You must pre-register at the Mesquite Recreation Center & pick up your class materials, then register online with NDOW. Your Today's Hunter Workbook must be 100% complete prior to attending class. The deadline to register is Saturday, April 1, 2023. Space is limited to 20 students maximum.




FROM THE MAYOR Mesquite can't be defined as just a 'sleepy little retitement community'

often look to social media to get a feel for what people are thinking and what's being discussed in the community. I have noticed that many

of the comments are by people who either just moved here, or are recent transplants, mostly from large cities. Yes, Mesquite



people are used to. Yes, we have what seems to some, as too many Mexican restaurants, and too many car washes. Yes, we don't have big box stores, with the exception of Walmart.

I also hear that we are strictly a retirement community and nothing else. I don't feel that way, and I'll explain why.

Retirement communities are defined as groups of housing units restricted to those over a certain age, often 55 or 62. These housing units can be single-family homes, duplexes, mobile homes, townhouses or condos.

Yes, Mesquite has retirement communities like Sun City, which is a stand alone community, and a few other smaller developments mixed in various places in the city.

The rest of the city, which amounts to about 20,000 residents are a mixture of all ages. To further my comments, Dictionary.com gives a simple definition of a retirement community: A group of houses in a suburban area, or a town designated primarily for retired persons.

So what are we?

I did a little research and came up with these statistics from our most recent census.

Twenty percent of our local population is under 18, and 49 percent is over 65, leaving 31 percent between 18 and 65.

We have three public schools, and one private school in the city. The children that attend these schools have parents, for the most part in their 20s and 30s, Yes, we have more than the average over 65, but this does not make us a retirement community.

I also have had a few complaints about how many young people we have on the weekends for youth sports.

It's true. We do, often thousands along with their parents. We welcome them. They support our hotels, eating establishments and more. They bring us needed tax dollars.

Prior to COVID, we had over a million visitors a year. Roof tops do not generate the needed tax dollars needed to provide the services to the community that we have. We need businesses and visitors that spend money. I want this to be a vibrant city, not just a place to retire and pass on.

One of the four pillars that are giving us our vision of Mesquite is sports tourism, along with diversity, and economic development necessary to give us the tax dollars needed to properly run our city.

So, again, I'll ask, what are we?

Given what I said here, I'll let you decide, just don't pigeonhole us. I believe we are a little bit of every thing. That's what makes Mesquite such a great place to grow-up, work, and yes, retire when the time comes. Al LItman is mayor of the city of



Virgin Valley flag football pulls off a miracle

The Virgin Valley High School flag football team was driving down the field trailing by six points with less than 20 seconds left against the Moapa Valley Pirates in the 2023 Nevada Interscholastic Activities Association Class 3A State Championship game at Las Vegas Raiders Headquarters in Henderson on Feb. 18.

The Bulldogs, who also trailed 20-0 entering the fourth quarter, found a way to come back to tie things up at 20 apiece on a touchdown with 13 seconds left to send the game to overtime.

In the extra period, despite losing the coin toss, Virgin Valley scored their touchdown. So, it was all up to Moapa Valley to keep the game going or give the Bulldogs their second straight 3A state title.

"I told the girls on the sidelines, 'You've got four plays for a state championship. It's up to you guys," said Virgin Valley head coach Joey Bowler, who has coached the team since its inception II years ago.

The defense shut out the Pirates on four consecutive plays to give the Bulldogs a state championship to remember for the rest of their lives.

"I was like, 'Look, you get knocked down in life and if you did what you did tonight, keep fighting, you're going to be successful in life because we don't know what kind of hand we get dealt. We just have to fight for

what we want," Bowler said to his players after the game. "I told them how proud I was of them. It was an epic comeback, and they were able to pull it off."

Âs much as the offense was efficient from the fourth quarter on, the pivotal moment came on the defensive side of the ball after Virgin Vallev's first touchdown.

Junior Gentree Draney, who totaled a team-high six tackles and two carries for 12 yards on the offensive side of the ball, recorded an interception with a little more than six minutes left to give the Bulldogs a short field position, leading to a quick score and the momentum continuing to shift.

"That interception was the key to get us the ball back and we went down and scored pretty quick and gave enough time to hold them and get the ball back and go down and score again," Bowler said.

Moapa Valley, which was looking to avenge their two losses against the Bulldogs from earlier in the season, had everything going their way for the first three quarters, forcing Bowler and his team to modify their game plan.

"They came out with some different stuff that we hadn't seen, and it was pretty effective," Bowler said. "They were getting the ball out a lot quicker. Our blitz is really stifling a lot of times. They moved around in the pocket. They got the ball out quick. We had to adjust, especially on defense to what they were doing."

Overall, Bulldogs senior Gabriell Potter completed 8-of-17 passes for 70 yards and two touchdowns. Senior Aracely Lopez was the team's leading rusher with 21 carries for 126 yards and a touchdown while completed two of her five receptions for 32 yards and a touchdown through the air.

"Our senior leadership really carried us in that game," Bowler said. "They came through and those young girls, it's a lot of pressure in a state game and the senior girls came and kept the girls going in the second half."

Senior McKenzie Averett recorded a team-high three receptions and 56 yards while scoring one of the team's three receiving touchdowns. Junior Kaeli Moore caught a 2-yard touchdown pass and freshman Linita Kioa, who noted two receptions for 10 yards, scored from five vards out.

The state championship victory gave Virgin Valley its 20th win of the season and its 16th consecutive victory to end the 2022-23 campaign that was already highlighted by winning the 3A South League championship.

Virgin Valley and Moapa Valley, who are both in the 3Å South League and took the top two spots in league play this season, respectively,

MSG putting finishing touches before first event

The planning stage for the Mesquite Senior Games is coming to an end with the first event on March 3.

Mesquite Senior Games Interim President Sandy Tudor said the progress for the 16-game slate is coming along nicely with a rather smooth registration process.

"We're doing really well," Tudor said. "I don't believe we have any event at the moment that is complete sold out except for bowling. I believe the doubles is sold out and the single event is almost. Everything else we still have some openings. But, were getting great response."

As spots continue to fill, that means the event is inching closer and closer to the start.

Tudor said she wants more squads on the diamond before the softball event kicks off the first weekend of April as only a few events have a threshold.

"We hope all of them get filled," Tudor said of each event. "There are only a few that we have a limit on the number of participants that we can have. Most of them are open to just almost as many as we can get.

"I would like to see more women's softball teams. We've only got 22 and I would like to see that close to 30. But, that's almost our last event. That doesn't happen until the first and second and the fourth and fifth of April. The only thing after that is our bocce tournament.

In addition to softball, the track and field events

are expected to reach a high number of participants with two dozen categories. There are nine running distances, ranging from 50 meters to 5,000 meters. There are five power walk distances from 400 meters to 5,000 meters and other events.

"We have a lot of people who participate in multiple events in track and field," Tudor said. "They walk, they run, they jump. We have power walk and long jump and high jump and pole vault and shot put. We have an 89-year-old pole vaulter, who generally participates.

"We can award up to 70-some medals just in track and field event."

In addition to getting more people to participate in

the various events, Tudor is also on the lookout for more help for the games, that is run by the volunteer coordinator, Beth Caplinger.

"We can use as many people as we can get," Tudor said. "We have a database of about 100 volunteers and what we do is when we have an event come up, like right now, (Caplinger) sends out an email and says these are the events that we have coming up, these are the positions that are available.

"So at our golf events, for example, we'll need a couple of people for check-in, we'll need scorers, we'll need people to measure the long drive. They

sign up for what they're interested in." In addition to the volunteers, the Mesquite Senior Games is looking for a new executive director.

played each other twice during the regular season.

The Bulldogs won both meetings in a span of three weeks, 24-12 at home on Jan. 4 and 34-0 at Moapa Valley on Jan. 26 in Overton.

That meeting to kick the 2023 calendar year, was a similar one despite not having to pull off a miracle like on Friday night.

"Well, we were only down 12-6 at halftime and then we came back and again, we shut them out in the second half and beat them 24-12," Bowler said. "We weren't in such a big hole like we were in the state an automatic external defibrillator, or an AED.

Tudor, who had to use an AED during a softball event five years ago, said it was important to have, especially at the events that do not already have one on site to be prepared if anything happens.

"Well, we're all old and I think we even learned during one of the football games when the 23-year-old went down with heart issues," Tudor said. "We realize there are places that don't have them, or they are not readily available. The nice thing about it, is there are so easy to use.

"You open it up and it walks you through everything you need to do, the first one being the person next to you calls 911."

As the planning concludes before the Target Pistol and Shotgun Sports events on March 3, Tudor is grateful for the sponsors, including its Corporate Sponsor, Mesquite Gaming.

Tudor also thanks the facilities being used for each event, including the Clark County School District and Virgin Valley High School for the track and field events, the Mesquite Athletic & Leisure Service for giving them the recreation center for the basketball, table tennis, pickleball courts and softball amenities and Sun City for the Poker and bocce events.
