# Automation Notwithstanding, Sky Is The Limit - With Work And Study

One in a Series

Automation is the steel-shanked spectre in homes of many American production workers today. This threat of machine replacing man spoils meals, bewilders breadwinners, and frightens their families.

"I can understand that," said Ford Snell, master mechanic at Wooster Division of Borg-Warner Corp. "But it's not new. . . In many cases, the worry is unnecessary. . . When they replaced steam engines with diesels on the railroads — partially because coal priced itself out of the market — they opened whole new fields of production and maintenance.

"I can imagine the hollering when the first wheel was designed," Snell grinned. "All those hod-carriers out of work."

A brawny man, with the memory of calluses on his hands, Snell has "been learning machines for 29 years." His voice is as soft as his grip is solid. News that a specialist had refused to come in for night work on job set-up made Snell's eyes flatten out, and he said quietly, "What's his reason?"

Hearing the reason, Snell didn't change expression. "Okay — I'll get it done," he said.

### Depends On Person

Snell doesn't agree with many forecasts that industry's fate is swinging shut on young men (or women) who like machinery. No machine will ever replace the creative intelligence, the adaptability of the human brain, he insisted.

"It all depends on the person," he said "If a boy will work and study, the sky's the limit. . . If he just wants a paycheck, he may be stuck."

Does this mean that the youngster with a love for machinery, but no chance at college, is eliminated from industry's future?

"No, sir," Snell snapped. "When we started this division of Borg-Warner nine and a half years ago, I had 48 turret lathes, half a dozen other pieces of precision machinery, a number of

aircraft contracts — and six experienced men. We struggled for weeks and got nowhere.

"I went into personnel," Snell recalled, "and told them, 'Get me some farm boys'. One day they were pitchin' hay — the next day they were runnin' a machine in here. We made machinists out of them. They were willing to work and learn."

### Dad Teaches Sons

Two of Snell's own three sons, Jim, 28, and Ed, 23, are working under their father's bright and penetrating gaze.

Roger, 13, is a freshman at Big Prairie - Lakeville High School. Daughter Linda, 18, is a senior, and Hilda, 16, is a sophomore.

"My sons are learning, from the machines up," Snell said. "Any young man who likes machinery can make a future if he'll dig and listen."

What about the boy who likes the feel of metal in his fingers, is fascinated by working at tolerances 40 times finer than a human hair? Where does he get his training, if he can't go to college?

"He can apprentice into a shop," Snell replied. "In some things, I think four years solid apprenticeship equals four years of college."

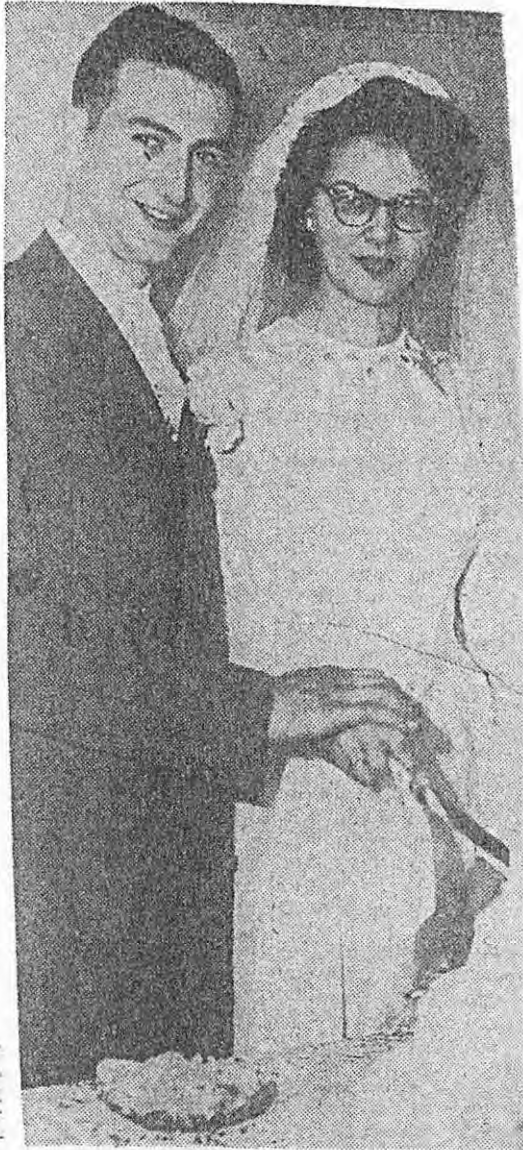

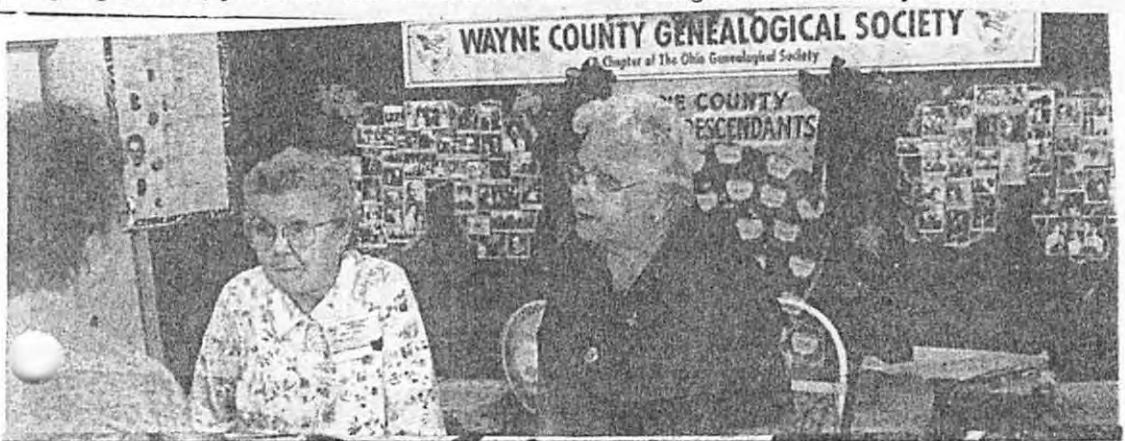

## Daniel Reed Dies At 83

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Daniel A. Reed, who served longer in Congress than any other Republican member, died today at Walter Reed Army Medical Center. He was 83.

Reed, who was also senior GOP member of the tax-writing House Ways & Means Committee, had entered the hospital 14 weeks ago for treatment of an infected foot.

Reed liked to describe himself as an old-fashioned Republican. He was strong for high tariffs and low taxes.

His views on these matters brought him into sharp conflict with President Eisenhower, who was the seventh President to occupy the White House since Reed entered Congress in 1918.

Reed was a strapping six-footer who once played and coached football at Cornell.

He was born on Sept. 15, 1875 at Sheridan, N. Y. He attended public schools and was graduated from Cornell with a law degree in 1898. He stayed on at Cornell for several years to coach the Big Red football team.

Reed was elected to Congress from New York's 43rd District on Nov. 5, 1918, six days before the end of World War I.

He is survived by his widow and a son, William, now with Standard Oil of Indiana.

Mrs. J. J. Fisher, mother of Mrs. Horn, is dead at her home in Louisville from shock caused by the receipt of the news of her daughter's death.

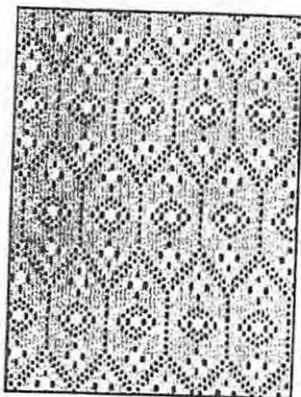

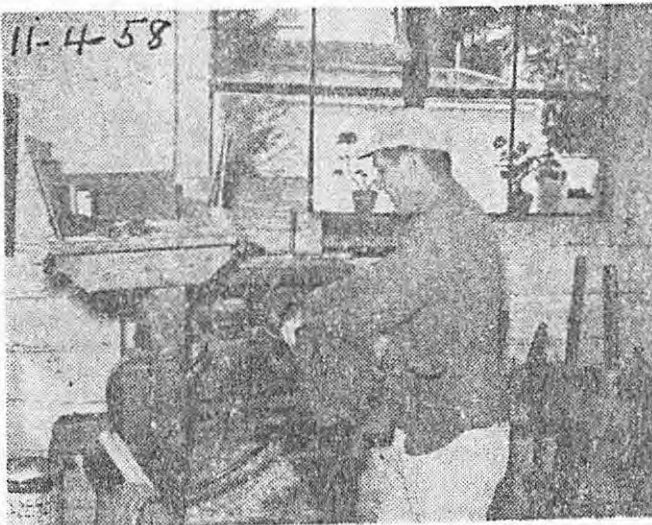

She asserts her husband threatened to do her bodily harm and did strike her Nov. 8, 1932, adding a charge that her husband "colluded" with their two younger children, 18 and 15 years old, with the result that they treated her in a "harsh, rude and insolent manner."

A temporary injunction restraining Ruder from making any disposition of his property, including 196 acres of land, was issued to the filing of the petition.

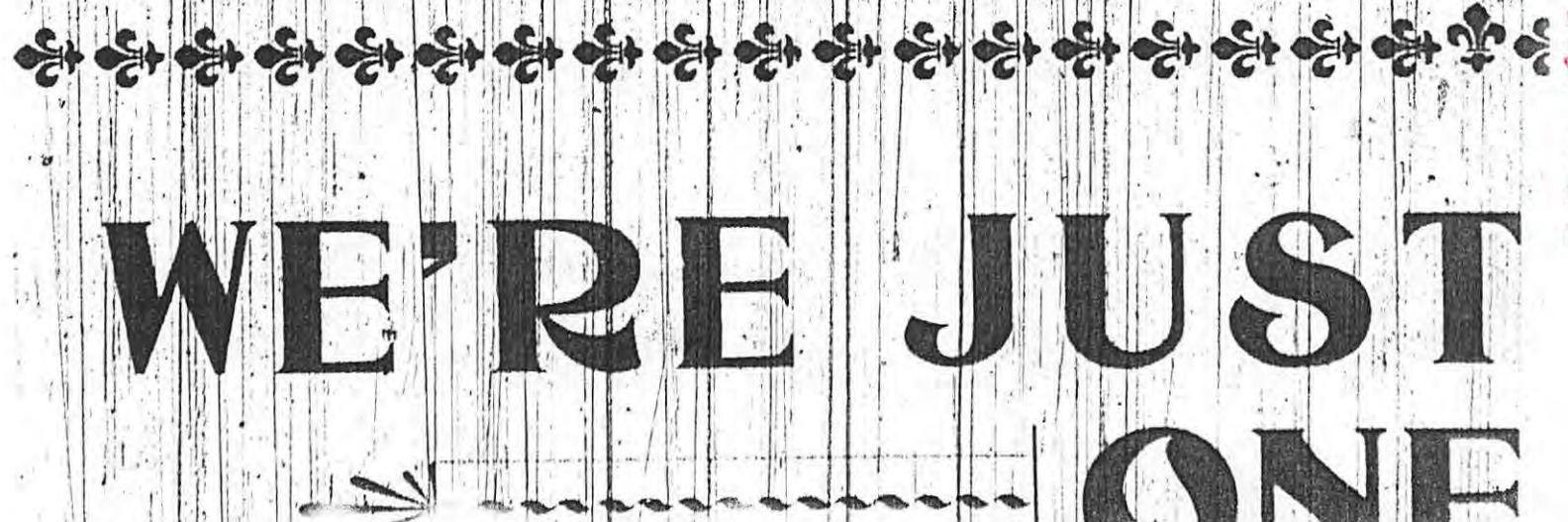

## Spy Claims Hearing Set For Apr. 15

RICHMOND, Va. (UPI) — A preliminary hearing has been set for April 15 for an Army sergeant and his buddy whom the FBI said stole and sold to Russia secrets involving America's missile defenses.

A federal grand jury Tuesday returned espionage indictments against Sgt. Robert Lee Johnson, 43, a courier once based at the Pentagon, and James Allen Mintkenbaugh, 46, a former Army sergeant who kept in close contact with Johnson.

Among the secrets the FBI said the two stole during a 12-year period involving international intrigue in Germany, Paris, California and Ft. Bliss, Tex., were diagrams of the electrical system of the Nike-Ajax missile, once regarded as a front line defense against air attack, U.S. anti-tank missile secrets and other classified documents.

A third indictment named Vitaly Ourjoumov, once an attache at the Russian Embassy in Paris. Ourjoumov, described as a "co-conspirator," is believed back in Russia.

**Little Enthusiasm Shown by Filipinos Over Amnesty Proclamation.**

**Manila, July 30.**—The two day fiesta in Manila, organized by Senor Paterno and his political followers to commemorate the amnesty, resulted in a fiasco. The people were passive, unenthusiastic and not even interested. Failing to perceive any tangible, effective results of amnesty, they say they can see no reason for celebrating.

Judge Taft and his colleagues of the commission felt constrained to decline to attend the banquet, as they had been informed that the speeches would favor independence under American protection and they could not passively lend their acquiescence by being present. Senor Paterno, foreseeing the suspension of the banquet without the Americans, frantically appealed to them to attend, promising that there should be no speeches.

**Week in the Philippines.**

**Manila, July 30.**—During last week's scouting ten Americans were killed and fourteen wounded. One hundred and eighty Filipinos were killed and sixty taken prisoners. Forty insurgent rifles were captured.

**Chance for Recovery.**

**Muncie, Ind., July 30.**—The physicians attending Henry Overmeyer, who attempted suicide Thursday, state that the chances for his recovery are good regardless of the fact that he is 68 years of age and has three pistol bullets in his brain, two sent through the ears, and the other from the rear of the head. The wounds are healing and there is a complete absence of pus formation. Overmeyer is taking nourishment regularly and complains of no pain.

**Livley Excursion Party.**

**Pueblo, Colo., July 30.**—While a large excursion from this city was on Veta Pass a fight occurred in which several drunken men participated. James Parsons was knocked down with a fence rail by Louis Vasquez and will probably die. A. Y. Graybill was shot in the abdomen by Charles Campbell and is dying. Many shots were fired at Campbell, but he escaped. A posse is in pursuit.

**Big Strike Imminent.**

**Cincinnati, O., July 31.**—Charles H. Davis of Newport, Ky., vice president of the Amalgamated Association of Iron and Steel Workers, stated that a strike of 24,000 puddlers in the United States is probable. They demand an increase of from \$5 to \$5.50 a tap and the committee from the union and the employers have failed to agree. The independent mills are willing to grant the demands but the trust holds out.

# Rittman Boy Drowns In Killbuck Near Overton

**RITTMAN** — Nine-year-old William Clifford Snell, only child of Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Snell of Rittman, died Sunday afternoon when he stepped into a 16-foot hole while wading in a creek, and drowned before help arrived.

The Snell family was picnicking at the George farm northwest of Wooster. After dinner Billy and a group of other children went wading in Killbuck Creek.

The accident was investigated by the sheriff's department.

A boy living in the vicinity warned the other waders of the drop-off, but the warning came too late to stop Billy, and he stepped into it, drowning before help could arrive.

Grappling hooks brought the body to the surface about an hour later. It was taken to the Bevington funeral home in Wooster, and later taken to the Gillman funeral home in Rittman.

A boat belonging to Ed Lyons was used to locate the body. Harry Mowrer and Herbert Bittle, two other young men of the community, were in the boat, using the grappling hooks sent to the scene by the Wooster fire department. A hook operated by Mowrer caught the lad's clothing and pulled the body to the surface.

Billy is survived by his parents, his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Chauncey Snell of Rittman, and his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Hiskinson, of Sterling.

The boy's parents reside at 48 Fairlawn ave. in Rittman. His father is a truck-driver for the Lenox Trucking Co.

## Daniel Reed Dies At 83

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Daniel A. Reed, who served longer in Congress than any other Republican member, died today at Walter Reed Army Medical Center. He was 83.

Reed, who was also senior GOP member of the tax-writing House Ways & Means Committee, had entered the hospital 14 weeks ago for treatment of an infected foot.

Reed liked to describe himself as an old-fashioned Republican. He was strong for high tariffs and low taxes.

His views on these matters brought him into sharp conflict with President Eisenhower, who was the seventh President to occupy the White House since Reed entered Congress in 1918.

Reed was a strapping six-footer who once played and coached football at Cornell.

He was born on Sept. 15, 1875, at Sheridan, N. Y. He attended public schools and was graduated from Cornell with a law degree in 1898. He stayed on at Cornell for several years to coach the Big Red football team.

Reed was elected to Congress from New York's 43rd District on Nov. 5, 1918, six days before the end of World War I.

He is survived by his widow and a son, William, now with Standard Oil of Indiana.

# Coastal Quake Made Crevice

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (INS) — University of California geologists reported today they have discovered a gaping crack in the earth, 600 yards long at the center of a recent violent California earthquake.

Geologists Charles Herrick and John Farr said the crack, located at Bear Mountain, was 59 feet at its widest and that the vertical displacement measured 30 inches.

They said the crack is on a high plateau high on the north side of the mountain.

Herrick said the crack was "particularly interesting" because fissures in the earth are rare and said that only 25 recorded quakes have resulted in known surface breaks since scientists first began studying earth tremors.

Meanwhile, Caltech seismologists reported that three more quakes were recorded in their laboratory over the weekend. The shocks were strong enough to rattle window panes in Bakersfield.

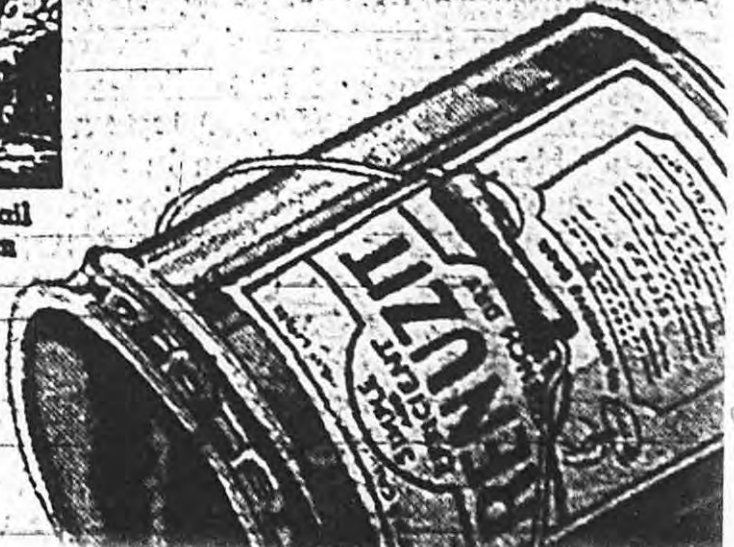

He is a man of considerable force and very practical, believing that his way is the only way, that everything should be done. For some time he had been at Mansfield, making quite a number of converts among the ignorant and sensual kind. He is reported to be healing the sick by means of medicines, condensing doctors, drug stores, etc., and asserts that all can be healed by "Faith cure, prayer, etc." It is said that by reason of this some children of his believers died for want of proper medical treatment; that families became estranged; that many weak minded persons became fanatical under his preaching, gave him money, etc.

But as "religious belief" is free in this country, the authorities could not lay their hands on Fockler, for he was able to hire lawyers, and the authorities were powerless. He was personally warned to keep away from Mansfield, but he came back there last Saturday and

He was given a hot reception. The daily Herald says: Cyrus Hartlet Fockler returned to this city at noon from Chicago and narrowly escaped serious injury at the hands of an infuriated, frenzied, mob of citizens; Fockler registered at the Vonhof immediately in company with E. I. Fisher, of Chicago, and was assigned to room 31 of that hotel. Fockler, accompanied by Attorney A. A. Douglas, went to the office of Mayor Brown immediately after dinner and police protection was demanded for Fockler. Mayor Brown informed him that he could not expect to be allowed to return to Mansfield and locate the citizens by abusing the city officials and in fact everybody and everything but Zion. Fockler then went to the office of Douglas & Meegert, where he remained some little time. Fockler was recognized on the street despite the fact that his beard and mustache were shaved off. The news spread rapidly and an excited crowd soon gathered at Central Park intent on carrying out the threats of mobbing Fockler in case he returned. The crowd gathered rapidly and in a short time the street in front of the office of Douglas & Meegert was thronged with people. Patrols were established and every avenue of escape carefully guarded.

Suddenly the cry arose that Fockler was making his escape by a rear entrance in the Newman block and the crowd surged around the building by the rear entrance and walked hurriedly down the alley to East Third and from thence to Main street, where he entered the Vonhof and went to his room. The throng, however, were about two minutes behind him. In three minutes the vicinity of the Vonhof was a sea of angry faces and excited citizens clamoring for Fockler. Two or three of the crowd came up the fire escape in the rear of the Vonhof and into Fockler's room, where they grabbed Fockler and hustled him out into the corridor. While there he was struck a couple of times on the head which were the only blows which he received. The crowd were unable to find any tar and took him outside the building.

### Killed by the Cars.

An aged citizen, Jacob Snell, a worthy man of Canaan township, was killed by the cars in Wooster last Monday morning. He and his son G. C. spected citizens, was laid to rest on  
last week Tuesday. He was called  
from this life in a way that was least  
expected in his individual case, as he

been a great surprise. We learn from  
his death, that there is a way to  
eternity that we all must travel, and  
none but God knows the way. We  
often times think that it is well that  
we are left alone to grope our way in

death would be before we are taken

ley W., who is at home with his  
mother.

Mr. Snell was a man of more than  
ordinary force of character, endowed  
with elements of usefulness and pos-  
sessing that sweet disposition of tem-  
per and unselfishness that endeared  
him to all with whom he came in con-  
tact. Many said that he was one of  
the best men they ever knew. If  
there ever was a Christian he  
was one. His life has been  
one of devotion and self-sacrifice  
for those he loved. Without a doubt  
many who read these lines can testify  
to the substantial tokens of his  
friendship. His Christian faith was  
simple, strong and beautiful. His  
life, though quiet, an unassuming,  
was fully consecrated to his Master.  
His voice was ever heard at the fam-  
ily altar, pleading for the salvation of  
his children and friends and neigh-  
bors. Although his hearing was  
blunt from age, his place at the  
church was never vacant, unless by  
sickness, and though the reaper came  
suddenly he was prepared to go.

The church has lost a good, faithful  
member, the wife a devoted, loving  
companion, and his sons a fond af-  
fectionate father. He leaves a widow  
who has the sympathy of all, as this  
is the third shock of the kind in the  
family. A son, a daughter and

mourn his loss.

# TANDARDS FOR OHIO NURSES

Measure Passed by House Would Set Up State Board to Set Up Regulations.

COLUMBUS, O., April 2— The state today received a bill from the House which would create a state nurses' board of five members empowered to establish standards for Ohio nurses and regulate practice of professional nursing.

Under provisions of the measure passed in the House without dissenting vote, the State Nurses' association would select the five-member board, subject to the approval of the governor, and finance operations of the commission from funds provided by fees paid members of the association. Some opposition to the bill developed prior to the vote on the grounds that nurses would "practically be practicing medicine," but opposition vanished when a large delegation from the Nurses' association appeared in the House gallery.

**Separate From Doctors**  
The bill specifically decrees that the nurses' board be kept separate from the State Medical Board which heretofore has conducted examinations and established standards for the nursing profession.

A flood of minor bills streamed through both the House and Senate the first day of the new month with lackadaisical debate carrying the legislature into a prolonged session.

**Milk Marketing Bill**  
By a vote of 118-0, the House passed a bill to set up liquid measure standards for marketing milk and other fluid dairy products. Rep. Chapman (R-Geauga) sponsored the measure which goes to the Senate with strong backing from rural and agricultural counties.

After sharp debate, the House passed by a vote of 106-24 the Chesney bill which would require only one means of egress in fireproof apartment buildings of not more than three stories. The opposition to the measure contended that exits should be provided to insure safety of tenants from fire.

## School Men Re-Employed

George Eastman, Dalton school superintendent, and Paul Dodez, Dalton High School principal, were re-employed for two years at a meeting of the Sugar Creek Township board of education last night. The board also re-hired all other teachers of the high school staff with the probability that some adjustments will be made in assignments.

CAMBRIDGE, O., April 2.—Attorney C. Ellis Moore, 57, who represented the 15th Ohio District in Congress for 14 consecutive years before he retired from public life eight years ago, died today at his home from coronary thrombosis. He was a Republican.

Moore was a leader in Republican party circles for many years. On numerous occasions friends urged him to seek the gubernatorial nomination, but he always declined. He served for four years as Guernsey County prosecutor, and was the only man from the county listed in "Who's Who in America." Since his retirement from Congress, Moore practiced law and served as president of the Central National Bank.

## Ex-Woosterian, Inventor, Dead At Age Of 91

DECATUR, Ill. (UPI) — John Leon Bennett, 91, an inventive genius who helped introduce the wire fly swatter and metal beer can to American life, died Saturday at St. Mary's Hospital.

An Ohio-born wizard whose imagination and energy knew no bounds, Bennett was involved in several business efforts ranging from coal companies to cemeteries. He raised championship show horses and was an active sportsman into his 70s.

He was born Aug. 11, 1874, at Newark, Ohio. He was a high school football star at Wooster, Ohio, and came to this Central Illinois town in 1898 as an employe of the Wabash Railroad.

It was in Decatur during the summer of 1900 that R. R. Montgomery invented the wire fly swatter. At that time, flies were swatted mainly with folded newspapers and church fans, and Montgomery theorized that a wire fly swatter would cause less breeze and nail more flies.

Bennett also is credited with thinking up the idea of a metal beer can. He once told a reporter the thought occurred to him in Chicago, in 1934, while he was having lunch with some can company executives.
