In a small town not far from Toronto, Canada, a church was built, dedicated to St. Ann. The priests decided to get u p a pilgrimage of members of the church from the New England states and surrounding country, and the word was sent out that the pope had sent to the church a piece of skin that had come from the arm of the Virgin Mary. Great spiritual blessings were offered to all who would visit the church of St. Ann and bow down before this piece of skin from the arm of the virgin. Each person deposited a sum of money upon entering the church, and none of them less than \$1,00.
