: assembling masts; cutting and swedging all the wires; mounting front and side crossbars with hardware; machining corner castings; assembling booms; fabricating stern plates and bow plates; attaching tips to the battens; fitting the rudder castings to the rudders; and assembling of tiller crossbars.

A second operation in the metal shop is the utilities. The people who work in this department are responsible for the sub-assembly of parts that are later attached to the larger pieces in the metal shop. These parts also end up in rig kits, on the sails, or packaged and sold as spare parts.

From the metal shop the hardware is moved to the assembly and fit area. Members of the assembly and fit team apply the hull striping and Hobie logos. They also insert the foam plugs into the pylons, along with the pylon bolts and breather tubes. The framing crew then totally assembles the boat, assuring that the crossbars have the proper fit. The U.S. patent stickers are placed on the boats before the boats are disassembled, boxed, and shipped off to one of the dealers.

CURIOUS COMRADERIE



A Casual Daysail Turns Into An Unexpected Romp With a Group of the Largest Mammals on the Planet

hen I felt the fine saltwater mist against my face I was afraid to look forward. I was afraid they had come back and terror began to overcome all my senses.

I saw the dorsal fin between the hulls of my Hobie 16 and followed the saltwater mist to its source — the breathing hole of a large killer whale.

That Saturday began very typically for a new Hobie sailor. I got up early, woke my roommate, George McLain, hooked the boat to my truck and headed for the beach. We planned to meet Rich Cullen and Marc Reynolds at La Jolla Shores for a day of fun sailing on Rich's boat. Even though it was late December, the weather was fantastic, visibility unlimited with a brisk wind; everything indicated a day of total relaxation.

We were aware that the whales were swimming south but the thought of actually seeing one close was remote. Both boats were rigged and ready to sail fairly early. We could only hope the breeze held.

And hold it did, for more than an hour and then it stopped. Both boats were a few miles offshore separated by several hundred yards. The ocean appeared to slowly turn into an expansive pane of glass without a ripple in sight.

George and I decided to make the most of our situation and opened our first beer. Our solitude was to be very short. I had barely swallowed a good gulp when I heard the gushing

The California Gray had surfaced close enough to my Hobie that I could have touched her. I'm sure she was oblivious to our existence. Her fluke came out of the water and she disappeared as quickly as she had come. Once again she would surface; midway between Rich's and my boats.

Slowly the wind began to blow. By then the Gray was close to a mile south. The thought of overtaking her and getting another look was tempting. We decided to respect her

We tacked north and headed further out. It was only a matter of minutes before we spotted the spouts. Distance made it difficult to count accurately, but it looked like three or

The next time they surfaced Rich and Marc were directly in our line of vision. Rich immediately tacked his boat away and yelled in our direction. I did not understand. The reason soon became apparent. The largest dorsal fin was more than four feet out of the water. Six killer whales surrounded my Hobie, a small Catamaran 16 feet in length. Three were to starboard (right), two at the stern, and one on port (left). The largest was considerably larger than my boat.

Never before had I experienced panic as my foremost emotion. I looked at George; if his expression was a mirror of mine I knew we were in trouble. Without a word being spoken, slowly we began to tack the boat.

The show at Sea World is more spectacular but not as effective as the action the killers took against our tack. Two from the starboard side swam in front of the bow; with a speed I did not know possible. Now it was the whales who had control of the boat because I did not want to risk a direct hit. The pod moved as a unit as I was forced to tack from a northwesterly to a south by southwest heading.

La Jolla Shores was to our stern, La Jolla Cove off the port hull — soon both disappeared. Between La Jolla Cove and Bird Rock the killers controlled my actions. Suddenly, like the big Gray, they were gone!

It had been nearly one-half hour since George and I had spoken and there was no need to now. We jibbed and headed toward shore.

Several minutes passed before anything was said. As we discussed what happened we realized the killers, with their spectacular black and white markings, had been close enough to touch! Yet we did not, nor did any of the huge mammals touch us or my boat.

We began to relax and prayed the wind would continue until we reached shore. But then the saltwater mist hit my face! The dorsal fin, this time, was directly between the hulls. My jib was being laundered as the massive animal expelled air from its lungs. Again, my small catamaran was being tacked by some of the largest creatures on the planet.

As I watched them, the panic subsided and a pleasant feeling filled my whole being. Again they disappeared as rapidly as they had reappeared. They never touched the boat. I do not know to this day why they swam with me as they did. Was it to prove they were more powerful than man; I think not!

I like to think it was a curious camaraderie.

YOUR FIRST HOBIE CAT REGATTA

Answers to the Most Frequently Asked questions of Regatta Organizers, Registration Committees, and The Hobie Class Association

Going to your first regatta can be an exciting adventure, especially if you come prepared. Each year, many new Hobie sailors discover how much fun racing is. Join a fleet and find out what Hobie Cat racing is all about!

What are the advantages of pre-registering for a regatta?

Have you ever been to a regatta when they run out of t-shirts in your size? Pre-registering helps alleviate this problem. By the number of pre-registrations, organizational committees are able to order t-shirts, goodies, beer, and food with a good idea of the number of people that will attend the event.

When should I arrive at a regatta?

Plan on arriving at the regatta with enough time to register, check-out your boat, and make the necessary tuning adjustments. After the boat is rigged and ready to race, go for a practice sail. This will give you a feel for the area.

When do I register and get my goodies?

Check in at the registration desk the morning of the regatta. Some fleets may have registration the day before if it is a large regatta. If you didn't pre-register you can do so then. And if you are pre-registered, check in with the desk and pick up any information and goodies that are handed out.

Fill out the registration card completely. The sail number and the class you are sailing in is the most important information on the card. You'll also be asked what your weight is. This is the combined weight of the skipper and crew.

What equipment should I take to a regatta?

Do you have more than one Hobie? When packing up for the regatta be sure to pick up the right sail. It's hard to sail a 16' with a 14' sail. Remember your trapeze harness, tiller extension, extra teflon chips for the mast base, life jacket, wet suit, tools, sailing gloves, and extra parts.

What other things do I need to know?

Many people are extremely excited when they get to the regatta site, and unload their boat without looking up. The most important thing to watch for when loading or unloading your boat is overhead wires. OVERHEAD WIRES CAN BE FATAL.

Will I have a problem not knowing much about racing?

The Hobie Class Association has set up regattas so that beginning racers sail against other novice sailors. Much of the information you need to know such as, when your class starts, what the flags mean, and how to tell what course to sail, is discussed at the skippers meeting. If something is missed that you don't know, be sure to ask.

What is the novice fleet?

The novice fleet is for the new Hobie 14 and 16 sailor who has sailed in two major regattas or less. After that you move into C fleet.

PREDICTING THE WIND

Understanding the basic principles of wind prediction can assist the racer in planning which way to sail a course.

The wind is never constant and these changes in the direction and/or velocity frequently affect the outcome of a race. In order to develop a plan of how to sail a particular leg of the course, it is important to understand some basic principles of predicting the wind.

GENERAL PRINCIPLES

Wind is the result of pressure differences in the atmosphere, which is caused by the heating and cooling of air. These differences tend to form general patterns. On a global scale for example, these patterns are responsible for the heat transfer from the equator to the polar regions, which moderates the temperature extremes in these regions. These general patterns are responsible for what are called prevailing winds.

An additional influence on the wind, is the Coriolis Force, named after G.G. DeCoriolis, a French mathematician. The Coriolis Force is due to the different rotational velocities of the earth at various latitudes. This force causes any object moving through the atmosphere (including the wind) to be deflected to the right in the Northern Hemisphere (all objects are deflected to the left in the Southern Hemisphere).

Using these two basic principles and combining them with the weather system patterns and local effects, you can start to analyze why the wind does change.

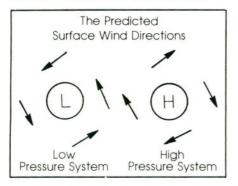
WEATHER SYSTEM WINDS

One of the primary components of the wind is the wind caused by the weather system that dominates a particular area. The weather system winds are influenced primarily by areas of high or low pressure and fronts. The secret to forecasting these winds is found on a weather map.

The predominate features illustrated on these maps is the pressure differences (the cause of wind), which are shown by the isobars (lines of equal pressure) and the center of each high and low pressure cell.

AREAS OF HIGH AND LOW PRESSURE

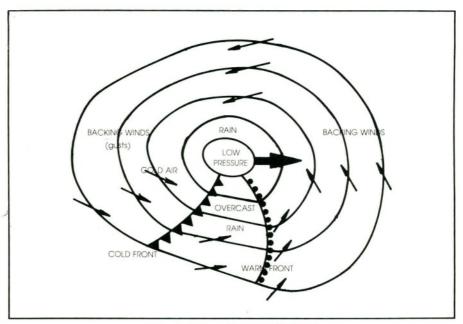
The isobars which enclose each high and low pressure area can be used to determine the strength and direction of the weather system wind. The strength of the wind can be determined by spacing between the isobars. Generally, the closer the isobars, the stronger the wind. The direction of the wind can also be determined from the weather map by using the following rule: Wind flows clockwise around a high pressure cell, and counterclockwise around a low pressure cell. Because the readings on the weather map are taken at approximately 2,000 feet, a deflection occurs due to the Coriolis Force. This deflection appears to us on the surface as a counterclockwise shift (a backing). The following illustration shows the effect of the Coriolis Force on the wind flow around a high and low pressure area.



To predict the direction of the wind using a weather map, simply determine your relative position to the appropriate weather system cell. In addition, you can verify if your predicted wind direction is accurate by examining a detailed weather map, which indicates the actual wind directions for each weather station and through personal observation.

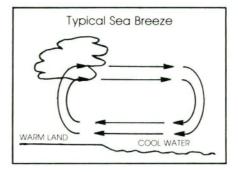
WARM AND COLD FRONTS

The passage of fronts generally results in dramatic changes in the wind. These fronts are simply a boundary between different air masses associated with a low pressure system. When a mass of warm air replaces a mass of cold air it is referred to as a warm front. When a mass of cold air replaces a mass of warm air it is called a cold front. The following figure shows the "ideal" model for a low pressure system.



A Typical Low Pressure System

The preceding figure was only one phase of the life cycle of a frontal system. The system is formed when two masses of air with different temperatures come in contact with each other to form cold and warm fronts. Since the trailing cold fronts move at a faster pace than the leading warm front, the cold front eventually overtakes the warm front. The combining of a warm and cold front is called an occlusion.

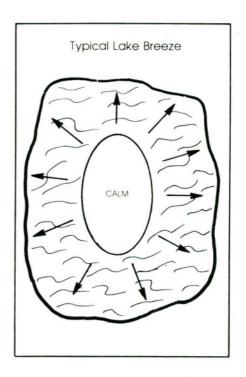


LOCAL EFFECTS

Unfortunately, the wind cannot usually be predicted solely on the basis of the weather systems winds. There are many local factors that affect the wind.

THERMALS

Because the land both cools and heats faster than water, a temperature difference sometimes exists, producing wind. The wind can be a sea breeze, which is caused by the sun heating the land, producing an onshore wind; or a land breeze, which flows offshore at night as the land cools. The more important of these two winds is the sea breeze because it is stronger and occurs during the day when most races are held. Clear skies over the lake (or ocean) and cumulus clouds over the land are important clues that a thermal wind is present. The following two diagrams are examples of typical thermal winds.

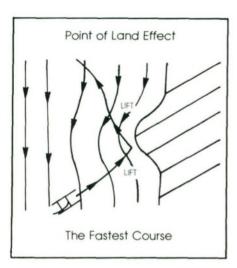


LAND EFFECTS

Since the wind always goes the easiest way, it allows special features in the land or on the shore to influence it.

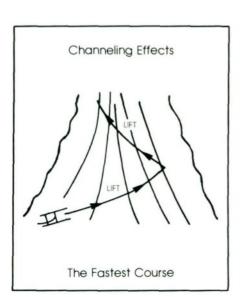
POINTS OF LAND

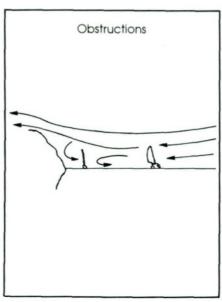
Because the wind tries to follow the shore a point of land will influence the direction of the wind by producing a lift on the windward side as shown in the following diagram.



CHANNELING

In addition, a gradual change in the geography can change the direction of the wind.





GUSTS

Sometimes the wind is quite unstable and has definite peaks and lulls. When a gust hits the wind not only increases, it also changes direction (a fact that is often overlooked in using your every effort to keep the boat upright). An even more surprising fact is that the directional change can be predicted. During a gust the wind veers in a clockwise direction, giving the starboard tack boat a lift.

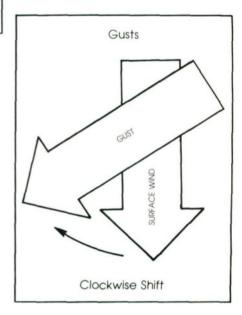

The third important influence the land has on the wind involves obstructions. As a general rule, the wind will be stronger in areas without such obstructions, such as a flat low shoreline. When there are obstructions such as buildings, trees, or hills the wind lifts above or around them, causing turbulence near the obstruction. The following example shows the effect an obstruction can have on the wind.



CONCLUSION

Understanding how the wind changes and being able to take advantage of this knowledge can be an important advantage to the racing sailor. The following summary should be helpful in developing your racing strategy.

- If the wind is changing in a cyclic manner, tack when headed and stay on the lifted tack.
- If the wind is changing in a persistent manner, sail towards the new wind.
- The determination as to whether a wind change is cyclic or persistent is relative to the length of the race or even a leg of the race.
- Remember to use the local influences of the wind to your maximum benefit.



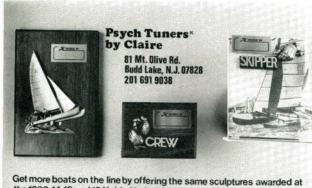

and keeping to its past traditions.

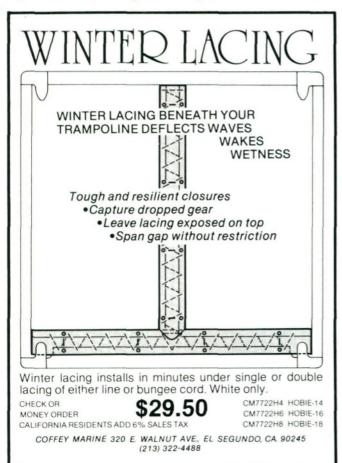

The Second Annual Hobie Cat Fleet 5 Fun Day/Superstock Race was held in September. The event was again "Blessed" by light winds and nearly required a superstocked Hobie to keep moving.

The combined (3) sail numbers were so long (5161-35089-179) that it took two lines on the form to register.

Other entrants had spinnakers, ginnies, windsurfer sails, umbrellas, paddles, and even a hand-cranked propeller. The rule said the boat must be over-powered, by wind or muscle.

Most of the boats paddled to the start, and half way around the course before the breeze increased to sailing force.

It is recommended that this event only be held in light winds, and that crews take care not to overstress the stock boat and rigging. Some type of quick-release mechanism should be used for returning (detuning) to the stock Hobie rig if the winds should increase.

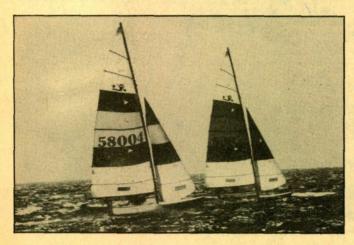

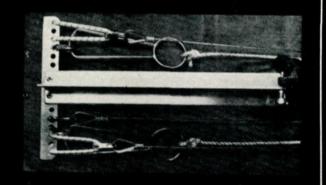

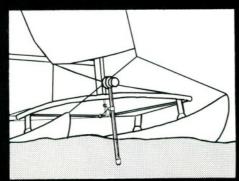

DSE PYLONS ON HOBIE

Hobie 14's with a loose pylon/casting fit can easily be tightened by removing the pylon bolts and redrilling the castings and pylons to accept Hobie 16 bolts.

Older boats may be loose due to the gradual elongation of the holes through the years.

OBIE 18 RUDDER ASSEMBLY

It is strongly recommended to regularly lubricate the entire Hobie 18 rudder locking mechanism as well as replace any worn parts. This keeps the "kick-up" feature operating easily. Failure to do this can cause the rudder to resist kicking up when necessary and may cause damage to the transom or rudder casting.

Tip: The creaking sound that you get when adjusting the Hobie 18 rudder tensioning screw can be eliminated by cutting down a teflon mast chip, and inserting it between the spring and the screw.

HOBIE FISHING · TEXAS STYLE

nder very certain conditions, we take advantage of the Hobie 16s breathtaking speed and sinewy grace, to sail out and fish among the schools of King mackerel ranging in the Gulf of Mexico. We select only a perfect summer day when Padre Island is basking under a stable high-pressure weather dome, when steady summer winds move in from the Gulf to rise above the scorching South Texas cotton fields

After clearing the swimmers and the breaking groundswells, we set rudders and sails, continuing our outward course. Offshore the water is gulf-green and partly clear, with visible micro-life mixed with the sand and silt from the rivers. With the sun overhead, we see our shadows punching down 10 to 15 feet below the surface.

Further out the water clears. A school of leg-size Bonita swim silently below the hulls. We keep looking across the waves, but nothing is different yet. When a flock of gulls in the distance looks interesting, we change course and reach for the action. As we approach, the gulls are feeding on a school of fish that are jumping and breaking the surface. Unwinding the trolling lines from around the siderails of the

trampoline, we cast the lures between the wakes following the rudders. Our method is to slice and tack, time and again through the school with lines and lures trailing.

The trolling tackle consists of closed swivel loops of line tied around the rear lacing. Swivel barrels are used to isolate both ends of the 75 foot trolling lines. The trolling line is made from parachute cord. Anything lighter would not remain straight during the rapid stretch/slack cycles caused by the motions of the trolling spoon. A normal handline would quickly twist and stretch, while monofilament line would be difficult to pull in by hand.

An arm's length leader with figure eight knots is tied on the end of each trolling line, behind the rear swivel. The leader is 80lb. test plastic coated, stainless steel, and is tied to another swivel which is built into the front of the spoon. A size 3 1/2 Huntington Drone trolling spoon is used the most. We have also had many good days with lead headed feather jigs, as well as other types of spoons. The feather jigs are not as active as the spoons, and are less likely to tangle when trolling double lines.

Although the 75 foot line length provides a lot of stretch, we also tie a three foot loop in the trolling line at the back of the trampoline, closed with a foot long shock cord. When a fish hooks up, the loop goes straight and the shock-cord stretches. We sheet-out and point into the wind to stabilize the boat and make room for elbowing in the handline. Once the fish is tired enough to stay between the rudders, it's pulled over the rear crossbar.

Even a Hobie 16 can't go in every direction, so we tack and reach often to equal the rapid windward course of the school and its predatory flock. We sail with more determination and skill than in any regatta.

As the day grows late, we pull in what is left of our trolling lines, then take a screaming reach back home. The bows shear through the waves, delivering sheets of brine high onto the sails. Because of our speed, a flying fish is startled. Our speed is as great as his as he leads us over the wave crest.

Onshore again, the catch of the day is prepared for our favorite fish stew, enjoyed along with the memories of blue skies, the rolling gulf, and jumping fish.

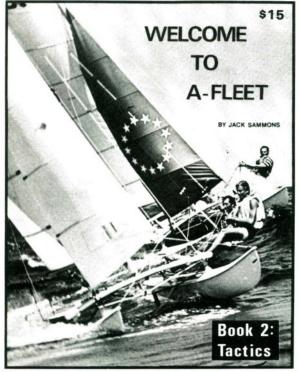

BOB CURRY

1980 Hobie 14 U.S. National Champion Tampa, Florida

ob Curry was excited weeks before the start of the 1980 Hobie 14 Nationals. He arrived early with his blue Hobie 14, practicing starts on the blue flag during the Women's Nationals, anticipating his turn the following week.

His constant training for the past three years resulted in Curry jubilantly accepting his first place trophy, at the 14 Nationals held in St. Petes Beach, Florida, He began sailing in 1976. After sailing a Laser for about 3 months, Curry borrowed a neighbor's 14' and went out for his first try. With dolphins swimming alongside, he was convinced that this was the experience he'd been looking for. Two weeks later he bought his first boat, "From the first time I saw an advertisement. I had wanted a Hobie Cat, and I knew that someday I would

For awhile, Curry enjoyed his boat with no intention of getting into racing. "I sailed for a year, then I got the bug," explained Curry, "I entered my first race and got a third place trophy; that got me stoked and I wanted more." He then raced in the 1977 Midwinters East, decided that B fleet wasn't tough enough and took a fifth in an A fleet race a few weeks later.

get one," explained Curry.

By the time the rough and windy 1978 14 Nationals in Virginia Beach came along, Curry was shooting for the top ten and ended up in third place. He said, "I came home really excited and started sailing just about everyday." He was shooting for that 14 Nationals title.

The next year at the 14 Nationals in Lake Tahoe, Nevada, he was ready to win it all. But it took only one disastrous wind shift on the last day and Curry finished third overall again. For 2 years in a row he had gotten close. "I was bound and determined to win it the next year, especially when it was going to be in St. Pete, right in my own backyard," said Curry.

For the next year Curry never let his goal out of sight. He spent his sunrise service on Easter morning in a practice race. He got his fellow skippers together for special training days and more practice races. About mid-season last year though, he was getting a little worn out and decided to change his focus and began sailing for fun. He sailed constantly. It is rare that any Hobie racer puts as much into training as Curry; he

enjoys competition and always sets some kind of goal for himself. Other than winning the Nationals, his goal last year was to win every point regatta in his division. He

won all but two.

Curry's key to competition is based on the psychology of winning. He says, "Making the boat go has to do with not letting my mind wander. I try to do my best at a Nationals and keep cool. I sail a lot of different 14s so I come in with a confidence that won't break down. I think the psychology of it is important, so that the little things don't get you down; basically see the wind and shift with it." During Curry's worst race at St. Pete, he was still smiling and laughing as he sailed in for his 24th place finish.

Currently living in Tampa, Florida, at 23 years old Curry has joined the Air Force and is looking forward to studying meterology. As he says, it's "To help my sailing." He hopes to continue his sailing career and eventually sail in the Olympics and in the Little Americas Cup in International C Class Cats.

Whether or not there is much sailing in Curry's near future may depend on the Air Force, particularly his commanding officer. But he doesn't seem worried about that. Reflecting instead on his recent win, Curry just smiled, and exclaimed, "I haven't come down from cloud nine yet!"

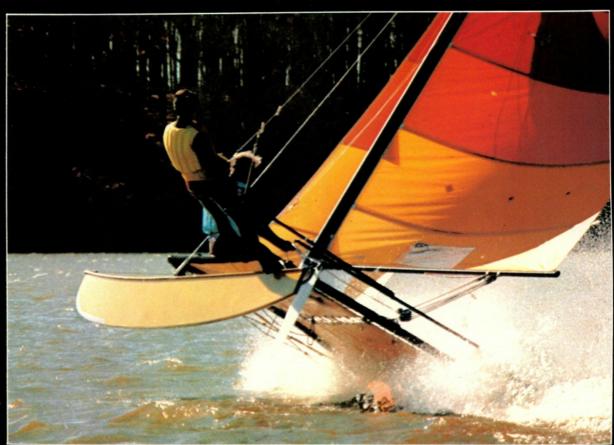

The most colorful operation is the sail loft. The personality of each boat depends on the sail and its number. Ideally one size sail and one color pattern are worked on each day. The panels of sailcloth are cut on long tables, with the numbers adhered before going to the hemmers. The hemmers sew the leech edge. The sail takes its first shape after the panels are sewn together. Careful attention to each step is vital to having uniform sails with good shapes. Grommets, headplates, and other last details are added before each sail is hoisted and inspected.

Next door to the sail loft is the tramp room. Here the trampolines are cut, edges melted together, and grommets inserted

The last area of production is the rig kit department. Here, Rig kits are packaged for each new boat, as well as numerous products that the Customer Service Department provides.

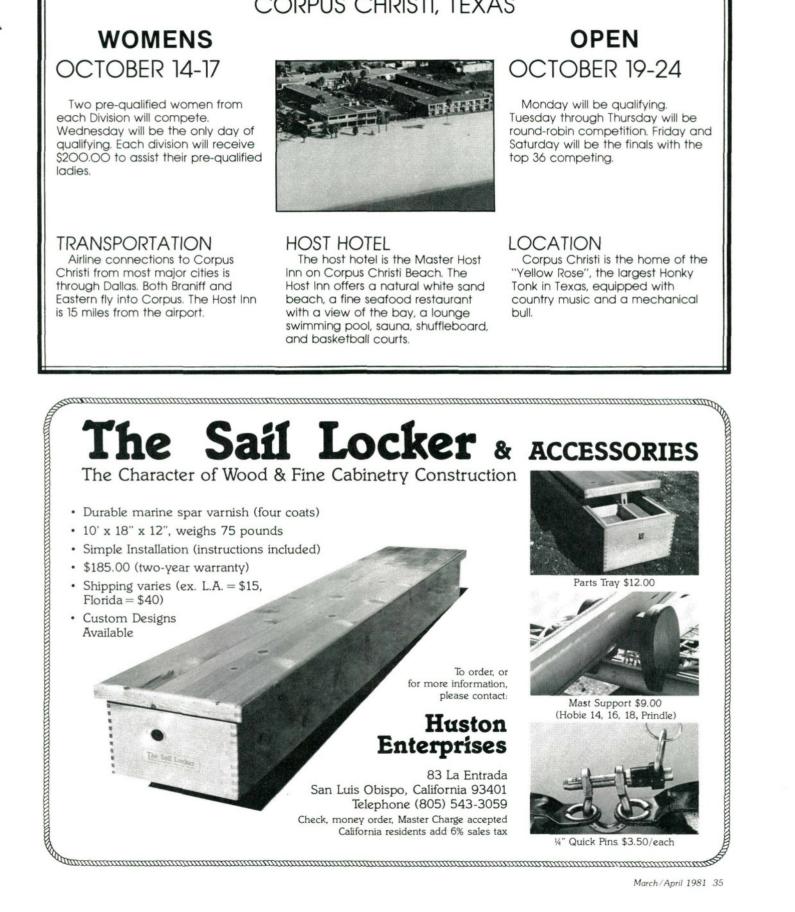

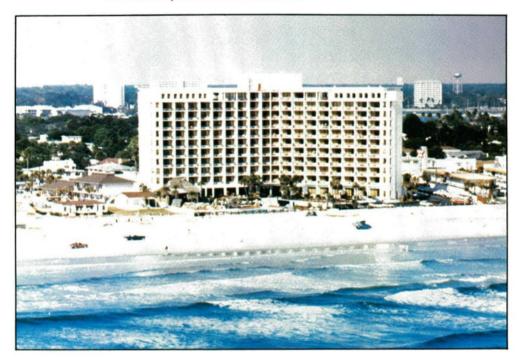

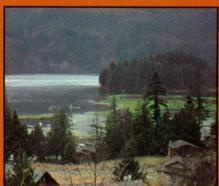
SUDDEN VALLEY, WASHINGTON SEPTEMBER 7-12, 1981

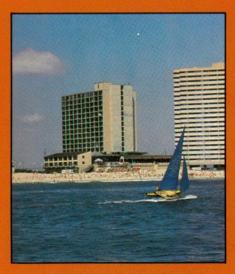

THE RACES

Qualifying races will be held on Sunday and Monday with the round-robin series Tuesday through Thursday, Friday and Saturday will be the finals. All races will be sailed on Hobie Class Association supplied boats.

TRANSPORTATION

Ocean City is about three hour's drive from Washington D.C. or Baltimore. Connections through most major east coast cities to Salisbury airport is available on Alleghany or US Air. Complimentary limousine service will take you to and from the Fontainebleau from the Salisbury airport.



HOST HOTEL

LOCATION

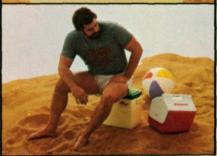
